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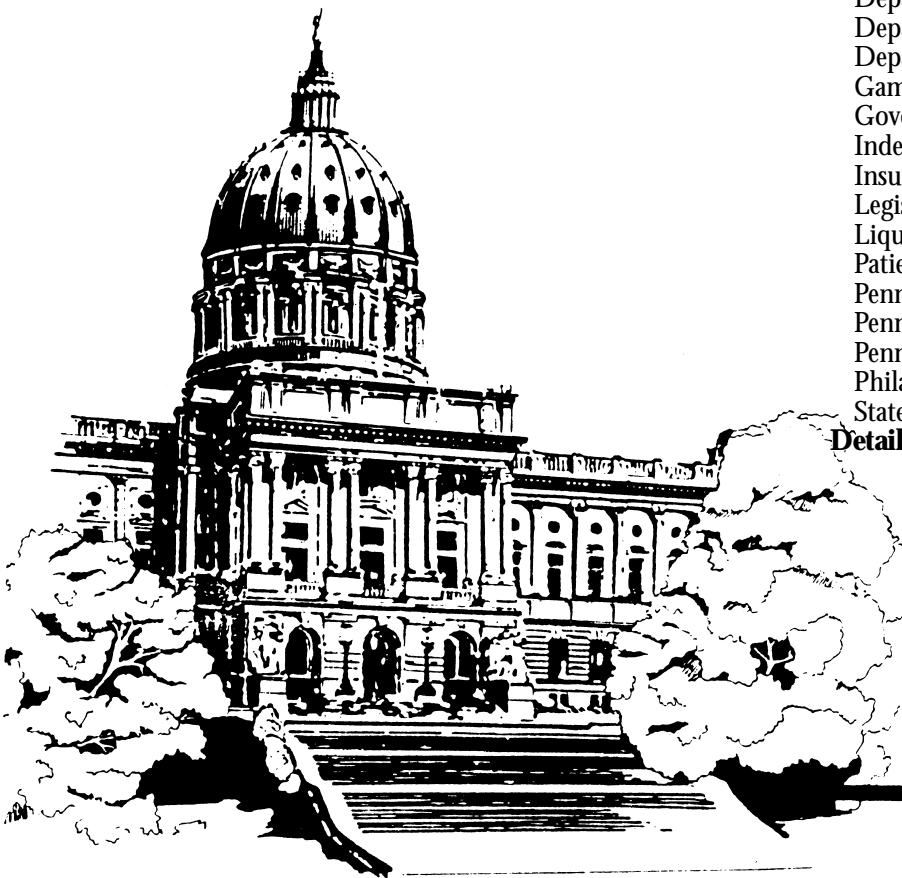

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READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where “no fiscal impact” is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.



CHAPTER 6. COUNCILS AND COMMITTEES

Subchapter J. ADVISORY COUNCILS FOR HUNTING, FISHING AND CONSERVATION

§ 6.143. Composition of the Governor's Advisory Council for Hunting, Fishing and Conservation.

(a) The Governor's Advisory Council for Hunting, Fishing and Conservation (Council) will consist of at least 12, but no more than 26, residents of this Commonwealth appointed by the Governor to serve at the pleasure of the Governor.

(b) Elected state officials and employees of the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, the Department of Environmental Protection, the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission, the Pennsylvania Game Commission and members of their immediate families are not eligible for membership on the Council.

(c) The Council shall represent a broad-based group of stakeholders, all of whom have an intrinsic interest in the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth. The members shall support hunting, trapping and angling as a valuable and accepted method of wildlife management.

Rule 107. Minimum Standards for Course Approval.

To be approved for credit, a CLE course or activity must meet the following standards:

* * * * *

(f) The course shall be presented in a suitable setting devoted to the educational activity of the program. No CLE shall consist solely of television viewing in the home, correspondence work, or self study, except as the Board shall approve to accommodate the needs of the handicapped or incapacitated. Video, motion picture or audio tape presentations may be used provided a faculty person is in attendance at all presentations to comment and answer questions. **Computer-based programs may be approved if they meet interactive, technical and accreditation standards set forth by the Board;**

Rule 108. Credit for Continuing Legal Education Courses and Activity.

* * * * *

(e) The number of credits earned by computer-based education that may be applied to the annual compliance requirement shall not exceed four (4).

STATE BOARD OF LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTS
[49 PA. CODE CH. 15]

Corrective Amendment to 49 Pa. Code § 15.12

The State Board of Landscape Architects has discovered a discrepancy between the agency text of 49 Pa. Code § 15.12 (relating to fees), as deposited with the Legislative Reference Bureau and published at 32 Pa.B. 3633 (July 27, 2002), and the official text codified in the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter* (Master Transmittal Sheet No. 335), and as currently appearing in the *Pennsylvania Code*. Provider application fees for continuing education courses were codified incorrectly.

Therefore, under 45 Pa.C.S. § 901: The State Board of Landscape Architects has deposited with the Legislative Reference Bureau a corrective amendment to 49 Pa. Code § 15.12. The corrective amendment to 49 Pa. Code § 15.12 is effective as of October 5, 2002, the date the defective official text was announced in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The correct version of 49 Pa. Code § 15.12 appears in Annex A.

GAME COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CHS. 141]

Hunting and Trapping; Permitted Devices

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its October 5, 2004, meeting, adopted an amendment to § 141.18 (relating to permitted devices).

This final-form rulemaking will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for this final-form rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 34 Pa.B. 5164 (September 18, 2004).

1. Introduction

The Commission amended § 141.18 to permit the use of sound amplification devices that completely cover the ears.

2. Purpose and Authority

Former regulations specifically prohibited the use of sound amplification devices that completely cover the ears. With the advances in technology, many of the available electronic hearing protection devices now also amplify sound. Former regulations prohibited many of these devices because they could be used to give hunters an unfair advantage. Many of the new hearing protection devices are electronic, enabling the hunter to hear normal conversation but preventing sounds over a certain decibel level from entering the ear. They amplify sound and completely cover the ears. By striking the relevant language in § 141.18, these hearing protection devices were made lawful for use.

Section 322(c)(5) of the code (relating to powers and duties of the commission) specifically empowers the Commission to "Fix the type and number of devices which may be used to take game or wildlife." Section 2102(b)(1) of the code (relating to regulations) authorizes the Commission to "promulgate regulations relating to . . . the number and types of devices and equipment allowed, the identification of devices and the use and possession of devices." Section 2102(d) of the code authorizes the Commission to "promulgate regulations stipulating . . . devices which may be used, the manner in which and the location where the devices may be used, the species the devices may be used for and the season when the devices may be used." Section 2102(a) of the code provides that "The commission shall promulgate such regulations as it deems necessary and appropriate concerning game or wildlife and hunting or furtaking in this Commonwealth, including regulations relating to . . . the ways,

manner, methods and means of hunting or furtaking, and the health and safety of persons who hunt or take wildlife or may be in the vicinity of persons who hunt or take game or wildlife in this Commonwealth." The amendment to § 141.18 was adopted under this authority.

3. *Regulatory Requirements*

This final-form rulemaking will permit the use of sound amplification devices that completely cover the ears.

4. *Persons Affected*

Persons who wish to use sound amplification devices that completely cover the ears will be affected by this final-form rulemaking.

5. *Comment and Response Summary*

There were no official comments received regarding this final-form rulemaking.

6. *Cost and Paperwork Requirements*

This final-form rulemaking should not result in additional cost or paperwork.

7. *Effective Date*

This rulemaking will be effective upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

Findings

The Commission finds that:

(1) Public notice of intention to adopt the administrative amendment adopted by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) The adoption of the amendment of the Commission in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for the administration and enforcement of the authorizing statute.

Order

The Commission, acting under authorizing statute, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapter 141, are amended by amending § 141.18 to read as set forth at 34 Pa.B. 5164.

(b) The Executive Director of the Commission shall certify this order and 34 Pa.B. 5164 and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(c) This order shall become effective upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Hunting and Furtaker Licenses

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its June 29, 2004, meeting, adopted § 143.12 (relating to fee for replacement hunter education training certificate).

Most of the requests come from individuals desiring to hunt in another state where proof of having completed hunter education training is required to purchase a hunting license in that state. Filling these requests formerly resulted in substantial administrative costs. To offset a portion of these costs, the Commission added § 143.12 to permit the Commission to implement a fee for the replacement of hunter education training certificates.

Section 2722(g)(2) of the code (relating to authorized license-issuing agents) directs the Commission to adopt regulations for the administration, control and performance of activities related to license issuing. Section 2102(a) of the code (relating to regulations) provides that "The commission shall promulgate such regulations as it deems necessary and appropriate concerning game or wildlife and hunting or furtaking in this Commonwealth, including regulations relating to the protection, preservation and management of game or wildlife and game or wildlife habitat, permitting or prohibiting hunting or furtaking, the ways, manner, methods and means of hunting or furtaking, and the health and safety of persons who hunt or take wildlife or may be in the vicinity of persons who hunt or take game or wildlife in this Commonwealth." The amendment to § 143.12 was adopted under this authority.

3. *Regulatory Requirements*

This final-form rulemaking adds § 143.12 to permit the Commission to implement a fee for the replacement of hunter education training certificates.

4. *Persons Affected*

1. *Introduction*

The Commission amended § 147.286 to restrict disposal or transfer of wildlife to only those persons who lawfully conduct activities under the authority of a permit to lawfully import the wildlife being transferred.

2. *Purpose and Authority*

With the current requirements in place through statute and regulations relative to importing, licensing and experience needed to receive a permit to possess wildlife, the Commission has identified a need to clarify to whom a permitted menagerie can transfer excess stock. The Commission determined that disposal or transfer of wildlife, for any reason, shall be limited to persons who lawfully conduct activities under the authority of a permit to lawfully import the wildlife being transferred. This would prohibit the disposal or transfer of wildlife to unpermitted private parties.

Section 2901(b) of the code (relating to authority to issue permits) provides that "the commission may, as deemed necessary to properly manage the game or wildlife resources . . . promulgate regulations to control the activities which may be performed under authority of any permit issued." Section 2102(c) of the code (relating to regulations) directs that "The commission shall promulgate regulations concerning the transportation, introduction into the wild, importation, exportation, sale, offering for sale or purchase of game or wildlife or the disturbing of game or wildlife in their natural habitat." Section 2102(a) of the code (relating to regulations) provides that "The commission shall promulgate such regulations as it deems necessary and appropriate concerning game or wildlife . . . in this Commonwealth, including regulations relating to the protection, preservation and management of game or wildlife . . . in this Commonwealth." The amendment to § 147.286 was adopted under this authority.

