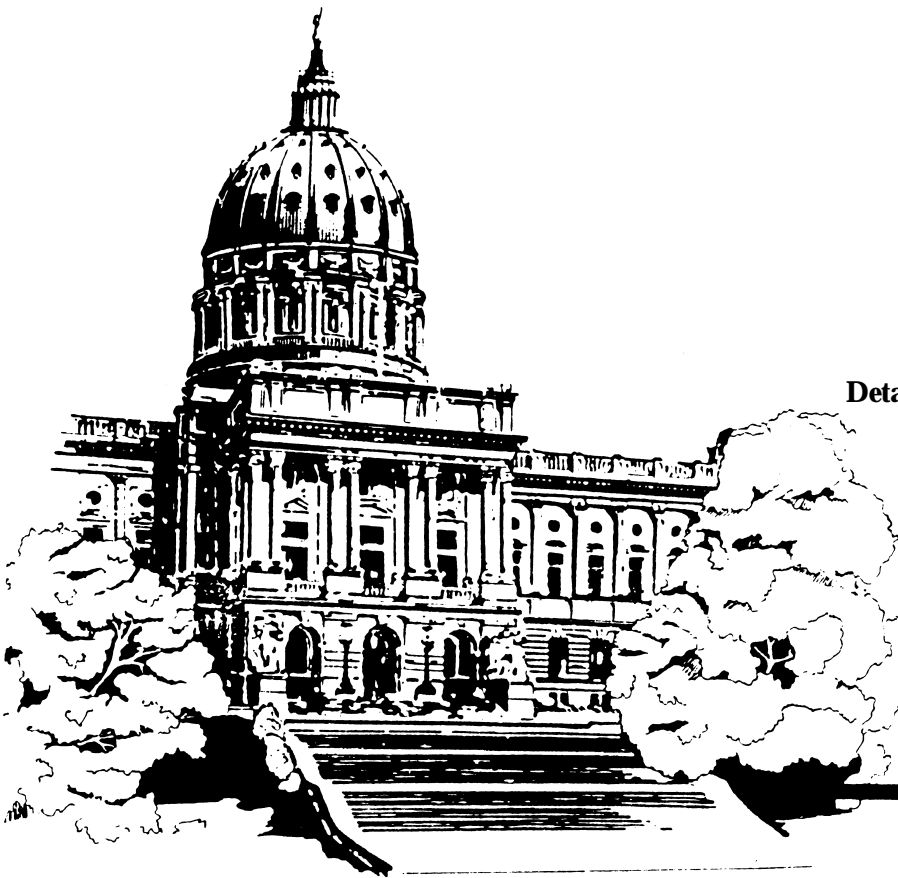

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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where “no fiscal impact” is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Equal Employment Opportunity

May 3, 2002

Whereas, this Administration believes that the employment practices of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania should be nondiscriminatory in intent and effect to promote public confidence in the fairness and integrity of government; and

Whereas, past governors of the Commonwealth have recognized a constitutional and legislative mandate to take affirmative steps to remedy employment discrimination and have issued Executive Orders promoting equal employment opportunity; and

Whereas, this Administration is firmly committed to strengthening and developing equal employment opportunity programs in the Commonwealth.

Now, Therefore, I, Mark S. Schweiker, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other laws, do hereby order and direct as follows.

§ 1.161. Prohibition of discrimination and affirmation of equal employment opportunity.

(a) Agencies under the jurisdiction of the Governor may not discriminate against an employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religious creed, ancestry, union membership, age, gender, sexual orientation, national origin, AIDS or HIV status or disability.

(b) Positive steps shall be taken by each agency under the jurisdiction of the Governor to ensure fair and equal employment opportunity at every level of government for African Americans, Hispanics, Asians, American Indians, Alaskans, Pacific Islanders, persons with a disability, persons of 40 years of age or older and women.

(c) Sexual harassment or harassment based on any of the factors in subsection (a) is prohibited.

§ 1.162. Responsibility for implementing equal employment opportunity.

(a) The Secretary of Administration supervises the development, implementation and enforcement of the Commonwealth's equal employment opportunity programs through the Bureau of Equal Employment Opportunity, which shall:

(1) Develop and promote steps designed to ensure equal employment opportunity and fair treatment of the protected classes at all levels of State government.

(2) Develop Commonwealth-wide equal employment opportunity policies and procedures to ensure consistency and uniformity.

(3) Conduct or participate in periodic onsite reviews and audits of agency equal employment opportunity programs.

(4) Develop complaint resolution procedures for implementation by all agencies under the jurisdiction of the Governor.

(5) Review complaint investigation reports at any time during the complaint process.

(6) Develop and implement a standardized equal employment opportunity procedure to monitor personnel transactions in all Commonwealth agencies under the jurisdiction of the Governor.

(7) Develop and issue guidelines for the conduct of agency equal employment opportunity programs and review of equal employment opportunity plans prior to implementation.

(8) Design and implement monitoring and reporting systems to measure effectiveness of agency equal employment opportunity programs.

(9) Consult with agency officials regarding personnel actions affecting agency equal employment opportunity professional staff, including recruitment, hiring, promotion, demotion, separation, transfer, performance standards and evaluation, and rate of pay.

(10) Provide leadership to agencies in the design and implementation of innovative equal employment opportunity strategies which will further the Commonwealth's fulfillment of the commitment to equal employment opportunity.

(b) Heads of departments and agencies under the jurisdiction of the Governor shall:

(1) Designate an equal opportunity manager or specialist with primary responsibility to develop and implement the agency's equal employment opportunity program.

(2) Ensure that the agency equal opportunity manager or specialist reports directly to the individual who has overall responsibility for the agency's equal employment opportunity program.

(3) Ensure that the agency's commitment to equal employment opportunity is clearly transmitted to all agency employees and that bureau directors and managers provide adequate support to the equal opportunity manager or specialist in the development and implementation of program plans designed to achieve the agency's equal employment opportunity objectives.

(4) Seek input from the Director of the Bureau of Equal Employment Opportunity on personnel actions affecting equal employment opportunity professional staff.

(5) Ensure that the agency develops and implements effective equal employment opportunity plans and auditing and reporting mechanisms.

(6) Ensure that all agency supervisory and management employees are rated on equal employment opportunity, diversity and inclusiveness based in part upon criteria identified in the agency's equal employment opportunity plan.

Executive Order 1996-9, Equal Employment Opportunity, dated December 20, 1996, is rescinded.

Governor's Task Force on Early Childhood Care and Education

Whereas, all infants are born ready to learn; and

Whereas, the majority of a child's brain development occurs in the first five years of a child's life, building the foundation for future learning and success; and

Whereas, the Commonwealth has a duty to assess every setting where our children spend their days, whether under the care of their parents, a relative, neighbor, or a center-based setting; and

Whereas, early identification of developmental delay and other risk factors is crucial to improving a child's individual linguistic, cognitive, social, and emotional development and thus, school readiness; and

Whereas, involved, informed parents, caregivers, and educators are critical to ensure the early identification of developmental delay; and

Whereas, school readiness is a critical workforce issue, with early skill building leading to greater academic achievement and graduates with the knowledge necessary to allow Pennsylvania to compete in the 21st Century economy; and

Whereas, it is the duty of the Commonwealth to invest resources on research-based, cost-effective programs or models with a documented record of success.

