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READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Title 49—PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

STATE BOARD OF CERTIFIED REAL ESTATE APPRAISERS

[49 PA. CODE CH. 36]

Broker/Appraiser Fees

By this order, the State Board of Certified Real Estate Appraisers (Board) amends § 36.6 (relating to fees) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Section 36.6 lists a schedule of fees currently charged by the Board. The amendments add to this schedule two fees relating to the new certification class of broker/appraiser: An application fee of \$40 (for the application period of September 3, 1996 to September 3, 1998) and an initial certification fee of \$90 (if certification occurred between July 1, 1997, and June 30, 1998) or \$45 (if certification occurred between September 3, 1996, and June 30, 1997, or if certification occurred on or after July 1, 1998, if the application for certification was received by September 3, 1998).

Background and Purpose

Act 71 of 1996 amended section 6 of the Real Estate Appraisers Certification Act (REACA) (63 P. S. § 457.6), to establish the certification class of broker/appraiser. The broker/appraiser certification permits eligible real estate brokers to perform real estate appraisals in non-Federally related transactions after their authority to do so under REACA expired September 3, 1998. Real estate brokers who were licensed in good standing as of September 3, 1996, and who submitted qualifying applications to the Board between September 3, 1996, and September 3, 1998, were eligible for certification as broker/appraisers.

The application fee defrays: (1) the identifiable costs incurred by the Board in reviewing and processing an application for broker/appraiser certification; and (2) a portion of the Board's administrative overhead. The initial certification fee (a prorated amount depending on when certification occurred during the Board's biennial renewal cycle, which begins July 1 of the odd-numbered years) defrays a portion of the Board's general operating expenses (for example, legal services, investigative activities, administrative support). These costs are not capable of being apportioned to a specific segment of the persons regulated by the Board and, therefore, must be borne by the entire regulated community. The same two-tiered fee is charged to newly certified persons in the Board's other certification classes (that is, general appraiser, residential appraiser, Pennsylvania evaluator).

Rather than delay the processing of broker/appraiser applications pending regulatory approval of the fees, the Board has issued certificates to qualified applicants who submitted timely applications and intends to bill certificateholders for the fees upon completion of final rulemaking. Applicants for certification were given notice of the proposed fees and of the Board's intention to deny biennial renewal of certification to those who fail to pay them.

Summary of Comments and Responses to Proposed Rulemaking

The Board published a notice of proposed rulemaking on May 2, 1998 (28 Pa. B. 2036), following which the Board entertained public comments for 30 days. On June 1, 1998, the Board received comments from the Pennsylvania Association of Realtors (PAR) supporting the fees.

On July 2, 1998, the Board received comments from the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) recommending editorial changes under its review of the fees under the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.1—745.15). The Board did not receive comments from the House Professional Licensure Committee (House Committee) and the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee (Senate Committee), both of which reviewed the fees during proposed rulemaking.

At the suggestion of IRRC, the Board has amended the description of the application fee in § 36.6 to clarify that the fee applies to applications that were submitted during the 2-year application period beginning September 3, 1996 and ending September 3, 1998; the original description of the fee did not reference the 2-year application period. Also at the suggestion of IRRC, the Board has amended the description of the initial certification fee in § 36.6 to clarify that the \$45 fee will be charged to certificateholders who obtained their certifications between September 3, 1996, and June 30, 1997, or on or after July 1, 1998, if their applications were received by September 3, 1998; the original description of the fee did not identify the final cutoff date.

Fiscal Impact

Each of the approximately 4,125 persons who hold current broker/appraisers certifications will be required to pay the \$40 application fee. Of these certificateholders, 699 will be required to pay the \$90 initial certification fee and approximately 3,426 will be required to pay the \$45 initial certification fee. Accordingly, the fees will generate total revenues for the Board of approximately \$382,080 (4,125 x \$40 plus 3,426 x \$45 plus 699 x \$90).

Paperwork Requirements

The fees will not create additional paperwork for the Board and the regulated community. Certificateholders will be billed for the fees when they receive their biennial renewal notices in April 1999.

Statutory Authority

Section 5(6) of the REACA (63 P. S. § 457.5(6)), authorizes the Board to establish fees for its operation. Section 9 of the REACA (63 P. S. § 457.9) requires the Board to fix the fees by regulation and to ensure that the revenues derived from the fees are adequate to cover the Board's expenses.

Compliance with Executive Order 1996-1

In accordance with the requirements of Executive Order 1996-1 (relating to regulatory review and promulgation), the Board, in developing the fees, solicited comments from the major trade organizations that represent various segments of the regulated community.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on April 17, 1998, the Board submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 28

Pa.B. 2036, to IRRC and to the House and Senate Committees for review and comment.

In adopting this final-form regulation, the Board considered comments from IRRC and the PAR. The Board did not receive comments from the House and Senate Committees.

On January 25, 1999, the Board submitted this final-form regulation to IRRC and the House and Senate Committees. Under the authority of section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, the final-form regulation was approved by the House Committee on February 9, 1999, deemed approved by the Senate Committee on February 16, 1999, and approved by IRRC on February 18, 1999.

Findings

The Board finds that:

(1) Public notice of the Board's intention to amend 49 Pa. Code Chapter 36, by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) The regulation adopted by this order is both necessary and appropriate for the administration of the REACA.

Order

The Board, acting under its authorizing statute, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Board, 49 Pa. Code Chapter 36, are amended by amending § 36.6 to read as set forth in Annex A.

(b) The Board shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General and the Office of General Counsel for approval as required by law.

(c) The Board shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) The amendment shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

[67 PA. CODE CH. 173]

Flashing or Revolving Lights on Emergency and Authorized Vehicles

The Department of Transportation (Department), Bureau of Motor Vehicles, under the authority contained in sections 4103 and 6103 of the Vehicle Code (75 Pa.C.S. §§ 4103 and 6103), and consistent with the goals of Executive Order 1996-1, February 6, 1996, Regulatory Review and Promulgation, announces its intention to amend Chapter 173 (relating to flashing or revolving lights on emergency and authorized vehicles).

The purpose of this proposed rulemaking is to bring Chapter 173, into compliance with the act of December 19, 1998 (P. L. 1126, No. 151) (75 Pa.C.S. § 4552). These proposed amendments will eliminate any inconsistencies between the statute and the regulations as they relate to lights permitted on school buses. The act of December 19, 1998 (P. L. 1126, No. 151) (75 Pa.C.S. § 4552) allows school buses to be equipped with a bright white strobe light on the roof of the vehicle. Chapter 173 must be amended to incorporate identical language so as to avoid any conflict with the authorizing statute.

The Department anticipates that this proposed rulemaking will affect owners of school buses. Vehicle Equipment and Inspection

The Department of Transportation (Department), Bureau of Motor Vehicles, under the authority contained in sections 4303 and 6103 of the Vehicle Code (75 Pa. C.S. §§ 4303 and 6103), and consistent with the goals of Executive Order 1996-1, February 6, 1996, Regulatory Review and Promulgation, announces its intention to amend Chapter 175 (relating to vehicle equipment and inspection).

