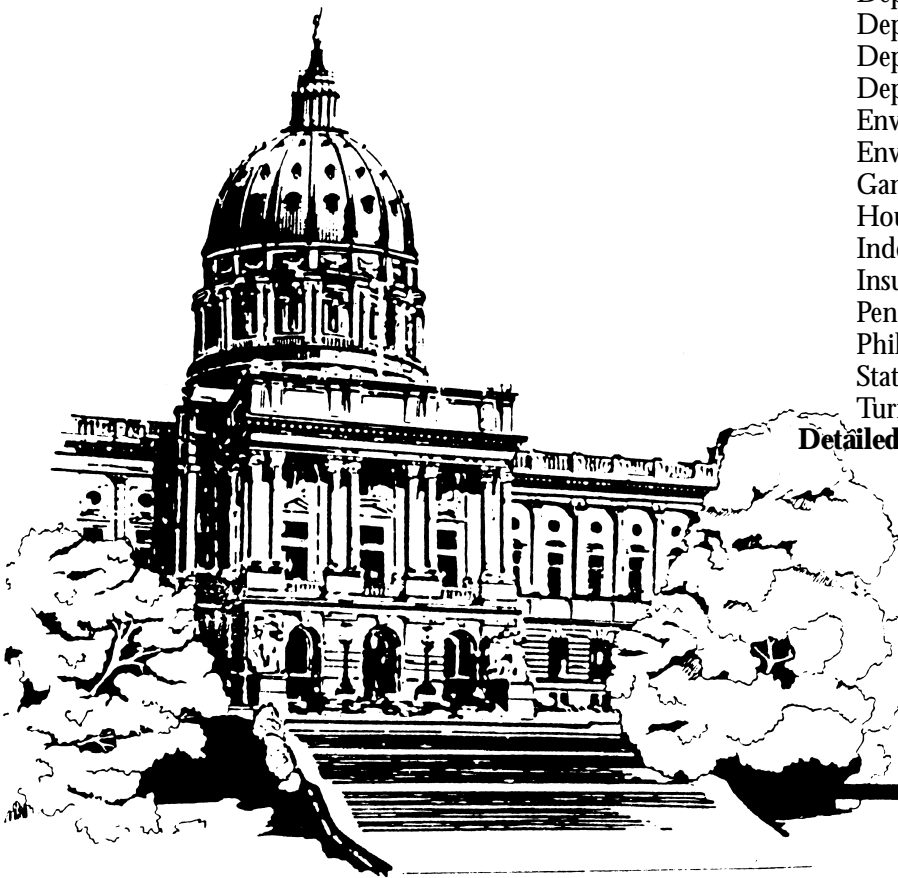

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READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where “no fiscal impact” is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Reproduction, Dissemination or Publication of Information

Third parties may not take information from the *Pennsylvania Code* and *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and reproduce, disseminate or publish such information except as provided by 1 Pa. Code § 3.44. 1 Pa. Code § 3.44 reads as follows:

Effective Dates of Statutes

The effective dates specified above for laws and appropriation acts were contained in the applicable law or appropriation act. Where no date is specified or where the effective date specified is prior to the date of enactment, the effective date is 60 days after final enactment except for statutes making appropriations or affecting budgets of political subdivisions. See 1 Pa.C.S. §§ 1701—1704 (relating to effective dates of statutes).

Advance Copies of Statutes

Section 1106 of Title 1 of the *Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes* provides that the prothonotaries of each county shall file advance copies of statutes in their offices for public inspection until the Laws of Pennsylvania are generally available. Section 2406(h) of The Administrative Code of 1929 provides that the Department of General Services shall distribute advance sheets of the Laws of Pennsylvania to each law judge of the courts, to every county and public library of this Commonwealth and to each member of the General Assembly. These copies shall be furnished without charge. The Department shall also mail one copy of each law enacted during any legislative session to any person who pays to it the sum of \$20.

Amendments to the Pennsylvania Rules of Disciplinary Enforcement Relating to Referral of Respondent-Attorneys to Mental Health Agencies

Notice is hereby given that The Disciplinary Board of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania is considering recommending to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania that it amend Rule 402 of the Rules of Disciplinary Enforcement as set forth in Annex A to permit Chief Disciplinary Counsel to refer respondent-attorneys to mental health agencies for help with problems such as alcoholism or substance abuse.

The Board has found that respondent-attorneys who receive treatment from qualified mental health agencies or programs dealing with alcoholism or substance abuse often benefit substantially from treatment by those agencies or participation in those programs. As a result, the Office of Disciplinary Counsel will often informally recommend to a respondent-attorney believed to be suffering from mental health or addiction problems that the respondent-attorney contact such an agency or program. For a number of reasons, respondent-attorneys sometimes ignore those recommendations. The Board is considering recommending to the Supreme Court that it amend the Rules of Disciplinary Enforcement to permit Chief Disciplinary Counsel to independently contact those types of agencies or programs with a request that the agency or program contact the respondent-attorney. To protect the respondent-attorney, the new rule would require that the Board have (i) previously reviewed the competency of the agency or organization conducting the program and (ii) entered into a confidentiality agreement with the agency or organization to protect the identity of the respondent-attorney. As a further safeguard, only Chief Disciplinary Counsel would have the authority to contact the agency or program.

