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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

There are no restrictions on the republication of official documents appearing in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted

proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Renewal of Declaration of Disaster Emergency of January 7, 1996

Whereas, On January 7, 1996, I declared a State of Disaster Emergency in forty-seven counties of the Commonwealth due to a severe winter storm which produced historical record amounts of snow accumulation, freezing rain, and high winds which devastated certain areas of Pennsylvania and resulted in extensive road closures and posed other adverse life safety impacts upon the general population of the Commonwealth; and

Whereas, on January 13, January 20, and February 12, 1996, I amended my Proclamation of Disaster Emergency of January 7, 1996, in order to add eleven additional counties to the designated disaster emergency area due to a second severe winter storm which struck Pennsylvania and subsequent widespread flooding which occurred throughout the stream and river systems of the Commonwealth; and

Whereas, the Proclamation and its Amendments authorized the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency, the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation, other State agencies and departments and the governing bodies and executive offices of all political subdivisions within the designated disaster emergency area to perform emergency response and recovery activities as deemed necessary to meet the emergency circumstances caused by the winter storms and flooding throughout Pennsylvania; and

Whereas, the winter storms and flooding caused widespread damage and destruction throughout Pennsylvania to highways, bridges, public utilities, businesses, and other forms of public and private property which requires the Commonwealth, its agencies and departments and political subdivisions to continue to perform emergency recovery activities in the form of repairing, maintaining, reconstructing or replacing damaged highways, bridges, and other public facilities and to provide other types of federal and State disaster assistance to businesses, individuals, and other eligible disaster applicants; and

Whereas, the current Proclamation is due to expire on April 5, 1996.

Now therefore, Pursuant to the provisions of Subsection 7301(c) of the Emergency Management Services Code (35 Pa.C.S.A. Section 7101 et seq.), I do hereby declare, order, and direct that the Proclamation of January 7, 1996, be renewed in the fifty-eight disaster declared counties for a period of ninety days. All provisions of the January 7, 1996, Proclamation and its Amendments and all authorized actions carried out pursuant to that Proclamation and its Amendments shall remain in effect.

Given under my hand and Great Seal of the Commonwealth, this third day of April, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine-hundred and ninety-six, and of the Commonwealth, the two-hundred and twentieth.

Effective Dates of Statutes

The effective dates specified above for laws and appropriation acts were contained in the applicable law or appropriation act. Where no date is specified or where the effective date specified is prior to the date of enactment, the effective date is 60 days after final enactment except for statutes making appropriations or affecting budgets of political subdivisions. See 1 Pa.C.S. §§ 1701—1704 (relating to effective dates of statutes).

Advance Copies of Statutes

Section 1106 of Title 1 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes provides that the prothonotaries of each county shall file advance copies of statutes in their offices for public inspection until the Laws of Pennsylvania are generally available. Section 2406(h) of The Administrative Code of 1929 provides that the Department of General Services shall distribute advance sheets of the Laws of Pennsylvania to each law judge of the courts, to every county and public library of this Commonwealth, and to each member of the General Assembly. These copies shall be furnished without charge. The Department shall also mail one copy of each law enacted during any legislative session to any person who pays to it the sum of \$20.

Per Curiam:

And Now, this 3rd day of April, 1996, Rules 219 and 221 of the Pennsylvania Rules of Disciplinary Enforcement are amended to read as set forth in Annex A hereto.

To the extent that notice of proposed rulemaking would be required by Rule 103 of the Pennsylvania Rules of Judicial Administration or otherwise, the immediate amendment of these rules is hereby found to be required in the interest of justice and efficient administration.

This Order shall be processed in accordance with Rule 103(b) of the Pennsylvania Rules of Judicial Administration and the amendments shall take effect with respect to assessment years commencing July 1, 1996 and thereafter.

TITLE 204. JUDICIAL SYSTEM GENERAL PROVISIONS

PART V. PROFESSIONAL ETHICS AND CONDUCT Subpart B. DISCIPLINARY ENFORCEMENT

CHAPTER 83. PENNSYLVANIA RULES OF DISCIPLINARY ENFORCEMENT

Subchapter B. MISCONDUCT

Rule 219. Periodic assessment of attorneys; voluntary inactive status.

* * * * *

- (d)(1) On or before July 1 of each year all persons required by this rule to pay an annual fee shall file with the Administrative Office a signed statement on the form prescribed by the Administrative Office setting forth:
- (i) The date on which the attorney was first admitted to practice in this Commonwealth, and a list of all courts (except courts of this Commonwealth) and jurisdictions in which the person has ever been licensed to practice law, with the current status thereof.
- (ii) The current residence and office addresses of the attorney. Each address shall be an actual street address or rural route box number, and the Administrative Office shall refuse to accept a statement that sets forth only a post office box number for either required address.
- (iii) The name of each financial institution **in this Commonwealth** in which the attorney on May 1 of the current year or at any time during the preceding 12 months held funds:
 - (A) of a client;

- (B) in a fiduciary capacity customary to the practice of law, such as administrator, executor, trustee of an express trust, guardian or conservator; or
- (C) as an escrow agent or other fiduciary, having been designated as such by a client or having been so selected as a result of the client-attorney relationship.
- (D) A certification reading as follows: "I certify that all fiduciary accounts that I maintain **in Pennsylvania** are in financial institutions **that have been** approved by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania for the maintenance of such accounts pursuant to Pennsylvania Rule of Disciplinary Enforcement 221 (relating to mandatory overdraft notification)."

Rule 221. Mandatory overdraft notification.

- (a) For purposes of this rule, a fiduciary account of an attorney is any account in which or with respect to which an attorney
 - (1) holds funds of a client,
- (2) holds funds in a fiduciary capacity customary to the practice of law, such as administrator, executor, trustee of an express trust, guardian or conservator, or
- (3) holds funds as an escrow agent or other fiduciary, having been so selected as a result of a client-attorney relationship.
- (b) [A fiduciary account of an] An attorney shall maintain a fiduciary account with respect to his/her practice in this Commonwealth [may be maintained] only in a financial institution approved by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania for the maintenance of such accounts. Subject to the provisions set forth herein, the Disciplinary Board shall establish regulations governing approval and termination of approval for financial institutions, shall make appropriate recommendations to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania concerning approval and termination, and shall periodically publish a list of approved financial institutions.

 - 2. Rules 2958 and 2961 are rescinded.
- 3. New Rules 2956.1, 2958.1, 2958.2, 2958.3, 2958.4, 2963, 2964, 2965, 2966 and 2967 are promulgated to read as follows.
- 4. Notes to Rules 2955 and 2956 are amended to read as follows.

This Order shall be effective July 1, 1996 and shall be processed in accordance with Rule of Judicial Administration 103(b).

Annex A

TITLE 231. RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 2950. CONFESSION OF JUDGMENT FOR MONEY

Rule 2950. [Definition] Definitions.

As used in this chapter

"action" means a proceeding to enter a judgment by confession for money pursuant to an instrument, other than an instrument executed by a natural person in connection with a consumer credit transaction, authorizing such confession.

Official Note: The action is abolished insofar as it would apply to a confession of judgment which is part of an instrument executed in connection with a consumer credit transaction.

"consumer credit transaction" means a credit transaction in which the party to whom credit is offered or extended is a natural person and the money, property or services which are the subject of the transaction are primarily for personal, family or household purposes.

Rule 2951. Methods of proceeding.

- (a) (1) [The] Upon filing of the documents required by subparagraph (2), the prothonotary shall enter judgment by confession on a note, bond or other instrument confessing judgment or authorizing confession by an attorney at law or other person against the person who executed it in favor of the original holder or, unless expressly forbidden in the instrument, in favor of the assignee or other transferee[, upon filing of the instrument and a certificate of residence of the plaintiff and of the defendant,] without the agency of an attorney and without the filing of a complaint, for the amount which may appear to be due from the instrument. The judgment may include interest computable from the instrument.
- (2) The documents to be filed in support of the entry of judgment are
 - (i) the instrument
- (ii) an affidavit that the judgment is not being entered by confession against a natural person in connection with a consumer credit transaction, and
- (iii) a certificate of residence of the plaintiff and of the defendant.

Official Note: [Subdivision (a) does not change existing law. It replaces Section 28 of the Act of

February 24, 1806, P. L. 334, 4 Sm.L. 270, as amended, 12 P. S. § 739, which is repealed by Section 2(a) of the Judiciary Act Repealer Act, 42 P. S. § 20002(a)(49).

Section 2737(3) of the Judicial Code provides that the prothonotary shall have the power and the duty to "enter all civil judgments, including judgments by confession."

A judgment by confession may be entered only in the name of a holder, assignee or other transferee. See Rule 2954.

For collection of attorneys' fees under such a judgment see Rule 2957. If an instrument authorizes confession for a penal sum judgment may be entered in that amount.

(b) If judgment by confession is authorized by the instrument but may not be entered by the prothonotary under subdivision (a), an action shall be commenced by filing with the prothonotary a complaint substantially in the form provided by Rule 2952. Even though the instrument is one on which judgment could be entered by the prothonotary under subdivision (a), the plaintiff may proceed under this subdivision.

[Official Note: Subdivision (b) replaces Section 8 of the Act of March 21, 1806, 4 Sm.L. 326, 12 P. S. § 738, which is repealed by Section 2(a) of the Judiciary Act Repealer Act, 42 P. S. § 20002(a)(50).]

* * * * *

- (d) If the instrument is more than twenty [(20)] years old, judgment may be entered only by leave of court after notice and the filing of a complaint under Subdivision (b).
- (e) When the plaintiff proceeds under Subdivision (b) and the original or a photostatic copy or like reproduction of the instrument showing the defendant's signature is not attached to the complaint, judgment may be entered only by leave of court after notice.

Official Note: Amended January 20, 1970. Effective February 15, 1970. The procedure for notice and hearing shall be in accordance with local practice.

See **[sec.]** sections 401(h) and **[sec.]** 1205 of the Goods and Services **[Retail]** Installment Sales Act, 1966, Special Sess. No. 1, October 28, P. L. 7, effective April 1, 1967, 69 P. S. §§ 1401(h) and 2205 which may limit the venue for commencement of an action in certain cases.

Rule 2952. Complaint; contents.

- (a) The complaint shall contain the following:
- [(a)] (1) the names and last known addresses of the parties;

Official Note: These rules change prior practice by not requiring a separate certification of address.

[(b)] (2) the original or a photostatic copy or like reproduction of the instrument showing the defendant's signature; if the original is not attached, an averment that the copy attached is a true and correct reproduction of the original; if neither the original nor a reproduction can be attached, an explanation why they are not available;

Official Note: If the original instrument is not attached to the complaint, a method of securing inspection thereof is provided by Discovery Rule 4009.

(3) an averment that judgment is not being entered by confession against a natural person in connection with a consumer credit transaction;

[(c)](4) * * *

[(d)] (5) * * *

[(e)](6) * * *

[(f)](7) * * *

[(g)](8) * * *

[(h)](9) if the instrument is more than twenty [(20)] years old, or if the original or a photostatic copy or like reproduction of the instrument showing the defendant's signature is not attached to the complaint, an application for a court order granting leave to enter judgment after notice;

Official Note: The procedure for notice and hearing will be in accordance with local practice.

Rule 2955. Confession of judgment.

* * * * *

Official Note: Added June 27, 1969. Eff. Jan. 1, 1970. Amended Jan. 20, 1970. Eff. Feb. 15, 1970. There are local rules in some counties requiring the filing of an affidavit of non-military service. See also the Soldiers' and Sailors' Civil Relief Act, 50 U.S.C.A. Appendix § 520.

[The Act of May 17, 1929, P. L. 1804, as amended by the Act of June 25, 1937, P. L. 2325, sec. 1, 12 P. S. § 743, requiring certification of the precise residence address of the plaintiff and the last known address of the defendant, remains unsuspended by these rules.]

Rule 2956. Entry of judgment.

* * * * *

Official Note: As to instruments more than 20 years old see Rules 2951(d) and [2952(h)] 2952(a)(9).

See Rule 236 for the notice required to be given and the documents required to be mailed to the defendant by the prothonotary.

Rule 2956.1. Execution upon a judgment entered by confession.

- (a) Except as otherwise provided by subdivisions (b) and (c), a judgment entered by confession shall be enforced as provided by Rule 3101 et seq. governing the enforcement of a judgment for the payment of money.
- (b) A judgment entered by confession which arises from a retail installment sale, contract or account under the Goods and Services Installment Sales Act or which constitutes a residential mortgage obligation under the Loan Interest and Protection Law shall be conformed as provided by Rule 2981 et seq. prior to execution.

Official Note: These Acts of Assembly prohibit execution upon these judgments until they have been conformed in a separate action. Once conformed pursuant to Rule 2986, these judgments may be enforced in the same manner as other judgments for the payment of money.

- (c) Execution upon a judgment entered by confession which is not within the scope of subdivision (b) and to which a petition to open or strike the judgment has not been filed, shall be
- (1) commenced by a praecipe as provided by Rule 2957 and
- **Official Note:** The praecipe required by subparagraph (1) is in place of the praecipe prescribed by Rule 3251.
- (2) conditioned upon the service of notice on the defendant in the judgment as provided by either
- (i) Rule 2958.1 at least thirty days prior to the filing of the praccipe for the writ of execution, or
- (ii) Rule 2958.2 with the notice of sale of real property, or
 - (iii) Rule 2958.3 with the writ of execution.

Official Note: The notice may be given prior to execution under Rule 2958.1 or as part of the execution process under Rule 2958.2 or 2958.3, whichever is applicable.

