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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

There are no restrictions on the republication of official documents appearing in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted

proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Effective Dates of Statutes

The effective dates specified above for laws and appropriation acts were contained in the applicable law or appropriation act. Where no date is specified or where the effective date specified is prior to the date of enactment, the effective date is 60 days after final enactment except for statutes making appropriations or affecting budgets of political subdivisions. See 1 Pa.C.S. §§ 1701—1704 (relating to effective dates of statutes).

Advance Copies of Statutes

Section 1106 of Title 1 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes provides that the prothonotaries of each county shall file advance copies of statutes in their offices for public inspection until the Laws of Pennsylvania are generally available. Section 2406(h) of The Administrative Code of 1929 provides that the Department of General Services shall distribute advance sheets of the Laws of Pennsylvania to each law judge of the courts, to every county and public library of this Commonwealth, and to each member of the General Assembly. These copies shall be furnished without charge. The Department shall also mail one copy of each law enacted during any legislative session to any person who pays to it the sum of \$20.

Title 231—RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE

PART I. GENERAL [231 PA. CODE CH. 1900]

Proposed Amendments to the Rules Relating to Protection From Abuse; Recommendation 42

The Domestic Relations Committee proposes the following amendments to the Rules of Civil Procedure relating to Protection From Abuse. The committee solicits comments and suggestions from all interested persons prior to submission of the proposed rule to the Supreme Court.

The explanatory comment which appears in connection with the proposed amendments has been inserted by the Committee for the convenience of those using the rules. It will not constitute part of the rules nor will it be officially adopted or promulgated by the Court.

Annex A

TITLE 231. RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 1900. ACTIONS PURSUANT TO THE PROTECTION FROM ABUSE ACT

Rule 1901. Definitions.

As used in this chapter:

Act—The Protection From Abuse Act No. 206 approved December 19, 1990, 23 Pa.C.S. § 6101 et seq.;

Action—A proceeding for protection from abuses defined in **[Section 2] § 6102** of the Act;

Court—The court of common pleas.

Emergency Order—An order entered by a hearing officer, who is a person meeting the definition set forth at 23 Pa.C.S. § 6102.

Protection From Abuse Examiner—An attorney appointed by the court to hear protection from abuse matters as provided by these rules.

Temporary Order—An order entered by the court pursuant to 23 Pa.C.S. § 6107.

Rule 1901.1. Venue.

- (a) Except as provided in subdivision (b), an action for protection from abuse may be brought in a county in which
- (1) the plaintiff resides, either temporarily or permanently, or is employed, or
 - (2) the defendant may be served, or
 - (3) the abuse occurred.
- (b) If the relief sought includes possession of the residence or household to the exclusion of the defendant, the action shall be brought only in the county in which the residence or household is located.

Rule 1901.2. Scheduling.

Each judicial district shall establish and publish a schedule of times when the court will be available to hear temporary Protection From Abuse matters, with hearings to be held no less frequently than once a week.

Official Note: When the court is unavailable, emergency relief may be sought from the minor judiciary pursuant to 23 Pa.C.S. § 6110.

Rule 1902. Commencement of Action.

- (a) Except as provided in subdivision (b), an action shall be commenced by filing with the prothonotary a petition setting forth the alleged abuses by the defendant.
- (b) Filing in the office of the prothonotary of a certified order of a district justice entered pursuant to 23 Pa.C.S. § 6110 shall constitute the commencement of an action in the court of common pleas.

Official Note: See 23 Pa.C.S. § 6110 conferring emergency jurisdiction on district justices and requiring immediate certification of its order to the court. I

Rule 1901.3. Commencement of Action.

- (a) Except as provided in subdivision (b), an action shall be commenced by filing with the prothonotary or presenting to the court a petition setting forth the alleged abuses by the defendant. The petition shall be substantially in the form set forth in Rule 1905(b) and shall have as its first page the Notice of Hearing set forth in Rule 1905(a).
- (b) Only in counties where representation is provided for every petitioner seeking emergency relief, an action may be commenced by filing a certified copy of the emergency order entered pursuant to 23 Pa.C.S. § 6110.

[Rule 1903. Service of Order. Enforcement.

(a) [Rescinded].

Official Note: For service of the petition or certified order of the district justice, see Rule 1930.4.

(b) An order entered under 23 Pa.C.S. §§ 6107 and 6108 shall be served and enforced by such persons and in such manner as the court shall direct in the order.

Rule 1901.4. Service and Registration of Order.

- (a) Service of the petition and temporary order shall be in accordance with Rule 1930.4.
- (b) An Affidavit of Service substantially in the form set forth in Rule 1905(d) shall be filed with the prothonotary.
- (c) A certified copy of every protection order shall be submitted for registration to
- (1) the prothonotary of the county in which the order was entered, as well as any other county in which plaintiff believes protection may be necessary; or

(2) the statewide registry. Orders submitted to the statewide registry shall be accompanied by the supplemental information form set forth in Rule 1905(f).

Official Note: Counties will not be required to maintain registries after the statewide registry is established and is fully operational, pursuant to 23 Pa.C.S. § 6104(b).

Rule 1901.5. Enforcement.

- (a) A police officer shall arrest a defendant for violating an order issued by any court within this Commonwealth pursuant to the Act where the order is
 - (1) registered in accordance with the Act; or
- (2) can be verified by radio, telephone or similar means of communication.
- (b) A complaint for indirect criminal contempt shall be completed and signed by either the police officer or the plaintiff. Neither Plaintiff's presence nor signature shall be required.
- Rule [1904] 1901.6. No responsive pleading required.

No pleading need be filed in response to the petition or the certified order and all averments not admitted shall be deemed denied.

Official Note: For procedures as to the time and manner of hearings and issuance of orders **[ex parte or after hearing]**, see 23 Pa.C.S. § 6107. For provisions as to the scope of relief **available**, see 23 Pa.C.S. § 6108. For provisions as to contempt for violation **of an order or consent agreement**, see 23 Pa.C.S. § 6114.

Rule 1901.7. Protection from Abuse Examiners.

- (a) The court may appoint attorneys as examiners to hear petitions for temporary relief pursuant to the Act.
- (b) After hearing, the examiner shall submit a proposed order to the court, recommending that the request for a temporary order either be granted or denied, and setting forth the specific relief appropriate in that case.
- (c) If the examiner recommends that a request for a temporary order be denied, or that the petition be dismissed, reasons for that recommendation shall be provided.
- (d) The court shall issue its order forthwith, and in no case later than the day the recommendation is made by the examiner.
- (e) No exceptions shall be filed to the recommendation of an examiner.
- (f) There shall be no fees imposed on either party for costs relating to a hearing before an examiner. Rule [1905] 1901.8. Decision. [Post] No post-trial relief.
- (a) The decision of the court [shall be governed by Rule 1038(b) and (c)] may consist only of general findings but shall dispose of all claims for relief. The court's order shall be rendered substantially in the form set forth in Rule 1905(e).
- (b) No motions for post-trial relief may be filed to the final order.

Offical Note: The procedure relating to Motions for Reconsideration is set forth in Rule 1930.2.

Rule 1905. Standard forms for use in protection from abuse matters.

(a) The Notice of Hearing required by Rule 1901.3 shall be substantially in the following form:

NOTICE OF HEARING

TO: Defendant,

YOU HAVE BEEN SUED IN COURT. The Plaintiff is the person suing you. Attached to this notice is a copy of the Petition which indicates Plaintiff's reasons for suing you, and a court order.

BE ADVISED THAT THE DATE, TIME AND PLACE OF THE FINAL HEARING ON THIS PETITION ARE SET FORTH IN THE ATTACHED ORDER OF COURT.