CHAPTER 83. PENNSYLVANIA RULES OF DISCIPLINARY ENFORCEMENT

Subchapter D. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

Rule 402. Confidentiality.

(a) [All] Except as provided in subdivision (c), all proceedings involving allegations of misconduct by or disability of an attorney shall be kept confidential until or unless:

* * * * *

(c) It shall not be a violation of subdivision (a) for Chief Disciplinary Counsel to disclose the identity of and contact information for a respondent-attorney reasonably believed to be suffering from mental health or addiction problems to an agency or organization approved by the Board under this subdivision. An agency or organization may be approved under this subdivision if:

(1) the Board finds that the agency or organization is competent to help people suffering from mental health or addiction problems; and

(2) the agency or organization executes a confidentiality agreement on a form prescribed by the Board pursuant to which the agency or organization agrees that:

(i) the identity of any respondent-attorney referred to it and the fact that there is a proceeding under these rules pending against the respondent-attorney shall be kept confidential; and

(ii) it will ensure that all of its employees and anyone else connected with it in any capacity will maintain the confidentiality of the information described in the preceding paragraph.

Official Note: If a lawyer receives confidential information under subdivision (c), the lawyer shall be subject to Rule 8.3(c) of the Pennsylvania Rules of Professional Conduct with respect to that information.

Amendments to the Rules of Organization and Procedure of the Board Relating to Prehearing Conferences

Notice is hereby given that The Disciplinary Board of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania is considering amend-

ing its Rules of Organization and Procedure as set forth in Annex A to require the holding of a prehearing conference in all proceedings before a hearing committee or special master.

The rules of the Board provide for the holding of optional conferences either before or during a hearing, but do not require a prehearing conference in all cases. 204 Pa. Code § 89.71. The Board believes that the hearing process could be improved if a prehearing conference were always required. The Board is accordingly proposing to amend its rules to require the scheduling in all cases of a prehearing conference to be held not less than 30 days before a hearing.

CHAPTER 89. FORMAL PROCEEDINGS

Subchapter B. INSTITUTION OF PROCEEDINGS

§ 89.57. Scheduling of hearing and prehearing conference.

The date, time and place of hearing on a petition for discipline shall be scheduled by the Office of the Secretary after consultation with and consideration of any recommendations by the members of the hearing committee or special master, the Office of Disciplinary Counsel, and, if available, the respondent-attorney. The date fixed for the hearing shall not be later than [60] 90 days after the file is transmitted to a hearing committee or special master under § 89.56 (relating to assignment for hearing), unless an extension has been granted by the Board Chairman at the request of any party. **At the time that the hearing is scheduled, the Office of the Secretary shall also schedule a prehearing conference for a date not less than 30 days before the scheduled date of the hearing.**

§ 89.58. Notice of hearing and prehearing conference.

The Office of the Secretary shall serve or cause to be served notice of the hearing and prehearing conference required by § 89.57 (relating to scheduling of hearing and prehearing conference) by means of Form DB-34 (Notice of Hearing and Prehearing Conference) upon the respondent-attorney, at least seven days in advance of the date fixed for the [hearing] prehearing conference. The notice shall indicate the [date, time and place] dates, times and places of the prehearing conference and the hearing and shall state that the respondent-attorney is entitled to be represented by counsel, to cross-examine witnesses and to present evidence in the respondent-attorney's own behalf. A copy of the notice [of hearing] shall at the same time be transmitted to staff counsel. See § 89.7(b) (relating to continuances).

Subchapter C. HEARING PROCEDURES

PREHEARING CONFERENCES

§ 89.72. Subjects which may be considered at conferences to expedite hearings.

At [any] the prehearing [or] conference required by § 89.57 (relating to scheduling of hearing and prehearing conference) and any other conferences which may be held to expedite the orderly conduct and disposition of any hearing, there may be considered, in addition to any offers of settlement permitted under § 89.71 (relating to conferences to expedite proceedings), the possibility of the following:

Som.R.Crim.P. 590. Guilty Pleas. Time For Acceptance.

A. A guilty plea pursuant to a plea arrangement must be tendered on or before the date of the Scheduling Conference for the trial session in which the case is listed for trial. After the date of the Scheduling Conference, the Court will not accept a guilty plea pursuant to a plea arrangement in a case on the current trial list, and will

accept only a general plea of guilty or straight plea of guilty as charged, absent a showing of extraordinary circumstances.

