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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Pennsylvania Greenways Partnership Commission

April 7, 1999

Whereas, under Article I, Section 27 of The Pennsylvania Constitution, the people have the right to the preservation of the natural, scenic, historic and aesthetic value of the environment; and

Whereas, Pennsylvania is blessed with a scenic beauty, a rich cultural heritage, and an environment of waterways, forests, farms, natural areas and open space lands; and

Whereas, a network of greenways across the State will help to preserve environmental values and protect these natural, cultural, historic and scenic assets for future generations; and

Whereas, a network of greenways across the State will enhance outdoor recreation opportunities; provide wildlife corridors and habitat; provide intermodal transportation options; stimulate our tourism industry; contribute to environmentally sensitive growth strategies; and improve the quality of life and livability of our neighborhoods, communities and regions; and

Whereas, developing a network of greenways requires the formulation of partnerships which include government agencies, nonprofit organizations, business interests and property owners; and

Whereas, the concept of creating greenway connections through public and private partnerships was addressed at the Governor's Conference on Greenways and Trails in April 1997 and creation of a Greenways Commission was a high priority of conference attendees.

Now, Therefore, I, Thomas J. Ridge, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other laws of the Commonwealth, do hereby establish The Pennsylvania Greenways Partnership Commission (hereafter referred to as "Commission") as hereinafter set forth:

CHAPTER 5. COUNCILS AND COMMITTEES

Subchapter QQQ. PENNSYLVANIA GREENWAYS PARTNERSHIP COMMISSION

§ 5.982. Composition and appointments.

(a) The Pennsylvania Greenways Partnership Commission (Commission) consists of 22 individuals who are appointed by and serve at the pleasure of

the Governor. The membership of the Commission shall reflect a cross section of greenway interests and the geographic diversity of the Commonwealth.

(1) The Commission shall be comprised of the Secretary of the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR), the Secretary of the Department of Transportation (PennDOT), the Secretary of the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) and one representative from each of the following organizations:

- (i) The Pennsylvania Environmental Council.
- (ii) The Conservation Fund.
- (iii) The Pennsylvania Rails-to-Trails Conservancy.
- (iv) The Pennsylvania Recreation and Parks Society.
- (v) The Pennsylvania Planning Association.
- (vi) The Pennsylvania Chamber of Business and Industry.
- (vii) The Pennsylvania Land Trust Association.
- (viii) The Pennsylvania Heritage Parks Association.
- (ix) The Pennsylvania Recreational Trails Advisory Board.
- (x) The National Parks Service.

(2) The remaining nine members of the Commission will be selected from a diversity of greenway interests.

(b) The Secretary of DCNR and the Secretary of PennDOT shall serve as the Commission's chairs for 1 year, after which time, the Governor will select a chair or cochairs or extend the term of the existing cochairs.

(c) DCNR, PennDOT and DEP shall be the primary State agencies for the planning and coordination of the Commission and shall provide administrative support services.

(d) Each Commission member may designate an alternate to represent him on the Commission.

§ 5.983. Functions and scope.

The Pennsylvania Greenways Commission (Commission) will advise and assist the Secretaries of the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, Department of Transportation and Department of Environmental Protection in carrying out the following responsibilities:

(1) Developing an action plan for advancing a Pennsylvania greenways partnership program into the 21st century. This action plan will include related recommendations from the 21st Century Environment Commission.

(2) Pursuing the creation of partnership opportunities to plan, implement, maintain and fund a greenways network for this Commonwealth.

(3) Maintaining an inventory, catalog and map of the network of greenways and trails in this Commonwealth.

(4) Exploring creative financial and technical assistance programs and strategies to benefit the creation and sustainability of State and local greenway efforts.

(5) Researching and identifying "best practices" of existing greenways efforts within this Commonwealth and other states.

(6) Creating a Statewide clearinghouse system for collecting, maintaining and disseminating materials on greenways and trails legal, design and mapping information.

(7) Developing a public education, outreach and coalition building strategy (including local government) for greenways and trails.

(8) Developing strategies for incorporating greenways opportunities into Federal, State and local planning efforts dealing with issues such as land use/smart growth, open space preservation, watershed protection, natural areas protection, heritage conservation, recreation, tourism development, intermodal transportation systems and brownfields development.

(9) Coordinating existing State agency initiatives dealing with the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission, disposition of crossing structures and existing funding programs.

§ 5.984. State agency coordination.

All State agencies shall cooperate with and provide assistance as needed to the Pennsylvania Greenways Partnership Commission (Commission) in performing its mission and functions. The following State agencies shall designate a liaison to the Commission who will serve as the coordinator of greenway-related activities and primary contact for the Commission:

- (1) Department of Agriculture.
- (2) Department of Community and Economic Development.
- (3) Department of Education.
- (4) Fish and Boat Commission.
- (5) Game Commission.
- (6) Department of Health
- (7) Historical and Museum Commission.
- (8) Pennsylvania Public Utilities Commission.

[EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 1992-2]

Pennsylvania Rural Development Council

March 29, 1999

Whereas, maintaining and expanding opportunities for rural communities and their residents is of great importance to all Pennsylvanians and is vital to the Commonwealth; and

Whereas, the formation of State rural development councils has been encouraged by the Federal government in order to improve the coordination and effectiveness of Federal, State, local and other programs, services and actions affecting rural areas under Section 607(b) of the Rural Development Act of 1972 as amended by Section 759A of the Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform Act of 1996; and

Whereas, the Pennsylvania Rural Development Council was originally constituted on April 6, 1992, through the execution of a Memorandum of Understanding between the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the United States Department of Agriculture (the April 6, 1992, Memorandum of Understanding was subsequently superseded by an additional Memorandum of Understanding dated November 11, 1994); and

Whereas, the Pennsylvania Rural Development Council was constituted to serve as a neutral forum where representatives of the private and nonprofit sectors and of all government agencies—local, State and Federal—can address issues of concern to the rural areas of the Commonwealth.

Now, Therefore, I, Thomas J. Ridge, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and other laws, do hereby formally create within the Governor's Executive Offices, the Pennsylvania Rural Development Council (hereinafter referred to as the "Council") as an

advocate for rural Pennsylvanians and do hereby order and direct as follows:

CHAPTER 6. ADDITIONAL COUNCILS AND COMMITTEES

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§ 6.11. Purposes and goals.

The purposes and goals of the Pennsylvania Rural Development Council (Council) are to:

(1) Build and foster inclusive, collaborative partnerships and networks of diverse individuals and organizations to improve the coordination and effectiveness of Federal, State and other programs, services and actions affecting rural areas in this Commonwealth. To this end, the Council will serve as a liaison to Federal, State and local government agencies to ensure that programs affecting rural Pennsylvanians are effectively utilized and that benefits are available to all rural citizens.

(2) Foster expanded economic and social opportunities for this Commonwealth's rural residents. In this regard, the Council and its partners will identify opportunities for and impediments to the expansion and develop strategies for taking advantage of opportunities and overcoming impediments. The Council will develop, review and recommend policies to the Governor to promote expanded economic and social opportunities for rural Pennsylvania.

(3) Serve as a vehicle for collective advocacy on behalf of this Commonwealth's rural communities and their residents.

(4) Promote intergovernmental cooperation.

(5) Promote community-based problem-solving strategies which include the ideas, resources and expertise without regard to traditional distinctions among units, agencies or levels of government. Further, these strategies anticipate inclusion in the problem-solving process, individuals, organizations and agencies with contributions to make for the advancement of the common good.

(6) Advise the Governor, agencies, organizations and other entities on issues affecting rural communities and their residents.

