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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency

wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacode.com.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is available at www.pabulletin.com.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised. A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

INTERLOCUTORY APPEALS

Rule 311. Interlocutory Appeals as of Right.

- (a) General rule.—An appeal may be taken as of right and without reference to Pa.R.A.P. 341(c) from:
- (1) Affecting judgments.—An order refusing to open, vacate, or strike off a judgment. If orders opening, vacating, or striking off a judgment are sought in the alternative, no appeal may be filed until the court has disposed of each claim for relief.
- (2) Attachments, etc.—An order confirming, modifying [or], dissolving, or refusing to confirm, modify or dissolve an attachment, custodianship, receivership, or similar matter affecting the possession or control of property, except for orders pursuant to [Section 3323(f) or 3505(a) of the Divorce Code,] 23 Pa.C.S. §§ 3323(f), 3505(a).
- (3) Change of criminal venue or venire.—An order changing venue or venire in a criminal proceeding.
- (4) *Injunctions.*—An order that grants or denies, modifies or refuses to modify, continues or refuses to continue, or dissolves or refuses to dissolve an injunction unless the order was entered:
- (i) [Section 3323(f) or 3505(a) of the Divorce Code,] Pursuant to 23 Pa.C.S. §§ 3323(f), 3505(a); or
- (ii) After a trial but before entry of the final order. Such order is immediately appealable, however, if the

- order enjoins conduct previously permitted or mandated or permits or mandates conduct not previously mandated or permitted, and is effective before entry of the final order.
- (5) Peremptory judgment in mandamus.—An order granting peremptory judgment in mandamus.
- (6) New trials.—An order in a civil action or proceeding awarding a new trial, or an order in a criminal proceeding awarding a new trial where the defendant claims that the proper disposition of the matter would be an absolute discharge or where the Commonwealth claims that the [lower] trial court committed an error of law.
 - (7) Partition.—An order directing partition.
- (8) Other cases. [An order which is made appealable by statute or general rule.]—An order that is made final or appealable by statute or general rule, even though the order does not dispose of all claims and of all parties.
- (b) Order sustaining venue or personal or in rem jurisdiction.—An appeal may be taken as of right from an order in a civil action or proceeding sustaining the venue of the matter or jurisdiction over the person or over real or personal property if:
- (1) the plaintiff, petitioner, or other party benefiting from the order files of record within ten days after the entry of the order an election that the order shall be deemed final; or
- (2) the court states in the order that a substantial issue of venue or jurisdiction is presented.
- (c) Changes of venue, etc.—An appeal may be taken as of right from an order in a civil action or proceeding changing venue, transferring the matter to another court of coordinate jurisdiction, or declining to proceed in the matter on the basis of forum non conveniens or analogous principles.
- (d) Commonwealth [Appeals in Criminal Cases] appeals in criminal cases.—In a criminal case, under the circumstances provided by law, the Commonwealth may take an appeal as of right from an order that does not end the entire case where the Commonwealth certifies in the notice of appeal that the order will terminate or substantially handicap the prosecution.
- (e) Orders [Overruling Preliminary Objections in Eminent Domain Cases] overruling preliminary objections in eminent domain cases.—An appeal may be taken as of right from an order overruling preliminary objections to a declaration of taking and an order overruling preliminary objections to a petition for appointment of a board of viewers.
- (f) Administrative [Remand] remand.—An appeal may be taken as of right from: (1) an order of a common pleas court or government unit remanding a matter to an administrative agency or hearing officer for execution of the adjudication of the reviewing tribunal in a manner that does not require the exercise of administrative discretion; or (2) an order of a common pleas court or government unit remanding a matter to an administrative agency or hearing officer that decides an issue [which] that would ultimately evade appellate review if an immediate appeal is not allowed.

- (g) Waiver of objections.
- (1) [Where an interlocutory order is immediately appealable under this rule, failure to appeal:] Except as provided in subparagraphs (g)(1)(ii), (iii), and (iv), failure to file an appeal of an interlocutory order does not waive any objections to the interlocutory order:
- (i) [Under Subdivisions (a), (b)(2) or (f) of this rule shall not constitute a waiver of the objection to the order and the objection may be raised on any subsequent appeal in the matter from a determination on the merits.] (Rescinded).
- (ii) [Under Subdivisions (b)(1) or (c)] Failure to file an appeal from an interlocutory order under subparagraph (b)(1) or paragraph (c) of this rule shall constitute a waiver of all objections to jurisdiction over the person or over the property involved or to venue, etc., and the question of jurisdiction or venue shall not be considered on any subsequent [appellate review of the matter] appeal.
- (iii) [Under Subdivision (e) of this rule shall constitute a waiver of all objections to such orders and any objection may not be raised on any subsequent appeal in the matter from a determination on the merits.] Failure to file an appeal from an interlocutory order under paragraph (e) of this rule shall constitute a waiver of all objections to such an order.
- (iv) Failure to file an appeal from an interlocutory order refusing to compel arbitration, appealable under 42 Pa.C.S. § 7320(a)(1) and subparagraph (a)(8) of this rule, shall constitute a waiver of all objections to such an order.
- (2) Where no election that an interlocutory order shall be deemed final is filed under [Subdivision] subparagraph (b)(1) of this rule, the objection may be raised on any subsequent appeal [in the matter from a determination on the merits].
- (h) Further proceedings in [lower] the trial court. [Rule 1701(a) (effect of appeal generally)]—Pa.R.A.P. 1701(a) shall not be applicable to a matter in which an interlocutory order is appealed under [Subdivisions] subparagraphs (a)(2) or (a)(4) of this rule.

Official Note: Authority—This rule implements 42 Pa.C.S. § 5105(c) [(interlocutory appeals)], which provides:

(c) Interlocutory appeals. There shall be a right of appeal from such interlocutory orders of tribunals and other government units as may be specified by law. The governing authority shall be responsible for a continuous review of the operation of section 702(b) (relating to interlocutory appeals by permission) and shall from time to time establish by general rule rights to appeal from such classes of interlocutory orders, if any, from which appeals are regularly [allowed] permitted pursuant to section 702(b).

The appeal rights under this rule [, and under Rule 312 (Interlocutory Appeals by Permission), Rule 313 (Collateral Orders), Rule 341 (Final Orders; Generally), and Rule 342 (Appealable Orphans' Court Orders),] and under Pa.R.A.P. 312, Pa.R.A.P. 313, Pa.R.A.P. 341, and Pa.R.A.P. 342 are cumulative; and

no inference shall be drawn from the fact that two or more rules may be applicable to an appeal from a given order.

[Subdivision] Paragraph (a)—If an order falls under [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 311, an immediate appeal may be taken as of right simply by filing a notice of appeal. The procedures set forth in [Rules] Pa.R.A.P. 341(c) and 1311 do not apply to an appeal under [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 311

[Subdivision (a), Paragraph (a)(1) (Affecting judgments)] Subparagraph (a)(1)—The 1989 amendment to [paragraph] subparagraph (a)(1) eliminated interlocutory appeals of right from orders opening, vacating, or striking off a judgment while retaining the right of appeal from an order refusing to take any such action.

[Paragraph (a)(2) (Attachments, etc.)] Subparagraph (a)(2)—The 1987 Amendment to [paragraph] subparagraph (a)(2) is consistent with appellate court decisions disallowing interlocutory appeals in matrimonial matters. Fried v. Fried, [509 Pa. 89,] 501 A.2d 211 (Pa. 1985); O'Brien v. O'Brien, [359 Pa. Super. 594,] 519 A.2d 511 (Pa. Super. 1987).

[Paragraph (a)(3) (Change of criminal venue or venire)—Under prior practice, either a defendant or the Commonwealth could appeal an order changing venue. See former Pa.R.Crim.P. 311(a) (Third sentence) before amendment of June 29, 1977, 471 Pa. XLIV. An order refusing to change venue is not appealable. Commonwealth v. Swanson, 424 Pa. 192, 225 A.2d 231 (1967). This rule makes no change in existing practice.]

Subparagraph (a)(3)—Change of venire is authorized by 42 Pa.C.S. § 8702 [(impaneling jury from another county)]. Pa.R.Crim.P. [312 (motion for change of venue or change of venire)] 584 treats changes of venue and venire the same. Thus an order changing venue or venire is appealable by the defendant or the Commonwealth, while an order refusing to change venue or venire is not.

See also [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 903(c)(1) regarding time for appeal.

[Paragraph (a)(4) (Injunctions)] Subparagraph (a)(4)—The 1987 amendment to [paragraph] subparagraph (a)(4) is consistent with appellate court decisions disallowing interlocutory appeals in matrimonial matters. Fried v. Fried, [509 Pa. 89,] 501 A.2d 211, 215 (Pa. 1985); O'Brien v. O'Brien, [359 Pa. Super. 594,] 519 A.2d 511, 514 (Pa. Super. 1987).

The 1996 amendment to **[paragraph]** subparagraph (a)(4) reconciled two conflicting lines of cases by adopting the position that generally an appeal may not be taken from a *decree nisi* granting or denying a permanent injunction.

The 2009 amendment to the rule conformed the rule to the 2003 amendments to the Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure abolishing actions in equity and thus eliminating the *decree nisi*. Because *decrees nisi* were in general not appealable to the extent they were not effective immediately upon entry, this principle has been expressly incorporated into the body of the rule as applicable to any injunction.

[Paragraph (a)(5) (Peremptory judgment in mandamus)—Paragraph] Subparagraph (a)(5)—Subparagraph (a)(5), added in 1996, authorizes an interlocutory appeal as of right from an order granting a motion for peremptory judgment in mandamus without the condition precedent of a motion to open the peremptory judgment in mandamus. [Under prior practice established in Hamby v. Stoe, 448 Pa. 483, 295 A.2d 309 (1972), an order granting peremptory judgment in mandamus was not appealable; only the order denying a motion to open the peremptory judgment in mandamus was appealable. The 1996 amendment eliminated the need to move to open. The January 1, 1996 amendment to Pa.R.C.P. 1098 eliminates the former practice of filing a petition to open a peremptory judgment in mandamus. The 1996 amendment overrules Hamby v. Stoe and other decisions that quashed appeals that were taken from the peremptory judgment in mandamus rather than the order denying the motion to open the judgment, e.g., Butler v. Emerson, 76 Pa. Cmwlth. 156, 463 A.2d 109 (1983); Mertz v. Lakatos, 21 Pa. Cmwlth. 291 (1975); Ellenbogen v. Larsen, 16 Pa. Cmwlth. 353, 328 **A.2d 587 (1974).** An order denying a motion for peremptory judgment in mandamus remains unappealable.

[Following a 2005 amendment to Rule 311, orders determining the validity of a will or trust were appealable as of right under former subdivision (a)(8). Pursuant to the 2011 amendments to Rule 342 (Appealable Orphans' Court Orders), such orders are now immediately appealable under subdivision (a)(2) of Rule 342.

Paragraph (a)(8) (Other cases)—Paragraph (a)(8) is directed primarily to statutes and general rules hereafter enacted or promulgated. The current text of the Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure, the Pennsylvania Rules of Criminal Procedure, etc., should be consulted to identify any interlocutory appeal rights provided for therein. See also, e.g., 42 Pa.C.S. § 7320 (appeals from court orders), concerning appeals from certain orders in nonjudicial arbitration proceedings, which section is not suspended by these rules. See Rule 5102(a) (Judicial Code unaffected).

Subparagraph (a)(8)—Subparagraph (a)(8) recognizes that orders that are procedurally interlocutory may be made appealable by statute or general rule. For example, see 27 Pa.C.S. § 8303. The Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure, the Pennsylvania Rules of Criminal Procedure, etc., should also be consulted.

Following a 2005 amendment to Pa.R.A.P. 311, orders determining the validity of a will or trust were appealable as of right under former subparagraph (a)(8). Pursuant to the 2011 amendments to Pa.R.A.P. 342, such orders are now immediately appealable under Pa.R.A.P. 342(a)(2).

[Subdivision (b) (Order sustaining venue or personal or in rem jurisdiction)—Subdivision] Paragraph (b)—Paragraph (b) is based in part on the Act of March 5, 1925, P. L. 23 [(order ruling on question of jurisdiction)]. The term "civil action or proceeding" is broader than the term "proceeding at law or in equity" under the prior practice and is intended to include orders entered by the orphans' court division. Cf. In the Matter of Phillips, [471 Pa. 289,] 370 A.2d 307 (Pa. 1977).

