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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

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THE GOVERNOR

Proclamation of Disaster Emergency

March 16, 2007

Whereas, A storm, accompanied by substantial accumulations of rainfall, snow and ice, which began on March 14, 2007, continues to impact the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania with severe weather conditions; and

Whereas, these storm conditions may result in extensive road closures, community public safety delays, property damage, and other adverse impacts upon the population of the Commonwealth; and

Whereas, a subsequent rise in temperatures may cause widespread flooding further adversely impacting the state; and

Whereas, these severe weather conditions may prompt affected county and municipal governments to declare local disaster emergencies or snow emergencies to exist; and

Whereas, the emergency situation may be of such magnitude or severity as to render essential the Commonwealth's supplementation of county and municipal efforts and resources and the activation of all applicable state, county, and municipal emergency response plans.

Now Therefore, pursuant to the provision of Subsection 7301(c) of the Emergency Management Services Code (35 Pa.C.S. Section 7101 et seq.), I do hereby proclaim the existence of a disaster emergency in the Commonwealth, and I direct all Commonwealth departments and agencies to utilize all available resources and personnel as is deemed necessary to cope with the magnitude and severity of this emergency situation.

Further, I hereby transfer up to \$500,000 in unused appropriated funds to the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency. The aforementioned funds shall be used for disaster-related expenses that may be incurred by various state agencies and departments. These funds shall be credited to a special account established by the Office of the Budget. All Commonwealth agencies purchasing supplies or services in response to this emergency are authorized to utilize the emergency procurement procedures set forth in Section 516 of the Commonwealth Procurement Code, 62 Pa.C.S. § 516. This Proclamation shall serve as the written determination of the basis for the emergency under Section 516; the time consuming bid and contract procedures and formalities normally prescribed by law shall be waived for the duration of the Proclamation, mandatory constitutional requirements excepted; and

Further, I hereby authorize the Secretary of Transportation to use all available equipment, resources and personnel of the Department, in whatever manner that he deems necessary, to ensure that all interstate and other federal and state highways in the Commonwealth are cleared of snow and any other obstructions resulting from this severe winter storm. In addition, I hereby waive any laws or regulations that would restrict the application and use of the Department's equipment, resources, and personnel to assist local jurisdictions in clearing and removal of snow and other types of obstructions from non-state-owned highways. This assistance to local jurisdictions may be provided solely at the discretion of the Secretary of Transportation. However, this assistance does not apply to privately owned highways, roads, streets, or other types of property; and I hereby authorize the Secretary of Transportation, in his sole discretion, to waive any provision of the Vehicle Code or any other law or regulation which he is authorized by law to administer or enforce as may be necessary to respond to this impending emergency; and

Further, if conditions warrant it, I hereby authorize the state Department of Transportation to waive any laws or regulations related to drivers of commercial vehicles; and

Further, pursuant to the powers vested in me by the Constitution and laws of this Commonwealth, I hereby authorize the Adjutant General of

Pennsylvania to place on state active duty for the duration of the emergency disaster proclamation, such individuals and units of the Pennsylvania National Guard, as requested by the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency, to alleviate the potential danger to public health and safety caused by the aforementioned emergency; and

Further, I hereby authorize the Commissioner of the Pennsylvania State Police to use all available resources and personnel of the Department, in whatever manner that he deems necessary, to aid in the recovery aspects related to all interstate, other federal and state highways in the Commonwealth to address the emergency resulting from this severe winter storm; and

Further, I direct that the emergency response and recovery aspects of the Commonwealth and all applicable county, municipal, and other disaster response plans be activated, and that all state, county, and municipal actions taken to implement those plans be coordinated through the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency; and

Still Further, I hereby urge the governing bodies and executive officers of all political subdivisions affected by this emergency to act as necessary to meet the current exigencies as legally authorized under this Proclamation, namely, by the employment of temporary workers, by the rental of equipment and by entering into such contracts and agreements as may be required to meet the emergency, all without regard to those time consuming procedures and formalities normally prescribed by law, mandatory constitutional requirements excepted.