IF YOU DO NOT APPEAR FOR THE HEARING AT THE TIME AND PLACE STATED IN THE ORDER, THE COURT CAN MAKE AN ORDER IN YOUR ABSENCE WHICH MAY LIMIT YOUR RIGHTS TO CUSTODY, MONEY OR PROPERTY, OR PREVENT YOU FROM HAVING ANY CONTACT WITH PLAINTIFF OR THE CHILDREN NAMED IN THE PETITION, FROM ENTERING PLAINTIFF'S RESIDENCE, OR FROM ENTERING THE PLAINTIFF'S OR CHILDREN'S PLACE OF EMPLOYMENT, BUSINESS OR SCHOOL, YOU MAY LOSE OTHER RIGHTS AS WELL.

A COPY OF THE ORDER IS ATTACHED; YOU MUST OBEY IT UNTIL THE HEARING. IF YOU DO NOT OBEY IT, THE POLICE WILL ARREST YOU.

YOU SHOULD TAKE THIS PAPER TO YOUR LAWYER AT ONCE. YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO HAVE AN ATTORNEY REPRESENT YOU AT THE HEARING. IF YOU DO NOT HAVE A LAWYER OR CANNOT AFFORD ONE, GO TO OR TELEPHONE THE OFFICE SET FORTH BELOW TO FIND OUT WHERE YOU CAN GET LEGAL HELP.

- 3. CUSTODY: Temporary custody of the parties' minor child(ren) is granted to and/or shall remain with Plaintiff pending the outcome of the final hearing. The police wherever the child(ren) may be located shall ensure that the child(ren) is/are placed in the care and control of Plaintiff. This provision shall not affect existing custody orders.
- 4. WEAPONS: Defendant is directed to turn over immediately to the local police department for delivery to [INSERT THE NAME OF THE PERSON OR AGENCY] any weapons used or threatened to be used by Defendant in an act of abuse against Plaintiff or the minor child(ren). Defendant is prohibited from acquiring or possessing any other weapons for the duration of this order.
- 5. SERVICE: This order may be served by any competent adult pursuant to Pennsylvania Rule of Civil Procedure 1930.4. [INSERT ADDITIONAL DIRECTIONS FOR SERVICE, IF NECESSARY].
- 6. COSTS OF FILING, SERVICE, AND CERTIFICATION: The costs of this action are waived pending the entry of the final order of court.
- 7. Plaintiff's request for temporary support and attorney's fees, if any, shall be considered by this Court at the final hearing on the Petition.

NOTICE TO LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS

The police who have jurisdiction over the Plaintiff's residence OR any location where a violation of this order occurs OR where the Defendant may be located, shall enforce this order.

If Defendant violates any provisions of this order, Defendant SHALL be arrested on the charge of Indirect Criminal Contempt. An arrest for violation of this order may be without warrant, based solely on probable cause, whether or not the violation is committed in the presence of the police.

Subsequent to an arrest, the police officer shall seize all weapons used or threatened to be used during the violation of the protection order or during prior incidents of abuse. The [INSERT THE APPROPRIATE NAME OR TITLE] shall maintain possession of the weapons until further order of this Court.

If the Defendant is placed under arrest for violation of the order, the Defendant shall be taken to [INSERT THE APPROPRIATE AUTHORITY OR AUTHORITIES BEFORE WHOM DEFENDANT IS TO BE ARRAIGNED]. Rule 124. **Time and Method of Appeal and** Stay of Execution Pending Appeal.

a. A party aggrieved by a judgment for money, or a judgment for possession of real property arising out of a nonresidential lease, may appeal therefrom within thirty (30) days after the date of the entry of the judgment by filing with the prothonotary of the Court of Common Pleas a notice of appeal together with a copy of the Municipal Court disposition sheet. The prothonotary shall not accept an appeal from an aggrieved party which is presented for filing more than thirty (30) days after the date of judgment without leave of the Court of Common Pleas and upon good cause shown.

b. A party aggrieved by a judgment for possession of real property arising out of a residential lease, may appeal therefrom within ten (10) days after the date of the entry of the judgment by filing with the prothonotary of the Court of Common Pleas a notice of appeal together with a copy of the Municipal Court disposition sheet. The prothonotary shall not accept an appeal from an aggrieved party which is presented for filing more than ten (10) days after the date of judgment without leave of the Court of Common Pleas and upon good cause shown.

[a. When a copy of a perfected appeal to the Court of Common Pleas is duly filed with the Municipal Court Administrator, execution shall not issue as to all parties and shall be stayed until said appeal is terminated without adjudication on the merits.

b. The stay of execution shall be vacated upon filing with the Municipal Court Administrator a copy of docket entries evidencing final termination of such appeal in favor of claimant without adjudication on the merits in the Philadelphia Court of Common Pleas.

- c. (1) Except as provided in subsection (c)(2), [Appeals] appeals to the Court of Common Pleas shall be governed by Rule 300 et seq. of the Philadelphia Court of Common Pleas Rules (Civil Division).
- (2) When an appeal is from a judgment on the merits for the possession of real property, receipt by the Municipal Court Administrator of a copy of the notice of appeal shall operate as a supersedeas

only if the tenant/appellant, at the time of filing the appeal, deposits with the prothonotary of the Court of Common Pleas of Philadelphia County a sum of money equal to the lesser of three (3) months' rent or the rent actually in arrears on the date of the filing of the appeal, based upon the Municipal Court judgment, and thereafter deposits cash with the prothonotary in a sum equal to the monthly rent which becomes due during the period of time the proceedings on appeal are pending in the Court of Common Pleas, such additional deposits to be made within thirty (30) days following the date of the appeal, and each successive thirty (30) day period thereafter. Upon application by the landlord/ appellee and approval by the Court of Common Pleas, the Court of Common Pleas shall release appropriate sums from the escrow account on a continuing basis while the appeal is pending to compensate the landlord/appellee for the tenant/ appellant's actual possession and use of the premises during the pendency of the appeal. In the event the appellant fails to deposit the sums of money required by this rule when such deposits are due, the prothonotary of the Court of Common Pleas, upon praecipe filed by the landlord/appellee, shall terminate the supersedeas. Notice of the termination of the supersedeas shall be forwarded via first class mail to all parties and to the Municipal Court Administrator, but if any party has an attorney of record named in filings with the court, notice shall be given to the attorney instead of to the party. Notice to a party that does not have an attorney of record is sufficient if mailed to the party's last known address of record. Where the deposit of money is made pursuant to this subsection at the time of filing the appeal, the prothono-tary of the Court of Common Pleas shall make upon the notice of appeal and its copies a notation that it will operate as a supersedeas when received by the Municipal Court Administrator. If an appeal is stricken or voluntarily terminated, any supersedeas based on it shall terminate. The prothonotary, upon order of the Court of Common Pleas, shall pay the deposits of rental to the party who sought possession of the real property.

Note

On March 28, 1996, the Pennsylvania Supreme Court promulgated amendments to the Pennsylvania District Justice Rules of Civil Procedure and instructed the Philadelphia Municipal Court to promulgate rules consistent with the amendments to the District Justice Rules. The amendments to Philadelphia Municipal Court Rule of Civil Procedure 124 are consistent with the Supreme Court's amendments within Pennsylvania District Justice Rules of Civil Procedure 1002 and 1008. In view of the Supreme Court's directive, these rules shall supersede any local rule of the Court of Common Pleas to the extent that said local rules are inconsistent with this rule.

Rule 126. Execution and Revival of Judgments: Sheriff's Interpleader.