In [paragraph] subparagraph (b)(1), a plaintiff is given a qualified (because it can be [overriden] overridden by petition for and grant of permission to appeal under Rule 312 (interlocutory appeals by permission))] Pa.R.A.P. 312) option to gamble that the venue of the matter or personal or in rem jurisdiction will be sustained on appeal. [Paragraph (g)(ii)] Subpara**graph** (g)(1)(ii) provides that if the plaintiff timely elects final treatment, the failure of the defendant to appeal constitutes a waiver. The appeal period under [Rule 903 (time for appeal) Pa.R.A.P. 903 ordinarily runs from the entry of the order, and not from the date of filing of the election, which procedure will ordinarily afford at least 20 days within which to appeal. See [Rule] **Pa.R.A.P.** 903(c) as to treatment of special appeal times. If the plaintiff does not file an election to treat the order as final, the case will proceed to [trail] trial unless (1) the trial court makes a finding under [Paragraph] subparagraph (b)(2) of the existence of a substantial question of jurisdiction and the defendant elects to appeal, (2) an interlocutory appeal is permitted under [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 312, or (3) another basis for appeal appears, [e.g.] for example, under [paragraph] subparagraph (a)(1), and an appeal is taken. Presumably, a plaintiff would file such an election where [he] plaintiff desires to force the defendant to decide promptly whether the objection to venue or jurisdiction will be seriously pressed. [Subdivision] Paragraph (b) does not cover orders that do not sustain jurisdiction because they are, of course, final orders appealable under [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 341.

[Subdivision (b)(2) (Substantial issue of venue or jurisdiction)] Subparagraph (b)(2)—The 1989 amendment to [paragraph] subparagraph (b)(2) permits an interlocutory appeal as of right where the trial court certifies that a substantial question of venue is present. This eliminated an inconsistency formerly existing between [subdivision] paragraph (b) and [paragraph] subparagraph (b)(2).

[Subdivision (c) (Changes of venue, etc.)—Subdivision] Paragraph (c)—Paragraph (c) is based in part on the act of March 5, 1925 (P. L. 23, No. 15) [(order ruling on question of jurisdiction)]. The term "civil action or proceeding" is broader than the term "proceeding at law or in equity" under the prior practice and is intended to include orders entered by the orphans' court division. Cf. In the Matter of Phillips, [471 Pa. 289,] 370 A.2d 307, 308 (Pa. 1977).

[Subdivision] Paragraph (c) covers orders that do not sustain venue, [e.g.,] such as orders under Pa.R.C.P. 1006(d) and (e).

However, the [subdivision] paragraph does not relate to a transfer under 42 Pa.C.S. § 933(c)(1) [(concurrent and exclusive jurisdiction)], 42 Pa.C.S. § 5103 [(transfer of erroneously filed matter) or under], or any other similar provision of law, because such a transfer is not to a "court of coordinate jurisdiction" within the meaning of this rule; it is intended that there shall be no right of appeal from a transfer order based on improper subject matter jurisdiction. Such orders may be appealed by permission under [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 312, or an appeal as of right may be taken

from an order dismissing the matter for lack of jurisdiction. See Balshy v. Rank, [507 Pa. 384, 388,] 490 A.2d 415, 416 (Pa. 1985).

Other orders relating to subject matter jurisdiction (which for this purpose does not include questions as to the form of action, [e.g.,] such as between law and equity, or divisional assignment, see 42 Pa.C.S. § 952 [(status of court divisions))]) will be appealable under [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 341 if jurisdiction is not sustained, and otherwise will be subject to [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 312.

[Subdivision (d) (Commonwealth appeals in criminal matters)—In subdivision (d), the 1992 amendment permits appeals by the Commonwealth from certain interlocutory orders that were previously treated as final orders under the pre-1992 version of Rule 341(c). See, e.g., Commonwealth v. Dugger, 506 Pa. 537, 486 A.2d 382 (1985); Commonwealth v. Deans, 530 Pa. 514, 610 A.2d 32 (1992); and Commonwealth v. Cohen, 529 Pa. 552, 605 A.2d 1212 (1992). The 1996 amendment to Rule 904(e) requires that the Commonwealth assert in the notice of appeal that the trial court's order will terminate or substantially handicap the prosecution.

Subdivision (e) (Orders overruling preliminary objections in eminent domain cases)—In subdivision (e), the 1992 amendment permits interlocutory appeals from orders overruling preliminary objections in eminent domain cases. These orders were previously appealable as final orders under Rule 341 even though such orders did not dispose of all claims and all parties. See In Re Certain Parcels of Real Estate, 420 Pa. 289, 216 A.2d 774 (1966); and Central Bucks Joint School Bldg. Authority v. Rawls, 8 Pa. Cmwlth. 491, 303 A.2d 863 (1973).

Paragraph (d)—Pursuant to paragraph (d), the Commonwealth has a right to take an appeal from an interlocutory order provided that the Commonwealth certifies in the notice of appeal that the order terminates or substantially handicaps the prosecution. See Pa.R.A.P. 904(e). This rule supersedes Commonwealth v. Dugger, 486 A.2d 382, 386 (Pa. 1985). Commonwealth v. Dixon, 907 A.2d 468, 471 n.8 (Pa. 2006).

[Subdivision (f) (Administrative remand)—In subdivision (f), the 1992 amendment permitted] Paragraph (f)—Pursuant to paragraph (f), there is an immediate appeal as of right from an order of a common pleas court or government unit remanding a matter to an administrative agency or hearing officer for execution of the adjudication of the reviewing tribunal in a manner that does not require the exercise of administrative discretion. Examples of such orders include: [(1)] a remand by a court of common pleas to the Department of Transportation for removal of points from a drivers license; and [(2)] an order of the [Workmen's] Workers' Compensation Appeal Board reinstating compensation benefits and remanding to a referee for computation of benefits.

[Subdivision] Paragraph (f) further permits immediate appeal from an order of a common pleas court or government unit remanding a matter to an administrative agency or hearing officer that decides an issue that would ultimately evade appellate review if an immediate appeal is not allowed. [See Department of Environ-

mental Resources v. Big B Mining Co., Inc., 123 Pa. Cmwlth, 591, 554 A.2d 1002 (1989) (order of Environmental Hearing Board reversing D.E.R.'s denial of a surface mining permit and remanding to D.E.R. for re-evaluation of effluent limitations); Phila. Commission On Human Relations v. Gold, 95 Pa. Cmwlth. 76, 503 A.2d 1120 (1986) (court of common pleas order reversing a Philadelphia Human Relations Commission finding of discrimination on ground the commission impermissibly commingled prosecutorial [or] and adjudicative functions). The 1992 amendment overrules, in part, FMC Corporation v. Workmen's Compensation Appeal Board, 116 Pa. Cmwlth. 527, 542 A.2d 616 (1988) to the extent that it is inconsistent with subdivision (f).] See Lewis v. Sch. Dist. of Philadelphia, 690 A.2d 814, 816 (Pa. Cmwlth. 1997).

[Subdivision (h) (Further proceedings in lower court)—See note to Rule 1701(a) (effect of appeal generally).]

Subparagraph (g)(1)(iv)—Subparagraph (g)(1)(iv), added in 2015, addresses waiver in the context of appeals from various classes of arbitration orders. All six types of arbitration orders identified in 42 Pa.C.S. § 7320(a) are immediately appealable as of right. Differing principles govern these orders, some of which are interlocutory and some of which are final. The differences affect whether an order is appealable under this rule or Pa.R.A.P. 341(b) and whether an immediate appeal is necessary to avoid waiver of objections to the order.

- Section 7320(a)(1)—An interlocutory order refusing to compel arbitration under 42 Pa.C.S. § 7320(a)(1) is immediately appealable pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 311(a)(8). Failure to appeal the interlocutory order immediately waives all objections to it. See Pa.R.A.P. 311(g)(1)(iv). This supersedes the holding in Cooke v. Equitable Life Assurance Soc'y, 723 A.2d 723, 726 (Pa. Super. 1999). Pa.R.A.P. 311(a)(8) and former Pa.R.A.P. 311(g)(1)(i) require a finding of waiver based on failure to appeal the denial order when entered).
- Section 7320(a)(2)—Failure to appeal an interlocutory order granting an application to stay arbitration under 42 Pa.C.S. § 7304(b) does not waive the right to contest the stay; an aggrieved party may appeal such an order immediately under Pa.R.A.P. 311(a)(8) or challenge the order on appeal from the final judgment.
- Section 7320(a)(3)—(a)(6)—If an order is appealable under 42 Pa.C.S. § 7320(a)(3), (4), (5), or (6) because it is final, that is, the order disposes of all claims and of all parties, see Pa.R.A.P. 341(b), failure to appeal immediately waives all issues. If the order does not dispose of all claims or of all parties, then the order is interlocutory. An aggrieved party may appeal such an order immediately under Pa.R.A.P. 311(a)(8) or challenge the order on appeal from the final judgment.

Paragraph (h)—See note to Pa.R.A.P. 1701(a).

FINAL ORDERS

Rule 341. Final Orders; Generally.

(a) General Rule.—Except as prescribed in [subdivision (d),] paragraphs (d) and (e) of this rule, an appeal may be taken as of right from any final order of [an administrative agency or lower] a government unit or trial court.

- (b) Definition of Final Order.—A final order is any order that:
 - (1) disposes of all claims and of all parties; or
- (2) [is expressly defined as a final order by statute; or] (Rescinded).
- (3) is entered as a final order pursuant to [subsection] paragraph (c) of this rule.
- (c) Determination of finality.—When more than one claim for relief is presented in an action, whether as a claim, counterclaim, cross-claim, or third-party claim or when multiple parties are involved, the trial court or other [governmental] government unit may enter a final order as to one or more but fewer than all of the claims and parties only upon an express determination that an immediate appeal would facilitate resolution of the entire case. Such an order becomes appealable when entered. In the absence of such a determination and entry of a final order, any order or other form of decision that adjudicates fewer than all the claims and parties shall not constitute a final order. In addition, the following conditions shall apply:
- (1) The trial court or other [governmental] government unit is required to act on an application for a determination of finality under [subdivision] paragraph (c) within 30 days of entry of the order. During the time an application for a determination of finality is pending the action is stayed.
- (2) A notice of appeal may be filed within 30 days after entry of an order as amended unless a shorter time period is provided in **[Rule] Pa.R.A.P.** 903(c). Any denial of such an application shall be reviewable only for abuse of discretion pursuant to Chapter 15.
- (3) Unless the trial court or other [governmental] government unit acts on the application within 30 days of entry of the order, the trial court or other [governmental] government unit shall no longer consider the application and it shall be deemed denied.
- (4) The time for filing a petition for review will begin to run from the date of entry of the order denying the application for a determination of finality or, if the application is deemed denied, from the 31st day. A petition for review may be filed within 30 days of the entry of the order denying the application or within 30 days of the deemed denial unless a shorter time period is provided by [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 1512(b).
- (d) Superior Court and Commonwealth Court Orders.— Except as prescribed by [Rule 1101 (appeals as of right from the Commonwealth Court)] Pa.R.A.P. 1101 no appeal may be taken as of right from any final order of the Superior Court or of the Commonwealth Court.
- (e) Criminal Orders.—An appeal may be taken by the Commonwealth from any final order in a criminal matter only in the circumstances provided by law.

Official Note: Related Constitutional and Statutory Provisions—Section 9 of Article V of the Constitution of Pennsylvania provides that "there shall be a right of appeal from a court of record or from an administrative agency to a court of record or to an appellate court." [The term "administrative agency" is not defined in Rule 102 of these rules and as used in this rule is intended to have the same meaning as the term "administrative agency" in Section 9 of Article V of

the Constitution of Pennsylvania.] The constitutional provision is implemented by 2 Pa.C.S. § 702 [(appeals)], 2 Pa.C.S. § 752 [(appeals)], and 42 Pa.C.S. § 5105 [(right to appellate review)].

Criminal Law Proceedings—Commonwealth Appeals—Orders formerly appealable under [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 341 by the Commonwealth in criminal cases as heretofore provided by law, but which do not dispose of the entire case, are now appealable as interlocutory appeals as of right under [Subdivision (d) of Rule] paragraph (d) of Pa.R.A.P. 311.

Final Orders—Pre- and Post-1992 Practice—The 1992 amendment generally eliminates appeals as of right under [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 341 from orders not ending the litigation as to all claims and as to all parties. Formerly, there was case law that orders not ending the litigation as to all claims and all parties are final orders if such orders have the practical consequence of putting a litigant out of court.

A party needs to file only a single notice of appeal to secure review of prior non-final orders that are made final by the entry of a final order, see K.H. v. J.R., [573 Pa. 481, 493-94,] 826 A.2d 863, 870-71 (Pa. 2003) (following trial); Betz v. Pneumo Abex LLC, [_Pa.__,] 44 A.3d 27, 54 (Pa. 2012) (summary judgment). Where, however, one or more orders resolves issues arising on more than one docket or relating to more than one judgment, separate notices of appeal must be filed. Commonwealth v. C.M.K., 932 A.2d 111, 113 & n.3 (Pa. Super. 2007) (quashing appeal taken by single notice of appeal from order on remand for consideration under Pa.R.Crim.P. 607 of two persons' judgments of sentence).

The 1997 amendments to [subdivisions] paragraphs (a) and (c), substituting the conjunction "and" for "or," are not substantive. The amendments merely clarify that by definition any order which disposes of all claims will dispose of all parties and any order that disposes of all parties will dispose of all claims.

