Norval Morris, LL.B., LL.M., Ph.D. Dean and Julius Kreeger Professor University of Chicago Law School

Scholar, lawyer, educator, advisor to presidents and prisoners, he came to us from the Antipodes to set the established world of criminology upside down, through his innovative and imaginative views of crime and punishment. He leads a great school of law wisely and by his writing and generous participation at every level of the criminal justice system helped in making that system more effective, more just and more compassionate.

Norval Morris

Norval Morris joined the faculty of the University of Chicago Law School in 1964. In 1965 he was appointed Julius Kreeger Professor of Law and Criminology and became the first Director of the School's Center for Studies in Criminal Justice. In 1975 he became Dean of the Law School.

Dr. Morris was born in New Zealand in 1923 and moved at an early age to Australia. After service with the Australian army during World War II, he studied law at Melbourne University, receiving the LL.B. degree in 1946 and the LL.M. degree in 1947. He attended the University of London, where he received a Ph.D. in criminology in 1949, his thesis being awarded the Hutchinson Silver Medal by the London School of Economics as the outstanding thesis over a four-year period in the fields of Law, Political Science, International Relations and Political History. In 1949-50 he was appointed to the Faculty of Law at the London School of Economics. Between 1950 and 1958 he served as Senior Lecturer in Law and as Associate Professor of Law and Dean of the Faculty of Law at the University of Adelaide. He has twice held visiting faculty appointments at Harvard Law School. He has taught also at Colorado and Utah. In 1962 he became Director of the United Nations Institute for the Prevention of Crime and Treatment of Offenders in Tokyo, Japan, the post he held immediately prior to coming to the Law School. He became an American citizen in 1973. He is married to the former Elaine Richardson and has three sons.

A barrister of the High Court of Australia with trial experience, Professor Morris' professional and scholarly interests have centered on problems of criminal law and corrections, a field in which he holds an international reputation. He served as Chairman of the Ceylon Commission on Capital Punishment in 1958-59 and since then has served on numerous councils and commissions concerned with correctional problems and practices, under the sponsorship of the United Nations, federal and state governments, and bar and other organizations. He is a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

Professor Morris's writings in the field of criminal law and criminology have been extensive and influential. His books include *The Habitual Criminal* (1951), *Studies in Criminal Law* (with C. Howard, 1964), *The Honest Politician's Guide to Crime Control* (with G. Hawkins, 1970), *The Future of Imprisonment* (1974), and *Letter to the President on Crime Control* (with G. Hawkins, 1977).

THE ORDER OF THE COIF

The Order of the Coif is the National Honor Society devoted to the encouragement of high standards of legal scholarship with chapters in leading law schools throughout the country. Graduates in the top ten percent of the class are eligible for election to the Order of the Coif.

The Order takes its name from the word used to designate the cap which all the members of the Order were required to wear. This cap or coif was originally of white lawn or silk, forming a close-fitting hood, to be seen today in old engravings, pictures and effigies of distinguished Judges and Serjeants. Serjeants were an order of the highest rank of barrister at the English or Irish Bar. By the ancient privileges of the Serjeants, this coif was not to be taken off, even in the royal presence. When wigs came into fashion the coif was changed, no longer being worn as a complete hood, but merely as a circular piece of white lawn fastened to the top of the wig.
