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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency

wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacode.com.

Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state. pa.us.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is available at www.pabulletin.com.

Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

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Third parties may not take information from the *Pennsylvania Code* and *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and reproduce, disseminate or publish such information except as provided by 1 Pa. Code § 3.44. 1 Pa. Code § 3.44 reads as follows:

§ 3.44. General permission to reproduce content of Code and Bulletin.

Information published under this part, which information includes, but is not limited to, cross references, tables of cases, notes of decisions, tables of contents, indexes, source notes, authority notes, numerical lists and codification guides, other than the actual text of rules or regulations may be reproduced only with the written consent of the Bureau. The information which appears on the same leaf with the text of a rule or regulation, however, may be incidentally reproduced in connection with the reproduction of the rule or regulation, if the reproduction is for the private use of a subscriber and not for resale. There are no other restrictions on the reproduction of information published under this part, and the Commonwealth hereby consents to a reproduction.

Rule 205.2(a). Filing of Legal Papers with the Prothonotary.

All papers filed in the Prothonotary's Office shall conform to the following requirements:

- 1. The use of backers and/or toppers is prohibited.
- 2. Original pleadings shall be held together by paper clip or expandable spring-loaded clip.
- 3. Original pleadings shall not be highlighted by the use of colored markers. Highlighting of text can be done on the computer by bolding or using a different shape and size of font.
- 4. All documents shall be single-sided, double spaced and the font size shall be no less than 12 points.
- 5. Paper size shall not exceed 8 1/2" x 11" and shall be on good quality paper.
- 6. Attachments smaller than 8 $1/2" \times 11"$ paper shall be attached to regular size paper by using scotch tape.
- 7. All exhibits shall be identified and marked on the bottom center of each exhibit. No exhibit tabs shall be allowed.
- 8. Pages must be consecutively numbered beginning with page 2 and said number shall appear in the upper right hand corner of the pleading.
- 9. All copies attached to the pleadings must be clear and legible.
- 10. Any documents presented for filing referring to social security numbers, driver's license/vehicle identification numbers, and any financial account numbers shall list only the last four digits. Birth dates shall be limited to the year of birth only. When reference is made to a minor child (i.e., individuals less than 18 years of age), the names shall not be given, only their initials. The complete social security numbers, account numbers, dates of birth and full names of minors shall be submitted on the Court's "CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION FORM" attached hereto. The Prothonotary's Office shall record the Confidential Information in the Court Computer Database and, upon verification of proper entry, shall shred the form containing the Confidential Information. This information shall remain confidential in that it will only be visible to internal personnel and cannot be accessed through the public access programs.

11. The parties and their attorneys are solely responsible for complying with the provisions of number 10 above. The court staff is not responsible for reviewing any document filed as a public record for compliance with

number 10 above. A party's or attorney's failure to comply with the provisions shall not affect access to case records that are otherwise accessible.

For form of briefs, see CARB.R.C.P. 210.
- 2 Any party opposing the motion shall file a response within thirty (30) days of service of the motion, together with a certificate of service evidencing service in accord-
- ance with number one above. Service shall be required on the District Court Administrator. A party who fails to respond to the motion shall be deemed to be unopposed to the granting of the motion without contest.
- 3 Upon service of the motion and response on the District Court Administrator, the matter shall be decided on briefs unless the assigned Judge requests that argument be scheduled. If a party desires argument, a Praecipe for Argument shall accompany the motion or response.
- 4 A respondent briefing schedule will be issued by the Court contemporaneous with the scheduling of any argument ordered by the Judge or requested by the filing of

5 A party who fails to file a brief shall not be permitted to argue.

- (4) One certified copy shall be sent to the Fayette County Law Library and the Editor of the *Fayette Legal Journal*.

The adoption of the Custody of Evidence Admitted in Court policy shall become effective thirty (30) days after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Custody of Evidence Admitted in Court

- (1) ALL evidence offered by a party in any civil, criminal, juvenile or orphans' court proceeding SHALL, after admission, remain in the custody of counsel for the party offering said evidence; and counsel for the offering party SHALL be required to secure and maintain the evidence, unadulterated, and insure the evidence is present in Court during all Court proceedings and available for jury deliberation.
- (2) Counsel for the parties shall be required to secure and maintain all evidence admitted in Court throughout the pendency of all appeals.
- (3) Under NO CIRCUMSTANCES SHALL the Court, or any officer thereof, take custody of any controlled substances, intoxicants, firearms, explosives, currency, money, or negotiable instruments admitted into evidence

in Court. Nor shall any of the aforementioned items be permitted to be in the custody of a jury at any time, including deliberations.

If during deliberations, the jury requests to view such evidence, the Court in its discretion, may permit such viewing in open court or by providing the evidence to a Deputy Sheriff who shall display the evidence to the jury in the jury room. In so doing, the Deputy Sheriff shall at all times maintain custody of such evidence and shall not speak or answer any questions.

(4) All such evidence as described in paragraph (3) shall remain in the custody of the offering party and may only be disposed of by return, forfeiture, or destruction pursuant to a Court Order and according to law.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

DEPARTMENT OF BANKING AND SECURITIES

[10 PA. CODE CH. 57]

Debt Management Services Continuing Education

The Department of Banking and Securities (Department) proposes to add Chapter 57 (relating to debt management services continuing education) to read as set forth in Annex A. This chapter is proposed under the authority of section 9(c) of the Debt Management Services Act (act) (63 P. S. § 2409(c)).

Purpose

The proposed rulemaking sets forth the continuing education requirements for credit counselors and supervisors employed by a debt management services licensee. The proposed rulemaking will satisfy the Department's obligation under section 9(c) of the act to promulgate regulations delineating the continuing education requirements for credit counselors and supervisors employed by debt management services licensees.

Explanation of Regulatory Requirements

Proposed § 57.1 (relating to definitions) defines the words and terms used in Chapter 57.

Proposed § 57.11 (relating to continuing education requirements) sets forth the continuing education requirements for credit counselors and supervisors.

Proposed § 57.12 (relating to course format) clarifies the acceptable formats for continuing education units.

Proposed § 57.13 (relating to former registered certifying organizations) explains how the Department will treat continuing education units obtained from a certifying organization which is no longer on the provider list.

Proposed § 57.21 (relating to reporting) sets forth the information a licensee shall report to the Department and how and when the information is to be reported.

Proposed § 57.22 (relating to recordkeeping) sets forth the recordkeeping requirements for licensees.

Proposed \S 57.23 (relating to compliance) explains how the Department will verify compliance.

Proposed § 57.24 (relating to enforcement) sets forth the Department's enforcement powers.