3. *Regulatory Requirements*

This final-form rulemaking will restrict the disposal or transfer of wildlife for any reason to only those persons who may themselves lawfully import the wildlife being transferred. This will prohibit the disposal or transfer of wildlife to an unpermitted private party.

Persons who wish to transfer or dispose of wildlife held under a menagerie permit will be affected by this final-form rulemaking.

The Commission amended § 147.663 to permit the Executive Director to establish approved woven wire fencing designs and specifications.

2. *Purpose and Authority*

Section 147.661 (relating to tagging of deer taken) provides for permits to control deer within fenced enclosures constructed for the purpose of improving forest regeneration. Managers of private and public forestland, including the Commission, construct these fences. Formerly, § 147.663 required these fences to be constructed of woven wire and be at least 8 feet high with the bottom edge tight to the ground. The industry standard fencing commonly used in this application is built from two widths of 47 feet woven wire with the bottom 1 foot (approximately) folded over the ground to the outside, leaving an approximate total above ground height of only 7 feet. These fences are in widespread use by the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources and the Commission and clearly do not meet our current regulatory requirements. Upgrading existing 7 foot fences to meet current regulatory requirements would require substantial modification and add cost to forest management practices and would not likely result in any greater

effectiveness in excluding deer. In fact, the foot of fencing sealing the structure at the ground actually increases the effectiveness of the fencing more than the additional 1-foot in height. The Commission amended § 147.663 to permit the Executive Director to establish approved woven wire fencing designs and specifications to be consistent with current industry standards.

Section 2901(b) of the code (relating to authority to issue permits) provides "The commission may, as deemed necessary to properly manage the game or wildlife resources, promulgate regulations for the issuance of any permit and promulgate regulations to control the activities which may be performed under authority of any permit issued." Section 2102(a) of the code (relating to regulations) provides that "The commission shall promulgate such regulations as it deems necessary and appropriate concerning game or wildlife and hunting or furtaking in this Commonwealth, including regulations relating to the protection, preservation and management of game or wildlife and game or wildlife habitat, permitting or prohibiting hunting or furtaking, the ways, manner, methods and means of hunting or furtaking, and the health and safety of persons who hunt or take wildlife or may be in the vicinity of persons who hunt or take game or wildlife in this Commonwealth." Temporary Order Designating Dangerous Transmissible Diseases

The Department of Agriculture (Department) hereby issues a temporary order designating West Nile Encephalitis (WNE), Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) and Spring Viremia of Carp (SVC) "dangerous transmissible diseases." These designations are made under the authority of 3 Pa.C.S. §§ 2301—2389 (relating to Domestic Animal Law).

This temporary order is the successor to a previous temporary order published at 34 Pa.B. 491 (January 24, 2004) that made the same dangerous transmissible disease designations. The previous temporary order took effect January 1, 2004, and expires as of January 1, 2005.

Under 3 Pa.C.S. § 2327(a) (relating to disease surveillance and detection), the Department has authority to monitor the domestic animal population of this Commonwealth to determine the prevalence, incidence and location of transmissible diseases of animals. Under 3 Pa.C.S. § 2321(d) (relating to dangerous transmissible diseases), the Department has authority to declare a disease that has not been specifically identified in that statute as a "dangerous transmissible disease" to be a dangerous transmissible disease through issuance of a temporary order making that designation.

WNE is a disease of public health significance. It also poses a threat to domestic animal health and to the economic well being of domestic animal industries—particularly the equine industry. Section 2322(c) of 3 Pa.C.S. (relating to neoplastic diseases, metabolic diseases and heritable diseases) requires the Department to proceed with the agreement of the Department of Health (Health) when it adds a disease of public health significance to the list of designated dangerous transmissible diseases. Both the Department and Health agreed upon adding WNE to the list of dangerous transmissible diseases and to the reissuance of this temporary order.

WNE is an infection of the brain caused by the West Nile virus. Although West Nile virus has, in the past, been found most typically in Africa, Eastern Europe and West Asia, it was detected in the New York City area and in parts of New Jersey in 1999. It has spread across the United States since then. In mild cases of human disease, infection can cause fever, headache, body aches, skin rash and swollen lymph glands. In more severe cases, it can cause headache, high fever, neck stiffness, stupor, disorientation, coma, tremors, paralysis and occasional convulsions. In animals, horses and birds appear to be most susceptible to illness following infection, although reports of illness in other species are increasing.

Humans and animals can acquire West Nile virus through a bite from a mosquito that has bitten an infected bird. The designation of WNE as a "dangerous transmissible disease" will facilitate the Department's surveillance of birds, horses and other animals for the presence of the West Nile virus or WNE. The designation will also help the Department in providing assistance to Health and other public health agencies in monitoring and treatment efforts.

CWD is a disease of whitetail deer, elk and other cervids and is a member of the group of diseases known as transmissible spongiform encephalopathies (TSEs). Other more well-known TSEs are scrapie and bovine spongiform encephalopathy (BSE) or "mad cow" disease. All are thought to be caused by a protein that has converted to an abnormal infectious form known as a "prion." There is some evidence, in the case of BSE, that humans may become infected through consumption of meat products containing central nervous system tissues, thus there is a significant public health interest concerning all TSEs.

A number of states have, in recent years, instituted import regulations requiring that cervids entering those states: (1) originate from herds that are participating in a surveillance program; and (2) originate from states that have authority to take action in the event that CWD is diagnosed. The designation of CWD as a "dangerous transmissible disease" will facilitate the development and oversight of a surveillance program, and will help the Department react and take action in the event CWD is detected.

SVC is caused by a ribonucleic acid virus known as *Rhabdovirus carpio*, and is considered an emerging disease in the United States. SVC poses a threat to both domestic fish health and wild fish health in this Commonwealth and has the potential to create a significant adverse economic impact on this Commonwealth's aquaculture industry.

The SVC virus readily infects species of the *Cyprinidae* family (carp and minnows), and spreads through direct contact with infected fish and through shared infected water sources. Symptoms typically appear in the spring time as water temperatures increase. Symptoms in infected fish range from undetectable through mild disease to sudden massive die-off.

There is no specific treatment for fish infected with SVC and no vaccine to prevent the disease. Once natural water resources become infected, SVC may be impossible to eradicate and may pose a permanent threat to aquaculture facilities utilizing those water sources.

Order

The Department hereby designates WNE, CWD and SVC "dangerous transmissible diseases" under 3 Pa.C.S. § 2321(d). This order supplants any previous temporary order making a designation.

This order shall take effect as of January 1, 2005, and shall remain in effect until no later than January 1, 2006. This Department may: (1) reissue this temporary order to extend the designation beyond January 1, 2006; (2) allow this temporary order to expire on January 1, 2006; (3) supplant this temporary order with a formal regulation; or (4) modify this temporary order.

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES application are invited to submit a statement to the regional office noted before an application within 30 days from the date of this public notice. Persons wishing to comment on a WQM permit application are invited to submit a statement to the regional office noted before the application within 15 days from the date of this public notice. Comments received within the respective comment periods will be considered in the final determinations regarding the applications. Comments should include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests for a public hearing on applications. A public hearing may be held if the responsible office considers the public response significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

UNDER ACT 2, 1995

PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the Background Standard, Statewide Health Standard, the Site-Specific Standard or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, a combination of the cleanup standards or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a Site-Specific Standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a Site-Specific Standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality within which the site is located may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified as the remediator of the site develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

For further information concerning the content of a Notice of Intent to Remediate, contact the environmental cleanup program manager in the Department regional office before which the notice appears. If information concerning this acknowledgment is required in an alternative form, contact the community relations coordinator at the appropriate regional office. PLAN APPROVAL AND OPERATING PERMIT APPLICATIONS

NEW SOURCES AND MODIFICATIONS

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has developed an "integrated" plan approval, State operating permit and Title V operating permit program. This integrated approach is designed to make the permitting process more efficient for the Department, the regulated community and the public. This approach allows the owner or operator of a facility to complete and submit all the permitting documents relevant to its application one time, affords an opportunity for public input and provides for sequential issuance of the necessary permits.

The Department has received applications for plan approvals and/or operating permits from the following facilities.

Interested persons may also request that a hearing be held concerning the proposed plan approval and operating permit. Comments or protests filed with the Department regional offices must include a concise statement of the objections to the issuance of the Plan approval or operating permit and relevant facts which serve as the basis for the objections. If the Department schedules a hearing, a notice will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at least 30 days prior the date of the hearing.

The plant is subject to Title V and 40 CFR Part 63, Subpart LLL, National Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants for Portland Cement Plants. The modification involves the

conversion of the two cement kilns from long dry type to single stage preheaters. Most of the particulate controls will be either upgraded or replacement. The approval will include facility caps (rolling 12-month totals) on the emissions of particulate (539.2 tons), PM-10 (443.2 tons), NOx (2,621.0 tons), SOx (436.1 tons), CO (349.0 tons), VOC (53.0 tons), fluorides (3.22 tons), sulfuric acid (16.82 tons) and lead (0.60 ton). At these levels the facility will not trigger New Source Review actions. Additional emission limits will be placed on the kilns and the various particulate sources at the plant. The approval will include a testing program requiring the particulate testing of all major particulate sources at the plant during a 5 year period with retesting. The kilns will be tested for all pollutants included in the facility cap, except NOx, SOx and CO. These three gaseous pollutants will be monitored by continuous emission monitors. The approval will include additional restrictions, work practices, monitoring, testing, recordkeeping, reporting and other requirements designed to keep the source operating within all applicable air quality requirements. The facility is presently covered by the Title V Operating Permit No. 06-05002. The plan approval will be incorporated into this permit in accordance with 25 Pa. Code § 127.450 (Administrative Amendment).

28-05020A: T.B. Woods, Inc. (440 North Fifth Avenue, Chambersburg, PA 17201) for installation of a fabric collector to control particulate matter emissions from an existing table blast machine at their iron foundry in Chambersburg Borough, **Franklin County**. The source has the potential to emit 0.7 ton PM10 per year. The plan approval and amended State-only operating permit will include emission restrictions, work practice standards, and testing, monitoring, recordkeeping and reporting requirements designed to keep the facility operating within all applicable air quality requirements.

67-03129A: Gamlet, Inc. (190 Carlisle Avenue, York, PA 17404) for construction of a surface coating operation at their industrial and electrical enclosure manufacturing facility in York City, **York County**. The source has the potential to emit 37 tons VOC per year. The plan approval and subsequent State-only operating permit will include emission restrictions, work practice standards, and testing, monitoring, recordkeeping and reporting requirements designed to keep the facility operating within all applicable air quality requirements.