Now, Therefore, I, Mark S. Schweiker, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other laws, do hereby establish the Governor's Task Force on Early Childhood Care and Education as hereinafter set forth.

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§ 6.61. Mission.

The Governor's Task Force on Early Childhood Care and Education (Task Force) is charged with examining the full range of proven, evidence-based school readiness strategies available for early childhood care and education targeted at children age 0-8 and the existing Commonwealth services targeted to that age group. The Task Force will provide implementation cost estimates of each strategy based on experience in this Commonwealth or other states.

§ 6.62. Functions.

The Governor's Task Force on Early Childhood Care and Education (Task Force) has the powers and duties to do the following:

- (1) Serve in an advisory capacity.
- (2) Assess the current menu of early care and education programs and services offered or funded by the Commonwealth for children and their families.
- (3) Develop a model for the identification of programs that have a sufficient basis in science and a demonstrated record of effectiveness for discussion by the Task Force.
- (4) Develop a comprehensive listing of programs meeting the effectiveness standards developed under paragraph (3).
- (5) Provide per participant cost estimates for each program included in the list of effective programs.
- (6) Identify innovative financing sources and models for early care and education based on existing initiatives in this Commonwealth and Nationally.

§ 6.63. Composition and appointments.

(a) The Governor's Task Force on Early Childhood Care and Education (Task Force) consists of certain designated public officials and other individuals appointed by the Governor. The membership includes the heads of agencies of the Commonwealth that have responsibilities in the development, funding or regulation of early care and education programming, as well as various early care and education stakeholders. The Task Force consists of the following members:

- (1) The Secretary of Education.
- (2) The Secretary of Public Welfare.
- (3) The Secretary of Health.
- (4) The Physician General.
- (5) Representatives from each of the following stakeholder groups:
 - (i) Child advocacy community.
 - (ii) Business community.
 - (iii) Faith community.
 - (iv) School administrator.
 - (v) Civic, not-for-profit organization.
 - (vi) Statewide professional childcare organization.
 - (vii) Local community partnerships.
 - (viii) Public health/medical community.
 - (ix) Head Start provider.
 - (x) Child care provider.

- (xi) Family literacy community.
- (xii) Clinical practitioner (psychologist, psychiatrist).
- (xiii) Family-based programs.
- (xiv) K-3 educator.
- (xv) Philanthropic organization.
- (xvi) Public outreach and education professional.

(b) The Governor will designate a member or members to serve as the Task Force chairpersons.

(c) The Governor's Community Partnership for Safe Children (Partnership), or its successor entity, shall provide administrative support to the Task Force, with the Executive Director of the Partnership serving as the Task Force's project director and direct advisor to the Chairperson.

(d) A Task Force member may designate an alternate to attend Task Force meetings, if required.

§ 6.64. Terms of membership.

(a) Members of the Governor's Task Force on Early Childhood Care and Education (Task Force) serve at the pleasure of the Governor.

(b) If a vacancy occurs on the Task Force due to resignation, disability or death of a member, the Governor will appoint a successor as expeditiously as possible.

§ 6.65. Compensation.

Members of the Governor's Task Force on Early Childhood Care and Education receive no compensation for their services, except that the members may be reimbursed for actual travel and related expenses in accordance with Commonwealth travel and subsistence policies. See Chapter 40 (relating to travel and subsistence).

§ 6.66. Reports.

The Governor's Task Force on Early Childhood Care and Education (Task Force) shall present an initial report to the Governor by September 30, 2002. The Task Force shall present a comprehensive assessment of child care quality, across all settings, in this Commonwealth by November 15, 2002.

§ 6.67. Annual report.

The Governor's Task Force on Early Childhood Care and Education shall provide a brief update of the reports to the Governor by September 30, 2003, and each subsequent year. The annual update shall include additional programming, practices and funding allocated during the previous year as well as outcomes related to existing programming and practices.

§ 6.68. Executive agencies.

Agencies under the Governor's jurisdiction shall provide assistance to the Governor's Task Force on Early Childhood Care and Education as requested by the chairpersons.

§ 6.69. Termination date.

This subchapter shall continue in force until rescinded or superseded by order of the Governor.

Whereas, Pennsylvania cannot be a Commonwealth to all of its people until all of its people enjoy the opportunity to participate fully in society; and

Whereas, Pennsylvania has a proud and distinguished history of protecting the rights of individuals with disabilities through such laws as the Pennsylvania Human Relations Act and the Universal Accessibility Act, as amended, December 20, 1988; and


Whereas, the Americans With Disabilities Act of 1990, P. L. 101-336 and the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, P. L. No. 93-112, are intended to empower people with disabilities to lead independent and productive lives and to participate fully in the activities of their communities; and

Whereas, the Americans With Disabilities Act and the Rehabilitation Act complement those state laws and thereby further open the doors of opportunity for Pennsylvanians who seek to be considered on the basis of their abilities and not their disabilities; and

Whereas, the Americans With Disabilities Act requires state services, programs, and activities, when viewed in their entirety, to be accessible to individuals with disabilities; and

Whereas, this Administration has an abiding commitment to the equal rights of all Pennsylvania's citizens.

Now, Therefore, I, Mark S. Schweiker, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other laws, do hereby order and direct as follows.

§ 7.571. Individuals with disabilities.

A Commonwealth agency under the Governor's jurisdiction may not discriminate against an individual with a disability because of his disability. Individuals with disabilities shall be treated with respect and dignity and shall be provided access to Commonwealth services, programs, activities and employment opportunities.

§ 7.572. Programs offered by Commonwealth agencies.

Commonwealth agencies under the Governor's jurisdiction shall ensure that the programs they offer to the public are nondiscriminatory, accessible and address the particular challenges faced by persons with disabilities.

§ 7.573. Direction for disability-related policy.

Direction for disability-related policy will be assigned as follows:

(1) The Secretary of Administration, as required by Federal law and court decisions, is responsible for ensuring compliance with the employment provisions of the Americans With Disabilities Act of 1960 (act) (42 U.S.C.A. §§ 12101—12213), sections 504 and 508 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (42 U.S.C.A. §§ 794 and 794d) and the Pennsylvania Human Relations Act (43 P.S. §§ 951—963), relating to Commonwealth employment and for ensuring public access to Commonwealth programs and services.

(2) The Secretary of General Services is responsible for ensuring compliance with Title II of the act (42 U.S.C.A. §§ 12131—12165) and other applicable laws relating to Commonwealth buildings and facilities and contract compliance.

(3) The Governor's Policy Office coordinates the implementation of Commonwealth disability-related policies and assesses the effectiveness of those policies.

(4) The Office of General Counsel provides direction and guidance to executive agency legal counsel on handling disability-related litigation and reviews proposed disability-related rules and regulations of executive agencies before they are deposited with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by sections 102, 201—208 and 602 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1102, 1201—1208 and 1602), known as the Commonwealth Documents Law.

§ 7.574. Coordination of meetings.

The Governor's Policy Office shall coordinate regular meetings of the responsible agencies to discuss disability-related policy and resolve issues that may arise.

§ 7.575. Rescission.

Executive Order 1996-11, Disability-Related Policy dated December 20, 1996, is rescinded.