Notice prior to execution under Rule 2958.1 may be given in all cases. However, the notice served with the notice of sale of real property under Rule 2958.2 is limited to execution upon real property or real property and personal property subject to Section 9501(d) of the Judicial Code. The notice served with the writ of execution under Rule 2958.3 is limited to an execution upon personal property or personal and real property.

Written notice under subdivision (c)(2) is required only in connection with execution proceedings and is in addition to the procedural requirements of Rule 3101 et seq. The notice is in addition also to the notice of the entry of the judgment given by the prothonotary under Rule 236.

Rule 2957. [Execution] Practipe for writ of execution; amount; items claimed; certification.

- (a) Plaintiff may include the amount due, interest, attorneys' fees and costs in [his] the praecipe for a writ of execution under Rule [3251(5)] 2963(5). Where judgment has been entered under Rule 2951(a) and there has been a record appearance of counsel at any stage of the proceedings and attorneys' fees are authorized in the instrument, these fees may be included in the praecipe for a writ of execution.
- (b) The praecipe for the writ of execution shall contain the words "Confessed Judgment" immediately below the title of the praecipe and a certification that
- (1) the praecipe is based upon a confessed judgment and
- (2) the prothonotary is authorized to issue the praecipe because
- (i) notice has been served pursuant to Rule 2958.1 as evidenced by a return of service filed of record, or
- (ii) notice will be served pursuant to Rule 2958.2 because the property to be levied upon consists solely of real property or real property and personal property to be sold with the real property pursuant to Section 9501(d) of the Uniform Commercial Code, or
- (iii) notice will be served pursuant to Rule 2958.3 because the property to be levied upon consists of

personal property or personal property and real property, not within the scope of Rule 2958.2(a)(2), or

- (iv) notice was served in connection with a prior execution on this judgment and no further notice is required under Rule 2958.4(b), or
- (v) a petition to open or strike the judgment has been previously filed and notice is not required under Rule 2956.1(c).

Official Note: See Rule 2963 for the form of the praecipe for writ of execution upon a confessed judgment.

Rule 2958. Rescinded.

Rule 2958.1. Notice served prior to execution.

(a) A written notice substantially in the form prescribed by Rule 2964 shall be served on the defendant at least thirty days prior to the filing of the praecipe for a writ of execution.

Official Note: The notice provided for by this rule may be served in all executions within the scope of Rule 2956.1(c). If notice is served under this rule at least thirty days prior to the filing of the praecipe, notice need not be given under Rule 2958.2 governing execution upon real property or Rule 2958.3 governing execution upon personal or personal and real property. Conversely, if notice is served under either Rule 2958.2 or 2958.3, notice need not be given under this rule.

Rule 2957(b) governing the practipe for the writ of execution requires a certification that notice has been given as provided by this rule.

Rule 2959(a)(3) requires a petition for relief from a confessed judgment to be filed within thirty days after service of notice pursuant to this rule.

- (b) The notice shall be served
- (1) upon a defendant in the judgment who has not entered an appearance
- (i) by the sheriff or by a competent adult who is not a party to the action in the manner prescribed by Rule 402(a) for the service of original process upon a defendant, or
- (ii) by the plaintiff mailing a copy in the manner prescribed by Rule 403, or
- (iii) pursuant to special order of court as prescribed by Rule 430 if service cannot be made as provided in subparagraphs (i) or (ii), or
- (2) upon a defendant in the judgment who has entered an appearance, by the plaintiff in the manner provided by Rule 440.
- (c) The person serving the notice shall file a return of service as provided by Rule 405.

Rule 2958.2. Notice of execution served with notice of sale of real property.

- (a) Written notice substantially in the form prescribed by Rule 2965 shall be served upon the defendant at least thirty days prior to the sheriff's sale if the property to be levied upon consists solely of
 - (1) real property, or
- (2) real property and personal property to be sold with the real property pursuant to Section 9501(d) of the Uniform Commercial Code.

Official Note: Section 9501(d) of the Uniform Commercial Code, 13 Pa.C.S. § 9501(d) relates to the rights of a secured party when the agreement covers real and personal property.

The notice required by this rule must be served only when the plaintiff has not proceeded under Rule 2958.1 requiring at least thirty days notice prior to the filing of the praccipe for writ of execution.

Rule 2957(b) governing the praecipe for the writ of execution requires a certification that notice has been given as provided by this rule.

Rule 2959(a)(3) requires a petition for relief from a confessed judgment to be filed within thirty days after service of notice pursuant to this rule.

(b) The notice shall be served with the written notice of sale of real property and shall be governed by the provisions of Rule 3129.2(c).

Official Note: Rule 3129.2(c) governing notice of the sale of real property provides for the manner of service, the return of service and the timeliness of the service.

Rule 2958.3. Notice of execution served with writ of execution. Request for prompt hearing limited to issue of waiver of due process rights.

- (a) Written notice in the form prescribed by Rule 2966 and a form of petition to strike the judgment and request for prompt hearing in the form prescribed by Rule 2967 shall be served upon the defendant with the writ of execution if the property to be levied upon consists of
 - (1) personal property or
- (2) personal property and real property, not within the scope of Rule 2958.2(a)(2).

Official Note: The notice required by this rule must be served only when the plaintiff has not proceeded under Rule 2958.1 requiring at least thirty days notice prior to the filing of the praccipe for writ of execution.

Rule 2957(b) governing the praecipe for the writ of execution requires a certification that notice has been given as provided by this rule.

Rule 2959(a)(3) requires a petition for relief from a confessed judgment to be filed within thirty days after service of notice pursuant to this rule.

- (b) If the writ has been served and property has been levied upon or attached, the defendant may file with the sheriff a petition to strike the judgment in the form provided by Rule 2967. The petition shall be limited to the issue whether the defendant voluntarily, intelligently and knowingly waived the right to notice and hearing prior to the entry of the judgment. The defendant may include in the claim a demand for a prompt hearing. The sheriff shall immediately notify the plaintiff of the filing of the petition.
- (c) The sheriff shall immediately present the matter to the court. The court shall hear the claim within three business days thereafter upon such notice to the parties as the court shall direct and shall promptly dispose of the matter on the testimony, admissions or other evidence.
- (1) If the court finds that the plaintiff has shown by a preponderance of the evidence that the defendant voluntarily, intelligently and knowingly waived the right to notice and hearing prior to the entry of judgment, it shall enter an order so determining and the stay of the execution proceedings under subdivision (d) shall terminate automatically.

- (2) If the court finds that the plaintiff has not made the required showing, it shall enter an order vacating the writ of execution and striking the judgment. Upon entry of the order, any property which has been seized, levied upon or attached pursuant to the writ of execution shall be returned to the defendant.
- (d) Execution proceedings shall be stayed during the period from the time the defendant files the hearing request form with the sheriff to the time the court makes the determination on the request.

Rule 2958.4. Choice of procedure. Notice upon subsequent executions.

- (a) A plaintiff who has given notice pursuant to Rule 2958.1 may not proceed thereafter under Rules 2958.2 and 2958.3.
- (b) The notice required by Rules 2958.1 through 2958.3 need not be given upon subsequent executions on a judgment if the notice was given prior to or upon a previous execution on that judgment and either
- (1) the defendant filed a petition for relief from the judgment and the court denied the relief, or
- (2) the defendant failed to file a petition for relief from the judgment within thirty days after service of the notice as required by Rule 2959(a)(3).

Rule 2959. Striking off or Opening Judgment. Pleadings. Procedure.

- (a) (1) Relief from a judgment by confession shall be sought by petition. [All] Except as provided in subparagraph (2), all grounds for relief whether to strike off the judgment or to open it must be asserted in a single petition. The petition may be filed in the county in which the judgment was originally entered, in any county to which the judgment has been transferred or in any other county in which the sheriff has received a writ of execution directed to [him] the sheriff to enforce the judgment.
- (2) The ground that the waiver of the due process rights of notice and hearing was not voluntary, intelligent and knowing shall be raised only
- (i) in support of a further request for a stay of execution where the court has not stayed execution despite the timely filing of a petition for relief from the judgment and the presentation of prima facie evidence of a defense; and
 - (ii) as provided by Rule 2958.3 or Rule 2973.3.
- (3) If written notice is served upon the petitioner pursuant to Rule 2956.1(c)(2) or Rule 2973.1(c), the petition shall be filed within thirty days after such service. Unless the defendant can demonstrate that there were compelling reasons for the delay, a petition not timely filed shall be denied.

(c) A party waives all defenses and objections which **[he does] are** not **[include] included** in **[his] the** petition or answer.

Rule 2960. Proceedings upon Opening of Judgment. Pleadings. Jury Trial. Waiver.

If a judgment is opened in whole or in part the issues to be tried shall be defined by the complaint if a complaint has been filed, and by the petition, answer and the order of the court opening the judgment. There shall be no further pleadings. The right to a jury trial on the opened judgment shall be deemed waived unless a party files and serves a written demand for jury trial within twenty **[(20)]** days after the order opening judgment; but if the issue is referred to compulsory arbitration, Rule 1007.1 shall apply.

* * * * *

Rule 2961. [Effective Date.] Application of Amendments to Pending Actions.

[These rules shall become effective on the first day of January, 1970. These rules shall apply only to actions commenced after the effective date except Rules 2959 and 2960 which also apply to judgments theretofore entered.]

(a) The amendments promulgated in 1996 to the rules of civil procedure prohibiting the entry of a judgment by confession for money in connection with a consumer credit transaction shall apply to actions commenced after the effective date set forth in the Order of the Supreme Court.

Official Note: The amendments to Rules 2950, 2951 and 2952 generally relate to the prohibition against the entry of a judgment by confession arising from a consumer credit transaction.

(b) The amendments promulgated in 1996 to the rules governing execution on a judgment entered by confession for money shall apply to executions commenced after the effective date set forth in the Order of the Supreme Court.

Official Note: The amendments to Rules 2956.1 through 2959 and Rules 2963 through 2967 generally relate to execution upon a judgment entered by confession and relief from the judgment.

CHAPTER 2980. STATUTORY ACTION TO CONFORM CONFESSED JUDGMENT

Rule 2986. Judgment. Conforming the Confessed Judgment.

(a) Judgment shall be entered in the action for the amount, if any, due the plaintiff from the defendant or the amount, if any, due the defendant from the plaintiff. That judgment shall merge with the confessed judgment. The court shall enter an appropriate order conforming the confessed judgment to the judgment in the action.

Official Note: Under Rule 214(g) trial of the action may be advanced by the court for good cause.

Once the judgment is conformed, it is enforced in the same manner as other money judgments pursuant to Rule 3101 et seq. Notice under Rule 2956.1(c) is not required when a confessed judgment has been conformed pursuant to this rule.

CHAPTER 3000. JUDGMENTS

SUBCHAPTER D. ENFORCEMENT OF MONEY JUDGMENTS FOR THE PAYMENT OF MONEY

Rule 3103. Commencement; issuance.

(a) Execution shall be commenced by filing a praecipe for a writ of execution with the prothonotary of any county in which judgment has been entered. Except as otherwise prescribed by Rule 2963 governing a judgment entered by confession, the praecipe shall be in the form prescribed by Rule 3251.

Rule 3129.2. Notice of sale; handbills; written notice; publication.

- (c) The written notice shall be prepared by the plaintiff, shall contain the same information as the handbills or may consist of the handbill and shall be served at least thirty days before the sale on all persons whose names and addresses are set forth in the affidavit required by Rule 3129.1.
 - (1) Service of the notice shall be made
- (i) upon a defendant in the judgment who has not entered an appearance and upon the owner of the property
- (A) by the sheriff or by a competent adult who is not a party to the action in the manner prescribed by Rule 402(a) for the service of original process upon a defendant, or

Subchapter E. ENFORCEMENT OF JUDGMENTS IN SPECIAL ACTIONS

FORMS

Rule 3251. Praecipe for writ of execution-money judgments.

The Except as provided by Rule 2963 governing execution upon a judgment entered by confession, the praecipe for a writ of execution shall be substantially in the following form:

Explanatory Comment

The rules of civil procedure governing confession of judgment for money have been revised in two major respects: the abolition of confession of judgment in a consumer credit transaction and the imposition of a requirement of notice prior to or with execution upon a confessed judgment.

I. Consumer Credit Transactions

Abolition of confession of judgment in connection with consumer credit transactions is effected by excluding the transactions from the scope of the action. Three rules are amended. Rule 2950 is revised by adding a definition of the term "consumer credit transaction" and defining the term "action" to exclude those transactions. Rules 2951 and 2952 are revised to require that the plaintiff file an affidavit if proceeding under Rule 2951(a) or aver in the complaint if proceeding under Rule 2951(b) that the judgment is not being entered in a consumer credit transaction.

II. Notice

The provisions for notice are intended to aid the bench and bar in complying with Jordan v. Fox, Rothschild, O'Brien & Frankel, 20 F.3d 1250 (C.A. 3 1994). The significance of the opinion was stated by Judge R. Stanton Wettick, Jr. in S&T Bank v. Coyne, No. GD 94-12141 (Allegheny County, August 11, 1994):

The Jordan opinion is significant only because the judgment creditor and its attorneys are now also subject to a § 1983 claim by a judgment debtor who did not waive its constitutional rights to notice and a hearing.

New rules have been promulgated to provide for notice to be served upon the defendant in most cases prior to or during execution on a judgment entered by confession. There are three notices but only one need be given in a particular case.

- 1. New Rule 2958.1 provides for a notice to be served at least thirty days prior to the filing of the praecipe for a writ of execution upon real or personal property. The form of notice is prescribed by new Rule 2964.
- 2. New Rule 2958.2 provides for a notice to be served with the notice of the sale of real property when the property levied upon is solely real property or when the property levied upon is real property and personal property to be sold with the real property pursuant to Section 9501(d) of the Uniform Commercial Code. The form of notice is prescribed by new Rule 2965.
- 3. New Rule 2958.3 provides for a notice to be served with the writ of execution when the property to be levied upon includes personal property or personal and real property and when the plaintiff determines that advance notice of the execution might not be appropriate. The form of the notice is prescribed by new Rule 2966.