49-00005B: Hoeganaes Corp. (1001 Taylors Lane, Cinnaminson, NJ 08077) for their facility in Delaware Township, **Northumberland County**. The respective facility is a major facility for which a Title V operating permit (TVOP 49-00005) has been issued. The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) intends to issue a plan approval to authorize the applicant to modify a fluidized bed metal powder coating system and associated equipment (insulated particles process) identified in TVOP 49-00005 as Source ID P102. The respective modification is an increase in the amount of methylene chloride emitted from the IPP and the resulting process modifications (controls, monitoring, recordkeeping and reporting) specified herein.

Under the best available technology provisions in 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the methylene chloride emissions from the IPP are being controlled by a combination of carbon adsorption, closed loop condensation and a leak detection and repair program (LDAR).

This modification will result in up to 28 tons of methylene chloride emissions in any 12 consecutive month period.

The maximum 1-hour ambient concentration of methylene chloride is projected to be 5,834 micrograms per cubic meter (short-term exposure limit is 10,851 micrograms per cubic meter), 69 meters from the source (at the facility fence line). Hoeganaes used the SCREEN3 (version 96043) model to predict the maximum 1-hour risk threshold.

The Department's review of the information contained in the application indicates that the IPP, as proposed, will comply with all applicable requirements pertaining to air contamination sources and the emission of air contaminants including the best available technology requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12. Based on this finding, the Department intends to approve the application and issue plan approval for the proposed modification.

The Department proposes to place in the plan approval the following conditions to ensure compliance with all applicable regulatory requirements:

1. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the methylene chloride emissions (including point source emissions and fugitive emissions) from the IPP shall not exceed 30.47 pounds per ton of production on a monthly average basis.

2. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the methylene chloride emissions (including point source emissions and fugitive emissions) from the IPP shall not exceed 28 tons in any 12 consecutive month period.

3. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the methylene chloride emissions from the IPP shall be controlled by three identical Envirotrol, Inc. model VPM-2000 carbon canisters (primary canisters) operated in parallel. Each of the three carbon canisters shall be followed (in series) by an identical Envirotrol, Inc. model VPM-2000 carbon canister (secondary canisters), for a total of six identical carbon canisters. Carbon canister No. 1 shall control the methylene chloride emissions from charge hopper 307, weigh hopper TK-315 and weigh hopper TK-316. Carbon canister No. 3 shall control the methylene chloride emissions from the discharge dense phase system (POT-101), the aborted goods hopper and the coater/closed loop prior to it being opened for maintenance. Carbon canister No. 5 shall control the methylene chloride emissions from the 2,500-gallon methylene chloride storage tank (TK-401), the 1,000-gallon mix tank (TK-405) and the 200-gallon day tank (TK-412).

4. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the fugitive methylene chloride emissions from the IPP shall be controlled by a LDAR program as submitted and required herein.

5. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, no condition in this plan approval shall void any requirement in Title V operating permit 49-00005 for the IPP (Source ID P102). The permittee shall continue to comply with all requirements of Title V operating permit 49-00005. If there is a conflict between any Title V operating permit condition and a condition of this plan approval, the permittee shall comply with the condition of this plan approval. In addition, the air contaminant emissions from charge hopper 307 shall continue to be exhausted to and controlled by the Griffin Env. Model CF-30L (Control Device C07) fabric

collector followed by the Donaldson/Torit Division Model 2DF12 cartridge collector (Control Device ID C14) prior to being exhausted to carbon canister No. 1.

6. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, each pressure relief device (valve) on the IPP (that is, mix tank 405, day tank 412, coater blower inlet line, coater discharge line to blower, weigh hopper 315 and weigh hopper 316) shall be maintained in good operating condition and shall be set to release at no less than 2 psig of pressure, except for the pressure relief valve on the methylene chloride storage tank 401, which shall be set to release at no less than 12 psig of pressure.

7. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the 17 flanges on the low pressure side of the IPP that do not meet ANSI standards (as specified in plan approval application addendum/revisions dated October 1, 2004) shall be replaced with ANSI compliant flanges within three years of the issuance of this plan approval. In addition, any piping equipment that needs replaced as a result of LDAR shall be replaced with ANSI compliant components (ANSI nos. B31.3 and B16.5) that are compatible with methylene chloride.

8. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the outlet exhaust temperature from the Edwards condenser shall not exceed 35°F.

9. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, prior to the coater and associated closed loop being opened for repairs, the permittee shall perform a nitrogen purge and shall direct the purge emissions to carbon canister No. 3.

10. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the permittee shall monitor the inlet and outlet of each primary carbon canister for methylene chloride concentration at the following times at least once each work shift to determine breakthrough of each primary carbon canister: for canister No. 1, during periods of metal powder discharge to the coater and during periods of weigh hopper (TK-315 and TK-316) volume displacement, for canister No. 3, during periods of discharge dense phase system (POT-101) volume displacement, during periods of aborted goods hopper volume displacement and prior to any maintenance activities that require opening of the coater/closed loop (i.e., during purge), for canister No. 5, during periods of methylene chloride storage tank (TK-401) volume displacement, during periods of mix tank (TK-405) volume displacement and during periods of day tank (TK-412) volume displacement. The methylene chloride monitoring shall be performed by the HNU Systems, Inc. PID utilizing an 11.7 eV lamp. Breakthrough of a primary carbon canister shall be defined as an outlet concentration that is equal to or in excess of 10% of the inlet concentration.

11. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, upon the measurement by the HNU PID of methylene chloride breakthrough of any of the three primary carbon canisters, the primary carbon canister shall immediately be replaced by the secondary carbon canister and a new (identical) carbon canister shall be placed in the secondary canister position.

12. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the outlet exhaust temperature from the Edwards condenser shall be con-

tinuously monitored and shall be electronically interlocked with the sprayer in the coater such that the sprayer in the coater immediately shuts down upon the condenser exhaust temperature exceeding 35°F.

13. The permittee shall calibrate the HNU PID prior to each carbon canister sampling event and each time the unit is turned on (if being used to perform monitoring required herein). The calibrations shall be performed in accordance with the submitted vendor specifications. Isobutylene shall be used for the calibration gas and a span value of 4.6 shall be entered into the PID to directly measure methylene chloride concentration.

14. The permittee shall monitor each IPP process component under the LDAR program (flanges/connectors, pumps, compressor, valves, pressure relief devices, agitators and open-ended lines) by the HNU Systems, Inc. PID (11.7 eV lamp). The permittee shall calibrate the HNU PID prior to monitoring each component type (that is, pump, valve, flange, pressure relief device, and the like) and each time the unit is turned on (if being used to perform monitoring required herein). The calibrations shall be performed in accordance with the submitted vendor specifications. Isobutylene shall be used for the calibration gas and a span value of 4.6 shall be entered into the PID in order to directly measure methylene chloride concentration.

15. The LDAR monitoring shall be performed in accordance with Method 21 of 40 CFR Part 60, Appendix A, including the monitoring requirement to "place the probe inlet at the surface of the component interface where leakage could occur. Move the probe along the interface periphery while observing the instrument readout. If an increased meter reading is observed, slowly sample the interface where leakage is indicated until the maximum meter reading is obtained. Leave the probe inlet at this maximum reading location for approximately two times the instrument response time. If the maximum observed meter reading is greater than the leak definition, record and report the results as specified herein."

16. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, a leak is defined as 500 ppm of methylene chloride for the IPP piping and duct connectors/flanges. Each connector/flange shall be monitored annually. If the results of the annual monitoring show that less than 0.5% of connectors/flanges are leaking, the monitoring may be reduced to once every 2 years. If the results of the biennial monitoring show that 0.5% or greater of connectors/flanges leak the monitoring frequency shall revert back to annual. In addition, the permittee shall perform annual visible, audible and olfactory inspections of the connectors/flanges for indications of leaking.

17. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, a leak is defined as 1,000 ppm of methylene chloride for the IPP pumps. Each pump shall be monitored monthly. In addition, the permittee shall perform a weekly visual inspection of each pump for indications of leaking.

18. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, a leak is defined as 500 ppm of methylene chloride for the IPP compressor. The compressor shall be monitored monthly. In addition, the permittee shall perform a daily visual inspection of the compressor for indications of leaking.

19. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, a leak is defined as 500 ppm of methylene chloride for IPP pressure relief devices.

Each pressure relief device shall be monitored monthly. In addition, within 5 calendar days after each pressure release, the pressure relief device shall be monitored.

20. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, a leak is defined as 500 ppm of methylene chloride for the IPP valves. Each valve shall be monitored monthly. If the results of the monthly monitoring show that greater than 1% of valves but less than 2% of valves are leaking, the monitoring may be reduced to once every quarter; if greater than 0.5% of valves but less than 1% of valves are leaking, the monitoring may be reduced to once every two quarters; if less than 0.5% of valves are leaking, the monitoring may be reduced to once every four quarters. The monitoring frequency shall be determined by calculating the average leakers of the two prior periods of monitoring. If a monitoring frequency is reduced and the percent leakers for that frequency is exceeded (such as, quarterly monitoring shall revert back to monthly if 2% or greater valves are leaking) the monitoring frequency shall revert back to the frequency corresponding to the percent leakers.

21. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, a leak is defined as 10,000 ppm of methylene chloride for the IPP agitators (agitator flanges). Each agitator shall be monitored monthly. In addition, the permittee shall perform a weekly visual inspection of each agitator for indications of leaking.

22. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, each open-ended line of the IPP shall be equipped with a cap, blind flange, plug or a second valve that shall seal the open end at all times except during operations requiring process fluid flow through the open-ended line, or during maintenance or repair. Each open-ended line shall be operated in a manner so that the valve on the process fluid end is closed before the second valve is closed.

23. The sampling connection system on stream 2 and stream 3 of the IPP shall be equipped with a closed-purge, closed-loop or closed-vent system that either returns the purged process fluid directly to the process line or collects and recycles the purged process fluid to the process.

24. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, when a leak is detected, it shall be repaired as soon as practicable, but no later than 15 calendar days after the leak is detected. In addition, a first attempt at repair shall be made no later than 5 calendar days after the leak is detected. After each pressure release, the pressure relief device shall be returned to a condition indicated by the monitoring instrument reading of less than 500 ppm. Valves and connectors/flanges shall be monitored within 3 months after a repair has been made.

25. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, first attempts at repair for pumps shall include, but are not limited to, the following practices where practicable: tightening of packing gland nuts and ensuring that the seal flush is operating at design pressure and temperature.

26. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, first attempts at repair for valves shall include, but are not limited to, the following practices where practicable: tightening of bonnet bolts, replacement of bonnet bolts, tightening of packing gland nuts and injection of lubricant into lubricated packing.

27. Under the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the permittee shall clearly identify each leaking process component with a tag or label. The identification may be removed from a valve or connector/flange once it has been monitored and found not leaking. For all other equipment, the identification may be removed after the equipment is repaired.

28. The permittee shall keep records of the mass of methylene chloride entering into, accumulating in and leaving the IPP each month (that is, methylene chloride mass balance). These records shall include weighing the primary canisters before and after use and after each month to determine the amount of methylene chloride in carbon. In addition, the permittee shall keep records of the supporting mass balance calculations to determine the quantity of methylene chloride emissions each month and shall verify compliance with the monthly average methylene chloride emission limitation (pounds per ton of production) and the methylene chloride emission limitation in any 12 consecutive month period. These records shall be retained for a minimum of 5 years and shall be made available to the Department upon request.

29. The permittee shall record at least once each working shift the outlet exhaust temperature from the condenser. These records shall be retained for a minimum of 5 years and shall be made available to the Department upon request.

30. The permittee shall keep records of each calibration of the HNU PID including the identity of the monitoring instrument used, the date and time of calibration, the reason for calibration (carbon canister No., LDAR pumps, LDAR valves, LDAR pressure relief valves, and the like), the calibration gas used, the span value entered and a statement indicating that the vendor calibration specification was followed. These records shall be retained for a minimum of 5 years and shall be made available to the Department upon request.

31. The permittee shall keep records verifying whether each LDAR monitoring event was performed in accordance with Method 21 of 40 CFR Part 60, Appendix A. These records shall be retained for a minimum of 5 years and shall be made available to the Department upon request.

32. The permittee shall keep records of the date and time, identity of carbon canister (i.e., canister No. 1, No. 3 or No. 5) and the results of each primary carbon canister monitoring performed (that is, ppm inlet and ppm outlet, breakthrough yes or no) and shall specify at what part of the IPP process batch each primary carbon canister was monitored (such as, canister No. 5—mix tank volume displacement, canister No. 3—aborted goods hopper volume displacement, canister No. 1—hopper 307 discharge into coater, and the like). In addition, upon carbon canister breakthrough, the permittee shall keep records of the date and time the secondary carbon canister is moved into the primary carbon canister position and a new canister is placed in the secondary canister position. These records shall be retained for a minimum of five years and shall be made available to the Department upon request.

33. The permittee shall keep the following records associated with the LDAR program:

a. A list of identification numbers for the IPP equipment monitored under the LDAR program. Connectors/flanges need not be individually identified if all connectors/flanges in a designated area or length of pipe are identified as a group and the number of connectors is indicated.

b. Visual inspections shall be logged and dated.

c. When an equipment leak is detected, records shall be kept of the equipment identification number, operator name, initials, the date the leak was detected, the date of first attempt to repair the leak, the date of successful repair of the leak and the maximum monitoring instrument (HNU) reading after it is successfully repaired.

d. Monitored methylene chloride concentration from the pressure relief valve within 5 days after a pressure release.

e. Records shall be kept if a repair is delayed and the reasons for the delay of repair.

PREAMBLE 3

If required, a cleanup plan evaluates the abilities of potential remedies to achieve remedy requirements. A work plan for conducting a baseline remedial investigation is required by provisions of the act for compliance with selection of a special industrial area remediation. The baseline remedial investigation, based on the work plan, is compiled into the baseline environmental report to establish a reference point to show existing contamination, describe proposed remediation to be done and include a description of existing or potential public benefits of the use or reuse of the property. The Department may approve or disapprove plans and reports submitted. This notice provides the Department's decision and, if relevant, the basis for disapproval.

To expedite the processing of the applicant's request, the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) asks that the most up-to-date NOI package available be used. This package, as well as other DEP-wide and/or program-specific permit packages are available in Microsoft Word format at this same web location. Applicants can download the appropriate NOI to a personal computer, complete the NOI electronically and print the document for submittal to DEP using the following steps:

General Instructions. This package is designed to assist the applicant in completing the NOI identified above. Type or print clearly when completing the NOI. If the information requires more than the space allows, attach additional sheets as necessary. If a question is not applicable to the project, write NA in the appropriate box.

Who may use this NOI? This NOI may be used by eligible permittees seeking coverage under the Water Quality Management (WQM) General Permit For Sewer Extensions and Pump Stations. Sewer extensions serving over 250 equivalent dwelling units (EDUs) (or having the potential to serve over 250 EDUs or receiving flows of 65,500 gallons per day (gpd)), pump stations and force mains require a WQM Permit. Sewer extensions and pump stations and force mains, which are designed in accordance with DEP's *Domestic Wastewater Facilities Manual*, DEP ID: 362-0300-001, available on DEP's website at www.dep.state.pa.us, may be eligible for coverage under this General Permit. DEP may determine that an individual permit is required to ensure compliance with the Clean Water Act (CWA), the Clean Streams Law (CSL) or Title 25 of the Pa. Code.

This permit is only applicable for construction of a sewer extension or a pump station to serve less than 500 EDUs or 131,000 gpd. If more than one pump station is proposed within a system or if the proposed pump station will receive flow from more than one upstream pump station, an individual WQM Permit is required. An individual WQM Permit is also required if the proposed sewer extension or pump station will exceed the current or projected reserve capacity of the most limiting component between the proposed addition and the treatment facility.

Pumps used in laterals are **not** pumping stations. A lateral is the part of the drainage system carrying sewage from an individual structure or property to the public sewer system. Laterals are not covered by WQM Permits.

It is the responsibility of the wastewater facility owner to obtain the WQM Permit. The owner of the facility shall file an administratively complete, acceptable NOI with DEP prior to commencing construction and operation of a sewer extension or pump station. For further information regarding what permits are required for various

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activities, refer to *Guide to DEP Permits and Other Authorizations* (8000-BK-DEP0341), available on DEP's website.

The requirements for preparing applications and obtaining a WQM Permit are included in Title 25 Pa. Code Chapter 91 of DEP's Rules and Regulations.

If a stream crossing or other encroachment is involved, contact DEP's regional Water Quality Management Program.

Design Engineer's Report and Seal. A *Design Engineer's Report* as well as drawings and specifications showing clearly the proposed project and the basis of design shall accompany the application. The Registered Professional Engineer Certification, *Design Engineer's Report* and the front cover of each set of drawings and specifications prepared or used by the designer must bear the name, signature and seal of the registered professional engineer, authorized to practice in Pennsylvania, responsible for preparing the application. Each drawing must also bear the imprint, or reasonable facsimile, of this seal.

Where to Submit. Two (2) copies of the NOI form, *Design Engineer's Report* and supplemental information shall be submitted to the appropriate DEP regional office. See DEP offices at the end of the instructions.

Application Fee. A filing fee of \$100.00 must be submitted with the application in the form of a check (less than 10 days old) made payable to "Commonwealth of Pennsylvania." This fee is **not** required of state agencies.

Proof of Public Notice. The NOI must include the Act 537 planning approval letter.

Applicant Responsibility. It is the applicant's responsibility to demonstrate eligibility for coverage under the General Permit. The demonstration must be made as part of the NOI submittal.

DEFINITIONS

To provide the applicant with a better understanding of terminology, DEP has included the following definitions.

Client (Responsible Party). A client (also referred to as applicant or permittee) is a person or organization that requests approval from DEP to perform a regulated activity. Client information is documented and assigned an internal DEP Client ID# for tracking purposes.

Site (Place). A site is a physical location of importance to DEP. A site may include locations where a regulated facility is physically located or where a regulated activity occurs that has the potential to impact the health and safety of the citizens and/or the natural resources of the Commonwealth. A site is not solely defined by geographical location (can span several municipalities and even counties in some cases) but rather by the client/applicant's purpose of doing business. All DEP programs' involvement at a physical location of importance to DEP is grouped under one "entity"– site. This holistic view of site will promote an understanding of the interrelationships of facilities to support pollution prevention, multi-media inspections, a DEP-wide view of compliance, and public understanding and access of information. Site information is documented and assigned an internal DEP Site ID# for tracking purposes.

Site-to-Client Relationships. DEP will create internal records to relate (link) each site with all clients associated with the site and/or facilities.

Facility. A facility (also referred to as Primary Facility (PF)) is a logical bridge between sites and sub-facilities that allows DEP to provide a framework for a facility's/activity's regulation. PF is a way to group a program's involvement at a site (what it regulates) under one heading. For example: One area of the water program groups all of their involvement (regulated entities) under a PF type of "Water Pollution Control Facility." Facility information is documented and assigned an internal DEP Facility ID# for tracking purposes.

Authorization. Any DEP approval. For example: permits, plans, approvals, licenses, registrations, certifications, etc. Authorization information is documented and assigned an internal DEP Auth ID# for tracking purposes.

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CLIENT/OPERATOR INFORMATION

DEP Client ID#. DEP-wide unique identification number assigned by DEP to the client after client information is entered into DEP's computer system. This one number identifies the client regardless of the program with which the client is working. When replying to DEP, inclusion of this number will make it easier to process the request in a timely manner. If known, enter the Client ID#. Otherwise skip to the next request for information.

Client Type/Code. Enter the code that represents the type of client acting as the responsible authority for the permitted activity.

Organization Name or Registered Fictitious Name. Clients other than individuals must provide the name under which the activity or business is conducted for which the permit or other authorization will be issued.

Individuals should complete the "Organization Name" only if they conduct their business or activity under a name other than their own (for example, "Jones Construction Company," rather than "Mary Jones").

For partnerships, list the business name of the partnership as it appears on the legal partnership papers.

If the applicant is an individual(s) or partnership, also provide the appropriate information on the individual name lines.

Employer ID#. Also referred to as "Federal Tax ID#." The Employer ID# (EIN) aids DEP in identifying the organization and prevents duplicate data entry from occurring. This information is required.

Dun & Bradstreet ID#. (Optional) If known, supply the applicant's Dun & Bradstreet Identification Number.

Individual Last Name, First Name, MI, Suffix, Social Security Number. This information, with the exception of the SSN, must be provided for applicants who are individuals or partnerships. The SSN aids DEP in identifying the individual and prevents duplicate data entry, although it is optional. The SSN is not accessible by the public or other government agencies.

Additional Individual Last Name, First Name, MI, Suffix, Social Security Number. This information, with the exception of the SSN, must be provided for additional applicants who are individuals or partnerships. The SSN aids DEP in identifying the individual and prevents duplicate data entry, although it is optional. The SSN is not accessible by the public or other government agencies.