Prohibition of Sexual Harassment in this Commonwealth

May 3, 2002

Whereas, sexual harassment is a form of discrimination that undermines the integrity of the employment relationship and/or service delivery; and

Whereas, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Pennsylvania's largest employer, has an obligation to assertively address sexual harassment issues in the workplace; and

Whereas, sexual harassment shall not be tolerated in Commonwealth workplaces under any circumstances; and

Whereas, this Administration is committed to providing a work environment where employees, applicants for employment, or individuals receiving services from the Commonwealth shall not be subjected to sexual harassment; and

Whereas, to prevent sexual harassment in the workplace, all managers, supervisors, and employees must be made aware of the Commonwealth's sexual harassment policy, the steps to take when concerns arise, and our commitment to address instances of sexual harassment aggressively and equitably.

Now, Therefore, I, Mark S. Schweiker, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other laws, do hereby adopt and reaffirm the Commonwealth's sexual harassment policy.

§ 7.591. Prohibition.

A department, board, commission or other agency under the Governor's jurisdiction may not tolerate sexual harassment by a Commonwealth employee against another employee, applicant for employment, or client or other person receiving services from or conducting business with the Commonwealth. Sexual harassment in Commonwealth work settings is strictly forbidden. Further, a department, board, commission or other agency under the Governor's jurisdiction may not tolerate acts of sexual harassment by persons not employed by the Commonwealth within Commonwealth offices or upon employees of the Commonwealth in the performance of their duties. Sexual harassment is a violation of Federal and State law. Therefore, all Federal and State laws relating to sexual harassment or sex discrimination, or both, will be enforced.

§ 7.592. Prohibited actions.

(a) Sexual harassment includes unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, or other verbal, visual or physical conduct of a sexual nature when:

(1) Submission to or rejection of the conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of an individual's employment.

(2) Submission to or rejection of the conduct by an individual is used as a basis for employment decisions affecting the individuals.

(3) The conduct has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with an individual's work performance or creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive working environment.

(b) Prohibited sexual harassment may include actions by members of the opposite sex of an employee as well as members of an employee's own sex.

Prohibited sexual harassment may include actions which are overtly sexual or facially neutral if the actions constitute gender-based discrimination.

§ 7.593. Disciplinary action.

A Commonwealth employee who engages in or knowingly condones sexual harassment related to Commonwealth employment shall be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

§ 7.594. Retaliation.

Retaliation in any form against an employee, applicant for employment, client or person conducting business with or receiving services from the Commonwealth who exercises his right to make a good faith complaint under this subchapter or who cooperates in an investigation of any complaint is strictly prohibited, and will itself be cause for appropriate disciplinary action.

§ 7.595. Education.

Commonwealth employees will be educated in sexual harassment issues. Education may consist of written materials, formal training, educational videos, orientation sessions, workplace discussions or individual counseling. Commonwealth employees will be provided with a copy of this policy and shall sign an acknowledgement that they have received and reviewed the policy.

§ 7.596. Workplace environment.

Agency heads shall create a workplace environment which encourages discussion of sexual harassment issues, where employees are educated and sensitized to sexual harassment, and where individuals with sexual harassment questions or complaints are provided with a response which is clear, impartial and timely.

§ 7.597. Complaint mechanism.

The Secretary of Administration shall require each agency to have an effective complaint mechanism, which ensures that an employee does not have to complain to the alleged harasser, and which provides for prompt and effective investigation of complaints. The Secretary of Administration shall also have the authority to issue Management Directives and establish rules necessary to carry out the mandates of this subchapter.

§ 7.598. Oversight and resolution of complaints and appeals

The Office of Administration, Bureau of Equal Employment Opportunity, shall provide appropriate oversight and resolution of complaints.

§ 7.599. Commonwealth policy.

This subchapter and *Management Directive 505.30, Prohibition of Sexual Harassment in Commonwealth Work Settings*, constitute the Commonwealth's sexual harassment policy.

§ 7.600. Cooperation by State agencies.

Commonwealth departments, boards, commissions and other agencies under the Governor's jurisdiction shall cooperate fully with the Secretary of Administration and provide assistance and information, as needed, in the implementation of this subchapter.

§ 7.601. Rescission.

Executive Order 1999-3, Prohibition of Sexual Harassment in the Commonwealth is rescinded.

(4) The Court Administrator shall designate one day of each calendar month as arbitration day. A day will be selected which does not conflict with criminal or civil trial schedules or other regular business of the Court. The Court Administrator will endeavor to standardize the selection of arbitration days so that all concerned will become accustomed to the schedule.

(5) For each arbitration day, the Court Administrator shall appoint a board of arbitration. The Court Administrator shall appoint an additional board or boards if the Court Administrator determines that the number of pending cases so requires. The Court Administrator shall notify all arbitrators of their appointment at least thirty (30) days before the arbitration day involved.

(6) When arbitration is initiated in any case, the Court Administrator shall schedule that case to be heard on the next arbitration day, which is at least forty-five (45) days thereafter.

(7) The Court Administrator shall prepare a list of cases scheduled to be heard on each arbitration day. Cases shall be listed in chronological order according to the date on which arbitration was initiated. The list shall include the name of the attorney for each party. A copy of the list will be posted in the Prothonotary's office. At least thirty (30) days before the arbitration day, the Court Administrator shall furnish to each arbitrator appointed to serve on that day, to each attorney involved, and to any party not represented by counsel a copy of the list as well as a roster of each board appointed to sit on that day and notice of the place each board will sit.

(8) All arbitration hearings shall be held in a courtroom or some other suitable space in the courthouse. The Court Administrator shall reserve the space for each board.

(9) The senior arbitrator from the chair list shall chair a board of arbitration.

(10) The arbitration procedure is intended to be economical for the parties and, therefore, the proceedings are abbreviated and somewhat less formal. The consequences to the litigants are nevertheless of great significance. To assure that all present understand the seriousness of the proceedings, the arbitrators will conduct their proceedings with appropriate dignity and decorum at all times.

(11) Each board of arbitration shall hear cases in the order in which they appear on the list for the day. If more than one board is sitting on the same day, when a board completes one case, it will take the next case remaining on the list.

(12) Each board of arbitration will convene at 9:30 o'clock A.M. and will remain in session until 4:00 o'clock

P.M., or such earlier time as all cases on the list have been heard. The lunch recess will ordinarily be from noon until 1:30 o'clock P. M. and, unless the parties consent, no case will be called to start during that period.

(13) If an arbitrator is unable to hear a particular case because of a conflict of interest, the case will be heard by another board of arbitration sitting on the same day. If no other board is sitting on that day, the case will be continued to the next arbitration day.

(14) Each board of arbitration shall file its award in each case with the Prothonotary not later than noon of the next business day after the hearing is concluded.

(15) When it is not possible to conclude a hearing on the day on which it commences, the board of arbitration will fix the time to resume the hearing. Each hearing will be completed within ten (10) days after the arbitration day unless the Court allows a longer time.

(16) The Court Administrator will coordinate the hearings on each arbitration day. At the conclusion of its hearings on any day, each board will report to the Court Administrator its disposition of the cases heard by it.

(b) If a party is not prepared to proceed when the case is called to be heard, the board of arbitration shall hear the parties who are present and decide the case on the basis of their evidence. If none of the parties is prepared to proceed when a case is called to be heard, the board of arbitration shall enter an award for the defending parties on each count.