The purpose of this proposed rulemaking is to bring Chapter 175, into compliance with the act of April 17, 1997 (P. L. 6, No. 3) (75 Pa. C.S. § 4702) and the act of December 19, 1998 (P. L. 1126, No. 151) (75 Pa. C.S. §§ 102, 4303, 4537, 4702 and 4703). These proposed

amendments will eliminate any inconsistencies between the statute and the regulations as they relate to the definition of specific vehicles and frequency of inspections for trailers and vehicles under contract with, or owned by, a school district, private or parochial school used to transport students. This proposed rulemaking will also clarify that only antique vehicles registered under 75 Pa.C.S. § 1340 (relating to antique, classic and collectible plates) are exempt from the safety inspection program; that new vehicles which are in some state of construction or modification and which are being transported to or by a second stage manufacturer are also afforded exemption from the inspection requirements; and that pedalcycle carrying devices may be installed on the front of buses.

The Department anticipates that this proposed rulemaking will affect owners of modular housing units, motorized pedalcycles, passenger cars, special mobile equipment, trucks and self-propelled wheelchairs or electrical mobility devices, antique vehicles, new vehicles in the possession of a second stage manufacturer, vehicles that are under contract with a school district to transport school students or vehicles owned by a school district or private or parochial school used to transport school students, trailers over 10,000 pounds and buses with pedalcycle carrying devices mounted on the front.

STATE BOARD OF ACCOUNTANCY

[49 PA. CODE CH. 11]

Continuing Education Program Sponsors

Under Executive Order 1996-1 (relating to regulatory review and promulgation), the State Board of Accountancy is soliciting preliminary input, prior to publication of proposed rulemaking, on draft amendments to its regulations relating to continuing education program sponsors.

The draft amendments would set forth new requirements for program sponsors effective May 1, 2000. The new requirements would enhance program sponsor standards and responsibilities, provide for onsite and offsite review of program sponsor offerings, clarify the grounds for withdrawal of program sponsor approval and establish fees for initial program sponsor approval and biennial renewal of approval. Currently approved program sponsors desiring to offer continuing education to certified public accountants and public accountants after April 30, 2000, would be required to apply for re-approval under the new requirements.

Currently approved and prospective program sponsors are invited to submit preliminary input on the draft amendments no later than April 30, 1999. STATE BOARD OF OSTEOPATHIC MEDICINE

[49 PA. CODE CH. 25]

Application Fees

The State Board of Osteopathic Medicine (Board) proposes to amend §§ 25.231 and 25.503 (relating to schedule of fees; and fees) by revising those fees which are not related to license renewals but rather to applications and specific services so as to accurately reflect the cost of processing applications and providing services. The proposed changes are set forth in Annex A.

A. Effective Date

The proposed amendments will take effect when they are published as final rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. Statutory Authority

Section 13.1(a) of the Osteopathic Medical Practice Act (act) (63 P. S. § 271.13a(a)), requires the Board to establish fees by regulation. The same provision requires the Board to increase fees to meet or exceed projected expenditures if the revenues raised by fees, fines and civil penalties are not sufficient to meet expenditures.

C. Background and Purpose

The act requires the Board to set fees by regulation so that revenues meet or exceed expenditures. General operating expenses of the Board are funded through biennial license renewal fees which are paid by all licensees. Expenses of the Board which are related to processing individual applications or providing certain services directly to individual licensees or applicants are excluded from general operating revenues. These expenses are funded through fees which are based on the cost of providing the service. The fee is charged to the person requesting the service. These application and service fees are the focus of this proposed rulemaking.

A recent systems audit of the operations of this and other boards within the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs analyzed the fees for services to licensees and applicants to determine if the fees reflected the actual cost of providing the services. Actual cost calculations are based on the following formula:

$$\begin{array}{r} \text{number of minutes to perform the function} \\ \times \\ \text{pay rate of personnel performing the function} \\ + \\ \text{a proportionate share of administrative overhead.} \end{array}$$

The analysis determined that the current application and service fees did not accurately reflect the actual cost of processing the following: application for osteopathic license; application for short-term camp license for an osteopathic physician; temporary training license or graduate training certificate for osteopathic physician; application for physician assistant certificate; application for registration as supervising physician; uncertified verification of license or permit; certification of license, examination grades or hours; application for registration as an acupuncturist; application for registration as an acupuncturist supervisor; temporary permit for respiratory care practitioner; initial license application for respiratory care practitioner; and fees for American Registry of Radiologic Technologists examinations.

Fees for most of these services were established in 1990. The fee for application for osteopathic license was established in January, 1989. The fees regarding acupuncturists were established in January, 1994. The fees for application for respiratory care practitioner and for a temporary permit for respiratory care practitioner were established in November, 1996. In some cases the fees exceeded actual cost, but in most, the fees fell short of the cost to provide the service.

Fees for the services identified in this proposal would be adjusted to allocate costs to those who use the service or submit the application.

The Board proposes a new fee of \$25 to cover the cost of processing applications for the Radiography, Nuclear Medicine Technology, Radiation Therapy Technology, limited Examination in Radiography—Thorax and extremities and limited examination in Radiography—skull and sinuses. The Board had previously charged a fee for each examination which covered the cost of both processing the application and the examination itself. The examination fee is now paid to the examination contractor and covers only the cost of the examination, not the Board's cost in processing the application. The application fee now covers the cost of processing the application.

The Board also proposes to delete from its regulations the fee for Study Materials for ARRT Limited Examination in Radiography. As a convenience to applicants taking the limited radiography examination, the Board

makes available study materials for applicants. Applicants are not required to purchase the materials either by the Board or any other entity. The Board is not required to provide the materials. The Board purchases the materials from the publisher and passes the materials on to those applicants who wish to obtain them. The Board improvidently implemented this optional service as a fee set by regulation. The publishers have changed the price of the materials several times since the implementation of the fee. The publisher does not give notice of its intention to change price. It is impractical for the Board to attempt to maintain a fee for this completely optional service. At the present time the publisher charges \$27 for the materials. The Board loses money every time it provides the materials because the fee is fixed at \$21. The Board proposes to delete the fee so that the materials could be provided at actual cost.

The fee increases have resulted from increases in staff costs and administrative overhead. The significant decreases in the costs of the application for unrestricted license to practice as an osteopathic physician and the application for physician assistant result from the processing of routine applications by Board staff. The Board had previously reviewed all physician and physician assistant applications. The Board now reviews only those physician and physician assistant applications which appear to contain problems or discrepancies.

D. Compliance with Executive Order 1996-1

In accordance with the requirements of Executive Order 1996-1 (February 1, 1996), in drafting and promulgating the proposed amendments the Board considered the proposed amendments as both required by law and the least restrictive means of covering the costs of services requested by licensees and applicants.

E. Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed amendments will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fees will have a modest fiscal impact on those members of the private sector who apply for services from the Board. The amendments will not impose additional paperwork requirements upon the Commonwealth, political subdivisions or the private sector.

F. Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the cost effectiveness of its regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

G. Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on March 17, 1999, the Board submitted a copy of these proposed amendments to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and the Chairpersons of the House Professional Licensure Committee and the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee. In addition to submitting the proposed amendments, the Board has provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a detailed regulatory analysis form prepared by the Board in compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, "Regulatory Review and Promulgation." A copy of the material is available to the public upon request.