[Final Orders in Declaratory Judgment Matters-In an action taken pursuant to the Declaratory Judgments Act, 42 Pa.C.S. §§ 7531-7541, orders based on a pre-trial motion or petition are considered "final" within the meaning of this Rule, under subdivision (b)(2), if they affirmatively or negatively declare the rights and duties of the parties. Nationwide Mut. Ins. Co. v. Wickett, 563 Pa. 595, 604, 763 A.2d 813, 818 (2000). Thus, an order in a declaratory judgment action sustaining a demurrer and dismissing some, but not all, defendants is considered a final order under subdivision (b)(2) because it is expressly defined as such by statute. Importantly, however, when a court enters an order in a declaratory judgment action that overrules preliminary objections in the nature of a demurrer, the order is not "final" under subdivision (b)(2), because such order merely allows the case to go forward without declaring the rights and duties of the parties. Safe Harbor Water Power Corp. v. Fajt, 583 Pa. 234, 876 A.2d 954 (2005).

In order to preserve issues for appeal after a trial in a declaratory judgment action, an aggrieved party must file post-trial motions as required by Pa.R.C.P. No. 227.1. *Motorists Mutual v. Pinkerton*, 574 Pa. 333, 830 A.2d 958 (2003); *Chalkey v. Roush*, 569 Pa. 462, 805 A.2d 491 (2002).

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Orders Appealable Under Other Rules—Orders which are separable from and collateral to the main cause of action where the right involved is too important to be denied review, and the question presented is such that if review is postponed until final judgment in the case, the claim will be irreparably lost, previously appealable as final orders under Rule 341, are now appealable under Rule 313. See Pugar v. Greco, 483 Pa. 68, 73, 394 A.2d 542, 545 (1978) (quoting Cohen v. Beneficial Industrial Loan Corp., 337 U.S. 541 (1949)).

The following is a partial list of orders that are no longer appealable as final orders pursuant to Rule 341 but which, in an appropriate case, might fall under Rules 312 (Interlocutory Appeals by Permission) or 313 (Collateral Orders) of this Chapter.

- (1) a decision transferring an equity action to the law side;
- (2) an order denying a defendant leave to amend his answer to plead an affirmative defense;
- (3) a pre-trial order refusing to permit a defendant to introduce evidence of an affirmative defense:
- (4) an order denying a party the right to intervene:
- (5) an order denying a petition to amend a complaint;
 - (6) an order requiring the withdrawal of counsel;
- (7) an order denying class certification in a class action case; and
 - (8) an order striking a lis pendens.

The dismissal of preliminary objections to a petition for appointment of a board of viewers and the dismissal of preliminary objections to a declaration of taking, formerly appealable as final orders under Rule 341, are now appealable as interlocutory appeals as of right under Rule 311.]

Rescission of subparagraph (b)(2)—The 2015 rescission of subparagraph (b)(2) eliminated a potential waiver trap created by legislative use of the adjective "final" to describe orders that were procedurally interlocutory but nonetheless designated as appealable as of right. Failure to appeal immediately an interlocutory order deemed final by statute waived the right to challenge the order on appeal from the final judgment. Rescinding subparagraph (b)(2) eliminated this potential waiver of the right to appeal. If an order designated as appealable by a statute disposes of all claims and of all parties, it is appealable as a final order pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 341. If the order does not meet that standard, then it is interlocutory regardless of the statutory description. Pa.R.A.P. 311(a)(8) provides for appeal as of right from an order that is made final or appealable by statute or general rule, even though the order does not dispose of all claims or of all parties and, thus, is interlocutory; Pa.R.A.P. 311(g) addresses waiver if no appeal is taken immediately from such interlocutory order.

One of the further effects of the rescission of subparagraph (b)(2) is to change the basis for appealability of orders that do not end the case but grant or deny a declaratory judgment. See Nationwide Mut. Ins. Co. v. Wickett, 763 A.2d 813, 818 (Pa. 2000); Pa. Bankers Ass'n v. Pa. Dep't. of Banking, 948 A.2d 790, 798 (Pa. 2008). The effect of the

rescission is to eliminate waiver for failure to take an immediate appeal from such an order. A party aggrieved by an interlocutory order granting or denying a declaratory judgment, where the order satisfies the criteria for "finality" under *Pennsylvania Bankers Association*, may elect to proceed under Pa.R.A.P 311(a)(8) or wait until the end of the case and proceed under subparagraph (b)(1) of this rule.

An arbitration order appealable under 42 Pa.C.S. § 7320(a) may be interlocutory or final. If it disposes of all claims and all parties, it is final and, thus, appealable pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 341. If the order does not dispose of all claims and all parties, that is, the order is not final, but rather interlocutory, it is appealable pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 311. Failure to appeal an interlocutory order appealable as of right may result in waiver of objections to the order. See Pa.R.A.P. 311(g).

[Subdivision] Paragraph (c)—Determination of Finality—[Subdivision] Paragraph (c) permits an immediate appeal from an order dismissing less than all claims or parties from a case only upon an express determination that an immediate appeal would facilitate resolution of the entire case. Factors to be considered under [Subdivision] paragraph (c) include, but are not limited to:

- (1) whether there is a significant relationship between adjudicated and unadjudicated claims;
- (2) whether there is a possibility that an appeal would be mooted by further developments;
- (3) whether there is a possibility that the court or **[administrative agency] government unit** will consider issues a second time; **and**
- (4) whether an immediate appeal will enhance prospects of settlement.

The failure of a party to apply to the [administrative agency or lower] government unit or trial court for a determination of finality pursuant to [subdivision (c),] paragraph (c) shall not constitute a waiver and the matter may be raised in a subsequent appeal following the entry of a final order disposing of all claims and all parties.

Where the [administrative agency or lower] government unit or trial court refuses to amend its order to include the express determination that an immediate appeal would facilitate resolution of the entire case and refuses to enter a final order, a petition for review under Chapter 15 of the unappealable order of denial is the exclusive mode of review to determine whether the case is so egregious as to justify prerogative appellate correction of the exercise of discretion by the lower tribunal. See, e.g., Pa.R.A.P. 1311, Official Note. The filing of such a petition for review does not prevent the [lower Court] trial court or other government unit from proceeding further with the matter[,] pursuant to Pa.R.A.P. 1701(b)(6). Of course, as in any case, the appellant could apply for a discretionary stay of the proceeding below.

[Subsection] Subparagraph (c)(2) provides for a stay of the action pending determination of an application for a determination of finality. If a petition for review is filed challenging denial, a stay or *supersedeas* will issue only as provided under Chapter 17 of these [Rules] rules.

In the event that a trial court or other [governmental] government unit enters a final order pursuant to [subdivision] paragraph (c) of this rule, the trial court or other [governmental] government unit may no longer proceed further in the matter, except as provided in Pa.R.A.P. 1701(b)(1)—(5).

The following is a partial list of orders previously interpreted by the courts as appealable as final orders under [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 341 that are no longer appealable as of right unless the trial court or [administrative agency] government unit makes an express determination that an immediate appeal would facilitate resolution of the entire case and expressly enters a final order pursuant to [Rule] Pa.R.A.P. 341(c):

- (1) an order dismissing one of several causes of action pleaded in a complaint but leaving pending other causes of action;
- (2) an order dismissing a complaint but leaving pending a counterclaim;
- (3) an order dismissing a counterclaim but leaving pending the complaint [which] that initiated the action;
- (4) an order dismissing an action as to less than all plaintiffs or as to less than all defendants but leaving pending the action as to other plaintiffs and other defendants; [and]
- (5) an order granting judgment against one defendant but leaving pending the complaint against other defendants; and
- 6) an order dismissing a complaint to join an additional defendant or denying a petition to join an additional defendant or denying a petition for late joinder of an additional defendant.

The 1997 amendment adding [subdivision (c)(3) provides] subparagraph (c)(3) provided for a deemed denial where the trial court or other [governmental] government unit fails to act on the application within 30 days.

ARTICLE II. APPELLATE PROCEDURE CHAPTER 9. APPEALS FROM LOWER COURTS Rule 904. Content of the Notice of Appeal.

* * * * *

- (b) *Caption*.—The parties shall be stated in the caption as they stood upon the record of the **[lower] trial** court at the time the appeal was taken.
- (c) Request for transcript.—The request for transcript contemplated by [Rule 1911 (request for transcript)] Pa.R.A.P. 1911 or a statement signed by counsel that either there is [either] no verbatim record of the proceedings or the complete transcript has been lodged of record[,] shall accompany the notice of appeal, but the absence of or defect in the request for transcript shall not affect the validity of the appeal.
- (d) *Docket entry*.—The notice of appeal shall include a statement that the order appealed from has been entered **[in] on** the docket. A copy of the docket entry showing the entry of the order appealed from shall be attached to the notice of appeal.
- (e) Content in criminal cases.—When the Commonwealth takes an appeal pursuant to [Rule] Pa.R.A.P.

- 311(d), the notice of appeal shall include a certification by counsel that the order will terminate or substantially handicap the prosecution.
- (f) Content in children's fast track appeals.—In a children's fast track appeal the notice of appeal shall include a statement advising the appellate court that the appeal is a children's fast track appeal.

Official Note: The Offense Tracking Number (OTN) is required only in an appeal in a criminal proceeding. It enables the Administrative Office of the Pennsylvania Courts to collect and forward to the Pennsylvania State Police information pertaining to the disposition of all criminal cases as provided by the Criminal History Record Information Act, 18 Pa.C.S. § 9101, et seq.

The 1986 amendment requires that the I The notice of appeal must include a statement that the order appealed from has been entered [in] on the docket. [The 1986 amendment deletes the requirement that the I The appellant does not need to certify that the order has been reduced to judgment. This omission does not eliminate the requirement of reducing an order to judgment before there is a final appealable order where required by applicable practice or case law.

[The 1997 amendment changes the word "order" to "request" in order to eliminate any unintended implication that a court order is required. No court order is required to obtain a transcript of the proceedings. See Pa.R.J.A. 5000.5 and the 1997 amendment to subdivision (a) of Rule 1911.]

With respect to [subdivision] paragraph (e), in Commonwealth v. Dugger, [506 Pa. 537,] 486 A.2d 382, 386 (Pa. 1985), the Supreme Court held that the Commonwealth's certification that an order will terminate or substantially handicap the prosecution is not subject to review as a prerequisite to the Superior Court's review of the merits of the appeal. The principle in *Dugger* has been incorporated in and superseded by Pa.R.A.P. 311(d). Commonwealth v. Dixon, 907 A.2d 468, 471 n.8 (Pa. 2006). Thus, the need for a detailed analysis of the effect of the order, formerly necessarily a part of the Commonwealth's appellate brief, [was] has been eliminated. [See also Commonwealth v. Deans, 530 Pa. 514, 610 A.2d 32 (1992); Commonwealth v. Cohen, 529 Pa. 552, 605 A.2d 1212 (1992) (allowing appeals by the Commonwealth from adverse rulings on motions in limine). Accordingly, the 1997 amendment added subdivision (e) as a requirement when the Commonwealth takes an appeal pursuant to Rule

A party filing a [cross appeal] cross-appeal should identify it as a [cross appeal] cross-appeal in the notice of appeal to assure that the prothonotary will process the [cross appeal] cross-appeal with the initial appeal. See also [Rules] Pa.R.A.P. 2113, 2136, and 2185 regarding briefs in [cross appeals and Rule] cross-appeals and Pa.R.A.P. 2322 regarding oral argument in multiple appeals.

Title 25—ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

SUSQUEHANNA RIVER BASIN COMMISSION [25 PA. CODE CH. 806] Review and Approval of Projects

Summary: This document contains final rules that would amend the regulations of the Susquehanna River Basin Commission (Commission) to simplify and clarify the process for transferring approvals and to add sections dealing with general permits and modifications to approvals. These amendments are to be made effective upon publication of this rulemaking.

Supplementary Information: Notice of proposed rule-making was published in the Federal Register on September 21, 2015 (80 FR 56936); the New York Register on October 7, 2015; the Maryland Register on October 16, 2015; and the Pennsylvania Bulletin on October 17, 2015. The Commission convened a public hearing on October 29, 2015, in Grantville, Pennsylvania and a written comment period was held open through November 9, 2015.

General Comments

Comment: The rule will simplify the approval process for certain modifications and will be less burdensome on permittees and the Commission while still protecting the Susquehanna River Basin resources.

Comment: The proposed rule will assist in streamlining the administrative and permitting process and are positive changes.

Comment: The proposed rule should serve to provide great potential improvements for both the Commission and the regulated community.

Response: The Commission appreciates the comments.

Comments by Section, Part 806

Section 806.6—Transfer of approvals.

Comment: We appreciate § 806.6(b) addressing previously unpermitted withdrawals and uses of water, which should address actions that affect local water resources.

Response: The Commission appreciates the comment. This section is largely unchanged from the prior regulatory text.

Comment: The Commission should require approvals being transferred that are greater than 10 years old to perform a new or updated aquatic resource survey (ARS).

Response: The Commission disagrees with the comment. The transfer rule does not allow new project sponsors to increase the withdrawal or consumptive use of the project above what was previously approved. The

Commission will be able to require an ARS, if appropriate and necessary, when these approvals expire and need to be renewed pursuant to 18 CFR 806.14.