Under new Rule 2959(a)(3), a defendant must file a petition within thirty days of service of the notice to obtain relief from the judgment or to prevent execution. After thirty days, the defendant is barred from relief unless there are "compelling reasons for the delay".

In the case of notice given under Rule 2958.3, the defendant is advised of the right to a hearing on the sole issue of the validity of the waiver of due process rights. The notice also advises the defendant of the right to request a prompt hearing which must be held within three business days after the sheriff presents the request to the court. Execution is stayed pending a determination of the validity of the waiver. The court is to determine whether "the plaintiff has shown by a preponderance of the evidence that the defendant knowingly, voluntarily and intelligently waived the right to notice and hearing prior to the entry of judgment". Rule 2958.3 imposes the burden of proof on the plaintiff who is asserting that a constitutional right has been waived. The quantum of evidence required to satisfy the rule is an evidentiary matter outside the scope of the rule.

Under Rule 2958.4, the plaintiff must choose whether to give thirty-days' advance notice under Rule 2958.1 or to give notice as part of the execution process under Rules 2958.2 and 2958.3. Subdivision (a) of the rule provides that a plaintiff who has given notice pursuant to Rule 2958.1 may not proceed also under Rule 2958.2 or Rule 2958.3. However, once having given the required notice, the plaintiff need not give notice again on a subsequent execution on the same judgment.

The intent of these rules is to limit the necessity for hearings on issues of due process and waiver by providing the defendant with a pre-deprivation notice and opportunity for hearing on the merits. However, new Rule 2959(a)(2) specifies three instances when the issue of the voluntary, intelligent and knowing waiver of due process rights may be raised. The first is in support of a request for a stay when the court has already denied a prior request for a stay despite timely filing of that request and "the presentation of prima facie evidence of a defense." The second is when personal property has been levied upon or attached without prior notice and hearing under new Rule 2958.2. The third is when a defendant in possession of leased residential real property has been evicted without prior notice and hearing under new Rule

2973.3. In all other instances, the issues upon a petition for relief from the judgment will be the merits and not the waiver of due process rights.

III. Conforming Amendments

A paragraph has been added to the note to present Rule 2986 stating that, once a confessed judgment has been conformed pursuant to Rule 2981 et seq., the judgment is enforced in the same manner as other money judgments.

Execution Rules 3103(a) and 3251 have been amended to cross-refer to the form of praecipe to issue a writ of execution upon a confessed judgment prescribed by new Rule 2963.

Rule 3129.2(c)(1)(i)(A) governing notice of the execution sale of real property has been amended to provide for service of the notice of sale upon a defendant who has not appeared in the action "by a competent adult who is not a party to the action" as well as by the sheriff.

IV. Application to Pending Actions

Rule 2961 governing the application of amendments to pending actions has been amended by deleting the former text and substituting two new subdivisions. New subdivision (a) provides that the amendments prohibiting the entry of a confessed judgment in connection with a consumer credit transaction are applicable to actions commenced after the effective date specified in the order of the Supreme Court. Subdivision (b) provides that the amendments relating to execution on a confessed judgment are applicable to executions commenced after the effective date.

By the Civil Procedural Rules Committee,

- 3. New Rules 2973.1, 2973.2, 2973.3, 2973.4, 2974.1, 2974.2, 2974.3, 2975 and 3161.1 are promulgated to read as follows.

This Order shall be effective July 1, 1996 and shall be processed in accordance with Rule of Judicial Administration 103(b).

Annex A

TITLE 231. RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 2970. CONFESSION OF JUDGMENT FOR POSSESSION OF REAL PROPERTY

Rule 2970. Conformity. Scope.

Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, the procedure in an action to enter a judgment in ejectment for possession of real property by confession pursuant to an instrument, other than a residential lease executed by a natural person, authorizing such confession shall be in accordance with the rules relating to confession of judgment for money.

Official Note: [The United States District Courts in Pennsylvania have held the procedure governing confession of judgment in ejectment to be unconstitutional insofar as the procedure applies to residential leases. Attorneys should ascertain whether such an action is permissible in the particular county.]

Confession of judgment in ejectment is abolished with respect to a residential lease executed by a natural person.

Rule 2971. Commencement of Action.

- (a) An action shall be commenced by filing with the prothonotary a complaint substantially in the form provided by Rule 2952. The complaint shall also contain
- (1) an averment, in place of that required by Rule 2952(a)(3), that the judgment is not being entered against a natural person in connection with a residential lease, and
 - (2) a description of the property and
 - (3) a demand for judgment in ejectment.

* * * *

Rule 2973. Rescinded.

Rule 2973.1. Execution.

Except as otherwise provided by subdivisions (b) and (c), a judgment in ejectment entered by confession shall be enforced in the manner provided by Rule 3160 et seq. governing the enforcement of a judgment in an action of ejectment.

Official Note: The form of praccipe required by subdivision (b) is in place of the form of praccipe prescribed by Rule 3254. The notice required by subdivision (c) is in addition to the procedural requirements of Rule 3160 et seq.

- (b) Execution shall be commenced by filing a praecipe for a writ of possession in the form prescribed by Rule 2974.1.
- (c) If no petition to open or strike the judgment has been filed, written notice shall be served upon the defendant in the judgment either
 - (1) prior to execution as provided by Rule 2973.2, or
- (2) with the writ of possession as provided by Rule

Official Note: The written notice provided by this rule is required only in connection with execution proceedings. The notice is in addition to the notice of the entry of judgment required by Rule 236.

Rule 2973.2. Notice Served Prior to Execution.

(a) A written notice in the form prescribed by Rule 2974.2 shall be served on the defendant at least thirty days prior to the filing of the praecipe for a writ of possession.

Official Note: If notice is served under this rule at least thirty days prior to the filing of the praecipe, notice need not be given under Rule 2973.3. Conversely, if notice is served under Rule 2973.3, notice need not be given under this rule.

Rule 2974.1 governing the form of the praecipe for the writ of possession requires a certification that notice has been given as provided by this rule.

Rule 2959(a)(3) requires a petition for relief from a confessed judgment to be filed within thirty days after service of notice pursuant to this rule.

- (b) The notice shall be served
- (1) upon a defendant in the judgment who has not entered an appearance
- (i) by the sheriff or by a competent adult who is not a party to the action in the manner prescribed by Rule 402(a) for the service of original process upon a defendant, or
- (ii) by the plaintiff mailing a copy in the manner prescribed by Rule 403, or
- (iii) pursuant to special order of court as prescribed by Rule 430 if service cannot be made as provided in subparagraphs (i) or (ii), or
- (2) upon a defendant in the judgment who has entered an appearance, by the plaintiff in the manner provided by Rule 440.
- (c) The person serving the notice shall file a return of service as provided by Rule 405.

Rule 2973.3. Notice Served with Writ of Possession. Prompt Hearing Limited to Issue of Waiver of Due Process Rights.

(a) A written notice in the form prescribed by Rule 2974.3 and a form of petition to strike the judgment and request for prompt hearing prescribed by Rule 2967 shall be served upon the defendant with the writ of possession.

Official Note: If notice is served under this rule at least thirty days prior to the filing of the praecipe, notice need not be given under Rule 2973.2.

Rule 2974.1 governing the form of the praecipe for the writ of possession requires a certification that notice will be given as provided by this rule.

See Rule 2959(a)(3) which requires a petition for relief from a confessed judgment to be filed within thirty days after service of notice pursuant to this rule.

- (b) A defendant who has been given notice pursuant to Rule 2973(a) may file with the sheriff a petition to strike the judgment in the form provided by Rule 2967. The petition shall be limited to the issue whether the defendant voluntarily, intelligently and knowingly waived the right to notice and hearing prior to the entry of the judgment. The defendant may include in the claim a demand for a prompt hearing. The sheriff shall immediately notify the plaintiff of the filing of the petition.
- (c) The sheriff shall immediately present the matter to the court. The court shall hear the claim within three business days thereafter upon such notice to the parties

as the court shall direct and shall promptly dispose of the matter on the testimony, admissions or other evidence.

- (1) If the court finds that the plaintiff has shown by a preponderance of the evidence that the defendant voluntarily, intelligently and knowingly waived the right to notice and hearing prior to the entry of judgment, it shall enter an order so determining and the stay of the execution proceedings under subdivision (d) shall terminate automatically.
- (2) If the court finds that the plaintiff has not made the required showing, it shall enter an order vacating the writ of possession and striking the judgment. Upon entry of the order, any property from which the defendant has been evicted pursuant to the writ of possession shall be returned to the defendant's possession.
- (d) Execution proceedings shall be stayed during the period from the time the defendant files the hearing request form with the sheriff to the time the court makes the determination on the petition.

Rule 2973.4. Choice of Procedure. Notice Upon Subsequent Executions.

- (a) A plaintiff who has given notice pursuant to Rule 2973.2 may not proceed thereafter under Rule 2973.3.
- (b) The notice required by Rules 2973.2 and 2973.3 need not be given upon subsequent executions on a judgment if the notice was given prior to or upon a previous execution on that judgment and either
- (1) the defendant filed a petition for relief from the judgment and the court denied the relief, or
- (2) the defendant failed to file a petition for relief from the judgment within thirty days after service of the notice as required by Rule 2959(a)(3).

Rule 2975. Application of Amendments to Pending Actions.

(a) The amendments promulgated in 1996 to the rules of civil procedure prohibiting the entry of a judgment by confession for possession in connection with a residential lease shall apply to actions commenced after the effective date set forth in the Order of the Supreme Court.

Official Note: The amendments to Rules 2970 and 2971 relate to the prohibition against the entry of a judgment by confession arising from a consumer credit transaction.

(b) The amendments promulgated in 1996 to the rules governing execution on a judgment entered by confession for possession shall apply to executions commenced after the effective date set forth in the Order of the Supreme Court.

Official Note: The amendments to Rules 2973.1 through 2973.3 and 2974.1 through 2974.3 relate to execution upon a judgment entered by confession and relief from the judgment.

Rule 2976. Suspension of Acts of Assembly. Abolition of Practice and Procedure Under Repealed Statutes.

After the effective date of these rules,

- (a) All Acts or parts of Acts of Assembly inconsistent with these rules are suspended to the extent of such inconsistency; and
- (b) (1) the] The practice and procedure provided in all former Acts of Assembly governing confession of judgment, which have been repealed [effective June 27, 1978 and June 27, 1979] by the Judiciary Act Repealer Act (JARA), Act of April 28, 1978, No. 53, and which are now part of the common law of the Commonwealth by virtue of Section 3(b) of JARA, are hereby abolished and shall not continue as part of the common law of the Commonwealth [; and]
- (2) with respect to all Acts of Assembly relating to such practice and procedure, repeal of which will become effective June 27, 1980 as provided by Section 4(b) of JARA, this is a general rule within the meaning of Section 3(b) of JARA and the practice and procedure provided in those Acts of Assembly shall not continue as part of the common law of the Commonwealth].

CHAPTER 3000. JUDGMENTS

Subchapter E. ENFORCEMENT OF JUDGMENTS IN SPECIAL ACTIONS

Rule 3161. Conformity to rules governing enforcement of judgments for payment of money.

The procedure for the enforcement of a judgment for possession shall be in accordance with the rules governing the enforcement of judgments for the payment of money with respect to the following:

(a) Commencement and Issuance of Writ:—Rules [3103(a), 3103(e) and 3105.

Rule 3161.1. Commencement.

Execution shall be commenced by filing a praecipe for a writ of execution with the prothonotary of any county in which judgment has been entered. Except as otherwise prescribed by Rule 2974.1 governing a judgment entered by confession, the praecipe shall be in the form prescribed by Rule 3254.

Rule 3254. Praecipe for writ of possession.

The Except as provided by Rule 2974.1 governing execution upon a judgment in ejectment entered by confession, the practipe for a writ of possession shall be substantially in the following form:

Explanatory Comment

The Supreme Court of Pennsylvania has promulgated two principal revisions to the rules of civil procedure governing confession of judgment for the possession of real property. First, the action has been redefined to abolish confession of judgment for the possession of real property in connection with a residential lease executed by a natural person. Second, the execution process has been revised by adding the requirement of a notice to be served upon the defendant prior to or with the writ of possession

I. Residential Leases Executed by Natural Persons

Confession of judgment for the possession of real property in connection with a residential lease executed by a natural person has been abolished. The abolition has been effected by amending Rule 2970 defining the scope of the action to include a confession of judgment for possession of real property arising from "an instrument, other than a residential lease executed by a natural person." Rule 2971 governing the commencement of the action has been revised by adding an averment to the complaint that judgment is not being entered against a natural person in connection with a residential lease.

A note to Rule 2970 formerly advised that the "United States District Courts in Pennsylvania have held the procedure governing confession of judgment in ejectment to be unconstitutional insofar as the procedure applies to residential leases." By abolishing the action as to such leases, the present amendment removes any uncertainty from the area and makes the practice uniform.

II. Notice

The revision of the rules governing confession of judgment for possession of real property to provide for a notice to the defendant prior to or with execution parallels a similar revision of the rules governing confession of judgment for money. The amendments are as follows.

New Rule 2973.1 is an introductory rule which serves as a guide to execution on the confessed judgment. The rule prescribes a special form of praecipe for the writ of possession which is to be used in place of the usual form of praecipe prescribed by Execution Rule 3254. When no petition to open or strike the judgment has been filed, the rule imposes the requirement of notice to be served either prior to execution or with the writ of possession and cross-refers to the appropriate rules.