B. When a guilty plea is entered, the District Attorney shall cause the information or plea to be endorsed with the name of the presiding Judge.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 28—HEALTH AND SAFETY

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

[28 PA. CODE CH. 23]

Intention to Amend Regulations Relating to School Immunizations

The Department of Health (Department) is hereby providing notice that it intends to amend its regulations relating to immunizations required for school entry to reflect recent recommendations of the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) for the allowance of a 4-day grace period for certain vaccine administration. Until that amendment can occur, the Department will accept as within the regulatory requirements of § 23.83 (relating to immunization requirements) those vaccines administered 4 days prior to the earliest date for vaccination permitted by the regulations.

On February 8, 2002, ACIP published revised immunization recommendations in the Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report (MMWR) stating that it recommended accepting vaccinations given at a time less than or equal to 4 days prior to the minimal interval and age limit for a valid dose of vaccine administration. This recommendation conflicts with the Commonwealth's school immunization requirement for measles, mumps, rubella and varicella vaccines, which states that the vaccines for these diseases must be administered on or after a child turns 12 months of age for the vaccine to be accepted as a valid dose. With respect to varicella, the Department's regulations for entry into seventh grade require either one dose of vaccine at 12 months of age or older or two doses of vaccine at 13 years of age or older. See § 23.83.

The Department has followed ACIP recommendations for Statewide immunization recommendations and school immunization requirements. The Commonwealth chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics supports ACIP's recent recommendations allowing a 4-day grace period for dose interval and age limit. After consideration of ACIP's February 8, 2002, recommendation and review of the relevant information relating to that recommendation, the Department agrees with ACIP's determination that administering a vaccine dose a few days earlier than the minimum interval or age limit is unlikely to have a significant negative effect on the immune response to that dose.

The Department intends to amend its regulations relating to school immunizations to reflect this 4-day grace period. Until that amendment can occur, the Department will accept vaccinations for measles, mumps, rubella and varicella given within the 4-day grace period.

Title 58—RECREATION

GAME COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CHS. 135, 141 AND 143]

All-Terrain Vehicles; Elk Hunting; Return Postage Fee

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its January 15, 2002, meeting, adopted the following amendments:

Amend § 135.50 (relating to definitions) to establish weight and width specification for all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) not defined as Class I ATVs under 75 Pa.C.S. Chapter 77 (relating to Snowmobile and All-Terrain Vehicle Law) (ATV law) and § 135.53 (relating to operation of ATVs on designated State game land roads by permitted persons) to accurately reflect and abide by the changes in the ATV law.

Amend § 141.42 (relating to big game animal hunting roster) by adding elk to ensure elk hunters may not cooperate to hunt elk in groups larger than 25 persons.

Amend § 143.10 (relating to fee for return postage) to allow the Director to establish return postage fees commensurate with changing first-class postage rates.

These amendments were adopted under the authority of 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

Amendments to §§ 135.50 and 135.53

1. Introduction

The act of June 25, 2001 (P.L. 701, No. 68) (Act 68) amended the ATV law to change the definitions of Class I and Class II ATVs. Class II ATVs no longer have a maximum width or weight. Section 135.50 incorporates these definitions. In addition, the act amended sections 7711.1 and 7711.2 of the ATV law (relating to registration of dealers; and registration of snowmobiles and registration and issuance of certificates of titles for ATVs) to require the display of registration plates on ATVs. To adjust for these changes, the Commission, at its October 2, 2001, meeting proposed, and at its January 15, 2002, meeting adopted, an amendment to § 135.50 to put width and weight limits on ATVs that can be used on State game lands and amended § 135.53 to require the display of a valid registration plate on ATVs used on State game lands. These final-form amendments were made under authority contained in section 2901(b) of the code (relating to authority to issue permits).

2. Purpose and Authority

As was indicated in the Introduction, Act 68 changed the definition of Class II ATVs to eliminate width and

weight restrictions. Since ATVs of an excessive size can cause damage to State game lands, the Commission has decided to retain the limitation for ATVs permitted to go on State game lands. Act 68 also changes sections 7711.1 and 7711.2 of the ATV law to require the display of registration plates on ATVs. With this change, the requirement of displaying a valid decal currently contained in § 135.53 is superseded by the registration plate requirement.

Section 2901(b) of the code provides that the Commission may "... promulgate regulations to control the activities which may be performed under the authority of any permit issued." This provision provides the authority for the final-form amendments.

3. *Regulatory Requirements*

The final-form amendments will retain the size limitations on ATVs that may be used on State game lands that existed prior to the effective date of Act 68 and will require the displaying of a valid registration plate rather than a decal.

4. *Persons Affected*

Disabled person permit holders desiring to use ATVs on State game lands will be affected by the final-form amendments.

5. *Comment and Response Summary*

Two official comments were received with regard to the final-form amendments, opposing the restrictions because they might limit opportunities for the disabled. The Commission believes that the restrictions are necessary to prevent damage and that an adequate number of models meeting the restrictions are available to the disabled.

6. *Cost and Paperwork Requirements*

The final-form amendments should not result in any additional cost or paperwork.