If IRRC has objections to any portion of the proposed amendments, it will notify the Board within 10 days of the close of the Committees' review period. The notification shall specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met by that portion. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review of

objections prior to final publication of the regulation by the agency, the General Assembly and the Governor.

Fees

The State Board of Physical Therapy (Board) proposes to amend §§ 40.5 and 40.153 (relating to fees) by revising certain application fees to read as set forth in Annex A.

A. Effective Date

The proposed amendments will be effective upon publication of the final-form regulation in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. Statutory Authority

The proposed amendments are authorized under section 8(b) of the Physical Therapy Practice Act (act) (63 P. S. § 1308(b)).

C. Background and Purpose

The act requires the Board to set fees by regulation so that revenues meet or exceed expenditures over a biennial period. General operating expenses of the Board are funded through biennial license renewal fees. Expenses related to applications or services which are provided directly to individual licensees or applicants are excluded from general operating revenues and are funded through fees in which the cost of providing the service forms the basis for the fee.

In a recent systems audit of the operations of the Board within the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, the fees for services to licensees and applicants were analyzed to determine if the fees reflected the actual cost of providing the services. Actual cost calculations are based upon the following formula:

$$\begin{aligned} & \text{number of minutes to perform the function} \\ & \quad \times \\ & \text{pay rate for the classification of personnel performing} \\ & \quad \text{the function} \\ & \quad + \\ & \text{a proportionate share of administrative overhead.} \end{aligned}$$

The analysis determined that certain fees were insufficient to capture the actual cost of providing the service whereas certain other fees were more than sufficient to capture the cost of providing the service. For example, the proposed fee for an application for licensure as a physical

therapist by foreign training would be reduced from \$160 to \$45 which is the actual cost of processing this application.

In this proposal, fees for the services identified would be adjusted to allocate costs to those who use the service or application. The Board would continue to apportion the enforcement and operating costs to the general licensing population when the Board makes its biennial reconciliation of revenue and expenditures.

In addition, this proposal combines all fees into one section rather than splitting fees pertaining to physical therapist assistants into a separate section.

D. Compliance with Executive Order 1996-1

In accordance with the requirements of Executive Order 1996-1 (February 6, 1996), in drafting and promulgating the proposed amendments the Board considered the least restrictive alternative to regulate costs for services requested by licensees and applicants.

E. Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed amendments will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fees will have a modest fiscal impact on those members of the private sector who apply for services from the Board. The proposed amendments will impose no additional paperwork requirements upon the Commonwealth, political subdivisions or the private sector.

F. Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the cost effectiveness of its regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

G. Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on March 17, 1999, the Board submitted a copy of these proposed amendments to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and the Chairpersons of the House Professional Licensure Committee and the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee. If IRRC has objections to any portion of the proposed amendments, it will notify the Board within 10 days of the close of the Committees' review period. The notification shall specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met by that portion. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the amendments, by the Board, the General Assembly and the Governor, of objections raised.

STATE BOARD OF EXAMINERS OF NURSING HOME ADMINISTRATORS

Subordinate Supervision

The State Board of Examiners of Nursing Home Administrators (Board) adopts the following statement of policy relating to the supervision of an applicant for a license as a nursing home administrator.

Section 39.5(b) (relating to requirements for admission to licensing examination, examination procedures) requires applicants to acquire experience in the practice of nursing home administration under the supervision of a full-time nursing home administrator. Frequently, applicants question whether experience obtained under the supervision by a subordinate of the applicant constitutes experience which satisfies this requirement.

The purpose of this statement of policy is to clarify the regulations and advise applicants that supervision by a subordinate does not constitute acceptable experience unless the subordinate is a full-time nursing home administrator licensed in this Commonwealth and has the authority to direct the applicant during the period of qualified work experience, including transferring, suspending, assigning or discharging the applicant.

This statement of policy is effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

GENERAL

§ 39.18. Subordinate supervision—statement of policy

(a) *Background and purpose.* Section 39.5 (relating to requirements for admission to licensing examination; examination procedures) requires applicants to acquire experience in the practice of nursing home administration under the supervision of a full-time nursing home administrator. Frequently, the Board is asked to recognize an

applicant's experience acquired under the supervision of a nursing home administrator who is a subordinate of the applicant.

(b) *Guidelines.*

(1) The Board does not view supervision by an applicant's subordinate as acceptable supervisory experience. The Board believes that supervisors need to have the ability to oversee and direct the applicant during the period of qualified work experience, including the ability to transfer, suspend, assign or discharge individuals under their supervision. The Board believes that in most circumstances subordinates, because of the supervisor-subordinate relationship, do not possess the requisite degree of oversight over their supervisor to comply with § 39.5.

(2) The Board recognizes that there may be rare circumstances in which an apparent supervisor-subordinate relationship exists, but the subordinate in fact has the ability to exercise the requisite oversight and direction of the applicant's work experience. In those instances, the applicant would have the burden of proving the supervisory relationship, and the applicant will be given the opportunity to prove to the Board's satisfaction that the subordinate in fact possessed the requisite degree of oversight to comply with the regulation.

Policy Statement Expanding Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) Process to Contested Proceedings Including 52 Pa. Code Ch. 41; Doc. No. M-00991221

Proposed Policy Statement

By the Commission:

Under section 501 of the Public Utility Code, 66 Pa.C.S. § 501, the Commission proposes a policy statement which

expands the availability and use of the Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) Process (mediation) to all contested proceedings, or proceedings which could be contested. The proposed expansion of the ADR policy statement will include transportation proceedings.

The proposed changes are based on 4 years of experience in handling mediations by the Commission's Office of Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) as well as the ALJ's favorable experience with the mediation process. This proposal allows more flexibility and is drafted to conform with general mediation principles which were not as well defined in the past. Accordingly, to make mediation a more flexible process and available to more parties, we will modify the existing policy statement.

The present ADR process has been in effect since March 15, 1994. The ALJ reports that the ADR process is working well and is highly successful.¹ The ALJ also reports that ADR is worthwhile in resolving disputes and agrees that it should be expanded to include all utility types.

The proposed policy statement recognizes the positive affect that mediation has had in streamlining contested proceedings in both rate and nonrate cases. The Commission wishes to accord all industries, including the transportation industry, the same opportunity to seek negotiated settlements in contested proceedings in lieu of incurring the time, expense and uncertainty of litigation. Expanding the availability of mediation to all contested proceedings or proceedings which could be protested, will further promote the goal of obtaining negotiated settlements in the public interest.

Previously, mediation was available to the transportation industry as a result of being included in the non-rate case category. However, by including the availability of mediation in Chapter 41 of the Commission's regulations the Commission intends to notify those in the transportation industry, who may have been previously unaware of the Commission's mediation process, that mediation is available in contested proceedings as a fair and efficient alternative to protracted litigation.

Accordingly, under section 501 of the Public Utility Code, 66 Pa.C.S. §§ 501, and sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) known as the Commonwealth Documents Law (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1—7.5, we propose the adoption of the policy statement in the manner set forth in Annex A; *Therefore,*

It Is Ordered That:

1. A proceeding shall be initiated to consider the proposed policy statement set forth in Annex A hereto.

2. This order and Annex A shall be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*; interested persons may submit written comments, an original and 15 copies, to: Secretary, Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission, P. O. Box 3265, Harrisburg, PA 17105-3265, and shall have 20 days from the date the order is published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* to submit the comments. Commentators are strongly encouraged, if suggesting changes or additions to the proposed policy statement, to supply alternative interpretive language. A diskette containing the comments in electronic format should also be provided to the Commission.

