READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Reproduction, Dissemination or Publication of Information

Third parties may not take information from the *Pennsylvania Code* and *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and reproduce, disseminate or publish such information except as provided by 1 Pa. Code § 3.44. 1 Pa. Code § 3.44 reads as follows:

§ 3.44. General permission to reproduce content of Code and Bulletin.

Information published under this part, which information includes, but is not limited to, cross references, tables of cases, notes of decisions, tables of contents, indexes, source notes, authority notes, numerical lists and codification guides, other than the actual text of rules or regulations may be reproduced only with the written consent of the Bureau. The information which appears on the same leaf with the text of a rule or regulation, however, may be incidentally reproduced in connection with the reproduction of the rule or regulation, if the reproduction is for the private use of a subscriber and not for resale. There are no other restrictions on the reproduction of information published under this part, and the Commonwealth hereby consents to a reproduction.

TITLE 4. ADMINISTRATION

PART I. GOVERNOR'S OFFICE

CHAPTER 1. AGENCY OPERATION AND ORGANIZATION

Subpart A. DIRECTIVES MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

§ 1.1. Establishment.

The Directives Management System, established in 1972, is designed to provide comprehensive statements of policy and procedure on matters that affect agencies and employees under the Governor's jurisdiction.

§ 1.2. Policy.

All issuances from the Governor's Office and from agencies under the Governor's jurisdiction, except proclamations and press releases, that are intended for distribution to two or more agencies are to be issued through the Directives Management System in one of four types of publications.

(1) Executive Orders, signed by the Governor, announce broad policies, programs, and responsibilities that are relatively permanent.

(2) Management Directives announce detailed policies, programs, responsibilities, and procedures that are relatively permanent. Management Directives are to be signed by the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of the Budget, Secretary of Administration, or the head of any department or independent board, commission or council under the Governor's jurisdiction.

(3) Administrative Circulars contain either informational material or instructions that are one-time or temporary in nature. Administrative Circulars are to be signed the same as Management Directives.

(4) Procedural issuances contain detailed information and guidelines for relatively restricted, well-defined operations or sets of operations. Procedural issuances may be manuals, handbooks, catalogs, guides or similar publications. Manuals are to be signed the same as Management Directives.

§ 1.3. Responsibility.

(a) The Secretary of Administration is responsible for operating the Directives Management System. Those responsibilities include the issuance of detailed instructions for operation of the system, ensuring that communications are reviewed for completeness and for their impact on other agencies and procedures, assuring consistency between publications, editing, maintenance of a distribution scheme, periodic publication of an index to current issuances and maintenance of back-up files on items issued.

(b) Originating offices are responsible for the technical content and propriety of all documents issued through the Directives Management System.

§ 1.3a. Rescission.

Executive Order 1974-7, published at 6 Pa.B. 2640 (October 23, 1976), is rescinded.

State Employee Combined Appeal

Subchapter Q. STATE EMPLOYEE COMBINED APPEAL (SECA)

§ 7.224. Payroll contributions.

(a) The use of payroll deductions by Commonwealth employees for charitable contributions through SECA has been authorized by the Governor.

(b) Consistent with that authorization, the Secretary of Administration is delegated the authority to administer, through the Directives Management System, the structure of SECA and the responsibilities of the Commonwealth to SECA.

(c) Executive Order 1985-1, published at 15 Pa.B. 3627 (October 12, 1985) is rescinded.

CHAPTER 67. INTERNAL OPERATING PROCEDURES OF THE COMMONWEALTH COURT

§ 67.53. Reporting of Opinions; Determination as to Reporting

A. Each judge who is the author of an opinion of a panel or the court en banc shall indicate, in circulating the opinion to the other members of the court, the authoring judge's recommendation as to whether the opinion should be reported. **A decision generally should be reported when it:**

1. establishes a new rule of law;
2. applies an existing rule of law to facts significantly different than those stated in prior decisions;
3. modifies or criticizes an existing rule of law;
4. resolves an apparent conflict of authority;
5. involves a legal issue of continuing public interest; or
6. constitutes a significant, non-duplicative contribution to law because it contains:
 - (a) an historical review of the law,
 - (b) a review of legislative history,
 - (c) a review of conflicting decisions among the courts of other jurisdictions.

B. The recommendation shall govern the determination as to reporting, unless a majority of the **commissioned** members of the court disagree with it. Opinions of a **[duty]** single judge shall be filed but not reported unless, because of the unique character of the case, the executive administrator, the prothonotary or the authoring judge shall recommend that the opinion be reported and a two-thirds majority of the **[active]** **commissioned** members of the court shall concur with the recommendation.

§ 67.55. Reporting of Opinions; Certain Decisions not to be Cited.

[Unreported opinions of the court shall not be cited in any opinion of this court or in any brief or argument addressed to it, except that any opinion filed in the same case may be cited as representing the law of the case. A one-judge opinion, even if reported, shall be cited only for its persuasive value, not as a binding precedent.] Unreported opinions of the court shall not be relied upon or cited by a Court or party in any other action or

proceeding, except that such a memorandum decision may be relied upon or cited when it is relevant under the doctrine of law of the case, res judicata, or collateral estoppel. When an unreported memorandum opinion is relied upon pursuant to this rule, a copy of the memorandum must be attached to the brief. A single-judge opinion, even if reported, shall be cited only for its persuasive value, not as a binding precedent. This rule shall be effective retroactively, so as to apply to opinions filed before the effective date of this section, as well as to opinions filed in the future.

§ 67.57. Reporting of Unreported Opinions.

After an opinion has been filed as unreported, the court, at any time on its own motion or on the motion of any party to the case, may order the opinion to be reported. Motions to report unreported opinions by parties shall be filed within 30 days after the filing of the opinion, and may be granted by majority vote of the commissioned judges.

GAME COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CH. 143]

Fee for Return Postage

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its January 23, 2001, meeting, adopted the following change:

Add § 143.10 (relating to fee for return postage) to require the payment of \$1.50 at the time of application for a general hunting or furtaker license by mail order, fax or over the Internet.

This amendment is hereby adopted under the authority of 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

1. Introduction

To more effectively issue hunting and furtaking licenses, the Commission at its October 12, 2000, meeting proposed, and at its January 23, 2001, meeting finally adopted the addition of § 143.10 providing for a fee of \$1.50 on licenses issued through the mail. This addition is being adopted, under section 2722(g)(2) of the code (relating to authorized license-issuing agents).

2. Purpose and Authority

The Commission has issued hunting and furtaking licenses by mail for some time. Now those licenses are being offered at the Commission's website. Each time a license is purchased by mail, facsimile or on the Internet, a package must be sent to the licensee. The current cost of postage alone to send a license package is \$1.43. This figure does not include package materials and preparation. To defray these costs, the Commission will charge a \$1.50 fee for each general or furtaker license issued by mail order, fax or over the Internet.

Section 2722(g)(2) of the code authorizes the Commission to adopt regulations for the administration, control and performance of license issuance activities. This provision supplies the authority for the adoption.

3. Regulatory Requirements

The addition will require the payment of \$1.50 at the time of application for a general hunting or furtaker license by mail order, fax or over the Internet.

4. Persons Affected

Individuals wishing to take advantage of license issuance by mail, fax or Internet will be required to pay the additional fee.

5. Comment and Response Summary

No official comments were received with regard to the adoption.

6. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

There will be no additional paperwork resulting from the adoption. There will be an additional fee of \$1.50 to defray the cost of mailing the license package.

7. Effective Date

The adoption will be effective on final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CH. 53]

Permits for Unpowered Boats Using Commission Lakes and Access Areas

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapter 53 (relating to Commission property). The Commission is publishing these amendments as a notice of proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code). The proposed amendments relate to permits for unpowered boats using Commission lakes and access areas.

A. *Effective Date*

The proposed amendment to § 53.8 (relating to boats), if approved on final rulemaking, will go into effect upon publication of an order adopting the amendments in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The proposed regulation set forth in § 53.27 (relating to use permits for unpowered boats), if approved on final rulemaking, will go into effect on December 1, 2001.

B. *Contact Person*

C. *Statutory Authority*

The proposed amendments are published under the statutory authority of section 742(e) of the code (relating to use of property, use of Commission lakes and access areas by unpowered boats).

D. *Purpose and Background*

The proposed amendments are designed to update, modify and improve the Commission's regulations pertaining to unpowered boats using Commission lakes and access areas. The specific purpose of the proposed amendments is described in more detail under the summary of proposal.