Given under my hand and the Seal of the Governor, at the City of Harrisburg, this sixteenth day of March in the year of our Lord two thousand seven, and of the Commonwealth the two hundred and thirty-first.

And Now, this 13th day of March, 2007, the Pennsylvania Rules of Civil Procedure are amended as follows:

- 1. Rules 1141, 1147, 1149, 3180, 3181 and 3257 are amended to read as follows, and
 - 2. New Rule 3101.2 is promulgated to read as follows.

This order shall be processed in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. 103(b) and shall be effective June 1, 2007.

Annex A

TITLE 231. RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 1000. ACTIONS

Subchapter I. ACTION OF MORTGAGE FORECLOSURE

Rule 1141. Definition. Conformity to Civil Action.

(a) As used in this chapter,

"action" means an action to foreclose a mortgage upon any estate, leasehold or interest in land, or upon both personal property and an estate, leasehold or interest in land pursuant to Section 9604(a) of the Uniform Commercial Code, but shall not include an action to enforce a personal liability.

Official Note: Section 9604(a) of the Uniform Commercial Code, 13 Pa.C.S. § 9604(a), provides that if a security agreement covers both personal and real property, the secured party may elect to proceed as to both the real property and the personal property in accordance with its rights with respect to the real property, in which case the other provisions of Article 9 of the Uniform Commercial Code do not apply.

(b) Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, the procedure in the action shall be in accordance with the rules relating to a civil action.

Rule 1147. The Complaint.

- **(a)** The plaintiff shall set forth in the complaint:
- (1) the parties to and the date of the mortgage, and of any assignments, and a statement of the place of record of the mortgage and assignments;
 - (2) a description of the land subject to the mortgage;

- (3) the names, addresses and interest of the defendants in the action and that the present real owner is unknown if the real owner is not made a party;
 - (4) a specific averment of default;
 - (5) an itemized statement of the amount due; and
 - (6) a demand for judgment for the amount due.

Official Note: The plaintiff may also set forth in the complaint a release of the mortgagor and the mortgagor's successors in interest. See Rule 1144(b).

If the mortgage is a residential mortgage under Act No. 6 of 1974, 41 P. S. § 101, the complaint should set forth an averment of compliance with the provisions of [§] **Section** 403 of Act No. 6, 41 P. S. § 403.

- (b) If the plaintiff is proceeding against both personal and real property covered by a mortgage as provided by Section 9604(a) of the Uniform Commercial Code, the plaintiff shall set forth in the complaint.
 - (1) the matters required by subdivision (a), and
- (2) a description of the personal property subject to the mortgage.

Official Note: Section 9604(a) of the Uniform Commercial Code, 13 Pa.C.S. § 9604(a), relates to the rights of a secured party when the agreement covers real and personal property. Compliance with subdivision (b) of this rule is a prerequisite to executing in one proceeding pursuant to Rule 3180(b) against both the real and personal property secured by the mortgage.

Rule 1149. Judgment. Execution.

Judgment in the action shall be enforced as provided by Rules 3180 to 3183, inclusive.

Official Note: Rule 3180 et seq. govern the enforcement of a judgment whether against an estate, leasehold or interest in land or against both personal property and an estate, leasehold or interest in land if the plaintiff has elected to proceed as to both pursuant to Section 9604(a) of the Uniform Commercial Code.

CHAPTER 3000. JUDGMENTS

Subchapter D. ENFORCEMENT OF MONEY JUDGMENTS FOR THE PAYMENT OF MONEY

- Rule 3101.2. Obligation Secured by Real and Personal Property. Plaintiff's Election to Proceed against Both in Accordance with Its Rights against the Real Property.
- (a)(1) A money judgment on an obligation secured by a mortgage which grants a mortgage lien on an estate, leasehold or interest in land and also a security interest in personal property, at the election of the plaintiff, may be enforced against both in one proceeding pursuant to the rules of this chapter governing execution against real property.
- (2) A claim that any tangible personal property levied upon pursuant to a writ of execution is the property of a person other than the defendant in the execution shall proceed in accordance with Rule 3201 et seq. governing sheriffs interpleader.