- 1. New Rule 2973.2 is virtually identical to its counterpart governing confession of judgment for money, Rule 2958.1. It provides for a notice to be served at least thirty days prior to the filing of the praecipe for a writ of possession. The form of notice is prescribed by new Rule 2974.2.
- 2. New Rule 2973.3 is also virtually identical to its counterpart governing confession of judgment for money, Rule 2958.3. The rule provides for a notice to be served with the writ of possession which advises the defendant of the right to a hearing on the sole issue of the validity of the waiver of due process rights. The notice also advises the defendant of the right to a prompt hearing which must be held within three business days after delivery of a hearing request to the sheriff. The form of the notice is prescribed by new Rule 2974.3. Execution is stayed pending a determination of the validity of the waiver. The court is to determine whether "the plaintiff has shown by a preponderance of the evidence that the defendant voluntarily, intelligently and knowingly waived the right to notice and hearing prior to the entry of judgment".

Subdivision (a) of Rule 2973.4 provides that a plaintiff who has given notice pursuant to Rule 2973.2 may not proceed also under Rule 2973.3. However, once having given notice required under one of those rules, the plaintiff need not give notice again on a subsequent execution on the same judgment.

A defendant served with a notice must file within thirty days of service of the notice a petition to obtain relief from the judgment or to prevent execution. After thirty days, the defendant is barred from relief unless there are "compelling reasons for the delay" as provided by Rule 2959(a)(3).

III. Conforming Amendments

Execution Rule 3161(a) has been amended to delete the incorporation by reference of Rule 3101(a) governing commencement of execution proceedings. Rule 3101(a) has been revised so that the references to the forms of praecipe apply solely to an execution upon a money judgment. New Rule 3161.1 has been added to govern the commencement of execution upon a judgment for possession. The new rule contains appropriate references to the rules providing the forms of praecipe for the writ of possession.

Execution Rule 3254 providing the form of the praecipe for a writ of possession has been amended to cross-refer to the praecipe to issue a writ of possession upon a confessed judgment prescribed by Rule 2974.1.

IV. Application of Amendments to Pending Actions

Former Rule 2973 governing the effective date of the rules has been rescinded and new Rule 2975 promulgated. Subdivision (a) of the new rule provides that the amendments prohibiting the entry of a confessed judgment arising from an instrument constituting a residential lease executed by a natural person are applicable to actions commenced after the effective date specified in the order of the Supreme Court. Subdivision (b) provides that the amendments relating to execution on a confessed judgment apply to execution proceedings commenced after the effective date.

The explanatory comment which appears in connection with the proposed amendments has been inserted by the Committee for the convenience of those using the rules. It will not constitute part of the rules nor will it be officially adopted or promulgated by the Court.

TITLE 231. RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 1910. ACTIONS FOR SUPPORT

Rule 1910.9. [Discovery] Earnings Information.

[(a) There shall be no discovery unless authorized by special order of court.]

[(b)] Where a party is employed, the court shall ascertain the party's earnings and may enter an order directing the employer to furnish earnings information to the court as provided by Rule 1910.27.

Rule 1910.11. Office Conference. Subsequent Proceedings. Order.

(j) [(1)] Promptly after receipt of the notice of the scheduled hearing, a party may move the court for a separate listing where

- (i) there are complex questions of law, fact or both, or
- (ii) the hearing will be protracted, or
- (iii) the orderly administration of justice requires that the hearing be listed separately.
- [(2) The motion may include a request for discovery. If granted, the order may specify the scope of discovery.]

Rule 1910.12. Office Conference. Hearing. Record. Exceptions. Order.

* * * * *

- (c) (1) Except as set forth in subdivision (c)(2), promptly after conclusion of the conference, a party may move the court for a separate listing of the hearing where
 - (i) there are complex questions of law, fact or both, or
 - (ii) the hearing will be protracted, or
- (iii) the orderly administration of justice requires that the hearing be listed separately.
- (2) Where the conference and hearing are scheduled on the same day, all requests for separate listing must be presented to the court at least seven days prior to the scheduled court date.
- [(3) The motion may include a request for discovery. If granted, the order may specify the scope of discovery.]

CHAPTER 1920. ACTION OF DIVORCE OR FOR ANNULMENT OF MARRIAGE

Rule 1920.22. [Discovery] Rescinded.

[(a) Except as provided by subdivision (b), there shall be no discovery in an action of divorce or for annulment or a claim which has been joined as permitted under the Divorce Code unless authorized by special order of court.

Official Note: Rule 1920.91 suspends § 3505(c) of the Divorce Code which provides for discovery in actions of divorce or for annulment of marriage.

(b) When a claim is made for alimony or the determination and distribution of property rights,

any party may serve upon any other party as of course within such time as not to delay the trial interrogatories limited to those claims. The practice and procedure shall be governed by the rules of civil procedure governing depositions and discovery.

Rule 1920.91. Suspension of Acts of Assembly.

* * * * *

[(2) Section 3505(c) of the Domestic Relations Code, 23 Pa.C.S. § 3505(c), absolutely;

Official Note: Suspended Section 3505(c) of the Divorce Code provides for discovery in actions of divorce or for annulment of marriage. Discovery in such actions is prescribed by Rule of Civil Procedure 1920.22.

[(3)] (2) Section 3505(b) of the Domestic Relations Code, 23 Pa.C.S. § 3505(b), absolutely;

Official Note: Suspended Section 3505(b) of the Divorce Code requires the submission to the court of an inventory and appraisement of property. Rule of Civil Procedure 1920.33(a) supplants this provision by requiring parties seeking the distribution of property to file an inventory while subdivision (b) of the rule requires the filing of pre-trial statement.

[**(4)**] **(3)** Section 3321 of the Domestic Relations Code, 23 Pa.C.S. § 3321, insofar as it prohibits the appointment of masters in partial custody or visitation matters.

Official Note: Suspended Section 3321 of the Divorce Code states that the court may appoint a master to hear testimony on all issues relating to a divorce except custody or paternity.

[(5)] (4) And all other Acts or parts of Acts of Assembly inconsistent with these rules to the extent of such inconsistency.

CHAPTER 4000. DEPOSITIONS AND DISCOVERY Rule 4001. Scope. Definitions.

(a) [(1)] The rules of this chapter apply to any civil action or proceeding at law or in equity brought in or appealed to any court which is subject to these rules including any action pursuant to the Eminent Domain Code of 1964 or the Municipal Claims Act of 1923.

[(2) These rules shall not apply to an action of divorce or for annulment of marriage, an action for support, or an action for custody of minor children except to the extent prescribed by the rules governing those actions.]

All existing explanatory notes and comments pertaining to the rules listed below are replaced by the following:

Explanatory Comment—Rule 1910.9

This proposed amendment to the support rules eliminates the need to obtain a special order of court before engaging in discovery. In accordance with the proposed revision, discovery would be available as provided by Rule of Civil Procedure 4001 et seq.

Explanatory Comment—Rule 1915.5

Under subdivision (a), the defendant may, but is not required to, plead to the complaint. All averments may be disputed by the defendant at the custody hearing. An attorney who wishes to file another pleading may do so. However, the action is not to be delayed to permit its filing.

The proposed liberalization of discovery in other areas of domestic relations practice does not extend to custody. Discovery is not permitted in any custody action unless authorized by special order of court.

Explanatory Comment—Rule 1920.22

This proposed amendment to the divorce rules eliminates the need to obtain a special order of court before engaging in discovery. In accordance with the proposed revision, discovery would be available as provided by Rule of Civil Procedure 4001 et seq.

1. Revise rule 206.1.A.(1) to read as follows:

All motions, petitions and preliminary objections shall be in writing and shall be accompanied by a proposed form of order; a petition shall also be accompanied by an order allowing a rule to show cause in form as set forth below, which order is hereinafter sometimes referred to as a "rule" or a "rule to show cause". Every motion and petition shall refer to the procedural rule, statute, or other authority relied upon to justify the relief requested, and shall display the counsel's name, address, i.d. number and telephone number.

- 2. Amend rule 206.1.B(3) to read as follows:
- (3) The procedure of Pa.R.C.P. No. 206.6 is adopted. An order containing a rule to show cause, except one which by its terms grants substantive relief or which contains a stay order or seeks to require an answer by respondent(s) in less than twenty (20) days, shall be issued per curiam when presented to the court administrator.

If a respondent orders the matter for argument on petition and answer without having taken depositions or such other discovery as the court may have allowed, then all averments of fact properly pleaded in the petition shall be deemed admitted for the purposes of the rule, unless the petitioner shall have failed to take depositions or such other discovery as the court may have allowed within the time required, in which event the petition shall be decided on petition and answer and all averments of fact responsive to the petition and properly pleaded in the answer, shall be deemed admitted pursuant to Pa.R.C.P. No. 206.7(c). Responsive briefs shall be filed within fifteen (15) days of the filing of the praecipe for determination. The assigned judge may, at his or her discretion, extend the time for filing briefs.
- 5. Amend rule 206.1.B(8) to read as follows:
 - (8) Form of Rule Returnable

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 58—RECREATION

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CHS. 53, 93, 95, 97, 101, 103, 111, 113 AND 117]

Fish and Boat Commission Property; and Boats and Boating

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) by this order amends Chapters 53, 93, 95, 97, 101, 103, 111, 113 and 117. The Commission is publishing these amendments under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code). The amendments deal with Commission property and boats and boating.

A. Effective Date

These amendments will take effect upon publication of this order.

B. Contact Person

C. Statutory Authority

The amendments are published under the statutory authority of sections 741 and 5122—5124 of the code.

D. Purpose and Background

The amendments update the Commission's regulations on boats and boating, including property regulations that relate to boats and boating. The amendments have been reviewed by the Commission's Boating Advisory Board (Board).

E. Summary of Changes

- (a) Personal flotation devices (PFD) on Commission lakes, § 53.8. The Commission and the Bureau of State Parks have historically required the wearing of PFDs by persons operating sculls on State-owned lakes in the exercise of the agencies' powers to regulate use of Commonwealth properties under their jurisdiction. The Board reviewed this issue and recommended that the Commission consider modifying its property regulations to permit the use of non-Coast Guard approved PFDs by the operators of sculls and rowing shells on its lakes. This change is being sought by those who operate sculls and rowing shells who cite the general exemption of sculls and rowing shells from Coast Guard PFD requirements in support of their request.
- (b) Access areas and marinas, § 53.12. Current Commission property regulations provide for boat mooring and slip rentals at the Walnut Creek Access, Erie County. The Commission now operates the North East Access and Marina in Erie County. No specific regulations have been published for the North East Access and Marina. As a result of the Commission obtaining control over an additional marina, the Commission has reexamined the regulation on the Walnut Creek Access area to determine what changes, if any, are in order. It appears that a more flexible regulatory structure, allowing all marinas to be operated in a more business-like manner will best address the needs of the boating public. The regulation was drafted to replace the regulation applicable to Walnut

- Creek Access in its entirety. Although this is a property regulation, the Commission sought public comment by including it in a notice of proposed rulemaking. The Commission received no public comments concerning this change and, therefore, adopted it as proposed.
- (c) State of principal operation of recreational boats, § 93.11. One of the more complicated issues relating to boat registration and numbering is "State of Principal Operation." The Coast Guard has considered the state in which a boat is used most often to be the state in which it is to be registered. An enforcement officer must determine in which state a boat is used most often even though he only sees the boat on an occasional basis. To further complicate the issue, some states have come to use a 60-day period as the period of reciprocity. Many laws allow a boat to operate in a state for a period of 60 days on an out-of-state registration. The regulation attempts to better explain how to determine state of principal operation and when a boat has to be registered in this Commonwealth.
- (d) Operation of a boat after the death of the registered owner, § 93.16. When the boating regulations were rewritten in 1992, a new section was drafted to provide regulatory relief for the estates of deceased boat owners. The intention was to permit the continued use of a boat during the current registration period while the decedent's estate is being administered. The regulation goes further, however, and permits the estate to renew the registration of the boat in the name of the estate. This wording is unnecessary, and, with the 2-year registration system, it allows too long a period before registration of the boat is transferred. The change requires the estate to take action to transfer registration at the end of the current period of registration.
- (e) Lights for boats, § 95.3. When the boating regulations were rewritten in 1992, a new section concerning rules of the road was added. An attempt was made to make these regulations reflect the Federal rules of the road while at the same time making them simpler in construction and easier to read. The rewrite failed to make a distinction in the lighting requirements between boats underway and not underway. The Commission therefore has adopted an amendment to § 95.3 to include the word "underway" and to make several minor editorial changes. On final rulemaking, the Commission has corrected errors in the conversion of the metric measurements.
- (f) PFDs, § 97.1. The Commission sought public comment on a proposal to require PFDs to be worn during certain cold-weather months. The Commission received four public comments concerning this change. One commentator expressed concerns with the change; two expressed support. Although the Board recommended that the Commission adopt the change, the Commission's Boating Committee (Committee) recommended that the Commission not adopt the amendment. The Commission encourages the wearing of PFDs during cold weather months. However, it does not believe that it is necessary to mandate this practice. At its January 1996 meeting, the Commission voted 7 to 2 against requiring that PFDs be worn during cold weather months.
- (g) Fire extinguishers, § 97.2. Federal regulations have required that all fire extinguishers used in boats are to be built to certain requirements established by the Coast Guard. This certification is identified by the presence of a

Coast Guard Approval Number that is found on the label of each marine fire extinguisher. Several years ago, the Coast Guard ceased to certify fire extinguishers turning that responsibility over to independent testing laboratories, most notably Underwriters Laboratory (U.L.). This change has been interpreted to mean that fire extinguishers no longer need the Coast Guard Approval Number. This is not the case. Even though U.L. does the actual certification, all extinguishers must still carry the Coast Guard Approval Number in order to be acceptable in marine use. The amendment merely clarifies this requirement.