(7) Serve as a resource for private and nonprofit organizations on rural issues, programs and available sources of technical and financial assistance.

§ 6.12. Composition.

(a) The Pennsylvania Rural Development Council (Council) will be governed by a Board of Directors comprised of 30 members, with six each representing the private sector, the nonprofit sector, local government agencies, State government agencies and Federal government agencies. The

Governor will consult with the Board of Directors prior to appointing an individual to serve as Executive Director of the Council. Members of the Board of Directors and the Executive Director will be appointed by and serve at the pleasure of the Governor. Members of the Board of Directors may continue to serve in their positions only so long as they are a member of the group from which they were chosen.

(b) The Executive Director will supervise and direct the staff of the Council and prepare an annual report on the Council's activities.

§ 6.13. Responsibilities.

(a) The Board of Directors is authorized to:

(1) Recommend and implement the Pennsylvania Rural Development Council's (Council's) annual budget.

(2) Adopt an annual work plan.

(3) Adopt procedures and guidelines, consistent with the Commonwealth's Management Directives and policies, as may be necessary for the effective operation of the Council.

(4) Adopt statements on issues of concern to rural Pennsylvanians.

(5) Direct the work of the Executive Director and of the Council's committees, task forces and working groups.

(6) Take other actions necessary to carry out the purposes and goals of the Council.

(b) The Board of Directors is authorized to establish subcommittees, rules and procedures for the effective implementation of its functions consistent with this subchapter and with Commonwealth policy and procedure.

(c) The Council may conduct other activities necessary to carry out its purposes and goals.

§ 6.14. Compensation.

Members of the Pennsylvania Rural Development Council do not receive compensation for their services. The members may be reimbursed for actual travel and related expenses in accordance with Commonwealth policy.

§ 6.15. Relationship with other agencies.

(a) The Pennsylvania Rural Development Council (Council) will seek to develop good working relationships with Federal and local government agencies so that the Council's mission to promote intergovernmental cooperation and coordination may be achieved to the greatest extent possible.

(b) Agencies under the Governor's jurisdiction shall fully cooperate with and provide assistance as needed by the Council in performing its functions.

Title 255—LOCAL COURT RULES

YORK COUNTY

Rule 6035, Termination of Inactive Cases; No. 99 MI 00125

Administrative Order

And Now, to wit, this 30th day of April, 1999, it is Ordered that Rule 6035 Termination of Inactive Cases suspended by Administrative Order dated June 9, 1998, is hereby rescinded and the following adopted and promulgated effective June 1, 1999 as: Rule 6035 Termination of Inactive Cases:

(a) All civil cases filed in this court, except as provided in (a) (1), (2), and (3), which shall not have been reduced to judgment or final order, and in which no action has been taken for a continuous period of two (2) years or more and which lack any docket activity for the same period of time or more, preceding the end of each calendar year, shall be terminated as herein provided, in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. 1901.

(1) In condemnation proceedings in which payment of damages into court by the condemnor has been made, the proceedings shall not be terminated for a period of six (6) years, commencing from the date of such payment;

(2) In all divorce proceedings, the cases shall not be terminated for a period of five (5) years, commencing from the date of last docket activity;

(3) All support and custody proceedings shall be governed by the provisions set forth in Rule 1915.1, et seq.

(b) On a quarterly basis throughout the calendar year, the Prothonotary shall furnish to the District Court Administrator a list of all cases which have become inactive cases as herein defined as of the close of the preceding quarter.

(c) Such list shall set forth for each such case:

(1) The docket number, and type of action;

(2) The name and address of counsel of record for each party;

(3) The name and address of each party for whom there is no counsel of record; and

(4) The date of the last action taken of record therein.

(d) The District Court Administrator shall give notice of all such cases by ordinary mail, postage prepaid, to the last address of record of counsel of record for each party; the parties for whom there is no counsel of record; the Prothonotary's office; and all opposing counsel. Service of this notice by publication will only be utilized if the attempted mailing was returned undelivered.

(e) The parties of record shall have 30 days from the date of the notice of termination to file a written objection with the Prothonotary setting forth the due diligence of prosecution during the two years of docket inactivity and all compelling reasons for the delay. The objecting party shall also serve a copy of the objection upon all opposing counsel. All other parties of record shall have 30 days to file a reply to the objection to termination, averring that prejudice has occurred and that the matter should be terminated, by serving a copy upon the Prothonotary and all parties.

(f) The matter will be disposed of as follows:

(1) If no written objection to the termination notice is filed within 30 days, the matter will be summarily dismissed in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. 1901.

(2) If an objection to termination is filed, and no reply is filed within 30 days by any party of record, the matter shall be returned to active status for a period of one year.

(3) If an objection to termination is filed, and a reply is filed by any party, the parties are directed to proceed in accordance with Local Rule 6034.

ARTICLE VII. HAZARDOUS WASTE MANAGEMENT

CHAPTER 260a. HAZARDOUS WASTE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM: GENERAL

§ 260a.30. Variances from classification as a solid waste.

The coproduct transition scheme is as follows:

* * * * *

(2) To qualify under paragraph (1), a person producing, selling, transferring, possessing or using a material as a coproduct not exempt from regulation under other provisions of this article shall submit by August 13, 1999, a written notification to the Department that the exemption in paragraph (1) applies to the person's activity.

Title 58—RECREATION

GAME COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CH. 139]

Deer Damage Areas

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission) at its April 9, 1999, meeting, adopted the following changes:

Add § 139.16 (relating to deer damage areas) which provides regulatory language for the enrollment and participation of certain landowners in the Deer Damage Areas Program as designated by the Executive Director.

This amendment is adopted under the authority of 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

1. Introduction

To more effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Commission at its January 12, 1999, meeting proposed, and at its April 9, 1999, meeting finally adopted adding § 139.16. The adopted section establishes conditions and procedures for designating deer damage areas where antlerless deer may be taken during the antlered deer season. Currently, the authorization to take an antlerless deer during the antlerless deer season on designated deer damage areas is established as part of the seasons and bag limits, § 139.4 (relating to seasons and bag limits for the license year), with no formal procedures for designating these areas. The provision, which was adopted under authority contained in section 2102 of the code (relating to regulations), would remedy this defect.

2. Purpose and Authority

Some years ago, the Commission authorized as part of the seasons and bag limits the taking of an antlerless deer during antlered deer season with the appropriate license on areas suffering severe agricultural damage. Requirements and procedures to be followed to establish deer damage areas were never promulgated as regulations. Since the program has been accepted by the agricultural and hunting communities, the current adoption remedies this situation.

Section 2102 of the code authorizes the Commission to promulgate regulations relating to seasons and bag limits and game and wildlife. This section provides the authority for the current adoption.

3. Regulatory Requirements

The adopted regulation formally establishes qualifications and procedures which have been informally followed for some time. The main requirement for land to be designated as a deer damage area is that it be enrolled in the Commission cooperative farm game program or safety zone program.

4. Persons Affected

Landowners or lessees of farmland and hunters who wish to hunt on this land would be affected by this adoption.

5. Comment and Response Summary

No written comments were received with regard to the adopted provision.

6. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

Application to be designated as a deer damage area can be made either in writing or by telephone. Signs furnished by the Commission shall be posted on lands so designated. Because of low volume, the Commission anticipates that the cost of application and signs will be fairly small.

7. Effective Dates

The adopted regulation will be effective on publication of final adoption in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until modified or rescinded by the Commission.

8. Contact Person

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

GAME COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CHS. 131 AND 135]

Field Acknowledgment of Guilt; Controlled Goose Hunting

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission) at its April 9, 1999, meeting proposed the following amendments:

Add § 131.7 (relating use of the field acknowledgment of guilt in Philadelphia County) to allow district wildlife conservation officers to accept penalties for guilty pleas with the field acknowledgment of guilt, therefore assuring that the penalties will be deposited in the Game Fund.