(c) Continuances shall be granted by the Court upon cause shown. There shall be no continuances granted on the date of the hearing except for emergencies.

(d) A \$25.00 fee shall be charged for continuances. No continuance shall be granted without payment of the required fee unless waived by the Court. Proof of payment shall be attached to the Motion when presented in accordance with Fayette County Rule 211.

ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY BOARD

[25 PA. CODE CH. 93]

Oysterville Creek, et al. Stream Redesignations; Public Meeting, Hearing and Extension of Public Comment Period

The Environmental Quality Board (Board) will hold a public meeting and hearing to discuss and accept comments on its proposal to redesignate portions of Oysterville Creek and West Branch Perkiomen Creek in Berks County as High Quality (HQ) and Exceptional Value (EV) Waters. The Board's proposal is based on specific segments of the basins meeting the biological test for HQ or EV designation as specified by the antidegradation regulations in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 93 (relating to water quality standards).

For Oysterville Creek, the proposed EV segment includes the upper reaches of the basin (source to T-634). The remainder of the basin (T-634 to mouth) qualifies for HQ, with the exception of Unnamed Tributary 01680, which would retain its Cold Water Fishes (CWF) designation. For West Branch Perkiomen Creek, the proposed EV segment includes the lower portion of the basin (SR 1022 to SR 2069). The remainder of the basin would retain its CWF designation.

The Board's proposal to redesignate portions of Oysterville Creek and West Branch Perkiomen Creek was published at 32 Pa.B. 2219 (May 4, 2002) and in the *Reading Eagle Times* on May 4, 2002, with a public comment period that closed on June 18, 2002. During the public comment period, the Board received a request to conduct a public hearing on the proposed redesignations. As a result of this request, a public meeting and hearing has been scheduled for August 7, 2002, in Topton, PA. In addition, the public comment period has been extended until August 21, 2002.

PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS AND PRACTICES COMMISSION

[22 PA. CODE CH. 237]

Definitions of Statutory Terms

The Professional Standards and Practices Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapter 237 (relating to definitions of statutory terms) to read as set forth in Annex A. The proposed amendments are made under the authority of sections 5(a)(11) and 9.2 of the Professional Educator Discipline Act (act) (24 P. S. §§ 2070.5(a)(11) and 2070.9b).

The Commission was created by the act of December 12, 1973 (P. L. 397, No. 141) as amended by the act of November 21, 2000 (P. L. 918, No. 123) (Act 123). By virtue of the act, the General Assembly has empowered the Commission to discipline professional educators and charter school staff members. In addition, the General Assembly directed the Commission to establish definitions consistent with its authority to discipline under sections 5(a)(11) and 9.2 of the act. Accordingly, the Commission did promulgate definitions in May of 1994.

Purpose

This chapter establishes definitions under sections 5(a)(11) and 9.2 of the act. The act recently was amended by Act 123 and this proposed rulemaking reflects the amendments to the act.

Requirements of the Propose Amendments

The most significant new requirements under the proposed amendments to this chapter are:

1. The recognition of the extended jurisdiction of the Commission to discipline charter school staff members, as well as professional educators, as contemplated by the recent amendments to the act.

2. The standard for "morals of a community" within the definition of immorality has been changed from a local standard to a Statewide standard to comport with the overall mission of the Commission.

3. A definition for the term "surrender in lieu of discipline" has been added to this chapter to reflect the recent amendments to the act, which designated a surrender in lieu of discipline as a specific type of discipline. The most significant impact of this designation is that surrenders in lieu of discipline are now considered public under the act.

Affected Parties

This chapter primarily affects professional educators who have been certified by the Department of Education (Department) as well as charter school staff members who are employed by a charter school in a position for which Pennsylvania certification would be required in a public school other than a charter school but who are not required to hold State certification under section 1724-A of the School Code of 1949 (24 P. S. § 17-1724-A).

Cost and Paperwork Estimates

It is not anticipated that the proposed amendments will engender any additional costs or paperwork for affected parties, which include professional educators, charter school staff members, local school districts and the Department.

Effective Date

This proposed rulemaking would become effective upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Sunset Date

The Commission will review the effectiveness of Chapter 237 on an ongoing basis. Thus, no sunset date is necessary.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on June 11, 2002, the Commission submitted a copy of this proposed rulemaking to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the House and Senate Committees on Education. In addition to submitting the proposed rulemaking, the Commission has provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a detailed Regulatory Analysis Form prepared by the Board in compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, "Regulatory Review and Promulgation." A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, if IRRC has objections to any portion of the proposed rulemaking, it will notify the Commission within 10 days of the close of the Committees' review period. The notification shall specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met by that portion of the proposed rulemaking. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the amendments, by the Commission, the General Assembly and the Governor of objections raised.

Annex A**TITLE 22. EDUCATION****PART XIV. PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS AND PRACTICES COMMISSION****CHAPTER 237. DEFINITIONS OF STATUTORY TERMS****Subchapter A. DEFINITIONS****§ 237.1. Purpose**

(a) Under [**section**] **sections 5(a)(11) and 9.2** of the [**act of December 12, 1973 (P. L. 397, No. 141) (act) (24 P. S. § 12-1255(a)(11))**], known as the **Teacher Certification Law**] **Professional Educator Discipline Act (act) (24 P. S. §§ 2070.5(a)(11) and 2070.9b)**, the Professional Standards and Practices Commission (Commission) is vested with the duty and granted the power to discipline professional educators [**charged with or convicted of certain criminal offenses or found guilty by the Commission, after hearing, of certain statutory offenses**] and **charter school staff members and to consider the reinstatement applications of professional educators and charter school staff members who seek to have previously revoked or suspended certificates or eligibility reinstated.**

(b) Under section 5(a)(11) of the act, the Commission has adopted this subchapter to define terms in [**section 5(a)(11) of**] the act which describe the conduct for which discipline of a professional educator **or charter school staff member** might be imposed by the Commission.

(c) This subchapter is not the sole authority for defining terms under [**section**] **sections 5(a)(11) and 9.2** of the act. Judicial interpretations and adjudications of the Commission will authoritatively define the statutory terms. Judicial decisions **and decisions of the Secretary** under Article XI, Part C of the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P. S. §§ 11-1121—11-1133) [—], known as the **Teachers' Tenure Act** [—], and decisions of the Secretary under the **Teachers' Tenure Act** are not binding upon the Commission but [**will**] **may** be regarded as persuasive authority.

(d) The standards and conduct expected of a professional educator **or charter school staff member** are also prescribed by Chapter 235 (relating to Code of Professional Practice and Conduct for Educators), the violation of which may be grounds for discipline.

(e) **The definitions found in section 1.1 of the act (24 P. S. § 2070.1b) are incorporated herein by reference.**

§ 237.2. Scope and effect.

(a) *Applicability.* This subchapter applies to the terms in **[section] sections 5(a)(11) and 9.2 of the [act of December 12, 1973 (P. L. 397, No. 141) (act), known as the Teacher Certification Law] Professional Educator Discipline Act (24 P. S. §§ 2070.5(a)(11) and 2070.9b)**, and proceedings before the Commission. This subchapter does not apply to similar or identical terms used in other regulations or statutes, including section 1122 of the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P. S. § 11-1122), or to proceedings before a board of school directors or the Secretary under Article XI of the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P. S. §§ 11-1121—11-1133), known as Teachers Tenure Act, or to proceedings before the Secretary under **[sections] section 2(i) and (j) of the act of May 29, 1931 (P. L. 210, No. 126)**, and section 1211 of the Public School Code of 1949, which were partially preserved from repeal by section 2 of the act of April 26, 1990 (P. L. 122, No. 33).