Official Note: The rules of this chapter governing execution on personal property do not apply to an execution on personal property if an election has been made to proceed under this rule. However, Rule 3201 et seq. governing sheriff's interpleader does apply when tangible personal property levied upon is claimed to be the property of a person other than the defendant in the execution.

For a similar provision applicable to the enforcement of a judgment of mortgage foreclosure, see Rule 3180(b).

- (b) The plaintiff shall make the election to proceed under subdivision (a) by filing an affidavit setting forth the place of record of the mortgage and stating that
- (1) the mortgage covers both the real property and the personal property against which the plaintiff seeks execution, and
- (2) the plaintiff intends to proceed against both in accordance with its rights against the real property pursuant to Section 9604 of the Uniform Commercial Code and this rule.
- (c) If plaintiff elects to proceed as provided by this rule, the term "real property" as used in this chapter shall be deemed to include the personal property.

Official Note: Subdivision (c) is not applicable to a proceeding in sheriff's interpleader under Rule 3201 et seq. in which tangible personal property levied upon is claimed to be the property of a person other than the defendant in the execution.

Subchapter E. ENFORCEMENT OF JUDGMENTS IN SPECIAL ACTIONS

ACTION OF MORTGAGE FORECLOSURE

Rule 3180. Judgment. Execution.

- (a) Judgment shall be enforced by a writ of execution substantially in the form provided by Rule 3257.
- **Official Note**: Where judgment is entered on the obligation secured by the mortgage, execution shall be in accordance with the rules governing the enforcement of judgments for the payment of money.
- (b) If the plaintiff is proceeding against both personal and real property covered by a mortgage as provided by Section 9604(a) of the Uniform Commercial Code and has complied with the pleading requirements of Rule 1147(b), the judgment may be enforced in one execution proceeding against both the personal and real property pursuant to the rules of this chapter governing execution on real property.

Official Note: Compliance with Rule 1147(b) governing the complaint in mortgage foreclosure is a prerequisite to executing in one proceeding pursuant to Rule 3180(b) against both the real and personal property secured by the mortgage.

The rules governing execution on personal property do not apply to an execution on personal property under subdivision (b).

For a similar provision applicable to the enforcement of a judgment entered on the obligation secured by the mortgage, see Rule 3101.2.

- Rule 3181. Conformity to Rules Governing Enforcement of Judgments for Payment of Money.
- **(a)** The procedure for the enforcement of a judgment **against real property** shall be in accordance with the rules governing the enforcement of judgments for the payment of money with respect to the following:
- [(a)] (1) Commencement and Issuance of Writ:—Rules 3103(a), 3103(e) and 3105.
- [(b)] (2) Substitution, Reissuance and Expiration of Writ:—Rules 3106(a), 3106(b) and 3106(d).
 - [(c)] (3) Security for Sheriff:—Rule 3116.
- [(d)] (4) Supplementary Relief in Aid of Execution:—Rule 3118, insofar as applicable.
 - (e) (5) Abandonment of Levy:—Rule 3120.
- [(f)] (6) Notice of Sale, Stay, Continuance:—Rule 3129.1 through .3.
- [(g)] (7) Sale of Mortgaged Property Located in More than One County:—Rule 3131.
 - [**(h)**] **(8)** Setting Aside Sale:—Rule 3132.
 - [(i)] (9) Lien Creditors as Purchasers:—Rule 3133.
- [(j)] (10) Sheriff's Deed, Distribution of Proceeds:—Rules 3135 and 3136.
- [(k)] (11) Sheriff's Expenses and Fees, Recovery as Costs, Abandonment of Writ for Nonpayment:—Rule 3138.
- [(1)] (12) Sheriff's Return:—Rules 3139(a)(1), 3139(c) and 3139(d).
- (b) The procedure for the enforcement of a judgment against both personal and real property as provided by Rule 3180(b) shall be in accordance with
- (1) the rules governing the enforcement of judgments for the payment of money as provided by subdivision (a) and
- (2) Rule 3201 et seq. governing sheriff's interpleader.