Comment: The proposed rule will allow approvals where there is a change in ownership but no change in the project or the use of water to occur without the submittal of an entirely new application, and the Commission is to be commended for proposing this change.

Response: The Commission appreciates the comment. Section 806.14—Contents of application.

Comment: The Commission proposed to add § 806.14(d) to set forth the application requirements for minor modifications. Section 806.14(a) should be correspondingly revised to include an exception for applications for minor modifications.

Response: The Commission agrees and will add the phrase "applications for minor modifications" in the first sentence of § 806.14(a) to clarify that the requirements of that paragraph do not apply to applications for minor modifications.

Section 806.15—Notice of application.

Comment: The next to last sentence of § 806.15(a) appears to contain grammatically incorrect language (which appears in the existing regulatory text). This should be corrected.

Response: The Commission agrees with the comment. The next to last sentence will be corrected to delete the word "for" and place two commas to make the sentence grammatically correct.

Comment: The intent of proposed rulemaking is that new paragraph (i) is meant to be the exclusive source of notice requirements for minor modification; however, no changes were proposed to paragraph (a) that make it clear that paragraph (a) does not apply to minor modifications. Paragraph (a) should be clarified.

Response: The Commission agrees with the comment and also finds it applicable to new paragraph (h). In the final rule, paragraph (a) will now begin with "Except with respect to paragraphs (h) and (i), . . .".

Comment: The extension of time allotted for notices to be published from 10 to 20 days allows ample time for all interested parties and the public to comment.

Response: The Commission appreciates with the comment.

806.17—General permits.

Comment: Section 806.17(d)(3) provides that a Notice of Intent (NOI) must be denied if the project does not meet the requirements of § 806.21(a) or (b). However, § 806.21(b) does not provide any requirements, but rather gives the Commission discretion to modify or deny a project if the Commission determines that the project is not in the best interest of the conversation, development, management or control of the basin's water resources or is in conflict with the Comprehensive Plan. The reference to § 806.21(b) should be removed or the standard placed verbatim into § 806.17(d)(3).

Response: The Commission does not agree with the proposed revisions of the commenter. However, the Commission agrees that the paragraph could be clarified in light of the comment. As a part of the final rule, the

Commission will revise paragraph (d)(3) to read as set out in the regulatory text at the end of this document.

Comment: The Commission does not define "minimal adverse impacts" in § 806.17(a)(4).

Comment: The Commission should tier a determination of minimal adverse impacts, looking at the existing standards in 18 CFR 806.23 or adopting a "significance" inquiry as provided in the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA).

Comment: The Commission should add a paragraph that provides that it shall not issue a general permit that creates or incites significant direct, indirect or cumulative impacts to water resources.

Response: The Commission agrees that § 806.17(a)(4) would be strengthened by a reference to the Commission's existing regulatory review standards. These standards are known and defined with respect to Commission reviews of consumptive uses, withdrawals and diversions. Conversely, the Commission does not agree that the inquiries under NEPA would provide clarity in a substantive review in establishing a general permit. In addition, adopting a new set of standards for general permits would add complexity and confusion to the process that is avoided by referencing the Commission's existing review standards. The Commission will revise the final rule so that § 806.17(a)(4) reads as set out in the regulatory text at the end of this document.

Comment: The proposed regulations seem to presume NOI issuance.

Response: The Commission disagrees with the comment. Part of the proposed rule includes \$ 806.17(d) entitled, "Denial of Coverage."

Comment: Public notice under the general permit procedure is inadequate. Specifically, the public is not afforded notice via the Federal Register of receipt of an NOI.

Response: The Commission agrees that the procedures do not set forth any requirement that the Commission publish receipt of NOIs. Accordingly, the Commission will amend the final rule to include a new paragraph (c)(9) to read as set out in the regulatory text at the end of this document.

Comment: Section 806.17(b)(3) should be revised to require the Commission to take into account the level of public interest and likelihood for controversy for any proposed general permit in determining whether to hold a public hearing.

Response: The Commission agrees with the comment. The Commission will amend § 806.17(b)(3) to read as set out in the regulatory text at the end of this document.

Comment: Section 806.17(c)(4) should be amended to provide for full Commission review and approval of general permits.

Response: No such revision is necessary. Section 806.17(b)(4) currently provides that the Commission will adopt and issue general permits. Paragraph (c)(4) provides that the approval of coverage under a general permit, shall be determined by the Executive Director unless the Commission establishes a different mechanism for approval when issuing the general permit. This process is similar to the existing process for approving projects under the Commission's Approvals By Rule in 18

CFR 806.22(e)(7) and (f)(10), where the Executive Director issues the approvals to project sponsors.

Comment: Section 806.17(c)(8) should be amended to require the project to conduct an aquatic resource survey (ARS) before any General Permit is renewed or amended.

Response: The Commission disagrees with the comment. The Commission currently requires projects to conduct an ARS on a case-by-case basis for individual applications for surface water withdrawals. The Commission does not believe that it would be appropriate to require ARSs to be conducted as a rule for every general permit NOI holder for renewal or amendment. The general permit procedures as proposed, however, are sufficiently broad to allow the Commission, as a part of the scope or application of a general permit developed by the Commission, to require an ARS from NOI applicants, if the Commission finds it appropriate for the type of activity being permitted.

Comment: The Commission is urged to specifically mandate adequate fees for general permit applications.

Response: The Commission appreciates the comment. The proposed rule provides that the Commission may set a fee for NOIs to any general permit. This allows the Commission to set a specific fee for NOIs under each particular general permit and tailor the fees to what is required of the NOI applicants and the Commission for each activity permitted.

806.18—Approval modifications.

Comment: Section 806.18(c)(8) should be revised to be grammatically consistent with paragraphs (c)(1) through (7).

Response: The Commission agrees with the comment. Paragraph (c)(8) is revised to read as set out in the regulatory text at the end of this document.

Comment: The word "flows" in § 806.18(d)(4) should be revised to "flow."

Response: The Commission agrees with the comment and has made this revision to the final rule.

Comment: Aside from the correction of typographical errors, every suggested minor modification category includes changes in permit terms that can result in significant adverse impacts to local water resources and should not be allowed as minor modifications.

Response: The Commission disagrees with the comment. In developing the list of minor modifications, the Commission examined the range of modification requests that it receives and carefully vetted those categories and developed them specifically because they do not pose significant adverse impacts to local water resources. Review of these types of modifications is largely administrative in nature and poses little to no risk to human health, safety or the environment.

Transition Issues

As a part of the Resolution adopting this final rule, the Commission also has set a reduced fee for applications for minor modifications at \$750. Future adjustments may be made to this application fee during the regular annual adjustments to the Commission fee schedule.

Accordingly, for the reasons set forth in the preamble, the Susquehanna River Basin Commission amends 18 CFR part 806 as follows:

PART 806—REVIEW AND APPROVAL OF PROJECTS

1. The authority citation for part 806 continues to read as follows:

Authority: Secs. 3.4, 3.5(5), 3.8, 3.10, and 15.2, Pub. L. 91-575, 84 Stat. 1509 et seq.

Subpart A—General Provisions

2. Amend § 806.4 by adding paragraph (a)(9) and revising paragraph (c) to read as follows:

§ 806.4 Projects requiring review and approval.

- (a) * * *
- (9) Any project subject to coverage under a general permit issued under § 806.17.

* * * * *

- (c) Any project that did not require Commission approval prior to January 1, 2007, and not otherwise exempt from the requirements of paragraph (a)(1)(iv), (a)(2)(v), or (a)(3)(iv) of this section, pursuant to paragraph (b) of this section, may be undertaken by a new project sponsor upon a change of ownership pending action on a transfer application under § 806.6.
 - 3. Revise § 806.6 to read as follows:

§ 806.6 Transfer of approvals.

- (a) An existing Commission approval may be transferred to a new project sponsor by the Executive Director provided:
- (1) The application for transfer is submitted within 90 days of a transfer or change in ownership of a project.
- (2) The new project sponsor operates the project subject to the same terms and conditions of the existing approval pending approval of the transfer application.
- (3) Any noncompliance by the existing project sponsor associated with the project or by the new project sponsor associated with other projects is resolved to the Commission's satisfaction.
- (4) If the existing approval is greater than 10 years old, the transfer shall be conditioned to require the submission of an updated metering and monitoring plan consistent with the requirements of § 806.30.
- (5) If the existing project has an unapproved withdrawal, consumptive use and/or diversion listed in paragraph (b) of this section, the transfer shall be conditioned to require the submission of a new application for review and approval of the unapproved withdrawal, consumptive use and/or diversion consistent with §§ 806.4 and 806.14.
- (6) Any modifications proposed by the new project sponsor shall be subject to a separate application and review process under §§ 806.14 and 806.18.
- (b) Previously unapproved activities associated with a project subject to transfer under paragraph (a) of this section include:
- (1) The project has an associated pre-compact consumptive water use that has not been subject to approval or had mitigation approved by the Commission.

- (2) The project has an associated diversion that was initiated prior to January 23, 1971.
- (3) The project has an associated groundwater withdrawal that was initiated prior to July 13, 1978, and that has not been approved by the Commission.
- (4) The project has an associated surface water withdrawal that was initiated prior to November 11, 1995, and that has not been approved by the Commission.
- (5) The project has a consumptive water use approval and has an associated withdrawal that has not been approved by the Commission.
- (c) Upon undergoing a change of name that does not affect ownership or control of the project, the project sponsor must request a reissuance of the project's approval by the Executive Director within 90 days from the date of the change.

Subpart B—Application Procedure

4. Amend § 806.14 by revising paragraph (a) introductory text and adding paragraph (d) to read as follows:

§ 806.14 Contents of applications.

(a) Except with respect to applications to renew an existing Commission approval, applications for minor modifications, and Notices of Intent for approvals by rule and general permits, applications shall include, but not be limited to, the following information and, where applicable, shall be submitted on forms and in the manner prescribed by the Commission. Renewal applications shall include such information that the Commission determines to be necessary for the review of same, shall be subject to the standards set forth in subpart C of this part, and shall likewise be submitted on forms and in the manner prescribed by the Commission.

* * * * *

- (d) Applications for minor modifications must be complete and will be on a form and in a manner prescribed by the Commission. Applications for minor modifications must contain the following:
 - (1) Description of the project;
- (2) Description of all sources, consumptive uses and diversions related to the project;
 - (3) Description of the requested modification;
- (4) Statement of the need for the requested modification:
- (5) Demonstration that the anticipated impact of the requested modification will not adversely impact the water resources of the basin; and
- (6) Any other information that the Commission or Executive Director deems necessary.
- 5. Amend \$ 806.15 by revising paragraph (a) and adding paragraphs (h) and (i) to read as follows:

§ 806.15 Notice of application.

(a) Except with respect to paragraphs (h) and (i) of this section, any project sponsor submitting an application to the Commission shall provide notice thereof to the appropriate agency of the member State, each municipality in which the project is located, and the county planning agency of each county in which the project is located. The project sponsor shall also publish notice of submission of the application at least once in a newspaper of general circulation serving the area in which the project is located. The project sponsor shall also meet any of the notice requirements set forth in paragraphs (b) through

(f) of this section, if applicable. All notices required under this section shall be provided or published no later than 20 days after submission of the application to the Commission and shall contain a description of the project, its purpose, the requested quantity of water to be withdrawn, obtained from sources other than withdrawals, or consumptively used, and the address, electronic mail address, and phone number of the project sponsor and the Commission. All such notices shall be in a form and manner as prescribed by the Commission.

* * * * *

- (h) For Notices of Intent (NOI) seeking coverage under a general permit, the project sponsor shall provide the NOI to the appropriate agency of the member State and each municipality and county planning agency in which the project is located and any additional notice identified in the general permit.
- (i) For applications for minor modifications, the project sponsor shall provide notice of the application to the appropriate agency of the member State and each municipality and county planning agency in which the project is located.
 - 6. Add § 806.17 to read as follows:

§ 806.17 General permits.

- (a) Coverage and purpose. The Commission may issue a general permit, in lieu of issuing individual approvals, for a specifically described category of diversions, water withdrawals and consumptive uses that:
- (1) Involve the same or substantially similar types of operations or activities;
- (2) Require the same limitations or operating conditions, or both;
- (3) Require the same or similar monitoring and reporting; and
- (4) Will result in minimal adverse impacts consistent with §§ 806.21 through 806.24.
- (b) Procedure for issuance. (1) At least 30 days prior to the issuance of a general permit, the Commission shall publish notice in the Federal Register and the member jurisdiction administrative bulletins of the intent to issue a general permit.
- (2) At least 30 days shall be provided for interested members of the public and Federal, State and local agencies to provide written comments on a proposed general permit.
- (3) The Commission or Executive Director may, in its discretion, hold a public hearing on a proposed general permit, taking into account the level of public interest and likelihood of controversy.
- (4) The issuance of a general permit adopted by the Commission will be published in the *Federal Register* and the member jurisdiction administrative bulletins. This notice shall set forth the effective date of the general permit.
- (c) Administration of general permits. General permits may be issued, amended, suspended, revoked, reissued or terminated under this section.
- (1) Any general permit issued under this section shall set forth the applicability of the permit and the conditions that apply to any diversion, withdrawal or consumptive use authorized by such general permit.
- (2) The Commission may fix a term to any general permit issued.