Amendment to § 141.42

1. *Introduction*

To more effectively manage the elk population of this Commonwealth and to standardize hunting methods, the Commission, at its October 2, 2001, meeting proposed, and at its January 15, 2002, meeting adopted, an amendment to § 141.42(e) to limit the number of individuals in parties hunting elk to 25 persons. Section 2102 of the code (relating to regulations) directs the Commission to promulgate regulations concerning the ways, manner, methods and means of hunting. This provision provides the authority for the final-form amendment.

2. *Purpose and Authority*

The act of December 20, 2000 (P. L. 452, No. 111) added section 2705(15) of the code (relating to classes of licenses), which provides for issuance by the Commission of elk hunting licenses. In addition, the Commission has adopted regulations providing for an elk hunting season in this Commonwealth in 2001 and will most likely adopt regulations for a similar season for 2002. The Commission is now in the process of standardizing requirements and limitations for elk hunting with hunting of other big game species. The Commission has therefore adopted an amendment to § 141.42(e) to limit parties hunting elk to 25 persons to promote safety and fair chase.

Section 2102 of the code provides that: "The commission shall promulgate such regulations as it deems necessary and appropriate concerning . . . the ways, manner, methods, and means of hunting or furtaking . . ." The amendment is adopted under this authority.

3. *Regulatory Requirements*

The final-form amendment will limit the number of individuals who can be involved in hunting elk together to 25. This is also currently true of parties hunting deer and bear.

4. *Persons Affected*

Individuals hunting elk either as license holders or as guides will be affected by the final-form amendment.

5. *Comment and Response Summary*

No official comments were received with regard to the final-form amendment.

6. *Cost and Paperwork Requirements*

The final-form amendment should not result in any additional cost or paperwork.

Amendment to § 143.10

1. *Introduction*

In recent years, the Commission has experienced increasing sales of hunting and furtaking licenses by means of mail, fax and the Internet. In June 2001, the Commission added § 143.10, providing for a \$1.50 fee per license order to cover postage and packaging costs. Since that recent change, the actual cost per order has increased to \$1.95. To deal with rapidly changing costs, the Commission, at its October 2, 2001, meeting proposed, and at its January 15, 2002, meeting adopted, an amendment to § 143.10 to allow the Executive Director to change the fee based on postage rates. This amendment is adopted on the basis of section 2722(g) of the code (relating to authorized license-issuing agents).

2. *Purpose and Authority*

As was indicated in the Introduction, although the Commission recently established a fee for postage and packaging of hunting and furtaking licenses ordered by mail, fax or on the Internet, the fee is already too low. To provide maximum flexibility, the Commission is adopting an amendment to § 143.10 to allow the fee to be set by the Executive Director, based on first class postage rates.

Section 2722(g) of the code directs the Commission to adopt regulations for "The administration, control and performance of activities conducted pursuant to the provisions of this chapter." This section provides the authority for the final-form amendment.

3. *Regulatory Requirements*

The final-form amendment will allow changes of fees for postage and packaging for licenses ordered by mail, fax or Internet by order of the Executive Director.

4. *Persons Affected*

Individuals applying for hunting or furtaking licenses by mail, fax or Internet may be affected by the final-form amendment.

5. *Comment and Response Summary*

No official comments were received with regard to the final-form amendment.

6. *Cost and Paperwork Requirements*

The final-form amendment may result in additional cost to license buyers for postage and packaging.

Effective Date

The final-form amendments will be effective on publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

(b) The Executive Director of the Commission shall submit this order and 31 Pa.B. 6189, to the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(c) This order shall become effective upon final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

GAME COMMISSION
[58 PA. CODE CH. 147]
Wildlife Rehabilitation; Special Permits

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its January 15, 2002, meeting, adopted the following amendments:

Amend §§ 147.301—147.304, 147.306, 147.308 and 147.309. With the advice and cooperation of the Wildlife Rehabilitation Council, the Commission wanted to apply some needed changes in the regulations to make the Commission's rehabilitation program more functional and easier to administer. The final-form amendments will help to clarify the various aspects of this program.

Amend § 147.553 (relating to permit) to establish posting requirements for farms enrolled in the deer control program.

These final-form amendments were adopted under the authority of 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

Amendments to §§ 147.301—147.309

1. Introduction

The Commission has had regulations relating to wildlife rehabilitation permits in Subchapter P (relating to wildlife rehabilitation) since 1992. Although the regulations have generally worked well, the Commission decided to propose some modifications. Therefore, at its October 2, 2001, meeting, the Commission proposed, and at its January 15, 2002, meeting, adopted, amendments to §§ 147.301—147.309 relating to wildlife rehabilitation permits. These amendments are adopted under authority contained in section 2901(b) of the code (relating to authority to issue permits).

2. Purpose and Authority

As was pointed out in the Introduction, the Commission has had regulations relating to wildlife rehabilitation permits for approximately 9 years. The Commission has decided to modify some policies and procedures as follows:

Section 147.301 (relating to definitions) defines "assistant" and redefines "wildlife rehabilitation."