Mailing Address. The mailing address of the client identified above (this should not include locational data that is not appropriate for a mail piece). In addition to the street number and name, PO Box#, RR#, Box#, or Highway Contract# designations, use any appropriate designation and number to further define the mailing address of the applicant.

Client Contact Information. Clients that are organizations must provide the name of a person representing the client (organization). This client contact must be an employee of the organization and must be located at the mailing address of the client and may receive correspondence on behalf of the client. Include the individual's name, title, daytime phone number and e-mail address. DEP will use this contact information for maintaining client data. This individual should be a high-level employee such as CEO, VP, Operations Manager, etc. or someone capable of answering informational questions regarding the organization such as EIN, fictitious name ownership, address data, related organizations, corporate changes, etc. Project contact information should be entered in the Site Contact Information section found in the Site Information section.

SITE INFORMATION

DEP Site ID#. DEP-wide unique identification number assigned to the site after site information is entered into DEP's computer system. This one number identifies the site regardless of the program with which the applicant is working. When replying to DEP, inclusion of this number will make it easier to process the NOI in a timely manner. If known, enter the Site ID#. Otherwise skip to the next request for information.

Site Name. The name of the site at the specific physical location. Do not use abbreviations or acronyms.

EPA ID#. (Optional) Supply the EPA ID# for the site (this number is also referred to as a FINDS ID#).

Description of Site. Provide a written description of the proposed site (e.g., sewage treatment plant, toy factory, etc.).

County, Municipality, State. Indicate the county and municipality in which the site is located. Check the appropriate box to identify the type of municipality entered (city, borough, township).

Site Location. Provide the physical address of the location where the permitted activities will occur. No PO Box Numbers will be accepted for site location information. Provide the city (or municipality), state and the ZIP+4.

Detailed Written Directions to Site. When providing written directions, do not use PO Box address data. Include landmarks and approximate distances from the nearest highway.

Site Contact Information. Provide the name of the person having overall responsibility for environmental matters at the site. Include the individual's name, title, firm, mailing address, daytime phone number and e-mail address (optional).

Site-to-Client Relationship. Enter the relationship code that best describes how the client is related to the activity or operation at the site for which the permit is being sought.

For a Municipality - state, federal or other public agency - by either a principal executive officer, ranking elected official or other authorized employee. For purposes of this NOI, a principal executive officer of a federal agency includes:

- a. The chief executive officer of the agency, or
- b. A senior executive officer having responsibility for the overall operations of a principal geographic unit of the agency (e.g., Regional Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)).

If signed by a person other than the above, written notification of delegation of signatory authority must be submitted to DEP along with the NOI.

The certification signatures must be notarized.

Registered Professional Engineer. This section is to be completed by the registered professional engineer who prepares this NOI, accompanying report and supporting documentation, whichever are applicable.

PERMIT CONDITIONS

General

1. Consistent with DEP's technical guidance document *Conducting Technical Reviews of Water Quality Management Permit Wastewater Treatment Facilities*, DEP ID: 362-2000-007, available on DEP's website, DEP considers the registered professional engineer whose seal is affixed to the design documents to be fully responsible for the adequacy of all aspects of the facility's design.
2. The approval is specifically made contingent on the permittee acquiring all necessary property rights, by easement or otherwise, providing for the satisfactory construction, operation, maintenance and replacement of all sewers or sewerage structures in, along or across private property with full rights of ingress, egress and regress.
3. If, at any time, the sewer extension and/or pump station covered by this General Permit creates a public nuisance, including but not limited to, causing malodors or causing environmental harm to waters of the Commonwealth, DEP may require the permittee to adopt appropriate remedial measures to abate the nuisance or harm.
4. This permit does not relieve the permittee of its obligations to comply with all federal, interstate, state or local laws, ordinances and regulations applicable to the facilities.
5. This General Permit does not give any real or personal property rights or grant any exclusive privileges, nor shall it be construed to grant or confirm any right, easement or interest in, on, to, or over any lands which belong to the Commonwealth.
6. No discharge is authorized from these facilities unless approved by an NPDES Permit.

Construction

7. An Erosion and Sedimentation (E&S) Control Plan must be developed prior to construction of the permitted facility, pursuant to Title 25 Pa. Code Chapter 102, and implemented during and after the earth disturbance activity.
If the activity involves 5 or more acres of earth disturbance, or from 1 to 5 acres of earth disturbance with a point source discharge to surface waters of the Commonwealth, an NPDES Permit is required.
In addition to the state NPDES permitting requirements, some municipalities, through local ordinances, require the E&S Control Plan to be reviewed and approved by the local county conservation district office prior to construction. For specific information regarding E&S control planning approval and NPDES permitting requirements please contact your local county conservation district office.
8. The sewer extension and/or pump station shall be constructed under the supervision of a Pennsylvania registered professional engineer in accordance with the approved reports, plans and specifications. Any deviations from approved plans or specifications so revised should, therefore, be submitted well in advance of any construction work which will be affected by such changes to permit sufficient time for review and approval. Structural revisions or other minor changes not affecting capacities, flows or operations will be permitted during construction without approval.
9. The local waterways conservation officer of the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission (PFBC) shall be notified when the construction of any stream crossing and/or outfall is started and completed. A written permit must be secured from the PFBC if there is any use of explosives in any waterways and the permittee shall notify the local waterways conservation officer when explosives are to be used.
10. Manhole inverts shall be formed to facilitate the flow of the sewage and to prevent the stranding of sewage solids. The whole manhole structure shall be built to prevent undue infiltration, entrance of street wash or grit and provide safe access to facilitate manhole maintenance activities.

Operation and Maintenance

11. The permittee shall maintain sewer extension and/or pump station operation and maintenance (O&M) manuals at the facility and ensure proper O&M of the permitted facility. The permittee shall file the O&M manuals with DEP upon request.
12. Stormwater from roofs, foundation drains, basement drains or other sources shall not be admitted directly to the sewer extension or pump station.
13. The sewer extension shall have adequate foundation support as soil conditions require. Trenches shall be back-filled to ensure that sewers will have proper structural stability, with minimal settling and adequate protection against breakage. Concrete used in connection with these sewers shall be protected from damage by water, freezing, drying or other harmful conditions until cured.
14. The approved sewer extensions and/or pump stations shall be maintained in good condition, kept free of deposits by flushing or other cleaning methods and repaired when necessary.
15. The sewer extension and/or pump station shall be properly operated and maintained so that the facility will perform as designed.
16. The attention of the permittee is called to the highly explosive nature of certain gases generated by the digestion of sewage solids when these gases are mixed in proper proportions with air and to the highly toxic character of certain gases arising from such digestion or from sewage in poorly ventilated compartments or sewers. Therefore, at all places throughout the facilities where hazard of fire, explosion or danger from toxic gases may occur, the permittee shall post conspicuous permanent and legible warnings. The permittee shall instruct all employees concerning the aforesaid hazards, first aid and emergency methods of meeting such hazards and shall make all necessary equipment and material accessible.
17. There shall be no physical connection between a public water supply system and a sewer or appurtenance to it which would permit the passage of any sewage or polluted water into the potable water supply. No water pipe shall pass through or come in contact with any part of the sewer extension and/or pump station.
18. Collected screenings, slurries, sludge and other solids shall be handled and disposed of in compliance with Title 25 Pa. Code, Chapters 271, 273, 275, 283 and 285 (related to permits and requirements for land filling, land application, incineration and storage of sewage sludge), Federal Regulations 40 CFR Part 257 and the Federal Clean Water Act and its amendments.

GENERAL PERMIT FOR SEWER EXTENSIONS AND PUMP STATIONS**

DEP's regulations at Title 25 Pa. Code §91.27 provide for the issuance of a General Permit. A General Permit is allowed when:

- A. The same, or substantially similar, types of operations are involved.
- B. The same types of waste are being treated.
- C. The same operating conditions are required.
- D. In the judgment of DEP, the discharges are more appropriately controlled under the General Permit than under individual permits.

NOTICE OF INTENT (NOI) FOR COVERAGE UNDER THE GENERAL PERMIT AND ADMINISTRATION OF THE PERMIT

Any applicant who wishes to be covered by the General Permit must file an NOI for coverage with DEP. If the NOI is accepted, DEP will formally notify the applicant of the coverage by transmitting a copy of the General Permit bearing an individual identification number. Notice of each NOI approval will be published by DEP in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The applicant also has the obligation under §510-5 of the Administrative Code (71 P.S. §510-5) to give written notice to the municipality in which the facility is located.

Construction and operation of a sewer extension and/or pump station is NOT authorized by the General Permit when one or more of the following conditions exist:

- A. The proposed design is not consistent with DEP's *Domestic Wastewater Facilities Manual*, DEP ID: 362-0300-001, available on DEP's website.
- B. The applicant is not, or will not be, in compliance with any of the conditions of the General Permit.
- C. The applicant has failed and continues to fail to comply, or has shown a lack of ability or intention to comply, with a prior permit issued by DEP.
- D. DEP determines that such action is necessary for any other reason to ensure compliance with the Clean Water Act, The Clean Streams Law, or Title 25 of the Pa. Code.

DEP may revoke or suspend previously issued coverage under the General Permit and require the permittee to obtain an individual WQM Permit for any of the reasons above. In addition, any interested person may petition DEP to take this action.

If DEP requires a permittee to obtain an individual WQM Permit, the discharger must submit a complete WQM Permit application within 90 days of receipt of the notification. Failure to submit the application within 90 days shall result in automatic termination of coverage under the General Permit. Timely submission of a complete application shall result in continuation of coverage of the applicable facilities under the General Permit, when the facility demonstrates that it has undertaken efforts to address the reasons for the revocation or suspension of coverage, until DEP takes final action on the pending permit application.

As in the case of individual WQM Permits, General Permits may be issued, amended, suspended, revoked, reissued or terminated in accordance with Title 25 Pa. Code Chapter 91.

PUBLIC NOTICE OF GENERAL PERMIT AND PUBLIC HEARING

Public notice of the General Permit will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

There will be a 30-day comment period during which interested persons may submit written comments or petition for a public hearing. All written comments received during the 30-day comment period will be considered in the formulation of the final permit. The period for comment may be extended, at the discretion of DEP, for one additional 15-day period.

A hearing will be held if there is significant public interest in holding a hearing. If a public hearing is to be held, DEP will publish a notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and in at least one newspaper of general circulation within the geographic areas of the proposed facility. This notice will be published at least 30 days before the hearing.

TYPE OF OPERATION AND AREA OF APPLICABILITY

The *Water Quality Management General Permit for Sewer Extensions and Pump Stations* applies to eligible sewer extensions and pump stations located in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania meeting the requirements of the General Permit.