Amend Chapter 135, Subchapter F (relating to special wildlife management areas) to allow the administration of special wildlife management areas at Middle Creek and Pymatuning to more efficiently manage these areas as well as provide more opportunities to hunters and trappers.

These proposed amendments will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for this proposed rulemaking is 34 Pa. Code (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

These proposals were made public at the April 9, 1999, meeting of the Commission, and comments on these proposals can be sent to the Executive Director of the Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797, until May 31, 1999.

Proposed Addition of § 131.7

1. Introduction

To more effectively administer the code, the Commission at its April 9, 1999, proposed adding § 131.7. This addition was necessitated by and proposed as a result of changes to section 926 of the code (relating to acknowledgment of guilt and receipt for payment) made by the act of December 21, 1998 (P. L. 1274, No. 166) (Act 166).

2. Purpose and Authority

Act 166 added a subsection (d) to section 926 of the code which reads as follows:

(d) *Limitations of acknowledgments of guilt.* On and after June 30, 1999, acknowledgments of guilt pursuant to this section shall be used only in such counties as the commission may designate by regulation for such use. The commission shall only designate such counties for continued use of field acknowledgment as it finds to have summary offense procedures that differ from Statewide summary offense procedures.

The Commission has determined that there is only one county that currently fits that description—Philadelphia County. As a result, the Commission has proposed to designate Philadelphia County for continued use of field acknowledgments of guilt on and after June 30, 1999.

3. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed designation does not change anything from what currently exists in Philadelphia County.

4. Persons Affected

Individuals violating the code in Philadelphia County could be affected by the proposed designation.

5. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

None, over what currently exists.

6. Effective Date

This proposed change would be effective June 30, 1999, and would remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

Proposed Amendment of Chapter 135, Subchapter F

1. Introduction

To better administer the special wildlife management areas at Middle Creek and Pymatuning, the Commission at its April 9, 1999, proposed making several changes to Subchapter F. The changes include a provision for the issuance of trapping permits by drawing in addition to the current first-come issuance; provisions changing the application deadlines and drawing dates for controlled goose hunting area blinds, a reduction in the goose limit in the controlled goose hunting areas at the Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area (MCWMA); a reduction in the number of controlled duck hunting area blinds at Pymatuning Wildlife Management Area (PWMA); and a provision for a designee to set dates for drawings of permits for special rabbit and squirrel hunts. This proposal is made under the authority contained in section 721(a) of the code (relating to control of property).

2. Purpose and Authority

The administration of the special wildlife management areas at MCWMA and PWMA is a dynamic process which sometimes requires adjustments to procedures. The providing of an option for the random drawing of names of applicants for trapping permits and adjustment of timing of the random drawing of applications for goose blinds should make the processes more efficient and fairer. It has also been decided that the bag limit in the controlled goose hunting areas at MCWMA should be reduced from two to one and that the number of permits to hunt in the controlled duck hunting areas PWMA should be reduced from 185.

Finally, the Commission is proposing that the Executive Director be authorized to delegate the setting of the dates for drawing of applications for permits to participate in special rabbit and squirrel hunts in controlled hunting areas of MCWMA. These changes are being proposed under authority contained in section 721(a) of the code which requires the Commission to promulgate regulations necessary to properly manage State game lands.

3. Regulatory Requirements

For the most part, the proposals involve changes to procedures with no additional requirements. The bag limit in the controlled goose hunting areas at the MCWMA and the number of permits to hunt ducks in the controlled duck hunting area of the PWMA will be reduced.

4. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to engage in the specified activities at the PWMA and MCWMA may be affected by the proposed changes.

5. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed changes would not result in any additional cost or paperwork.

6. Effective Date

These proposed changes would be effective on final publication in the Pennsylvania Bulletin and would remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

§ 131.7. Use of the field acknowledgment of guilt in Philadelphia County.

The field acknowledgment of guilt may be used by district wildlife conservation officers to accept penalties on guilty pleas for summary violations of the act and its attendant regulations in Philadelphia County for both resident and nonresident offenders.

CHAPTER 135. LANDS AND BUILDINGS

Subchapter F. SPECIAL WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS

§ 135.102. Controlled goose and controlled duck hunting areas.

The registration for controlled goose hunting areas:

(b) Trapping.

(1) General. Trapping permits will be issued on a first-come, first-served basis or by drawing until the quota, established by the Director or a designee, has been filled.

§ 135.103. Registration for controlled goose hunting areas.

The registration for controlled goose hunting areas:

* * * * *

(2) Reservation requests on official application forms shall be submitted by mail. [An application received later than September 10 will be rejected.] An application shall contain requested information, including the applicant's current valid hunting license back tag number, including letter.

(i) Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area. Applications shall be received by the close of business on the second Tuesday in August. Applications received later than the close of business on the second Tuesday in August will be rejected.

(ii) Pymatuning Wildlife Management Area. Applications shall be received by the close of business on

the second Saturday in September. Applications received later than the close of business on the second Saturday in September will be rejected.

* * * * *

(4) Selections of mailed application forms will be made by random drawing from all eligible applications submitted. [The drawing will be held on the first Saturday following September 10 at the registration center and shall be open to the public.] The Director will establish, no later than 20 days prior to the drawing, the number of applications to be drawn.

(i) Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area. The drawing will be held on the second Wednesday in August and shall be open to the public.

(ii) Pymatuning Wildlife Management Area. The drawing will be held on the third Saturday in September and shall be open to the public.

§ 135.104. Restrictions on controlled goose hunting areas.

It is unlawful to:

* * * * *

(9) Take more than one goose per person [except at the Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area where the limit will be two as provided in § 141.26 (relating to early Canada goose hunting season on Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area)]. Duck limits shall conform with Chapter 139 (relating to seasons and bag limits) and 50 CFR Part 20 (relating to migratory bird hunting).

§ 135.106. Pymatuning Wildlife Management Area.

(b) The following apply to reservations for the controlled duck hunting area:

(1) Reservations will be made on each designated shooting day at the registration center. Hunting is limited to [100] 85 hunters at one time on the two areas combined. Reservations will be issued on a first-come, first served basis if there are [100] 85 hunters or less [making application] applying at the registration center and 1 1/2 hours prior to the opening hunting hour. If there are more than [100] 85 applicants present, a drawing shall be held to determine to whom the [100] 85 permits are issued.

Amend § 141.4 (relating to hunting hours) to allow the hunting of mourning doves the entire day during the 1999-2000 hunting season; and § 141.26 (relating to early Canada goose hunting season on Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area) to allow the controlled area at Middle Creek to be opened during both an early and regular season.

These proposed amendments will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for this proposal is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife code) (code).

*Proposed Amendment to § 141.4***1. Introduction**

To more effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Commission, at a meeting held on April 9, 1999, proposed a change to § 141.4 to expand the hunting hours for hunting mourning doves. This change was proposed under sections 322(c)(1) and 2102(a) of the code (relating to powers and duties of the Commission; and regulations).

2. Purpose and Authority

The current § 141.4(1) provides that mourning doves may be hunted from noon to sunset during the first season. It appears that mourning dove populations are sufficient to permit full hunting days during the first season. The proposed change would allow this.

Section 322(c)(1) of the code empowers the Commission to fix daily shooting or taking hours. Section 2102(a) of the code authorizes the Commission to promulgate regulations relating to the hunting of game or wildlife in this Commonwealth. The proposed change would be adopted under this authority.

3. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed change would not result in any additional regulatory requirements but rather would relax current requirements.

4. Persons Affected

Individuals wishing to hunt mourning doves would be affected by the proposed change.

*Proposed Amendment to § 141.26***1. Introduction**

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Commission at its April 9, 1999, meeting proposed changing § 141.26 to provide for goose hunting in both the early and regular seasons in the controlled area of Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area (MCWMA). This change was proposed under sections 322(c)(1) and 2102(b)(1) of the code.

2. Purpose and Authority

The Commission is required to set hunting and furtaking seasons and bag limits on an annual basis. Section 322 of the code specifically empowers the Commission to fix seasons for any species of game or wildlife. Section 2102(b) of the code mandates that the Commission promulgate regulations relating to seasons and bag limits.

Because of concerns about the migratory populations of Canada geese, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service will probably approve a very short regular Canada goose season in this Commonwealth. At the same time, the population of resident Canada geese has dramatically increased, resulting in numerous nuisance geese complaints. Authorizing goose hunting during both the regular and early seasons in the controlled goose hunting area of MCWMA should help to resolve this dilemma.

3. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed change will relax current regulatory requirements.

4. Comment and Paperwork Requirements

Persons wishing to hunt geese at MCWMA would be affected by the change.

5. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed changes will not result in any additional cost or paperwork, either to the Commission or to hunters.

6. Effective Date

The proposed changes would be effective on final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and would remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

Proposed Amendments to Chapter 135, Subchapter C

1. *Introduction*

To expand recreational opportunities for sportsmen holding disabled permits, the Commission at a meeting held on April 9, 1999, proposed to add §§ 135.49—135.56. This proposed action would be taken under the authority in section 721(a) of the code (relating to control of property).

2. *Purpose and Authority*

As a result of meetings held between representatives the Commission and representatives of disabled sportsmen, the Commission has decided to propose limited use of ATVs on designated game lands roads by holders of disabled person permits. This would expand accessibility

for disabled sportsmen and provide them with more recreational opportunities. The use of ATVs would be restricted to protect wildlife responses. Section 721(a) of the code requires the Commission to promulgate regulations necessary to properly manage State game lands.

3. *Regulatory Requirements*

This proposal would expand opportunities for hunters with disabilities.

4. *Persons Affected*

Persons holding disabled person permits would have expanded hunting opportunities. Because of limitations, it is anticipated that impact on other hunters would be minimal.

5. *Cost and Paperwork Requirements*

A towing vehicle placard would be required and issued free of charge. This would be the only additional requirement.

6. *Effective Date*

These proposed regulations would be effective on final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and would remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

CHAPTER 135. LANDS AND BUILDINGS

Subchapter C. STATE GAME LANDS

§ 135.49. Scope.

Sections 135.50—135.56 regulate the use of ATVs on State game lands by disabled persons.

§ 135.50. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this section and §§ 135.49 and 135.51—135.56, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

ATV—All-terrain vehicle—A motorized vehicle as defined in 75 Pa.C.S. § 7702(1)—(3) (relating to definitions).

Designated roads—State game land access or maintenance road that have been declared open to disabled persons using ATV's by the Director.

Permitted person—A person who qualifies for and is in possession of a permanent Disabled Person Permit to use a vehicle as a blind issued by the Commission and who possesses a valid hunting license.

Universal access symbol—A placard on which is displayed a wheelchair, generally blue and white in color that is recognized worldwide as evidence that the person who is displaying the symbol is disabled.

Towing vehicle placard—A placard provided by the Commission to permitted persons that shall be displayed on the dashboard or in a window of a vehicle.

§ 135.51. Designated roads on State game lands open to ATVs.

State game land roads that will be open for use by permitted persons operating ATVs will be designated by the Director. The Commission will make a list of these open roads available to the permittee, and will provide the list by mail to a permitted person that has applied for a towing vehicle placard.

(1) The Director, or a designee, may close State game lands or portions thereof, to recreational or other uses, when the specified uses may be or has become detrimental to those lands or the flora or fauna thereon, or where the uses conflict with legal hunting, furtaking or fishing activities or the Commission's management or administration of State game lands. The closure may be seasonal or year-round and shall remain in effect until the Director, or a designee, removes the restrictions.

(2) Designated roads shall be open for use by permitted persons from 14 days prior to the opening day of the archery season to the closing day of the late muzzleloader/archery season and during the spring turkey season.

§ 135.52. Towing vehicle placard.

(a) A permitted person may apply for a towing vehicle placard on a form provided by the Commission.

(b) The towing vehicle placard shall be displayed on the dashboard or in a window of the towing vehicle when the towing vehicle is parked on State game lands.

§ 135.53. Operation of ATVs on designated state game land roads by permitted persons.

Permitted persons may operate an ATV on designated State game land roads under the following conditions:

(1) The ATV is operated at a speed not to exceed 10 mph.

(2) A universal access symbol for the disabled, at least 3 inches by 3 inches in size is displayed in a prominent place on the ATV while on State game lands.

(3) The ATV is registered with the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources and is displaying the valid decal as required under 75 Pa.C.S. § 7712(a) and (b) (relating to registration of snowmobiles and registration and issuance of certificates of title for ATVs).

(4) The ATV is equipped with a fully functional spark arrestor while operating on State game lands.

§ 135.54. Areas of operation and passengers.

(a) A permitted person may traverse a maximum of 100 yards perpendicular from the nearest road edge to establish a hunting location but may not traverse streams, springs, wet areas or food plots or other areas posted against travel.

(b) When a permitted person is incapable of operating an ATV, the person may be accompanied by one other person who is the operator, if the ATV is designed to carry a passenger.

(c) Except as provided in subsection (b), a permitted person may not carry another person as a passenger on an ATV.

§ 135.55. Penalties.

A person who violates this subchapter shall be subject to the penalties as provided in the act.

STATE BOARD EXAMINERS OF NURSING HOME ADMINISTRATORS

[49 PA. CODE CH. 39]

Fees

The State Board of Examiners of Nursing Home Administrators (Board) proposes to amend § 39.72 (relating to fees) by revising certain fees to read as set forth in Annex A.

A. Effective Date

The proposed amendment would be effective upon publication of the final-form regulation in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. Statutory Authority

The proposed amendment is authorized under section 7.1(a) of the Nursing Home Administrators License Act (act) (63 P. S. § 1107.1(a)).

C. Background and Purpose

Section 7.1(a) of the act requires the Board to set fees by regulation so that revenues meet or exceed expenditures over a biennial period. General operating expenses of the Board are funded through biennial license renewal fees. Expenses related to applications or services which are provided directly to applicants are excluded from general operating revenues and are funded through fees in which the cost of providing a service forms the basis for the fee.

In a recent systems audit of the operations of the Board within the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, the fees for services to licensees and applicants were analyzed to determine if the fees reflected the actual cost of providing the services. Actual costs are based upon the following formula:

The analysis determined that current fees do not accurately reflect the actual cost of processing license applications, or the cost of the National Association of Examiners of Long Term Care Administrators (N.A.B.) examination or the complete licensing examination. Current fees do not reflect the actual costs of issuing temporary permits, certification of examination scores, verification of licensure, verification of temporary permits, continuing education provider applications and continuing education individual program applications. Fees for temporary permits, certification of examination scores, verification of licensure, continuing education provider

applications and continuing education program applications have not been revised since July 23, 1988. While the fee for license applications has not been revised since December 22, 1990, fees for the N.A.B. examination and the complete licensing examination were last revised on January 27, 1996. The Board fee for verification of temporary permits is a new fee. The fee charged to continuing education providers exceeded the actual cost of the service provided, but all other fees fell short of the cost to provide the service.