- a. Except as provided below, execution shall not issue until the time for appeal which could be filed with the Court of Common Pleas has expired[, except that execution upon landlord-tenant judgments for writs of possession may issue within five (5) days after judgments].
- b. Subsequent to entry of judgment of possession of real property arising out of a nonresidential lease, the writ of possession may issue on or after fifteen (15) days after judgment, and the alias writ of possession may issue on or after sixteen (16) days after issuance of the writ of possession. Subsequent to entry of judgment of possession of real property arising out of a residential lease, the writ of possession may issue on or after ten (10) days after judgment, and the alias writ of possession may issue on or after eleven (11) days after issuance of the writ of possession.
- **[b.] c.** Enforcement and revival of judgments shall be in the same manner as if commenced in the Court of Common Pleas, except that authorized Landlord-Tenant Officers may serve and enforce all writs of possession and alias writs of possession.
- [c.] d. Sheriff's interpleader proceedings shall be in accordance with the Rules governing actions in the Court of Common Pleas.
- **[d.] e.** An alias writ of possession may not be issued after six (6) months from the date of the judgment for possession without leave of court.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 55—PUBLIC WELFARE

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE
[55 PA. CODE CH. 140]

Eligibility Provisions for the Healthy Horizons Program for the Elderly/Disabled

The Department of Public Welfare (Department), by this order, adopts amendments to Chapter 140 (relating to special MA eligibility provisions) to read as set forth in Annex A under the authority of sections 201(2) and 403(b) of the Public Welfare Code (62 P. S. §§ 201(2) and 403(b)) which, respectively, authorize the Department to promulgate regulations to make the Commonwealth eligible for available Federal funding in joint State and Federal welfare programs, and delegate to the Department the authority to adopt regulations setting rules and standards for eligibility for all welfare programs.

Notice of proposed rulemaking is omitted in accordance with section 204(1)(iv) of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (CDL) (45 P. S. § 1204(1)(iv)) and 1 Pa. Code § 7.4(1)(iv) because the administrative regulations relate to Commonwealth grants and benefits. Additionally, notice of proposed rulemaking is omitted for good cause as unnecessary and contrary to the public interest in accordance with section 204(3) of the CDL and 1 Pa. Code § 7.4(3).

The amendments have been implemented as mandated by Federal law (42 U.S.C.A. § 1396a(a)(10)(E)(iii)) through notices of rule change published, respectively, at 23 Pa.B. 494 (January 23, 1993), effective January 1, 1993, and 25 Pa.B. 1916 (May 13, 1995), effective January 1, 1995. No administrative discretion was permitted and the changes benefit low-income elderly and disabled persons. Public comments were solicited and none were received.

Failure to conform State regulations with Federal requirements will seriously jeopardize Federal Financial Participation (FFP) and would be contrary to the public interest. The Federal requirements are very specific, allowing for no alternative means of compliance. Therefore, the Department is required to codify the mandated changes to avoid quality control errors and allow continued receipt of Federal funds. Accordingly, the Department is formalizing the amendments found in Annex A with proposed rulemaking omitted.

Purpose

These amendments add a new benefit group with a new limited benefit to the Healthy Horizons Medical Assistance (MA) Program. Certain low-income Medicare beneficiaries, who by definition are elderly or disabled, are eligible for MA payment of the Medicare Part B premiums as a result of a separate increase in the MA income eligibility limit specifically related to this new limited benefit. These amendments also add a later, additional increase in the income eligibility limit for this new benefit group. Both of these sequential changes were mandated by section 4501 of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1990 (OBRA '90) (Pub. L. No. 101—508) (42 U.S.C.A. § 1396a(a)(10)(E)(iii)).

Background

The Sixth Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act (SOBRA) of 1986 (Pub. L. No. 99-509) contained optional provisions

which permitted states to make Medicaid available for elderly and disabled persons with income up to 100% of the Federal Poverty Income Guidelines (FPIGs) and resources which do not exceed the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) resource standard for the appropriate family size. (In Pennsylvania, Medicaid is known as Medical Assistance). Thereafter, the Medicare Catastrophic Coverage Act (MCCA) of 1988 (Pub. L. No. 100-360) mandated states to provide Medicaid payment of the Medicare Part B premiums, Medicare Part A premiums of individuals enrolled in and paying for the Part A plan, and Part A and B deductibles and coinsurances.

The Department implemented these benefits through the Healthy Horizons Special MA eligibility provisions on January 1, 1989, as a two-part special MA Program to extend the availability for medical care through MA coverage for elderly and disabled persons with income up to 100% of the FPIGs. Under Healthy Horizons, there are two separate programs, namely, the Healthy Horizons Categorically Needy Program implemented under the optional provisions of SOBRA and the Healthy Horizons Medicare Cost-Sharing Program implemented under the mandated MCCA provisions.

The extent of benefit coverage is dependent upon the amount of resources which may not exceed, respectively, either the SSI resource standard or twice the SSI resource standard. The lower resource level applies to the Healthy Horizons Categorically Needy Program which provides full categorically needy MA benefits in addition to payment of Medicare cost-sharing benefits.

The higher resource level applies to the Healthy Horizons Medicare Cost-Sharing Program which pays the Medicare Part A premium if the individual is eligible for or enrolled in Part A, the Medicare Part B premium, and the Medicare Part A and Part B deductibles and coinsurances. Persons who qualify for these Medicare cost-sharing benefits are known as Qualified Medicare Beneficiaries (QMBs) (pronounced Quimbys).

Thereafter, OBRA '90 mandated that, effective January 1, 1993, the states must provide Medicaid payment of the Medicare Part B premiums for Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiaries (SLMBs) (pronounced Slimbys). These are persons whose income is more than 100%, but does not exceed 110% of the FPIGs and whose resources are not more than twice the SSI resource standard. The payment of the Medicare Part B premium is the only benefit provided, unless the SLMB individual is also eligible for another program.

OBRA '90 also mandated that, effective January 1, 1995, states must increase the income eligibility limit for SLMB benefits to 120% of the FPIGs.

Need for the Regulations

OBRA '90 expands the income eligibility limit for a portion of Medicare cost-sharing benefits for persons who are elderly or disabled. The expansion of the allowable maximum income for eligibility for payment of the Medicare Part B premiums will result in more low-income persons who are elderly or disabled qualifying for this benefit. Payment of these premiums will give this segment of the population more income to spend on other basic needs to help improve their quality of life.

Summary of the Amendments

Section 140.201 (relating to policy on Healthy Horizons)—A new subsection (d) has been added to describe

the Department's participation in the limited Medicare Cost-Sharing Program for persons who are designated as SLMBs and are eligible for payment of the Medicare Part B premiums. Existing subsection (d) has been relettered as (e) and technical clarifying changes have been made to subsection (b).

Section 140.202 (relating to definitions)—Because of the addition of this new SLMB benefit group, the Medicare Cost-Sharing Program is now a two-tier income level eligibility program providing two separate levels of benefits. Accordingly, a definition has been added for SLMBs.

Section 140.221(1)(ii) (relating to conditions of eligibility)—A technical correction has been made to reflect the current chapter number for MA residence provisions, which have been codified separately from the cash residence provisions subsequent to the publication of the original Healthy Horizons regulations. Accordingly, the reference to Chapter 147 has been changed to Chapter 148

Section 140.231 (relating to income eligibility limitations)—This section has been revised to now have separate subsections (a) and (b) in order to reflect the new two-tier income eligibility levels for the different Medicare Cost-Sharing benefit packages under the Healthy Horizons provisions.

Section 140.301 (relating to resource eligibility limitations)—Technical, clarifying changes have been made to reflect the two-tier benefit levels of the Medicare Cost-Sharing Program.

Section 140.331 (relating to benefit coverage)—A new subsection (c) has been added in order to distinguish the Healthy Horizons SLMB Medicare Cost-Sharing Program, which provides persons who qualify as SLMBs with the sole benefit of payment of the Medicare Part B premium, from the Healthy Horizons QMB Medicare Cost-Sharing Program, which provides payment of premiums, deductibles and coinsurances for Part A and Part B. Existing subsection (c) is relettered as (d).

Section 140.332 (relating to category designation)—A new subsection (d) has been added to designate the category and program status codes by which SLMB individuals are identified.

Section 140.335 (relating to retroactive eligibility)—Subsection (b) has been revised to clarify that, unlike the QMB Medicare Cost-Sharing Program which does not have retroactive coverage, eligibility for the SLMB Medicare Cost-Sharing Program may be retroactive for up to 3 months.

Affected Persons and Organizations

These amendments will affect persons who are elderly or disabled and who are applying for or receiving MA benefits and whose income is within these new limits.