¹In the Commission's 1997/1998 Fiscal Year Annual Report, the ALJ reported that a total of 55 cases were concluded under mediation procedures. Of those cases, 50 cases were resolved in full, two were resolved for the most part and three mediations were terminated, resulting in a success rate in excess of 90%.

3. A copy of this order and Annex A shall be served upon the Pennsylvania Motor Truck Association, the Pennsylvania Bus Association and the International Taxicab and Livery Association, the National Association of Water Companies-Pennsylvania Chapter, the Pennsylvania Gas Association, the PTA, the Pennsylvania Electric Association, the Office of Consumer Advocate, the Office of Small Business Advocate and the Office of Trial Staff.

MEDIATION PROCESS GUIDELINES

§ 41.31. General.

The Commission encourages parties to seek negotiated settlements of contested proceedings in lieu of incurring the time, expense and uncertainty of litigation. To further promote the goal of obtaining negotiated settlements in the public interest, the Commission has adopted guidelines that offer the parties, in certain contested proceedings, the option of mediation.

§ 41.32. Availability of mediation process.

The mediation process is intended to be a flexible program designed to facilitate the amicable resolution of disputes between parties. The Office of Administrative Law Judge manages the mediation program. The mediation process administered by the Commission follows the procedures in Chapter 69 (relating to general orders, policy statements and guidelines on fixed utilities) regarding mediation process for fixed service utilities.

Subpart C. FIXED SERVICE UTILITIES

CHAPTER 69. GENERAL ORDERS, POLICY STATEMENTS AND GUIDELINES ON FIXED UTILITIES

[ALTERNATIVE DISPUTE RESOLUTION (ADR) PROCESS MEDIATION PROCESS GUIDELINES]

§ 69.391. General.

(a) The [Commission's policy and regulations encourage] Commission encourages parties to seek negotiated settlements of contested proceedings in lieu of incurring the time, expense and uncertainty of litigation. To further promote the goal of obtaining negotiated settlements in the public interest, the Commission has adopted guidelines that will offer the parties in certain

contested proceedings the option of [an ADR process before an experienced mediator] mediation.

(b) Mediation is intended to be a flexible program designed to facilitate the amicable resolution of disputes between parties. The Office of Administrative Law Judge manages the mediation program.

§ 69.392. Availability of [ADR] mediation process.

(a) [The ADR process will be available to the parties in contested proceedings involving the following:

(1) Nonrate cases.

(2) Rate cases in which the amount of the requested increase in annual revenues is less than \$500,000.

(3) Single-issue rate cases.

(b) Parties that desire to use the ADR process should notify the Commission in writing within 20 days of the date a formal complaint is filed or, in the case of a Commission instituted proceeding, within 10 days of the entry date of the Commission order which institutes the proceeding. The party with the burden of proof shall agree to use the ADR process; and, for cases subject to a statutory deadline for adjudication, that party shall also agree to extend voluntarily the statutory deadline by at least 60 days] Mediation is available to parties in all contested proceedings, or proceedings which could be contested, when the proceeding qualifies for mediation. A proceeding qualifies for mediation when the following apply:

(1) Mediation is deemed to be appropriate by the OALJ.

(2) Necessary parties consent to mediate.

(b) The following applies to parties requesting mediation:

(1) Parties may request mediation, prior to the commencement of a proceeding, by sending a letter request to the Mediation Coordinator of the Office of Administrative Law Judge (OALJ), and a copy of the request to the Secretary of the Commission.

(2) Parties may request mediation in their pleadings.

(3) Parties may request mediation during the course of a proceeding.

(c) The OALJ may notify the parties in a proceeding that mediation may be appropriate and ask whether the parties consent to use the mediation process.

(d) The following applies to the party with the burden of proof:

(1) Except as otherwise directed by the Commission, there can be no mediation unless the party with the burden of proof, and the other necessary parties, consent to mediate.

(2) When the party with the burden of proof consents to mediation in proceedings subject to a statutory deadline for adjudication, that party shall also agree, in writing, to extend the statutory deadline by at least 60 days.

(e) The Commission may assign a case to the OALJ for mediation.

§ 69.393. Assignment and role of mediator.

[The ADR process will be managed by the Office of Administrative Law Judge (OALJ) which will determine initially whether the proceeding qualifies for mediation and, if so, will assign an experienced ALJ or other qualified bureau employe to mediate the contested proceeding. The OALJ mediator's role will be to facilitate resolution of the contested issues among the parties, not to render a decision on the merits. As such, the OALJ mediator will not have access to nonpublic Commission reports that evaluate the merits of the parties' positions or claims, or both.] If the Commission assigns a case for mediation, or the Office of Administrative Law Judge (OALJ) determines that a proceeding qualifies for mediation, the OALJ will assign a mediator to the proceeding. The mediator's role will be to facilitate resolution of the contested issues between or among the parties, as opposed to rendering a decision.

§ 69.394 [Timetables and procedures] Notice.

[If no full settlement is reached or only a partial settlement is produced within 30 days of the date the matter is assigned to the mediator, the matter will be automatically referred to an administrative law judge for hearing and decision, except that the initial 30-day mediation period can be extended for up to another 30 days by mutual consent in writing of all parties who are participating in the mediation. For cases subject to a statutory deadline for adjudication, the party with the burden of proof must agree to extend the deadline commensurately with the length of the mediation extension. For cases in which hearings must be commenced within 90 days, a party's request for mediation shall be construed as a waiver of that requirement.] (a) If the Commission assigns a case for mediation, or the Office of Administrative Law Judge (OALJ) determines that a proceeding qualifies for mediation, the parties will be notified of the time, date and place of the mediation session, as well as the name, address and telephone number of the mediator.

(b) If the OALJ determines that the proceeding does not qualify for mediation, the parties will be notified of this as well as the procedure to be used in lieu of mediation.

§ 69.395. [Mediator's report] Rules.

[Regardless of the result of the mediation, the Office of Administrative Law Judge mediator will issue a public report for the record that describes the efforts expended in attempting to reach a settlement and the results achieved.] (a) Acceptance into the mediation program is construed as a waiver of the requirement that hearings shall be commenced within 90 days after the proceeding is initiated.

(b) The participants in a mediation proceeding shall agree to abide by mediation rules and procedures established by the Office of Administrative Law Judge. There will be no mediation when the necessary parties do not agree to abide by these rules and procedures. Failure to abide by these rules and procedures, following commencement of mediation, could lead to the termination of the mediation.

§ 69.396. Conclusion of mediation.

(a) When an agreement is reached in a formal complaint proceeding, the complaint may be withdrawn, unless otherwise provided for by law or regulation.

(b) When appropriate, the mediator may submit a report to an administrative law judge, or the Commission. The report will describe only the procedural background and the result of the mediation.

§ 69.397. Flexibility.

To ensure maximum flexibility, the rules and procedures used in mediation are subject to modification as deemed appropriate to facilitate a resolution of a dispute.