Section 147.302(a)(5) (relating to general) authorizes rehabilitator use of unlicensed volunteers.

Section 147.302(b) authorizes the holding of injured wildlife by a licensed veterinarian for up to 48 hours before notifying the Commission and requires transfer to a licensed rehabilitator.

Section 147.302(j) allows disposal of terminated wildlife in an appropriate manner.

Section 147.302(k) requires submission of a copy of permit records annually by July 30.

Section 147.302(o) makes renewal of permit contingent upon compliance with all relevant legal requirements.

Sections 147.303(b)(6) and 147.304(a)(1)(iv) (relating to permit applications; and wildlife rehabilitation permits) amend "passerines" to "nonraptor" avian species for purposes of identifying types of wildlife.

Sections 147.303(b)(7) and 147.304(d) eliminate the master class of permit.

Section 147.304(c)(1)(ii) eliminates the requirement of passing a written test and requires submission of photographs or a videotape of the permittee's facility.

Section 147.306(b)(4) (relating to endangered or threatened species certification) allows submission of a videotape of facilities for endangered or threatened species certification.

Section 147.306(c) requires attendance at a certification workshop or seminar for endangered or threatened species certification.

Section 147.308(a) (relating to training and education requirements) allows approval by the Wildlife Rehabilitation and Educational Council and the Commission of equivalent training for certification.

Section 147.309(d)(3) (relating to educational use of rehabilitation wildlife permits) prohibits free flying by any species not just avian species.

Section 2901(b) of the code authorizes the Commission "... as deemed necessary to properly manage the game or wildlife resources, ... promulgate regulations for the issuance of any permit and ... to control the activities which may be performed under authority of any permit issued." This section authorizes the final-form amendments.

3. *Regulatory Requirements*

See Purpose and Authority.

4. *Persons Affected*

Individuals wishing to engage in wildlife rehabilitation activities will be affected by the adopted changes.

5. *Comment and Response Summary*

No official comments were received with regard to the final-form amendments.

6. *Cost and Paperwork Requirements*

The final-form amendments should not result in any substantial additional cost or paperwork.

Amendment to § 147.553

1. *Introduction*

The Commission, at its June 12, 2001, meeting, adopted the deletion of § 139.16 (relating to deer damage areas). Posting of deer damage areas under § 139.16 was a prerequisite to obtaining a deer control permit under Subchapter R (relating to deer control). As a result, the Commission, at its October 2, 2001, meeting, proposed, and at its January 15, 2002, meeting, adopted, an amendment to § 147.553 to add paragraph (3), requiring posting of the property.

Section 2901(b) of the code authorizes the Commission to promulgate regulations to control activities performed under authority of a permit.

2. *Purpose and Authority*

As a result of the Commission's adopting of concurrent antlerless and antlered deer seasons, the need for a special season for deer damage areas was eliminated and § 139.16 was deleted. Participation in the deer damage farm program, including posting of the property involved, was a prerequisite to obtaining an agricultural deer control permit under Subchapter R. The Commission has decided to retain the posting requirement of the deer damage farm program and has therefore adopted adding the posting requirement to § 147.553.

Section 2901(b) of the code authorizes the Commission to promulgate regulations to control activities which may be performed under the authority of a permit. This section provides the authority for the adoption.

3. *Regulatory Requirements*

The final-form amendment will continue the requirement that signs be posted on boundaries and along public roads identifying a farm as experiencing deer damage as a prerequisite to obtain an agricultural deer control permit.

4. *Persons Affected*

Individuals owning or leasing farms experiencing deer damage and hunters desiring to hunt on the land would be affected by the final-form amendment.

5. *Comment and Response Summary*

No official comments were received with regard to the final-form amendment.

6. *Cost and Paperwork Requirements*

The final-form amendment will continue an existing requirement and therefore, should not result in any additional cost or paperwork.

Effective Date

The final-form amendments will be effective on publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

UNDER ACT 2, 1995

PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (Act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one or a combination of the cleanup standards or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the Act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the Act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

The Department may approve or disapprove plans and reports submitted. This notice provides the Department's decision and, if relevant, the basis for disapproval.

Final Certification under Section 401 of the Federal Clean Water Act and Coastal Zone Management Consistency Determination

The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) hereby certifies under section 401 of the Clean Water Act (CWA) (33 U.S.C.A. § 1341), subject to the conditions listed in this notice, that the activities authorized by the United States Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) published at 67 FR 2019 (January 15, 2002) (Issuance of Nationwide Permits (NWP) Notice) which may result in a discharge into waters of the United States in this Commonwealth will comply with the applicable provisions of sections 301—303, 306 and 307 of the CWA and are consistent with Pennsylvania's Coastal Zone Management Program. In addition, the Commonwealth certifies, subject to the conditions listed in this notice, that there is a reasonable assurance that the construction and operation of the NWPs set forth in the January 15, 2002, notice will comply with applicable Federal and State water quality standards.