In this proposal, fees for the services identified would be adjusted to allocate costs to those who use the service or application. The Board would continue to apportion the enforcement and operating costs to the general licensing population when the Board makes its biennial reconciliation of revenues and expenditures.

D. Compliance with Executive Order 1996-1

In accordance with Executive Order 1996-1 (February 6, 1996), in drafting and promulgating the proposed amendment, the Board considered the least restrictive alternative to regulate costs for services requested by licensees and applicants.

E. Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed amendment will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fees will have a modest fiscal impact on those members of the private sector who apply for services from the Board. The proposed amendment will impose no additional paperwork requirements upon the Commonwealth, political subdivisions or the private sector.

F. Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the cost effectiveness of its regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

G. Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on April 30, 1999, the Board submitted a copy of this proposal to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and the Chairpersons of the House Professional Licensure Committee and the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee (Committees). In addition to submitting the proposal, the Board has provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a detailed regulatory analysis form prepared by the Board in compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, "Regulatory Review and Promulgation." A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, if IRRC has objections to any portion of the proposal, it will notify the Board within 10 days of the close of the committees' review period. The notification shall specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met by that portion. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the

regulation, by the Board, the General Assembly and the Governor, of objections raised.

H. Public Comment

Referendum on Creation of the Pennsylvania Christmas Tree Marketing and Research Program

The Pennsylvania Christmas Tree Marketing and Research Program Referendum is being conducted under the provisions of the Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act (act). The act empowers the Secretary of Agriculture to conduct a referendum to establish a marketing program if the Secretary finds that the program will tend to effectuate the purposes of the act.

Referendum Period: The referendum period shall be June 1, 1999, until 4 p.m. on June 15, 1999. Completed ballots shall be mailed or hand delivered to the Office of the Secretary of Agriculture, Room 211, 2301 North Cameron Street, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9408. Hand delivered ballots must be received by 4 p.m. on June 15, 1999. Ballots that are mailed must be postmarked no later than June 15, 1999, and received no later than June 21, 1999.

Notice of Referendum: This referendum order and an official ballot shall be mailed no later than June 1, 1999 to all affected producers whose names appear on the list of Pennsylvania Christmas tree producers maintained in the Office of the Secretary of Agriculture. Additional copies of the same materials shall be made available at the Office of the Secretary of Agriculture.

Eligible Voters: The rules governing the eligibility of a producer for voting are as follows: The record date for

determination of whether a producer is eligible to vote is December 31, 1998. All Christmas tree producers with 10 or more acres of Christmas trees who cut and sell trees during the marketing season of October 1 through December 31 of any year, as of December 31, 1998, are entitled to vote.

Counting of Ballots: The ballots will be canvassed and counted by a Teller Committee appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture. The counting of the ballots will begin at 10 a.m., June 22, 1999, in the State Agriculture Building, Harrisburg, PA. The Secretary will announce the results of the referendum within 30 days following the completion of the referendum period. The results will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and disseminated to the news media.

Reporting Irregularities: Any irregularities or disputes concerning the referendum procedures must be reported in written form to the Secretary of Agriculture not later than 7 calendar days from the end of the referendum period.

Publication: This referendum order shall be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and the *Harrisburg Patriot-News*.

Effective Date: The foregoing order shall be effective from and after the 26th day of March, 1999.

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302, 303, 304 and 305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the background standard, Statewide health standard, the site-specific standard, or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area, must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, or a combination of the cleanup standards, or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified as proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved, and comments, should be directed to the remediator of the site.

8. J&L Specialty Steel shall submit a yearly report to this office which demonstrates compliance with the emission limits in Condition Nos. 4 and 5, above. This report shall include, but is not limited to, the following information:

- The total amount of 300 series steel processed in the DRAPL for the year.
- The total amount of steel processed in the DRAPL for the year.
- The amount of natural gas used in the annealing furnace when running 300 series steel.
- The total amount of natural gas used in the annealing furnace for the year.
- Calculations of the actual emissions for each source for the year.
- Annual natural gas usage for the process boiler.

9. Visible emissions into the outdoor atmosphere from each source in the DRAPL shall not equal or exceed 10% opacity for a period or periods aggregating more than 3 minutes in any hour.

10. The applicant shall perform stack testing no later than 180 days after startup of the DRAPL to determine compliance with the emission limits in Condition No. 7.

11. Stack tests shall be conducted at maximum capacity under a worst case emissions scenario.

13. J&L Specialty Steel shall perform annual stack tests on the Annealing Furnace and the Pickle Line to determine the emission rate of NOx as NO₂.

14. All stack testing shall be performed in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapter 139 regulations and the Department's Source Testing Manual.

15. Two copies of a pretest protocol shall be submitted to the Department for review at least 60 days prior to the performance of the stack test.

16. The Department shall be notified at least 2 weeks prior to the stack test of the date and time of the test so that an observer may be present.

17. Two copies of the stack test results shall be supplied to the Department for review within 60 days of completion of the testing.

18. Stack test data shall be submitted to this office within 30 days of obtaining the data.

19. Emission limits set forth above may be revised based on the results of the required stack testing.

We have reviewed this proposed regulation from the State Board of Pharmacy (Board) and submit for consideration the following objections and recommendations. Subsections 5.1(h) and 5.1(i) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) specify the criteria the Commission must employ to determine whether a regulation is in the public interest. In applying these criteria, our Comments address issues that relate to fiscal impact, consistency and clarity. We recommend that these Comments be carefully considered as you prepare the final-form regulation.

1. Section 27.91. Schedule of fees.—Fiscal Impact, Consistency and Clarity

Administrative overhead costs

In the proposed regulation's fee report forms, there are significant differences in the costs covered by different fees except for "Administrative Overhead" costs. We met and discussed this situation with staff from the Department of State and its Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (BPOA). They indicated that each fee's overhead cost is calculated by dividing total overhead costs by the number of active licensees. On the other hand, the staff costs are based on the actual time BPOA staff spends performing the tasks covered by each fee.

Although their methodology is reasonable, there is no indication that the fees will recover the actual "overhead" costs. This is because there is no relationship to the service covered by the fees and because the costs are based on past expenditures rather than on projected expenditures. Hence, there is no certainty that the fees'

projected revenues "will meet or exceed projected expenditures" under section 8.2(a) of the Pharmacy Act (63 P. S. § 390-8.2(a)).

We question the use of a constant overhead cost that is unrelated to the actual costs of activities covered by different fees. Even though this process was used for other fees, why should BPOA maintain this approach? The Board and BPOA should thoroughly examine its cost allocation methodology for overhead expenses and itemize the overhead costs to be recouped by these fees.

Board duties for certification and verification

The House Professional Licensure Committee requested additional information from the Board in two areas. First, it questioned the Board's role in the certification of scores and intern hours. In addition, it noted that the description of Board staff functions in the fee report forms for certification and verification fees were the same. However, there was a significant difference in the staff time and costs for these fees. Staff time for certification equaled 45 minutes at a cost of \$15.23. Staff time for verification was 4.8 minutes at a cost of \$1.62.