Proposed § 57.31 (relating to registration) explains the method for registering as an acceptable certifying organization.

Proposed § 57.32 (relating to criteria) sets forth the Department's criteria for the designation of an acceptable continuing education provider.

Proposed § 57.33 (relating to verification) explains how the Department will verify that a certifying organization continues to meet the criteria of § 57.32.

Affected Parties

The proposed rulemaking would affect debt management services providers licensed by the Department.

Fiscal Impact

State government

The proposed rulemaking would have a de minimus impact on the Department. The Department already

regulates the debt management services providers. Proposed Chapter 57 only adds another item that the Department will review in its investigations and examinations. The proposed rulemaking will not have impact on the Commonwealth and its political subdivisions.

Regulated community

The proposed rulemaking would have a de minimus impact on the regulated community. Credit counselors employed by debt management services licensees already complete continuing education to obtain and maintain credit counselor certification. Proposed Chapter 57 would only add the cost of attendance of continuing education for supervisors if the supervisors are not also certified as credit counselors.

Paperwork

The proposed rulemaking would require the regulated community to maintain documentation to verify that the credit counselors and supervisors in its employ completed the continuing education requirements.

Effective Date and Sunset Date

Chapter 57 will be effective upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The regulations do not have a sunset date because the Department will periodically review the effectiveness of the regulations.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on April 24, 2014, the Department submitted a copy of this proposed rulemaking and a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form to IRRC and to the Chairpersons of the House Commerce Committee and the Senate Banking and Insurance Committee. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC may convey any comments, recommendations or objections to the proposed rulemaking within 30 days of the close of the public comment period. The comments, recommendations or objections must specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the rulemaking, by the Department, the General Assembly and the Governor of comments, recommendations or objections raised.

§ 57.1. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Act—Debt Management Services Act (63 P. S. §§ 2401—2449).

Certifying organization—An independent third-party offering debt management services certification for credit counselors and continuing education courses for supervi-

Continuing education unit—An hour of continuing education.

Credit counselor—An individual who interacts, corresponds or otherwise communicates with a consumer on behalf of a licensee to discuss, develop, implement or maintain a consumer education program for the consumer regarding debt management services.

Licensee—A debt management service provider licensed by the Department under the act.

Supervisor—An individual with direct responsibility for the actions of one or more credit counselors, for example, a manager.

Subchapter B. CREDIT COUNSELORS AND SUPERVISORS

57.11. Continuing education requirements.

57.12 Course format.

Former registered certifying organizations. 57.13.

§ 57.11. Continuing education requirements.

The following continuing education requirements shall be met:

- (1) A credit counselor shall maintain valid certification through a registered certifying organization.
- (2) A supervisor shall complete a minimum of 16 continuing education units every 2 years through a registered certifying organization.

§ 57.12. Course format.

A credit counselor or supervisor may complete continuing education units through a course format offered by a registered certifying organization including live instruction, web and teleconference formats.

§ 57.13. Former registered certifying organizations.

If a credit counselor or supervisor completes courses with a certifying organization that the Department removes from the provider list, the Department will consider the continuing education units:

(1) Valid if the credit counselor or supervisor completed the units before the Department removed the certifying organization from the list and the Department will not take action against the licensee.

(2) Invalid if the credit counselor or supervisor completed the units after the Department removed the certifying organization from the list and the Department will consider taking action against the licensee.

Subchapter C. LICENSEES

§ 57.21. Reporting.

- (a) The licensee shall prepare a statement verifying that the credit counselors and supervisors employed by the licensee meet the continuing education requirements.
- (b) The statement must include a list for each credit counselor that contains the credit counselor's:
 - (1) Name.
 - (2) Job title.
 - (3) Work address.
 - (4) Certification number.
 - (5) Hire date.
 - (6) Certification effective date.
 - (7) Certification expiration date.
 - (8) Certifying organization.
- (c) The statement must include a list for each supervisor that contains the supervisor's:
 - (1) Name.
 - (2) Job title.
 - (3) Work address.
- (4) Completed continuing education units within the past 24 months.
 - (5) Hire date.
 - (6) Certifying organization.
- (d) The licensee shall submit the statement to the Department as part of each debt management license renewal application.

§ 57.22. Recordkeeping.

The licensee shall keep records regarding completion of the continuing education requirements for at least four license renewal periods.

§ 57.23. Compliance.

The Department will verify compliance with this chapter through the methods statutorily available to the Department under the act, including examination. If the Department conducts an examination, the Department will assess examination costs on the licensee consistent with section 17(1) of the act (63 P.S. § 2417(1)).

§ 57.24. Enforcement.

- (a) A violation of this chapter is a violation of the act.
- (b) If the licensee violates this chapter, the Department will use the enforcement options statutorily available to it under the act, including revocation of the license, suspension of the license or assessment of a penalty.

§ 57.31. Registration.

- (a) The certifying organization shall submit a completed registration form to the Department to be considered an acceptable certifying organization. The Department will provide the form on the Department's web site.
- (b) The Department will maintain a list of registered certifying organizations on its web site at www.dobs. state.pa.us.

§ 57.32. Criteria.

The Department will consider the certifying organization to be an acceptable continuing education provider if the certifying organization:

- (1) Submits the registration form to the Department.
- (2) Requires at least 16 continuing education units for credit counselor certification.
- (3) Offers credit counselor certification that is valid for no longer than 24 months.
- (4) Permits supervisors to attend continuing education

§ 57.33. Verification.

- (a) The Department will periodically request that the registered certifying organization resubmit the form provided by the Department to verify that the certifying organization continues to meet the criteria.
- (b) If a registered certifying organization fails to meet the requirements of this chapter, the Department will remove that certifying organization's name from the Department's web site as an acceptable provider.

PHILADELPHIA PARKING AUTHORITY

[52 PA. CODE CHS. 1001, 1011 AND 1051] **Annual Filing Requirements**

The Philadelphia Parking Authority (Authority), on March 24, 2014, adopted a proposed rulemaking order to modify existing annual filing requirements to eliminate reference to the term "expire" when used in conjunction with a certificate of public convenience and that filing requirement. While the Authority's regulations do not provide for the expiration of certificates of public convenience, some industry members have expressed confusion over the use of this term. The proposed regulation is intended only for those clarification purposes.

Proposed Rulemaking Order

By the Authority:

In accordance with of the act of July 16, 2004, (P. L. 758, No. 94), 53 Pa.C.S. §§ 5701 et seq., as amended, (the "act"), the Authority formally commences its rulemaking process to promulgate a regulation to clarify annual information update procedures for the Philadelphia taxi-

cab and limousine industries and to amend regulations to reflect applicable statutory changes as provided in Act 64 of 2013.² The Authority seeks comments from all interested parties on the proposed regulation, which are found at Annex A to this Order.