- (3) A project sponsor shall obtain permission to divert, withdraw or consumptively use water in accordance with a general permit by filing a Notice of Intent (NOI) with the Commission, in a form and manner determined by the Commission.
- (4) Approval of coverage under a general permit shall be determined by the Executive Director or by any other manner that the Commission shall establish for any general permit.
- (5) The Commission may set a fee for NOIs to any general permit.
- (6) A project sponsor shall provide notice for NOIs in accordance with \S 806.15(h) and any additional notice requirements that the Commission may adopt for any general permit.
- (7) The requirements of § 806.16 apply to the review of NOIs to any general permit.
- (8) Upon reissuance or amendment of a general permit, all project sponsors permitted to divert, withdraw or consumptively use water in accordance with the previous general permit shall be permitted to continue to operate with the renewed or modified general permit unless otherwise notified by the Commission.
- (9) Notice of receipt of NOIs shall be published on the Commission's website and in any other manner that the Commission shall establish for any general permit.
- (d) *Denial of coverage*. The Executive Director will deny or revoke coverage under a general permit when one or more of the following conditions exist:
- (1) The project or project sponsor does not or can no longer meet the criteria for coverage under a general permit.
- (2) The diversion, withdrawal or consumptive use, individually or in combination with other similar Commission regulated activities, is causing or has the potential to cause adverse impacts to water resources or competing water users.
- (3) The project does not comport with § 806.21(a) or (b).
- (4) The project includes other diversions, withdrawals or consumptive uses that require an individual approval and the issuance of both an individual approval and a general permit for the project would constitute an undue administrative burden on the Commission.
- (5) The Executive Director determines that a project cannot be effectively regulated under a general permit and is more effectively regulated under an individual approval.
- (e) Requiring an individual approval. If coverage is denied or revoked under paragraph (d) of this section, the project sponsor shall be notified in writing. The notice will include a brief statement for the reasons for the decision. If coverage under a general permit was previously granted, the notice will also include a deadline for submission of an application for an individual approval. Timely submission of a complete application will result in continuation of coverage of the applicable withdrawal, consumptive use or diversion under the general permit, until the Commission takes final action on the pending individual approval application.
- (f) Action of the Commission. Action by the Executive Director denying or revoking coverage under a general permit under paragraph (d) of this section, or requiring an individual approval under paragraph (e) of this sec-

tion, is not a final action of the Commission until the project sponsor submits and the Commission takes final action on an individual approval application.

7. Add § 806.18 to read as follows:

§ 806.18 Approval modifications.

- (a) *General*. A project sponsor shall submit an application for modification of a current approval prior to making a change in the design, operational plans, or use as presented in the application upon which the approval was originally issued, and that will affect the terms and conditions of the current approval.
- (b) Applications for modification. A project sponsor may apply for a modification of a current approval by submitting an application for modification to the Commission.
- (c) Minor modifications. The following are minor modifications:
 - (1) Correction of typographical errors;
 - (2) Changes to monitoring or metering conditions;
 - (3) Addition of sources of water for consumptive use;
 - (4) Changes to the authorized water uses;
- (5) Changes to conditions setting a schedule for developing, implementing, and/or reporting on monitoring, data collection and analyses;
 - (6) Changes to the design of intakes;
- (7) Increases to total system limits that were established based on the projected demand of the project; and
- (8) Modifications of extraction well network used for groundwater remediation systems.
- (d) Major modifications. Major modifications are changes not considered to be minor modifications. Major modifications may include, but are not limited to:
- (1) Increases in the quantity of water withdrawals, consumptive uses or diversions;

- (2) Increases to peak day consumptive water use;
- (3) Increases to the instantaneous withdrawal rate or changes from a single withdrawal rate to a varied withdrawal rate;
 - (4) Changes affecting passby flow requirements; and
- (5) Changes that have the potential for adverse impacts to water resources or competing water users.
- (e) Notice and approval. (1) Applications for modifications are subject to the notice requirements of § 806.15.
- (2) The Commission or Executive Director may approve, approve with conditions or deny an application for minor modification, or direct that an application for major modification be made.
- (3) The Commission may approve, approve with conditions or deny an application for major modification.





Section 11.2(c) of the Manufactured Home Community Rights Act (act) (68 P. S. § 398.11.2(c)) requires that the Department of Community and Economic Development annually adjust relocation fees that may be owed to manufactured home owners in the event that the community closes. The fees are adjusted based on an increase on the Consumer Price Index.

The base amount of this fee in effect for calendar year 2013 was \$4,000 for single section manufactured homes and \$6,000 for multisection manufactured homes. The Consumer Price Index Inflation Calculator as provided by the United States Department of Labor adjusts the fees for calendar year 2016 as follows:

- \$4,075.19 for single section manufactured homes
- \$6,112.78 for multisection manufactured homes

MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed NPDES permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Effluent Limits for Noncoal Mining Activities

The limits for noncoal mining activities as provided in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 77 are pH 6 to 9 and other parameters the Department may require.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 563-2112-115, Developing National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permits for Mining Activities. Other specific factors to be considered include public comments and Total Maximum Daily Load(s). Additional discharge limitations may apply in the event that unexpected discharges occur.

Comments must include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department may approve or disapprove plans and reports submitted. This notice provides the Department's decision and, if relevant, the basis for disapproval.

Requirement to Submit Emissions Inventory Data for Natural Gas Activities

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) is notifying all owners or operators of companies involved in certain natural gas related activities across this Commonwealth that source reports must be submitted to the Department for air contaminant air emissions from their facilities during the 2015 calendar year.

In accordance with section 4(3) of the Air Pollution Control Act (35 P.S. § 4004(3)) and 25 Pa. Code § 135.3 (relating to reporting), the Department is authorized to collect air quality emissions inventories, including those from owners or operators of facilities engaged in the following: coal bed methane gas compressing, processing and related activities; unconventional natural gas development, production, transmission, processing and related activities; and midstream conventional natural gas compressing, processing and related activities.

The sources and activities that the Department has identified for the source reporting requirements include, but are not limited to, midstream compressor stations, pigging operations, dehydration units, drill rigs, heaters, pneumatic pumps, stationary engines, simple cycle turbines, natural gas-driven pneumatic controllers, pneumatic pumps, fugitive sources, storage vessels/tanks, venting, blowdown systems, well heads and well completions. Fugitive sources include connectors, flanges, pump lines, pump seals and valves. The storage vessels/tanks category includes storage tanks, pressurized vessels, impoundments and central impoundments.

Complete source reports, including emissions data, for the 2015 calendar year must be submitted to the Department no later than March 1, 2016. Subsequent source reports and annual emissions inventories will be due to the Department by March 1 each year for operations during the preceding calendar year. A request for an extension of time for source reporting may be submitted to the Department by a source owner or operator in accordance with 25 Pa. Code § 135.3(c).

The owner or operator of a well site facility or coalbed methane facility must submit Microsoft Excel source reports, including emissions factors and actual calculations, for the 2015 calendar year to the Department no later than March 1, 2016. These spreadsheets must be submitted through the GreenPort. Subsequent source reports and annual emissions inventories will be due to

the Department by March 1 each year for operations during the preceding calendar year.

Midstream facility owners and operators must submit emissions through the Department's AES*Online or AES*XML emission inventory system no later than March 1, 2016. Supporting documents, including emission factors, actual calculations and supplemental spreadsheets, must be attached to the submittal. The owner or operator should use mass balance estimation methods to calculate fugitive emissions. Access to the Greenport may be requested by contacting Robert Bihl, (717) 772-3950, rbihl@pa.gov as soon as possible but no later than 2 weeks prior to accessing the system. Subsequent source reports and annual emissions inventories will be due to the Department by March 1 each year for operations during the preceding calendar year.

Any owner or operator of midstream pipeline pigging stations must submit separate Microsoft Excel spreadsheets to the Department by e-mail for those pigging operations that are not located within 1/4 mile of a compressor station and not included in compressor station submittals. The owner or operator of pigging operations within 1/4 mile of a compressor station must submit data to AES, not by means of spreadsheet. Instructions and spreadsheets are available for downloading on the Bureau of Air Quality's web site.

All source reports and emissions data must be submitted to the Department by a responsible official, as defined in 25 Pa. Code § 121.1 (relating to definitions).

Emission statements required for stationary sources emitting equal to or greater than 50 and 100 tons per year of volatile organic compounds and oxides of nitrogen, respectively, should have already been submitted to the Department as required under 25 Pa. Code § 135.21 (relating to emission statements).

Under section 3(a)(5) of the act (35 P. S. § 10172.3(a)(5)), laboratories that have been approved by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) to access the Combined DNA Index System (CODIS) or an equivalent Federally administered National DNA database are automatically approved to receive sexual assault evidence for testing and analysis.

Approved Prearrest and Evidential Breath Testing Devices

The Department of Health (Department) has statutory authority to approve both prearrest and evidential breath testing devices for use by law enforcement officials to determine the alcohol content of blood by analysis of a person's breath. This notice contains the combined approved lists of prearrest breath testing devices and evidential breath testing devices.

Prearrest Breath Testing Devices

The Department approves prearrest breath testing devices as required by 28 Pa. Code §§ 5.101—5.104 (relating to equipment to determine blood alcohol content under the Vehicle Code and the Fish and Boat Code). Authority to promulgate these regulations is contained in the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. § 1547(k) (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance), the Fish and Boat Code, 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125(k) (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance), the Game and Wildlife Code, 34 Pa.C.S. § 2502(j) (relating to chemical test to determine amount of alcohol) and section 2102(g) of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 532(g)).

Prearrest breath testing devices approved under this authority may be used by police officers, waterways patrolmen and officers enforcing the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code and the Game and Wildlife Code in conducting preliminary determinations of the alcohol content of blood of persons suspected of driving, boating, hunting or furtaking while under the influence of alcohol. Officers and patrolmen use these devices to assist them in determining whether or not a person should be placed under arrest for violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3802 (relating to driving under influence of alcohol or controlled substance), for violation of 30 Pa.C.S. § 5502 (relating to operating watercraft under influence of alcohol or controlled substance), for violation of 34 Pa.C.S. § 2501 (relating to hunting or furtaking prohibited while under influence of alcohol or controlled substance) or for any other criminal offense under the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code or the Game and Wildlife Code which involves operating a vehicle or boat, hunting or furtaking while under the influence of alcohol.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) of the United States Department of Transportation published model specifications for Screening Devices to Measure Alcohol in Bodily Fluids at 59 FR 39382 (August 2, 1994). These specifications established performance criteria and methods for testing alcohol screening devices to measure alcohol content. The NHTSA established these specifications to support state laws and the United States Department of Transportation's workplace alcohol testing program. The Department has elected to use the NHTSA criteria for approving devices for the prearrest testing of a person's breath to determine the alcohol content of the person's blood.

The NHTSA published its first Conforming Products List (CPL) for screening devices at 59 FR 61923 (December 2, 1994), with corrections at 59 FR 65128 (December 16, 1994), identifying the devices that meet the NHTSA's Model Specifications for Screening Devices to Measure Alcohol in Bodily Fluids. Thereafter, the NHTSA updated the CPL at 60 FR 42214 (August 15, 1995), 66 FR 22639 (May 4, 2001), 70 FR 54972 (September 19, 2005), with corrections at 70 FR 72502 (December 5, 2005) and 72 FR 4559 (January 31, 2007).

The NHTSA published revised Model Specifications for Screening Devices to Measure Alcohol in Bodily Fluids at 73 FR 16956 (March 31, 2008). These specifications removed from use interpretive screening devices (ISD) because ISDs did not provide an unambiguous test result. These specifications also removed from use the Breath Alcohol Sample Simulator as it is not necessary for testing breath alcohol screening devices. All other performance criteria and test methods were maintained. The NHTSA published an additional update to the CPL at 74 FR 66398 (December 15, 2009). The current list was published at 77 FR 35745 (June 14, 2012).

On January 9, 2014 the NHTSA indicated that it had approved the ALERT J5 from Countermeasure Systems Corp. as a breath screening device. The Department received confirmation of this addition on July 10, 2015.

Evidential Breath Testing Devices

The Department approves evidential breath testing devices under the authority of the Vehicle Code (75 Pa.C.S. \S 1547(c)(1)), the Fish and Boat Code (30 Pa.C.S. \S 5125(c)(1)) and the Game and Wildlife Code (34 Pa.C.S. \S 2502(c)).

Evidential breath testing devices approved under this notice may be used by law enforcement officials to obtain test results which will be admissible in evidence in any summary or criminal proceeding in which the defendant is charged with a violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3802 or any other violation of the Vehicle Code arising out of the same action or 30 Pa.C.S. § 5502 or any other violation of the Fish and Boat Code arising out of the same action or 34 Pa.C.S. § 2501 or any other violation of the Game and Wildlife Code arising out of the same action.