On November 24, 2001, the DEP published an initial notice of the Corps' request for section 401 certification of

the Corps' proposed NWP (see 66 FR 42070) (August 9, 2001) at 31 Pa.B. 6512 (November 24, 2001). During the 30-day comment period following the publication of the notice, no public comments were received. The final version of the NWP was published at 67 FR 2019. The Corps is reissuing all the existing NWPs, General Conditions definitions with some modifications and one new General Condition. These final NWPs will be effective on March 18, 2002. All NWPs, except NWPs 7, 12, 14, 27, 31, 40, 41, 42, 43 and 44, expire on February 11, 2002. Existing NWPs 7, 12, 14, 27, 31, 40, 41, 42, 43 and 44 expire on March 18, 2002. To reduce the confusion regarding the expiration of the NWPs and the administrative burden of reissuing NWPs at different times, the Corps is issuing all NWPs on the same date so that they expire on the same date. Thus, all issued, reissued and modified NWPs, and General Conditions contained within the January 15, 2002, notice will become effective on March 18, 2002, and expire on March 19, 2007.

Except in instances where the Pennsylvania Statewide Programmatic General Permit (PASPGP-2) issued by the Corps in July 2001 does not apply, the Corps has indicated it will suspend these NWPs. This suspension will preserve the one-stop State and Federal permitting process the Corps presently offers under PASPGP-2 while maintaining the current level of protection provided to our wetlands and water resources.

Proposed Revisions to Pennsylvania General Permits for the Beneficial Use of Biosolids or Residential Septage by Land Application (PAG-7, PAG-8 and PAG-9)

Extension of Public Comment Period and Notice of Public Hearing

In accordance with the provisions of the Federal Clean Water Act, The Clean Streams Law (35 P. S. §§ 691.1—691.1001), sections 1905-A, 1917-A and 1920-A of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. §§ 510-5, 510-17 and 510-20), the Solid Waste Management Act (35 P. S. §§ 6018.101—6018.1003) and the Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act (53 P. S. §§ 4000.101—4000.1904), the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) issues three general permits for use by eligible persons for the beneficial use of exceptional quality biosolids, biosolids or residential septage that will be land applied, who are required in 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91, 92 or 271 (relating to general provisions; National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permitting, monitoring and compliance; and municipal waste management—general provision), as applicable, to obtain a permit for the beneficial use of biosolids in this Commonwealth. The general permits, referred to as PAG-7, PAG-8 and PAG-9, shall only be valid for eligible persons that have submitted an administratively complete and acceptable application, hereinafter referred to as Notice of Intent, to the Department on the prescribed form.

Proposed revisions are necessary to clarify the general permits as they relate to biosolids and to clarify previous language. There is no change to the current application fee of \$500 for each permit.

Notices of proposed revisions to the PAG-7, PAG-8 and PAG-9 were published at 32 Pa.B. 367 and 377 (January 19, 2002), with a 30-day public comment period that closed on February 19, 2002. The Department, by this notice, extends the public comment period on the proposed revisions to the three general permits for an additional 15 days following publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, or March 25, 2002. The Department will also hold a public hearing on the proposed revisions as indicated in this notice.

Summary of Proposed Revisions

The general permits have been reorganized and made more concise. In many instances, repetitive regulatory language was replaced by the appropriate regulatory reference. A definition of biosolids is proposed to be added and is proposed to replace "sewage sludge" where appropriate. As an incentive for biosolids generators to produce exceptional quality products, proposed language was added to PAG-7 to exclude exceptional quality biosolids from waste processing and transportation placard requirements. Storage requirements were clarified and en-

hanced notification requirements were added to PAG-8 and PAG-9. An annual soils sampling requirement at land application sites has also been proposed for PAG-8. Appendices are proposed for deletion because the information is readily obtainable from the regulations or other resources.

The existing permit documents package will continue to be available from the Department's regional and central offices until it is replaced or updated.

Notice from the Secretary of the Commonwealth

On January 31, 2002, Governor Mark Schweiker signed into law Act 3 of 2002 (Act 3). Effective March 17, 2002, Act 3 repeals the act of June 30, 1995 (P. L. 170, No. 25), known as the Pennsylvania Voter Registration Act (PVRA) (25 P. S. Ch. 4A (relating to Voter Registration Act)), and codifies it as Part IV (relating to voter registration) of Title 25 (relating to elections) of the *Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes*. See Act 3, §§ 1, 5(2) and 6. The repeal of the PVRA and its replacement by 25 Pa.C.S. Pt. IV is effective 45 days after enactment, or March 17, 2002. See Act 3, § 7(3).

Section 1513 of Title 25 provides as follows:

§ 1513. Applicability of provisions.

(a) *Suspension.*—To the extent that the Secretary of the Commonwealth determines that the National Voter Registration Act of 1993 (Public Law 103-31, 42 U.S.C. § 1973gg et seq.) prohibits the cancellation of registration for elections for Federal office because of a failure to vote as provided in section 1510 (relating to failure to vote), the provisions of sections 1506 (relating to checkup of registers) through 1512 (relating to correction of errors in cancellation or suspension) are suspended. The suspension shall become effective upon publication of notice of the determination in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

(b) *Effect of suspension.*—Should the provisions of sections 1506 through 1512 be suspended as provided in subsection (a), the provisions of Chapter 19 (relating to provisions contingent on Federal Law) shall be effective during the period of suspension.