Referendum on Continuation of the Pennsylvania Peach and Nectarine Research Program

I. The Pennsylvania Peach and Nectarine Research Program (Program) was established under 3 Pa.C.S. §§ 4501—4513 (relating to Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act) (act). The act requires that the Secretary of Agriculture call a referendum of affected producers every 5 years to determine whether or not a majority of those voting still desire the program. The program was last subjected to a review referendum conducted in 1994. It is now time for another review referendum to determine whether a majority of the peach and nectarine producers desire for the program to continue.

II. *Referendum Period:* The referendum period shall be April 16, 1999, until 4 p.m. on April 30, 1999. Completed ballots shall be mailed or hand-delivered to the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Market Development, Room 311, 2301 North Cameron Street, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9408. Hand-delivered ballots must be received by 4 p.m. on April 30, 1999. Ballots that are mailed must be postmarked no later than April 30, 1999, and received no later than May 5, 1999.

III. *Notice of Referendum:* This referendum order and an official ballot shall be mailed no later than April 16, 1999, to all affected producers whose names appear on the list of Pennsylvania peach and nectarine producers maintained in the Office of the Secretary of Agriculture.

Additional copies of the same materials shall be made available at the Office of the Secretary of Agriculture.

IV. *Eligible Voters:* The rules governing the eligibility of a producer for voting are as follows: The record date for determination of whether a producer is eligible to vote is April 1, 1999. All peach and nectarine producers who grow 500 or more peach and/or nectarine trees of all ages are eligible to vote.

V. *Counting of Ballots:* The ballots will be canvassed and counted by a Teller Committee appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture. The counting of the ballots will begin at 10 a.m., Thursday, May 6, 1999, in the State Agriculture Building, Harrisburg, PA. The Secretary will announce the results of the referendum within 30 days following the completion of the referendum period. The results will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and disseminated to the news media.

VI. *Reporting Irregularities:* Any irregularities or disputes concerning the referendum procedures must be reported in written form to the Secretary of Agriculture not later than 7 calendar days from the end of the referendum period.

VII. *Publication:* This referendum order shall be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and the *Patriot-News*.

VIII. *Effective Date:* The foregoing order shall be effective from and after the 20th day of March, 1999.

LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

Preamble 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302, 303, 304 and 305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the background standard, Statewide health standard, the site-specific standard, or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area, must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site, and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, or a combination of the cleanup standards, or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified as proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is

made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of a site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved, and comments, should be directed to the remediator of a site.

This sewage treatment plant treats sewage from Indiana Borough and White Township and discharges to Stoney Run approximately 2,500 feet upstream of the confluence with Two Lick Creek. The Department of Environmental Protection (Department), under the authority of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (35 P. S. §§ 6020.101—6020.1304) (HSCA), has initiated a prompt interim response at Concept Sciences Inc. Site (Site). This response has been undertaken under section 505(b) of HSCA. The Concept Sciences Inc. Site is located at 749 Roble Road in the Lehigh Valley Industrial Park III, in Hanover Township, Lehigh County, PA.

On February 19, 1999, an explosion occurred at the Site. As a result of the explosion, five people were killed and extensive property damage occurred. The Site was a chemical manufacturing facility utilizing and/or containing materials such as hydroxylamine, hydroxylamine sulfate, potassium hydroxide, potassium sulfate and others. As a result of the explosion, a release and a threat of release of hazardous substances and contaminants exists at the Site. Under section 505(b) of the HSCA, the Department determined that prompt action was required to protect public health and the environment.

Between February 19, 1999, and March 3, 1999, neither the owner nor the operator agreed to implement measures determined to be reasonable in light of the information available to the Department to address the continuing release and threat of release of hazardous substances and contaminants at the Site. Because the Site owner, Lehigh Realty Associates III, and operator, Concept Sciences Inc., did not address the immediate threat to human health and the environment posed by runoff from the Site, the Department mobilized an emergency response contractor on February 27, 1999. The contractor was tasked with collecting and transporting contaminated runoff from the Site to a disposal facility.

In addition, as of March 3, 1999, the owner and the operator had not addressed the continuing release and threat of release of hazardous substances and contaminants remaining at the Site which pose a continuing threat to public health and the environment. Accordingly, the Department initiated a Prompt Interim Response at the Site on March 4, 1999. The Department's contractor, in addition to taking over the work of the emergency response contractor, was tasked with, among other things, disposal of chemicals in tanks, drums and other containers, maintenance of security, decontamination and removal of debris, excavation and removal of contaminated soil, collection of soil and water samples and demolition of onsite building. The Department selected the Prompt Interim Response based on the information available to the Department as of March 4, 1999. The objective of the Department's prompt interim response is to eliminate the immediate threat to human health and safety and the environment posed by the hazardous substances and contaminants present at the Site.

This notice is being provided under sections 505(b) and 506(b) of HSCA. The administrative record which contains the information that forms the basis and documents the selection of this response action is available for public review and comment. The administrative record is located at the Department's Bethlehem District Office, 4530 Bath Pike (Route 512) in Hanover Township, Northampton

County and is available for review Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Division of Dam Safety

Act 91

Amending Title 30 (Fish) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes Providing for the Marking of Dams

Under its responsibility under Act 91, the Department of Environmental Protection (Department), Bureau of

Waterways Engineering, Division of Dam Safety has compiled and maintains the following list of existing dams on the waters of this Commonwealth that the Department determines to be run-of-the-river type dams. The Department has notified the permittees and owners of these run-of-the-river dams and advised them of their duties and responsibilities to mark these dams under Act 91 in accordance with guidelines established by the Fish and Boat Commission.

Act 91 requires permittees and owners of run-of-the-river dams to maintain warning signs and buoys and provides for civil penalties for any permittee or owner who fails to maintain signs and buoys in accordance with Fish and Boat Commission Guidelines. The Act also provides that exclusion zones above and below these dams be established by the Fish and Boat Commission and that persons who enter an exclusion zone marked under the provisions of the Act commits a summary offense of the third degree.

Persons aggrieved by this action may appeal, under section 4 of the Environmental Hearing Board Act (35 P. S. § 7514) and 2 Pa.C.S. §§ 501—508 and 701—704 (relating to the Administrative Agency Law) to the Environmental Hearing Board, Second Floor, Market Street State Office Building, P. O. Box 8457, Harrisburg, PA 17105-8457, (717) 787-3483. TDD users may contact the Board through the Pennsylvania Relay Service, (800) 654-5984. Appeals must be filed with the Environmental Hearing Board within 30 days of receipt of written notice of this action unless the appropriate statute provides a different time period. Copies of the appeal form and the Board's rules of practice and procedure may be obtained from the Board. The appeal form and the Board's rules of practice and procedure are also available in braille or on audiotape from the Secretary to the Board at (717) 787-3483. This paragraph does not, in and of itself, create any right of appeal beyond that permitted by applicable statutes and decisional law.

Proposed General Plan Approval and General Operating Permit (BAQ-GPA/GP-10); Nonheatset Web Offset Lithographic Printing Press

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) proposes to issue general plan approvals and operating permits for nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses (hereinafter referred to as the "Nonheatset Web Press General Permit"). This general plan approval and operating permit, authorized under section 6.1(f) of the Air Pollution Control Act, applies only to plants that are not major volatile organic compound (VOC) or major hazardous air pollutant (HAP) emitting facilities.

