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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva-nia Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Effective Dates of Statutes

The effective dates specified previously for laws and appropriation acts were contained in the applicable law or appropriation act. Where no date is specified or where the effective date specified is prior to the date of enactment, the effective date is 60 days after final enactment except for statutes making appropriations or affecting budgets of political subdivisions. See 1 Pa.C.S. §§ 1701—1704 (relating to effective dates of statutes).

Advance Copies of Statutes

Section 1106 of Title 1 of the *Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes* provides that the prothonotaries of each county shall file advance copies of statutes in their offices for public inspection until the *Laws of Pennsylvania* are generally available. Section 2406(h) of The Administrative Code of 1929 provides that the Department of General Services shall distribute advance sheets of the *Laws of Pennsylvania* to each law judge of the courts, to every county and public library of this Commonwealth and to each member of the General Assembly. These copies shall be furnished without charge. The Department shall also mail one copy of each law enacted during any legislative session to any person who pays to it the sun of \$20.

The amendments adopted hereby shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and shall govern all matters thereafter commenced and, insofar as just and practicable, matters then pending.

CHAPTER 83. PENNSYLVANIA RULES OF DISCIPLINARY ENFORCEMENT

Subchapter D. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

Rule 402. Access to Disciplinary Information and Confidentiality.

(a) Except as provided in subdivisions (b) [and], (d) and (k), all proceedings under these rules shall be open to the public after:

* * * * * *

(c) Until the proceedings are open under subdivision (a) or (b), all proceedings involving allegations of misconduct by or disability of an attorney shall be kept confidential unless:

* * * * *

- (3) in matters involving alleged disability, the Supreme Court enters its order transferring the respondent-attorney to inactive status pursuant to Enforcement Rule 301 (relating to proceedings where an attorney is declared to be incompetent or is alleged to be incapacitated); or
- (4) [the proceeding is based upon allegations that have become generally known to the public; or
- (5) I there is a need to notify another person or organization, including the Lawyers' Fund for Client Security, in order to protect the public, the administration of justice, or the legal profession.

(k) If a formal proceeding results in the imposition of private discipline or dismissal of all the charges, the proceeding shall cease to be open to the public when the decision to impose private discipline or dismiss the charges becomes final, unless the respondent-attorney requests that the record of the proceeding remain open to the public.

Official Note: Paragraph (d)(2) is based on 18 Pa.C.S. § 5108 (relating to compounding). Otherwise Disciplinary Counsel may be in the anomalous position of violating Rule 8.4 of the Pennsylvania Rules of Professional Conduct.

Although subdivision (k) provides that a formal proceeding that becomes open to the public under subdivision (a) will subsequently be closed if it results in the imposition of private discipline or dismissal of all the charges, the closing of the proceeding cannot change the fact that the proceeding was open to the public for a period of time. Thus, subdivision (k) makes clear that the respondent-attorney may request that the record of the proceeding remain open to demonstrate that the charges were dismissed or only private discipline was imposed.

Annex A

TITLE 231. RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 1915. ACTIONS FOR CUSTODY, PARTIAL CUSTODY AND VISITATION OF MINOR CHILDREN

Rule 1915.8. Physical and Mental Examination of Persons.

(a) The court may order the **[child or a party]** child(ren) and/or any party to submit to and fully participate in an evaluation by an appropriate expert or experts. The order, which shall be substantially in the form set forth in Rule 1915.18, may be made upon the court's own motion **[or on]**, upon the motion of a party with reasonable notice to the person to be examined,