Accomplishments/Benefits

These amendments will have a positive impact on low-income elderly and disabled persons.

Fiscal Impact

Cost to the Commonwealth: The Department will pay the Medicare Part B premium for SLMBs whose income does not exceed 110% of the FPIGs, effective January 1, 1993. Effective January 1, 1995, the Healthy Horizons Cost-Sharing Program has increased to include persons whose income does not exceed 120% of the FPIGs. The fiscal impact of these provisions is estimated at \$7.617 million (\$3.482 million in State funds) during Fiscal Year 1995—1996.

Cost to the private sector: There is no additional cost to the private sector.

Paperwork Requirements

These amendments require no additional forms or reports.

Effective Date

The effective date of these amendments is retroactive to January 1, 1993, for the SLMB Medicare Cost-Sharing Program for persons whose income does not exceed 110% of the FPIGs, and retroactive to January 1, 1995, for persons whose income does not exceed 120% of the FPIGs.

Sunset Date

No sunset date is applicable. The Department continuously reviews the MA Program and regulations through the Federally monitored quality control process. The Federal Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) staff conduct audits periodically on specific aspects of the MA Program.

Regulatory Review Act

Under section 5(f) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), the Department submitted a copy of these amendments with proposed rulemaking omitted on February 21, 1996, to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the House Committee on Health and Human Services and the Senate Committee on Public Health and Welfare. On the same date, these amendments were submitted to the Office of the Attorney General for review and approval under the Commonwealth Attorneys Act (71 P. S. §§ 732-1—732-506). In accordance with section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, these amendments were approved by the Committees on March 12, 1996, and were approved by IRRC on March 21, 1996.

Findings

The Department finds that:

- (1) Public notice of intention to adopt the administrative regulations adopted by this order is omitted in accordance with section 204(1)(iv) of the CDL and 1 Pa. Code § 7.4(1)(iv) because the administrative regulations relate to Commonwealth grants and benefits. Additionally, notice of proposed rulemaking is omitted for good cause as unnecessary and contrary to the public interest in accordance with section 204(3) of the CDL and 1 Pa. Code § 7.4(3).
- (2) The adoption of the amendments in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for the administration and enforcement of the Public Welfare

Order

The Department, acting under the Public Welfare Code orders that:

- (a) The regulations of the Department, 55 Pa. Code Chapter 140, are amended by amending $\S\S$ 140.201, 140.202, 140.221, 140.231, 140.301, 140.331, 140.332 and 140.335 to read as set forth in Annex A to this order.
- (b) The Secretary of the Department shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General and the Office of General Counsel for approval as to legality and form as required by law.
- (c) The Secretary of the Department shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (d) This order shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and apply retroactively to January 1, 1993, for the SLMB Medicare Cost-Sharing Program for persons whose income does not exceed 110% of the FPIGs, and retroactively to January 1, 1995, for persons whose income does not exceed 120% of the FPIGs.

Subchapter B. ELIGIBILITY PROVISIONS FOR THE HEALTHY HORIZONS PROGRAM FOR THE ELDERLY/DISABLED

GENERAL PROVISIONS

§ 140.201. Policy on Healthy Horizons.

- (a) The Department provides MA under the Healthy Horizons Categorically Needy Program to elderly/disabled persons who are otherwise eligible with family income up to 100% of the current Federal Income Poverty Guidelines and resources not exceeding the SSI resource standard for the appropriate family size.
- (b) The Department participates in QMB Medicare cost-sharing only under the Healthy Horizons Medicare Cost-Sharing Program for qualified Medicare beneficiaries with family income up to 100% of the current Federal Poverty Income Guidelines and resources not exceeding twice the SSI resource standard for the appropriate family size.
- (c) The Department also participates in the Medicare Cost-Sharing for qualified Medicare beneficiaries found eligible for benefits under the Healthy Horizons Categorically Needy Program.

- (d) The Department participates in SLMB Medicare Cost-Sharing only under the Healthy Horizons Medicare Cost-Sharing Program for SLMBs with family income which on or after January 1, 1995, is more than 100% but does not exceed 120% of the current Federal Poverty Income Guidelines and resources not exceeding twice the SSI resource standard for the appropriate family size. Prior to January 1, 1995, for calendar years 1993 and 1994, family income shall be more than 100%, but may not exceed 110% of the applicable Federal Poverty Income Guidelines and resources may not exceed twice the SSI resource standard for the appropriate family size.
- (e) MA is provided under the program which is most advantageous for the client based on individual circumstances. Eligibility for MA benefits under both the NMP-MA and MNO-MA Programs is also explored.

§ 140.202. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this subchapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Applicant/recipient—A person who is applying for, or receiving, benefits under the Healthy Horizons Program.

Calendar quarter—A period of 3 full calendar months beginning with January, April, July or October.

Countable net income—Income counted in determining income eligibility for Healthy Horizons, less appropriate exemptions, deductions and disregards.

Earned income—Money or other compensation received in return for services rendered.

Infrequent income—Income that is received not more than once in a calendar quarter.

Irregular income—Income that is not subject to scheduling or is unpredictable.

Legal guardian—A person who is court appointed as the legal guardian.

Personal property—Privately owned possessions which are not real property. The term includes cash, bank accounts, stocks, bonds, mortgages, cash value of life insurance policies, household furnishings, personal effects, motor vehicles, boats and Federal, State and local tax refunds.

*QMB—Qualified Medicare beneficiary—*An individual who is entitled to, or voluntarily enrolled in, Medicare hospital insurance under Part A.

Real property—Land, buildings, mobile homes and improvements thereto.

SLMB—Specified low-income Medicare beneficiary—An individual who meets the eligibility requirements for QMB status except for income in excess of the QMB income limit, but not exceeding the limits specified in § 140.231 (relating to income eligibility limitations).

SSI—Supplemental Security Income—The benefit amount paid to an eligible person or to an eligible person and the eligible spouse under Title XVI of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C.A. §§ 1381—1383c).

Spouse—A person who is married to another by legal ceremony or by common-law.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

§ 140.221. Conditions of eligibility.

Eligibility for MA under the Healthy Horizons Program is based on the following:

- (1) An individual shall meet the following eligibility requirements:
- (i) Chapters 125 and 127 (relating to application process; and reserved).
 - (ii) Chapter 148 (relating to residence).
 - (iii) Chapter 149 (relating to citizenship and alienage).
 - (iv) Chapter 155 (relating to enumeration).
- (v) Chapter 178 (relating to resource provisions for categorically NMP-MA and MNO-MA).
 - (vi) Chapter 255 (relating to restitution).
 - (vii) Chapter 257 (relating to reimbursement).
- (2) Under the Healthy Horizons Categorically Needy Program, an individual shall also meet one of the following criteria:
 - (i) Be 65 years of age or older.
- (ii) Be a disabled person who is receiving Social Security Disability benefits or disability benefits based on SSI disability criteria at § 141.71 (relating to policy).
- (iii) Be a disabled person who meets the disability requirements of § 141.71.
- (3) Under the Healthy Horizons Medicare Cost-Sharing Program, an individual shall also be a qualified Medicare beneficiary.

INCOME REQUIREMENTS

§ 140.231. Income eligibility limitations.

- (a) For the Healthy Horizons Categorically Needy and Healthy Horizons QMB Cost-Sharing Programs, net family income after applicable deductions and disregards cannot exceed 100% of the current Department of Health and Human Services Annual Update of Federal Poverty Income Guidelines for the appropriate family size.
- (b) For the Healthy Horizons SLMB Cost-Sharing Program, on or after January 1, 1995, net income after applicable deductions and disregards shall be more than 100% of the current Department of Health and Human Services annual update of Federal Poverty Income Guidelines for the appropriate family size but may not exceed 120%. Prior to January 1, 1995, for calendar years 1993 and 1994, net income after applicable deductions and disregards shall be more than 100% of the applicable Department of Health and Human Services Annual Update of Federal Poverty Income Guidelines for the appropriate family size, but cannot exceed 110%.