COVERAGE UNDER GENERAL PERMIT

As NOIs are received, they will be reviewed to see if coverage under the General Permit is appropriate. DEP will notify the applicant of its findings either in the form of a General Permit coverage letter and copy of the General Permit with a unique WQM Permit number or a denial of the General Permit coverage letter.

Laboratories Approved to Determine Blood Alcohol Content Under the Clinical Laboratory Act, the Vehicle Code, the Fish and Boat Code and the Game and Wildlife Code

The following laboratories are licensed by the Department of Health (Department) under the Clinical Laboratory Act (35 P.S. §§ 2151—2165) and are currently approved by the Department under 28 Pa. Code §§ 5.50 and 5.103 (relating to approval to provide special analytical services; and blood tests for blood alcohol content) to perform alcohol analyses of blood and/or serum and plasma. This approval is based on demonstrated proficiency in periodic tests conducted by the Department's Bureau of Laboratories.

Since procedures for determining the alcohol content of serum and plasma are identical and results obtained from serum or plasma derived from a blood sample are the same, laboratories that demonstrate reliability in the analysis of serum proficiency testing specimens are approved to analyze both serum and plasma. These laboratories are also approved and designated under the provisions of the Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1547 and 3755 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance; and reports by emergency room personnel), the Fish and Boat Code, 30 Pa.C.S. § 5125 (relating to chemical testing to determine amount of alcohol or controlled substance), and the Game and Wildlife Code, 34 Pa.C.S. § 2502 (relating to chemical test to determine amount of alcohol) as qualified to perform the types of specialized services which will reflect the presence of alcohol in blood and/or serum and plasma. Laboratories located outside this Commonwealth may not provide blood and/or serum and plasma alcohol testing services in this Commonwealth unless they are specifically licensed by the Department under the Clinical Laboratory Act.

Persons seeking forensic blood and/or serum and plasma analysis services from the following designated laboratories should determine that the laboratory employs techniques and procedures acceptable for forensic purposes and that the director of the facility is agreeable to performing determinations for this purpose. The list of approved laboratories will be revised approximately semi-annually and published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The name of a laboratory is sometimes changed but the location, personnel and testing procedures of the facility remain unchanged. When changes of this type occur, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number does not change. If questions arise about the identity of a laboratory due to a name change, the Clinical Laboratory Permit number should be used as the primary identifier. To assist in identifying a laboratory that performed a test if the name of the facility changed, the Clinical Laboratory Permit numbers of the facilities are included in the lists of approved laboratories above the name of the laboratory at the time the list was prepared.

The Department's blood alcohol and serum/plasma alcohol proficiency testing programs are approved by the United States Department of Health and Human Services in accordance with the requirements contained in the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 (42 CFR 493.901 and 493.937) which are administered by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services. Participation in these programs may therefore be used to

demonstrate acceptable performance for approval purposes under both Federal and Commonwealth statutes.

Unemployment Compensation Benefit Rate Table

The purpose of this notice is to effect the automatic extension of the Unemployment Compensation Benefit Rate Table. Each year the maximum weekly benefit rate is calculated as 66 2/3% of the average weekly wage in covered employment for the preceding fiscal year. The maximum weekly benefit rate for unemployment compensation purposes in this Commonwealth during calendar year 2005 will be \$478.

Under the authority contained in sections 201 and 404(e)(2) of the Unemployment Compensation Law (43 P. S. §§ 761 and 804(e)(2)) and 34 Pa. Code § 65.111 (relating to benefit table), the table for 2005 is being adopted by this notice and will be codified in 34 Pa. Code Chapter 65, Appendix A. See 14 Pa.B. 4688 (December 29, 1984).

Under section 404(e)(2) of the Unemployment Compensation Law, this table is effective for claimants whose benefit year begins on or after January 2, 2005.

Medical Assistance Program; Prior Authorization List

The purpose of this notice is to announce that the Department of Public Welfare (Department) will add an item to the Medical Assistance (MA) Program's list of services requiring prior authorization.

Section 443.6(b)(7) of the Public Welfare Code (62 P. S. § 443.6(b)(7)) authorizes the Department to add items and services to the list of services requiring prior authorization by publication of notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The MA Program will require prior authorization of prescriptions for Proton Pump Inhibitors (PPIs) dispensed on and after February 7, 2005, that meet any of the following conditions:

1. The prescription is for a PPI other than Prilosec Over-The-Counter (OTC), including prescription brand name Prilosec and generic Omeprazole.
2. The prescription is for Prilosec OTC and Prilosec OTC was prescribed for 4 months in the preceding 180 days.
3. The prescription for Prilosec OTC is for a quantity greater than 84 tablets per month, or a dosage greater than 40 mg per day, or both.

Exception: Prior authorization is not required for the following:

1. Oral liquid or IV forms of PPIs for recipients under 15 years of age and 65 years of age or older.
2. Omeprazole, 10 mg, limit one tablet per day.
3. Alternative preparations such as dissolvable or orally soluble forms of PPIs for recipients under 15 years of age.

Fiscal Impact

The estimated savings for Fiscal Year 2004-2005 is \$1.875 million (\$0.879 million in State funds). The estimated savings for Fiscal Year 2005-2006 is \$7.500 million (\$3.449 million in State funds).

**Department of Transportation Regulation No.
18-378 (IRRC No. 2434)**

**Access to and Occupancy of Highways by
Driveways, Local Roads and Structures
January 3, 2005**

We submit for your consideration the following comments that include references to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5b) which have not been met. The Department of Transportation (Department) must respond to these comments when it submits the final-form regulation. The public comment period for this regulation closed on December 1, 2004. If the final-form regulation is not delivered within two years of the close of the public comment period, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

1. General.—Fiscal impact; Reasonableness; Implementation procedure; Clarity.

Actions or requests by the Department

Multiple provisions throughout the proposed regulation indicate that the Department will take or require applicants or permittees to take some type of action. For example, the traffic impact study must include a description of proposed remedies pursuant to Section 441.3a(c)(5)(iii). Clause (B) states the Department will determine if a proposed remedy is acceptable. It is unclear when this determination will be made, and how the Department will notify an applicant of its determination.

Similar provisions in the regulation direct the Department to make determinations, request additional information or changes, approve actions, issue opinions or take actions that become mandates with which a permittee, applicant or other regulated party must comply. Additional examples of these provisions include:

We recognize that discretion and flexibility are necessary because each access by a property to a state highway may be unique and raise different concerns with traffic flow and other conditions. However, discretion and flexibility to respond to unique conditions must also be balanced with a format that provides some direction concerning when and how objectives will be accomplished. We have two concerns.

First, there is no indication of when the Department will take specific actions. For example, when would the Department notify an applicant or permittee of the need for a “curb or other approved structures to be constructed” under Section 441.8(g)(3). The regulation should clearly indicate the time periods in which the Department may act under these various provisions.

Second, there is no indication of how the Department will notify applicants, permittees or other affected parties of its actions. At a minimum, the regulation should state that the Department will notify the affected parties in writing.

Section 441.3a(b) Scoping meeting

Section 441.3a(b)(4) states: “The applicant will receive direction from the Department at the scoping meeting.” From discussion with the Department, many of the items noted above are discussed with the applicant at the scoping meeting. However, these meetings are at the request of the applicant. In addition, Section 441.3a(b)(5) limits the subject matter at a scoping meeting to concerns involving the traffic impact study. The Department should consider expanding these meetings to cover other areas in the regulation where the Department needs to provide direction to an applicant.

Improving state highways and fair cost distribution

A commentator raises the concern that the traffic impact study requirements in Section 441.3(s) will impose unfair costs on permittees. The proposed regulation could compel permittees to pay for improvements of existing poor road conditions. If the road is in poor condition before the access project is initiated, the permittee is not the only one who will benefit from improvements in the highway. The Department should consider other methods to equitably distribute the costs of improving poor road conditions among property owners and others who will benefit.

2. Section 441.1. Definitions.—Reasonableness; Clarity.

AASHTO and TRB

The definitions of the “American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO)” and “Transportation Research Board, National Research Council (TRB)” include the phrase “currently located in Washington, D.C.” This phrase is not helpful to the reader. The definitions should provide the full current address like what was done in the definition of the “central permit office.”

Highway, local road, and roadway

The proposed regulation and existing language in Chapter 441 contain definitions of “highway,” “local road” or “roadway.” We have concerns with each definition and with their relationships to each other.

First, the term “highway” is defined in the existing portion of Chapter 441 as “[A] highway or bridge on the system of State highways and bridges, including the entire width between right-of-way lines, over which the Department has assumed or has been legislatively given

jurisdiction.” This definition is circular since the term “highway” is used to define itself.

The definition of “local road” includes the statement “[a] public highway other than a State highway” The term “public highway” is not defined. In addition, the word “highway” is already defined as part of the “State highways.” Hence, the use of the term “highway” in this definition is confusing. A commentator has expressed an additional concern with new language in the definition of “local road” that includes “an access for which the owner intends to transfer or dedicate ownership to a governmental body after completion of the permitted work.” This language is problematic since it is local ordinances that would allow such a transfer under certain conditions. The owner’s intent would not be sufficient to accomplish the transfer. The Department should explain this new language or delete it.

The definition of “roadway” is “[t]hat portion of a highway or local road improved, designed or ordinarily used for vehicular travel, exclusive of the sidewalk or shoulder.” The Department has indicated that a “roadway” also includes auxiliary lanes. The definition should be amended to reflect this fact. In addition, does a “highway” or “local road” include a “roadway”? If so and since “roadway” is defined with more detail than “highway” or “local road,” the term “roadway” could be used in part to define “highway” and “local road.”

Plans

The definition of “plans” ends with the phrase “and other details the Department deems appropriate.” Instead of using this phrase, the “other details” should be included in the substantive provisions of the regulation with a cross-reference in the definition.

3. Section 441.3. Permit application procedure.—Consistency with the statute; Reasonableness; Clarity.

Subsection (b) Authorization of local governments to issue permits

This subsection allows the Department to enter into agreements with “local governments” to issue permits. The authorizing statute (36 P. S. § 670-420) uses the term “municipality” instead of “local governments.” For consistency with the statute, the final-form regulation should use the term “municipality.”

Subsection (e) Submission of a completed application

Applicants are instructed by this subsection to submit applications to either the district or county office or the municipality. How can an applicant determine where to submit the application?