- [and] or by agreement of the parties. The order shall specify the place, manner, conditions and scope of the examination and the person or persons by whom it [is to] shall be made and to whom distributed. In entering an order directing an evaluation pursuant to this rule, the court shall consider all appropriate factors including the following, if applicable:
- (1) the allocation of the costs, including insurance coverage, if any, attendant to the undertaking of the evaluation and preparation of the resultant report and court testimony of any appointed expert;
- (2) the execution of appropriate authorizations and/or consents to facilitate the examination;
- (3) any deadlines imposed regarding the completion of the examination and payment of costs;
- (4) the production of any report and of underlying data to counsel and/or any unrepresented party upon the completion of the examination; and
- (5) any additional safeguards that are deemed appropriate as a result of the alleged presence of domestic violence and/or child abuse.
- (b) Where the expert is appointed upon the court's motion | Unless otherwise directed by the **court**, the expert shall deliver to the court [and], to the attorneys of record, or to the parties if there are no attorneys of record] and to any unrepresented party, copies of [a detailed written report] any reports arising from the evaluation setting out the findings, results of all tests made, diagnosis and conclusions within the time provided in subdivision (d) of this rule |. No reports shall be filed of record or considered evidence unless and until admitted by the court. Any report which is prepared at the request of a party, with or without a court order, and which a party intends to introduce at trial, must be delivered to the court and the other party at least thirty days before trial. If the report or any information from the evaluator is provided to the court, the evaluator shall be subject to crossexamination by all counsel and any unrepresented party without regard to who obtains or pays for the evaluation.
- (c) [Where the expert evaluation is obtained upon motion of a party, the expert shall deliver to that party a detailed written report setting out the findings, results of all tests made, diagnosis and conclusions within the time provided in subdivision (d) of this rule.
- (d) Each expert's report shall be filed and/or served
- (1) within sixty days of the entry of the order where the county pays the expert, or
- (2) within sixty days after full payment of the expert fee(s) where one or both parties are directed to pay.
- (e) The court may assess the cost of the examination and report on any or all of the parties or as otherwise permitted by law.
- (f) The order shall require that payment be made within twenty days of the date of the order.

- (g) If a party refuses to obey an order of court made under subdivision (a) of this rule, the court may make an order refusing to allow the disobedient party to support or oppose designated claims or defenses, [or] prohibiting the party from introducing in evidence designated documents, things or testimony, [or] prohibiting the party from introducing evidence of physical or mental condition, or making such other order as is just. The willful failure or refusal of a party to comply with an order entered pursuant to this rule may also give rise to a finding of contempt and the imposition of such sanctions as may be deemed appropriate by the court, including, but not limited to, an adverse inference against the non-complying party.
- [(h)] (d) A petition for contempt alleging failure to comply with an order entered pursuant to subdivision (a) of this rule shall be treated in an expedited manner.
- [(i) Any report which is prepared at the request of a party, with or without a court order, and upon which a party intends to rely at trial, must be served upon the court and the opposing party thirty days before trial.

Explanatory Comment—1981

A child custody determination may often involve consideration of the mental and physical condition of both the parties to the proceeding and the child. Rule 1915.8 provides a procedure for the mental and physical examination of persons, similar to that provided by Discovery Rule 4010. One major difference between this rule and the Discovery Rule is the express statement that "the order may be made upon the court's own motion or on motion of a party...."

The power of the court to order a physical or mental examination on its own motion is a concrete example of the direction which custody law has taken. As expressed by Judge Lawrence W. Kaplan, "The Child Advocate in Custody Litigation," in PBI publication No. 1980-140, p. 86, supra:

The Superior Court, in exercising its actual adjudicative responsibility and perceived administrative stewardship over the custody law of Pennsylvania, has taken the unprecedented step of requiring the trial judge to develop the record where it is deficient for the parties' failure to fully explore the relevant issues. *Lewis v. Lewis*, 267 Pa. Super. 235, 406 A.2d 781 (1979). By imposing this requirement, Pennsylvania's custody law challenges bench and bar in a fashion unmatched in other areas of the law.

This challenge was noted by the editors of the Pennsylvania Family Lawyer, Vol. 1, No. 1, p. 3 (January 1980):

An increased substantial burden is being placed upon judges and attorneys to develop a custody case to its fullest potential to insure that a proper award will be made. There is an affirmative duty to develop a record and to conduct a thorough investigation with the aid of outside agencies.

The reason for the challenge imposed by the Superior Court is clearly stated by the Pennsylvania Family Lawyer, p. 7:

Custody cases are not akin to most other cases in the adversary process. The focus is not on parental rights but unrepresented children's rights.

The Superior Court has placed litigants to a custody dispute on notice that the court is bound to explore all facets of the action to determine the best interest of the child. Physical and mental condition of the parties and of the child is but one facet to be explored.

There are two additional points to be noted. First, subdivision (b) provides that the examining physician or psychologist is to deliver a copy of his report to both the court and the parties. Second, subdivision (b) provides sanctions which may be imposed upon a party who refuses to obey an order to submit to an examination.