Official Note: Rule 3201 et seq. govern the procedure when tangible personal property levied upon is claimed to be the property of a person other than the defendant in the execution.

FORMS

Rule 3257. Writ of Execution. Mortgage Foreclosure.

The writ of execution in an action of mortgage foreclosure shall be substantially in the following form:

Explanatory Comment

Section 9604(a) of the Uniform Commercial Code (U.C.C.) provides a party with a security interest in personal property and a mortgage on real property with the right to proceed against both in accordance with its rights against the real property:

§ 9604. Procedure if security agreement covers real property or fixtures

- (a) *Enforcement: personal and real property.*—If a security agreement covers both personal and real property, a secured party may proceed:
- (1) under this chapter as to the personal property without prejudicing any rights with respect to the real property; or
- (2) as to both the personal property and the real property in accordance with the rights with respect to the real property, in which case the other provisions of this chapter do not apply.

* * * * *

The provision has already been implemented with respect to confession of judgment by Rule 2958.2(a). The following chapters of rules now have been amended to implement this provision: the action of mortgage foreclosure, execution upon a judgment of mortgage foreclosure and execution upon a judgment for the payment of money.

Action of mortgage foreclosure and enforcement of judgment

The definition of "action" in Rule 1141 has been revised to include both the traditional "action to foreclose a mortgage upon any estate, leasehold or interest in land" and an action to foreclose a mortgage "upon both personal property and an estate, leasehold or interest in land pursuant to Section 9604(a) of the Uniform Commercial Code." The amended rule retains the restriction that the action "shall not include an action to enforce a personal liability."

If a plaintiff brings an action to foreclose a mortgage upon both personal and real property, new Rule 1147(b) governing the complaint requires that, in addition to the usual allegations prescribed by subdivision (a) of the rule, the complaint must set forth "a description of the personal property subject to the mortgage."

As a plaintiff may proceed against both the personal and real property in one action of mortgage foreclosure, so also the plaintiff may enforce the judgment obtained in the action in one proceeding. Execution Rule 3180 has been amended by adding new subdivision (b) providing that a plaintiff who complies with the pleading requirements of Rule 1147(b) may enforce the judgment "in one proceeding against both the personal and real property pursuant to the rules of this chapter governing execution on real property."

The note following Rule 3180(b) reinforces the rule by emphasizing that the plaintiff must comply with the pleading requirements of Rule 1147(b) to be able to enforce the judgment against both the personal property and the real property under the rule. The note points out that the procedure to enforce a mortgage foreclosure judgment against real property applies to enforcement of the judgment against the personal property as well. The rules governing enforcement of judgments against personal property do not apply unless otherwise provided by this chapter.

The text of Rule 3181 prior to the present amendment has been designated subdivision (a) of the rule and the subparagraphs have been assigned numbers rather than letters. Subdivision (a) continues to provide that certain rules governing the enforcement of a money judgment are applicable also to enforcement of a judgment of mortgage foreclosure against real property. New subdivision (b) provides that those rules also apply when the plaintiff is proceeding against both personal and real property. In addition, subdivision (b) incorporates the procedure of Rule 3201 et seq. governing sheriffs interpleader when there is a claim that the personal property which is the subject of the execution proceeding is the property of one other than the defendant.

The form of writ of execution prescribed by Rule 3257 is revised to accommodate an execution against both personal and real property by providing for a description of the personal property to be levied upon as well as a description of the real property.

Enforcement of judgment for payment of money

A plaintiff may bring an action on the underlying obligation secured by a mortgage rather than an action to foreclose the mortgage. When a mortgage grants a mortgage lien on real property and a security interest in personal property, a plaintiff who obtains a money judgment on the underlying obligation may still take advantage of the provisions of Section 9604(a) of the U.C.C. New Rule 3101.2(a)(1) provides that the plaintiff may elect to execute against both the personal and real property "in one proceeding pursuant to the rules of this chapter governing execution against real property." Subdivision (b) requires that the election be made by filing an affidavit and prescribes the content of the affidavit.