Why does the Board certify scores? How much work is required to provide the services covered by these three fees? The Board should explain in detail the answers to these questions when it submits the final-form version of this regulation.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 34—LABOR AND INDUSTRY

DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND INDUSTRY

[34 PA. CODE CH. 121]

Workers' Compensation Special Funds Assessments

The Department of Labor and Industry (Department), Bureau of Workers' Compensation (Bureau), by this order, adopts the following amendments to clarify and provide detailed guidance for the uniform application of section 2218 of the act of November 26, 1997 (P. L. 530, No. 57) (71 P. S. § 578) (Act 57), as it affects the Pennsylvania Workers' Compensation Act (act) (77 P. S. §§ 1—2626). The Department, by this order, amends §§ 121.1, 121.22 and 121.23 (relating to general; subsequent injury fund; and supersedeas fund) insofar as they address assessments for the Subsequent Injury and Supersedeas Funds. In addition, the Department amends Chapter 121 by adding sections designed to implement section 2218 of Act 57 and refining existing procedures for assessment collection and calculation. These amendments are contemplated and designed to both implement the provisions of section 2218 of Act 57 and clarify existing procedures relating to the calculation and collection of assessments for the Subsequent Injury, Supersedeas and Workmen's Compensation Administration Funds (special funds), as well as the assessment authorized under section 1303 of the act (77 P. S. § 1041.3) for the purpose of funding the operation of the Office of Small Business Advocate.

Statutory Authority

These amendments are adopted under the authority of section 2218 of Act 57 which provides: "[T]he assessments for the maintenance of the Subsequent Injury Fund, the Workmen's Compensation Supersedeas Fund and the Workmen's Compensation Administration Fund under sections 306.2, 443 and 446 of the act . . . shall no longer be imposed on insurers but shall be imposed, collected and remitted through insurers in accordance with regulations promulgated by the Department of Labor and Industry." These amendments are adopted under the additional authority of sections 401.1 and 435 of the act (77 P. S. §§ 710 and 991), which provide that the Department will adopt regulations which are necessary or desirable for the explanation and enforcement of the act and which are reasonably calculated to provide interested parties with their rights and obligations under the act.

Background

On November 26, 1997, Governor Tom Ridge signed into law Act 57, which amended sections 306.2, 443 and 446 of the act (77 P. S. §§ 517, 999 and 1000.2). The amendment is designed to allow the imposition, collection and remittance of assessments "through" insurers on behalf of employers, rather than the imposition of assessments "on" insurers.

In an effort to streamline the assessment and collection procedures, the Department proposed amendments which were designed to fulfill the Legislative directive that this change shall be effected "in accordance with regulations promulgated by the Department of Labor and Industry." These proposed amendments were also designed to fur-

ther clarify and amend existing sections of Chapter 121 (relating to general provisions) and add new sections to implement section 2218 of Act 57.

These amendments were published at 28 Pa.B. 4603 (September 5, 1998) in a notice of proposed rulemaking. The Department invited all interested parties to provide written comments to the Department regarding the proposed rulemaking. In response, the Department received comments from Timothy L. Wisecarver and Dale W. Broadwater of the Pennsylvania Compensation Rating Bureau (PCRB) and Coal Mine Compensation Rating Bureau (CMCRB) respectively; Samuel R. Marshall, of the Insurance Federation of Pennsylvania; and Keith T. Bateman, of the Alliance of American Insurers. The Department also received written comments from the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) by letter dated November 5, 1998.

This notice of final rulemaking supplants and further clarifies and expands upon the previous interpretation of Act 57 provided in the notice of proposed rulemaking. In response to comments received, some changes have been made to the previously published proposed rulemaking.

Purpose

The purpose of these amendments is to implement section 2218 of Act 57 and to clarify and enforce the provisions of the act which provide for assessments for the special funds and the Office of Small Business Advocate. In addition, these amendments clarify procedures relating to the operation of the special funds.

Affected Persons

Those affected by these amendments are private and public sector employers in this Commonwealth, workers compensation insurance carriers, self-insured employers and injured workers.

Fiscal Impact

There is no significant fiscal impact associated with these amendments. These amendments only require modifications to existing forms and do not result in any significant costs to the Commonwealth. Similarly, these amendments have been written to prevent any significant costs to the regulated community associated with their implementation.

Response to Comments

The following addresses the concerns found in the comments received from the public and IRRC.

(1) The PCRB, CMCRB and IRRC suggested that the term "earned premium," as defined in § 121.1(b), be refined to exclude coverages which do not relate to the operations of the special funds. The Department agrees. Accordingly, the definition of "earned premium" in § 121.1(b) has been changed to reflect that premium amounts earned on certain types of coverages may not be taken into account in calculating assessments.

(2) The PCRB and CMCRB noted that Special Schedule W, on which earned premium is reported, is filed not only by individual insurance carriers, but by groups of affiliated insurance carriers, and that the regulations, as proposed, might not permit this practice. This result was not intended by the Department, and, in fact, the Bureau currently classifies assessment accounts by affiliated in-

surer groups. Therefore, the definition of "insurance carrier" in § 121.1(b) has been amended to expressly include groups of affiliated insurance carriers.

(3) The PCRB and CMCRB noted that in some instances, an insurance carrier may report an amount of earned premium that is less than zero. The commentators acknowledge that a formula incorporating negative values would be administratively burdensome and suggest that any negative earned premium amounts be entered into the appropriate formulas as zero. The Department agrees that amounts of earned premium reported as a negative number should be entered into the appropriate assessment formula as zero. Therefore, §§ 121.22, 121.23 and 121.31 have been amended accordingly.

(4) The PCRB and CMCRB questioned the Department's use of different formulas for calculating the special funds and argued that all assessments for the special funds should be based upon the same period of time (fiscal year or calendar year) and the same type of information (amount paid / accrued or budget amount). The commentators' suggestions, however, cannot be incorporated into the rulemaking in light of the statutory basis for the assessments. The relevant statutory authority for each assessment defines the appropriate time period and informational basis for each assessment, and the Department is bound to adhere to the criteria set forth by the Legislature. As stated in the act, assessments for the Administration Fund are due on or before January 31 of each year (77 P. S. § 1000.2). Similarly, notice of assessment for the Supersedeas Fund is to be provided on or before June 30 of each year with payment due within 30 days of the notice (77 P. S. § 999). In addition, payment for the Subsequent Injury Fund assessment is made on an annual basis under section 306.2 of the act (77 P. S. § 517); this assessment was, per statute, originally issued at the end of the 1971-1972 fiscal year and is currently issued in conjunction with the annual assessment for the Supersedeas Fund (77 P. S. § 999).

(5) The PCRB and CMCRB remarked that §§ 121.22(b), 121.23(a)(3) and 121.31(c) are confusing in that they appear to require that each insurance carrier collect an exact amount from all of its insured employers. Of course, lapses in policies and variations among insurance carriers business practices make adherence to an exact collection administratively burdensome, if not impossible. In keeping with the intent of Act 57, the Department's use of the term "collect" was designed to establish that assessments are to be imposed, collected and remitted through insurers. The Department did not intend to bind insurers to an impossible task. Therefore, the Department has incorporated the suggestions of the commentators and amended these sections to clarify that insurance carriers shall remit assessment amounts to the Department according to the appropriate formulas. The Department believes that §§ 121.22(d), 121.23(c), 121.31(d) and 121.33(b)(3) sufficiently establish that assessments shall be imposed, collected and remitted through insurers.

(6) The PCRB, CMCRB and IRRC noted that § 121.34(a) concerning objections to assessments is somewhat redundant and confusing in light of § 121.34(e). Section 121.34(a) provides: "Objection to assessment does not relieve an insurer of its obligation to promptly pay assessment amounts imposed under the [Act]." The commentators stated that § 121.34(e) already requires that payment be made within 10 days of the objecting party's receipt of the Department's findings and notice of the amount charged against the objecting party. The Depart-

ment agrees that the section, as written, may be confusing. Therefore, the Department has deleted the language from § 121.34(a) and revised § 121.34(e) to reflect that payment must be made within 10 days after receipt of the Department's findings and, in accordance with sections 443 and 446 of the act before the commencement of any action to recover amounts paid pursuant to those findings.