E. *Summary of Proposal*

On December 20, 2000, Governor Ridge signed Senate Bill 1117 into law as Act 115 of 2000, effective immediately. Act 115 of 2000 amends the code by adding section 742(e). The amendment provides that the Commission shall, by regulations adopted within 1 year after the effective date of the section, provide for issuance of use permits, valid for 1 or 2 years, for unpowered boats that are not registered in accordance with law, to use Commission property. The amendment also provides that on and after the effective date of the regulations promulgated by the Commission, the owner of an unpowered boat that uses Commission property shall have the option of registering the boat or purchasing a use permit. The amendment further provides that the Commission shall establish fees for use permits and that these fees may not exceed the fees charged by the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) for boat launch permits for State parks lakes. Last, the amendment provides that the Commission shall, in cooperation with the DCNR, provide for reciprocal or joint use/launch

permits for unpowered boats to use both Commission and State parks lakes and access areas.

This amendment addresses an issue that has been of some concern to unpowered boat owners for several years. It allows the Commission to issue use permits for boats that use Commission property in lieu of registration. To move forward with timely implementation of this new law, the Commission proposes regulatory amendments that address the following:

(1) *Extending reciprocity with the DCNR launch permits.* The DCNR already extends reciprocity to unpowered boats registered by the Commission. It is expected that the DCNR will amend its regulations to extend this reciprocity to Commission use permits. Since the DCNR already recognizes the Commission's registrations, it should be unnecessary to condition the effective date of this reciprocity on changes to the DCNR regulations.

(2) *Eliminating the exception for out-of-state boats.* The Commission changed its regulations, effective February 19, 2000, to provide that out-of-State unpowered boats are in compliance with the Commission's requirements if they comply with the registration requirements of their state of principal use. This change had the effect of exempting most out-of-State unpowered boats from having to register their boats to use Commission property. It was designed to deal with the anomaly whereby out-of-State boats could not use our access areas unless they were registered. It would not have been appropriate to require a boat to register in this Commonwealth since the Commonwealth was not the state of principal use. With the new Commission use permit and reciprocity with DCNR launch permits, owners of out-of-State boats that want to use Commission lakes and access areas have several options and do not have to register their boats. Accordingly, the exception for out-of-State boats is no longer required.

(3) *New use permits.* The fees for the use permit are set at the same level as that for the DCNR resident launch permits: currently, \$10 per year; \$18 for 2 years. As proposed, a 1-year permit expires at the end of the calendar year for which it was issued, and a 2-year permit expires at the end of the calendar year following the year for which it was issued. Although it is conceivable that the Commission could issue permits valid for 12 or 24 months from the date of issuance, such a process involves somewhat more administrative complications. As proposed, the regulation permits the Executive Director to adjust the fees whenever the DCNR does so. The new permits are designed to be easy to issue. The information required for issuance of a use permit is considerably less than required for registration of a boat.

The Commission proposes to amend § 53.8 and add § 53.27 to read as set forth in Annex A.

F. *Paperwork*

The proposed amendments will increase paperwork and create new paperwork requirements because individuals who wish to purchase a use permit for their unpowered boats will have to complete a brief application form. However, the information that they will be required to provide is less than that which is required to register a boat.

G. Fiscal Impact

The proposed amendments will not have an adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. It is anticipated that the Commission and its agents will issue approximately 5,000 use permits during the first year of implementation and that these revenues will offset any program costs. The proposed amendments will impose new costs on those members of the general public who wish to use their unpowered boats on Commission lakes and access areas and who wish to purchase a use permit as opposed to registering their unpowered boats. Although the proposed amendments impose a fee for this new permit (\$10 for 1 year and \$18 for 2 years), this charge should be viewed in light of the current biennial registration fee of \$10 for unpowered boats. The proposed amendments will impose no new costs on the private sector.

H. Public Comments

Interested persons are invited to submit written comments, objections or suggestions about the proposed amendments to the Executive Director, Fish and Boat Commission, P. O. Box 67000, Harrisburg, PA 17106-7000, within 30 days after publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Comments submitted by facsimile will not be accepted.

In addition, all electronic comments must be contained in the text of the transmission, not in an attachment. If an acknowledgment of electronic comments is not received by the sender within 2 working days, the comments should be retransmitted to ensure receipt.

TITLE 58. RECREATION

PART II. FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

Subpart A. GENERAL PROVISIONS

CHAPTER 53. COMMISSION PROPERTY

§ 53.8. Boats.

* * * * *

(h) [A boat] The following apply to boats using a Commission lake or access area [shall be registered and display the official registration number and current validation stickers described under Subpart C and Part II of the code:]

(1) An unpowered boat using a Commission lake or access area shall comply with one of the following conditions:

(i) Be registered and display the official registration number and current validation stickers described under Subpart C (relating to boating) and Part III of the code (relating to boats and boating).

(ii) Display an official and valid use permit issued by the Commission under § 53.27 (relating to use permits for unpowered boats).

(iii) Display an official and valid watercraft launch or mooring permit issued by the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources for use of launch or mooring facilities at the Commonwealth's State parks and forests.

(2) This subsection does not apply to [noncommercial]:

(i) Noncommercial users of access areas on the Delaware River and West Branch of the Delaware River bounded by the State of New York.

[(2) Exempt from this subsection are public]

(ii) Public service boats as defined under section 5302(a)(3) of the code (relating to exemptions from registration). [and unpowered]

(iii) Unpowered boats participating in events authorized under § 109.6 (relating to special marine events). [Unpowered]

(3) Registered unpowered kayaks, sculls, sailboards and other low volume boats of similar design are exempt from displaying registration numbers, but shall display a current validation sticker.

[(3) Unpowered boats with a state of principal operation other than this Commonwealth shall meet the requirements of this subsection if they are in compliance with the registration and display requirements of their state of principal operation. There is a rebuttable presumption that the state of principal operation of any boat using a Commission lake or access area is this Commonwealth. The owner or operator of a boat may overcome this presumption by providing documentary evidence to show the state of principal operation is elsewhere.]

§ 53.27. Use permits for unpowered boats.

(a) The Commission and issuing agents designated by the Commission will issue use permits for unpowered boats when their owners choose not to register them to use Commission lakes and access areas.

(b) Use permits will be issued in the form of decals, showing the expiration date. Decals shall be displayed above the waterline on both sides of the bow of the boat for which the permit is issued.

(c) An applicant for a use permit shall provide the following information:

(1) The name, address and telephone number of the applicant.

(2) The name and address of the owner of the boat (if different from the name and address of applicant).

(3) A description of the boat (make, model, year).

(4) The Hull Identification Number (HIN) of the boat (if readily available).

(d) A use permit is issued for a specific boat. It is unlawful to transfer a use permit issued for a specific boat to another boat. A use permit remains effective for the boat for which it is issued even if ownership of the boat is changed during the term of the permit.

(e) Use permits shall be valid for 1 or 2 years. The expiration date of a 1-year use permit shall be December 31 of the year for which it is issued. The expiration date of a 2-year use permit shall be December 31 of the second year for which it was issued.

(f) The initial fees for the use permits shall be \$10 for a 1-year permit and \$18 for a 2-year permit. The Executive Director may, by notice published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, adjust these fees so that they remain the same as the resident price for 1-year and 2-year boat launching permits as established in the schedule of fees published, and from time-to-time revised, by the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources for State parks and forests. Whenever a use permit authorized by this section is issued by an issuing agent other than the Commission or the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, the issuing agent may charge an issuing agent fee not to exceed \$1 per transaction for issuing the permit.

[58 PA. CODE CH. 139]

Seasons and Bag Limits

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission) at its January 23, 2001, meeting, proposed the following amendment to:

Amend § 139.4 (relating to seasons and bag limits for the license year) to provide dates for the 2001-2002 hunting license year.

This proposed amendment will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the proposal is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

This proposal was made public at the January 23, 2001, meeting of the Commission, and comments on this proposal can be sent to the Executive Director of the Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797, until April 6, 2001.

1. Introduction

These seasons and bag limits were proposed under sections 322(c)(1) and 2102(b)(1) of the code (relating to powers and duties of Commission; and regulations). Notable changes for the 2001-2002 year include earlier antlerless deer seasons and increased opportunities to take antlerless deer, a proposed elk hunting season for the first time in 70 years, and increased small game hunting opportunities.

2. Purpose and Authority

The Commission is required to set hunting and furtaking seasons and bag limits on an annual basis. Section

322 of the code specifically empowers the Commission to "... fix seasons ... and daily, season and possession limits for any species of game or wildlife." Section 2102(b) of the code mandates that the Commission promulgate regulations relating to seasons and bag limits.

Changes that have been proposed for the 2001-2002 season are primarily intended to increase the harvest of antlerless deer, allow the limited taking of elk and to maximize recreational opportunities where game and wildlife populations allow. Major changes are as follows:

1. The thrust of the proposed deer seasons for 2001-2002 is to emphasize the taking of antlerless deer, the main mechanism by which deer populations are controlled, and to limit the harvesting of antlered deer. As a result, the rifle antlerless season will begin on the Saturday before the rifle antlered deer season and run concurrently with that season. There will also again be an early (October) antlerless muzzleloader season and a similar rifle season for junior and senior license holders, disabled person permit holders and those serving on active duty in the armed forces.