Rule 3101.2(a)(1) provides for the execution against personal property secured by a mortgage to proceed "pursuant to the rules of this chapter governing execution against real property." Subdivision (c) reinforces this provision by providing that if "plaintiff elects to proceed as provided by this rule, the term "real property" as used in this chapter shall be deemed to include the personal property."

Although a party may elect to proceed under Rule 3101.2, subdivisions (a)(1) and (c) of that rule have no application when there is a claim that tangible personal property levied upon is the property of a person other than the defendant in the execution. Subdivision (a)(2) provides that such a claim is to be determined pursuant to Rule 3201 et seq. governing sheriff's interpleader.

CARBON COUNTY Administrative Order

Ordered and Decreed that effective immediately, the Carbon County Court of Common Pleas hereby Rescinds Local Rule of Orphans Court Procedure Carbon Co. O.C.R. No. 15.5(a)(1) governing the Petition in Adoption cases

It is further Ordered and Decreed that the Orphans' Court Division of the Court of Common Pleas shall return to each depositor all funds previously deposited pursuant to Administrative Order 10-2001 which remain in escrow and shall remit to the County of Carbon all accrued interest on said funds.

The Carbon County District Court Administrator is *Ordered* and *Directed* to do the following:

- 1. File seven (7) certified copies of this Administrative Order with the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts.
- 2. File two (2) certified copies and 1 diskette with the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
- 3. File one (1) certified copy with the Pennsylvania Orphans Procedural Rules Committee.

PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302-305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the Pennsylvania Bulletin an acknowledgment noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a Site-Specific Standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a Site-Specific Standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality within which the site is located may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified as the remediator of the site develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

The press is proposed to install a total enclosure with 100% capture efficiency and use an existing catalytic oxidizer, which also controls Rotogravure Press No. 8. As part of the project, Rotogravure Press No. 7 will be removed. The catalytic oxidizer shall have a minimum destruction and removal efficiency for VOC of 96%. The Department's review of the information contained in the application submitted by Dalrymple Gravel & Contracting Company indicates that the floating dredge operation and associated water spray dust suppression system will comply with all applicable air quality requirements pertaining to air contamination sources and the emission of air contaminants, including the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the fugitive air contaminant emission requirement of 25 Pa. Code § 123.1 and the requirements of 40 CFR Part 60, Subpart OOO, 60.670-60.676. The plan approval, if issued, will subsequently be incorporated in an operating permit by means of an administrative amendment in accordance with 25 Pa. Code § 127.450 at a later date.

Based upon this finding, the Department intends to issue a plan approval for the proposed project. The following is a summary of the conditions the Department proposes to place in the plan approval to be issued to ensure compliance with all applicable regulatory require-

- 1. This plan approval is issued for the construction of a floating dredge operation (Source ID P201), consisting the following sources:
- (a) one 30'' by 42'' Telsmith model "D" jaw crusher
- (b) one 6' by 12' Diester model BFO-1612-DW sand dewatering screen
- (c) one 6' by 20' double-deck Diester wash screen
- (d) one 30" by 3,000' conveyor
- (e) one 30" by 100' radial stacking conveyor
- (f) two 30" by 100' floating conveyors
- (g) one 30" by 28' conveyor
- (h) one 30" by 180' floating conveyor
- (i) one 30" by 50' conveyor (j) one 42" by 54" conveyor
- (k) associated transfer chutes and sand collection tank.

Any of the equipment listed previously may be replaced without obtaining plan approval provided that the replacement equipment is of equal of smaller size as defined in Subpart OOO of the Federal Standard of Performance for New Stationary Sources, 40 CFR 60.670-60.676, and provided that the replacement equipment is of equivalent design and function (such as, a jaw crusher may be replaced with a jaw crusher, and the like). The permittee shall notify the Department, in writing, prior to the replacement.