The NHTSA published the Standards for Devices to Measure Breath Alcohol at 38 FR 30459 (November 5, 1973). A Qualified Products List of Evidential Breath Measurement Devices comprised of instruments that met this standard was first issued at 39 FR 41399 (November 21, 1974).

The NHTSA converted the Standards for Devices to Measure Breath Alcohol to Model Specifications for Evidential Breath Testing Devices (Model Specifications) and published a CPL of instruments that were found to conform to the Model Specifications as Appendix D to that notice at 49 FR 48854 (December 14, 1984). Those instruments are identified in this notice with an asterisk.

The NHTSA published a notice to amend the Model Specifications at 58 FR 48705 (September 17, 1993) and to update the CPL. That notice changed the alcohol concentration levels at which instruments are evaluated for precision and accuracy, from 0.000, 0.050, 0.101 and 0.151 blood alcohol content (BAC), to 0.000, 0.020, 0.040, 0.080 and 0.160 BAC, respectively. It also included a test for the presence of acetone and an expanded definition of alcohol to include other low molecular weight alcohols, for example, methyl or isopropyl. Since that time, the CPL has been annotated to indicate which instruments have been determined to meet the Model Specifications published in 1984 and which have been determined to meet the Model Specifications, as revised and published in 1993. Thereafter, the NHTSA has periodically updated the CPL with those breath instruments found to conform to the Model Specifications.

The Department's list of evidential breath testing devices contains updates to the CPL published at 77 FR 35747 (June 14, 2012) for instruments that conform to the Model Specifications for Evidential Breath Alcohol Measurement Devices at 58 FR 48705 (September 17, 1993).

The NHTSA also evaluates equipment to determine if it must be operated at fixed locations (that is, nonmobile equipment) or can be transported to nonfixed operational sites in the field (that is, mobile equipment). Most equipment on the following list is approved for mobile and nonmobile operation. The instruments on the list not marked with an asterisk meet the specifications for use as prearrest or evidentiary breath testing devices. The instruments on the list marked with an asterisk may be used as evidentiary devices for blood alcohol concentrations at or above 0.050%. These instruments may also be used as prearrest breath testing devices if they are approved for mobile operations. However, these instruments may not be used for making arrests under the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code or the Game and Wildlife Code when blood alcohol concentrations below 0.050% must be determined. Nonmobile devices can only be used as evidentiary testing instruments since they are not portable. Before purchasing breath testing devices, law enforcement officials should consult with the manufacturer of the equipment they intend to purchase to verify that the devices can be used for their intended purposes.

Law enforcement agencies should determine that an approved training program in the use of the equipment is available in accordance with the previously referenced statutes before purchasing any of the devices contained on this list. Law enforcement agencies that plan to utilize a device that does not appear on the following list should contact the manufacturer of the equipment to verify that it has been evaluated by the NHTSA and found to meet the NHTSA's performance requirements. If a device is approved by the NHTSA after the date of this publication, the manufacturer of the device will need to forward documentation of the NHTSA acceptability to Dr. James R. Lute at the following address so that the Department has information sufficient to enable it to include the device in the next revision of this notice in the Pennsylvania Bulletin.

Some of the devices included in this notice are listed under the name of more than one manufacturer due to the fact that the name of the manufacturer has changed or the right to produce a device has been transferred to a

different company. In these instances, the device is listed under the name of every company that was ever associated with the device to allow law enforcement agencies to continue using devices bearing the name of a previous manufacturer.

To facilitate accessibility of information concerning breath alcohol testing devices which are approved for law enforcement purposes in this Commonwealth, the Department will publish revisions of this list of equipment semiannually as notices in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Instructions to this effect are stated on all packaging accompanying the device. Accordingly, the device should not be stored at temperatures above 27°C (80°F). If the device is stored at or below 27°C (80°F) and used at higher temperatures (that is, within a minute), the device meets the Model Specifications and the results persist for 10—15 minutes. The following laboratories are licensed by the Department of Health (Department) under The Clinical Laboratory Act (35 P.S. §§ 2151—2165) or section 353 of the Federal Clinical Laboratories Improvement Amendments of 1988 (42 U.S.C.A. § 263a), or both, and are currently approved by the Department under 28 Pa. Code § 5.50 (relating to approval to provide special analytical services) to perform analyses of blood or serum, or both, for the determination of controlled substances. This approval is based on demonstrated proficiency in periodic tests conducted by the Department's Bureau of Laboratories. These laboratories are also approved and designated for purposes of the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1547 and 3755 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance; and reports by emergency room personnel), the Fish and Boat Code, 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance) and the Game and Wildlife Code, 34 Pa.C.S. § 2502 (relating to chemical test to determine amount of alcohol), as qualified to perform the types of services which will reflect the presence of controlled substances or their biotransformation products in blood or serum, or both.

Depending upon their capability and performance in proficiency surveys, laboratories are approved to perform screening or confirmatory analyses, or both, on blood or serum, or both. Screening analyses provide a presumptive indication that a controlled substance is present. Confirmatory testing is used to substantiate screening results.

Persons seeking forensic blood or serum analysis services, or both, from any of the listed laboratories should determine that the laboratory employs techniques and procedures acceptable for medicolegal purposes. They should also determine that the director of the facility is agreeable to performing analyses for forensic purposes. Persons seeking blood or serum analysis, or both, are responsible for specifying the controlled substances for which testing is being sought. Persons seeking those analyses should first determine the purpose of the analyses, that is, whether they are for medical, legal or other purposes.

The Vehicle Code contains a provision in 75 Pa.C.S. § 1547(c)(3)(ii) that permits test results on blood or urine for alcohol or controlled substances to be introduced into evidence in legal proceedings in this Commonwealth if the laboratory is located in another state and is not licensed and approved by the Department to provide these services. This section states that the test results may be admissible into evidence at summary or criminal proceedings in which the defendant is charged with a violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3802 (relating to driving under influence of alcohol or controlled substance) if the laboratory that performed the test is licensed by the state in which the facility is located and licensed under the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 (Pub. L. No. 100-578, 102 Stat. 2903). A similar provision appears in the Fish and Boat Code at 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125(c)(3)(ii).

The name or location of a laboratory, as well as the personnel and testing procedures, can change. When changes of this type occur, the clinical laboratory permit number does not change. If questions arise about the identity of a laboratory due to a name or location change, the clinical laboratory permit number should be used as the primary identifier. To assist in identifying a laboratory that performed a test, the clinical laboratory permit number of the facility at the time the list was prepared is included in the list of approved laboratories before the name of the laboratory.

The list of approved laboratories will be revised approximately semiannually and published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Questions regarding this list should be directed to Dr. James R. Laboratories Approved to Determine Blood Alcohol Content under The Clinical Laboratory Act, the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code and the Game and Wildlife Code

The following laboratories are licensed by the Department of Health (Department) under The Clinical Laboratory Act (35 P.S. §§ 2151—2165) and are currently approved by the Department under 28 Pa. Code §§ 5.50 and 5.103 (relating to approval to provide special analytical services; and blood tests for blood alcohol content) to perform alcohol analyses of blood, serum or plasma. This approval is based on demonstrated proficiency in periodic tests conducted by the Department's Bureau of Laborato-

ries. These laboratories are also approved and designated under the provisions of the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1547 and 3755 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance; and reports by emergency room personnel), the Fish and Boat Code, 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance) and the Game and Wildlife Code, 34 Pa.C.S. § 2501 (relating to hunting or furtaking prohibited while under influence of alcohol or controlled substance) as qualified to perform the types of specialized services which will reflect the presence of alcohol in blood, serum or plasma.

The Vehicle Code at 75 Pa.C.S. § 1547(c)(3)(ii) also permits test results on blood or urine for alcohol or controlled substances to be introduced into evidence in certain legal proceedings in this Commonwealth if the laboratory is located in another state and is not licensed and approved by the Department to provide forensic blood, serum or plasma analysis services. This section states that the test results will be admissible into evidence at summary or criminal proceedings in which the defendant is charged with a violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3802 (relating to driving under influence of alcohol or controlled substance) or any other violation of the Vehicle Code arising out of the same action if the laboratory that performed the test is licensed to conduct the test by the state in which the facility is located and licensed under the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 (Pub. L. No. 100-578, 102 Stat. 2903). A similar provision appears in the Fish and Boat Code at 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125(c)(3)(ii).

Since procedures for determining the alcohol content of serum and plasma are identical and results obtained from serum or plasma derived from a blood sample are the same, laboratories that demonstrate reliability in the determination of alcohol in serum are approved to analyze both serum and plasma for alcohol content.

Persons seeking forensic blood, serum or plasma analysis services from the following designated laboratories should determine that the laboratory employs techniques and procedures acceptable for forensic purposes and that the director of the facility is agreeable to performing determinations for this purpose.

The name or location of a laboratory, as well as the personnel and testing procedures, can change. When changes of this type occur, the clinical laboratory permit number does not change. If questions arise about the identity of a laboratory due to a name or location change, the clinical laboratory permit number should be used as the primary identifier. To assist in identifying a laboratory that performed a test, the clinical laboratory permit number of the facility at the time the list was prepared is included in the list of approved laboratories above the name of the laboratory.

The Department's blood alcohol and serum and plasma alcohol proficiency testing programs are approved by the United States Department of Health and Human Services in accordance with the requirements in section 353 of the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 (42 U.S.C.A. § 263a), and implementing regulations at 42 CFR 493.901 and 493.937 (relating to approval of proficiency testing programs; and toxicology), which are administered by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. Participation in these programs may therefore be used to demonstrate acceptable performance for approval purposes under both Federal and Commonwealth statutes.

Laboratories Approved to Determine Controlled Substance Content of Urine under The Clinical Laboratory Act, the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code and the Game and Wildlife Code

The following laboratories are licensed by the Department of Health (Department) under The Clinical Laboratory Act (35 P.S. §§ 2151—2165) and are currently approved by the Department under 28 Pa. Code § 5.50 (relating to approval to provide special analytical services) to perform analyses of urine for the determination of controlled substances or their biotransformation products

This approval is based on demonstrated proficiency in periodic tests conducted by the Department's Bureau of Laboratories. These laboratories are also approved and designated for purposes of the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1547 and 3755 (relating to chemical testing to deter-

mine amount of alcohol or controlled substance; and reports by emergency room personnel), the Fish and Boat Code, 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance) and the Game and Wildlife Code, 34 Pa.C.S. § 2502 (relating to chemical test to determine amount of alcohol), as qualified to perform the types of services which will reflect the presence of controlled substances or their biotransformation products in urine.

Depending upon their capability and performance in proficiency surveys, laboratories are approved to perform screening or confirmatory urine drug analysis, or both. Screening analyses provide a presumptive indication that a controlled substance is present. Confirmatory testing is used to substantiate screening results.

Persons seeking forensic urine drug analysis services from any of the listed laboratories should determine that the laboratory employs techniques and procedures acceptable for the purpose. They should also determine that the director of the facility is agreeable to performing analyses for that purpose. Persons seeking the analyses are responsible for specifying the extent to which the presence of a controlled substance is to be verified. That specification should be predicated upon the purpose for which the analysis is being sought.

The Commonwealth's Vehicle Code contains a provision in 75 Pa.C.S. § 1547(c)(3)(ii) that permits test results on blood or urine for alcohol or controlled substances to be introduced into evidence at legal proceedings in this Commonwealth if the laboratory is located in another state and is not licensed and approved by the Department to provide these services. This section states that the test results may be admissible into evidence at summary or criminal proceedings in which the defendant is charged with a violation of 75 Pa.C.S. § 3802 (relating to driving under influence of alcohol or controlled substance) or any other violation of the Vehicle Code arising out of the same action if the laboratory that performed the test is licensed by the state in which the facility is located and licensed under the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 (Pub. L. No. 100-578, 102 Stat. 2903). A similar provision appears in the Fish and Boat Code at 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125(c)(3)(ii).

The name or location of a laboratory, as well as the personnel and testing procedures, can change. When changes of this type occur, the clinical laboratory permit number does not change. If questions arise about the identity of a laboratory due to a name or location change, the clinical laboratory permit number should be used as the primary identifier. To assist in identifying a laboratory that performed a test, the clinical laboratory permit number of the facility at the time the list was prepared is included in the list of approved laboratories above the name of the laboratory.

The list of approved laboratories will be revised approximately semiannually and published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin. Questions regarding this list should be directed to Dr. James R. Laboratories Approved to Perform Blood Lead and/or Erythrocyte Protoporphyrin Determinations under The Clinical Laboratory Act

The following laboratories are licensed in accordance with The Clinical Laboratory Act (35 P. S. §§ 2151—2165) and are currently approved under 28 Pa. Code § 5.50 (relating to approval to provide special analytical services) to perform analyses of blood for lead or erythrocyte protoporphyrin content. This approval is based on demonstrated proficiency in periodic evaluations conducted by the Bureau of Laboratories of the Department of Health (Department).