- (h) Boating accident reports, § 101.4. During the rewrite of the boating regulations in 1992, the requirements for submitting written boating accident reports were rewritten. The new regulation does not require the operator or owner of the vessel involved in the accident to file a "completed" report. Many of the reports that are received by the Commission are incomplete or illegible making it very difficult to review the accident. A clarification to § 101.4 requiring the reports to be completed will allow the Commission's Boating Accident Review Officer to return the report to the operator or owner of the vessel with regulatory authority to demand any additional information being withheld, or clarification of the information on the report.
- (i) Duties of operators involved in watercraft accidents, § 101.8. The purpose of this amendment is to clarify the duties of operators involved in boating accidents. This change, which mirrors similar requirements for operators of vehicles, updates the requirements to remain at the scene of a boating accident, exchange information and render aid.
- j) Operation of boats in a counter clock-wise direction, § 103.3. The current regulation provides that "motorboats underway on water impoundments—dams, reservoirs, lakes and the like-in areas not marked by well-defined channels, canals, rivers or stream courses shall operate in a counterclockwise fashion insofar as reasonably possible." These rules are not intended to exempt operators of boats from operating in a counter clockwise fashion on rivers and streams. The intent of this rule was to lend some order to boat traffic on congested waterways. It was meant to apply on all waters and was to be a standard of conduct and not an enforceable regulation. The intent of the current language in the boating regulations is somewhat obscure. At least one county court has held that it does not apply to an impoundment on a river. The Commission sought public comment on the regulation and received one comment concerning the change. After considering the public comment, the Commission adopted the regulation as proposed to clarify the applicability of this navigation rule on all waters of this Commonwealth.
 - (k) Special boating regulations, Chapter 111.
- (1) Highland Lake, Bradford County, § 111.8. Highland Lake is a small 1-acre private lake in Bradford County. The Highland Lake Association was first formed in 1947. By agreement of the members, no motorboats have ever been permitted on the lake. The exception to this rule is the Association's motorboat that is used to control algae growth. The Association realizes that its rules have no force of law and have requested that formal regulations be adopted that would prevent the use of motors on this lake. The Commission's staff surveyed the residents of the lake. All residents were generally in support of the amendment. One individual requested that electric motors be permitted on the lake in deference to the needs for senior citizens and handicapped individuals. Because this

- is a private lake, already under agreed regulation, the Commission sought public comment on this change, but the Commission received none. The Commission's Committee subsequently considered this item and recommended to the Commission that it not adopt the special regulation banning motorboats from Highland Lake, a small lake with no public access. At its January 1996 meeting, the Commission declined to adopt the special regulation.
- (2) Delaware River, Bucks County, § 111.9. The New Hope Borough Council and the Solebury Township Supervisors joined forces to request that several slow minimum height swell speed zones be created on the Delaware River in their respective municipalities. The request may be considered in two parts. The first was a request that Pennsylvania adopt regulations consistent with New Jersey that restricts boats to slow no wake while passing through bridge spans. This restriction would apply to four bridges in the vicinity of New Hope. The spans in question are at most 150 feet between piers. If the piers were considered shoreline, two boats could not pass under the span without violating the current Pennsylvania slow no wake regulations. The regulations are unclear, however, in defining what constitutes shoreline. A regulation specifically addressing these four bridge spans would allow consistency of regulations and not necessitate a Statewide regulation to address a problem that does not appear to be Statewide in nature. The second part was to create a slow minimum height swell speed zone of approximately 3,000 feet on the Delaware River near Lumberville. The change would help address general complaints concerning noise and operation of personal watercraft in this area. The Commission received 46 public comments in favor of the slow speed zone in the vicinity of Lumberville. The Board reviewed the change at its meeting on January 19, 1996, and recommended that the slow, minimum height swell speed restriction on the 3,000 feet near Lumberville be effective during the period from 12:01 a.m. on the Friday before Memorial Day until midnight on the following Labor Day. The Board further indicated that this section should also provide that this speed zone will take effect when the State of New Jersey approves similar restrictions. At its meeting on January 21, 1996, the Commission adopted this regulation with the changes proposed by the Board.
- (3) Lake Erie and Presque Isle Bay (Erie County), § 111.25. The Bureau of State Parks maintains a comprehensive set of regulations concerning the operation of boats on waters within its jurisdiction. After the 1992 rewrite of the boating regulations, it was discovered that the Commission failed to include an electric motors only restriction in the lagoons of Presque Isle State Park. This restriction has been in effect for a number of years and its exclusion from the regulations was an oversight. The regulation restores this wording to § 111.25.
- (4) Fairview Lake, Pike County, § 111.52. The Commission received a petition from residents of Fairview Lake, Pike County, to establish a slow minimum height swell speed zone in a cove along the north shore of the lake. This cove is relatively long, narrow and shallow. The operation of conventional motorboats and personal watercraft in this area has resulted in the churning of the bottom silt which turns the normally clear water of the cove murky and uninviting. There appears to be a strong consensus for establishment of this speed zone on Fairview Lake.
- (5) Long Pond, Wayne County, § 111.64. This change was designed to codify restrictions on waterskiing that

the Commission previously approved, but which were not included in the 1992 comprehensive rewrite of boating regulations. It adjusts the hours during which waterskiing is permitted on Long Pond.

- (l) Reliance on locations of aids and markers, § 113.12. During the rewrite of the boating regulations in 1992, the prior provision on reliance on the location of aids to navigation was not included in the new Chapter 113 (relating to aids to navigation and obstructions to navigation). Although aids to navigation are maintained with a reasonable degree of reliability, the rigors of the environment and other unforeseen circumstances often result in aids being moved off station or becoming inoperative. Consequently, prudent boaters do not rely on aids as an absolute warning of hazardous conditions. The amendment advises boaters concerning placement of aids to navigation.
- (m) PFDs on rental boats, § 117.2. On May 1, 1996, new Federal regulations concerning the use of the Type IV PFD by livery operators will go into effect. After that date, livery operators will have to supply wearable PFDs for everyone using one of their boats. The general regulation on PFDs, § 97.1, already has been changed to reflect these new requirements. A staff review of Chapter 117 (relating to boat rental businesses) disclosed a need to amend § 117.2 (relating to standards) to assure that there is no confusion concerning the wearable PFD requirement.
- (n) Information requirements for boat rental businesses, § 117.3. There are currently 225 businesses in this Commonwealth that rent motorboats of various types. An unknown number of businesses rent unpowered boats. Every year, thousands of people are introduced to boating through rented boats. Each year thousands of people come away with a good experience and many may become hooked on boating. Unfortunately some come away with a bad experience. Nationally, 10% of all reported boat accidents involve rented boats. Figures for this Commonwealth reflect a similar rate. While this may not be a large percentage, the numbers are significant enough to warrant some concern. The Commission sought public comment on a regulation that would require the owners or operators of boat rental businesses to provide a summary of boating regulations and a rudimentary instruction in the safe operation of the boat being rented. It might be said that good business practices will assure that this is done without regulation; however, the change adopted by the Commission will ensure that persons who rent boats are given some basic information in all cases. The Commission did not receive any public comments regarding this amendment.

F. Paperwork

The amendments hereby adopted will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements, except that under the change to § 117.3, operators of boat rental businesses will be required to provide a summary of laws and regulations on boating and instruction regarding the safe operation of boats to persons renting boats.

G. Fiscal Impact

The amendments will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The amendments impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public.

H. Public Involvement

A notice of proposed rulemaking containing the proposed amendments was published at 25 Pa.B. 4129

(September 30, 1995). Except for the public comments discussed under the summary of changes in Section E of this Preamble, none of the changes attracted public comment.

Findings

The Commission finds that:

- (1) Public notice of intention to adopt the amendments adopted by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.
- (2) The public comment period was provided and that the comments received were considered.
- (3) The adoption of the amendments of the Commission in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing statutes.

Order

The Commission, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapters 53, 93, 95, 97, 101, 103, 111, 113 and 117, are amended by amending §§ 53.8, 93.11, 93.16, 97.2, 101.4, 101.8, 103.3, 111.8, 111.25, 111.52, 111.64, 117.2 and 117.3, by deleting § 53.12 and by adding §§ 53.12a and 113.12 to read as set forth at 25 Pa.B. 4129 (September 30, 1995); and by amending §§ 95.3 and 111.9 to read as set forth at Annex A.

(*Editor's Note*: The proposal to amend §§ 97.1 and 111.8, included at 25 Pa.B. 4129, has been withdrawn by the Commission.)

- (b) The Executive Director will submit this order and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General for approval as to legality as required by law.
- (c) The Executive Director shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (d) This order shall take effect immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Subpart C. BOATING

CHAPTER 95. MANUFACTURER INSTALLED EQUIPMENT

§ 95.3. Lights for boats.

(a) General rule. A boat from sunset to sunrise and during periods of restricted visibility shall carry and exhibit the lights prescribed by the Inland Navigation Rules Act of 1980 (33 U.S.C.A. §§ 2001—2073). A boat owner may elect to carry and exhibit the lights prescribed by the International Rules in lieu of the Inland Rules but,

in that event, the boat owner shall comply in all respects with those standards. See Appendix A.

- (b) Boats less than 12 meters (39 feet 4.4 inches) in length while underway.
- (1) Motorboats and sailboats using power may use the lighting arrangement in Appendix A, Figure 1, 2 or 3.
- (2) Sailboats using sail alone may use the lighting arrangement in Appendix A, Figure 4, 5 or 6.
- (3) A motorboat or sailboat using power underway on the Great Lakes may use the lighting arrangement in Appendix A, Figure 7D instead of the arrangements in Appendix A, Figure 1 and 2.
- (4) A sailboat using sail alone, less than 7 meters (22 feet 11.6 inches) in length if impractical to display lights in Appendix A, Figure 4, 5 or 6, may display a single white light in time to prevent a collision. See Appendix A, Figure 7C.
- (c) Boats 12 meters (39 feet 4.4 inches) but less than 20 meters (65 feet 7.4 inches) in length while underway.
- (1) Motorboats and sailboats using power may use the lighting arrangements in Appendix A, Figure 1 or 2.
- (2) Sailboats using sail alone may use the lighting arrangement in Appendix A, Figure 4, 5 or 6.
- (d) Rowing or paddle boats while underway. One hand held or permanent all-around white light shall be ready to display in time to prevent a collision. Appendix A, Figure 7, A or B.
- (e) Boat at anchor. One all-around white light is needed—Appendix A, Figure 7E. Anchor lights are not required when anchored in special anchorage areas. Boats less than 7 meters (23 feet) in length are required to display anchor lights when anchored in or near a channel, when in an anchorage not designated as a special anchorage area, or where other vessels normally navigate.
- (f) *Locations of lights.* Lights shall be located and have the characteristics as shown in Appendix A.
- (1) The masthead light (forward white light in Appendix A, Figures 1, 2 and 7D) shall be at least 1 meter (3 feet 3.4 inches) higher than the colored lights on a boat less than 12 meters (39 feet 4.4 inches) and at least 2.5 meters (8 feet 2.4 inches) above the gunwale on a boat 12 meters (39 feet 4.4 inches) in length but less than 20 meters (65 feet 7.4 inches) in length. The after masthead light (Appendix A, Figure 1 only), if used, shall be higher than the forward masthead light so as to be seen as a separate, distinct light at a distance of 1,000 meters (1,093 yards 1.8 feet) ahead of the boat.
- (2) The all-around white lights shown in Appendix A, Figures 3 and 7D shall be 1 meter (3 feet 3.4 inches) higher than the colored lights.
- (3) An anchor light shall be displayed where it can best be seen.

CHAPTER 111. SPECIAL REGULATIONS COUNTIES

§ 111.9. Bucks County.

- (a) Levittown Lake. The operation of boats powered by internal combustion motors is prohibited.
- (b) Neshaminy Creek. Boats are limited to slow, minimum height swell speed from the mouth of Neshaminy

Creek to a point approximately 200 yards upstream from the Route 13 Bridge, a distance of approximately 1.5 miles.

- (c) *Nockamixon Lake—Nockamixon State Park.* The use of motors in excess of 10 horsepower is prohibited.
- (d) *Tyler State Park.* The operation of boats powered by internal combustion motors is prohibited.
 - (e) Delaware River.
- (1) Boats are limited to slow minimum height swell speed in the following areas:
 - (i) Franklin Cove
- (ii) From the mouth of Paunacussing Creek, approximately 3,000 feet to a point in the vicinity of Green Hill Road, effective from 12:01 a.m. on the Friday before Memorial Day until midnight on Labor Day.
- (2) Boats are limited to slow minimum height swell speed while passing through the following bridge spans:
 - (i) Route 263 (Stockton-Center) Bridge.
 - (ii) Route 202 Toll Bridge.
 - (iii) Route 179 (New Hope-Lambertville) Bridge.
- (3) The requirements in this subsection that affect waters of joint jurisdiction with New Jersey are effective May 1, 1997.
- (4) The mooring of boats within 100 feet of the marina boat dock in Franklin Cove is prohibited.

[58 PA. CODE CHS. 61 AND 77] Reptiles and Amphibians

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) by this order amends Chapters 61 and 77 (relating to seasons, sizes and creel limits; and reptiles and amphibians). The Commission is amending these chapters under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code of 1980) (code). The amendments deal with reptiles and amphibians.

A. Effective Date

These amendments will take effect upon publication of this order.

C. Statutory Authority

These amendments are published under the statutory authority of sections 2102 and 2904 of the code (relating to rules and regulations; and permits for protection and management of particular fish).

D. Purpose and Background

The amendments update the Commission's regulations on reptiles and amphibians to provide for the better protection and management of this form of wildlife.