- 2. Under BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the air contaminant emissions from the floating dredge operation shall be controlled by a high pressure water spray dust suppression system which shall, at a minimum, incorporate the following spray nozzles:
- One spray nozzle at the discharge end of the 30" by 42" Telsmith model "D" jaw crusher
- Ten spray nozzles on the 6' by 20' double-deck Diester wash screen

Additional spray nozzles may be installed without Department approval but none of those identified above should be omitted, deleted or removed without obtaining Department approval.

- 3. Under BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the fugitive PM emissions from the equipment of the floating dredge operation shall not exceed the emissions limitations of 25 Pa. Code §§ 123.1 and 123.2.
- 4. Under BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the material from the 6' by 20' double-deck Diester wash screen shall be delivered to the 30" by 42"

Telsmith model "D" jaw crusher through the telescopic chutes with a minimum possible freefall distance at the transfer point.

- 5. Under BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the permittee shall not cause any visible fugitive emissions from the wash screens or any subsequent belt conveyors of floating dredge operation up to the material's entry into the next crusher of floating dredge operation.
- 6. For equipment of floating dredge operation, the permittee shall comply with the test methods and procedures specified in 40 CFR Part 60, 60.675(c), (e) and (h) that verifies compliance with the fugitive PM emission limitations.
- 7. All equipment of the floating dredge operation shall be powered on direct or commercial electrical lines. The permittee shall not construct or install any fuel-burning generators, stationary engines or engine/generator sets without prior Department approval.
- 8. The water spray dust suppression system associated with the floating dredge operation shall be operated on any and all occasions that the sources of floating dredge operation are operated, except in those unusual instances where conditions are such that operation of the sources without the simultaneous operation of water spray dust suppression system can take place without creating air contaminant emissions in excess of the limitations specified in 25 Pa. Code §§ 123.1 and 123.2 or in Subpart OOO of the Federal Standards for Performance for New Stationary Sources, 40 CFR Part 60 Subpart OOO 60.670-60.676. If, however, the water spray dust suppression system associated with the sources of floating dredge operation is incapable of operation due to weather conditions or any other reason sources of floating dredge operation may not be operated at all.
- 9. If at any time, the Department determines that air contaminant emissions from the equipment of the floating dredge operation are in excess of fugitive emissions limitations, the permittee shall immediately install additional spray nozzles and/or take other control measures as are necessary to reduce the air contaminant emissions to within the applicable limitations.
- 10. An operable water truck equipped with a pressurized water spray mechanism shall be kept onsite and shall be used, as needed, for the prevention and control of fugitive air contaminant emissions from plant roadways, and the like.
- 11. The floating dredge operation is subject to Federal Standards of Performance for New Stationary Sources (NSPS), 40 CFR Part 60, Subpart OOO, 60.670-60.676 for nonmetallic mineral processing plant. The permittee shall comply with all applicable requirements of 40 CFR Part 60, 60.670—60.676. Under 60.4 of the Standards of Performance, the submissions of all requests, reports, applications, submittals and other communications required by the Standards of Performance must be made to both the Department of Environmental Protection and the Environmental Protection Agency. The Environmental Protection Agency copies may be sent to Director, Air, Toxics and Radiation Division, U.S. EPA, Region III, 1650 Arch Street, Philadelphia, PA 19103.

Under section 1113 of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (35 P. S. §§ 6020.101—6020.1305) (HSCA), notice is hereby provided that the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has entered into a Prospective Purchaser Agreement (PPA) in the form of a Consent Order and Agreement (CO&A) with WP Valmont Associates, LP (Developer). The PPA addresses the continued investigation and/or remediation of VOCs in soils and groundwater by the Developer. The Developer will demon-

strate attainment with one or a combination of remediation standards established under Act 2, and will reimburse the Department a portion of the costs incurred to perform the initial site investigation/response activities at the Polyclean Dry Cleaners Site (Site).