The proposed general plan approval and general operating permit contains conditions that prescribe applicable performance standards, emission limits, monitoring, recordkeeping and reporting requirements for nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses. The proposed general plan approval and operating permit may also be used to authorize the construction of new nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses. Major facilities, as defined in 25 Pa. Code § 121.1 (relating to definitions), may use the general plan approval/general permit as a plan approval so long as major source permitting requirements are not triggered.

The proposed Nonheatset Web Press General Permit is the second air quality general plan approval/general permit prepared in consultation with the Graphic Arts Association and the Graphic Arts Technical Foundation. The Graphic Arts Technical Foundation has prepared guidance for the industry to determine if graphic arts facilities are subject to the permitting requirements, as

well as, recordkeeping and reporting forms for showing compliance with the Nonheatset Web Press General Permit requirements.

Prior to operating under the Nonheatset Web Press General Permit, the owner or operator of the source must notify the Department and receive prior written approval from the Department before commencing to operate the affected facility. The owner or operator of an affected facility proposing to operate under this general permit shall notify the Department on a form provided by the Department and receive prior written approval to operate under the Nonheatset Web Press General Permit. The owner or operator of nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses operating under this general permit must comply with the terms and conditions of the general plan approval and general operating permit.

Authorization to operate under the Nonheatset Web Press General Permit will be valid for a term of 5 years. A plan approval application fee is required each time the permittee constructs nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses in accordance with Nonheatset Web Press General Permit. The Department proposes to establish plan approval application, operating permit application and operating permit renewal fees as follows:

- a. Two hundred fifty dollars during the 1999 calendar year.
- b. Three hundred dollars during the 2000-2004 calendar years.
- c. Three hundred seventy-five dollars beginning in the 2005 calendar year.

Within 30 days of the expiration date of the authorization to operate under the general plan approval and general operating permit, the permittee must renew the authorization if the facility intends to continue to operate under the Nonheatset Web Press General Permit.

1. *Statutory Authority and General Description*—In accordance with section 6.1(f) of the Air Pollution Control Act (35 P. S. § 4006.1), and 25 Pa. Code § 127.622 (relating to compliance with general plan approvals and gen-

eral operating permit conditions), the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) hereby issues this general plan approval and general operating permit for nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses (hereinafter referred to as "Nonheatset Web Press General Permit").

2. *Applicability/Source Coverage Limitations*—This Nonheatset Web Press General Permit is designed to serve as either a general plan approval or as a general operating permit for printers who exclusively use nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses or have one or more nonheatset web offset lithographic presses located in a facility. The specific use of the general permit will depend upon permit status, emission levels and location of the facility as outlined below.

Approval herein granted to operate under this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit is limited to a facility engaged in printing on nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses as defined in Condition 16 of this permit. This Nonheatset Web Press General Permit has been established in accordance with the provisions described in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 127, Subchapter H (relating to general plan approvals and operating permits). If additional types of printing or manufacturing is conducted at the facility that can not be regulated by the requirements of this general permit, an operating permit issued in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapter 127, Subchapter F (relating to operating permits) will be required, or, if the facility is a Title V facility, a Title V operating permit issued in accordance with Subchapter F and Subchapter G (relating to Title V operating permits) will be required.

Operating Permit

This Nonheatset Web Press General Permit is not intended for use by a Title V facility as defined in 25 Pa. Code § 121.1. A "Title V facility" includes sources that have actual emissions or a potential to emit (PTE) equal to or greater than the maximum permitted emission levels shown in the following table for a single facility: A facility is eligible to operate under this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit if its actual emissions will remain below the maximum permitted emission levels listed below. A nonheatset web offset lithographic printing press facility is exempted from the permit requirements of § 127.402 (relating to general provisions) if it is demonstrated that the facility's actual emissions are less than the permit exemption levels in this section.

This Nonheatset Web Press General Permit can be used for any facility engaged in nonheatset web offset printing with actual emissions less than those identified above as the maximum permitted emission levels.

Plan Approval

This Nonheatset Web Press General Permit shall also serve as a general plan approval for nonheatset web offset lithographic printing press that meet the requirements specified in Conditions 17, 18, 19 and 20 of the general permit. The installation or modification of each nonheatset web offset lithographic printing press that meets the following criteria is exempt from plan approval requirements if the press:

- a. emits volatile organic compounds (VOCs) at a rate less than 2.7 tons per year (tpy), and;
- b. emits a single hazardous air pollutant (HAP) at a rate less than 1 tpy, and;
- c. emits a combination of hazardous air pollutants (HAPs) rates less than 2.5 tons of all HAPs combined per year, or;
- d. has a cylinder width 17 inches or less.

Facilities claiming an exemption based on the emissions-based criteria (a)—(c) must provide a 15-day prior written notification to the Department indicating that VOC/HAP emission increases will not exceed the emissions-based criteria.

The modification of a nonheatset web offset lithographic printing press includes the addition of a printing unit, coating unit, or other changes that would increase the facility's emission of VOCs or HAPs above the exemption levels specified in criteria (a)—(c).

3. *Application for Use*—Any person proposing to operate, install or modify a nonheatset web offset lithographic press under this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit shall notify the Department using the Nonheatset Web Offset Lithographic Printing Press General Permit Application provided by the Department. In accordance with 25 Pa. Code § 127.621 (relating to application for use of general plan approvals and general operating permits), the applicant shall receive prior written approval from the Department prior to operating under the general permit.

4. *Compliance*—Any applicant authorized to operate a nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses under this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit shall comply with the terms and conditions of the general permit. The nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses shall be:

- a. Operated in such a manner as not to cause air pollution.
- b. Operated and maintained in a manner consistent with good operating and maintenance practices.
- c. Operated and maintained in accordance with the manufacturer's specifications and the applicable terms and conditions of this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit.

5. *Permit Modification, Suspension and Revocation*—This Nonheatset Web Press General Permit may be modified, suspended or revoked if the Department determines that affected nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses cannot be regulated under this general permit. Authorization to use this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit shall be suspended or revoked if the permittee fails to comply with applicable terms and conditions of the Nonheatset Web Press General Permit.

The approval herein granted to operate the nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses shall be sus

pended, if, at any time, the permittee causes, permits or allows any modification without Departmental approval (as defined in 25 Pa. Code § 121.1) of the nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses covered by this general permit. Upon suspension of the general permit, the permittee may not continue to operate or use said nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses. If warranted, the Department will require that the nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses be permitted under the state operating permit and/or Title V operating permit program requirements in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 127, as appropriate.

6. *Notice Requirements*—The applications and notifications required by 25 Pa. Code § 127.621 shall be submitted to the appropriate Regional Office responsible for issuing general permits in the county in which the nonheatset web offset lithographic printing press is, or will be, located. As required under § 127.621(b) the application shall be either hand delivered or transmitted by certified mail return receipt requested.

The permittee shall notify the Department, in writing, within 24 hours of the discovery of any malfunction during a business day or by 5 p.m. on the first business day after a weekend or holiday of any malfunction of the nonheatset web offset lithographic printing press(es) which results in, or may result in, the emission of air contaminants in excess of the limitations specified in, or established pursuant to, any applicable rule or regulation contained in 25 Pa. Code Part I, Subpart C, Article III (relating to air resources).