A. Background and discussion.

The Authority's existing regulations require all regulated parties to make an annual information filing (renewal) with the Authority to assure that the individual or business entity is in continuing compliance with the act and the Authority's orders and regulations. This annual update or "renewal" process was an issue during the promulgation of the regulations because the regulations use to term expired as to certificates of public convenience. See 41 Pa.B. 6499, 6526 (December 11, 2011).

The proposed regulation will eliminate the use of the word expired as to taxicab, limousine and dispatcher certificates of public convenience to eliminate confusion. Because driver certificates and broker registrations do expire, the term will continue to apply in that context. Driver certificates and broker registrations will continue to be subject to an annual approval process.

B. The regulation.

We propose amending the below referenced sections to reflect the current budget statutes and to eliminate the use of the confusing term "expired" in connection with certificates of public convenience. Under the regulations, certificates of public convenience do not expire.

§ 1001.43. Authority fee schedule.

We propose amending subsections (a) and (b) of this section to accurately reflect the applicable provisions of sections 5707 and 5710 of the act. Section 5710 is new and specifically deals with the use of fees and the creation of a fee schedule. The act was amended to eliminate the original deemed approved budgetary language and replace that approval process with one that requires compliance with Article VI of the act of April 9, 1929 (P. L. 177, No. 175), known as The Administrative Code of 1929 as required by the new 5707 (a) of the act. The act's annual budget process was amended by the Legislature in response to a negative decision of the Commonwealth Court of Pennsylvania.³

§ 1011.3. Annual rights renewal process.

We propose amending this section to eliminate the use of the term "expired" in relation to a certificate of public convenience which can expire under our regulations. The same forms will be used and the term expired will continue to be used in relation to taxicab driver certificates and broker registrations, which can expire under the regulations.

A new subsection (g) was created to differentiate taxicab, limousine and dispatcher certificates of public convenience from driver certificates and broker registrations. The annual filing procedure will remain the same for these certificate holders. The failure to make this important regulatory filing will continue to result in an out of service designation. In addition, the identification of issues that would have prohibited the original application of a certificate holder from approval will render the certificate holder's vehicles ineligible for attachment of a TLD inspection sticker, if the underlying issue is not corrected. This annual filing and review process often

evidences issues that are in need of correction by the certificate holder. Those issues include outstanding regulatory penalties, moving violations, out of date insurance filings and other issues that are generally corrected by the certificate holder when brought to their attention during this review.

This is one of the reasons that this annual information review is important, it causes the regulated parties and the regulator to re-examine key compliance issues and make corrections where necessary. The same substantive changes were made to the annual information filing process for limousines in section 1051.3 (relating to annual rights renewal process), although in that section only limousine drivers and limousine certificates of public convenience need be referenced.

§ 1011.4. Annual assessments and renewal fees.

We propose amending this section to create consistency with the statutory changes of Act 64. The applicable subsections of § 5707 (relating to budget and assessments) are now referenced. Subsection (b) notes the assessment payment time line required by Act 64. Also, subsection (c) has been amended to change the optional assessment payment installment dates from the set June 15 date, to 15 days after notice of the assessment is made to the certificate holder. We understand that the Commonwealth's budget is often not completed by June 15, this change will permit all parties flexibility in exercising this payment option. The same changes were made to section 1057.1 (relating to annual assessments and renewal fees), which applies to limousine service.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on April 29, 2014, the Authority submitted a copy of this proposed rulemaking to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the House Urban Affairs Committee and the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee. In addition to submitting the proposed rulemaking, the Commission provided IRRC and will provide the Committees with a copy of a detailed Regulatory Analysis Form. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC may convey any comments, recommendations or objections to the proposed rulemaking within 30 days of the close of the public comment period. The comments, recommendations or objections must specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the rulemaking, by the Authority, the General Assembly and the Governor of comments, recommendations or objections raised.

Conclusion

The Authority, therefore, formally commences its rule-making process to promulgate this regulation to become part of 52 Pa. Code Part II in a manner consistent with Annex A to this Order. The Authority seeks comments from all interested parties on this proposed body of regulations, which are found at Annex A to this Order. The Authority hereby advises that all comments submitted in response to this Order will be posted, without redaction of name, address, or other personal information or comment provided, on the website of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission, which may be reached at (717) 783-5417.

S. §§ 1201 and 1202), and the regulations promulgated thereunder at 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1, 7.2 and 7.5; section 204(b) of the Commonwealth Attorneys Act (71 P. S. § 732.204(b)); section 745.5 of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5); and section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232); and the regulations promulgated at 4 Pa. Code §§ 7.231—7.234, the Authority proposes adoption of the regulations set forth in Annex A; *Therefore*,

It Is Ordered That:

- 1. A proposed rulemaking be opened to consider the regulation set forth in Annex A.
- 2. The Executive Director shall submit this proposed rulemaking Order and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General for review as to form and legality.
- 3. The Executive Director shall submit this proposed rulemaking Order and Annex A for review and comments to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission and the Legislative Standing Committees.
- 4. The Executive Director shall do all such other things necessary to advance this regulation through the appropriate promulgations process in an expeditious manner.
- 5. The Secretary of the Board shall certify this proposed rulemaking Order and Annex A and that the Executive Director shall deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*
- 6. An original and 15 copies of any written comments referencing the docket number of the proposed regulation be submitted within 30 days of publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* to the Philadelphia Parking Authority, Attn: General Counsel, 701 Market Street, Suite 5400, Philadelphia, PA 19106.

CHAPTER 1001. RULES OF ADMINISTRATIVE PRACTICE AND PROCEDURE

Subchapter E. FEES

§ 1001.43. Authority fee schedule.

(a) The Authority will issue a new fee schedule for each fiscal year[, subject to disapproval of the Legislature, under section 5707(b) of the act (relating to budget and fees)] under section 5710(a) of the act (relating to fees).

- (b) The Authority will provide general notice of the new fee schedule through publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The Authority will provide direct notice of the fee schedule by email to each certificate holder [as required under section 5707(b) of the act] within 5 days of its effective date. The current fee schedule may be obtained from the Authority's web site at www.phila park.org/tld.
- (c) Supersession. Subsection (a) supersedes 1 Pa. Code §§ 33.21(b) and 33.23 (relating to filing fees; and copy fees).