(b) *Statewide effect.* The act and this subchapter will be construed and applied by the Commission in the context of the Commission's power and duty to determine the present, continuing and future fitness and ability of a person to properly perform in this Commonwealth the duties and responsibilities of a professional educator **[in the area of the person's certification] or charter school staff member.**

§ 237.3. Immorality.

[(a) Definition.] Immorality is conduct which offends the morals of **[a community] the Commonwealth** and is a bad example to the youth whose ideals a professional educator **or a charter school staff member** has a duty to foster and elevate.

[(b) Morals of a community. For purposes of the definition of the term "immorality" set forth in subsection (a), the "morals of a community" means the morals of the community in which the professional educator is employed.]

§ 237.4. Incompetency.

Incompetency is a continuing or persistent mental or intellectual inability or incapacity to perform the services expected of a professional educator **or a charter school staff member.**

§ 237.6. **[Habitual use of drugs or narcotics] (Reserved).**

[(a) Definition. Habitual use of drugs or narcotics is the illegal or improper use of drugs or narcotics on a frequent or regular basis.

(b) *Drugs and narcotics.* The terms "drug or narcotics" as used in section 5(a)(11) of the act of December 12, 1973 (P. L. 397, No. 141), known as the Teacher Certification Law (24 P. S. § 12-1225(a)(11)) are defined as the terms "drug" and "narcotic" are defined in section 2 of The Controlled Substance,

Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act (35 P. S. § 780-102), and as the term "drug" is defined by section 2 of the Pennsylvania Drug and Alcohol Abuse Control Act (71 P. S. § 1690.102).]

§ 237.8. Negligence.

(a) *Definition.* Negligence is a continuing or persistent **[actions] action or [omissions] omission** in violation of a duty.

(b) *Duty.* A duty may be established by law, by **[duly]** promulgated school rules, **policies** or procedures, by express direction from superiors or by duties of professional responsibility, including duties prescribed by Chapter 235 (relating to Code of Professional Practice and Conduct for Educators).

§ 237.9. Crimes **[and misdemeanors]** involving moral turpitude.

(a) *Definition.* Moral turpitude includes the following:

(1) That element **[and]** of personal misconduct in the private and social duties which a person owes to his fellow human beings or to society in general, which characterizes the act done as an act of baseness, vileness or depravity, and contrary to the accepted and customary rule of right and duty between two human beings.

* * * * *

(b) *Elements of the crime [or misdemeanor].* A determination of whether a crime **[or misdemeanor]** involves moral turpitude will be determined based solely upon the elements of the crime **[or misdemeanor]**. The underlying facts or details of an individual criminal charge, indictment or conviction **[is]** are not relevant to the issue of moral turpitude. **[The actual guilt or professed innocence of the charged, indicted or convicted professional educator is not relevant.]**

(c) *Specific crimes [or misdemeanors].* Crimes **[or misdemeanors]** involving moral turpitude **per se** include the following:

(1) An offense under 18 Pa.C.S. (relating to crimes and offenses) listed in section 111(e)(1) of the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P. S. § 1-111(e)(1)). **At any time subsequent to the adoption of this chapter if section 111(e)(1) is amended to add or delete crimes, the Commission will consider each additional or deleted crime to determine if the crime involves moral turpitude per se and will vote at a public meeting whether the crime will be designated as involving moral turpitude per se for purposes of cases coming before the Commission under section 9.2 of the Professional Educator Discipline Act (24 P. S. § 2070.9.2) (act).**

* * * * *

(3) An offense of a criminal law of the Commonwealth, the Federal government or another state or territory of the United States, **or another nation**, an element of which offense is delivery of a controlled substance or possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver.

(4) A State offense, out-of-State offense or Federal offense **or an offense of another nation** similar in nature to crimes **[listed]** in paragraphs (1)—(3).

(d) *Certified copy.* For purposes of section **[5(a)(11)] 9.2 of the [act of December 12, 1973 (P. L. 397, No.**

141), known as the Teacher Certification Law] (act) (24 P. S. § [**12-1225(a)(11) (act)**] **2070.9b**) and this section, a document certified by the clerk of court or other judicial officer designated by law as the official custodian of criminal court records **or certified by the official custodian of the appropriate licensing authority in another state, territory or nation** will be treated by the Commission as a certified copy of the document.

(e) *Indictment.* Indictment under section [**5(a)(11)**] **9.2** of the act includes a criminal complaint, criminal information or other similar document filed in a court of competent jurisdiction.

(f) *Conviction.* The term conviction under section [**5(a)(11)**] **9.2** of the act is defined to mean the [**entry of a judgment of sentence**] **verdict, judgment or sentence** or the entry of an order which constitutes a final order by the sentencing court. [**Judgment of sentence following a**] A plea of **guilty or nolo contendere** constitutes a conviction for purposes of this section.

§ 237.10. Surrender in lieu of discipline.

A professional educator's teaching certificate or a charter school staff member's eligibility to teach will be considered surrendered in lieu of discipline whenever the certificate or eligibility is surrendered to the Department after a local school entity furnishes the educator or charter school staff member with a written statement of charges for dismissal under section 1127 of the Public School Code of 1949 (24 P. S. § 11-1127), or after the educator or charter school staff member is discharged for cause by a local school entity, or after the Department receives a report concerning the educator or charter school staff member under section 9.1 of the Professional Educator Discipline Act (24 P. S. § 2070.9b) (act), or after the Department receives a complaint concerning the educator or charter staff member under section 9 of the act (24 P. S. § 2070.9).

STATE BOARD OF VETERINARY MEDICINE

[49 PA. CODE CH. 31]

Professional Conduct; Prescription Drugs

The State Board of Veterinary Medicine (Board) proposes to amend § 31.21 (relating to Rules of Professional Conduct for Veterinarians) to read as set forth in Annex A. The proposed amendment would require veterinarians to dispense prescription drugs in child resistant or manufacturer's original packaging; require veterinarians to place certain information on the label of dispensed prescription drugs; require veterinarians to dispense or administer prescription drugs and other medications only if they are within the manufacturer's expiration date; and provide that a veterinarian will not be disciplined for refusing to issue a written prescription, rather than dispensing a prescription drug, if the veterinarian has a good faith belief that a written prescription may be misused.

Effective Date

The rulemaking would be effective upon publication of the final-form regulation in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

Section 5(2) of the Veterinary Medicine Practice Act (act) (63 P. S. § 485.5(2)) authorizes the Board to adopt rules and regulations of professional conduct appropriate to establish and maintain a high standard of integrity, skills and practice in the profession of veterinary medicine.

Background and Need for Amendment

The Board currently has no regulations addressing the issues of dispensing, packaging and labeling of drugs by a veterinarian. Several inquiries have been addressed to the Board regarding the proper packaging of veterinary drugs. In the past, it was common for veterinarians to dispense prescription drugs in paper envelopes. However, both professionals and the public have become more aware of the dangers inherent in having prescription drugs in the home.