The Site consists of commercial properties that formerly included a dry cleaning facility between the late 1960s and the 1980s. A prior environmental investigation, conducted on behalf of the Department, identified environmental impacts from the prior dry cleaning operations at the Site. Specifically, soils at the Site and groundwater at and potentially migrating from the Site have been found to be impacted by VOCs, primarily chlorinated solvents including perchloroethylene (PCE), as well as by various metals. The results of the investigation performed for the Department was summarized in a report for the Department entitled "Final Site Investigation Report Former Polyclean Dry Cleaning Site," dated August 30, 2006.

The settlement proposed in the PPA/CO&A referenced above would resolve certain potential claims of the Department solely against the Developer, for future enforcement and reimbursement of response costs incurred by the Department in addressing the release or threat of release of hazardous substances at the Site. The claims originated under the authority of HSCA. The proposed settlement would require the Developer to pay the Department \$40,000 within 30 days of the effective date of the PPA/CO&A.

The specific terms of this settlement are set forth in the PPA/CO&A between the Department and the Developer, which is available for public review and comment. The Department will receive and consider comments relating to the CO&A for 60 days from the date of this Public Notice. The Department has the right to withdraw its consent to the CO&A if the comments concerning the CO&A disclose facts or considerations which indicate that the CO&A is inappropriate, improper, or not in the public interest. After the public comment period, the Department's settlement with the Developer shall be effective upon the date that the Department notifies the Developer, in writing, that this CO&A is final and effective in its present form, and that the Department has filed a response to significant written comments to the CO&A, or that no such comments were received.

The Department may

approve or disapprove plans and reports submitted. This notice provides the Department's decision and, if relevant, the basis for disapproval.

The Department will accept applications for the program until 4 p.m. on June 28, 2007.

The municipal waste stream in Pennsylvania consists of over 30% organic materials that could be recycled and diverted from the waste stream and managed by composting. These organic waste streams, such as yard and food wastes, can become a resource to compost facilities that use these materials as feedstocks. Composting of organic wastes helps to lessen the burden on landfill capacity and creates a beneficial soil conditioner that can be marketed.

NOx Budget Trading Program; New Source Set-Aside 2007 NOx Allocations

Under 25 Pa. Code § 145.41(d) (relating to timing requirements for NOx allowance allocations), the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) is publishing the NOx allowance allocations from the new source set-aside for the 2007 control period (May 1, 2007, through September 30, 2007). The new source set-aside contains 2,542 NOx allowances, 1,920 of which are available for new sources after allocation corrections. For each NOx budget unit, Table 1 lists: 1) the NOx allowances applied for under the "request" column; 2) the maximum potential number of NOx allowances authorized by the regulation under the "maximum" column; and 3) the final, pro rata NOx allocation under the "allocation" column.

New source operators are advised that this allocation is for one control period only. To receive NOx allocations from the new source set-aside for future control periods, source operators must submit new requests to the Department by January 1 each year. Notice of the proposed NOx allowance allocations from the new source set-aside for the 2007 control period, including a request for comment, was published at 37 Pa.B. 850 (February 17, 2007). The Department did not receive comments during the 15-day public comment period that concluded on March 5, 2007.

Patient Safety Trust Fund Surcharge for Fiscal Year 2006-2007 Under the Medical Care Accountability and Reduction of Error Act

On March 20, 2002, the Medical Care Accountability and Reduction of Error Act (MCARE Act) (40 P. S. §§ 1301.101—1301.910) was signed into law. Among other provisions, the MCARE Act established the Patient Safety Authority (Authority) to collect, analyze and evaluate data regarding reports of serious events and incidents occurring in certain medical facilities and to make recommendations to those facilities regarding changes, trends and improvements in health care practices and procedures for the purpose of reducing the number and severity of serious events and incidents.