(7) IRRC suggested that use of the term "accumulated" in §§ 121.22(a)(2)(ii), 123.23(a)(2) and 121.31(b) is confusing. The Department agrees with IRRC's suggestion that "accumulated" be replaced with "calculated" and has made changes to reflect IRRC's comments.

(8) IRRC commented that §§ 121.22(e), 121.23(d) and 121.31(f) are unclear in their attempt to establish that self-insured employers and runoff self-insurers must pay assessments directly to the Department. The Department agrees that a clarification is in order and thus adopts the language suggested by IRRC.

(9) IRRC commented that § 121.23(e), relating to the Supersedeas Fund, is unclear in its attempt to establish that all applications will be reviewed administratively to determine whether judicial resolution is necessary. The regulation has been revised to address IRRC's concerns.

(10) The Alliance of American Insurers expressed concern that the amendments do not adequately protect insurers from taxes which they may be required to pay in other states. In response, the Department maintains that these amendments were crafted within the limited framework of the act and Act 57. Similarly, the Department has adopted these regulations to fulfill the legislative directive of Act 57. Therefore, it is the Department's belief that it has adequately responded to the needs of the regulated community in proposing and adopting these amendments.

Reporting, Recordkeeping and Paperwork Requirements

The amendments do not require the creation of any new forms, and required few modifications to existing forms. All data which is required by the regulations is currently maintained by the Insurance Department and the approved compensation rating organizations. Therefore, the regulations do not impose any additional reporting, recording or paperwork requirements on either the Commonwealth or the regulated community.

Sunset Date

No sunset date is necessary for these amendments. These regulations will be continuously monitored, because the Department regularly issues the assessments regulated by these regulations. Issues regarding the regulations' effectiveness, clarity or impartiality can be easily addressed through the specified objection procedures and communications between employers, insurers and the Department. If needed, corrections can be made based on information received in those proceedings and communications.

Effective Date

These amendments will be effective on publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will apply to all assessments issued on or after July 1, 1998.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. 745.5(a)), on September 5, 1998, the Department submitted copies of the proposed rulemaking, published at 28 Pa.B. 4603, to IRRC and to the Chairpersons of the House Labor Relations Committee and the Senate Labor

and Industry Committee (Standing Committees) for review and comment. IRRRC and the Standing Committees were provided with copies of the comments received during the public comment period.

In preparing these final-form regulations, the Department has considered all comments received from IRRRC, stakeholders and the public.

These final-form regulations were deemed approved by the House and Senate Committees on April 5, 1999. IRRRC met on April 8, 1999, and approved the amendments in accordance with section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(e)).

Findings

The Department finds that:

(1) Public notice of intention to amend the administrative regulations amended by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) The amendment of the regulations of the Department in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for the administration and enforcement of the authorizing statute.

Order

The Department, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Department, 34 Pa. Code Chapter 121, are amended by adding §§ 121.31—121.35 and by amending §§ 121.1, 121.22 and 121.23 to read as set forth in Annex A.

(b) The Secretary shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of General Counsel and Office of Attorney General for approval as to form and legality as required by law.

(c) The Secretary shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) This order shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will apply to all assessments issued on or after July 1, 1998.

**TITLE 34. LABOR AND INDUSTRY
PART VIII. BUREAU OF WORKERS'
COMPENSATION**

CHAPTER 121. GENERAL PROVISIONS

§ 121.1. General.

(a) *Purpose.* This chapter has been promulgated in response to the legislative mandate in the act and

designed to further the lawful, efficient and speedy administration of the act. The term "employer" as used in this chapter means, when applicable, the insurer thereof and a self-insured employer.

(b) *Definitions.* The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Act—The Pennsylvania Workers' Compensation Act (77 P. S. §§ 1—2626).

Approved rating organization—One or more organizations situated within this Commonwealth, subject to supervision and to examination by the Insurance Commissioner and approved by the Insurance Commissioner as adequately equipped to perform the functions specified in Chapter 7B of the act (77 P. S. §§ 1035.1—1035.22), on an equitable and impartial basis.

Bureau—The Bureau of Workers' Compensation.

Department—The Department of Labor and Industry.

Earned premium—A direct premium earned as required to be reported to the Insurance Department on Special Schedule "W," under section 655 of The Insurance Company Law of 1921 (40 P. S. § 815). For the purposes of this chapter, direct premium earned may not include:

(i) The effects of premium credits granted under deductible elections by insured employer.

(ii) Premiums not attributable to coverage under the act or The Pennsylvania Occupational Disease Act (77 P. S. §§ 1201—1603).

(iii) Premiums attributable to excess policies written for specified retentions on self-insured employers.

Insurance carrier—An entity or group of affiliated entities subject to The Insurance Company Law of 1921 (40 P. S. §§ 341—477d), including the State Workers' Insurance Fund, but not including self-insured employers or runoff self-insurers, with which an employer has insured its liability under section 305 of the act (77 P. S. § 501).

Insured employer—An employer which has chosen to insure its workers' compensation liabilities through a workers compensation insurance carrier licensed to do so in this Commonwealth. The term "employer" when used in this context does not include the insurer thereof.

Insurer—A workers' compensation insurance carrier which is licensed to insure workers' compensation liabilities in this Commonwealth and acts in this capacity on behalf of insured employers. The term includes a self-insured employer and a runoff self-insurer.

Runoff self-insurer—An employer that had been a self-insurer but no longer maintains a current permit to self-insure under section 305 of the act.

Self-insured employer—An employer which has been granted the privilege to self-insure its liability under the act. The term includes a parent company or affiliate which has assumed a subsidiary's or an affiliate's liability upon the termination of the parent-subsidiary or affiliate relationship, and a runoff self-insurer.

Special funds—Funds maintained under sections 306.2, 443 and 446 of the act (77 P. S. §§ 517, 999 and 1000.2).

§ 121.22. Subsequent injury fund.

(a) Compensation for a subsequent injury, as defined in section 306.1 of the act (77 P. S. § 516) shall be paid as follows:

(1) The employer is responsible for payments due for specific loss under section 306(c) of the act (77 P. S. § 513).

(2) Upon expiration of the specific loss period, the Department will be responsible for additional compensation due for the duration of total disability. The fund established under section 306.2 of the act (77 P. S. § 517), from which these payments are to be made, shall be maintained as follows:

(i) Self-insured employers shall pay assessments in amounts determined by the following:

$$\frac{\text{Amount of Compensation Paid by a Self-insured Employer During the Preceding Calendar Year}}{\text{Total Amount of Compensation Paid by All Insurers During the Preceding Calendar Year}} \times \text{The Amount Expended from the Subsequent Injury Fund during the Preceding Calendar Year}$$

(ii) The amount expended from the Subsequent Injury Fund during the preceding calendar year, minus the total amount owed by all self-insured employers, as calculated under subparagraph (i), shall equal the aggregate amount to be collected by insurance carriers.

(b) Insurance carriers shall remit to the Department assessment amounts as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Amount of Earned Premium as Reported to the Insurance Department, by an Insurance Carrier, for the Preceding Calendar Year}}{\text{Total Amount of Earned Premium Reported to the Insurance Department by all Insurance Carriers for the Preceding Calendar Year}} \times \text{Aggregate Amount to be Collected by Insurance Carriers}$$

(c) If the amount of earned premium as reported to the Insurance Department, by an insurance carrier, for the preceding calendar year is less than zero, the Department will calculate the assessment amount as though an earned premium amount of zero were reported to the Insurance Department.

(d) Insured employers shall remit assessment amounts through their insurance carriers, according to procedures defined by the approved rating organization and approved by the Insurance Commissioner.