Subpart B. TAXICABS CHAPTER 1011. GENERAL PROVISIONS

§ 1011.3. Annual rights renewal process.

- (a) Expiration of [certificate] driver and broker rights. All driver and broker rights will expire annually, [including the following] as follows:
- [(1) Except as provided in subsection (f), a certificate will expire on June 30 of each year.
- (2) \(\) (1) A taxicab driver's certificate will expire 1 year from its date of issuance or renewal.
- [(3)] (2) Except as provided in subsection (f), a broker registration will expire on June 30 of each year.
 - (b) Expired rights.
- (1) Expired rights will be placed out of service by the Authority as provided in § 1003.32 (relating to out of service designation).
- (2) Taxicab driver certificates that have been expired for 1 year or more will be deemed cancelled.
 - (c) Renewal forms.
- (1) Rights [issued by the Authority] in subsection (a) shall be renewed by completing and filing the required renewal form with the Manager of Administration. Renewal forms may be obtained on the Authority's web site at www.philapark.org/tld or from TLD Headquarters.
- (2) The renewal forms may require the submission of additional information or documents to confirm continuing eligibility under the act or this part.
- (3) The renewal forms must be verified as provided in § 1001.36 (relating to verification and affidavit) and filed as follows:
- [(i) For medallion taxicab certificates, Form TX-1 "Medallion Renewal" shall be filed on or before February 15 of each year.
- (ii) For partial-rights taxicab certificates, Form PR-1 "Partial Rights Renewal" shall be filed on or before February 15 of each year.
- (iii) For dispatcher certificates, Form DSP-6 "Dispatcher Renewal" shall be filed on or before February 15 of each year.
- (iv)] (i) For taxicab drivers' certificates, Form DR-3 "Driver Renewal" shall be filed between 60 and 90 days before the expiration date printed on the taxicab driver's certificate
- [(v)] (ii) For broker registrations, a Form BR-4 "Broker Renewal" shall be filed on or before February 15 of each year.
- (d) Renewal denial. The Authority will deny renewal of rights in the following circumstances:

- (1) If the owner of the rights subject to renewal fails to complete the renewal process.
- (2) The renewal process reveals information about the renewing person [or those with a controlling interest in the renewing person] that would have resulted in a denial of an initial application for the rights.
- (3) The renewing person fails to comply with § 1011.4 (relating to annual assessments and renewal fees).
- (e) Suspended driver and broker rights. Rights subject to suspension for any reason must be renewed on the dates and in the manner provided by [this section] subsection (c)(3) regardless of the suspended status.
- (f) New certificates and registrations. A certificate or broker registration will not be subject to the renewal **or annual information filing** requirements in this section during the calendar year in which it is first issued.
 - (g) Taxicab and dispatcher information filing.
- (1) The owner of taxicab or dispatcher rights shall complete the annual information filing required under this subsection to ensure continued compliance with the act, this part and the orders of the Authority.
- (2) The annual information filing required under this subsection must be verified as provided in § 1001.36 and filed with the Manager of Administration as follows:
- (i) For medallion taxicab certificates, Form TX-1 "Medallion Renewal" shall be filed on or before February 15 of each year.
- (ii) For partial-rights taxicab certificates, Form PR-1 "Partial Rights Renewal" shall be filed on or before March 31 of each year.
- (iii) For dispatcher certificates, Form DSP-6 "Dispatcher Renewal" shall be filed on or before March 31 of each year.
- (3) The forms identified in paragraph (2) may require the submission of additional information or documents in furtherance of that review and may be obtained on the Authority's web site at www.philapark.org/tld or from TLD Headquarters.
- (4) The filing requirements of this subsection apply to rights subject to suspension for any reason.
- (5) The failure to file Form LM-1 will subject the applicable rights to an out of service designation as provided in § 1003.32.
- (6) The TLD will not issue a TLD inspection sticker to a vehicle operated through a taxicab certificate if the review of the information required under this section reveals information about the certificate holder that would have resulted in a denial of an initial application for the rights. This paragraph does not relieve a certificate holder of any other penalty that may result from noncompliance, nor the obligation to appear at inspections as directed by the TLD.

§ 1011.4. Annual assessments and renewal fees.

(a) Assessments and renewal fees. The owners of rights issued by the Authority shall pay an annual assessment or renewal fee in an amount established each year under section [5707(b)] 5707(a) and (c) of the act (relating to budget and [fees] assessments) and as set forth in the

Authority's annual fee schedule as provided in § 1001.43 (relating to Authority fee schedule).

- (b) Payment of assessments by certificate holders. [Except as provided in subsection (c), the annual assessment for certificate holders is due on or before June 15 of each year.] Assessment payments shall be made by each certificate holder as provided in section 5707.1(a) of the act (relating to assessment notice and hearings).
- (c) Installment payments. Upon request by a taxical certificate holder through the annual renewal form required under [§ 1011.3] § 1011.3(g) (relating to annual rights renewal process), the Director may permit certificate holders to pay the assessment in two equal installments on or before [June 15] the 15th day from notice of assessment as provided in section 5707.1(a) of the act and December 15 of each year, as limited under subsections (d) and (e).
- (f) Payment of renewal fees by taxicab drivers. The annual renewal fee for taxicab drivers is due with the filing of the DR-3 as provided in [§ 1011.3(c)(3)(iv) (relating to annual rights renewal process)] § 1011.3(c)(3)(i).
- (g) Payment of renewal fees by brokers. The annual renewal fee for brokers is due with the filing of the BR-4 as provided in [§ 1011.3(c)(3)(v)] § 1011.3(c)(3)(ii).

Subpart C. LIMOUSINES

CHAPTER 1051. GENERAL PROVISIONS

§ 1051.3. Annual rights renewal process.