Current Federal regulations require drugs dispensed for human consumption to be packaged in child resistant packaging. Approximately 60% of the drugs used by a small animal veterinary practitioner are also prescribed for humans. In the interest of public safety, the Board believes it is appropriate to address the issue of packaging of prescription drugs dispensed by veterinarians. Requiring child resistant or manufacturer's original packaging, except in limited circumstances, would promote the safety of children who may come into contact with prescription drugs dispensed for animals in their home environments. In addition, public safety demands that a prescription drug be readily identified by its label. In the case of an accidental ingestion, that information may be life saving.

In a disciplinary context, the Board has determined that a veterinarian's use of outdated prescription drugs is a violation of the act, because that conduct fails to conform to the standards of acceptable and prevailing veterinary medical practice. However, there are no regulations that specifically restrict a veterinarian to dispensing and administering only prescription drugs and other drugs that are not date-expired. Some of the states surrounding this Commonwealth have adopted regulations specifically precluding the use of outdated prescription drugs or drugs. The proposed prohibition on the use of outdated prescription drugs or drugs would be purposefully broader than the packaging and labeling requirements. The packaging and labeling requirements of the proposed rulemaking would apply only to prescription drugs (those determined by the United States Food and Drug Administration to be limited to use on the order of a veterinarian or other medical doctor); in contrast, the prohibition on the use of outdated prescription drugs or drugs would apply to all drugs, whether or not a prescription is required for their use.

Finally, there are no current regulations addressing the provision of written prescriptions to clients. Both veterinarians and consumers have questioned the Board about proper veterinary practice related to providing a written prescription for veterinary drugs. The Board therefore proposes this amendment to establish the standard of professional conduct of a veterinarian with regard to written prescriptions.

Description of Proposed Amendment

The Board proposes to amend its professional conduct regulations in § 31.21 to add a new Principle 8 related to prescription drugs and drugs. The proposed amendment would, with just three exceptions, require a veterinarian to dispense prescription drugs in child resistant packaging. The amendment would set forth requirements for the proper labeling of prescription drugs dispensed by a veterinarian. The amendment would mandate that veterinarians dispense or administer only currently dated drugs. Finally, the amendment would provide that a veterinarian will not be disciplined for refusing to issue a written prescription to a client if the veterinarian has a good faith belief that the prescription may be misused.

Definitions

Subsection (a) would define "drug" as that term is defined in both the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act, 21 U.S.C.A. § 321(g), and section 102 of The Controlled Substance, Drug Device and Cosmetic Act (35 P. S. § 780-102). "Prescription drug" would be defined as any drug, except for blood and blood components intended for transfusion, required by Federal law, including Federal regulation, to be dispensed only by a prescription. This definition encompasses both the definition of prescription drug and veterinary prescription drug in 21 U.S.C.A. § 353(b) and (f) and is consistent with the definition of "prescription drug" used in 21 CFR 203.3(y) (relating to definitions).

Prescribing Limited to Animals under the Care of the Veterinarian

Subsection (b) would limit veterinarians to prescribing prescription drugs for animals that are under the veterinarian's care. This provision would require that the veterinarian or an authorized licensed associate have personal, first-hand knowledge of, and medical responsibility for, the animal for which the drug is prescribed. This provision is designed to ensure the safety of animals and prevent unscrupulous persons from obtaining prescription drugs by misrepresenting information to a veterinarian. As an alternative, a veterinarian may also prescribe prescription drugs for an animal if the veterinarian has made medically appropriate and timely visits to the premises where the animal is kept. This alternative would set forth the appropriate criteria for a veterinarian who works with herd animals.

Packaging Requirements

Subsection (c) would require veterinarians to dispense prescription drugs, other than for food animals, in child resistant or manufacturer's original packaging. The draft sent to interested parties used the term "safety closure packaging" instead of "child resistant packaging." Several commentators asked the Board to clarify what was intended by "safety closure" packaging. The Board determined that the standard language in use in the Federal regulations for the appropriate type of packaging is "child resistant" packaging and has adopted this term for its regulation. See 16 CFR 1700.15 (relating to poison prevention packaging standards).

The proposed amendment would allow a veterinarian to dispense a prescription drug in the manufacturer's original packaging for several reasons. First, this type of packaging is often inherently child resistant. For example, manufacturers sometimes package pills and single dose topical preparations in a sheet of individually separated, sealed plastic containers. Second, it may be impractical for a veterinarian to repackage certain types of

prescription drugs. For example, tubes of an ointment would be impossible to repackage and, depending on the size of the tube, it might be impractical or costly to place the entire tube inside a child resistant package. Finally, some drugs used by veterinarians are dispensed in a quantity that would be difficult for the veterinarian to obtain safety closure packaging to accommodate the medication. Moreover, this exemption for manufacturer's original packaging would not exempt medications with a high risk of accident, such as syringes prefilled with the correct dosage of a drug because the syringe does not come prefilled from the manufacturer. No hardship would be created for the veterinarian, because safety closure packaging for syringes is readily available.

The following two exceptions would be permitted: (1) when dispensing for food animals; and (2) when the client specifically requests alternate packaging. Dispensing for food animals is exempted for three reasons. First, the drugs are not normally kept within the reach of children, thus lessening the danger of accidental ingestion. Second, laypersons administering drugs to food animals are generally familiar with safe handling procedures because administration of drugs is a common part of animal husbandry. Third, because drugs dispensed for food animals are often dispensed on a "per herd" basis, their quantity would make meeting the general requirement impractical and costly.

Finally, an exemption is permitted under a client's request to allow a veterinarian to dispense drugs to a person who has difficulty opening child resistant packaging in a container that is more easily opened by that person. This exemption mirrors the exemption to the child resistant packaging requirement for human drugs in Federal law. See 16 CFR 1701.1(d) (relating to definitions).

Labeling Requirements

Subsection (d) would address labeling requirements for prescription drugs dispensed by veterinarians. Requiring information about the prescribing or dispensing, or both, veterinarian on the medication's label would serve the public interest by allowing consumers immediate access to veterinarian contact information in the case of questions or concerns about the prescription drug or its effects and in case of an emergency accidental ingestion. The proposed amendment would require the name, address and telephone number of the prescribing veterinarian and the name and telephone number of the dispensing veterinarian, if different. The address of the dispensing veterinarian, if a different veterinarian than the veterinarian who prescribed the drug, is unnecessary because the client would already know the address of the dispensing veterinarian because the client would have to go to the dispensing veterinarian to pick up the medication. The information required would enable the two veterinarians to more easily communicate with each other and would allow the client ready access to the contact information of the prescribing veterinarian, who is in the best position to answer questions or concerns about the drug prescribed.

The information regarding the name, potency, quantity of the drug and date dispensed would permit a veterinarian, medical doctor or poison control center to more accurately provide the appropriate treatment in the case of accidental ingestion and would provide important information to enable a veterinarian to answer a client's questions. Requiring directions for use and cautionary statements would aid the veterinary client in proper administration of the drug. The reference to cautionary

statements required by law encompasses Federal law that requires the statement that the drug may only be dispensed on the prescription of a veterinarian and any other cautionary statements that Federal law may require to be placed on specific drugs. Providing the expiration date of the drug would identify the drug as either within the expiration date or expired and requiring disposal. Other information required would include the number of refills allowed and the name of the patient, if applicable, that is, when not prescribed for a herd.