Explanatory Comment—1994

In order to make a proper determination in a child custody case, the court often requires information which can only be supplied by an expert evaluation of the parties and the subject child. Rule 1915.8 provides a procedure for expert evaluation of persons. Unlike the civil discovery rule (R.C.P. 4010), Rule 1915.8 provides that expert evaluations may be ordered upon the court's own motion as well as the motion of a party.

The proposed revisions to Rule 1915.8 add definite time limits during which the cost of evaluations must be paid, the evaluation themselves completed, and the reports provided to the court and counsel. The time limits are imposed in response to complaints of unreasonable delays in the completion of evaluations. The rule also provides a range of sanctions which the court may impose for failure to comply with an order directing evaluations, and provides that a petition for contempt for failure to comply with an order entered under this rule is to be treated in an expedited fashion.

Explanatory Comment—2007

This rule addresses the process for any number of expert evaluations a court may order in a custody case, including, but not limited to, physical, mental health, custody and/or drug and alcohol evaluations, and/or home studies. Since the initial promulgation of this rule in 1981, the frequency of utilizing professionals as expert witnesses in child custody litigation has increased considerably. In appropriate cases, evaluations have served as a means to provide the court with a full and complete record and to facilitate settlement of the litigation.

The proposed revisions to Rule 1915.8 are intended to afford the trial court and the parties a more flexible and case-sensitive means of determining the scope and parameters of a physical and/or mental examination, including deadlines, costs, underlying data, and access. In many instances, the previous sixty-day deadline was impractical and ignored. While some cases demanded that the evaluation be completed in less than 60 days, others demanded far more time than that. The revisions to this rule also specifically permit the trial court to draw an adverse inference from one party's failure to comply with an order pursuant to this rule.

Rule 1915.18. Form of Order Directing Expert Examination and Report.

RULES AND REGULATIONS Title 49—PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

STATE BOARD OF VEHICLE MANUFACTURERS, DEALERS AND SALESPERSONS [49 PA. CODE CH. 19] Biennial Renewal Fees

The State Board of Vehicle Manufacturers, Dealers and Salespersons (Board) amends § 19.4 (relating to fees). This final-form rulemaking increases the biennial license renewal fee for all classes of the Board's licensees.

Statutory Authority

The Board is required by law to support its operations from revenue it generates from fees, fines and civil penalties. Section 30(a) of the Board of Vehicles Act (act) (63 P. S. § 818.30(a)) requires the Board to increase fees so that adequate revenue is raised to meet the Board's expenditures in enforcing the act. While many of the Board's fees are based on the cost of providing a service to an individual licensee, such as processing an application for licensure, biennial renewal fees are charged to licensees across the Board and are thus most appropriately increased to meet the Board's general enforcement costs.

Response to Comments

Proposed rulemaking was published at 36 Pa.B. 7619 (December 16, 2006) for 30 days of public comment. The Board did not receive comments from the public. The House Professional Licensure Committee (HPLC) submitted two comments on February 13, 2007. On February 15, 2007, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) submitted notice to the Board that it had no objections, comments or recommendations to offer and that, if the HPLC and the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee (SCP/PLC) did not take any action, the final-form rulemaking would be deemed approved by IRRC when delivered. The SCP/PLC did not submit comments.

The HPLC asked for additional fiscal information explaining the major costs centers where significant increases had occurred in the past 5 years. As noted in the preamble to proposed rulemaking, the most significant increases in expenses have occurred in the investigative and legal divisions. The following chart sets forth the Board's expenses in these two categories from Fiscal Year (FY) 2000-2001 through the projections for FY 2005-2006.

As is the case with the 27 licensing boards and commissions within the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, the Board's investigation, enforcement and prosecution of matters is directly related to the number and seriousness of complaints filed by the public. The Board has seen an increase in the number and seriousness of complaints filed/cases opened. The increase in seriousness is indicated by the increased number of serious sanctions—revocation of licenses and active suspension of licenses. The following table lists the number of cases opened from 1999 to the close of FY 2006 and the type of disciplinary action imposed.