- (a) Expiration of driver's certificate. [All rights will expire annually, including the following:
- (1) Except as provided in subsection (f), a certificate will expire on June 30 of each year.
- (2) A limousine driver's certificate will expire 1 year from its date of issuance or renewal.
 - (b) Expired rights.
- (1) Expired rights will be placed out of service by the Authority as provided in § 1003.32 (relating to out of service designation).
- (2) Limousine driver certificates that have been expired for 1 year or more will be deemed cancelled.
 - (c) Renewal forms.
- (1) [Rights issued by the Authority] Limousine driver certificates shall be renewed by completing and filing the [required renewal form] Form DR-3 "Driver Renewal" with the Manager of Administration. Renewal forms may be obtained on the Authority's web site at www.philapark.org/tld or from TLD Headquarters.
- (2) [The renewal forms] Form DR-3 may require the submission of additional information or documents to confirm continuing eligibility under the act [or this part, or both], this part and orders of the Authority and must be verified as provided in § 1001.36 (relating to verification and affidavit).
- [(3) The renewal forms must be verified as provided in § 1001.36 (relating to verification and affidavit) and filed as follows:

- (i) For limousine certificates, Form LM-1 "Limousine Renewal" shall be filed on or before April 1 of each year.
 - (ii) For limousine drivers' certificates,]
- (3) Form DR-3 ["Driver Renewal"] shall be filed between 90 and 60 days before the expiration date printed on the limousine driver's certificate.
- (d) *Renewal denial*. The Authority will deny renewal of **[rights] a limousine driver certificate** in the following circumstances:
- (1) If the owner of the rights subject to renewal fails to complete the renewal process.
- (2) The renewal process reveals information about the renewing person [or those with a controlling interest in the renewing person] that would result in a denial of an initial application for the rights.
- (3) The renewing person fails to comply with § 1051.4 (relating to annual assessments and renewal fees).
- (e) Suspended driver rights. Rights subject to suspension for any reason shall be renewed on the dates and in the manner provided by this section regardless of the suspended status.
- (f) New certificates [and registrations]. A certificate will not be subject to the [renewal] information filing requirements [in this section] of subsection (g) during the calendar year in which it is first issued.
 - (g) Limousine information filing.
- (1) The owner of limousine rights shall complete on an annual basis Form LM-1 "Limousine Renewal" to ensure continued compliance with the act, this part and the orders of the Authority.
- (2) Form LM-1 shall be verified as provided in \$ 1001.36 and filed with the Manager of Administration on or before March 31 of each year.
- (3) Form LM-1 may require the submission of additional information or documents and may be obtained on the Authority's web site at www.philapark.org/tld or from TLD Headquarters.
- (4) The filing requirements of this subsection apply to rights subject to suspension for any reason.
- (5) The failure to file Form LM-1 will subject the applicable rights to an out of service designation as provided in § 1003.32.
- (6) The TLD will not issue a TLD inspection sticker to a vehicle operated through a taxicab certificate if the review of the information required under this section reveals information about the certificate holder that would have resulted in a denial of an initial application for the rights. This paragraph does not relieve a certificate holder of any other penalty that may result from noncompliance, nor the obligation to appear at inspections as directed by the TLD.

§ 1051.4. Annual assessments and renewal fees.

(a) Assessments and renewal fees. The owners of rights issued by the Authority shall pay an annual assessment or renewal fee in an amount established each year under section [5707(b)] 5707(a) and (c) of the act (relating to budget and [fees] assessments) and as set forth in the

Authority's annual fee schedule as provided in § 1001.43 (relating to Authority fee schedule).

- (b) Payment of assessments by certificate holders. The annual assessment for certificate holders is due [on or before June 30 of each year] as provided in section 5707.1(a) of the act (relating to assessment notice and hearings).
- (c) Payment of renewal fees by limousine drivers. The annual renewal fee for limousine drivers is due with the filing of the DR-3 as provided in [§ 1051.3(c)(3)(ii)] § 1051.3(c)(4) (relating to annual rights renewal process).
- (d) Late assessment or renewal fee payments. Rights issued by the Authority may be placed out of service at the time an assessment or renewal fee payment becomes late, as provided in § 1003.32 (relating to out of service designation).


Reorganization of the Department of Education

Referendum on Continuation of the Pennsylvania Peach and Nectarine Research Program

Chapter 45 (relating to Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act), a review referendum was held from March 17, 2014, to March 31, 2014, to determine if the producers affected by the Pennsylvania Peach and Nectarine Research Program (program) desired to continue the program for an additional 5 years. To pass, a majority of eligible producers voting had to vote in favor of the program's continuation. An impartial Teller Committee met on April 10, 2014, to count the ballots. The following results were submitted by the Teller Committee: a total of 41 eligible votes were cast with 37 producers voting in favor of and 4 voting against the continuation of the program. An additional eight ballots were invalid because they did not meet the eligibility requirements. Votes favoring continuation of the program by number of producers represented 90% of eligible votes and votes against continuation of the program represented 10% of eligible votes. Because a majority of the votes were cast in favor of the program, the program shall continue for 5 years, effective immediately.

Referendum on Continuation of the Pennsylvania Wine Marketing and Research Program

Under the applicable provisions of 3 Pa.C.S. Chapter 45 (relating to Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act), an amendment referendum was held from March 17, 2014, to March 31, 2014, to determine if the producers affected by the Pennsylvania Wine Marketing and Research Program (program) assented to amend the program as described in the Referendum Order published at 44 Pa.B. 1453 (March 15, 2014). A Teller Committee met on April 10, 2014, to count the ballots. The results were as follows: a total of 74 eligible votes were cast with 44 producers voting in favor of and 30 producers voting against the amendment. An additional three ballots were invalid because they were incomplete. Two ballots were ineligible because they were received late. Additionally, eligible producers voting in favor of the program amendment represented 59% of the votes and 72% of production gallons. Producers voting against the proposed amendment represented 41% of the votes and 28% of production gallons. In accordance with the foregoing, the program order is amended as proposed in the Referendum Order published at 44 Pa.B. 1453 and shall become effective 21 days from publication of the notice of issuance in accordance with 3 Pa.C.S. § 4509 (relating to notice of issuance), except Article IX.2 which shall become effective January 1, 2015.

not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the following site, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified as follows. MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed NPDES permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92a and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing provisions of The Clean Streams Law (35 P. S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. §§ 1251—1376).

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has prepared a draft NPDES permit and made a tentative determination to issue the NPDES permit in conjunction with the associated mining activity permit.

Effluent Limits for Coal Mining Activities

For coal mining activities, NPDES permits, when issued, will contain effluent limits that are the more stringent of technology-based (BAT) effluent limitations or Water Quality Based Effluent Limits (WQBEL).

The BAT limits for coal mining activities, as provided in 40 CFR Part 434 and 25 Pa. Code Chapters 87—90 are as follows:

In addition, the Department imposes a technology-based aluminum limit of $2.0~\text{mg/l}\ (30~\text{day average})$ to protect stream uses.

A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code \$\$ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Effluent Limits for Noncoal Mining Activities

The BAT limits for noncoal mining activities as provided in 40 CFR Part 436 and 25 Pa. Code Chapter 77 are as follows:

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

Between 1981 and 2009, the Department determined there were numerous effluent limit violations as a result of BCI's mining discharge and subsequent treatment attempts.