2. In Act 111 of 2000, signed into law by Governor Ridge on December 20, 2000, the Commission was authorized to issue elk hunting licenses. The elk population in this Commonwealth has reached the point where a limited hunt will not jeopardize the population and there are more and more elk-human conflicts. The Commission has therefore proposed a 6-day elk season for those issued an elk hunting license.

3. The Commission has generally expanded the late small game hunting season.

4. Turkey Management Area #9-A has been closed to fall turkey hunting.

3. Regulatory Requirements

These proposed seasons and bag limits would establish when and where it is lawful to hunt and trap various game species and place limits on the numbers that can be legally taken.

4. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to hunt and trap in this Commonwealth would be affected by these seasons and bag limits.

5. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed new seasons and bag limits would not result in any additional cost either to the Commission or to hunters and furtakers.

6. Effective Dates

The effective dates are July 1, 2001, to June 30, 2002.

MIGRATORY GAME BIRDS

Exceptions:

- (a) Hunting hours in § 141.4 (relating to hunting hours).
- (b) Nontoxic shot as approved by the Director of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service is required for use Statewide in hunting and taking of migratory waterfowl.
- (c) Subject to approval by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, an early and late season for Canada geese will be held as defined in § 141.25.

STATE BOARD OF FUNERAL DIRECTORS

[49 PA. CODE CH. 13] Application Fees

The State Board of Funeral Directors (Board) proposes to amend § 13.12 (relating to fees) by revising certain application fees to read as set forth in Annex A.

A. Effective date

The amendment will be effective upon publication of the final-form regulation in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. Statutory Authority

The amendment is authorized under section 18.1 of the Funeral Director Law (act) (63 P. S. § 479.18.1).

C. Background and Purpose

The act requires the Board to set fees by regulation so that revenues meet or exceed expenditures over a biennial period. General operating expenses of the Board are funded through biennial license renewal fees. Expenses related to applications or services which are provided directly to individual licensees or applicants are excluded from general operating revenues and are funded through fees in which the cost of providing the service forms the basis for the fee.

In a recent systems audit of the operations of the Board within the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (Bureau), the fees for services to licensees and applicants were analyzed to determine if the fees reflected the actual cost of providing the services. Actual cost calculations are based upon the following formula:

$$\begin{aligned} & \text{number of minutes to perform the function} \\ & \times \\ & \text{pay rate for the classification of personnel performing the function} \\ & + \\ & \text{a proportionate share of administrative overhead.} \end{aligned}$$

In computing overhead charges, the boards and the Bureau include expenses resulting from service of support staff operations, equipment, technology initiatives or upgrades, leased office space and other sources not directly attributable to a specific board. Once determined, the Bureau's total administrative charge is apportioned to

each board based upon that board's share of the total active licensee population. In turn, the board's administrative charge is divided by the number of active licensees to calculate a "per application" charge which is added to direct personnel cost to establish the cost of processing. The administrative charge is consistently applied to every application regardless of how much time the staff spends processing the application.

This method of calculating administrative overhead to be apportioned to fees for services was first included in the biennial reconciliation of fees and expenses conducted in 1988-89. In accordance with the regulatory review, the method was approved by the Senate and House Standing Committees and IRRC as reasonable and consistent with the legislative intent of statutory provisions which require the Board to establish fees which meet or exceed expenses.

The systems audit determined that the fees for 16 services do not accurately reflect the actual cost of providing those services.

The current fees have not been revised since 1986. In addition, no fees are currently in place for: license application for shared funeral establishment; application for registration as preceptor or change; reinspection after failure; and verification of license or registration.

In this proposal, fees for these services would be adjusted to allocate costs to those who use the service or make application. The Board would continue to apportion enforcement and operating costs to the general licensing population by means of its license renewal fee through the biennial reconciliation of revenue and expenditures.

D. Description of Services

Professional licensing boards other than the Board of Funeral Directors have also been proposing revisions to nonrenewal fees. Review of the proposed new fee regulations by the legislative committees indicated that certain explanations of the services for which fees are charged would be helpful for an understanding of the need to set appropriate fees.

The certification of an examination score is made at the request of a licensee when the licensee is seeking to obtain licensure in another state based upon licensure in this Commonwealth which was issued on the basis of a uniform National or regional examination which was taken in this Commonwealth. Generally the state of original licensure is the only source of the score of the

licensee, as testing agencies do not maintain this information. The licensure laws of many states include provisions that licensure by reciprocity or endorsement based on licensure in another state will be granted only if the board or agency determines that the agencies have interpreted this provision to require that licensees have attained a score equal to or exceeding the passing rate in that jurisdiction at the time of original licensure. For this reason, these states require that the Pennsylvania board and other boards certify the examination score the applicant achieved on the licensure examination.

The difference between the verification and certification fees is the amount of time required to produce the document requested by the licensee. As noted, states request different information when making a determination to grant licensure based on reciprocity or endorsement from another state. The Bureau has been able to create two documents from its records that will meet all of the needs of the requesting state. The licensee, when applying to the other state, receives information as to what documentation and form is acceptable to the requesting state. The Bureau then advises the licensee of the type of document the Bureau can provide and the fee. In the case of a "verification" the staff produces the requested documentation by a letter, usually computer generated, which contains the license number, date of original issuance and current expiration date, and status of the license. The letters are printed from the Bureau's central computer records and sent to the Board staff responsible for handling the licensee's application. The letters are sealed, folded and mailed in accordance with the directions of the requestor. The Board estimates the average time to prepare this document to be 5 minutes. The Bureau uses the term "certification fee" to describe the fee for a request for a document, again generally to support reciprocity or endorsement applications to other states, territories or countries, or for employment or training in another state. A certification document contains information specific to the individual requestor. It may include dates or location where examinations were taken, or scores achieved or hours and location of training. The information is entered onto a document which is usually supplied by the requestor. The average time to prepare a certification is 45 minutes. This is because a number of resources, such as files, microfilm and rosters must be retrieved and consulted in order to provide the information requested. The Board staff then seals and issues the document.

E. Compliance with Executive Order 1996-1

In accordance with Executive Order 1996-1 (February 6, 1996), in drafting and promulgating the proposed amendment the Board considered the least restrictive alternative to regulate costs for services requested by licensees and applicants.

F. Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed amendment will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fees will have a modest fiscal impact on those members of the private sector who apply for services from the Board. The amendment will impose no additional paperwork requirements upon the Commonwealth, political subdivisions or the private sector.

G. Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the cost effectiveness of its regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

H. Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on March 6, 2001, the Board submitted a copy of this proposed amendment to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and the Chairpersons of the House Professional Licensure Committee and the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee. In addition to submitting the proposed amendment, the Board has provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a detailed regulatory analysis form prepared by the Board in compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, "Regulatory Review and Promulgation." A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, if IRRC has objections to any portion of the proposed amendment, it will notify the Board within 10 days of the close of the Committees' review period. The notification shall specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met by that portion. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the regulation, by the Board, the General Assembly and the Governor, of objections raised.

STATE BOARD OF PHYSICAL THERAPY

[49 PA. CODE CH. 40]

Sexual Misconduct

The State Board of Physical Therapy (Board) proposes to adopt regulations regarding sexual misconduct committed by physical therapists, physical therapist assistants and certified athletic trainers (PTs, PTAs and ATCs) by adding §§ 40.301—40.304 to read as set forth in Annex A.

Effective Date

These regulations will be effective upon publication of final-form regulations in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

The Board is authorized to adopt regulations necessary for the administration of its enabling statute under section 3(a) of the Physical Therapy Practice Act (63 P. S. § 1303(a)) (act).

Background and Purpose

This proposed rulemaking was developed against a background of increasing complaints of sexual misconduct against health care professionals who are licensed by the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs. In this proposal, the Board addresses issues concerning sexual misconduct in the context of the provision of physical therapy and athletic training services.

The proposed regulations seek to better protect consumers of physical therapy and athletic training services and to provide guidance to the professions by defining terms such as “patient,” “professional relationship,” “sexual impropriety” and “sexual violation.” The proposed regulations guide licensees and certificateholders by informing them that conduct defined as a sexual violation or sexual impropriety with a patient during the course of a professional relationship violates standards of professional conduct for PTs, PTAs and ATCs. These proposed regulations guide PTs, PTAs and ATCs by informing them that their professional relationship with a patient exists for a time period beginning with the first professional contact or consultation and ends upon discharge from or discontinuance of services. The proposed regulations notify PTs, PTAs and ATCs that the consent of a patient to a sexual impropriety or violation cannot be a defense in a disciplinary proceeding before the Board and that a PT, PTA or ATC who engages in conduct prohibited by the regulations will not be eligible for placement into an impaired professional program under the act.

Compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, Regulatory Review and Promulgation

In compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, prior to drafting these proposed regulations, the Board invited

interested associations and colleges and universities to comment on a preliminary draft. The Board reviewed and considered all comments and suggestions received by interested parties during the regulatory development process. The interested associations, colleges and universities included the Pennsylvania Physical Therapy Association, Hospital Association of Pennsylvania, Pennsylvania Association of Rehabilitation Facilities, Pennsylvania Athletic Trainers Society, Beaver College, Chatham College, College Misericordia, Duquesne University, Gannon University, Medical College of Pennsylvania and Hahnemann University, Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science, Slippery Rock University, Temple University, Thomas Jefferson University, University of Pittsburgh, University of Scranton, Alvernia College, Central Pennsylvania Business School, Community College of Allegheny County Boyce Campus, Harcum College, Lehigh Carbon Community College, Mercyhurst College, Mount Aloysius College, Penn State University, Penn State University Mont Alto Campus, East Stroudsburg University, Lock Haven University, California University of Pennsylvania, University of Pittsburgh, Slippery Rock University, West Chester University, Temple University, Messiah College, Waynesburg College and Mercyhurst College.

Description of Amendments

§ 40.301 (relating to definitions)

The proposed regulation defines “patient,” “professional relationship,” “sexual impropriety” and “sexual violation” as used in §§ 40.302—40.304.

The term “patient” is defined to mean a person other than a spouse or immediate family member, who receives professional services from a PT, PTA or ATC regardless of whether the practitioner receives remuneration for the services.

The term “sexual impropriety” is defined as offenses including making sexually demeaning or sexually suggestive comments about or to a patient, including comments about a patient’s body or undergarments; unnecessarily exposing a patient’s body or watching a patient dress or undress, unless for therapeutic purposes or the patient specifically requests assistance; examining or touching genitals without the use of gloves when performing an otherwise appropriate examination; discussing or commenting on a patient’s sexual performance or requesting details of a patient’s sexual history or preferences during an examination or consultation, except when the examination or consultation is pertinent to the issue of sexual function or dysfunction or reproductive health care; soliciting a date from a patient; and volunteering information to a patient about one’s sexual problems, preferences or fantasies.

The term “sexual violation” is defined as offenses including sexual intercourse, genital to genital contact and oral to genital contact between a PT, PTA or ATC and a patient during the period of the professional relationship; touching breasts, genitals or any other body part for any purpose other than appropriate examination or treatment; using prolonged or improper examination techniques, or examining a patient when the patient has refused or has withdrawn consent; encouraging a patient to masturbate in the presence of the PT, PTA or ATC or masturbating while the patient is present; and providing or offering to provide treatment in exchange for sexual favors.

The term “professional relationship” for a PT, PTA or ATC means the period of time beginning with the first

professional contact or consultation with the patient and ending upon discharge from or discontinuance of services by the PT, PTA or ATC.

§ 40.302 (relating to procedural matters)

This proposed section of the regulations addresses procedural issues in disciplinary matters before the Board. Subsection (a) would put all licensees and certificateholders on notice that the consent of a patient to a sexual impropriety or violation will not be a defense in a sexual misconduct proceeding. A patient cannot consent to unprofessional forms of treatment. Subsection (b) would put all licensees and certificateholders on notice that neither evidence of specific instances, nor opinion evidence, nor reputation evidence of a patient's past sexual conduct is admissible in proceedings alleging conduct which constitutes a sexual impropriety or violation. Subsection (c) would put all licensees and certificateholders on notice that if a licensee or certificateholder accused of a sexual impropriety or violation raises the defense that the certificateholder's conduct was appropriate to the treatment, the licensee or certificateholder will have to demonstrate the relevancy of the conduct in question to the patient's condition or diagnosis.

§ 40.303 (relating to impaired professional program)

This proposed provision of the regulations would inform licensees and certificateholders that a licensee or certificateholder subject to disciplinary action for a sexual impropriety or violation will not be eligible for an impaired professional program under the act.

§ 40.304 (relating to disciplinary action)

This provision would notify licensees and certificateholders that a PT, PTA or ATC who engages in sexual misconduct will be subject to discipline under the act and § 40.52, § 40.121(a)(6) or § 40.181(a)(6) (relating to unprofessional conduct, physical therapists; refusal, suspension or revocation of certificate; and refusal, suspension or revocation of registration).

Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed regulations should have no fiscal impact and will not impose additional paperwork on the private sector, the general public, the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions.

Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors its regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), the Board submitted a copy of these proposed regulations on March 6, 2001, to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the House Committee on Professional Licensure and the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee. In addition to submitting the regulations, the Board has provided the Committees and IRRC with a copy of a detailed Regulatory Analysis Form prepared by the Board in compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, "Regulatory Review and Promulgation." A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Act, if IRRC has any objections to any portion of the proposed regulations, it will notify the Board within 10 days of the close of the Committees' review period. The notification shall specify that regulatory review criteria which have not been met

by that portion. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the regulations, by the Board, the General Assembly and the Governor of objections raised.

§ 40.301. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this subchapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Patient (includes resident and client)—A person, other than a spouse or immediate family member, who receives professional services from a physical therapist, physical therapist assistant or certified athletic trainer, regardless of whether the services are provided for remuneration.

Professional relationship—For a physical therapist, physical therapist assistant or certified athletic trainer, the relationship shall be deemed to exist for a period of time beginning with the first professional contact or consultation between a physical therapist, physical therapist assistant or certified athletic trainer and a patient and ending upon discharge from or discontinuance of services provided by the physical therapist, physical therapist assistant or certified athletic trainer.

Sexual impropriety—The term includes the following offenses:

(i) Making sexually demeaning or sexually suggestive comments about or to a patient, including comments about a patient's body or undergarments.

(ii) Unnecessarily exposing a patient's body or watching a patient dress or undress, unless for therapeutic purposes or the patient specifically requests assistance.

(iii) Examining or touching genitals without the use of gloves when performing an otherwise appropriate examination.

(iv) Discussing or commenting on a patient's potential sexual performance or requesting details of a patient's sexual history or preferences during an examination or consultation, except when the examination or consultation is pertinent to the issue of sexual function or dysfunction or reproductive health care. Discussion of a patient's sexual practices and preferences shall be fully documented in the patient's chart.

(v) Soliciting a date from a patient.

(vi) Volunteering information to a patient about one's sexual problems, preferences or fantasies.

Sexual violation—The term includes the following offenses:

(i) Sexual intercourse between a physical therapist, physical therapist assistant or certified athletic trainer and a patient during the professional relationship.

(ii) Genital to genital contact between a physical therapist, physical therapist assistant or certified athletic trainer and a patient during the professional relationship.

(iii) Oral to genital contact between a physical therapist, physical therapist assistant or certified athletic trainer and a patient during the professional relationship.

(iv) Touching breasts, the genitals, or any other part of the body of a patient in a sexual, erotic or romantic manner. Touching for the purpose of an appropriate examination or treatment does not constitute a sexual violation.

(v) Encouraging a patient to masturbate in the presence of the physical therapist, physical therapist assistant or certified athletic trainer or masturbating while a patient is present.

(vi) Providing or offering to provide treatment in exchange for sexual favors.

§ 40.302. Procedural matters.

(a) The consent of the patient to any sexual impropriety or violation is not a defense to any disciplinary charge for violation of the act or this chapter.

(b) Evidence of specific instances, opinion evidence or reputation evidence of a patient's past sexual conduct is

not admissible in proceedings brought under §§ 40.52, 40.121 and 40.181 (relating to unprofessional conduct, physical therapists; refusal, suspension or revocation of certificate; and refusal, suspension or revocation of registration). The Board may consider sexual relationships between the physical therapist or the physical therapist assistant or the certified athletic trainer and the patient occurring prior to the professional relationship.

(c) A physical therapist or the physical therapist assistant or the certified athletic trainer who attempts to raise as a defense an argument that conduct prohibited as a sexual violation or sexual impropriety was necessary or appropriate to the treatment of any patient shall be required to demonstrate the relevancy of the conduct in question to the patient's condition or diagnosis. Appropriate discussions of sexual matters between a physical therapist, or the physical therapist assistant or the certified athletic trainer and a patient shall be fully documented in patient records.

§ 40.303. Impaired professional program.

When the Board is empowered to take disciplinary or corrective action against a physical therapist, physical therapist assistant or certified athletic trainer for conduct defined as a sexual violation or sexual impropriety, the physical therapist, physical therapist assistant or certified athletic trainer will not be eligible for placement into an impaired professional program under section 13 of the act (63 P. S. § 1313).

§ 40.304. Disciplinary action.

A physical therapist, physical therapist assistant or certified athletic trainer who engages in sexual impropriety or violation as defined in § 40.301 (relating to definitions) will be subject to disciplinary action under §§ 40.52, 40.121(a)(6) and 40.181(a)(6) (relating to unprofessional conduct; physical therapists; refusal, suspension or revocation of certificate; and refusal, suspension or revocation of registration) and section 11 of the act (63 P. S. § 1311).

LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDiation UNDER ACT 2, 1995

PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted Under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (Act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under Sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the Act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified below. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified below, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved, and comments, should be directed to the remediator of the site.

The resultant volatile organic compound emissions are controlled by a thermal oxidizer which has been demonstrated, via stack testing, to have a volatile organic compound destruction efficiency in excess of the 95% required by Plan Approval 47-318-009. The volatile organic compound emission rate determined to have existed during the respective stack testing was less than .5 pounds per hour.

The Department of Environmental Protection has determined that the respective fabric coating and curing operation was constructed, and is operating, in conformance with all conditions contained in Plan Approval 47-318-009 as well as in compliance with all applicable requirements contained in Article III of the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Environmental Protection. The Department of Environmental Protection consequently intends to issue an operating permit for the fabric coating and curing operation.

The Department intends to place conditions in the operating permit to be issued which are intended to assure continued compliance with all applicable requirements as well as require appropriate monitoring, testing, record keeping and reporting. The following is a summary of these conditions:

1. The thermal oxidizer shall maintain a minimum oxidizer chamber outlet temperature of 1400° F at all times.

2. The thermal oxidizer shall be equipped with an oxidizer chamber outlet temperature monitoring and recording system.

3. 100% of the volatile organic compounds emitted from the fabric coating and curing operation shall be captured and ducted to the thermal oxidizer and at least 95% of the volatile organic compounds ducted to the thermal oxidizer shall be destroyed therein.

4. The only cleaning solvent that shall be used is d-limonene except that up to 52 gallons of ethyl alcohol may be used per year. The thermal oxidizer shall be operational whenever cleaning solvent is in use.

5. The fabric coating and curing operation shall be retested by no later than January 31, 2005.

6. Records shall be maintained of all surface coating material and cleanup solvents used in the fabric coating and curing operation and shall be submitted to the Department on a calendar quarter basis.

Under 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.11, the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) intends to issue a plan approval to **Agere Systems Inc.** (William R. Knolle, Air Quality Engineer, 555 Union Blvd., Allentown, PA 18103) for their plant in Allentown, **Lehigh County**. The facility currently has a Title V Operating Permit No. 39-00001. The plan approval includes terms and conditions to assure the proper operation of the sources, which satisfy the state and federal requirements. It includes, at a minimum, the conditions related to source description, emissions limits for pollutants, monitoring, recordkeeping and reporting, temporary operations to facilitate shake-down and temporary operation period. This plan approval will be incorporated into the Title V Operating Permit through an administrative amendment at a later date.

Plan Approval No. 39-313-044 is for operation of VOC emitting sources. The emissions from the sources will be controlled by a carbon adsorption and condenser and shall have a Plantwide Applicability Limit of 87.7 tons of VOC per year. Although the sources covered by this plan approval may be located at a major facility, the installations/ modifications do not trigger major new source review or prevention of significant deterioration requirements.

Under 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.44(b) and 127.424(b), that the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) intends to issue a plan approval to **American Refining Group** (77 North Kendall Avenue, Bradford, PA 16701) for their plant in the city of Bradford, **McKean County**. The facility currently has a Title V Operating Permit No. 42-00004, which was issued November 13, 2000. This plan approval will, in accordance with 25 Pa. Code § 127.450, be incorporated into the Title V Operating Permit through an administrative amendment at a later date.

The application is for an Isomer Unit that will take Light Straight Run (LSR) feed from the existing naphtha fractionator unit and treat it with platformer gases to boost the octane value of the LSR. The design maximum processing rate for the LSR is 1000 barrel per day. This process will not cause an increase in production nor will it cause an increase in emissions for any other process. The only emission point in this unit will be a natural draft gas fired heater. The draft is adjusted manually. There will be a number of potential fugitive emission

points due to potential equipment leaks. There are two relief valves on the recycle gas system for protection of equipment. All relief valves will be connected to flare header such that any release that occurs at the startup, shut down, or upset, will be passed through the refinery flare. The fuel usage and emissions for natural gas and refinery gas are based on continuous operation of 8,760 hours per year. This source is subject to Federal NSPS Regulations, 40 CFR Part 60, Subpart J Standards of Performance for Petroleum Refineries. The applicable refinery gas is low sulfur fuel (<162 ppm). Subpart J requires the facility to comply with the H₂S emission limit of 0.10 gr/dscf for the refinery fuel gas. The facility has proposed using an existing H₂S CEMS monitoring the low sulfur stream from the stabilizer unit and achieve compliance with the requirements of Monitoring of Emissions and Operations (Subpart J Section 60.105). The refinery already implements LDAR for the equipment leaks. The new isomerization unit will be covered by the same program. There are no process vents associated with this unit. Existing storage vessels will be utilized for feed and product storage.

Under 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.44(b) and 127.424(b), that the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) intends to issue a plan approval to **Ellwood Quality Steels Company** (700 Moravia Street, New Castle, PA 16101) for their plant in the City of New Castle, **Lawrence County**. The facility currently has a Title V Operating Permit issued December 27, 1999. This plan approval will, in accordance with 25 Pa. Code § 127.450, be incorporated into the Title V Operating Permit through an administrative amendment at a later date.

This plan approval application is for modification of Furnace No. 17. The modification will remove the existing 1942 vintage burners and controls and replace them with new burners and controls, which will utilize low NOx technology. The overall NOx emissions are expected to drop from 12.3 tpy to 4.6 tpy.

Project description: The Erie-Western Pennsylvania Port Authority has requested a State certification under Section 401(a) of the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. § 1341(a)) discharge of dredged material from the East Avenue Launch Ramp into the Lake Erie Harbor Confined Disposal Facility (CDF) will comply with the applicable provisions of Sections 301—307 of Federal Clean Water Act.

This request was necessitated by conditions imposed by the Department's Water Obstruction and Encroachment Permits E25-404A and E25-581 issued to the Erie-Western Pennsylvania Port Authority requiring Federal Water Act Section 401 certification for the disposal of dredged material into the CDF prior to each dredging and disposal event. The Erie-Western Pennsylvania Port Authority has sampled and tested the sediments in accordance with Attachment A "Sample Collection and Testing Protocol" of both Water Obstruction and Encroachments Permits E25-404A and E25-581. Laboratory testing was conducted in accordance with the US Army Corps of Engineer's Inland Testing Manual and the document "Ecological Evaluation of Proposed Discharge of Dredged or Fill Material in Navigable Waters." Based upon this sampling and laboratory testing, the Erie-Western Pennsylvania Port Authority indicates that the approximately 500 cubic yards of basin sediments from the East Avenue Launch Ramp (Erie North, PA N: 3.6 inches; W: 8.9 inches) discharged into the Lake Erie Harbor Confined Disposal Facility (Erie North, PA N: 4.7 inches; W: 10.3 inches) will have a relatively insignificant impact on the water quality of Lake Erie. This 401 Water Quality Certification is only for this single activity. Any subsequent dredging of the East Avenue Launch Ramp basin and use of the CDF will require separate 401 Water Quality Certification.

OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF AMD TREATMENT SYSTEMS

The Bureau of Abandoned Mine Reclamation (BAMR) is seeking qualified contractors to provide the services needed to maintain interim treatment of acid mine drainage (AMD) discharges. This work will include the operation and maintenance of existing AMD treatment systems as well as the operation and maintenance of new or supplemental systems designed and constructed under BAMR authority. This work will be performed in the anthracite and bituminous coal fields of Pennsylvania.

Contractors should submit information that describes their personnel qualifications, direct experience and geographical areas of interest. This information must be submitted to BAMR on or before 2 p.m., April 25, 2001. BAMR will maintain a list of qualified contractors, grouped by geographical area of interest as well as the type of active or passive AMD treatment systems they are qualified to operate and maintain. This list will be used in one of two ways. If a need arises because of circumstances constituting an emergency as described in Section 516 of the Commonwealth Procurement Code, one or more qualified contractors may be selected from the list of qualified firms without competitive bid and issued a contract for the short-term. The second way the list may be used is to invite qualified contractors, and other interested firms, to participate in the Request for Proposal process if a contractor is needed to operate and maintain the site for the long-term.

The types of AMD treatment systems that will require operation and maintenance have not yet been specifically identified. Generally, most of the work will include active treatment systems such as, but not limited to, the following:

- Lime slurry
- Pebble lime slurry
- Calcium oxide
- Caustic soda flush or drip
- Soda ash briquettes

• Hydrated lime Many of these systems will require the operation and maintenance of facilities such as mixing systems, slurry storage tanks, clarifiers, pumps, retention dams and wells. Any well-developed technologies for active AMD treatment systems may be considered, as will well-developed technologies for passive AMD treatment systems. The types of passive AMD treatment systems include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Limestone beds
- Aerobic wetlands
- Anoxic limestone drains
- Vertical flow systems
- Semi-active dosing systems

Any combination of active and passive AMD treatment systems may also be considered.