In addition to investigating complaints filed, the investigation and enforcement division also inspects new vehicle dealerships to ensure compliance with the act. For FY 2000-2001, a total of 14,850 new, routine and other inspections were performed. For FY 2001-2002, 14,662 total inspections were performed. For FY 2002-2003, 15,038 total inspections were performed. For FY 2003-2004, 16,326 total inspections were performed. For FY 2004-2005, 12,748 total inspections were performed.

The HPLC also requested an explanation as to why 17 years have elapsed since the last biennial fee increase. The Board receives annual reports from the Bureau of

Finance and Revenue regarding its income and expenditures. In the report provided in July 2002, it was projected that the Board would have a balance of \$737,311 in FY 2004-2005. In the report provided in August 2003, it was projected that the Board would have a balance of \$602,305 in FY 2004-2005. In the report provided in August 2004, it was projected that the Board would have a balance of \$258,519 in FY 2004-2005. In the report provided in June 2005, it was projected that the Board would be in a serious deficit situation by FY 2005-2006, with a deficit of \$804,513, increasing to \$1,633,513 by FY 2007-2008. Although the Board was

reluctant to raise the fees charged to its licensees, it was apparent by June 2005, that an increase was imperative. *Fiscal Impact*

The final-form rulemaking increases the biennial renewal fee for all classes of the Board's licensees. The final-form rulemaking should have no other fiscal impact on the private sector, the general public or political subdivisions.

Paperwork Requirements

The final-form rulemaking requires the Board to alter some of its forms to reflect the new biennial renewal fees. However, it should not create additional paperwork for the private sector.

Sunset Date

The act requires the Board to monitor its revenue and costs on a fiscal year and biennial basis. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on December 5, 2006, the Board submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 36 Pa.B. 7619, to IRRC and the Chairpersons of the HPLC and the SCP/PLC for review and comment.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC, the HPLC and the SCP/PLC were provided with copies of the comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. In preparing the final-form rulemaking, the Board has considered all comments from IRRC, the HPLC, the SCP/PLC and the public.

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(j.2)), on April 18, 2007, the final-form rulemaking was approved by the HPLC. On May 2, 2007, the final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the SCP/PLC. Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, the final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by IRRC, effective May 2, 2007.

- (2) A public comment period was provided as required by law and all comments were considered.
- (3) This final-form rulemaking is necessary and appropriate for administering and enforcing the authorizing act identified in this Preamble.

The Board, acting under its authorizing statute, orders that:

- (a) The regulations of the Board, 49 Pa. Code Chapter 19, are amended by amending § 19.14 to read as set forth at 36 Pa.B. 7619.
- (b) The Board shall submit this order and 36 Pa.B. 7619 to the Office of General Counsel and the Office of Attorney General as required by law.
- (c) The Board shall certify this order and 36 Pa.B. 7619 and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (d) This order shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

STATEMENTS OF POLICY

Title 49—PROFESSIONAL AND VOCATIONAL STANDARDS

BUREAU OF PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL AFFAIRS

[49 PA. CODE CH. 43b]

Schedule of Civil Penalties—Veterinarians and Veterinary Technicians

The Commissioner of Professional and Occupational Affairs (Commissioner) adds § 43b.21 (relating to schedule of civil penalties—veterinarians and veterinary technicians—statement of policy) to read as set forth in Annex A. This section establishes a civil penalty schedule for violations of the Veterinary Medicine Practice Act (63 P. S. §§ 485.1—485.35) and the regulations of the State Board of Veterinary Medicine (Board).

Section 5(a) of the act of July 2, 1993 (P. L. 345, No. 48) (Act 48) (63 P. S. § 2205(a)) authorizes the Commissioner, after consultation with the licensing boards and commissions in the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (Bureau), to adopt a schedule of civil penalties for: (1) operating without a current, registered, unsuspended and unrevoked license, registration, certificate or permit; and (2) violating a provision of an act or regulation of a licensing board or commission within the Bureau regarding the conduct or operation of a business or facility licensed by the licensing board or commission. Under section 5(a) of Act 48, the Commissioner may adopt the schedule of penalties by publishing the schedule in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* as a statement of policy and within 2 years thereafter promulgating the schedule as a regulation