Subsection (m) Impact on other property owners

Under this subsection, two commentators expressed concerns related to Paragraph (3). One commentator believes local governments should be exempt from the additional security requirements. Another believes the provision relating to “a form and amount acceptable to the Department” is too vague. We have three questions. What is the reason for not exempting local governments from this requirement? How will the Department determine what is an acceptable form and amount of security? How will the applicant be notified?

Subsection (n) Impact on sensitive or unique property

The phrase “State and Federal environmental requirements” is used in this subsection. A cross-reference should be provided that specifies these requirements.

Subsection (o) Review by governmental bodies

This subsection relates to review by governmental bodies. The phrase “governmental bodies” should be defined in the final-form regulation. Also, the phrase “municipalities and their political subdivisions” is not clear because municipalities do not have political subdivisions.

Under Subsection (o)(5), a governmental body can request to review an application. The Department has indicated that the request to review should be made before the permit is issued and the work begins because it is the only time the governmental body can submit meaningful input. Therefore, final-form regulation should include a timeframe in which governmental bodies can request to review an application.

Subsection (p) Impact on archeological and historic property

This subsection requires the applicant to notify the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission if the proposed work will require the construction or widening of a lane or right-of-way 60 days prior to submission of the application. A commentator questioned the need for a 60 day review period and noted the potential time delay this requirement could cause. What is the need for this review period that must occur before the submission of the application? Would a shorter or concurrent period suffice?

Subsection (s) Traffic impact study

Subsection (s)(1)(iii) states that a traffic impact study will be required, if “[i]n the opinion of the Department, the development is expected to have significant impact on highway safety or traffic flow even though it does not meet subparagraph (i) or (ii).” What is meant by a “significant impact”?

4. Section 441.3a. Preparation of a traffic impact study.—Reasonableness; Clarity.

Traffic impact studies assist the Department in determining if the plans or proposals of the applicant are acceptable. The regulation does not specify when the Department must make these determinations. How long will the Department need to analyze a traffic impact study and how will the Department notify the applicant if it is acceptable? What are the criteria for acceptable plans and proposals?

Subsection (a) General rule

Subsection (a)(2) details who must conduct a study and includes the phrase “other persons authorized by law.” The Department should either list all the other professions that are allowed to conduct a study or delete this phrase from the final-form regulation. The same phrase appears in Section 441.3b(a)(2), relating to preparation of drainage impact study, and we recommend that this section likewise be amended.

Subsection (c) Traffic impact study contents and scope

Subsections (c)(3) and (c)(4) pertain to future traffic conditions with and without development. They require the applicant to describe the ability of the roadway network within the study area to accommodate traffic for the ensuing ten years beyond the opening of the development and other time periods as directed by the Department. What is the “roadway network” and how is the study area determined? Furthermore, why should the study be based on the ability of the roadway to accommodate traffic ten years into the future as opposed to when the development is completed?

Under Subsection (c)(3)(i), what are Metropolitan Planning Organizations or Local Development Districts? These terms should be defined in the final-form regulation.

Subsection(c)(5) references certain "Levels of Service." The Department explained that levels of service range between A and F and rate how a roadway handles traffic. This phrase should be defined in the final-form regulation.

5. Section 441.3b. Preparation of drainage impact report.—Reasonableness; Clarity.

Subsections (b)(1) and (b)(6)(iii) contain the phrases "other pertinent information" and "pertinent policy directives." This information should be listed in the final-form regulation.

Subsection (b)(6)(iv) states that hydraulic computations must be developed "in accordance with procedures and criteria acceptable to the Commonwealth or governmental bodies." The final-form regulation should list the various state agencies or governmental bodies that would have oversight and list or cross-reference the procedures and criteria that would be acceptable.

Under Subsection (b)(7), the drainage impact report must include a description of proposed actions that will remedy identified deficiencies related to flow rate and flow velocity. It states that remedies "may not include projects programmed by the Commonwealth or other governmental bodies." This differs from Section 441.3a(c)(5)(iii)(A), relating to traffic impact studies, which allows remedies to include "projects programmed by the Commonwealth or governmental bodies." We recommend that this subsection be amended to provide for collaboration or integration with other projects that have completion dates that coincide with the applicant's access project.

6. Section 441.4. Permit fees and costs.—Reasonableness; Implementation procedure; Clarity.

In Subsection (d), the Department can assess additional fees if it anticipates that its costs will exceed by a "significant amount" the application or permit fees. How will the Department decide what is a "significant amount"?

7. Section 441.5. Issuance of permits.—Reasonableness; Implementation procedure; Clarity.

Subsection (f) Permit requiring agreement/security

Subsection (f)(2) is one long sentence that contains 116 words. The sentence describes the contents of an agreement between the Department and an applicant. The contents should be set forth with shorter sentences and enumeration as recommended in Section 2.8 and Chapter 7 of the *Pennsylvania Code and Bulletin Style Manual*.

Subsection (j) Photo documentation

Subsection (j)(3) allows the Department to create its own photo documentation and charge the permittee for the costs. This occurs after the Department receives photos from the permittee that are not discernible or otherwise acceptable. As written, the paragraph allows the Department to return the photos to the permittee for resubmission or obtain its own photo documentation and charge the permittee for the cost. Rather than give the Department the option, the regulation should require that the Department notify the permittee of the need to submit better photo documentation before the Department obtains its own photos and charges the permittee for the expense.

8. Section 441.6. General conditions.—Reasonableness; Implementation procedure; Clarity; Statutory Authority.

Paragraph (1) Scope of permit

Under Paragraph (1)(v), the permittee and the property owner will be liable for failure to comply with the permit and this chapter. Section 441.5(b) states that permits will be issued only to the owners of the property. Since permits can only be issued to property owners, what is the need to list both "permittee and the property owner" in this paragraph? We note this phrase is used throughout this chapter and suggest that the Department be consistent with any changes it makes to this phrase.

Paragraph (1)(vii) allows the Department to require changes to an access, structure or associated highway work or improvements. Can these changes be mandated after the permitted work has been completed?

Clause (B) of Paragraph (1)(vii) states that the Department may require a new application. Will an additional application fee be charged?

Paragraph (4) Permittee responsibilities

Paragraph (4)(viii) describes actions the Department could take if a permittee or property owner does not pay an invoice for work performed by the Department. It states that an unpaid bill will "constitute a first lien on the real and personal property of the permittee or owner of the property on which the access or structure is located." If a lending institution or other party already has a "first lien" on a property, what is the Department's statutory authority for replacing that lien with its own?

In addition, this paragraph states that the Department may also "revoke and annul the permit." We have three questions. What is the difference between revoking and annulling a permit? Will the permittee or property owner have an opportunity for a hearing before their permit is revoked and/or annulled? Under what circumstances would a permit be annulled?

Paragraph (16) Future additional driveways

Paragraph (16)(iv) includes a sentence that states, in part, the following: "If the applicant demonstrates that a release cannot be reasonably obtained from each affected property owner . . ." How will an applicant demonstrate that its attempt has been reasonable?

9. Section 441.8. Driveway design requirements.—Reasonableness; Implementation procedure; Fiscal impact; Clarity.

Subsection (a) General

Subsection (a)(1) states that the design of a driveway must take into consideration the amount and type of traffic it is expected to serve and the type and character of the road it accesses. This rulemaking adds the phrase "and other nearby highways" to the last provision. How will the applicant know what other highways to consider?

Subsection (h) Sight distance

Subsection (h)(1)(iv) includes the following sentence: "The owner should locate a driveway at a point which provides optimal sight distance." The word "should" indicates that this provision is optional. Optional provisions should not be included in regulations. Therefore, the word should be changed to "shall."

Subsection (i) Grade of access

Subsection (i)(5)(i) states, in part, the following: "Depressed curb is preferable to the alternative of extending

curb around the driveway radii . . .” This language is not regulatory language and should be deleted from the regulation or replaced with a mandate.

Subsection (k) Access pavement

Subsection (k)(2) relates to low, medium and high volume driveways and local roads which provide access to paved highways. It requires these accesses to be paved “from the pavement edge to at least 20 feet beyond the right-of-way and joints shall be sealed.” A commentator noted that the current regulations do not require local roads to comply with this provision. Will these requirements apply to existing roads? If so, who is responsible for paying for these improvements?

Subsection (m) Medians

Subsection (m)(3) states the following: “Requests for removal of a median divisor will not be granted without approval of the district executive or higher Departmental authority.” When and why would approval of a higher Departmental authority be required? How will the permittee know to whom they should make the request?

Subsection (p) Required right-of-way

This subsection states that the Department may require the applicant to acquire additional right-of-way and “may require the applicant to utilize property acquisition policies, practices and procedures of the Department.” The final-form regulation should provide cross-references to the appropriate policies, practices and procedures.

10. Section 441.10. Penalties and enforcement.—Reasonableness; Implementation procedure; Clarity.

Subparagraph (a)(4)(ii) states that written notice will not have to be provided to a permittee or property owner if it is “impracticable.” Under what circumstances would it be impractical for the Department to notify a permittee or property owner of an action?

11. Miscellaneous Clarity.

The phrase “in a form acceptable to the Department” or “techniques acceptable to the Department” or variations of these phrases are used throughout the regulation. The regulation should provide guidance on what is considered an acceptable form. Examples of these phrases can be found in the following sections: 441.3 (m)(1)—(m)(3); 441.3a(c)(2)(i)—(vi); 441.6(16)(iv); and 441.8(j)(4), (m)(4) and (p).

The phrase “applicant or Department” is used throughout the regulation. How will the affected parties know when they have a duty to act? Examples of this phrase can be found in the following sections: 441.3 (m)(1), (n), (p); 441.3a(c)(2); 441.6(16)(iv); 441.7(d); and 441.8(j)(5).

In § 441.6(4)(iii)(C), what is “flowable fill material”? The term “crashworthy” is used in § 441.6(10). What does this term mean?

Under § 441.8(d), the word “must” should be replaced with the word “may.”

Department of Labor and Industry Regulation No. 12-58 (IRRC No. 2443)

Boiler and Unfired Pressure Vessel Regulations

January 5, 2005

We submit for your consideration the following comments that include references to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5b) which have not

been met. The Department of Labor and Industry (Department) must respond to these comments when it submits the final-form regulation. The public comment period for this regulation closed on December 6, 2004. If the final-form regulation is not delivered within 2 years of the close of the public comment period, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

1. Section 3a.1. Definitions.—Consistency with the statute and other regulations; Clarity.

ASME Code

A commentator suggested a correction to this definition to fully reference the pertinent code of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers (ASME). The words “Rules for Construction of Power Boilers” should be replaced with “The Boiler and Pressure Vessel Code” in the final-form regulation.

Certificate of competency

In this definition, the noun “inspector” should be replaced with the verb “inspect.”