The information to be submitted to BAMR includes the contractor's personnel qualifications, direct experience, and geographical areas of interest. Include the number of professional personnel such as analysts, auditors, researchers, programmers, consultants and others who may be engaged in the work. For each personnel listed, include education and experience in geology, engineering, mine water treatment and abatement. Indicate the responsibilities each will have and how long each has been with your company. Include experience in the operation and maintenance of AMD treatment systems as well as acid mine water prevention, abatement and treatment and the design of AMD mitigation projects. Experience shown should be work done by individuals who will be assigned to this work as well as that of the company. Identify studies or projects referred and for customers, provide the name, address, and telephone number of the responsible official, customer, company, or agency. Include the geographical areas that your company is interested in doing work. Geographic areas are those covered by five District Offices in the Bureau of District Mining Operations. The District Offices included are Cambria, Greensburg, Hawk Run, Knox, and Pottsville. Additional relevant information will also be accepted.

All construction of in-stream structures and stream restoration shall be completed in dry work conditions through dam and pumping or fluming stream flow around work area. All rock materials used for in-stream work shall be free of fines and silts. The project will permanently impact 0.36-acre of wetland and 600-feet of waterway. The 600-feet of waterway impacted by the activities authorized by this permit shall be successfully mitigated by 0.12-acre of stream restoration. Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency Regulation No. 30-55 Reductions of Major Water Use March 2, 2001

We submit for your consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) which have not been met. The Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (PEMA) must respond to these comments when it submits the final-form regulation. If the final-form regulation is not delivered by December 4, 2002, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

1. Section 118.1. Definitions.—Clarity.

Public water supply agency

Section 118.1 defines "public water supply agency" by referencing a statutory standard of "... at least 15 service connections. . . ." However, §§ 118.2 and 118.4(a)(1) relax this standard to "50 or more customer connections." There are two issues. First, what is the basis for the standard of "50 or more customer connections?"

Second, the regulation should include the standard of "50 or more customer connections" in the definition of "public water supply agency," and then use this defined term without qualification in §§ 118.2 and 118.4(a)(1).

2. Section 118.4. Contingency plans—public water supply agencies.—Reasonableness, Clarity.

Subsection (b)(6)

This subsection requires the public water supply agency to provide a plan of action including, "public notice" when responding to drought and water shortage conditions. What constitutes "public notice" in this instance? The final-form regulation should include examples of "public notice."

Subsection (b)(7)

In this subsection there is a reference to 4 Pa. Code § 120.9(d). Should the reference be 4 Pa. Code § 120.9(e)?

Subsection (b)(7)(i)

In subsection (b)(7)(i), as well as § 118.6(a)(1), the language, "relative impact of water use reductions" is used. How is the "relative impact of water use reductions" going to be measured?

Subsection (b)(7)(i)(C)

This subsection and § 118.6(a)(2)(iii) use the phrase "essential public utility services." It is unclear what services fall into this category. For example, the definition of "public utility" in the Public Utility Code (66 Pa.C.S.A. § 102) includes transportation carriers, such as railroads and telecommunications providers. However, the definition excludes electric generation supplier companies as a result of the Electricity Generation Customer Choice and Competition Act (66 Pa.C.S. §§ 2801—2812). For clarity, "essential public utility services" should be defined, and the definition should include the specific utility services which are considered essential.

3. Section 118.5. Contingency plans—self supplied commercial and industrial users.—Clarity.

In subsection (a)(3), the phrase, "a reasonable time" is used in the last sentence. What is considered "a reasonable time?" The final-form regulation should specify a time frame, or the criteria upon which a "reasonable time" will be determined.

4. Section 118.8. Procedure for exemptions or variance from water use reductions by self-supplied industrial or commercial water users.—Clarity.

Subsection (c)(3)

Paragraph (3) authorizes the Commonwealth Drought Coordinator (CDC) to “request the applicant to provide *within a reasonable time* additional information as necessary to review the application.” (Emphasis added.) The final-form regulation should specify a minimum time frame, or the phrase “within a reasonable time” should be deleted.

Additionally, this paragraph contains a vague reference to “other appropriate Commonwealth agencies.” The agencies should be specified in the final-form regulation.

Subsection (c)(4)

Under paragraph (4), “[w]hen possible” the CDC will issue a written decision on an application for an exemption or variance within 7 working days, or 1 working day if perishable products are involved. The regulation does not specify what circumstances would prevent the CDC from issuing a decision within these time frames. Since an application for an exemption or variance is filed when a business believes it is facing “extraordinary hardship,” the time frame for review may be critical to the industrial or commercial water user. What circumstances would prevent the CDC from meeting the 7 or 1 working day time frames?

Subsection (c)(7)

Paragraph (7) provides that when a decision of the CDC is appealed, “PEMA will provide the applicant with an opportunity for a hearing. The regulation also states that “PEMA may appoint a hearing examiner who may be an administrative law judge of the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission.” There are two questions.

First, within what time frame will a hearing be provided? Second, under what circumstances will PEMA appoint a Public Utility Commission administrative law judge to serve as the hearing examiner?

Subsection (c)(9)

Under paragraph (9), PEMA will notify the applicant in writing of its final decision on the appeal. The regulation provides no time frame for PEMA to issue the final decision. Consequently, it is unclear if the appeal process will be completed quickly enough to provide relief to a business. Time frames for each stage of the appeal process should be added to the final-form regulation.

5. Section 118.9. County drought management task force.—Clarity.

Format

The existing language under this section is intended to be deleted. However, as published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, the right bracket at the end of the second sentence is missing. When published in final-form, there should be a right bracket after “*Pennsylvania Bulletin*.”

Subsection (a)(2)

This subsection states that “county task forces shall be comprised of county emergency management officials, . . . elected officials, health officials, fire officials, law enforcement officials. . . .” As written, this provision could be interpreted to require all officials in each county to serve on their county task forces. Is the intent to allow these officials, or their representatives, to serve on the county task force? The final-form regulation should clarify the intent of this provision.

Subsection (a)(3)

The subsection requires the county commissioners to report to the CDC on county task force activities. However, the regulation is silent on when and how often these reports are due. The final-form regulation should clarify this reporting requirement.

6. Miscellaneous clarity issues.

- In § 118.1, the definition of “consumptive water” appears to contain a typographical error. The conjunction “or” after the word, “used” and before the word, “is” should be deleted.
- The last sentence of § 118.2 uses the phrase “directs by directing.”
- It appears that “by directing” should be deleted.
- Section 118.4(b)(7) references 4 Pa. Code § 120.9(d). Should the reference be 4 Pa. Code § 120.9(e)?
- Section 118.7 is placed between §§ 118.6 and 118.8 (relating to Implementation of reductions by self-supplied industrial and commercial water users; and relating to Procedure for exemptions or variance from water use reductions by self-supplied industrial or commercial water users). The penalties and enforcement provision should be moved to the end of the chapter.

**Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency
Regulation No. 30-56**

**Prohibition of Nonessential Water Uses in a
Commonwealth Drought Emergency Area**

March 2, 2001

We submit for your consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) which have not been met. The Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (PEMA) must respond to these comments when it submits the final-form regulation. If the final-form regulation is not delivered by December 4, 2002, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

1. Section 119.1. Definitions.—Clarity.

Athletic field

What does the term “racing” refer to in this definition?

2. Section 119.4. Prohibition of nonessential water uses.—Clarity.

Vague language

The last sentence of the opening paragraph states “Nothing in paragraphs (1)—(4) allows a prohibited use of water as either a direct or indirect effect of the exceptions contained therein.” This sentence neither narrows the restrictions, nor clarifies the exceptions. Therefore, it should be deleted.

Paragraph (2)(iv)(F)

Under this paragraph, noncompliance with an approved plan will cause the plan to be void and will result in a prohibition on further water use. The preceding paragraph (2)(iv)(A)—(E) relate to approval of a plan. Since the provision in paragraph (2)(iv)(F) is not related to plan approval, it should be included as a separate paragraph (2)(v), and the succeeding paragraphs should be renumbered.

Paragraph (3)(ii)

Under this paragraph, certain gardens, landscaped areas, trees and shrubs may be watered between 5 p.m. and 9 a.m. A commentator noted that water bags are used to irrigate trees. The bags are installed and left in place for several days. As a result, they would not meet the time of day restriction for watering included in this paragraph. Has PEMA considered exempting the use of water bags from the time of day restriction?

Paragraph (4)

In this paragraph, the regulation establishes a time frame for plan approval of "no earlier than 3 years prior to the month of use during an emergency." How was the 3-year time frame determined?