Section 305(a) of the MCARE Act (40 P. S. § 1301.305(a)) authorizes the establishment of a Patient Safety Trust Fund (Fund) for the operations of the Authority. Section 305(c) of the MCARE Act states that commencing July 1, 2002, and for every fiscal year thereafter, each medical facility covered by the MCARE Act shall pay the Department of Health (Department) a surcharge on its licensing fee as necessary to provide sufficient revenues to operate the Patient Safety Authority. Section 305(c) of the MCARE Act also states that the total assessment amount for Fiscal Year (FY) 2002-2003 shall not exceed \$5 million and that the Department shall transfer the total assessment amount to the Fund within 30 days of receipt.

Section 305(d) of the MCARE Act provides that for each succeeding calendar year, the Department shall determine and assess each medical facility a proportionate share of the Authority's budget. The base amount of \$5 million provided for in FY 2002-2003 shall be increased no more than the Consumer Price Index in each succeeding fiscal year. With the cooperation of Pennsylvania hospitals, birthing centers and ambulatory surgery facilities, the surcharge for FYs 2002-2003 and 2003-2004 was implemented, and provided resources for the implementation of the web-based Pennsylvania Patient Safety Reporting System and the operation of the Authority.

The Authority has recommended that the FY 2006-2007 surcharge assessment total \$2.5 million, approximately one-half of the amount that may be assessed under the MCARE Act.

This notice sets forth the procedure that the Department will follow in assessing and collecting the surcharge for 2006-2007. The MCARE Act states that the surcharge shall be collected from medical facilities, which are defined as ambulatory surgical facilities (ASFs), birth centers and hospitals licensed under either the Health Care Facilities Act (35 P. S. §§ 448.101—448.904) or Article X of the Public Welfare Code (62 P. S. §§ 1001—1087).

To assess the surcharge in an equitable manner, the Department continues to use a common denominator in these facilities. For ASFs and birth centers, the Department has chosen the number of operating and procedure rooms; for hospitals, the Department has chosen the number of beds contained on the license of each hospital, whether by the Department (general and special acute care hospitals) or the Department of Public Welfare (privately-owned psychiatric hospitals). It was also necessary to pick a point in time to make this assessment; the Department has chosen January 1, 2007.

The amount of operating/procedure rooms (for ASFs and birth centers) and the amount of licensed beds (for hospitals) was totaled and that amount was divided into \$2.5 million to arrive at a charge per unit. The total number of units (operating rooms, procedure rooms and licensed beds) is 44,060. Dividing this number into \$2.5 million results in a per unit assessment of approximately \$56.74. To obtain a copy of the assessment for all facilities, send an email to paexcept@health.state.pa.us, and request the 2006-2007 MCARE surcharge assessment list.

Each facility will receive notification from the Department setting forth the amount due, date due and the name and address to which the payment should be sent. Payment will be due by May 27, 2007. The MCARE Act authorizes the Department to assess an administrative penalty of \$1,000 per day on facilities who fail to pay the surcharge by the due date.

The Authority and Governor's Office of Health Care Reform has advised the Department that, because of the additional role of the Authority in the Governor's Health Care Reform Plan, the Authority may require that, to meet its budget needs, an additional assessment be levied on all facilities, not to exceed in the aggregate the total assessment allowed by law for this current year (\$5 million plus cost of living increases). Should an additional surcharge be levied, notice shall be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and invoices provided to individual facilities.

On November 16, 2004, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the Department of Public Welfare (Department). This rulemaking amends 55 Pa. Code Chapter 140. The proposed regulation was published in the November 27, 2004 *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 30-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on February 16, 2007.

This final-form regulation adopts an option contained in the federal Breast and Cervical Cancer Prevention and Treatment Act of 2000 (BCCPT). The BCCPT permits states to provide Medicaid coverage to low-income, uninsured women under 65 years of age who have been screened and determined to need treatment for breast or cervical cancer through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's National Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program.

We have determined this regulation is consistent with the statutory authority of the Department (62 P. S. §§ 201(2) and 403(b)) and the intention of the General Assembly. Having considered all of the other criteria of the Regulatory Review Act, we find promulgation of this regulation is in the public interest.