E. Summary of Changes

The existing reptile and amphibian regulations were in need of revision to provide adequate protection of these resources. The Commission observed increasing interest in collecting certain reptiles and amphibians in this Commonwealth. There were areas regarding regulations pertaining to organized reptile and amphibian hunts that required clarification. Commission staff from the Bureaus of Fisheries and Law Enforcement and members of the Herpetology Advisory Committee discussed and contributed to the drafting of the changes.

The Commission has adopted changes to current reptiles and amphibian regulations to:

- (a) Clarify requirements for individual permits to take, catch or kill timber rattlesnakes, § 77.2 (relating to reptile and amphibian hunt permits).
- (b) Further define possession issues regarding timber rattlesnakes including the addition of an annual limit, § 77.6 (relating to season and daily possession limits).
- (c) Prohibit the sale, trade or barter of native reptile and amphibian parts, § 77.3 (relating to taking and selling reptiles and amphibians under section 2102(b) and (c) of the code).
- (d) Prohibit harvest and possession of reptile eggs and provide additional protection for nests, § 77.3.
 - (e) Place possession limits on frogs, § 77.6.
- (f) Place season, daily and possession limits on snapping turtles, § 77.6.
- (g) Clarify the prohibition on the importation of timber rattlesnakes, § 77.8 (relating to importation of timber rattlesnakes).

Additionally, the Commission has adopted changes to Pymatuning Reservoir regulations in § 61.3 (relating to Pymatuning Reservoir) to bring them in line with current and proposed Statewide regulations. The Commission's staff solicited comments from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (DNR), which has shared jurisdiction for this boundary water. The Ohio DNR has no objections to these changes. On final rulemaking, the Commission has corrected a wording error in § 77.3.

F. Paperwork

These amendments will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements, except the clarification on the requirement for individual annual timber rattlesnake hunt permits, in § 77.2, will more clearly define who is required to have permits.

G. Fiscal Impact

The amendments will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The amendments impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public.

H. Public Involvement

A notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 25 Pa.B. 4134 (September 30, 1995). The Commission received no written public comments in response to the

notice of proposed rulemaking. Andy Shiels, Herpetology, Endangered Species and Triploid Grass Carp coordinator, reports that he received two telephone calls about the proposed amendments. Both concerned the seasons for snapping turtles.

Findings

The Commission finds that:

- (1) Public notice of intention to adopt the amendments adopted by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.
- (2) A public comment period was provided and that all comments received were considered.
- (3) The amendment of the regulations of the Commission in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing statutes.

Ordei

The Commission, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

- (a) The regulations of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapters 61 and 77, are amended by amending §§ 61.3, 77.2, 77.6 and 77.8 to read as set forth at 25 Pa.B. 4134; and by amending § 77.3 to read as set forth in Annex A.
- (b) The Executive Director shall submit this order, 25 Pa.B. 4134 and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General for approval as to legality as required by law.
- (c) The Executive Director shall certify this order, 25 Pa.B. 4134 and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (d) This order shall take effect immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

TITLE 58. RECREATION PART II. FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION Subpart B. FISHING

CHAPTER 77. REPTILES AND AMPHIBIANS

- § 77.3. Taking and selling reptiles or amphibians under section 2102(b) and (c) of the code.
- (a) A reptile or amphibian may not be taken through the use of chemicals, smoke, explosives, winches, jacks or other devices or materials, or manually that may disrupt, damage or destroy the den or the immediate surroundings thereof. Habitat may not be destroyed in pursuit of a reptile or amphibian.
- (b) It is unlawful to take, catch, kill or possess an amphibian or reptile, whether dead or alive, in whole or in parts, including eggs or any lifestage, except common snapping turtles (*Chelydra serpentina*), in this Commonwealth for the purpose of selling the amphibian or reptile or offering it for sale.
- (c) It is unlawful for a person to sell, offer for sale, import or export for consideration, trade or barter, or purchase an amphibian or reptile, except common snap-

ping turtles, whether dead or alive, in whole or in parts, including eggs or any lifestage, that was taken, caught or killed in this Commonwealth. It is not a violation of this subsection to sell, offer for sale, import or export for consideration, or purchase an amphibian or reptile taken, caught or killed prior to September 1, 1979.

(d) In prosecutions for violation of this section, it shall be a rebuttable presumption that a species of amphibian or reptile that is native to or occurs within this Commonwealth, was taken, caught or killed in this Commonwealth.

wealth, and that a reptile or amphibian offered for sale, sold, or purchased in apparent violation of this section was taken, caught or killed after September 1, 1979.

(e) It is unlawful to damage or disrupt the nest or eggs of a reptile or to gather, take or possess the eggs of any reptile in the natural environment of this Commonwealth.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

[25 PA. CODE CHS. 260—270]
Universal Waste Rule—Enforcement Strategy

On April 16, 1996, the Environmental Quality Board (EQB) approved amendments to the hazardous waste regulations known as the Universal Waste Rule as a proposed rulemaking. The rulemaking provides a State counterpart to EPA's Universal Waste Rule, which can be found in 40 CFR Part 273 (relating to standards for universal waste management).

The Department has established an enforcement strategy for the management of waste nickel cadmium and other batteries, certain pesticides and mercury thermostats as outlined in the proposed rulemaking and as allowed in the Federal Universal Waste Rule.

The enforcement strategy encourages recycling while ensuring adequate protection of human health and the environment and provides incentives for industries and organizations to collect the universal wastes for recycling.

The Department will allow the collection, transportation and management of universal wastes as provided in the proposed rulemaking approved by the EQB on April 16, 1996. These proposed regulations will be utilized in lieu of the Commonwealth's present hazardous waste regulations.

The Department will exercise its discretion not to enforce those provisions of the Commonwealth's hazardous waste regulations in Chapters 260—270 applicable to those wastes classified as universal waste in light of the Department's intention to submit to the Environmental Quality Board the Universal Waste Rule as final rule-making. Waste covered by the Universal Waste Rule must be shipped to a destination facility which recycles the waste.

Until the Universal Waste regulations are promulgated as final rulemaking, the Department will exercise enforcement discretion only when a regulated party is in compliance with the proposed Universal Waste regulations, referenced in this enforcement strategy. If a regulated party fails to comply with the proposed regulations, the Department reserves the right to take enforcement action for violations of its own existing regulations.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE [55 PA. CODE CH. 6000]

Procedures for Funding Reserved Hospital and Leave Days Under 2176 Waiver

Purpose

The purpose of this statement of policy is to issue revised procedures for funding reserved hospital and leave days under the 2176 waiver.

Background

Procedures on Federal and State reimbursement for days in which individuals receiving waiver services are hospitalized or on a leave status were first issued on August 29, 1985, and revised on May 31, 1988. These procedures were consistent with rules established for MA funded long-term care and were approved by the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) as part of the Department's first 5-year waiver renewal which ended June 30, 1995.

In a March 24, 1995, letter to the National Association of State Directors of Developmental Disabilities Services. Inc., the HCFA explained that states are prohibited from making specific therapeutic leave payments for Medicaidreimbursable home and community-based services. The reason given for this prohibition is that Federal financial participation for therapeutic leave days applies to institutional care, not home and community services.

HCFA regional staff are being instructed to give states a reasonable period of time to bring their program policies into compliance with a reimbursement system where the cost of leave days should be factored into provider rates. HCFA plans to make no attempt to recover past leave days payments for noncomplying states which make timely revisions in their procedures. In coming into compliance with new Federal policy, the Department has been able to maintain its current policy regarding hospital leave and has only needed to change the portion of the policy related to the rapeutic leave.

This revised statement of policy is intended to ensure continued Federal financial participation in the cost of maintaining waiver services for individuals who are absent from services for a reasonable period of time due to hospitalization or other legitimate reason. Implementation of this policy should also continue to encourage family visits, excursions with friends or groups, and other forms of leave which support the individual's choices and participation in home and community life.

Discussion

A reserved hospital day is a 24-hour period of inpatient hospitalization during which the provider of service does not provide any waiver funded services for the individual but does reserve a place in the service or program for the individual when he returns from the hospital stay.

A reserved leave day is a 24-hour period in which the individual is absent from a waiver funded service when each of the following criteria are met:

(1) The provider reserves a place in the service or program for the individual when he returns from leave.

- (2) The provider assumes fixed staffing or other service costs while the individual is on leave.
- (3) The provider does not claim additional Federal and State financial participation for services rendered to someone who takes the place of the individual on leave.

§ 6000.841. Procedures for funding reserved hospital and leave days under 2176 waiver.

- (a) The Department will participate in the cost of a reserved hospital or leave day when:
- (1) The cost of the reserved hospital or leave day is established as part of the provider's rate pursuant to a vacancy factor in the calculation of the rate. The vacancy factor, in effect, adjusts the provider's rate to account for anticipated costs for reserving the service during the individual's hospitalization or leave. The vacancy factor should be based on historic leave or hospitalization rates, or both, and the characteristics of individuals receiving services. Rates and vacancy factors will continue to be approved by the county mental health and mental retardation program in accordance with its fiscal responsibilities under Chapter 4300 (relating to county mental health and mental retardation fiscal manual).
- (2) The cost of the reserved day is reconciled to actual allowable costs and reported to the county mental health/ mental retardation program through the provider's annual audit. The county then reports these costs on the appropriate annual income and expenditure report to the Department for waiver eligible services.
- (3) The provider is able to maintain a cost effective service. Extremely high rates of leave can jeopardize service effectiveness and reasonableness of costs. The Department expects that the county mental health/mental retardation program will closely monitor vacancy rates in all waiver funded services to assure that providers are rendering services at the frequency and duration that individuals need. The regional program offices will also review service utilization as part of their ongoing waiver reviews to assure cost effectiveness.
- (b) A reserved hospital or leave day is a vacancy and as such is not billable or reportable as a day or unit of waiver services to the county mental health/mental retardation program or to the Department.

Commission Meeting and Public Hearing

The Delaware River Basin Commission will hold a public hearing on Wednesday, April 24, 1996. The hearing will be part of the Commission's regular business meeting which is open to the public and scheduled to begin at 10:30 a.m. in the Goddard Conference Room of the Commission's offices at 25 State Police Drive, West Trenton, NJ.

An informal conference among the Commissioners and staff will be held at 9:30 a.m. at the same location and will include a discussion of proposed revisions to the Commission's Administrative Manual—Rules of Practice and Procedure, an update on management of New Jersey's Potomac-Raritan-Magothy Aquifer system and public dialogue.

The subjects of the hearing will be as follows:

- Applications for Approval of the Following Projects Under Article 10.3, Article 11 and/or Section 3.8 of the Compact:
- 1. Holdover Project: Borough of Berlin D-95-24 CP. An application for approval of a groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 27.5 million gallons (mg)/30 days of water to the applicant's distribution system from new well no. 12, and to limit the withdrawal from all wells located within the Delaware River Basin to 27.5 mg/30 days. The project is located in Berlin Township, Camden County, NJ. This hearing continues that of March 26, 1996.
- 2. National Utilities, Inc./Hamilton Division D-85-55 CP RENEWAL. An application for the renewal of a groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 5.5 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's Hamilton Division from well nos. 1, 3 and 4. Commission approval on August 8, 1990, was limited to 5 years. The applicant requests that the total withdrawal from all wells remain limited to 5.5 mg/30 days. The project is located in Ross Township, Monroe County, PA.
- 3. Kraft Foods, Inc. D-92-53 (Revised). A project to provide a groundwater supply to serve the applicant's food processing plant in the City of Dover, Kent County, Delaware. The applicant will continue to use its existing well nos. 1 and 2 for its food processing operations; existing well no. 3 and the existing cogeneration facility it serves will be sold to First State Power Management, Inc. (see Application D-96-10). The applicant requests that the total combined withdrawal from well nos. 1 and 2 be limited to 7 mg/30 days (0.23 million gallons per day (mgd)).
- 4. Monroe Municipal Utilities Authority D-93-9 CP. An application for approval of a groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 25.92 mg/30 days of water to that portion of the applicant's distribution system located within the Delaware River Basin from new well nos. 9 and 10, and to limit the withdrawal from all wells located within the Delaware River Basin to 25.92 mg/30 days. The project is located in Monroe Township, Gloucester County, NJ.

- 5. Florence Township Water Department D-94-82 CP. An application for approval of a groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 21.6 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's distribution system from new well no. 5, and to limit the withdrawal from all wells to 60 mg/30 days. The project is located in Florence Township, Burlington County, NJ.
- 6. Whitehall Township Authority D-95-48 CP. An application for approval of a groundwater withdrawal project to supply up to 8.64 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's distribution system from the new Huber Well, and to retain the existing withdrawal limit from all wells of 73 mg/30 days. The project is located in Whitehall Township, Lehigh County, PA.
- 7. Township of Horsham Sewer Authority D-95-64 CP. A project to modify and expand the applicant's 0.5 mgd Park Creek Sewage Treatment Plant (STP) which is located off Keith Valley Road in Horsham Township, Montgomery County, PA. The STP will be expanded to provide 1.0 mgd of advanced secondary treatment, including ammonia, phosphorus and nitrogen removal. The STP will serve a larger area of Horsham Township and will continue to discharge to Park Creek.
- 8. Utility Group Services Corporation D-96-8. A project to upgrade and expand the applicant's Little Washington Drainage Company STP located in East Brandywine Township, Chester County, PA. The STP serves two residential developments in East Brandywine Township: Culbertson Run and The Timbers. The project entails expansion from 53,100 gallons per day (gpd) to 93,000 gpd in two phases, and the advanced secondary STP will be upgraded from extended aeration to a suspended growth biological nitrogen removal process with tertiary filtration. The existing allowable discharge to Culbertson Run will remain at 53,100 gpd and the expanded average flow of 40,000 gpd will be discharged to two proposed infiltration beds for subsurface disposal.
- 9. First State Power Management, Inc. D-96-10. A project to operate an existing well and cogeneration facility, both to be purchased from Kraft Foods, Inc. (see Application D-92-53 (Revised)). The project is located in the City of Dover, Kent County, DE. The applicant will operate an 18-megawatt steam cycle coal-fired cogeneration plant to provide power to the City of Dover's electric distribution system, and steam to Kraft Foods, Inc. The cogeneration plant site includes well no. 3; the applicant requests the withdrawal be limited to 16 mg/30 days (0.53 mgd).