(e) Self-insured employers and runoff self-insurers shall pay assessments directly to the Department.

(f) The claimant shall file a petition for additional compensation as provided in section 315 of the act (77 P. S. § 602) or the claim will be forever barred.

§ 121.23. Supersedeas fund.

(a) Annual assessments under section 443 of the act (77 P. S. § 999) shall be in amounts determined by the following:

(1) Self-insured employers shall pay assessments in amounts determined by the following:

$$\frac{\text{Amount of Compensation Paid by a Self-insured Employer During the Preceding Calendar Year}}{\text{Total Amount of Compensation Paid by All Insurers During the Preceding Calendar Year}} \times \text{The Amount of Supersedeas Payments Made or Accrued as Payable during the Preceding Calendar Year}$$

(2) The amount of supersedeas payments made or accrued as payable during the preceding year, minus the total amount owed by all self-insured employers, as calculated under paragraph (1), shall equal the aggregate amount to be collected by insurance carriers.

(3) Insurance carriers shall remit to the Department assessment amounts as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Amount of Earned Premium as Reported to the Insurance Department, by an Insurance Carrier, for the Preceding Calendar Year}}{\text{Total Amount of Earned Premium Reported to the Insurance Department by all Insurance Carriers for the Preceding Calendar Year}} \times \text{Aggregate Amount to be Collected by Insurance Carriers}$$

(b) If the amount of earned premium as reported to the Insurance Department, by an insurance carrier, for the preceding calendar year is less than zero, the Department will calculate the assessment amount as though an earned premium amount of zero were reported to the Insurance Department.

(c) Insured employers shall remit assessment amounts through their insurance carriers, according to procedures defined by the approved rating organization and approved by the Insurance Commissioner.

(d) Self-insured employers and runoff self-insurers shall pay assessments directly to the Department.

(e) Applications for reimbursement shall be filed directly with the Bureau on Form LIBC-662, "Application for Supersedeas Fund Reimbursement." Applications will be processed administratively to determine whether the parties can agree on the payment or amount of reimbursement. If the payment or amount of reimbursement cannot be agreed upon, the matter will be assigned to a Workers' Compensation Judge for a formal hearing and adjudication.

§ 121.31. Workmen's Compensation Administration Fund.

(a) Annual assessments on self-insured employers, under section 446(b) of the act (77 P. S. § 1000.2(b)), shall be in amounts determined by the following:

$$\frac{\text{Amount of Compensation Paid by a Self-insured Employer during the Preceding Calendar Year}}{\text{Total Amount of Compensation Paid by All Insurers During the Preceding Calendar Year}} \times \text{The Approved Budget of the Workmen's Compensation Administration Fund for the Current Fiscal Year}$$

(b) The approved budget of the Workmen's Compensation Administration Fund for the current fiscal year,

minus the total amount owed by all self-insured employers, as calculated under subsection (a), shall equal the aggregate amount to be collected by insurance carriers.

(c) Insurance carriers shall remit to the Department assessment amounts as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Amount of Earned Premium as Reported to the Insurance Department, by an Insurance Carrier, for the Preceding Calendar Year}}{\text{Total Amount of Earned Premium Reported to the Insurance Department by all Insurance Carriers for the Preceding Calendar Year}} \times \text{Aggregate Amount to be Collected by Insurance Carriers}$$

(d) If the amount of earned premium as reported to the Insurance Department, by an insurance carrier, for the preceding calendar year is less than zero, the Department will calculate the assessment amount as though an earned premium amount of zero were reported to the Insurance Department.

(e) Insured employers shall remit assessment amounts through their insurance carriers, according to procedures defined by the approved rating organization and approved by the Insurance Commissioner.

(f) Self-insured employers and runoff self-insurers shall pay assessments directly to the Department.

§ 121.32. Office of Small Business Advocate.

(a) The Department may collect annual assessments imposed on insurance carriers, but not on self-insured employers or runoff self-insurers, for the purpose of funding the Office of Small Business Advocate in accordance with section 1303 of the act (77 P. S. § 1041.3). Insurance carriers shall be directly liable to the Department for prompt payment of assessments for the Office of Small Business Advocate, as provided in the act and this chapter.

(b) Annual assessments under section 1303 of the act shall be in amounts as determined by the following formula:

$$\frac{\text{Amount of Compensation Paid by an Insurance Carrier, but not a Self-insured Employer or Runoff Self-insurer, During the Preceding Calendar Year}}{\text{Total Amount of Compensation Paid by All Insurance Carriers, but not Self-insured Employers or Runoff Self-insurers, During the Preceding Calendar Year}} \times \text{The Approved Budget of the Office of Small Business Advocate for the Current Fiscal Year}$$

§ 121.33. Collection of special funds assessments.

(a) The Department will collect assessments for the special funds by calculating the total amount of the following:

(1) What each self-insured employer is liable for paying to the Department.

(2) What each insurance carrier is responsible for collecting from insured employers and remitting to the Department.

(b) Assessments for the special funds shall be imposed, collected and remitted as follows:

(1) The Department will transmit to each insurance carrier and self-insured employer a notice of assessment amount to be collected, which shall specify the amount calculated under subsection (a) and the date on which the amount is due.

(2) Each self-insured employer shall timely remit to the Department the amount calculated under subsection (a)(1).

(3) Each insurance carrier shall collect payment for assessments from insured employers according to the procedures defined by the approved rating organization and approved by the Insurance Commissioner and timely remit payment to the Department.

(4) The failure of any insurance carrier to receive payment from an insured employer does not limit an insurance carrier's responsibility to collect and timely remit to the Department the total amount calculated under subsection (a)(2).

§ 121.34. Objections to assessments.

(a) A party receiving a notice of assessment amount to be collected from the Department may, within 15 days of receipt, object to the assessment reflected in the notice on the basis that it is excessive, erroneous, unlawful or invalid. Insured employers retain all rights provided under section 717 of the act (77 P. S. § 1035.17).

(b) Objections shall be set forth in numbered paragraphs, shall specifically state the facts necessary to determine the validity of the challenged assessment or assessment amount and shall be accompanied by a supporting memorandum documenting the legal grounds for the objections.

(c) An objection to assessment or assessment amount shall be accompanied by a proof of service as specified in 1 Pa. Code § 33.35 (relating to proof of service) and a notice of appearance as specified in 1 Pa. Code § 31.24 (relating to notice of appearance), and shall be served on all interested parties as specified in 1 Pa. Code § 33.32 (relating to service by a participant).

(d) An objection not conforming to this section or the act will be rejected by the Department. The Department will notify the objecting party of the specific reasons for the rejection. The objecting party shall have 30 days to cure any deficiency.

(e) Upon receipt of an objection which conforms to this section and the act, the Department will hold a hearing in accordance with 1 Pa. Code Part II (relating to the general rules of administrative practice and procedure). After the hearing, the Department will record its findings on any objections and will transmit to the objector, by registered or certified mail, notice of the amount, if any, charged against it in accordance with the findings. The amount shall be paid by the objector within 10 days after receipt of the findings. After payment has been made, the objector may initiate an action in the appropriate court to recover the payment of the assessment or any portion thereof. No insurer may maintain an action to recover payment unless it has previously objected under subsection (a).

§ 121.35. Annual reports of compensation paid.

Every annual report of compensation paid made by an insurer under sections 445 and 446(e) of the act (77 P. S. §§ 1000.1 and 1000.2(e)) shall include amounts paid by an insurer for which policyholders have agreed to reim-

burse the insurer under deductible policies issued under section 448 of the act (77 P. S. § 1000.4).