RESOURCE REQUIREMENTS

§ 140.301. Resource eligibility limitations.

- (a) An applicant/recipient is resource eligible for the Healthy Horizons Categorically Needy Program if his total resources considered in accordance with Chapter 178, Subchapters A and B (relating to general provisions for MA resources common to all categories of MA; and aged, blind and disabled categories of MA), do not exceed the SSI resource standard for the appropriate family size.
- (b) An applicant/recipient is resource eligible for both the SLMB and QMB Healthy Horizons Medicare Cost-Sharing Programs if total resources considered under Chapter 178, Subchapters A and B do not exceed twice the SSI resource standard for the appropriate family size.

BENEFIT COVERAGE

§ 140.331. Benefit coverage.

- (a) The Department will provide the following under the Healthy Horizons Categorically Needy Program:
 - (1) Full categorically needy benefits.
- (2) Qualified Medicare beneficiaries are also eligible for the following:
- (i) Buy-in of the Medicare Part A premium if the individual is enrolled in Medicare Part A and paying the Part A premium.
 - (ii) Buy-in of the Medicare Part B premium.
- (iii) Payment of the Medicare Part A and Part B deductibles and coinsurances. The combined Medicare and Medicaid payment will not exceed the Department's Medicaid fee for the service provided.
- (b) The Department will provide the following under the QMB Healthy Horizons Medicare Cost-Sharing Program:
- (1) Buy-in of the Medicare Part A premium if the individual is enrolled in Medicare Part A and paying the Part A premium.
 - (2) Buy-in of the Medicare Part B premium.
- (3) Payment of the Medicare Part A and Part B deductibles and coinsurances. The combined Medicare and Medicaid payment will not exceed the Department's Medicaid fee for the services provided.
- (c) Under the Healthy Horizons SLMB Medicare Cost-Sharing Program, the Department will provide buy-in of only the Medicare Part B premium if the individual is enrolled in or eligible for Medicare Part A.
- (d) The Department will pay the Medicare Part A premium, if appropriate, and the Medicare Part B premium beginning with the month following the month in which the applicant is determined eligible.

§ 140.332. Category designation.

- (a) Elderly/disabled persons who are eligible to receive Healthy Horizons Categorically Needy benefits are designated as "PS" category and are identified by the appropriate program status code.
- (b) Elderly persons who are eligible for Medicare Cost-Sharing only are designated as "PG" category.
- (c) Disabled persons who are eligible for Medicare Cost-Sharing only are designated as "PL" category.
- (d) Elderly disabled persons who are eligible for SLMB Medicare Cost-Sharing are designated as TA/TJ category and the appropriate program status code.

§ 140.335. Retroactive eligibility.

- (a) The earliest possible date for retroactive Healthy Horizons Categorically Needy benefits to begin is the first day of the third month preceding the month of application. The period of eligibility for retroactive Healthy Horizons Categorically Needy benefits begins the first day of the month in which the first medical service was incurred if the applicant was otherwise eligible during that month.
- (b) There is no retroactive coverage under the Healthy Horizons QMB Medicare Cost-Sharing Program, but eligibility for the SLMB Medicare Cost-Sharing Program may be retroactive for up to 3 months.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

[67 PA. CODE CH. 231]

Intrastate Motor Carrier Safety Requirements

The Department of Transportation (Department), Bureau of Maintenance and Operations (Bureau), under the authority contained in 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 4704 and 6103(c) (relating to inspection by police or Commonwealth personnel; and promulgation of rules and regulations by department) proposes an amendment to Chapter 231 (relating to intrastate motor carrier safety requirements), as set forth in Annex A. These statutory provisions, respectively, set forth guidelines for the inspection of vehicle equipment by a police officer or qualified Commonwealth employe; and authorize the Department to adopt by reference any Federal statute or regulation or provision thereof relating to vehicles or drivers including minimum driver qualifications, maximum hours of service, loading, unloading, hazardous materials, operation, equipment, records and inspection. Further, the extent of coverage of Federal statutes or regulations adopted under 75 Pa.C.S. § 6103 extends to drivers and vehicles operating in intrastate commerce.

Purpose of Chapter 231

The purpose of this chapter is to prescribe minimum requirements and qualifications for drivers, vehicles and other matters relating to intrastate operation of commercial motor vehicles. This chapter extensively incorporates by reference provisions of 49 CFR Parts 390—397.

Purpose

The purpose of this proposed amendment is to eliminate the exemption from medical examinations and physical qualifications for commercial motor vehicle drivers employed by State and local governments. These drivers will be required to comply with the same medical examination and physical qualification requirements that all other commercial motor vehicle drivers operating in intrastate commerce are subject.

The Department, in an effort to assure continued motor carrier safety assistance program funding for Federal Fiscal Year 1996, published a proposed rulemaking at 25 Pa.B. 1962 (May 20, 1995), for purposes of amending Chapter 231 to incorporate by reference the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations (49 CFR 391.41-391.49) relating to medical examination and physical qualification requirements for commercial motor vehicle drivers. The Department's proposed rulemaking also included an exemption from the medical examination and physical qualification requirements for commercial motor vehicle drivers employed by State and local governments. The Department incorporated the exemption as a consequence of time constraints for adoption of these rules and because the Department could not unilaterally impose the medical examination and physical qualification requirements upon State drivers since these drivers were signatory to a binding, existing State employe union agreement which does not expire until June 30, 1996. Accordingly, the Department felt that these requirements for State and local government drivers must be subjected to negotiation/rulemaking and comment since the Federal rules did not expressly direct, charge or mandate that

State and local government drivers be required to adhere to these provisions. Thus, the Department could not insist that these drivers subscribe to the medical examination and physical qualification requirements, and these drivers, under their collective bargaining agreements, were under no duty to comply at the time these provisions were initially adopted and applied to the other commercial motor vehicle drivers.

Further, as a consequence of the public comments received in opposition of State and local government driver exemption to the testing and physical qualifications and as a result of a meeting of Department officials with the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) staff, the Department has committed to eliminating the exemption for State and local government drivers. Accordingly, the final adoption order published at 25 Pa.B. 3996 (September 23, 1995) included a commitment to publish a subsequent rulemaking to solicit comments on the proposed elimination of the exemption from medical examinations and physical qualification requirements for drivers employed by State and local governments.

The most significant proposed amendment to this regulation includes the following:

Section 231.85 (relating to drivers employed by State and local governments) is proposed to be amended by deleting the language exempting drivers employed by State and local governments from the requirements of §§ 231.31(b)(9) and 231.61—231.66 (relating to qualifications of drivers; and physical qualifications and examinations). This language exempted these drivers from the medical examination and physical qualification requirements of this chapter. The newly proposed language allows a driver regularly employed by a State or local government as of July 1, 1996, who cannot meet the physical qualification requirements of this chapter, to continue to operate in intrastate commerce only until the existing unqualifying condition worsens or a new unqualifying condition develops. This exemption is available only to those drivers who obtain a certification, from both their employer and medical examiner, that the driver is capable of operating in intrastate commerce despite the unqualifying medical condition. Further, the driver's qualification file must contain a copy of the medical examiner's initial certificate establishing a driver's qualification under this section, the most current biannual medical examiner's certificate and the most current motor carrier certification. These documents must be retained in the driver's file for the entire length of the driver's employment, and for 2 years thereafter.

The certification of the employing State or local government must be based on a review of the driver's past driving safety record and accident history. The employer's certification must be on a form prescribed by the Department and shall be valid for a period commensurate with that of the medical examiner's certification. Requirements for the medical examiner's certificate are not set forth in this section since they do not differ from the requirements with which the medical examiner must presently comply.

The requirements of this section are identical to those of § 231.64 (relating to drivers regularly employed as of September 23, 1995), thereby putting drivers employed by State and local governments on the same footing as other motor carrier drivers operating in intrastate commerce. The Department believes this proposed amendment will help ensure public roadway safety, while also striking a

balance that does not work severe economic hardship on those drivers with disqualifying conditions but who have historically demonstrated their ability to safely operate their vehicles.