Section 1513 is substantively identical to Section 5103 of the PVRA (25 P. S. § 5103 (relating to applicability of provisions)). Acting under Section 5103 of the PVRA, the Secretary of the Commonwealth in 1995 published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a notice that she had determined that the National Voter Registration Act of 1993 (NVRA) prohibits the cancellation of registration for elections for Federal office because of a failure to vote. See 25 Pa.B. 2844 (July 15, 1995). Consequently, since that time, the provisions of Sections 906 through 912 of the PVRA (25 P. S. §§ 961.906—961.912) have been suspended.

Inasmuch as the PVRA on March 17, 2002 will be repealed by Act 3 and replaced by 25 Pa.C.S. Pt. IV, the Secretary of the Commonwealth must make a similar determination under 25 Pa.C.S. § 1513. Upon review of the NVRA, the Secretary of the Commonwealth has determined that the NVRA prohibits the cancellation of registration for elections for Federal office because of a failure to vote as provided in 25 Pa.C.S. § 1510 (relating to failure to vote). Therefore, as provided by Section 1513(a), the provisions of 25 Pa.C.S. §§ 1506 (relating to checkup of registers) through 1512 (relating to correction of errors in cancellation or suspension) are suspended, and the provisions of 25 Pa.C.S. Chapter 19 (relating to provisions contingent on Federal Law) shall be effective during the period of suspension.

This notice shall be effective March 17, 2002, to coincide with the effectiveness of Act 3's repeal of the PVRA and its replacement by 25 Pa.C.S. Pt. IV.

Settlement of Appeal

Waste Management Disposal Services of Pennsylvania, Inc. v. DEP, EHB Doc. No. 2001-003-K

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) and Waste Management Disposal Services, Inc. (WMDS) have agreed to a settlement of the previous matter.

On or about August 22, 2000, WMDS submitted to the Department two separate Phase I applications for expansions of the Pottstown Landfill (Waste Permit ID No. 10059), located in Douglas and West Pottsgrove Townships, Berks and Montgomery Counties. On or about December 7, 2000, the Department terminated review of the applications and returned the applications to WMDS. On or about January 5, 2001, WMDS filed an appeal of the Department's return of the Phase I applications with the Environmental Hearing Board (Board). The appeal was docketed at EHB Doc. No. 2001-003-K.

The parties have agreed to a settlement, the major provisions of which include:

a. In the event that prior to the cessation of currently approved waste disposal operations in the Eastern Expansion area of the Pottstown Landfill, WMDS or any of its successors or assigns applies to vertically expand the Eastern Expansion area of the Pottstown Landfill within the existing permit area limit of the Existing Eastern Expansion Area then the Department and WMDS, its successors and assigns, will consider the application to be a proposal to operate an "area permitted prior to January 25, 1997," within the meaning of 25 Pa. Code § 273.202 (relating to areas where municipal waste landfills are prohibited).

b. In the event that WMDS or any of its successors or assigns applies to expand or otherwise permit any area of the Pottstown Landfill other than the vertical expansion of the Eastern Expansion area of the Pottstown Landfill as previously stated, then the Department and WMDS, its successors and assigns will consider the application to be a proposal to operate an "area permitted after" December 23, 2000, January 13, 2001, and any other date that precedes the date of approval of the permit for the purposes of the exclusionary area criteria set forth in 25 Pa. Code Articles VIII and IX (relating to municipal waste; and residual waste management).

State Real Estate Commission—Agency; Regulation No. 16A-568

On January 20, 2000, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the State Real Estate Commission. This rulemaking amends 49 Pa. Code Chapter 35. The proposed regulation was published in the February 5, 2000, *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 30-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on January 22, 2002.

This rulemaking implements Act 112 of 1998 and Act 47 of 2000. These Acts delineate certain duties of licensees according to whom they are representing and include mandatory provisions to be contained in written agreements and sales contracts. Additionally, the amendments explain various agency relationships and list the duties required of licensees.

We have determined this regulation is consistent with the statutory authority of the State Real Estate Commission (63 P. S. §§ 455.404, 455.608, 455.608a and 455.608b) and the intention of the General Assembly. Having considered all of the other criteria of the Regulatory Review Act, we find promulgation of this regulation is in the public interest.

State Board of Private Licensed Schools—Definitions, Fees; Regulation No. 6-272

On April 4, 2001, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the State Board of Private Licensed Schools (Board). This rulemaking amends 22 Pa. Code Chapter 73. The proposed regulation was published in the April 14, 2001, *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 30-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on January 24, 2002.