Process boiler

This definition in the regulation differs from the statutory definition. The final-form regulation should use the statutory definition in section 2 of the Boiler and Unfired Pressure Vessel Law (Act) (35 P. S. § 1331.2) or reference the statutory definition.

2. Section 3a.3. Scope.—Consistency with other regulations; Clarity.

Subsection (c) reads, “. . . when the heat exchanger operates at 16 psi or greater, and has 5 cubic feet of volume . . .” To increase technical accuracy of subsection (c), the words “or more” should be placed after the words “5 cubic feet” in the final-form regulation.

In Subsection (d), there is more than one subparagraph labeled as (3). This enumeration error should be corrected in the final-form regulation.

Subsection (d)(10) begins with the following sentence:

Unfired pressure vessels designed to ASME Code section VIII, Division 1 which *meet* one of the following specifications: [Emphasis added.]

A commentator suggested that the word “meet” should be replaced with “do not exceed” in this subsection. We concur.

3. Section 3a.5. Examination for inspector commission.—Reasonableness; Implementation procedure; Clarity.

Subsection (a) states that the Department will conduct the National Board of Boiler and Pressure Vessel Inspectors (National Board) examinations. Subsection (b) indicates that the Department will also conduct a Pennsylvania certificate of competency examination. The role and purpose of these two examinations are unclear. It is our understanding that the Department administers the two different examinations and applicants are required to pass both. The final-form regulation should clearly state that applicants are required to pass these two examinations and how and when each examination will be administered.

Subsection (a)(1) requires that an applicant for examination as a boiler inspector must “meet the National Board rules and regulations, and its education and experience requirements.” The final-form regulation should contain specific references to the pertinent regulations and requirements of the National Board.

Subsection (b)(2) contains a specific list of education and experience prerequisites for those who apply to take the Pennsylvania certificate of competency examination. This list should be moved to the beginning of the section to alert potential applicants of the basic requirements they need to fulfill to qualify to apply for the examination.

4. Section 3a.6. Certificate of competency, commission, credential card and renewal application.—Clarity.

Subsection (a) states, “[t]he Department will issue a certificate of competency, credential card and commission to an applicant who passes an examination for inspector.” Since § 3a.5 includes two different examinations, this section should also clearly affirm that an applicant needs to pass both examinations.

5. Section 3a.8. Reciprocity.—Clarity.

A commentator noted an inconsistency between Subsections (a) and (b). As written, the first subsection would allow a person without a National Board commission to obtain a reciprocal commission in Pennsylvania. However, Subsection (b) requires an applicant for reciprocal commission to submit a copy of his National Board commission. This inconsistency should be corrected in the final-form regulation.

6. Section 3a.24. Boiler controls.—Implementation procedure; Clarity.

The effective date of this section is not stated. It is unclear whether this section applies to boilers installed before effective dates of the national standards or this regulation. The effective date for this section should be specified in the final-form regulation.

7. Section 3a.26. Valves and safety devices.—Clarity.

Subsection (a) refers to § 3a.152 (relating to safety appliances) which is located in a different Subchapter that sets forth rules for unfired pressure vessels installed before September 1, 1937. It is our understanding that the intent of the Department is to have the safety requirements in § 3a.152 apply to all boilers and vessels not just those installed in and before 1937. For this reason, we suggest that the substantive provisions of § 3a.152 be moved to Subchapter B relating to requirements for boilers and unfired pressure vessels. The appropriate cross-reference can be placed in § 3a.152 to insure that the substantive requirements are also applied to the older units.

8. Section 3a.37. Special design.—Clarity.

Subsection (a) reads:

(a) The owner or user of a new boiler or unfired pressure vessel having unusual features of special design intended for installation and operation in this Commonwealth *may* submit all of the following to the Department for approval:

(1) *Duplicate* complete specifications. [Emphasis added.]

There are two concerns. First, there appears to be a conflict between this section and its description in the preamble. According to the preamble, this section “requires owners and operators to submit construction specifications and plans for Department approval prior to the installation” However, the first paragraph of this section uses the word “may” rather than “shall.” The use of the word “may” implies that the provision is optional for owners or users of units with unusual features of special design. The proposed regulation needs to be clear

in stating that owners or users must submit the required information to the Department.

Second, it is unclear what is meant by the phrase “duplicate complete specifications.” It is our understanding that one copy of the complete manufacturer’s specifications is needed by the Department. These items should be clarified in the final-form regulation.

9. Section 3a.81. Major repairs and alterations.—Reasonableness; Clarity.

This section describes the procedures and requirements for repairs to a boiler or unfired pressure vessel. Subsection (b) states that a manufacturer or repair company may not perform certain repairs without holding an “R” stamp. However, subsection (c) includes the following sentences:

A manufacturer holding the appropriate ASME Code stamp may alter a boiler or vessel. A manufacturer holding an ASNI/NB 23 “R” stamp may perform alterations to other vessels.

These two sentences appear to limit alterations or repairs to manufacturers who hold the appropriate ASME or “R” stamp. We acknowledge that anyone who makes repairs or alterations should hold the appropriate stamp. But, is it the Department’s intent to limit alterations or repairs to manufacturers, or can a repair company or anyone with the appropriate stamp also make alterations? If anyone with the appropriate ASME or “R” stamp can make alterations and repairs, this should be clearly stated in the final-form regulation.

In addition, a typographical error is repeated in subsections (b) and (c). Both use the acronym “ASNI/NB 23” which should be “ANSI/NB 23.” The later term is defined in Section 3a.1 as the “National Board Inspection Code, 2001 edition, issued by the National Board of Boiler and Pressure Vessel Inspectors.” The term “ANSI” is defined in Section 3a.1 as the “American National Standards Institute.” The error should be corrected in the final-form regulation.

10. Section 3a.93. Insurance notification.—Reasonableness; Implementation procedure; Need; Clarity.

A commentator questioned the practicality of this requirement since many users of boilers are unaware of insurance changes that occur at the corporate level. We question the need for and effectiveness of this section. The Act is silent concerning this type of notice requirement. The Department should explain how it would use this information or delete the provision from the final-form regulation.

11. Section 3a.94. Accident notification.—Reasonableness; Consistency with statute; Clarity.

Subsection (a) refers to section 16 of the Act and mirrors the statutory directive that an owner or user must “immediately notify” the Department of an accident. We have three concerns.

First, Section 16 of the Act includes the word “operator” among those who must notify the Department. Rather than limit the contact to the owner or user, this subsection should fully reflect the Act by including the term “operator.”

Second, if the Department interprets “immediately notify” as within 24 hours, this specific standard should be in the regulation.

Third, the final-form regulation should include a number or title for the “Department prescribed form” and indicate where and how owners, users or operators can obtain copies of the form. For example, will it be available on the Department’s website?

12. Section 3a.96. Condemnation.—Clarity.

In Subsections (a) and (b), it is unclear whether the “XX” will cover over or be above the existing stamping from the Commonwealth or National Board. If the “XX” are to cover over the existing stamping, this needs to be expressly stated in the final-form regulation.

The second sentence of subsection (b) is missing the word “be” between the words “will” and “at least.” This correction should be made in the final-form regulation.

13. Section 3a.100. Notice of deficiency.—Reasonableness; Implementation procedure; Clarity.

Subsection (a)(2) includes this sentence: “The Department may inspect the boiler or unfired pressure vessel to verify the corrective action or repair.” Are there specific circumstances in which the Department will conduct an inspection? If so, the circumstances in which an inspection will occur for any provision in this section should be described in the final-form regulation.

14. Section 3a.111. Field inspections.—Reasonableness; Implementation procedure; Clarity.

This section gives the impression that the Department will be conducting all inspections. However, this is not the case. Field inspections may also be conducted by insurance inspectors. This section should be changed in the final-form regulation to reflect this fact.

Subsections (d) and (h) state, “an inspector may require an internal inspection because of a vessel’s age or condition.” Department staff members indicate that the inspector will notify the operator, owner or user of the need for an internal inspection verbally during the external inspection or later in writing. This notification process should be described in the final-form regulation.

15. Subchapter H. Special Installations.—Implementation procedure; Clarity.

This subchapter includes 11 sections (§§ 3a.161—3a.171). These sections set forth the applicable national standards and other requirements for different types of equipment which include:

Modular boilers;
 Portable boilers;
 Fired coil water heaters and instantaneous water heaters;
 Storage water heaters;
 Steam/hot water coil storage water heater;
 Miniature boilers and kitchen equipment;
 Hot water/steam heat exchangers;
 Autoclaves and quick opening vessels;
 Fuel trains and piping systems;
 Swimming pool heaters; and
 Locomotive boilers.

Only one of these sections (§ 3a.168 relating to autoclaves and quick opening vessels) specifically mentions inspectors. Subchapter D includes specific provisions on inspections but does not reference Subchapter H or the equipment types in Subchapter H. Hence, it is unclear what, if any, inspection requirements apply to Subchapter H beyond what is expressly mentioned in § 3a.168. The

inspection requirements for this subchapter should be included in the final-form regulation.

Parties may appear with or without counsel and offer relevant testimony or evidence. In some cases, the Insurance Commissioner (Commissioner) may order that the company reimburse an insured for the higher cost of replacement insurance coverage obtained while the appeal is pending. 2004 and 2005 Project Priority List**

The Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority (PENNVEST) and the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) have amended the combined Federal fiscal year (FY) 2004/2005 Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) Project Priority List (List) of drinking water projects.

The FY 2004/2005 List was prepared in conformance with the requirements of the Safe Drinking Water Act Amendments of 1996 (act) and Federal guidance. The act stipulates that states must maintain a Project Priority List of drinking water projects from which to develop the annual DWSRF Intended Use Plan (IUP) list of projects to be funded.

The projects added to the List will not replace any project on the previously published FY 2004/2005 List. Projects were placed in the appropriate ranking slot in relation to other rated and ranked projects on the List. The rank order standing of projects on the List does not dictate the order in which projects are chosen for funding in the DWSRF program. A project's readiness to proceed and the reasonable availability of alternative sources of funds have a bearing on project selection for funding in the program.

Some projects added to the FY 2004/2005 List are expected to proceed to construction in the near future, and others are being added as potential projects for future construction loan consideration. The projects expected to be ready for loan funding in the near future have submitted applications for funding and may be placed on an IUP to (1) replace projects that have not proceeded timely toward initiation of project construction and/or (2) to fill funding gaps that have developed as a result of cost savings. Projects removed from an IUP will remain on the List and be considered for DWSRF loan funds in the future.

Interested persons are invited to express their views on the priority rating or ranking of projects on the amended FY 2004/2005 List.