Persons and Entities Affected

This proposed amendment will affect State and local governments and drivers employed by these governments. This proposed amendment will also affect the State Police, the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission and the Department.

Fiscal Impact

This proposed amendment will require that drivers employed by State and local governments obtain a biennial medical examination and that their employers maintain a copy of the medical examination results. This proposed amendment may impose costs on commercial motor vehicle drivers employed by State or local governments if the driver is responsible for paying for the biannual medical examination, or the State or local governments if they assume responsibility for paying for the biannual medical examination, however, these costs are not readily measurable. Since State government self-insures its own vehicles, State government will experience no change in insurance costs. Local governments may experience a reduction in their insurance rates since their drivers will be receiving medical examinations every 2 years to determine their competency to drive a commercial motor vehicle.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), the Department submitted a copy of this proposed amendment on April 24, 1996, to IRRC and to the Chairpersons of the House Transportation Committee and the Senate Transportation Committee. In addition to submitting this proposed amendment, the Department has provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a detailed Regulatory Analysis Form prepared by the Department in compliance with Executive Order 1982-2, "Improving Government Regulations." A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

If IRRC has objections to any portion of the proposed amendment, it will notify the Department within 30 days of the close of the public comment period. The notification shall specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met by that portion. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the regulation, by the Department, the General Assembly and the Governor of objections raised.

Sunset Provisions

The Department is not establishing a sunset date for this regulation since this regulation is needed to administer provisions required under 75 Pa.C.S. (relating to Vehicle Code). The Department, however, will continue to monitor this regulation for its effectiveness.

Interested persons are invited to submit written comments, suggestions or objections regarding the proposed amendment to Amar C. Bhajandas, P. This regulation requires all motor carrier drivers employed by State and local governments to have a biennial medical examination. The Department currently pays for the cost of these medical examinations for motor carrier vehicle drivers operating vehicles with hazardous material placards who are employed by the Department. Therefore, this regulatory fiscal note assumes that the Department will also pay for examinations for other motor carrier drivers employed by the Department now that the examinations are required.

The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources may also elect to pay for the medical examinations for motor carrier vehicle drivers employed by the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources. Costs for the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources to pay for the examinations are estimated at less than \$10,000 biennially.

ARTICLE VIII. ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT

CHAPTER 231. INTRASTATE MOTOR CARRIER SAFETY REQUIREMENTS

Subchapter B. QUALIFICATIONS OF DRIVERS LIMITED EXEMPTIONS

§ 231.85. Drivers employed by State and local governments.

[Sections 231.31(b)(9) and 231.61—231.65 (relating to qualifications of drivers; and physical qualifications and examinations) do not apply to regularly employed drivers of State and local governments and agencies of State and local governments.]

(a) A driver regularly employed by State or local government as of July 1, 1996, who cannot meet the physical qualification requirements of § 231.61 (relating to physical qualifications of drivers), will be considered to be qualified to operate in intrastate commerce only if certified by the medical examiner and the employing State or local government in accordance with this section. The driver shall be considered qualified only until the existing unqualifying medical or physical condition significantly worsens or a new unqualifying medical or physical condition develops subsequent to July 1, 1996.

- (b) The employing agency's certification shall be based on a review of the driver's past driving safety record and accident history. The employing agency's certification shall be on a form prescribed by the Department and shall be valid for a period commensurate with the period of the medical examiner's certificate issued in accordance with this chapter.
- (c) A copy of the medical examiner's initial certificate establishing a driver's qualification under this section and annotated in accordance with § 231.62 (relating to medical examination; certifi-

cate of physical examination), the most current biennial medical examiner's certificate and the most current certification by the employing motor carrier that the driver is qualified to operate in intrastate commerce shall be maintained in the driver's qualification file for the entire period of the driver's term of employment and for an additional 2 years after termination of employment.


Board of Probation and Parole

Small Communities Planning Assistance Program

By this notice, the Department of Community Affairs (DCA) and/or its successor, announces the opening of the application period beginning May 25, 1996, for funding from the Small Communities Planning Assistance Program (SCPAP). Grant applications will be accepted beginning May 25, 1996, through the DCA regional offices (addresses appear at the end of this notice). All applications must be received in the regional office by close of business August 16, 1996, or if mailed, postmarked no later than this date. No applications will be accepted via FAX machine.

The SCPAP program is administered by the Department's Bureau of Community Planning. The purpose of the Program is to assist eligible municipalities to prepare

comprehensive strategies for community conservation and economic development. A total of \$250,000 has been set aside from the Commonwealth's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program 1996 funds to provide funds for this purpose contingent upon appropriation by the General Assembly.

The Department published the Summary Notice of the Consolidated Plan for Federal Fiscal Years 1995—1999 at 40 Pa.B. 4911 (October 1, 1994). The full plan is available at all County Commissioners offices, all DCA CDBG grantees and all District Libraries.

Notice of submission to the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) was published at 48 Pa.B. 5852 (November 28, 1994). Regulations for the CDBG Program may be found at 16 Pa. Code Ch. 25.

Eligible Applicants

All Pennsylvania Boroughs, incorporated towns and townships are eligible, in accordance with Act 179 of 1984, to apply for planning assistance grants with the exception of the following:

- A. Municipalities eligible to receive CDBG funds directly from the Federal Government because of their destination as Federal Entitlement Communities or those eligible to receive funds through the HUD Urban County CDBG Program.
- B. Boroughs, towns and townships which are identified as entitlement municipalities under the Pennsylvania CDBG Program and which have populations of 10,000 or more based on the 1990 census.

Program Contents and Eligible Activities.

The SCPAP emphasizes action-oriented planning programs with a high potential for implementation. Eligible activities include:

- 1. Overall community development strategies;
- 2. Neighborhood revitalization strategies;
- 3. Economic development planning projects;
- 4. Housing strategies; and
- 5. Community conservation planning projects.

SCPAP funds may also be utilized for all other planning and policy-planning-management-capacity building activities eligible under the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) regulations (24 CFR Part 570.205) September 6, 1988.

Applications will be competitively evaluated based upon the following criteria:

A. Quality of Work Program—The degree to which the application presents a proposed work program that ad-

dresses the problems in an effective and logical way, presents a coordinated approach with other existing planning activities and is realistic in terms of cost and time of execution.

- B. Seriousness of the Problem—The comparative seriousness of the needs to be addressed by the proposed planning activity as compared with needs identified in other applications.
- C. Potential for Implementation—The degree to which the application proposes an action-oriented planning program which includes as its final end product realistic and achievable short range activities with high potential for implementation.
- D. Benefit to Low- and Moderate-Income Persons—The extent to which the application proposes a planning program which is designed to benefit this income category.
- E. Leverage—The extent to which other funds are leveraged to undertake the proposed planning program.
- F. Timeliness—The ability of the applicant to complete the proposed planning program in a timely fashion.
- G. Past Performance—Applicants that have received previous SCPAP grants will be evaluated on their performance in administering those grants.
- H. Community Involvement—The extent to which the public participated in the preparation of the application and the extent the public will be involved in the planning program and its implementation.

Ineligible Activities

- A. General government operating and maintenance expenses including legal fees and general administrative costs other than those cited under the Financial Assistance, paragraph C.
- B. Architectural (landscape-architectural)/engineering specifications and design costs.
- C. The preparation of a Small Communities Planning Assistance Program application.
 - D. Property Acquisiton.
 - E. Construction projects.

Financial Assistance

- A. The Department in awarding grants will insure that at least 70% of the total SCPAP funds awarded will benefit low- to moderate-income persons and families.
- B. The financial assistance will be for a period not to exceed 24 months and at a SCPAP maximum funding level of \$28,000 per applicant.
- C. The Department will pay for application preparation costs, surveys conducted in accordance with CDBG Sur-

vey Standards and the actual advertising costs of the two required public notices for successful grantees. The total administrative allowance shall not exceed \$3,600.