The Stutzman Mine, MDP No. 56800103, is located in Stonycreek Township, Somerset County, Pennsylvania. In February 1986, the Department discovered four seep locations both on and off the site previously permitted to FMI and requested that FMI implement a permanent abatement plan for the seep treatment.

The Department also notified BCI and FMI in October 2004, that the initial bonds posted for the Sites in the amounts of \$504,640 and \$8,700 were insufficient to guarantee payment of perpetual treatment of the postmining discharges and seeps. Jointly, BCI and FML claimed in a June 2005, letter that they lacked the financial resources to provide for perpetual payment and in September 2005, notified the Department that treatment of the discharges and seeps would cease when then-current materials had exhausted. The Department immediately took over treatment of the discharges and seeps after BCI and FMI ceased treatment activity on December 31, 2005. The Department then notified BCI and FMI in January 2006, of its intention to forfeit the bonds for the Sites. Those bonds are currently held by the Mid Continent Insurance Company.

On November 12, 2009, the Department filed a Complaint with the Commonwealth Court seeking that BCI and FMI be required to resume or begin to treat all of the discharges and seeps resulting from the operator's mining activity, and to post long-term financial guarantees so as to provide for those treatments.

Under the terms of the COA, in settlement of litigation, BCI and FMI have agreed to construct and/or repair the treatment systems for the discharges and seeps on the Sites. Rather than collecting on the forfeited bonds, the Department will direct funds from the Mid Continent Insurance Company, Inc., to a treatment trust that has been established with the Clean Streams Foundation for the perpetual treatment of the mine discharges resulting from the mining operations.

Pennsylvania's 2014-2015 Annual Ambient Air Monitoring Network Plan; Available for Public Comment

On October 17, 2006, the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) promulgated final amendments to the National ambient air monitoring requirements for criteria pollutants at 40 CFR Parts 53 and 58 (relating to ambient air monitoring reference and equivalent methods; and ambient air quality surveillance). See 71 FR 61236 (October 17, 2006). The EPA's final rule requires state and local agencies to enhance air monitoring to "improve public health protection and better inform the public about air quality in their communities." Under 40 CFR 58.10 (relating to annual monitoring network plan and periodic network assessment), air quality state and local monitoring agencies must adopt an annual airmonitoring network plan and make the plan available for public inspection for at least 30 days prior to final submission to the EPA Regional Administrator. Public Notice of the Availability of National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System General Permit for Discharges from Small Flow Treatment Facilities (PAG-04)

Under The Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and sections 1905-A, 1917-A and 1920-A of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. §§ 510-5, 510-17 and 510-20), the Department of Environmental Protection (Department), by this notice, informs the public of the availability of the National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) PAG-04 General Permit for Discharges from Small Flow Treatment Facilities. The General Permit will become effective at 12 a.m. on Monday, May 12, 2014.

The PAG-04 General Permit is intended to provide NPDES permit coverage to existing and proposed Small Flow Treatment Facilities (SFTF) for discharges from these facilities to waters of the Commonwealth. SFTFs are treatment works designed to adequately treat sewage flows of not greater than 2,000 gallons per day for final disposal using a stream discharge or other methods approved by the Department.

Notice of the availability of a draft PAG-04 General Permit was published at 44 Pa.B. 96 (January 4, 2014). A 30-day comment period was provided as part of the draft permit publication. No public comments were received.

The proposed Notice of Intent (NOI) fee for coverage under this General Permit is \$100 for SFTF that are not Single Residence Sewage Treatment Plants. The Department anticipates that once coverage under the General Permit is authorized, coverage will continue without the need to submit a separate, subsequent NOI for renewal of coverage as long as the PAG-04 General Permit is renewed, unless the Department specifically requires the submission of a separate, subsequent NOI in writing. The permittee shall be responsible for complying with the final renewed, reissued or amended General Permit. If the permittee is unable to comply with the renewed, reissued or amended General Permit, the permittee must submit an application for an individual NPDES permit within 90 days of the final General Permit publication.

One modification was made to the draft permit in response to a comment received from the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The Department has clarified that where an EPA-approved Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) is in effect for a water body, the Department may require an applicant to apply for an individual NPDES permit where the SFTF discharge under the PAG-04 General Permit would not be consistent with the TMDL.

Request for Applications for Watershed Protection and Restoration Grants and Surface Mining Conservation and Reclamation Act Grants through the Growing Greener Plus Program

As part of the 2014 Department of Environmental Protection's (Department) Growing Greener Plus Program (Growing Greener), applications are now being accepted for watershed protection and restoration grants. Examples of eligible projects include those that will reduce nonpoint source pollution in watersheds where streams are impaired, projects that will help reduce Total Maximum Daily Load pollutants and integrating stormwater management into watershed management and water conservation strategies.

Through the same application process, applicants can also apply for funding through the Department's Surface Mining Conservation and Reclamation Act (SMCRA) Grant Programs and the Section 319 Nonpoint Source Grant Program. SMCRA grants are available to various entities including municipalities, municipal authorities and nonprofit organizations for projects meeting SMCRA Set Aside or Bond Forfeiture grant requirements. Section 319 grants focus on funding similar projects to Growing Greener but with special emphasis within targeted watersheds.

The deadline for submitting applications to the Department's Growing Greener Grants Center (Center) is July 11, 2014. Applications must be postmarked no later than July 11, 2014. HOUSING FINANCE AGENCY

Homeowner's Emergency Mortgage Assistance Program; No Longer in a Period of High Unemployment

On April 18, 2014, it was announced by the Department of Labor and Industry (Department) that the Commonwealth's seasonably adjusted unemployment rate for March 2014 was 6%. It was previously announced by the Department that the February 2014 unemployment rate was 6.2% and that the January 2014 rate was 6.4%. Thus the average unemployment rate for the 3-month period of January, February and March 2014 was 6.2%.

Section 405-C(f.1) of the Housing Finance Agency Law (act) (35 P. S. § 1680.405c), provides as follows:

(f.1) The twenty-four (24) month limit on assistance available under this act established in subsection (f) and referenced in sections 401-C(a)(5), 403-C(f) and 404-C(a)(5) and (12) shall increase to thirty-six (36) months if during the month the homeowner submits an application for assistance the average rate of total unemployment in the Commonwealth, as seasonally adjusted, for the period consisting of the most recent three (3) months for which such data for the Commonwealth is published before the close of such month equals or exceeds six and one-half (6.5) percent.

Similarly, section 406-C(2.1) of the act (35 P. S. 1680.406c) provides as follows:

(2.1) The forty (40) percent ratio established under paragraphs (1) and (2) shall be reduced to thirty-five (35) percent if during the month the homeowner submits an application for assistance the average rate of total unemployment in the Commonwealth, as seasonally adjusted, for the period consisting of the most recent three (3) months for which such data for the Commonwealth is published before the close of such month equals or exceeds six and one-half (6.5) percent.