7. *Sampling and Testing*—The permittee shall, upon the request of the Department, provide input material analyses, or input material samples used in any nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses authorized to operate under this general permit.

8. *Monitoring, Recordkeeping and Reporting*—The permittee shall comply with applicable monitoring, recordkeeping and reporting requirements set forth in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 139 (relating to sampling and testing, the Air Pollution Control Act, the Clean Air Act, and the applicable regulations under the acts).

9. *Term of Permit*—The Nonheatset Web Press General Permit is issued for a fixed term of 5 years. The Department will notify each applicant, by letter, when approval to operate under this general permit is granted.

10. *Permit and Administrative Fees*—The Nonheatset Web Press General Permit establishes the following application and renewal fees payable every 5 years if no equipment changes occur:

a. Two hundred fifty dollars during the 1999 calendar year.

b. Three hundred dollars during the 2000-2004 calendar years.

c. Three hundred seventy-five dollars beginning in the 2005 calendar year.

An additional plan approval application fee as indicated above is required each time the permittee installs or modifies a nonheatset web offset lithographic printing press. The installation or modification of a nonheatset web offset lithographic printing press must be conducted according to the terms and conditions of this general permit. Two or more nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses may be installed under a single plan approval fee.

11. *Expiration and Renewal of Permit*—The permittee's right to operate under this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit terminates on the date of expiration of this permit unless a timely and complete application for the renewal of the general permit is submitted to the Department at least 30 days prior to the permit expiration date.

Upon receipt of a complete and timely application for renewal, the nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses may continue to operate subject to final action by the Department on the renewal application. This protection shall cease to exist if, subsequent to a completeness determination, the applicant fails to submit by the deadline specified in writing by the Department any additional information required by the Department to process the renewal application.

The Nonheatset Web Press General Permit application for renewal shall include the identity of the owner or operator, location of the nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses, current permit number, description of source category, the appropriate renewal fee listed in Condition 10 of this permit and any other information requested by the Department. At a minimum, the permit renewal fee shall be submitted to the Department at least 30 days prior to the expiration of the Nonheatset Web Press General Permit.

12. *Applicable Laws*—Nothing in this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit relieves the permittee from its obligation to comply with all applicable Federal, State and local laws and regulations.

13. *Prohibited Use*—Any air contamination source that is subject to the requirements of 25 Pa. Code Chapter 127, Subchapter D (relating to prevention of significant deterioration), 25 Pa. Code Chapter 127, Subchapter E (relating to new source review) 25 Pa. Code Chapter 127, Subchapter G (relating to Title V operating permits), or 25 Pa. Code § 129.91 (relating to control of major sources of NO_x and VOCs), may not operate under this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit. Title V facilities may use this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit as a general plan approval when the major new source review and prevention of significant deterioration requirements are not applicable.

14. *Transfer of Ownership or Operation*—The permittee may not transfer the Nonheatset Web Press General Permit except as provided in 25 Pa. Code § 127.464 (relating to transfer of operating permits).

15. *Plan Approval*—This Nonheatset Web Press General Permit authorizes the construction and operation of nonheatset web offset lithographic printing press(es) that meet the best available technology (BAT) required under 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12(a)(5). For purposes of this general permit, the emission limits specified in Conditions 17, 18, 19 and 20 of this general permit are BAT for nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses.

16. *Definitions*—For purposes of this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit, the following definitions apply:

a. *Alcohol*—A class of compounds containing the hydroxyl group OH. The term includes any of the following compounds, when used as a fountain solution additive for offset lithographic printing: ethanol, n-propanol and isopropanol.

b. *Alcohol Substitutes*—Nonalcohol additives that contain VOCs and are used in the fountain solution. The

term includes additives used to reduce the surface tension of water or prevent piling (ink build-up).

c. *Automatic Blanket Wash System*—Equipment used to remotely clean lithographic blankets which may include, but is not limited to those utilizing a cloth and expandable bladder, brush, spray or impregnated cloth system.

d. *Batch*—A supply of fountain solution that is prepared and used without alteration until completely used or removed from the printing process. For the purposes of this general permit, this term includes solutions that are either prepared in discrete batches or solutions that are continuously blended with automix units.

e. *Cleaning Solution*—Liquid solvents or solutions used to remove ink and debris from the operating surfaces of the printing press and its parts.

f. *Dampening System*—Equipment used to deliver the fountain solution to the lithographic plate.

g. *Fountain Solution*—A mixture of water, non-volatile printing chemicals, and an additive (liquid) that reduces the surface tension of the water so that it spreads easily across the printing plate surface. The fountain solution wets the nonimage area so that the ink is maintained within the image areas. Nonvolatile additives include mineral salts and hydrophilic gums. For the purpose of this general permit, the additives may include a VOC content of 5.0% or less. Alcohol and alcohol substitutes, including isopropyl alcohol, glycol ethers, and ethylene glycol, are the most common VOC additives used to reduce the surface tension of the fountain solution.

h. *Fountain Solution Recirculating Reservoir*—The collection tank which accepts fountain solution recirculated from printing units. The tanks typically contain a coarse filter to remove contaminants from the fountain solution and in some cases, are equipped with cooling coils for refrigeration of the fountain solution.

i. *Inking System*—A series of rollers used to meter the ink onto the lithographic plate. The system can include agitators, pumps and totes and other types of ink containers.

j. *Lithography*—A planographic printing process where the image and nonimage areas are chemically differentiated; the image area is oil receptive and the nonimage area is water receptive. This method differs from other printing methods, where the image is typically printed from a raised or recessed surface.

k. *Non-heatset*—A lithographic printing process where the printing inks are set without the use of heat. Traditional nonheatset inks set and dry by absorption and/or oxidation of the ink oils. For the purposes of this general permit, ultraviolet-cured and electron beam-cured inks are considered non-heatset, although radiant energy is required to cure these inks.

l. *Offset*—A printing process that transfers the ink film from the lithographic plate to an intermediary surface (blanket), which, in turn, transfers the ink film to the substrate.

m. *Press*—For purposes of this general permit, a printing production assembly composed of one or more units used to produce a printed substrate or a web. The term includes any associated coating, spray powder application, or infra-red heating units.

n. *Unit*—The smallest complete printing component, composed of inking and dampening systems, of a printing press.

o. *VOC Composite Partial Vapor Pressure*—The sum of the partial pressure of the compounds defined as VOCs. VOC composite partial pressure is calculated as follows:

$$PP_c = \sum_{i=1}^n \frac{(W_i)(VP_i) / MW_i}{\frac{W_w}{MW_w} + \frac{W_c}{MW_c} + \sum_{i=1}^n \frac{W_i}{MW_i}}$$

W_i = Weight of the "i"th VOC compound, in grams

W_w = Weight of water, in grams

W_c = Weight of exempt compound, in grams

MW_i = Molecular weight of the "i"th VOC compound, in g/g-mole

MW_w = Molecular weight of water, in g/g-mole

MW_c = Molecular weight of exempt compound, in g/g-mole

PP_c = VOC composite partial pressure at 20°C, in mm Hg

VP_i = Vapor pressure of the "i"th VOC compound at 20°C, in mm Hg

p. *Web*—A continuous roll of paper used as the printing substrate in a printing process.