Paragraph (4)(iv)

This paragraph requires meters and meter records to be available to representatives of the local law enforcement authority or the Commonwealth Drought Coordinator (CDC). The final-form regulation should clarify if the records are to be made available by the golf course operator or the local water supplier.

Paragraph (4)(vi)

This provision allows limited watering of heat sensitive grasses on golf courses between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m., provided that the watering is done with a hand-held hose with an automatic shut-off nozzle. Has PEMA considered allowing automated systems for this watering if they are timed and supervised?

Paragraph (5)(i)—(iv)

These paragraphs list the exceptions to the prohibition on the use of water for washing paved surfaces. A commentator noted that washing of manufacturing plant roads should be allowed when it is required to meet an environmental permit condition or other regulatory requirement for dust control. This specific exemption is not included under subparagraphs (i)—(iv). The final-form regulation should clearly state whether paved surfaces can be washed to meet a permit or other regulatory requirement.

Paragraph (7)(v)(B)

The regulation allows car dealers to wash vehicles on certain days of the week. Car dealers with even or no street addresses may wash cars on Wednesdays. In the existing regulation, dealers with no street address were permitted to wash cars on a separate day. Why have the even and no street addresses been combined in the proposed regulation?

3. Section 119.6. Procedure for exemptions or variance from the prohibition of nonessential uses of water.—Clarity.

Duration of exemption or variance

Is an exemption or variance permanent, or just for the duration of a drought? A public water supply agency could be under the impression that an exemption approved during a drought constitutes a plan revision. The regulation should clearly state that an exemption granted for a particular drought does not automatically apply to a future drought.

Subsection (b)

The criteria for reviewing a water supplier's application for an exemption are not clear. What criteria will be used to determine "the ability of law enforcement agencies

locally or throughout the drought emergency area to enforce these or other emergency regulations?"

Subsection (c)

The phrase, "other personal or economic loss which is substantially more severe than the sacrifices borne by other water users subject to the prohibition of nonessential use of water" is vague. What factors will PEMA consider to make this determination?

Subsection (d)(5)

This subsection states "When possible. . ." the drought coordinator will provide a decision within certain time frames. What circumstances would prevent the CDC from rendering a decision within these time frames?

**Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency
Regulation No. 30-58
Local Water Rationing Plans
March 2, 2001**

We submit for your consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) which have not been met. The Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (PEMA) must respond to these comments when it submits the final-form regulation. If the final-form regulation is not delivered by December 4, 2002, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

1. Section 120.1. Definitions.—Clarity.

Commonwealth Drought Coordinator

This definition should be consistent with the definition of the same term in §§ 118.1 and 119.1.

2. Section 120.5. Implementation of plans.—Reasonableness; Clarity.

Subsection (a)

Paragraph (2) references two guidance documents relating to water rationing and states that public water supply agencies "are encouraged to" contact the Department for assistance in developing a plan. Regulations establish binding norms of general applicability and future effect. The provisions in this paragraph are not mandates. Therefore, paragraph (2) should be deleted. However, its provisions would be more appropriately placed in a policy statement or other publication.

Subsection (d)

Paragraph (1) requires notice in "at least one newspaper serving the area covered by the plan." To insure adequate coverage, the regulation should require the notice to be published in a newspaper of general circulation for the area covered by the plan (See 45 Pa.C.S. §§ 101 and 307).

Additionally, the notice in paragraph (1) is only required to include the approval of the plan and its effective date. Should the notice also include where the public can review a copy of the plan, or how the public can obtain a copy as required by paragraphs (3) and (4)?

3. Section 120.8 Service interruptions.—Reasonableness; Clarity.

One commentator believes it would not be practical for a water supplier to operate curb stops or install flow restrictors on single user services. Are the provisions of this section intended to apply to individual service connections or to larger portions of a water system?

4. Section 120.11. Enforcement by political subdivision ordinance.—Clarity.

As published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, subsection (a)(1) repeats the phrase “plan has been.” This typographical error should be corrected for publication of the final-form regulation.

5. Section 120.14 Repeal of a plan.—Clarity.

The title of this section references a “repeal.” However, the text of this section references both repeal and amendment. The title should be revised accordingly.

6. Section 120.15. Notification of termination.

Similar to § 120.5(d), this section requires notice of a plan repeal to be published in “at least one newspaper.” The regulation should require the notice to be published in a newspaper of general circulation for the area covered by the plan (See 45 Pa.C.S. §§ 101 and 307).

**State Board of Veterinary Medicine
Regulation No. 16A-5713
Examinations, Application for Licensure and
Certification, Fees**

March 2, 2001

We submit for your consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) which have not been met. The State Board of Veterinary Medicine (Board) must respond to these comments when it submits the final-form regulation. If the final-form regulation is not delivered by January 2, 2003, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

1. Section 31.32. Certification.—Clarity.

Subsection (a)(4)

This subsection requires an applicant to provide a letter of good standing from the licensure board of other states reporting the outcome of any disciplinary actions. It is unclear what impact reports of disciplinary actions accompanying a “letter of good standing” will have in the Board’s certification decisions. The regulation should be revised to clarify how disciplinary action may affect the review of these types of applications.

Subsection (a)(5)

This subsection requires an animal health technician applicant to provide a statement that the applicant has not been convicted of a drug related felony in this Commonwealth or other states. The subsection includes three exceptions to this requirement: (1) “at least 10 years have elapsed from the date of conviction,” (2) the applicant demonstrates “significant progress in personal rehabilitation since the conviction” and (3) “the applicant otherwise satisfies the qualifications contained in the Board’s regulations.”

Each exception raises questions.

First, the House Professional Licensure Committee questioned how the Board would determine that there have been no convictions during the past 10 years.

Second, how will the Board determine whether “significant progress in personal rehabilitation” has occurred?

Third, what is the need for, and purpose of, the third exception? It provides an exception when the applicant “otherwise satisfies the qualifications contained in the Board’s regulations.” To which “qualifications,” is it refer-

ring? Aren’t all applicants required to meet the qualifications prescribed by the Board?

The Board should respond to the questions concerning these exceptions.

2. Section 31.33. Applications.

Section 31.11. Application for licensure.—Reasonableness; Clarity.

There are two issues concerning how applicants can obtain application forms.

First, there are different application forms for animal health technician certification. To apply for certification by endorsement, applicants must contact the Board for application forms. In contrast, applicants for certification by examination must contact the professional testing organization for application forms under § 31.33(a). The regulation contains information on how to contact the Board for application forms. However, it provides no information on how to contact the professional testing organization. The regulation should clarify how applicants may obtain forms from the professional testing organization.

Second, § 31.33(b) state that applicants may use the Board’s mailing address or the “Board’s web page” to obtain application forms for animal health technician certification by endorsement. Similar language is used in § 31.11(a) for application forms for veterinarian licensure. However, the regulation is deleting the Board’s telephone number as an option for contacting the Board. Why? The regulation should give applicants the opportunity to obtain application forms via telephone as well as mail or internet.

3. Section 31.35. Examinations.—Clarity.

The Board is deleting information on the availability and frequency of examinations. The Board’s reason for this deletion is “the professional testing organization, not the Board, determines the frequency and location of the Veterinary Technician National Examination.” While this is correct, the regulation should inform applicants how they can learn where and when these examinations will be given.

**Constables’ Education and Training Board
Regulation No. 35-26
Constables’ Education and Training**

March 2, 2001

We submit for your consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) which have not been met. The Pennsylvania Constables’ Education and Training Board (Board) must respond to these comments when it submits the final-form regulation. If the final-form regulation is not delivered by December 18, 2002, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

1. Section 431.2. Definitions.—Need; Reasonableness.

The first paragraph of this section includes the sentence “The following words and phrases, when used in this chapter, have the meanings as indicated.” This sentence is not needed, and should be deleted.

Waiver

This definition is lengthy and includes substantive provisions. For clarity, the Board should shorten this definition and rely upon the specific criteria for each

course in the regulation. For example, it may be sufficient to simply define waiver as “the Board’s grant of permission to a constable to reduce the hours of classroom attendance in a Board training course.”

2. Section 431.11. Registration.—Clarity.

This section states: “To be considered by the Board for certification, a person shall register with the Board by submitting the information requested by the Board.” We have two concerns with this section.

First, what information will the Board request? An applicant will not know what information to submit if no examples of information are included in the regulation. Examples of pertinent information should be included in the final-form regulation.

Second, this section should specifically state how and in what format an applicant should submit such information to the Board. For example, does a form exist? This should be clarified.

3. Section 431.15. Certification numbers.—Clarity.

Subsections (d) and (e)

Both subsections (d) and (e) use the term “immediately.” Subsection (e)(1) uses the phrase “as soon as practicable.” These phrases are vague. The Board should replace these phrases with specific time frames.