In furtherance of the statutory provisions, the Housing Finance Agency's (Agency) guidelines for the Homeowner's Emergency Mortgage Assistance Program in 12 Pa. Code Chapter 31 (relating to Housing Finance Agency) provide in 12 Pa. Code § 31.210 (relating to periods of high unemployment):

- (a) Months of assistance available. The 24 month limit on mortgage assistance available under § 31.203(d), and the 24 month periods referred to in §§ 31.202(d)(1), 31.203(a)(3)(ii), 31.204(c)(2) and 31.206(a) and (d)(2) shall increase to 36 months if during the month the homeowner submits an application for assistance the Agency has determined that a period of high unemployment exists.
- (b) Housing expense formula. The 40% ratio referred to in §§ 31.204(c) and (e) and 31.205(c)(3) (relating to agency review; and financial hardship due to circumstances beyond the homeowner's control) shall be reduced to 35% if during the month the homeowner submits an application for assistance the Agency has determined that a period of high unemployment exists.
- (c) Definition; declaration. There shall be a "period of high unemployment" if the average rate of unemployment in this Commonwealth equals or exceeds 6.5%. This determination will be made by the Agency on a monthly basis based upon seasonably adjusted unemployment figures for the most recent 3 months for which the data for this Commonwealth is published. If the Agency determines that a period of high unemployment exists, the Agency will immediately publish a notice to that effect in the Pennsylvania Bulletin consistent with this section.

The Agency published a notice at 39 Pa.B. 1372 (March 14, 2009) announcing that a Period of High Unemployment existed and that the 36-month and 35% figures would be applicable to applications received during February 2009. The notice also indicated that the Agency would continue to monitor unemployment figures on a monthly basis and if the 3-month calculation would produce an average result of less than 6.5% the Agency would publish a new notice to inform the public that the Commonwealth is no longer in a Period of High Unemployment and that the 36-month and 35% figures are changed back to 24 months and 40%, respectively.

As indicated previously, the average unemployment rate for the 3-month period of January, February and March 2014 was 6.2%. Consequently, the 24-month and 40% provisions will be applicable to applications received on or after July 1, 2014.

Petition of the City of Titusville for a Declaratory Order that the Provision of Water Service to Isolated Customers in the Townships of Oil Creek and Cherrytree Does Not Constitute Provision of Public Utility Service Under 66 Pa.C.S. § 102

Petition of the City of Titusville for a Declaratory Order that the Provision of Water Service to Isolated Customers in the Townships of Oil Creek and Cherrytree Does Not Constitute Provision of Public Utility Service Under 66 Pa.C.S. § 102; Doc. No. P-2013-2376600

Tentative Order

By the Commission:

On July 29, 2013, the City of Titusville (the City or Titusville), filed the above-captioned petition (Petition) for a declaratory order. In accordance with 52 Pa. Code § 5.42, the City served a copy of its Petition on the Office of Consumer Advocate (OCA), the Office of Trial Staff (OTS),¹ the Office of Small Business Advocate (OSBA) and each of the 101 customers located outside of the City's corporate limits. Titusville also served a copy of the Petition on the Boards of Supervisors of the two townships in which the 101 affected customers reside, namely, Oil Creek and Cherrytree Townships. No answers were filed to Titusville's Petition.

 $^{^1}$ Due to the restructuring at the Commission, OTS is now part of the Commission's Bureau of Investigation and Enforcement (hereinafter "I & E").

Section 331(f) of the Public Utility Code provides that the Commission "may issue a declaratory order to terminate a controversy or remove uncertainty." 66 Pa.C.S. § 331(f). In its Petition, the City seeks a determination that its provision of water service to the 101 extraterritorial customers does not make the water service subject to the Commission's jurisdiction. The City asserts that the service it provides to these 101 customers is not service "to or for the public" within the meaning of Section 102 of the Public Utility Code. 66 Pa.C.S. § 102.

In its Petition, the City states that it has a total of 2,454 customers. The City has approximately 5,600 residents concentrated in a 2.6 square mile area, and 2,353 customers within the City. The City also states that it is primarily residential and is adjoined on the north, east and west sides by the Township of Oil Creek located in Crawford County, and on the south by the Township of Cherrytree located in Venango County.

The City provides water service to nine customers in Cherrytree Township, which is overwhelmingly rural and agricultural, and 92 customers in Oil Creek Township, which is also overwhelmingly rural and agricultural. Of the nine customers in Cherrytree Township, all but one are residential customers and the remaining customer is a park owned by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The customers within Oil Creek Township are primarily residential, but include a small number of businesses, the Township of Oil Creek's office building, and one church.

According to the City's Petition, the 101 customers outside of the City's corporate limits are in close proximity to the City's boundaries and the City's water mains. The customers in Cherrytree Township, beginning in the 1940s, were allowed to connect to the City's water main for, as described by the City, "unknown reasons" other than their location to the City's water main. Petition at 2. The customers in Oil Creek Township who have connected to the City's water mains are generally located in the area of Route 8, which traverses the City, North Perry Street and West Spring Street. According to the City, these connections have existed prior to 1970 and it is similarly unknown why the connections were permitted other than location. The City points out that, prior to last year, the City's water system and assets were owned by the Titusville Municipal Authority (Authority); however, the Authority was dissolved in 2013.³

Finally, the City has stated that the City does not, and never has held itself out as engaged in the business of supplying water to the public. As stated previously, the customers in Cherrytree and Oil Creek Townships were permitted to connect to the City's mains because the customers were in close proximity to the City's boundaries and existing City water mains. Moreover, the City avers that it has never built or extended a water line or water main in order to serve or obtain more customers in Cherrytree or Oil Creek Townships.

Titusville has requested by this Petition a declaration that the City is not subject to the Commission's jurisdiction so that it may save the cost and time burdens of tariff and reporting requirements, while simultaneously ensuring that these nonresident customers continue to receive water service under terms that are acceptable to the Commission and the customers.4

Based upon our consideration of these facts and circumstances, the Commission finds that it is appropriate to issue a Declaratory Order in response to the subject Petition.

Initially, it should be emphasized that the City has passed an ordinance, dated June 18, 2013, that provides that the City will apply the same rules, regulations, and rates to the customers outside as those within City limits. 5 Additionally, attached to the Petition is an affidavit of the Mayor of Titusville stating that the City will not repeal or modify the aforementioned ordinance without providing advance notice to the Commission. These commitments were made to ensure that the 101 extraterritorial customers will not be subject to potential discrimination without the opportunity for Commission oversight.