17. *Equipment Standards for Fountain Solutions*—Any nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses subject to this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit shall meet one of the following requirements for the fountain solution used on that press:

a. Maintain the as applied VOC content of the fountain solution at or below 5.0% by weight, and;

b. The fountain solution shall contain no alcohol.

18. *Equipment Standards for Blanket and Roller Cleaning Solutions*—Any blanket and roller cleaning solution used on a nonheatset web offset lithographic printing press subject to the terms and conditions this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit shall meet one of the following requirements:

a. VOC content, as applied, is less than or equal to 30 percent by weight, or;

b. VOC composite partial vapor pressure, as used, is less than or equal to 10 mm Hg at 20°C (68°F).

c. The use of cleaning solutions not meeting Conditions 18(a) or (b) is permitted provided that the quantity used does not exceed 55 gallons over any twelve consecutive months.

19. *Equipment Standards for Solvent Containers*—Any owner/operator of a nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses subject to this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit shall keep all solvent containers closed at all times unless filling, draining, or performing cleanup operations.

20. *Equipment Standards for Solvent Laden Shop Towels*—Any owner/operator of a nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses subject to this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit shall keep all solvent laden shop towels in a closed container when not being used.

21. *Testing of Fountain Solutions*—Any owner/operator of a nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses subject to this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit shall determine the VOC content of fountain solution by one of the following procedures:

a. Analysis by USEPA Method 24 of a fountain solution sample,

b. Calculation which combines USEPA Method 24 analytical VOC content data for the concentrated materials used to prepare the press ready fountain solution and

records of the proportions in which they are mixed. The calculation shall only be performed once for each press ready fountain solution and kept in the form of a batch log. See the Fountain Solution Batch VOC Content Form and Fountain Solution VOC Addition Form attached to this general permit. The analysis of the concentrated fountain solution may be performed by the suppliers of those materials.

22. *Testing of Blanket and Roller Cleaning Solutions*—Any owner/operator of a nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses subject to this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit shall determine the VOC content or VOC composite partial vapor pressure of cleaning solutions by one of the following procedures:

a. Analysis by USEPA Method 24 of a cleaning solution sample for VOC content or by an appropriate method for composite partial vapor pressure,

b. Calculation which combines USEPA Method 24 analytical VOC content data for the concentrated materials used to prepare the press ready cleaning solution and records of the proportions in which they are mixed. The calculation shall only be performed once for each press ready cleaning solution and kept in the form of a batch log. See the Cleaning Solution Batch VOC Content Form attached to this general permit. The analysis of the concentrated cleaning solution may be performed by the suppliers of those materials,

c. Calculation for VOC composite partial vapor pressure which combines analytical VOC vapor pressure data for the concentrated materials used to prepare the press ready cleaning solution and records of the proportions in which they are mixed. The analysis and vapor pressure determinations of the concentrated materials may be performed by the suppliers of the materials.

23. *Monitoring Requirements for Automatic Blanket Wash Systems*—Any owner/operator of a nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses subject to this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit using an automatic blanket wash system that mixes cleaning solution

at the point of application must demonstrate compliance with the VOC limitation in Condition 18(a) or (b), shall document that flow meters or fixed volume spray systems result in the VOC content of the mixed solution complies with Condition 18(a) or (b) of the general permit.

24. *Recordkeeping Requirements*—Any owner/operator of a nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses subject to this Nonheatset Web Press General Permit shall collect and record the applicable information specified in this Condition. The information shall be maintained at the facility for a minimum of 5 years. The Department or an authorized representative of the Department shall, at reasonable times, have access to and require the production of books, papers or records, as the Department may reasonable prescribe relevant to compliance with the terms and conditions in this general permit. The information required includes the following:

a. For each nonheatset web offset lithographic ink or conventional varnish used: the monthly consumption in pounds or gallons; the percent by weight VOC and HAP content, as applied; and, an estimate of VOC and HAP emissions. Alternately, the ink with the highest VOC and HAP content may be used to represent all inks used by all nonheatset web offset lithographic printing presses.

b. For each fountain solution and additive: the monthly consumption in pounds or gallons; the percent by weight or weight to volume ratio (lbs/gal) VOC and HAP content and an estimate of VOC and HAP emissions.

c. For each blanket and roller cleaning solution used: the monthly consumption in pounds or gallons; the percent by weight or weight to volume ratio (lbs/gal) VOC and HAP content and an estimate of VOC and HAP emissions.

d. For each month of operation, the volume of all cleaning solution used which does not meet Condition 18(a) or (b).

e. For each month of operation, an estimate of VOC and HAP emissions during the latest 12 months.

Environmental Quality Board—Control of VOCs from Gasoline Dispensing Facilities (Stage II); Regulation No. 7-320

Order

On April 21, 1997, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the Environmental Quality Board. This rulemaking amends 25 Pa. Code § 129.82. The authority for this regulation is 35 P.S. § 4005. The proposed regulation was published in the May 3, 1997 *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 60-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on February 9, 1999.

This regulation implements gasoline dispensing vapor control requirements for most gasoline dispensing facilities in seven southwestern Pennsylvania counties (Allegheny, Armstrong, Beaver, Butler, Fayette, Washington and Westmoreland). The amendments are a part of the overall ozone reduction strategy required to comply with the National Ambient Air Quality Standard. Controlling Volatile Organic Compounds (VOCs) will reduce ozone because VOCs are one of the precursors to the formation of ozone in the atmosphere.

We have reviewed this regulation and find it to be in the public interest. This regulation will help move the southwestern Pennsylvania counties toward compliance with the Federally required standard for ozone.

Therefore, It Is Ordered That:

1. Regulation No. 7-320 from the Environmental Quality Board, as submitted to the Commission on February 9, 1999, is approved; and

2. The Commission will transmit a copy of this Order to the Legislative Reference Bureau.

Environmental Quality Board—Equivalency Determinations and Aerospace Manufacturing and Rework—VOC Emission Limitations; Regulation No. 7-326

Order

On August 12, 1997, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the Environmental Quality Board (EQB). This rulemaking amends 25 Pa. Code §§ 121.1, 129.51 and 129.73. The authority for this regulation is sections 5(a)(1) and 5(a)(13) of the Air Pollution Control Act (35 P.S. §§ 4005(a)(1) and 4006(a)(13)). The proposed regulation was published in the August 23, 1997 *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 67-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on February 9, 1999.

The regulation sets forth the volatile organic compound limitations for operations in the aerospace manufacturing and rework industry. It incorporates the requirements contained in the provisions of a Control Techniques Guidance document from the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The regulation also deletes a provision that requires all equivalencies be submitted to the EPA as revisions to the State implementation plan.

We have reviewed this regulation and find it to be in the public interest. This regulation is consistent with the operating and emission requirements for the aerospace industry in other states. It will allow Pennsylvania's industry to compete more effectively in meeting the demands of its customers including the United States Department of Defense and National Aeronautics and Space Administration. The changes to the equivalency provisions will allow industries in the Commonwealth to implement alternate compliance methods with greater expediency.

Therefore, It Is Ordered That:

1. Regulation No. 7-326 from the Environmental Quality Board, as submitted to the Commission on February 9, 1999, is approved; and

2. The Commission will transmit a copy of this Order to the Legislative Reference Bureau.