D. The Department reserves the right to deny approval of any application and to request additional information from certain applicants without undertaking any duty to request such information from all applicants. Grants will be awarded at the discretion of the Department to those projects that are determined to be most suitable for funding.

In addition to the above, more restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining which may occur will be incorporated into a mining activity permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chs. 93 and 95). Persons or agencies which have requested review of the NPDES permit requirements for a particular mining activity within the above-mentioned public comment period will be provided with a 30-day period to review and submit comments on those requirements.

Written comments or objections should contain the name, address and telephone number of persons submitting comments or objections, application number and a statement of sufficient detail to inform the Department on the basis of comment or objection and relevant facts upon which it is based. Requests for an informal conference must contain the name, address and telephone number of requestor, application number, a brief summary of the issues to be raised by the requestor at the conference and a statement whether the requestor desires to have the conference conducted in the locality of the proposed mining activities.

The Department's review has found that the Joint Plan Update is now acceptable and hereby grants planning approval. This review has also not identified and significant environmental impacts resulting from this proposal.

The Joint Plan Update calls for the construction of a new, 1.6 mgd (Average Daily Flow)/5.7 mgd (Peak Flow) regional wastewater treatment facility by the recently chartered Central Carbon Municipal Authority. This flow includes an allowance of 13,600 gpd, of the proposed facility's overall capacity, for the treatment of residential septage generated within the four municipalities previously identified. The proposed regional wastewater treatment facility will be constructed on property identified as Site No. 7 in the Joint Plan Update. Site 7 is located in Mahoning Township, south of the existing Lehighton Wastewater Treatment Facility; and is currently owned by Consolidated Rail Corporation (CONRAIL). The CCMA will acquire Site 7, through proper, legal means at the appropriate time. Treated wastewater will be discharged to the Lehigh River from the proposed regional wastewater treatment facility.

The Joint Plan Update also calls for the installation of new wastewater collection systems to serve selected areas in both Mahoning and Franklin Townships. In Mahoning Township, collection systems will be constructed in the Jamestown, Packerton, Meadowcrest, Ashtown and Graverville/SR0443 areas. In Franklin Township, collection systems will be constructed in the North Weissport, East Weissport and Union Hill areas. Each Township will assess its users for the construction and operation and maintenance of their individual wastewater collection systems.

The Joint Plan Update identified the existence of infiltration/inflow (I/I) problems within the existing wastewater collection/conveyance systems of Lehighton and Weissport Boroughs. Both Boroughs propose activities which are intended to reduce I/I through rehabilitation and/or replacement of various portions of their wastewater collection systems. In addition, the proposed, regional wastewater treatment facility's peak hydraulic treatment capacity has been increased beyond normal levels to provide sufficient capacity to properly treat both Boroughs' combined, peak wet-weather wastewater flows.

Conveyance facilities, both existing and proposed, have been included in the Joint Plan Update to facilitate the transportation of wastewater between the individual, municipal wastewater collection systems and the proposed regional wastewater treatment facility. The Jamestown and Packerton areas of Mahoning Township will discharge wastewater to a proposed 165 gpm pump station to be located northeast of the intersection of Carbon and First Streets in Mahoning Township. This pump station will discharge its wastewater into manhole No. 397 located in Subarea 2 of the existing Lehighton Borough Wastewater Collection System. The costs associated with this pump station and force main will be borne by Mahoning Township.

The Ashtown section of Mahoning Township is currently served by a 174 gpm pump station which discharges to manhole No. 256D in the existing Lehighton Borough Wastewater Collection System. In conjunction with this discharge, wastewater from the Meadowcrest area of Mahoning Township will be conveyed to the existing Ashtown Pump Station for conveyance to Lehighton Borough's Wastewater Collection System and ultimately the regional wastewater treatment facility. The existing Ashtown Pump Station has adequate capacity to transport the wastewater flows which will be generated by both the Ashtown and Meadowcrest areas of Mahoning Township.

Wastewater from the Graverville/SR0443 areas of Mahoning Township will be conveyed to manhole No. 256D in the existing Lehighton Borough Wastewater Collection System by a proposed 270 gpm pump station and force main. The costs associated with the proposed, new pump station and force main will be borne by Mahoning Township.

As a result of the increased discharge to manhole No. 256D from the previously identified areas of Mahoning Township, several Lehighton Borough Wastewater Collection System lines will need to be upgraded. The Bridge Street Collection line, from manhole No. 256D to manhole No. 201, will be upgraded from an 8" to a 10" diameter line. The 15" collection line, between manhole No. 201 and manhole No. 345 will be upgraded to an 18" line. The 18" conveyance line, between manhole No. 345 and manhole No. 418, will be upgraded to a 21" line. All costs associated with these three line upgrades will be borne by the CCMA.

The existing Stanley Hoffman Boulevard Pump Station, which serves Subareas 3 and 4 of the Lehighton Wastewater Collection System and the proposed Jamestown and Packerton Wastewater Collection Systems in Mahoning Township, must be upgraded and expanded. The costs associated with this upgrade will be borne by the CCMA. As a direct result of the Stanley Hoffman Boulevard Pump Station Upgrade/Expansion an existing 15" conveyance line in the Lehighton Wastewater Collection System will need to be upgraded to an 18" conveyance line. The existing line must be upgraded between manhole No. 440 and manhole No. 444 in the Lehighton Wastewater Collection System. All costs associated with this upgrade will be borne by the CCMA.

An existing pump station, currently serving only Weissport Borough, will be upgraded to accommodate Weissport Borough's projected wet-weather flows and the proposed flows from Franklin Township. The existing 300 gpm pump station will be replaced by an 850 gpm pump station. However, the same 8" force main, between the existing Weissport Pump Station and the existing Lehighton Wastewater Treatment Facility, will still be capable of transporting the total, increased wastewater volume from Weissport Borough and Franklin Township. The costs associated with this pump station upgrade/expansion will be borne by the CCMA.

The project's final conveyance component will be the construction of a new influent pumping station to be located at the existing Lehighton Wastewater Treatment Facility Site. This pump station will be equipped with three, 50 HP variable speed drive pumps. The station will be capable of pumping all of the raw wastewater received from the four municipalities, through an 18" ductile iron force main to the proposed regional wastewater treatment facility site. All costs associated with the influent pumping station and force main will be borne by the CCMA.

Financing of each of the proposed municipal projects will be as follows:

- CCMA—Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority (PENNVEST) $\,$
 - Lehighton Borough—Conventional
- Mahoning Township—Rural Economic Community Development Service (RECDS)
- Franklin Township—Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority (PENNVEST)
- Weissport Borough—Combination of a Grant from Carbon County and Rural Economic Community Development Service (RECDS)

Each municipality will be responsible for the financing, construction and operation and maintenance of its own wastewater collection system and appurtenances. The CCMA will be responsible for the financing, construction and operation and maintenance of the proposed regional wastewater treatment facility. It will also be responsible for the financing, construction and operation and maintenance activities associated with existing pump station expansions and those conveyance facilities (interceptors, force mains, and the like) which will transport wastewater from two or more of the municipalities within a common conveyance facility or line.

In accordance with the provisions of the Pennsylvania Sewage Facilities Act, 35 P. S. § 750.1—750.20(a) (Act 537), and Chapter 71 of the Department's Regulations (25 Pa. Code Ch. 71), the Department will hold the Borough of Lehighton, the Borough of Weissport, Mahoning Township and Franklin Township responsible for the complete

and timely implementation of each municipality's portion of the Joint Plan Update's activities, as listed in the Schedules of Implementation described in the regional and respective, municipal sections of the Joint Plan Update.