Requirement that Veterinarians Administer and Dispense only Currently Dated Medications

Section 21(11) of the act (63 P. S. § 485.21(11)) authorizes the Board to discipline licensees who depart from, or fail to conform to, the standards of acceptable and prevailing veterinary medical practice. The Board's regulations currently do not address the issue of whether a veterinarian departs from the standards of acceptable and prevailing veterinary medical practice by prescribing, administering or dispensing a medication that is expired. The Board has reviewed the issue and found that the acceptable and prevailing standards of veterinary medical practice demand that veterinarians administer or dispense only medications that are within the date set by the manufacturer as the drug's effective date. The determination of this expiration date has been given thorough review by the United States Food and Drug Administration and the Board finds that it is the date that shall determine whether a drug is current or expired.

The Board uses the term "drugs" in this section of the proposed amendment rather than using the term "prescription drugs." The Board intends to require that all drugs administered or dispensed by a licensed veterinarian, whether or not the drug is a prescription drug, shall be current, within the date as determined by the manufacturer. The Board believes that the safety and efficacy of outdated drugs, as well as prescription drugs, could negatively impact the health and safety of animals and their human custodians.

Issuance of Written Prescriptions

Finally, the amendment as submitted for predraft commentary required a veterinarian to provide the client with a prescription if one was requested, rather than dispensing the medication. A number of commentators who work with farm animals voiced strong objections to the draft language. Because these veterinarians often dispense drugs in large, multiple dose quantities, providing a prescription rather than the drug itself would make it impossible for the veterinarian to have even minimal knowledge or control over the remaining quantity or expiration date of the drug. This could be particularly dangerous to humans when food animals are involved. The Board determined that its regulation should leave the decision of whether to provide a prescription upon request of a client to the professional judgment of the veterinarian. However, the proposed amendment requires that a veterinarian have a good faith reason for refusing a client's request for a prescription. This provision clarifies the Board's position that a veterinarian should not be motivated solely by profit in determining whether to issue a prescription rather than dispense a medication.

Compliance with Executive Order 1996-1

In accordance with "Regulatory Review and Promulgation," Executive Order 1996-1 in drafting and promulgating the proposed amendment, the Board sent the text of the proposed amendment to interested parties, including State and regional veterinary medical associations, asso-

ciations of animal health technicians and schools of veterinary medicine. Several persons submitted comments. One commentator suggested that the Board clarify the term "food animal" to specifically include or exclude equines. The Board determined that it would not further define the term because equines are not intended for human food consumption in this country. Another commentator suggested that the amendment provide that "hazardous or potentially toxic medications are recommended to be dispensed in" child resistant packaging. The Board rejected this suggestion for two reasons. First, if the amendment sets forth a recommendation rather than a requirement, the amendment would be impossible to enforce. Second, the Board rejected the suggestion that the packaging requirements be limited to hazardous medications because virtually any prescription drug can be hazardous if accidentally ingested. Comments also suggested requiring the veterinarian's telephone number, method of administration, number of refills authorized and the name of the patient on the drug label. The Board adopted all of these suggestions.

Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed amendment should have only a minimal financial impact on licensees, who will be required to purchase child resistant packaging for some of the drugs they dispense. The proposed amendment should have no fiscal impact on the Board, the private sector, the general public or political subdivisions. In addition, the proposed amendment should not create additional paperwork for licensees, the Board, State government or the private sector.

Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors its regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on June 10, 2002, the Board submitted a copy of this proposed amendment to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC), the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee (SCP/PLC) and the House Professional Licensure Committee (HPLC). In addition to submitting the proposed amendment, the Board has provided IRRC, the SCP/PLC and the HPLC with a copy of a detailed Regulatory Analysis Form prepared by the Board in compliance with Executive Order 1996-1. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(g)), if IRRC has objections to any portion of the proposed rulemaking, it will notify the Board within 10 days of the close of the SCP/PLC's and HPLC's review period. The notification shall specify the regulatory review criteria that have not been met. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review of objections by the Board, the General Assembly and the Governor prior to publication of the regulations.

Public Comment

Interested persons are invited to submit written comments, suggestions or objections regarding this proposed amendment to Robert Kline, State Board of Veterinary Medicine, P. O. VETERINARY MEDICINE

PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT

§ 31.21. Rules of Professional Conduct for Veteri-
narians.

Preamble

The Board is empowered under section 5(2) of the act (63 P. S. § 485.5(2)) to adopt rules and regulations of professional conduct appropriate to establish and maintain a high standard of integrity, skill and practice in the profession of veterinary medicine. In accordance with this authority, the Board has determined that the following rules are necessary in the public interest to protect the public against unprofessional conduct on the part of veterinarians. The Board therefore adopts this professional conduct code for veterinarians practicing veterinary medicine in this Commonwealth. Some of the rules of conduct are imperatives, cast in the terms, "shall" or "may not." Veterinarians who fail to adhere to these rules will be subject to professional discipline. Other rules, generally cast in the terms "may" or "should," are intended as aspirational goals and define areas under which the veterinarian has professional discretion. No disciplinary action will be taken when a veterinarian acts within the bounds of discretion. References throughout this professional conduct code to imperative conduct on the part of veterinarians [shall] also apply to applicants for licensure and temporary permit holders where these persons render services under qualified supervision.

* * * * *

Principle 8. Drugs.

(a)(1) For purposes of Principle 8, the term "drug" means:

(i) Substances recognized in the official United States Pharmacopoeia, official National Formulary, or Federal Food and Drug Administration Approved Animal Drug Products or any supplement to them.

(ii) Substances intended for use in the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment or prevention of disease in man or other animals.

(iii) Substances (other than food) intended to affect the structure or any function of the human body or other animal body.

(iv) Substances intended for use as a component of any substance specified in subparagraph (i), (ii) or (iii), but not including devices as that term is defined in section 2 of The Controlled Substance, Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act (35 P. S. § 780-102).

(2) The term "prescription drug" means any drug required by Federal law, including Federal regulation, to be dispensed only by a prescription.

(b) A veterinarian shall only prescribe prescription drugs to animals that are under the veterinarian's care. For purposes of this section, "under the veterinarian's care" means that the veterinarian or one of the veterinarian's licensed associates has examined the animal or has made medically appropriate and timely visits to the premises where the animal is kept.

(c) Prescription drugs dispensed by a veterinarian, other than drugs for food animals, shall be dispensed in child resistant packaging or in the manufacturer's original packaging, except when the client specifically requests other packaging.

(d) Prescription drugs dispensed by a veterinarian shall be labeled with, at a minimum, the following information:

(1) The name, address and telephone number of the prescribing veterinarian and the name and telephone number of the dispenser, if different;

(2) The brand or generic name of the drug.

(3) The potency and the quantity of the drug.

(4) The number of refills allowed, if any.

(5) Adequate directions for use, which shall include quantity of dose, frequency of administration or application, duration of administration or application and route or method of administration or application.

(6) Any cautionary statements specified by the veterinarian or required by Federal law, including the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act (21 U.S.C.A. §§ 301—397) and 21 CFR (relating to food and drugs).

(7) The name of the patient, if applicable.

(8) The date the drug was dispensed.

(9) The expiration date of the drug.