Public Notice of Proposed Consent Decrees

Oliver Site Waterford Township, Erie County

Under section 1113 of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (35 P. S. §§ 6020.1113—6020.1304), notice is hereby provided that the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has entered into two Consent Decrees concerning settlement of the Department's Complaint against General Electric Company (GE) and GAF Building Materials Corporation (GAF). The Department's Complaint concerns the investigation and cleanup of the Oliver Site in Erie County, PA. The Department's Complaint against GE and GAF is filed in the United States District Court for the Western District of Pennsylvania at the Federal Courthouse in Erie, PA.

In the past, wastes containing hazardous substances were disposed at the Oliver Site, and these hazardous substances have contaminated the soil, surface water, groundwater and sediments at the Site. The Department has incurred approximately \$1 million in past response costs, and estimates that it will cost approximately \$3 million to clean up the Oliver Site.

The Department has entered into a settlement with GE whereby GE will, among other things, pay \$920,000 to the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Fund and will design and construct a water service for the residences with drinking water that is or could be affected by the hazardous substances at the Oliver Site. The specifics of this settlement are set forth in the Consent Decree for the settlement between the Department and GE.

The Department has also entered into a de minimis settlement with GAF whereby GAF will pay \$28,550 to the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Fund. This de minimis settlement is based upon the Department's determination that the amount of hazardous substances contributed by GAF is minimal compared to the amount of the other hazardous substances at the Oliver Site; the toxic or other hazardous effects of these hazardous substances are minimal compared to the effects of the other hazardous substances at the Oliver Site; these hazardous substances have not contaminated the groundwater at the Oliver Site; and these hazardous substances have caused and will cause only a minor portion of the response costs at the Oliver Site. The specifics of this settlement are set forth in the Consent Decree for the settlement between the Department and GAF.

The Department will receive and consider comments relating to these Consent Decrees for 60 days from the date of this public notice. The Department may withdraw its consent to the settlements with GE and GAF if the comments concerning the Consent Decrees disclose facts or considerations which indicate that the settlements are inappropriate, inadequate or not in the public interest. UGI Columbia Gas Site Borough of Columbia, Lancaster County

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) under the authority of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (HSCA) (35 P.S. §§ 6020.101—6020.1304) has entered into a consent order and agreement with

Pennsylvania Power & Light Company (PP&L) regarding the UGI Columbia Gas site in the Borough of Columbia, Lancaster County. The site housed a former gas manufacturing facility that operated from approximately 1853 to 1948. The site is not owned by PP&L, but has been owned by a number of entities during the plant's operation and the years subsequent to its closing.

Operations of the manufactured gas facility resulted in contamination of the site, particularly in the areas of the relief holder and gas holders. The gas holder was located near the center of the property and consisted of a 40-foot diameter structure that was a brick-lined cylindrical pit with a concrete base. Site characterization revealed that the pit contains tar coated material to a depth of approximately 17 feet and that the concrete base is fractured.

The relief holder was constructed of riveted steel plates and was contained within a pit that was approximately 26 feet deep. Tars were stored inside during the plant's operation. Once the plant operations ceased, the pit was filled with refuse, construction debris, and fill. Assessment activities at the site indicated that approximately 800 cubic yards of Susquehanna River sediment southwest of the site were also contaminated with coal tar.

On May 31, 1994, under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act, 42 U.S.C.A. §§ 9601 et seq., and the National Oil and Hazardous Substances Contingency Plan, 40 C.F.R. Part 300, the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) placed the site on the National Priority List. EPA also authorized the Department to address the gas and relief holders and to further assess the site and the contaminated river sediments. On July 17, 1995, the Department issued, pursuant to HSCA, a Statement of Decision (SOD) for the site, In its SOD, the Department determined there was a need to conduct interim actions to address the risks posed by the gas and relief holders. In order to address these risks, the Department determined there was a need to remove contaminated material from the gas and relief holders and selected the processes to accomplish this goal.

On April 4, 1996, the Department and PP&L entered into a consent order and agreement whereby PP&L agreed to implement the interim actions, as selected by the Department in its SOD, to conduct a remedial investigation and feasibility study of the site, and to assess further the river sediment contamination and means for addressing it. PP&L also agreed to reimburse the Department \$22,980.80 for the past costs expended by the Department at the site and to reimburse the Department for its future costs to implement the consent order and agreement.

This notice is provided under section 1113 of HSCA (35 P. S. § 6020.1113). The Department will respond to any significant written comments before the consent order and agreement becomes final. The consent order and agreement that contains the specific terms of the settlement is available for public review and comment. Final Submission Date for Municipal Recycling Program Peformance Grant Applications under the Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act

The Department of Environmental Protection hereby announces a request for applications from municipalities for grant assistance for recycling programs under the Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act (35 P. S. §§ 4000.101—4000.1904). Municipalities include counties, cities, boroughs, incorporated towns, townships and home rule municipalities.

Recycling Performance Grant funds will be awarded to municipalities based upon the weight of source separated recyclable materials identified in section 1501 of act 101 recovered by municipal recycling programs, and the population of the municipality. For this application period, municipalities awarded grants will receive a base award of \$5 for each ton of eligible recyclable materials marketed, and \$1 per ton for each percentage of waste diverted from disposal. The weight of eligible materials allowable from non-residential (commercial and institutional) sources will be limited to no more than the weight of eligible materials from residential sources. The Department will not award grants calculated to be less than \$10.

Eligible materials include: clear glass, colored glass, aluminum, steel and bimetallic cans, high-grade office paper, newsprint, corrugated paper, other marketable grades of paper, and plastics. Grants will be awarded only for properly documented, eligible materials that were actually marketed on or after January 1, 1995, to and including December 31, 1995. Grant funds will not be awarded for residues, materials not listed as eligible, or any materials which cannot be documented as being recycled into a new product or use.

Documentation to support all claims that eligible recyclable materials were generated within the municipality and marketed must be retained at the offices of the municipal applicant for 4 years from the end date of the year the application covers. The supporting documentation is not required to be submitted with the application.

Acceptable Supporting Documentation. Weight slips or receipts verifying that the materials were marketed are required as supporting documentation for the grant application. The documentation must be on the letterhead of the market or on forms provided by the market, must bear a signature of an authorized representative verifying that the materials were received, and must identify the type and weight of the materials received. Estimates of weight will not be accepted except in cases where: 1) the material is packaged in uniform bales and the average weight of a bale can be demonstrated, or, 2) when multiple generators contribute to a known quantity of marketed material and the hauler or market estimates the quantities allocatable to any individual establishment, or lists each establishment, and verifies the estimate with his/her signature.

Supporting documentation must be available for review by representatives of the Department of Environmental Protection, the Office of the Attorney General and the Office of the Treasurer. Although the supporting documentation is not required to be submitted with the grant application, any documentation provided must conform to the above requirements or the materials claimed will not be credited toward the grant.

The deadline for submission of applications is 3 p.m., October 4, 1996. Applications must be on the revised

Section 303(d) List of Waters; Notice of Availability

The Department of Environmental Protection announces that Pennsylvania's section 303(d) list of waters which requires the development of Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDLs) is available for review and comment. The list was developed by the Department to comply with

section 303(d) of the Federal Clean Water Act and 40 CFR Part 130. TMDLs are the total amounts of point and nonpoint source pollutants that may be discharged into a water body that will still meet water quality standards. For point sources, the TMDLs are used as a basis for water quality-based limits in NPDES permits. For nonpoint sources, watershed management plans are developed which identify the Best Management Practices or other measures necessary to improve water quality with the goal of meeting water quality standards. A water body need not be listed if a TMDL has already been established. In addition, a water body that will meet water quality standards after the implementation of technology-based requirements need not be listed.

The Department developed the list using existing and readily available information regarding waste sources, water quality, water uses and water quality criteria. It considered the 16 screening categories of information included in EPA guidance in developing the list. The list considered compliance with water quality criteria for conventional, nonconventional and toxic pollutants. The waters included on the list are those identified through the Department's Watershed Permitting Process, Water Quality Assessment Program (including the section 305(b) Water Quality Inventory Report) and the Department's Nonpoint Source Program. The Department expects to develop TMDLs for some of the listed waters over the next 2 years.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEARING BOARD

Duquesne Light Company v. DEP; Doc. No. 95-241-G

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) and Duquesne Light Company have agreed to a settlement of the above matter.

The Department issued NPDES Permit No. PA 0001627 to Duquesne Light Company (DLCo) authorizing the discharge of wastewater to the Allegheny River and Little Deer Creek. DLCo objected to the inclusion of Water Quality-Based Effluent Limitations (WQBELs) at Outfall 002 because they were calculated using an inaccurate, outdated water quality computer model. DLCo also objected because several water quality criteria were revised prior to issuance of the NPDES Permit, but the revised criteria were not incorporated into the WQBELs.

The major provisions of the settlement are:

1. Modification of the Beryllium, Copper and Silver effluent limitations at Outfall 002 reflecting revised criteria and developed using the Model PENTOXSD.

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

Closure to Public Fishing—Childrens Lake, Boiling Springs, Cumberland County

The Executive Director of the Fish and Boat Commission, acting under the authority of 58 Pa. Code §§ 53.18 (relating to additional restrictions on Commission prop-

erty) and 65.25 (relating to temporary changes to fishing regulations), is taking action to close Childrens Lake (formerly known as Boiling Springs Lake), Cumberland County, during the period of its drawdown.

The Executive Director finds that this action is necessary and appropriate for the protection, preservation and management of fish and fish habitat at Childrens Lake. Childrens Lake is owned by the Fish and Boat Commission. The dam, which impounds the Lake, is in need of repairs. The Commission has entered into a cooperative agreement with South Middleton Township, which controls the road where the dam is located, to rehabilitate the dam. South Middleton Township has entered into a contract for this work. The dam repairs will require drawdown of the Lake for approximately 10 to 12 weeks. A flow of water will be maintained from the spring that feeds Childrens Lake through the lake bed. Although it is anticipated that most fish will move to downstream waters during this period, fishing in the drawndown portion of the Lake will cause concerns from the points of view of protection and management of the fishery and safety of persons who fish.

This notice takes effect at 12:01 a.m. on April 21, 1996. It is expected that Childrens Lake will reopen to public fishing during the summer of 1996.

Insurance Department—Medicare Supplement Insurance Minimum Standards; Doc. No. 11-133

Order

On March 6, 1996, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this regulation from the Insurance Department. This rulemaking would amend 31 Pa. Code, Chapter 89, Subchapter K, Medicare Supplement Insurance Minimum Standards, Sections 89.771, 89.772, 89.775, 89.776, 89.778, 89.780, 89.783 and 89.784 and Appendices E and I. The authority for this regulation is The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. §§ 66, 186, 411 and 412) and the Federal Social Security Act Amendments of 1994 (42 U.S.C.A. § 1395ss(a)(2) and (p)(1)) and Section 171(m) of the Social Security Act. Notice of proposed rulemaking was omitted for this regulation; it will become effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

On March 29, 1996, amendments to the final-omitted regulation were submitted by the Department to correct technical errors in the Pa. Code title and in section 89.776(1)(v)(E) and section 89.780(a)(3)(c).

To meet the requirements of the Social Security Act Amendments of 1994 (SSAA-94), this proposal standardizes Medicare supplement insurance coverage by establishing in regulation the revisions prepared by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC). Revisions prepared by the NAIC were circulated to State Insurance Commissioners by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Health Care Financing Administration which directed states to adopt changes to state regulatory programs before April 28, 1996. If Pennsylvania fails to make the changes in the proposal, Medicare supplemental policies could only be sold after April 28, 1996, if the Secretary of HHS certifies that the policies meet the new Federal standards. Revisions to existing regulations in this proposal include the minimum requirements for the approval of Medicare supplemental policies for issuance and sale in the Commonwealth.

Because the SSAA-94 permits some exceptions which allow the sale of Medicare Supplement insurance policies that duplicate Medicare benefits or duplicate existing supplemental coverage when proper disclosure is made, significant changes are made to section 89.783 (required disclosure provisions) and to the disclosure statements in Appendix I of this proposal. Revisions for the "Statements" and "Questions" section of an application must contain information to warn consumers about duplication of coverage.

In an addition to the "Statements" which must accompany an application, there is a warning to consumers that if the policy is purchased, they may want to evaluate existing health coverage and decide if multiple coverage is needed. An existing statement notifies consumers that counseling services may be available concerning medical assistance through the State Medicaid program. Benefits as a Qualified Medicare Beneficiary and a Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiary are added. The revision allows the sale of policies to Medicaid beneficiaries who meet specific income and asset guidelines.

The "Questions" portion of an application will now ask if the consumer intends to replace a current Medicare policy. The proposal requires an increase of type size, from 10 point to 12 point, for notices to the applicant. The text of the notice is modified to state that if the consumer decides to purchase the coverage, they should terminate other Medicare supplement coverage. Further, the notice will also warn the consumer to evaluate the need for other accident and sickness coverage that may be duplicated by the new policy. The agent must sign a statement which indicates to the best of their knowledge, the policy they are selling will not duplicate existing Medicare coverage because the consumer intends to terminate existing Medicare supplemental coverage. Applications provided to Medicare-eligible persons for health insurance must disclose the extent to which a policy duplicates Medicare. Additionally, when a replacement policy is sold to a consumer who already has an existing Medicare supplement policy, a replacement notice advising the consumer to terminate existing Medicare supplement coverage must be provided.