The Board has added the definition of "seminar," a new fee for schools that only present seminars, and raised fees for biennial school licensure and licensure of admissions representatives. The Board is increasing these fees to generate revenues that meet or exceed expenditures in a biennial period as required by statute.

We have determined this regulation is consistent with the statutory authority of the State Board of Private Licensed Schools (24 P. S. §§ 6504(a) and 6510(a)) and the intention of the General Assembly. Having considered all of the other criteria of the Regulatory Review Act, we find promulgation of this regulation is in the public interest.

Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission—Financial Reporting Requirements for All Telecommunications Carriers; Regulation No. 57-222

On August 27, 2001, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (PUC). This rulemaking amends 52 Pa. Code §§ 63.31—63.33, 71.3 and 71.9. The proposed regulation was published in the September 8, 2001, *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 30-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on January 24, 2002.

The regulation updates the existing telephone utility classifications and streamlines reporting requirements for incumbent local exchange carriers (ILECs) and competitive local exchange carriers (CLECs). The regulation allows CLECs to use accounting methods other than the Uniform System of Accounts as long as they report to the PUC which method they are using. Finally, existing requirements for quarterly and annual rate-of-return financial reports are clarified to apply only to ILECs, and the quarterly reports are reduced to semi-annual reports.

We have determined this regulation is consistent with the statutory authority of the PUC (66 Pa.C.S. § 501) and the intention of the General Assembly. Having considered all of the other criteria of the Regulatory Review Act, we find promulgation of this regulation is in the public interest.

Insurance Department—Long-Term Care Insurance Form and Rate Filings; Regulation No. 11-208

On September 25, 2001, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the Insurance Department (Department). This rulemaking deletes 31 Pa. Code Subchapter M (§§ 89.901—89.921) and adds 31 Pa. Code Chapter 89a.

The proposed regulation was published in the October 6, 2001, *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 30-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on January 23, 2002. On February 8, 2002, the Commission received a request from the Department to toll consideration of this final-form regulation to modify one sentence. Also on February 8, 2002, the Department submitted its revision to the final-form regulation to the Commission.

The Department is replacing its existing long-term care insurance regulations with a new chapter that revises rate-filing requirements and required disclosure notices. It addresses areas related to the impact of rate increases and adequate disclosure of the terms and conditions of long-term care insurance policies.

We have determined this regulation is consistent with the statutory authority of the Department (40 P. S. § 991.1112) and the intention of the General Assembly. Having considered all of the other criteria of the Regulatory Review Act, we find promulgation of this regulation is in the public interest.

Retention of an Engineering Firm

Open-End Construction Inspection Mileposts 246.00—359.0 and the Northeast Extension

Reference No. 4-060

The Turnpike Commission (Commission) will retain an engineering or construction management firm to provide open-end construction inspection services for various projects in the Pennsylvania Turnpike's Eastern Region (Mileposts 246.00—359.0 and the Northeast Extension) (Berks, Bucks, Carbon, Chester, Dauphin, Lackawanna, Lancaster, Lebanon, Lehigh, Luzerne and Montgomery Counties). The types of projects to be inspected under this agreement may include, but are not limited to, bituminous overlays, bridge rehabilitation and replacements, service plaza parking lot expansions and building modifications.

The contract will be for a maximum cost of \$500,000 or for a 36-month period, with projects assigned on an as-needed basis. The number of required inspectors is contingent upon the workload and has been historically in the average range of zero to seven inspectors at any given time.

The main service to be provided under this agreement will be to supply construction inspectors on an as-needed basis as a supplement to our existing inspection staff. On limited occasions, the selected firm may be required to provide a full-time onsite construction inspection staff, with sufficient office personnel, managers, engineers, technicians and clerical staff, to support the field functions. The selected firm may be required to attend the prebid meeting and preconstruction conference, write project correspondence, and review and approve contractor's submissions. In addition, the selected firm may be required to keep records utilizing the Commission's Construction Documentation System to document the construction progress, prepare current and final estimates for payment to contractors, prepare change orders, conduct monthly job conferences, monitor monthly progress, provide liaison with affected utilities and communities, conduct semifinal and final inspections, determine the final quantities for each contract item and perform other duties as required.

Eighty percent of the inspection staff assigned to this Commission construction project must meet at least one of the following requirements:

1. Be certified by the National Institute for Certification in Engineering Technologies as a transportation engineering technician—construction level 2 or higher.
2. Be registered as a professional engineer by the Commonwealth with 1 year of highway inspection experience acceptable to the Commission.
3. Be certified as an engineer-in-training by the Commonwealth with 2 years of highway inspection experience acceptable to the Commission.

4. Hold a bachelor of science degree in civil engineering or civil engineering technology with 2 years of highway inspection experience acceptable to the Commission.

5. Hold an associate degree in civil engineering technology with 3 years of highway inspection experience acceptable to the Commission.

The remaining 20% assigned to this project shall meet the following education and experience requirements:

Education—Graduation from high school or equivalent certification or formal training. Completion of a training program in construction inspection approved by the Commission may be substituted for high school graduation.