Lead poisoning is reportable. Approved laboratories that offer blood lead testing services are required to inform the Department of actual or possible incidents of this condition in accordance with 28 Pa. Code § 27.34 (relating to reporting cases of lead poisoning). These regulations specify the following requirements for reporting by clinical laboratories:

- (1) A clinical laboratory shall report all blood lead test results on both venous and capillary specimens for persons under 16 years of age to the Department's Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program, Division of Maternal and Child Health, Bureau of Family Health.
- (2) A clinical laboratory shall report an elevated blood lead level in a person 16 years of age or older to the Department's Division of Environmental Health Epidemiology, Bureau of Epidemiology or to other locations as designated by the Department. An elevated blood lead level is defined by the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH). As of January 26, 2002, NIOSH defines an elevated blood lead level as a venous blood lead level of 25 micrograms per deciliter (µg/dL) or

higher. The Department will publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* any NIOSH update of the definition within 30 days of NIOSH's notification to the Department.

- (3) A clinical laboratory which conducts blood lead tests of 100 or more specimens per month shall submit results electronically in a format specified by the Department.
- (4) A clinical laboratory which conducts blood lead tests of less than 100 blood lead specimens per month shall submit results either electronically or by hard copy in the format specified by the Department.
- (5) A laboratory which performs blood lead tests on blood specimens collected in this Commonwealth shall be licensed as a clinical laboratory and shall be specifically approved by the Department to conduct those tests.
- (6) Blood lead analyses requested for occupational health purposes on blood specimens collected in this Commonwealth shall be performed only by laboratories which are licensed and approved as specified in paragraph (5), and which are also approved by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration of the United States Department of Labor under 29 CFR 1910.1025(j)(2)(iii) (relating to lead).
- (7) A clinical laboratory shall complete a blood lead test within 5 work days of the receipt of the blood specimen and shall submit the case report to the Department by the close of business of the next work day after the day on which the test was performed. The clinical laboratory shall submit a report of lead poisoning using either the hard copy form or electronic transmission format specified by the Department.
- (8) When a clinical laboratory receives a blood specimen without all of the information required for reporting purposes, the clinical laboratory shall test the specimen and shall submit the incomplete report to the Department.

Erythrocyte protoporphyrin determinations may be performed as an adjunct determination to substantiate blood lead levels of 25 micrograms per deciliter or higher. Since erythrocyte protoporphyrin concentrations may not increase as a result of low-level exposures to lead, direct blood lead analysis is the only reliable method for identifying individuals with blood lead concentrations below 25 micrograms per deciliter.

Persons seeking blood lead or erythrocyte protoporphyrin analyses should determine that the laboratory employs techniques and procedures acceptable for the purpose for which the analyses are sought.

The list of approved laboratories will be revised approximately semiannually and published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The name or location of a laboratory, as well as the personnel and testing procedures, can change. When changes of this type occur, the clinical laboratory permit number does not change. If questions arise about the identity of a laboratory due to a name or location change, the clinical laboratory permit number should be used as the primary identifier. To assist in identifying a laboratory that performed a test, the clinical laboratory permit number of the facility at the time the list was prepared is included in the list of approved laboratories above the name of the laboratory.

The Department's blood lead proficiency testing program is approved by the United States Department of Health and Human Services in accordance with 42 CFR 493.901 and 493.937 (relating to approval of proficiency

testing programs; and toxicology) which are administered by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. Participation in these programs may therefore be used to demonstrate acceptable performance for approval purposes under both Federal and Commonwealth statutes.

Availability of Amendments to the Office of Developmental Programs' Consolidated and Person/ Family Directed Support Waivers

The Department of Human Services (Department) is making available for public review and comment the Office of Developmental Programs' proposed Consolidated and Person/Family Directed Support (P/FDS) waiver amendments.

Background

Whenever changes are intended to be made to an approved waiver, the Department must submit an amendment to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services for approval. The Department proposes the following substantive amendments to the Consolidated and P/FDS waivers effective May 1, 2016:

- Increasing the unduplicated number of participants served in the P/FDS waiver to reflect the Fiscal Year (FY) 2015-2016 waiting list initiative. This proposed change is contingent on the final budget enacted by the General Assembly.
- Increasing reserved capacity for unanticipated emergencies in waiver year 5 (FY 2016-2017) for the Consolidated waiver only.
- Decreasing reserved capacity for hospital and rehabilitation care in the Consolidated waiver to more accurately reflect utilization.
- Moving the requirement for new providers to complete a self-assessment from a provider monitoring requirement to a provider qualification requirement.
- Allowing relatives/legal guardians of waiver participants to provide companion and nursing services when they meet the qualification criteria to provide the services.
- Implementing a limit on the number of hours of companion and home and community habilitation services that may be provided by relatives or legal guardians.
- Increasing the number of 15-minute respite units available in the P/FDS waiver.
- \bullet Aligning the supported employment service definition with section 1915(c)(5)(C) of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C.A. § 1396n(c)(5)(C)).
- Updating the name and qualification criteria for visual/mobility therapy to reflect current terminology and standards.
- Allowing supports broker services to be provided for individuals currently residing in a waiver residential

habilitation setting that have a plan to transition to a private residence and self-direct their services in the Consolidated waiver only.

- Adding that supports broker services are exempt from the \$30,000 per person per fiscal year total limit established for P/FDS waiver services. The only other service currently exempt from this limit is supports coordination.

- Adding a requirement that transitional work services may only be authorized as a new service for individuals under 24 years of age when documentation has been obtained that the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation (OVR) has closed the participant's case or that the participant has been determined ineligible for OVR services
- Aligning the requirements for background clearances under the act of July 1, 2015 (P. L. 94, No. 15).
- Updating the factors related to estimated annual average per capita Medicaid costs to reflect the most recent data available. These factors are Factor D' Derivation, Factor G Derivation and Factor G' Derivation.

Program Guidelines for Veterans Temporary Assistance

1. Purpose. The purpose of these guidelines is to describe the use of funds under 51 Pa.C.S. § 1721 (relating to Veterans' Trust Fund) to provide temporary financial assistance to eligible veterans and unmarried surviving spouses of eligible veterans when they face adverse financial circumstances and need assistance to provide themselves with the necessities of living. In general, assistance is provided under this section to replace or supplement income lost or reduced because of an unexpected change in circumstances or to offset unexpected increased costs or expenses that affect the ability to pay for the necessities of living.

2. Definitions.

- (1) "Bureau." The Bureau of Programs, Initiatives, Reintegration and Outreach (PIRO) or its successor of the Office of Veterans' Affairs (OVA).
- (2) "Department." The Department of Military and Veterans Affairs (DMVA).
- (3) "Eligible Veteran." A person who served in the Armed Forces of the United States, who:
- (i) was discharged under honorable conditions after a period of active duty, other than active duty for training, as evidenced by a DD-Form 214 or other official documentation, or,
 - (ii) died in service or was killed in action; or
- (iii) suffered a service-connected disability as certified by the United States Veterans' Administration.
- (4) "Essential Furnishings and Fixtures." Items of tangible personal property, which are necessary and useful, in carrying out the activities of daily living and maintained in or about the applicant's shelter. A fixture is ordinarily affixed to the shelter property while furnishings are essentially portable. Luxury goods are excluded.
- (5) "Necessities of Living." Expenses for water, food, shelter, clothing, health care, personal care, essential furnishings and fixtures, utilities, transportation, communication and laundry to the extent not provided by other government programs.
- (6) "Need for Temporary Assistance." Financial circumstances unexpectedly resulting in insufficient funds to pay for shelter and necessities of living for the veteran and family, when:
- (i) a veteran is unable to provide the necessities of living and has a direct and immediate need for assistance. The assistance must be essential and not for the relief of an inconvenience, or the purchase of goods or services other than necessities of living, and,
- (ii) caused by an unexpected loss of income, assets or support due to sickness, disability, unemployment, natural or manmade disaster or other cause beyond the control of, and not as a result of misconduct by, the applicant, or,

(iii) caused by an unexpected increase in costs or expenses beyond the control of, and not as a result of misconduct by, the applicant resulting in insufficient funds to pay for necessities of living.

- (7) "Personal care expenses." Expenses, other than health care expenses, which are for the well-being, appearance, cleanliness, personal hygiene and presentability of the applicant, including toiletries, haircuts and hair care, and similar expenses.
- 3. *Eligibility*. In order to qualify for temporary assistance, applicants must demonstrate that:
- (1) They are eligible veterans or unmarried surviving spouses of deceased eligible veterans.
- (2) They are bona fide residents of Pennsylvania who permanently reside in this Commonwealth and who maintain a legal residence in no other state for any purpose.
- (3) They are not receiving sufficient monetary assistance from any state or Federal agency based on the need for temporary assistance described in the application.
- (i) Applicants may be receiving Food Stamps and still qualify for temporary assistance under these guidelines.
- (ii) Applicants must show that other funds or resources are not available to address the need for temporary assistance.
- (4) They demonstrate a clear and present direct and immediate need for temporary assistance in order to provide themselves and their families with shelter and the necessities of living.
- 4. Maximum Amount of Assistance. The maximum assistance under this program in any twelve-month period is the lesser of \$1,600 or the documented amount of the need.
- (1) In no case will the amount of the assistance exceed the amount of the demonstrated need.
- (2) In no case will the amount of the assistance exceed \$1,600 in any twelve-month period.
- (3) In no case will the amount of assistance exceed the amount of income lost or increase in expense incurred.
- (4) The Department may adjust the amount of assistance paid under this program so that total payments to qualified Veterans or unmarried surviving spouses do not exceed the amount of funds available for this purpose.
- (5) Only one grant will be made based upon need arising out of each event or episode to either the Veteran or the eligible spouse of the Veteran, but not to both.
- 5. Fund Committee. The Deputy Adjutant General of Veterans Affairs (DAG-VA) will appoint a Veterans Temporary Assistance (VTA) Fund Committee to assist in administering the VTA program.
 - (1) Composition. The Fund Committee will consist of:
- (i) A chairperson, who shall be the Chairman of the State Veterans' Commission.
- (ii) A vice chairperson, who shall be the President, Pennsylvania State Association of County Directors of Veterans' Affairs or designee.

- (iii) Three additional Committee members who shall be the Director, Programs, Initiatives, Reintegration and Outreach (PIRO), the Chief, Division of Programs and Services, the Veteran Service Office Supervisor, Division of Programs and Services, or designees.
- (iv) The Department's Office of Chief Counsel will provide legal advice and assistance to the fund committee (without vote).
- (2) Subcommittee on Application Review. At least three members of the Fund Committee or their designees will constitute a subcommittee to review applications for assistance referred to the subcommittee by the Bureau staff. The staff may refer applications and request assistance of the subcommittee in matters involving unusual facts and circumstance, major policy or legal questions or complexities, requests for assistance in amounts close to the annual limit, or where an appeal is anticipated. The membership of the application review subcommittee will rotate based on availability and to ensure that all Fund Committee members and designees have the opportunity to review applications from time to time.

6. Application Procedures.

- (1) Application forms are available from the DMVA, including DMVA field offices, veterans' organizations named in section 1702 of the Military and Veterans Code, 51 Pa.C.S. § 1702 (relating to State Veterans' Commission), and Pennsylvania County Directors of Veterans' Affairs. A completed application for temporary assistance will include:
 - a. Veteran's DD 214 or DD 1300/death certificate.
 - b. Proof of residency.
 - c. Copy of applicant's marriage license.
- d. Supporting documentation, to include proof of total household income from all sources, current copies of household bills, such as utilities, medical bills mortgage statement or rental agreement, vehicle payments and insurance, estimates for repairs, bank statements, earning statements and any other household bills.
- e. Certification under penalty of law, that the information is true and correct to the best of the knowledge, information and belief of the application.
- (2) Applications shall be submitted to the DMVA, Office of Veterans Affairs, through the applicable Pennsylvania County Director of Veterans' Affairs, veterans' organization, or the Adjutant General's Offices in Pittsburgh, Philadelphia and Fort Indiantown Gap.
- (3) The Bureau or Fund Committee shall review the applications and determine eligibility based on the eligibility criteria provided herein.

If the Bureau or the Fund Committee determines the applicant eligible, it shall notify applicant of the amount and duration of the assistance.

7. Grants:

(1) Applications for grants will be evaluated according to the criteria set forth in 51 Pa.C.S. § 1702 and in paragraph 8 of these guidelines subject to the availability of funds and the exercise of the approval authority's discretion in evaluating the relative priority of requests if funds are not sufficient to satisfy all eligible requests.