Other modifications in the proposal include a change in the definition of "Medicare supplement policy" which is revised to eliminate an exemption for health care prepayment plans which are not employer or union-based plans. The exception from notice requirements for basic, catastrophic, major medical and single premium nonrenewable policies is eliminated. An existing requirement for refund of premiums for retroactively-determined periods of Medicaid eligiblity is eliminated. The proposal allows a 6-month enrollment period at age 65 for all individuals whether or not previously enrolled. Loss ratio standards are established for policies issued prior to July 30, 1992. Also, refund or credit calculations for policies issued prior to July 30, 1992, must be calculated separately after the effective date of this proposal, for individual policies and all other group policies combined. The Medicare Supplement Refund Calculation form found in Appendix E of this proposal is changed accordingly.

We have reviewed this regulation and find it to be in the public interest. The amendments bring Subchapter K into compliance with minimum Federal statutory requirements by adopting the NAIC Model Regulation. Adoption of the proposal will allow the continued sale of Medicare supplemental policies in Pennsylvania. Further, the final-omitted regulation contains revisions which benefit consumers by ensuring complete disclosure of information.

Therefore, It Is Ordered That:

- 1. Regulation No. 11-133 from the Insurance Department, as submitted to the Commission on March 6, 1996, and amended on March 29, 1996, is approved; and
- 2. The Commission will transmit a copy of this Order to the Legislative Reference Bureau.

Environmental Quality Board—Stream Redesignations— Pine and Elk Creek et al.; Doc. No. 7-284

Order

On November 14, 1994, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the Environmental Quality Board (EQB). This rulemaking would amend 25 Pa. Code § 93.9m. The authority for this regulation is sections 5 and 402 of the Clean Streams Law (35 P. S. §§ 691.5 and 691.402), and section 1920-A of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 510-20). The proposed regulation was published in the December 3, 1994 *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 72-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on March 5, 1996.

The regulation would change the designations of nine stream segments in Centre County. Seven of the stream segments would be redesignated as "Exceptional Value Waters" (EV). Two others would be designated as "High Quality Cold Water Fishes" (HQ-CWF). Four of the segments proposed for EV designation are currently designated as "Cold Water Fishes" (CWF) and the three other segments are currently designated as HQ-CWF.

The objective of this regulation is the redesignation of stream segments in two watersheds in Centre County. Elk Creek is a tributary to Pine Creek which flows into Penns Creek. Above its confluence with Pine Creek, Penns Creek is currently designated as CWF. Below its merger with Pine Creek, Penns Creek is designated as HQ-CWF. These current designations for Penns Creek are not being revised by this regulation.

Both Elk and Pine Creeks begin in Bald Eagle State Forest. The headwaters and the first 2 miles of Pine Creek are located in the Hook Natural Area. This area is a 5,119 acre forest tract that is being preserved in its natural state by the Bureau of Forestry in the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources. Pine Creek flows for approximately 20.4 miles, and Elk Creek flows 18.5 miles. With the exception of their headwaters and upper segments, both streams run through private property. There is a considerable degree of agricultural and residential activity in both watersheds. Small, but active, towns, such as Millheim Borough, Coburn and Woodward, are located on the banks of Elk or Pine Creeks.

The preamble of the final-form regulation summarizes the potential costs and benefits for local governments and the private sector in the following manner:

Persons proposing activities or projects which result in discharges to streams must comply with the regulatory

requirements relating to current stream designations. Such persons could be adversely affected by the recommended changes that increase the level of protection provided to a stream, if they expand their discharge, or add a new discharge point, since they may need to provide a higher level of treatment for their new or expanded discharge. These increased costs take the form of higher engineering, construction or operating costs for wastewater treatment facilities. Treatment costs are site-specific and may depend upon the size of the discharge in relation to the size of the stream and many other factors. It is therefore not possible to precisely predict the actual change in costs. In addition, non-point source controls necessary to protect High Quality and Exceptional Value Waters generally add to the cost of planning and development for new or expanded non-point source discharges.

Overall, the citizens of the Commonwealth will benefit from these recommended designations because they will provide, in some cases, an added degree of protection for important public natural sources and, in all cases, the most appropriate degree of protection for each stream in question.

Both supporters and opponents of the regulation agree that the regulation will increase costs for local governments, residents and the private sector. There is disagreement over how onerous the increases will be and when and how they will occur. The current discharge from Millheim Borough's sewage treatment plant is "grandfathered" as an existing use and will not be affected by the regulation. However, if Millheim needs to expand its discharge or if other neighboring municipalities opt to build sewage treatment systems, then there will be new and additional costs. The Millheim Borough Council and the Boards of Supervisors for both Penn and Miles are all concerned by the future costs and restrictions that could be imposed by the regulation. According to these officials, a significant number of residents in the area are retired persons or senior citizens who are on fixed incomes. These people may not be able to afford the additional costs for sewage treatment imposed by the regulation. Representatives of the farmers in the area are also concerned by the uncertainty over cost increases associated with the regulation.

During the public comment period, more than 4,700 written comments were received concerning this regulation. The EQB also held a public hearing on January 25, 1995, at Penns Valley High School near the two watersheds. More than 70 people either testified or submitted written comments at the hearing. In recent weeks, we received more than 850 pieces of correspondence concerning this regulation.

Phillips Although most of the written comments supported the regulation, strong opposition to the regulation was expressed by a number of local residents, local municipalities and other organizations. The following is a list of some of the parties who have expressed opposition to the regulation:

Senator J. Doyle Corman forwarded correspondence to the Commission from both supporters and opponents of the regulation. Pine and Elk Creeks are located in his district and in Representative Rudy's district.

We have reviewed this regulation and find it to be in the public interest. This regulation is one of the most controversial and divisive regulations ever brought before us for review. A great deal of frustration, anger, ardent dedication and resolute determination have been expressed by all sides of the debate over this regulation. There is also a significant level of confusion about the actual objectives of the regulation and its impact on local residents in the two watersheds. In our view, the primary objective of this regulation is the protection of the backward sedge (Carex retrorsa), an endangered semiaquatic plant species. According to the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), this is the overriding factor behind the EV designations for the lower stream segments of both Pine and Elk Creeks. The focus of contention for all sides of the debate over this regulation was the lower segments of these two creeks.

We recognize and respect the fact that Pine and Elk Creeks on their own and as a tributary to Penns Creek represent a valuable native trout fishery. However, DEP noted in August 1994 that the current CWF designations or upgrades to HQ-CWF were the appropriate designations to protect this type of resource. This position is consistent with the policy guidelines set forth in the DEP Special Protection Waters Implementation Handbook (DEP Handbook). Although this regulation will provide additional protection for the fishery resource, the existence of the backward sedge is the prime determinant for the policy decision for the EV upgrade.

With regard to the backward sedge, there is an apparent lack of scientific information as to whether an EV designation is necessary to protect this species. None of the watersheds in which the backward sedge reportedly exists is currently classified as EV at 25 Pa. Code § 93.9. Although this may indicate that an EV designation is not necessary for the survival of this species, the DEP notes that many of these designations may not actually reflect the current water quality of these streams. At present, there is no way to be certain how fluctuations in water quality will impact the continuation of this species. With the support of such organizations as the Pennsylvania Natural Diversity Inventory and Western Pennsylvania Conservancy, the EQB and DEP decided to err on the side of caution and provide the backward sedge with the utmost protection available under the special protection program. Although majority of the Commission acknowledges the ecological prudence of this approach, we are concerned by its impact on local governments and residents in the watersheds and the application of this policy approach in future stream redesignations.

Our concern with this policy is generated by the DEP Handbook itself. In its summary of the reasons for the EV designations in the Pine and Elk Creeks watersheds, DEP lists "EV Category IV.1-Waters of Substantial Ecological Significance" as the basis for the EV designation of the downstream segments of Pine and Elk Creeks. On page II-27 of the DEP Handbook, EV Category IV.1 reads: "Waters where maintenance of existing water quality is required to protect any life cycle phase of an endangered or threatened aquatic or semi-aquatic species." [Emphasis added] The policy decision for Pine and Elk Creeks contradicts a straight-forward reading of EV Category IV.1 if it is an evidentiary prerequisite for a determination that maintenance of the current water quality is necessary for the survival of an endangered species. We recommend that the EQB and DEP review this guideline, fully examine its potential impact on the Commonwealth, local governments and private sector, and set forth their intent in greater detail. Any clarification or revision to the policy should include public notice and an opportunity for public comment.

A final area of concern is the role of local government in the stream redesignation process. From the comments we have received, it appears that the DEP failed to keep the local governments informed about revisions made to its initial proposal. Although the Commonwealth is the legal guardian of Pennsylvania's water resources, the costs of the Commonwealth's water management policies often have the greatest impact on the pocketbooks of the local taxpayers, residents and businesses. There should be a recognition of this fact within the redesignation process. All of the duly elected representatives of local governments in the affected watersheds should be active partners in the stream redesignation process. A prime example of the benefits of including local governments in this process was the EV upgrade for Valley Creek in Chester and Montgomery Counties and the Valley Forge National Park. In this case, local government agencies played a crucial role in supporting the EV designation. We recommend that the DEP and EQB work towards an inclusive approach in the stream redesignation process.

Therefore, It Is Ordered That:

- 1. Regulation No. 7-284 from the Environmental Quality Board, as submitted to the Commission on March 5, 1996, is approved; and

Project Priority List and Intended Use Plan; Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund Projects

The Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority (PIIA) and the Department of Environmental Protection have prepared a combined Federal fiscal year 1996 and 1997 sewage construction Project Priority List and the fiscal year 1996 Intended Use Plan (IUP) list of municipal sewerage projects to be considered for a construction loan from funds Pennsylvania expects to receive from fiscal year 1996 Federal appropriation acts to capitalize the Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund (WPCRF) program. In addition, notice is hereby given that the Intended Use Plans for fiscal year 1990, 1993 and 1994 have been updated to utilize Federal funds.

The FY 1996/97 Project Priority List was developed in conformance with the requirements of section 216 of the Water Quality Act and Federal guidance. Accordingly, the projects included on the Project Priority List have a project priority rating under the Department's Environmental Protection Agency approved Chapter 103 project priority rating system. The act stipulates that states must maintain a Project Priority List of municipal sewerage projects from which to develop the annual IUP list of projects to be funded.

The projects to be considered for a loan from the WPCRF must meet the Federal requirements for funding in accordance with Title II and Title VI of the Water Quality Act. Accordingly, the projects included in the IUP are rated under Pennsylvania's approved project priority rating system and are expected to meet the requirements applicable to use of the WPCRF loan funds. Projects listed on the FY 1996 and the amended IUP lists are on Pennsylvania's WPCRF Project Priority List and are projects that have or are expected to proceed to construction in the near future. Other projects on the WPCRF sewage construction Project Priority List are projects that are in development or will be developed for future construction loan consideration. Any project removed from an IUP is maintained on the Project Priority List unless otherwise completed.

The FY 1996 IUP has 19 municipal sewage construction projects listed with a total dollar value of approximately \$47.2 million. The WPCRF will be capitalized with approximately \$40.5 million of Federal FY 1996 funds from the Environmental Protection Agency and approximately \$8.1 million of State funds. Some \$1.4 million will be set-aside for program administration costs. After the public hearing and assessment of the comments received, the Final FY 1996 IUP will be completed, and potentially, it may include other projects from the Project Priority List.

A project must appear on the PIIA approved IUP before it can receive a loan from the WPCRF. The IUP was developed in accordance with the ranking criteria listed in Section 10(b) of Act No. 1988-16. These ranking criteria differ somewhat from the Chapter 103 project priority rating system, as does the methodology used to evaluate projects. In addition, a project's readiness to proceed and the reasonable availability of alternative funds also have a bearing on project selection for the IUP. Consequently, the rank ordered list of projects on the Project Priority List does not dictate the order in which projects will be chosen for inclusion in the IUP.

Federal guidance and regulations on development of the Project Priority List and Intended Use Plan direct that the project lists be subject to public comment and review before being submitted to the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency.

The Department has scheduled a public hearing for 10 a.m., June 5, 1996, in the Auditorium of the Rachel Carson State Office Building, located at 400 Market Street, Harrisburg, PA. The hearing is scheduled for the purpose of receiving comments from the public regarding the combined fiscal year 1996/97 WPCRF Project Priority List and the FY 1996 IUP. Interested persons are invited to express their views on the priority rating or ranking of projects on the Project Priority List and the public hearing. Persons wishing to offer comments should contact the Administrative Services Section, Division of Municipal Planning and Finance, Bureau of Water Quality Management, 10th Floor, Rachel Carson State Office Building, P.O. Box 8466, Harrisburg, PA 17105-8466, telephone (717) 787-6744, or by Internet E-Mail (Maisano.Tony @ al.dep.state.pa.us) by 4 p.m., June 4, 1996. Where written statements are prepared and will be submitted at the hearing, speakers will be asked to restrict the oral portion of the statement to a summary of the written comments. Speakers will be called to present their comments generally in the order of receipt of the notice of intent to appear at the hearing.

It is not necessary to appear at the public hearing to present comments on the Project Priority List or the IUP list of projects. Interested persons may submit written comments to the Department at the address shown above. Such written comments will be considered equivalent to oral statements presented at the hearing. To be considered by the Department and PIIA, the written comments must be received by the Administrative Services Section on or before the date of the hearing.