(e) Veterinarians shall dispense or administer only drugs, including prescription drugs, that are within the expiration date specified by the manufacturer and shall dispense or administer only drugs that will not expire within the prescribed treatment period.

(f) Upon request, a veterinarian shall provide a client with a written prescription for an animal that is under the veterinarian's care, except that a veterinarian may refuse to do so without being subject to discipline if the veterinarian has a good faith belief that the prescription may be misused.

Maximum Lawful Rate of Interest for Residential Mortgages for the Month of July 2002

The Department of Banking (Department), under the authority contained in section 301 of the act of January 30, 1974 (P. L. 13, No. 6) (41 P. S. § 301), hereby determines that the maximum lawful rate of interest for residential mortgages for the month of July, 2002, is 8%.

The interest rate limitations under the State's usury statute were preempted to a great extent by Federal law, the Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980 (Pub. L. No. 96-221). Further preemption was instituted with the signing of Pub. L. No. 96-399, which overrode State interest rate limitations on any individual who finances the sale or exchange of residential real property which the individual owns and which the individual occupies or has occupied as a principal residence.

Each month the Department is required by State law to compute and announce the ceiling rate on residential mortgages in this Commonwealth. This maximum rate is determined by adding 2.50 percentage points to the yield rate on long-term government bonds as published by the Federal Reserve Board and/or the United States Treasury. The latest yield rate on long-term government securities is 5.49 to which was added 2.50 percentage points for a total of 7.99 that by law is rounded off to the nearest quarter at 8%.

Under the Federal Clean Water Act and The Clean Streams Law, the following parties have applied for an NPDES permit or to renew their current permit to discharge controlled wastewaters into the waters of this Commonwealth or to conduct other activities required by the NPDES permit. For renewal applications listed in Section I, the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has made a tentative determination to reissue these permits for 5 years subject to effluent limitations and monitoring and reporting requirements in their current permits, with appropriate and necessary updated requirements to reflect new and changed regulations and other requirements. For all new permit applications, renewal application with major changes or applications for permits not waived by the EPA, the Department, based upon preliminary reviews, also made a tentative determination of proposed effluent limitations and other terms and conditions for the permit applications listed in Section II. These determinations are published as proposed actions for comments prior to taking final actions.

Unless indicated otherwise, the EPA Region III Administrator has waived the right to review or object to this proposed permit action under the waiver provision 40 CFR 123.24(d).

Persons wishing to comment on the proposed permit are invited to submit a statement, to the office noted before the application, within 30 days from the date of this public notice. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the Act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Addition of Substances Subject to Registration

The Noncontrolled Substances Reporting and Registration Act (act) (35 P. S. §§ 881—888) provides that any manufacturer, wholesaler, retailer or other person who is engaged in the sale, distribution, transfer or furnishing of any substance covered by the act shall register with the Secretary of Health (Secretary).

The act enumerates various substances which are subject to registration, itemizes what information is required to be reported to the Secretary, itemizes what records are required to be kept by the registrants and provides for penalties for failure to comply with the act.

The act also permit the Secretary, by notice, to add to the list of substances subject to registration. The act requires that notice be sent to every person known to the Secretary to be engaged in the sale, distribution, transfer or furnishing of these substances.

In addition to the notice as required by the act, the Secretary is also publishing this notice so that persons engaged in the sale, distribution, transfer or furnishing of these substances, not known to the Secretary, will also be informed of the registration and record keeping obligations.

Currently, there are 32 substances subject to the provisions of the act. Accordingly, the Secretary hereby adds the following four substances to the list of substances subject to the provisions of the act:

- (33) Red phosphorus
- (34) White phosphorus
- (35) Hypophosphites
- (36) Hypophosphorus acid

The Secretary believes that these substances are being used or could be used in the illegal manufacture of controlled substances or in the illegal sale of controlled substances.

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

Consideration of Changes to Special Regulation Designations

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) has approved guidelines with regard to encouraging public participation on possible changes to the designation of stream sections or lakes for special regulation programs. Under 58 Pa. Code Chapter 65 (relating to special fishing regulations), the Commission designates certain streams, stream sections and lakes as being subject to special fishing regulations. These designations are effective after Commission approval when they are posted at the site and a notice is published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Under the Commission's guidelines, a notice concerning the proposed designation or redesignation of a stream section or lake under special regulations ordinarily will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before the matter is reviewed by the Commissioners.

At the next Commission meeting on July 26 and 27, 2002, the Commission will consider designating the following stream sections or lakes as waters subject to special fishing regulations under 58 Pa. Code Chapter 65, effective January 1, 2003, with the exception noted as follows:

58 Pa. Code § 65.6. Delayed harvest artificial lures only areas.

The Commission will consider revising the limits of the delayed harvest artificial lures only (DHALO) area on Fishing Creek, Columbia County. Specifically, the Commission will consider extending the downstream area approximately 100 yards and reducing the upstream area approximately 0.2 mile. If approved, the revised section will be as follows: from 180 yards upstream of the upstream Benton Borough line to the upstream Richard Kriebel property line, a distance of approximately 0.5 mile. This change will go into effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The Commission also will consider adding the following stream section to the list of DHALO Areas designated under 58 Pa. Code § 65.6:

State Board of Osteopathic Medicine Regulation No. 16A-539 Sexual Misconduct June 7, 2002

We submit for consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) which have not been met. The State Board of Osteopathic Medicine (Board) must respond to these comments when it submits the final-form regulation. If the final-form regulation is not delivered within 2 years of the close of the public comment period, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

We note that this regulation is identical to the State Board of Medicine's Regulation #16A-497 relating to sexual misconduct. We continue to have concerns with the same issues and as a result, our comments on the proposed regulations are similar.

1. Section 25.215. Sexual misconduct.—Clarity.

General

As proposed, § 25.215 contains both definitions and substantive regulatory provisions. To be consistent with regulatory framework existing in Chapter 25, the Board should create two separate sections. The definitions should remain in § 25.215. The substantive provisions should be placed in a separate section following the definitions.

Subsection (a)

This subsection defines "immediate family member." It is unclear if the phrase "other family member" contained

in the definition includes a relationship by blood, marriage or law. In addition, the inclusion of the phrase, "with whom a patient resides" in the definition limits the scope of this regulation. Finally, the definition does not address a patient's relationships with nonfamily members.

Subsection (b)

This subsection refers to "Board regulated practitioner." The Board should define "Board regulated practitioner" by adding the term to the definitions section and referencing section 271.2 of the Osteopathic Medical Practice Act (63 P. S. § 271.2).

Subsections (b)—(d)

These subsections include the phrase "and subjects the practitioner to disciplinary action." Where can the disciplinary action be found? A cross-reference to the appropriate citation for disciplinary action should be provided in the subsections.

Subsection (d)

The Board uses the phrase "mental health disorder" in this subsection. The meaning of this phrase is vague. The regulation should either define or reference the categories of mental health disorders. For instance, the Board could refer to patients who are diagnosed under the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders—IV (DSM-IV) or subsequent publications.

2. Behavioral examples.—Clarity.

A commentator noted that the regulations proposed by the State Board of Medicine and the Board were too vague and provided several scenarios in which innocent behavior would be in violation of the regulation. Given this possibility, the Board should consider providing examples of the type of behavior it considers inappropriate.