Subsection (e)

Paragraph (2) finishes with the phrase, “upon the constable’s successful completion of the next available continuing education.” This phrase is incomplete. To alleviate any confusion, a term such as “period” or “program” should be inserted at the end of this sentence.

The timeframes described in paragraphs (1)—(3) are not clear. For example, paragraph (3) uses the time period of “5 years after the constable’s initial certification or most recent recertification.” Do these time periods begin with the date of initial certification, or the lapse of certification? This should be explained.

Additionally, in paragraph (3), the phrase “not less than 5 years” should be replaced with “5 years or more.”

4. Section 431.21. Curriculum.—Statutory authority; Consistency with statute.

Subsection (a)

This subsection outlines the categories of instruction included in basic training. Section 2945 of Act 44 of 1994 (42 Pa.C.S. § 2945) (act) states that basic training must include “instruction in the interpretation and application of the fees provided for in section 2950 (relating to fees).” This topic is not specifically listed in this section. For consistency with the statute, “instruction in the interpretation and application of the fees provided for in section 2950 (relating to fees)” of the act should be included in the final-form regulation.

Subsection (b)

This subsection would allow the Board to “add, delete or modify one or more topics upon publishing prior notice of the changes in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and in an edition of the *Constables’ Training Bulletin*. . . .”

A provision of the regulation may only be amended by promulgation of a new regulation. The Board should delete subsection (b) or explain its statutory authority to amend the regulation without going through the rule-making process.

5. Section 431.22. Successful completion.—Clarity.

Training period

This section does not state the total number of training hours needed for an applicant to become a constable. Section 2945 of the act requires “training for a total of 80 hours.” The 80-hour requirement should be stated in the final-form regulation.

Subsection (a)(3)

A constable or other person, according to subsection (a)(3), will complete basic training successfully by “demonstrating to the Board’s satisfaction proficiency in practical skills.” We have three issues with the clarity of this subsection.

First, what is the process by which a constable or other person will demonstrate their skills to the Board? Will they demonstrate through examination scores or a practical examination? This should be clarified in the final-form regulation.

Second, the criteria that will be used to determine the Board’s satisfaction should be included in this subsection, such as a certain score on a written exam.

Finally, the Board should provide examples of “practical skills” in the final-form regulation.

6. Section 431.24. Waiver examination.—Clarity.

Subsection (a)

We have two comments on subsection (a). First, this section states, “. . . who attains a passing grade score on the Board’s basic training waiver examination as established by the Board.” It is not clear as to what is being established by the Board—the basic training waiver examination or the passing grade score. According to § 431.32(a), the Board is establishing a passing score. To alleviate confusion, the phrase “as established by the Board” should be placed directly after what the phrase modifies. Further, the phrase should be used consistently throughout the regulation.

Second, subsection (a) uses the term “passing grade score.” Subsection (b) uses “passing score.” For consistency, one phrase should be used consistently throughout the regulation.

7. Section 431.31. Curriculum.—Economic impact; Clarity.

This section states the Board may periodically change the content of continuing education. We have two questions. First, how will a constable receive notice of this change? How will the Board implement changes so that a course already completed at the time of the change is not later disallowed?

Second, the term “periodically” is vague. Does the Board intend to change the content annually? If so, “annually” should replace “periodically.”

8. Section 431.32. Successful completion.—Need; Reasonableness; Clarity.

Subsection (a)(1) requires attendance for all of the hours required by the act. For clarity, this provision should include the specific requirement of “40 hours per year” in section 2946 of the act.

9. Section 431.43. Firearm and ammunition.—Clarity.

Course Prerequisites

We have two overall concerns with this section. First, it is our understanding that subsections (a)—(c) are prereq-

uisites to being admitted to the firearms qualification course. Failure to meet them would not result in a failure of the course under § 431.44(b)—(d), since the constable would not have been admitted to the course. The regulation should clearly explain that subsections (a)—(c) are prerequisites to being admitted to the firearms qualification course.

Second, as explained in more detail below, the requirements of subsections (a)—(c) lack specificity, partly due to the broad range and changing nature of firearms and ammunition available. The Board should consider adding a mechanism which allows a constable the opportunity to predetermine whether a specific firearm and ammunition are acceptable.

Subsection (a)

This subsection states “a constable shall be responsible for providing a firearm, ammunition, magazines, speed loaders, safety accessories, cleaning equipment and other associated equipment as needed during the firearms qualification course.” How will a constable know what specific “safety accessories, cleaning equipment, and other associated equipment” are needed?

Subsections (b) and (c)

These subsections require firearms and ammunition to be “generally acceptable for law enforcement usage within this Commonwealth.” The regulation should either specifically state or cross reference the standards used to determine firearms and ammunition that is acceptable for law enforcement usage in this Commonwealth. In the alternative, the Board should establish a mechanism for a constable to request advance approval of a particular firearm.

10. Section 431.51. Board approval of school.—Clarity.

Section 6.8 of the *Code and Bulletin Style Manual* states that “shall” should be used to express a duty or obligation, and “will” should be used when the agency pledges to act. Since the Board must establish, implement and administer training programs under section 2944(1) of the act, we question why the word “may” is used in subsection (a) rather than “will.”

**State Board of Veterinary Medicine
Regulation No. 16A-5711
Continuing Education**

March 2, 2001

We submit for your consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) which have not been met. The State Board of Veterinary Medicine (Board) must respond to these comments when it submits the final-form regulation. If the final-form regulation is not delivered by December 18, 2002, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

1. Section 31.15. Continuing education.—Reasonableness of implementation; Need; and Clarity.

We have four concerns with this section:

“Individual study or correspondence courses”

The terms “individual study or correspondence courses” are unclear. Existing regulations for other licensure boards contain definitions for similar terms. For example, § 36.224 in the existing regulations for Certified Pennsyl-

vania Evaluators defines the term “correspondence courses.” Including similar definitions in this regulation would clarify these terms.

Setting a limit on credit for “individual study or correspondence courses”

The House Professional Licensure Committee (House Committee) noted that the Regulatory Analysis Form (RAF) states that the regulation uses the figure “25%” to set the number of credits that could be earned through individual study or correspondence courses. However, the regulation sets a limit of a “maximum of 2 clock hours” per biennium for these types of courses. Why are the RAF and the regulation inconsistent when describing required credit hours? This should be explained.

Implementation date

The Preamble states that the regulation will apply to continuing education credits earned during the December 1, 2000, to December 1, 2002, biennial renewal period. We have two concerns with beginning the program during this cycle. First, the House Committee has suggested that the Board should postpone implementation of the program to the next biennial cycle. If the Board plans to implement this rulemaking within the next 6 months, we see no need to alter the effective date. However, if implementation will take longer than 6 months, we agree with the House Committee that the regulation should not apply to continuing education credits earned until the December 1, 2002, to December 1, 2004, biennial renewal period.

Second, licensees who take individual study or correspondence courses prior to the rulemaking’s effective date should be given full credit for those courses in accordance with current requirements.

Unnecessary phrases

The amendment adds a new sentence to the end of § 31.15 that reads: “The courses shall meet the requirements of § 31.16 (relating to continuing education provider approval).” We question the need for this sentence since section 31.16 immediately follows this section and includes similar language. The new sentence is also redundant. The first sentence in the same section states, “a veterinarian shall attend clock hours of continuing education courses *approved* by the Board . . .” (emphasis added). To eliminate repetition, the new sentence at the end of this section should be deleted.

“Attend” v. “complete”

The section states that “a veterinarian shall attend 8 clock hours of continuing education . . .” The House Committee suggested changing the word “attend” to “complete” (emphasis added). We agree that this change would clarify the requirements set forth in the regulation.

Code Part II (relating to the General Rules of Administrative Practice and Procedure) (General Rules). The chairperson of the Board has appointed a committee to conduct all necessary proceedings under the General Rules and to recommend action by the Board under section 293.1 of the School Code.

Because Williamsport has filed an appeal of the decree of the court of common pleas to the Commonwealth Court, there is substantial question as to whether the Board has the authority to act upon the application for approval of the creation of Woodward Township and its transfer until disposition of the appeal. Without deciding at this time whether the Board has the power, authority and jurisdiction during the pendency of Williamsport's appeal to the Commonwealth Court to decide upon Woodward Township's application, the committee has decided to commence the procedures that it must conduct before it makes its recommendation to the Board.

Therefore, in anticipation of the conduct of further proceedings under the General Rules, the Board committee established to consider the application of Woodward Township hereby invites all interested persons and entities to file with the Board all appropriate notices of intervention, petitions to intervene, protests or public comments regarding the Woodward Township application.

It should be noted that Williamsport and Jersey Shore, along with Woodward Township, have already been granted status as participants in the matter.

Notices of intervention, petitions to intervene, protests and public comments must be received by the Board at its offices at 333 Market Street, Harrisburg, PA 17126-0333, no later than Friday, April 20, 2001.