- (2) Applicants must demonstrate that they have a direct and immediate financial need for assistance as a result of circumstances beyond the control of the applicant and not as a result of misconduct.
- (3) Grants may be made for purposes such as: food, rent, utilities, transportation and vehicle repair, medical/dental expenses, emergency home repairs necessary to maintain habitability, funeral expenses, as well as other emergency needs at the discretion of the approval authority.
- (4) It is recognized that neither 51 Pa.C.S. § 1702 nor these guidelines can describe every possible emergency scenario that might result in an immediate and direct financial need as a result of circumstances beyond the control of the applicant and not as a result of misconduct by the applicant. The following situations are appropriate examples:
- a. Failure to receive pay in a timely manner as a result of an error by the employer.
 - b. Loss of income due to a medical issue or lay off.
 - c. Unusual medical care not covered by insurance.
- d. Victims of a crime that result in a loss of income or property (for example identity theft).
- e. Death of a veteran or immediate relative that results in a loss of income or unexpected expenses.
- (5) The following are examples where temporary assistance is not appropriate:
 - a. Pay for nonessential items, or to finance vacations.
 - b. Pay fines or legal expenses in criminal matters.
- c. Assist with home purchase or financing or home improvements not required as a result of a natural or manmade disaster.
 - d. Pay bills incurred through credit card debt.
- e. Loss of income as a result of the exhaustion of Unemployment Compensation or Workman's Compensation benefits.
- 8. *Evaluation Criteria*: The criteria that will be considered in determining whether to approve applications for temporary assistance include:
 - a. The nature of assistance required.
 - b. The degree of financial hardship.
 - c. Current household income.
 - d. Current debts and obligations.
 - e. Number of dependents.
- f. The cause of the financial hardship and its relationship if any, to the negligence of the applicant in managing income and debt.
 - g. Change in income.
- h. Change in employment and income status of dependents
 - i. Bankruptcy filed or pending.
 - j. Whether other aid is available.
- k. Amounts and dates of any funds previously awarded.
 - 1. Whether a HUD-VASH voucher was issued.

Exceptions must be approved by the Board and final approval by DAG-VA.

9. Appeals. Any applicant aggrieved by a staff decision with respect to a grant application may appeal the action of the staff to The Adjutant General in writing within 10 days of receiving the decision. The appeal will be under provisions of 1 Pa. Code § 35.20 (relating to appeals from actions of the staff). The appeal shall state the reasons for the appeal and describe the requested relief. The Adjutant General shall review the appeal and make a final decision concerning any appeal.

10. Effective Date: These guidelines take effect based on the approval of the State Veterans Commission and

upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, and apply to all grant applications submitted on or after the effective date and all grant applications pending on the effective date.

AmeriHealth HMO (INAC-130337476); Small Group Off Exchange; Rate Filing

AmeriHealth HMO submitted a rate filing to increase the premium rates for its Small Group ACA compliant plans renewing on or after April 1, 2016. The filing proposes a rate increase of 1.59% and will affect approximately 790 members. The proposed rate increase will generate approximately \$77,000 of additional annual revenue.

Unless formal administrative action is taken prior to March 14, 2016, the subject filing may be deemed approved by operation of law.

By the Commission:

The Commission's regulations at 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(a) state that an Electric Generation Supplier (EGS) license will not be issued or remain in force until the licensee furnishes a bond or other security approved by the Commission. In addition, 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(d) states that the maintenance of an EGS license is contingent on the licensee providing proof to the Commission that a bond or other approved security in the amount directed by the Commission has been obtained.

Failure to file the requested documentation before the financial security's expiration date may cause Commission staff to initiate a formal proceeding that may lead to the following: cancellation of each company's electric supplier license, removal of each company's information from the Commission's website and notification to all electric distribution companies, in which each company is licensed to do business, of the cancellation of the license.

As of December 8, 2015, each EGS listed in the Supplier Table below has not provided proof to the Commission that it has a bond or other approved security in the amount directed by the Commission, to replace its expired bond as noted in the table below.

As part of its EGS license validation procedures, the Commission's Bureau of Technical Utility Services sent a 60-day Security Renewal Notice Letter to each entity in the Supplier Table above stating that original documentation of a bond, or other approved security, must be filed within 60 days prior to each entity's security expiration date. None of the companies listed in the Supplier Table provided the required documentation.

Based on the above facts, we tentatively conclude that the EGSs listed in the Supplier Table are not in compliance with 52 Pa. Code § 54.40(a) and (d) and therefore it is appropriate to initiate the cancellation process for each EGS license of each company listed in the Supplier Table, without the necessity of a formal complaint, as being in the public interest; *Therefore*,

It Is Ordered That:

* Taking title to electricity

- 1. Cancellation of the Electric Generation Supplier Licenses of each company listed in the Supplier Table is hereby tentatively approved as being in the public interest.
- 2. The Secretary serve a copy of this Tentative Order upon the Office of Consumer Advocate, the Office of Small Business Advocate, the Bureau of Investigation & Enforcement, Department of Revenue—Bureau of Corporation Taxes, all electric distribution companies, all of the Electric Generation Suppliers in the Supplier Table and also cause a copy of this Tentative Order to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 30-day comment period.
- 3. Absent the filing of adverse public comment or the filing of approved security within 30 days after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, the Bureau of Technical Utility Services shall prepare a Final Order for entry by the Secretary and shall advise the affected Bureaus within the Commission in writing that the Electric Generation Supplier Licenses held by each company listed in the Supplier Table, are cancelled and the cases may be alread
- 4. Upon entry of the Final Order described in ordering Paragraph No. 3 above, each company listed in the Supplier Table will be stricken from all active utility lists maintained by the Commission's Bureau of Technical Utility Services and the Assessment Section of the Bureau of Administration, removed from the Commission's website, and notifications be sent to all electric distribution companies in which the Electric Generation Suppliers are licensed to do business.

Order

By the Commission:

On October 30, 2015, NEP Cellcorp, Inc. (NEP) filed a Petition to relinquish its designation as an Eligible Telecommunications Carrier (ETC) in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Pursuant to 52 Pa. Code § 1.36, NEP attached the verification of its President. NEP's certificate of service indicates that it served its Petition on the statutory advocates and the current ETCs that provide service in NEP's service area. No responses were filed to NEP's Petition.

Background

NEP is a commercial mobile radio service licensee authorized to provide GSM service using broadband personal communication service spectrum and 70 MHz spectrum in northeastern Pennsylvania, including Lackawanna, Susquehanna and Wayne Counties. In 2008, NEP was designated as an ETC in the entire study areas served by the following rural telephone companies in Pennsylvania: Deposit Telephone Co., Inc. and Hancock Telephone Co. NY (Hancock). Although Hancock is based in New York, the telephone company serves territory in both New York and Pennsylvania. In 2010, the FCC amended NEP's ETC designation in Pennsylvania to include the entire study area of North Eastern Pennsylvania Telephone Company. Most recently, by Order entered October 2, 2014, this Commission amended NEP's ETC designation to include the entire study area of South Canaan Telephone Company, the Beach Lake wire center of Verizon North LLC, and the Hamlin, Honesdale, Hawley, Lake Ariel, Moscow and Newfoundland wire centers of Verizon Pennsylvania LLC. NEP amended its designation in order to compete in the FCC's (Federal Communications Commission) Mobility Fund Phase II auction for federal universal service fund (USF) support.

NEP states that, on June 8, 2015, it announced that it had decided to exit the retail wireless business. As a result of that decision, NEP entered into an agreement with AT&T Mobility (AT&T) through which AT&T will purchase certain NEP spectrum assets, pending FCC approval. By this Petition, NEP seeks to relinquish its ETC status in all areas of Pennsylvania for which it is currently so designated. NEP attached a copy of its Press

Release as Exhibit A to its Petition. In response to staff's questions, NEP also provided a copy of the Notice of Relinquishment of ETC Designation that was filed with the FCC on November 19, 2015, and documentation that it returned all of the Mobility Phase II funding that it received.

Section 214(e)(4) of the Telecommunications Act of 1996 (TA 96), as amended, 47 U.S.C. § 214(e)(4), authorized the Commission to rescind a carrier's ETC status upon request and provides in pertinent part:

A state commission . . . shall permit an eligible telecommunications carrier to relinquish its designation as such a carrier in any area served by more than one eligible telecommunications carrier. An eligible Telecommunications carrier that seeks to relinquish its eligible designation for an area served by more than one eligible telecommunications carrier shall give advance notice to the State commission...of such relinquishment. Prior to permitting a telecommunications carrier designated as an eligible telecommunications carrier to cease providing universal service in an area served by more than one eligible telecommunications carrier, the State commission . . . shall require the remaining eligible telecommunications or carriers to ensure that all customers served by the relinquishing carrier will continue to be served, and shall require sufficient notice to permit the purchase or construction of adequate facilities by any remaining eligible telecommunications carrier.

In a Secretarial Letter issued September 3, 2013, the Commission reaffirmed the rules and requirements for relinquishment under TA96 and provided further guidance and directives to Pennsylvania ETCs seeking to relinquish ETC status. In addition to the relinquishment requirements listed in TA96 the Commission requires the following:

- (1) All Petitions to relinquish ETC status must be accompanied by an affidavit or verification of an authorized individual.
- (2) The Petition must be served upon the statutory advocates and all carriers referenced in the petition as alternative ETCs.
- (3) Notice must be provided to all affected Lifeline customers as follows:
- (a) Written notice 90 days prior to discontinuance of Lifeline service in the form of a stand-alone mailing separate from any billing or collections mailing.
- (b) Telephone notice 60 days prior to discontinuance of Lifeline service.
- (c) Written notice 30 days prior to discontinuance of Lifeline service in the form of a billing insert or standalone mailing.
- (4) The notices should inform the affected customers of the date certain that Lifeline service will end, list alternative Lifeline providers and offer assistance to those customers who wish to retain Lifeline service.
- (5) Petitioners are directed to ensure that the transition to another Lifeline provider is seamless for the Lifeline customer and ensure that the customer is not subject to additional connection fees or deposits. Also the Petitioner is to assist the Lifeline customer with any Lifeline certification requirements occasioned by the petition

Discussion

In its Petition, NEP states that more than one ETC currently serves in its service area. NEP states that it satisfies the advance notice requirement by the filing of its Petition and serving it on the statutory advocates and remaining ETCs. NEP does not believe that any of the remaining ETCs will be required to purchase or construct facilities to provide service to NEP's Lifeline customer. NEP states that on or about June 8, when NEP announced it was exiting the retail wireless business, NEP had one Lifeline customer in Pennsylvania. At that time, NEP avers that it provided written notice to all of its customers, including its sole Lifeline customer, of its exit decision, identifying a date certain upon which service would end, informing them of their wireless service options and offering assistance with the transition to another wireless carrier. NEP states that the customer notice was sent as a stand-alone mailing by first class mail, and attached it to its Petition as Exhibit D.

NEP states, on July 6, 2015, August 24, 2015 and September 11, 2015, it sent text messages to its remaining customers directing them to visit NEP's website for additional information, or to contact AT&T for information on AT&T's limited promotional offer (i.e. waived activation fee and bill credits). During this time period, NEP also included a bill message on its customers' bills which reminded them of the service end date and the need to make arrangements to find another provider.

NEP reports that all non-Lifeline customers were successfully migrated to other carriers of their choice by October 16, 2015. Those customers were not subject to any fees from NEP for migration, and the customers electing to move to AT&T did not pay an activation fee to their new carrier. NEP states that its only Lifeline customer voluntarily elected to switch service to AT&T, and that customer's number was successfully ported on July 24, 2015. NEP advises that it followed up telephonically with its former Lifeline customer to discuss the transition, and the customer indicated that they were pleased with their migration and AT&T's promotional offer. No fees were charged by NEP or AT&T for the migration. NEP submits that it has satisfied the notice requirements and ensured that its Lifeline customer had at least one option for a seamless transition to another Lifeline carrier.

As stated earlier, NEP no longer has any retail wireless customers. However, it continues to provide roaming services and will do so as long as it owns spectrum that is subject to the proposed transaction with AT&T. In addition, NEP states that it retains open numbers for 911 network testing purposes. As stated earlier, NEP provided documentation confirming that it has returned to USAC all of the Mobility Fund Phase II money that it received from the USF.

Conclusion

Based upon the foregoing, NEP has satisfied all of the requirements necessary to relinquish its ETC designation. It gave advance notice to the Commission as well as the FCC. NEP satisfied the customer notice requirements and successfully migrated all of its customers, including its lone Lifeline customer, to alternative service providers. It appears that the migration and number porting was seamless and at no additional cost to the customers. Furthermore, the ETC designation that NEP seeks to relinquish in Pennsylvania is not transferrable to any other entity. As a result of NEP's actions, NEP has not had any retail wireless customers in Pennsylvania since

October 16, 2015. In addition, there are no informal or formal complaints pending against the NEP before the Commission. Accordingly, we will grant NEP's Petition to relinquish its ETC designation in Pennsylvania as in the public interest; *Therefore*,

It Is Ordered That:

- 1. The Petition filed at P-2015-2511520 by NEP Cellcorp, Inc. to relinquish its designation as an Eligible Telecommunications Carrier in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is hereby granted.
- 2. The authorization of NEP Cellcorp, Inc. to provide Eligible Telecommunications Carrier services at P-2013-2356640 is hereby cancelled and its name be stricken from all active utility lists maintained by the Commission's Bureau of Technical Utility Services.
- 3. A copy of this order be published in the *Pennsylva*nia Bulletin.