Any additional wastewater-related improvements, additions, deletions or changes outside of those explicitly described in the Joint Plan Update must be in compliance with the Department's Regulations and be submitted to and approved by the Department in writing. Since the CCMA is proposing PENNVEST financing and the total cost of the project is greater than \$10 million, Value Engineering must be performed for those issues related to the proposed regional wastewater treatment facility. Issues such as the type of wastewater treatment process, wastewater treatment facility site layout or other issues which cannot be completely resolved during the planning stage of the project, should be resolved during the Value Engineering process.

Submission Date for Public-Private Partnership Recycling Grants Under Act 101 Section 902; The Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act of 1988

The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) hereby announces a request for applications from municipalities for recycling program grant assistance under section 902 of the Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act (53 P. S. §§ 4000.101—4000.1904).

Municipalities eligible for the grants include counties, cities, boroughs, incorporated towns, townships and home rule municipalities. Authorities are not eligible to apply for the grants, but may be sponsored by a county or municipality.

This solicitation is for projects considered to be public-private partnerships where municipalities may sponsor a recycling grant application on behalf of a private sector partner for projects benefiting both entities. Priority will be given to projects that expand processing or manufacturing capacity within Pennsylvania for source separated recyclable materials including aluminum, glass, plastic and steel containers, corrugated cardboard, high-grade office papers, magazines, newspapers and other marketable grades of paper. All grant awards will be predicated on the receipt of recycling fees required by sections 701 and 702 of Act 101, and the availability of monies in the Recycling Fund. The maximum funding available is \$300,000 per project.

Municipalities and counties are eligible for 90% funding of approved recycling project costs. Municipalities considered financially distressed by the Department of Community Affairs under the Municipalities Financial Recovery Act (53 P. S. §§ 11701.101—11701.501) are eligible to receive funding for an additional 10% of approved costs.

Eligible recycling project development costs include: recycling project design costs; recycling market investigations; development of recycling market commitments; development of recycling program ordinances; development of recycling public education programs; and the costs of developing contracts or procuring equipment and services necessary for the operation of the recycling program.

Eligible recycling project implementation costs include: vehicles used to collect or transport recyclable materials to processing or storage facilities, or in the operation of a materials recovery facility, or in the transport of recyclable materials to market; reusable containers for household recyclable materials storage and collection; the cost of acquisition and/or renovation of buildings for the processing or storage of recyclable materials; equipment used for the processing of recyclable materials; and land improvements for a recycling facility. Yard waste composting programs as defined by the Pennsylvania Municipal Waste Management Regulations, Chapter 75, will be considered as recycling programs.

Before a municipality can submit a recycling grant application to the Department for the funding of mechanical processing equipment, it must first publish a notice in a newspaper of general circulation describing in detail the kinds of processing equipment that it proposes to pur-

chase and the intended use of the equipment. The notice, in the form of a display advertisement, must appear at least once weekly for 2 consecutive weeks. The municipality must allow 30 days for responses from interested individuals. When the municipality submits the recycling grant application to the Department, it must include proof of compliance with the notification requirements, a description of any responses received to the notice, and an explanation of why the municipality has concluded the mechanical processing equipment is not available to the program from the private sector.

The Public-Private Partnership Recycling Grant Program has a two-step application process. The first step involves the submission of a Letter of Intent to apply for grant funding. The Letter of Intent will identify the municipal sponsor, the private partner and the recyclable materials involved; summarize the project, its financing and the partnership arrangement; and will require the signature of appropriate representatives of the municipal sponsor and the private partner. The Departments of Commerce and Environmental Protection will jointly review each letter of intent to assess the economic and environmental benefits of the project. Projects receiving a favorable review will be invited to submit a full Public-Private Partnership Recycling Grant Application as the second step of the application process.

Three copies of the letter of intent must be received or postmarked by 3 p.m. August 29, 1996. Applications received by DEP after that date will not be considered during the current round of solicitation. Enhancement to the Dealer Late Submission and Nonsubmission of Vehicle Registration Program Documents

ENVIRONMENTAL HEARING BOARD

Keystone Cement Company v. DEP; EHB Doc. No. 95-151-MG

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) and Keystone Cement Company (Keystone) have agreed to a partial settlement of the above-captioned matter regarding its two cement kilns located in East Allen Township, Northampton County.

The Department had issued Air Quality Operating Permits (Permits) to Keystone on June 19, 1995, authorizing Keystone to operate the cement kilns in accordance with the waste fuel feed rates, emission limitations, monitoring requirements and other conditions set forth in the Permits. Keystone filed a timely appeal challenging the waste fuel feed rates, emission limitations, the requirement to perform a risk assessment and other permit conditions.

The parties have agreed to a partial settlement, the major provisions of which include:

- 1. Within 30 days, the Department will prepare, for publication and comment, the following draft modifications to Keystone's Permits, published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* on August 12, 1995:
- a. Condition No. 6, relating to the metal concentration limits, shall be modified to read as follows:

The Permittee shall not fire any waste fuels in the cement kiln having as fired metal concentrations in excess of the following limits:

arsenic	_	100 ppm
beryllium	_	20 ppm
cadmium	_	1000 ppm
hexavalent chromium	_	1000 ppm
mercury	_	10 ppm
nickel	_	1000 ppm
lead	_	2500 ppm

The Permittee shall not accept waste fuels with metal concentrations limits in excess of the "as fired" limits, unless Permittee applies for and receives a hazardous waste treatment permit authorizing the blending of the waste fuels or the Department or Environmental Quality Board determines that such a permit is not required.

b. Condition No. 11e, relating to the automatic operation of the interlocks with visible air contaminants, shall be modified to read as follows:

Visible air contaminants from the kiln as measured by opacity is equal to or greater than 20% for any 6 minute rolling average, or equal to or greater than 60% for any 1 minute block average.

- c. Condition No. 13, relating to stack sampling for metals, chlorine and particulates, shall be deleted. (See Paragraph 2.e. below.)
- d. Condition No. 14, relating to stack sampling for PCDD and PCDF, shall be deleted. (See Paragraph 2.e. below.)
- e. Condition No. 15, which requires stack sampling for arsenic, beryllium, cadmium, hexavalent chromium, mercury, nickel, lead, HCl, chlorine, particulates, PCDD and PCDF, at a frequency prescribed by the Department but at a minimum every 6 months for the first 18 months, then annually thereafter, shall be modified to read as follows:

The Permittee shall conduct stack sampling for the following pollutants on an annual basis: arsenic, beryllium, cadmium, hexavalent chromium, mercury, nickel, lead, HCl, chlorine, particulates, PCDD and PCDF. All stack sampling and analysis shall be conducted by an independent Department approved third party and shall be conducted while the source is operating at maximum routine operating conditions. The Department reserves the right to require the Permittee to sample the emissions in accordance with such methods and procedures and at such locations and intervals of time as the Department may reasonably prescribe and provide the Department with the results, as authorized by law.

f. Condition No. 24, relating to notification of the Department in the case of exceedances of emission limits, shall be modified to read as follows:

The Permittee shall promptly notify the Department at (610) 861-2070 of the sources or associated air cleaning devices which results in, or may possibly be resulting in, the emission of air contaminants in excess of the regula-

tion contained in Article III of the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Environmental Resources.

- 2. The Department and Keystone will follow the public notice provisions set forth in 25 Pa. Code § 127.424, and the Department will take final action on the modifications after consideration of any comments received.
- 3. Keystone will not appeal the final modifications as long as the terms and conditions thereof are not materially different from those set forth above, but reserve the right to appeal the final modifications if they are materially different.

INSURANCE DEPARTMENT

Limited Liability Companies; Notice 1996-07

Pennsylvania's Business Corporation Law prohibits "limited liability companies" from being organized to conduct the business of insurance (15 Pa.C.S. § 8911.(a)). Historically, the Insurance Department has construed this prohibition as preventing limited liability companies from conducting business as an agent or broker, in addition to prohibiting activity as an insurer.

The Insurance Commissioner has now determined that this law was not designed to prevent insurance agencies or brokers from being incorporated as limited liability companies. Accordingly, the Insurance Department will consider agent and broker applications from limited liability companies, whether resident or nonresident.