In the Commission's judgment, the circumstances here are similar to those presented to the Commission in the matters of Lehigh Valley Cooperative Farmers v. City of Allentown, 54 Pa. P.U.C. 495 (1980); Petition of New Albany Borough, Docket No. P-00991775, 200 Pa. PUC Lexis 34 (2000); Petition of Laceyville Borough, Docket No. P-2008-2064117 (2008) and Petition of Cochranton Borough, Docket No. P-2008-2035741 (2009), wherein the Commission concluded that service to a number of isolated individuals outside of the municipal boundaries under special circumstances did not constitute public utility service subject to the Commission's jurisdiction.

In Lehigh Valley, New Albany Borough, Laceyville Borough and Cochranton Borough, the Commission reiterated that the test to determine whether a party is rendering service to the public is set forth in Borough of Ambridge v. Pa. Public Service Commission, 165 A. 47 (Pa. Super. 1933). In Ambridge, the Commission noted,

We find the distinction between public and private rendition of such service put definitely on the readiness to serve all members of the public to the extent of capacity: The test is, therefore whether or not such person holds himself out, expressly or impliedly, as engaged in the business of supplying his product or service to the public, as a class, or to any limited portion of it, as contradistinguished from holding himself out as serving or ready to serve only particular individuals. The public or private character of the enterprise does not depend, however, upon the number of persons by whom it is used, but upon whether or not it is open to the use and service of all members of the public who may require it, to the extent of its capacity; and the fact that only a limited number of persons may have occasion to use it does not make it a private undertaking if the public generally has a right to such use.

See also, Petition of Chicora Borough, P-00981355 (May 22, 1998).

More recently, the Commission applied the same rationale in Joint Application of Seven Fields Development Corporation, A-220007 and A-210062F2000 (October 1, 1999). In that case, the Commission granted an application filed by a jurisdictional utility seeking to transfer its assets used in the operation of its water system to the

² Titusville is a third class City under Pennsylvania classifications and is located in the southeast corner of Crawford County, Pennsylvania. The City was founded by Jonathan Titus in 1796 and incorporated as a City in 1866. Under Section 102 of the

Public Utility Code, the City is a municipal corporation.

The Titusville Municipal Authority was created in 1955 as a financing authority as opposed to a bona fide operating municipal authority, which would be exempt from Commission regulation. However, over the years, the Authority discontinued meeting on a regular basis and in 2013, Titusville City Council voted to disband the Authority.

⁴ Titusville has indicated that the rates, terms and conditions of service for the 101 customers outside of the City are identical to the rates, terms and conditions of service of customers inside of the City. Specifically, by way of an email dated February 19, 2014, the City has indicated that Titusville customers, both inside and outside of the 2014, the City has indicated that ittusville customers, both inside and outside of the City, pay a base rate of \$5.89, a readiness to serve charge of \$6.00, and a water usage rate of \$1.45 per thousand gallons.

5By email dated February 19, 2014, Titusville confirmed that the ordinance remains in full force and effect.

Borough of Seven Fields. The Commission noted that the borough would be providing water service to three customers that were located outside of the borough's limits. Moreover, the Commission took note of the fact that the borough committed to continue providing water service solely to these three customers at the same terms of service as are or will be offered to customers within the boundaries of the borough. Also, as in the instant case, the Borough of Seven Fields presented an affidavit to the effect that it did not intend to offer service to the general public outside of its boundaries in the future. In the Seven Fields case, the Commission concluded that the limited nature of water service to such a defined group of customers should not realistically be subject to its jurisdiction. (Order at p.4).

In Pilot Travel Center, LLC v. Pa. Public Utility Commission, 933 A.2d 123 (Pa. Cmwlth. 2007), appeal denied, 938 A.2d 1054 (Pa. 2007), the Commonwealth Court, in affirming the Commission's view on this issue, concluded:

The test for determining whether utility services are being offered "for the public" is whether or not such person holds himself out, expressly or impliedly, as engaged in the business of supplying his product or service to the public, as a class, or to any limited portion of it, as distinguished from holding himself out as serving or ready to serve particular individuals. The private or public character of a business does not depend upon the number of persons who actually use the service; rather, the proper characterization rests upon whether or not the service is available to all members of the public who may require it.

933 A.2d at 128.

In applying the standards enunciated in Ambridge, Lehigh Valley, Seven Fields, Laceyville Borough, Cochranton and Pilot Travel Center to the facts of the case sub judice, we find that the limited extraterritorial service provided by the City is not subject to Commission jurisdiction. The extraterritorial service being provided by Titusville is provided to a limited number of customers and is not available to the general public. Moreover, the City clearly states that it will continue to provide service solely to the 101 customers that it is presently serving outside of its boundaries and that it is not soliciting additional customers nor will it provide service to any additional extraterritorial customers in the future. Indeed, Titusville, by way of this Petition, has assured the Commission that it has no intention of ever offering water service to any other customers that are located outside of the City corporate limits.⁶ Moreover, the City is not holding itself out as providing service to the public. See Bethlehem Steel Corp. v. Pa. Public Utility Commission, 713 A.2d 1110 (Pa. 1998). Based upon the facts as stated in the City's Petition, the service by Titusville to the 101customers in Oil Creek and Cherrytree Townships who are located in close proximity to the City's water mains does not constitute the provision of water service to or for the public.

Finally, we note that an express condition of this exemption is that the City apply the same rates outside as well as within the City's corporate limits and that the City does not add any additional customers outside of

Titusville's corporate limits. Absent any contrary responses from concerned parties, the Commission herein concludes that the extraterritorial service provided by Titusville is not subject to the jurisdiction of this Commission; *Therefore*,

It Is Ordered That:

- 1. The Petition for Declaratory Order filed by the City of Titusville on July 29, 2013, at Docket No. P-2013-2376600 is hereby granted.
- 2. The provision of water service by the City of Titusville to the 101 customers located outside of the City's boundaries is deemed to be non-jurisdictional because it is not service "to or for the public" within the intendment of Section 102 of the Public Utility Code, 66 Pa.C.S. § 102.
- 3. A copy of this Tentative Order shall be served upon the City of Titusville and each of the individuals and offices listed in Titusville's certificate of service.
- 4. The Secretary shall certify this Tentative Order and deposit it with the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
- 5. The City of Titusville is directed to cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the Titusville area notice of this Tentative Order.
- 6. If no objection to this Tentative Order is filed with the Commission within 20 days of the publication date in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, this Tentative Order shall become final.