The Commissioner previously adopted civil penalty schedules under section 5(a) of Act 48 for many of the licensing boards and commissions within the Bureau. These schedules, as well as guidelines and procedures for their implementation, have been codified as regulations, in accordance with Act 48, in Chapter 43b (relating to Commissioner of Professional and Occupational Affairs). Act 48 authorizes agents of the Bureau to issue citations and impose civil penalties under schedules adopted by the Commissioner in consultation with the Bureau's boards and commissions. Act 48 citations streamline the disciplinary process by eliminating the need for formal orders to show cause, answers, adjudications and orders, and

consent agreements. At the same time, licensees who receive an Act 48 citation retain their due process right of appeal prior to the imposition of discipline. The use of Act 48 citations has increased steadily since 1996, when the program was first implemented, and they have become an important part of the Bureau's enforcement efforts, with approximately 30% of sanctions imposed by the boards and commissions being accomplished through the Act 48 citation process.

The Commissioner recently consulted with the Board regarding the adoption of a schedule of civil penalties for violation of certain provisions of the Veterinary Medicine Practice Act and the regulations of the Board that would appear to lend themselves to the Act 48 summary procedures such as advertising violations, failure to display a license and practicing as a veterinarian or veterinary technician on an expired license or certificate. Prior to adoption of the civil penalty schedule, the Commissioner's representative consulted with the Board, who then approved the civil penalty schedule set forth in Annex A at a regular public meeting of the Board held on February 27, 2007.

The civil penalties set forth in Annex A are effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and apply to acts, omissions or violations occurring on and after the date of publication.

STATE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Nutrient Management Rules and Regulations

The State Conservation Commission (SCC) is proposing to amend Chapter 83, Subchapter B, Conservation District Fund Allocation Program—Statement of Policy (CDFAP SOP).

In July 2006, Senate Bill 1224 was signed into law creating authorization for a new Conservation District Fund. This legislation amended the existing Conservation District Law and directed the State Conservation Commission (SCC), in cooperation with the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) and the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA), to create a new special nonlapsing fund (The Conservation District Fund). Under this legislation, the SCC was specifically authorized to establish procedures for advanced payments to county conservation districts and to provide funding for activities necessary to meet the requirements of the Conservation District Law.

The SCC's CDFAP SOP guides the distribution of specific funds from DEP and PDA for transfer to county conservation districts. It is the vehicle through which the SCC disburses funds to districts for conservation district manager's cost-share, technical assistance cost-share, administrative assistance and other special project funds.

The SCC intends to amend its current published CDFAP SOP to incorporate changes necessary to implement the provisions of the Conservation District Fund legislation.

General Provisions

§ 83.31. Purpose.

The Commission proposes numerous additions to better describe the purpose of the CDFAP SOP and the new nonlapsing "Conservation District Fund." The Commission proposes to delete the list of program funding priorities.

§ 83.32. Definitions.

The Commission proposes adding definitions for the Agricultural Conservation Technical Assistance Program, Agricultural Area Security Law, Conservation District Management Staff, Cooperating Organization, Erosion and Sediment Control Program, National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Permitting Program and the PDA. The Commission also proposes adding "and engineer" to the "Conservation district technician" definition.

§ 83.33. Eligible expenses.

This is a new section consolidating eligible expenses from the existing CDFAP SOP sections. Additional salary-related expenses that may be reimbursed are also proposed in this section.

§ 83.34. Application procedures.

This is a new section consolidating application procedures from existing CDFAP SOP sections.

§ 83.35. Procedures for allocating funds.

This is a new section describing how funds will generally be allocated to conservation districts and general restrictions that may be imposed based on the intent of the funding.

§ 83.36. Procedures for advance payments.

This is a new section describing how advance payments to conservation districts for manager and technical costshare and administrative assistance will be determined.

§ 83.37. Reimbursement requirements and procedures.

This is a new section consolidating reimbursement requirements and procedures from existing CDFAP SOP sections. This section also defines what reports and documents are required by the Commission and the due date for each. Sanctions for missing a due date are also defined in this section.

§ 83.38. Reporting requirements.

This is a new section consolidating reporting requirements from existing CDFAP SOP sections. This section also requires the conservation district to use the Conservation

vation District E-commerce System for submission of forms and reports to the greatest extent possible.

§ 83.39. Record retention requirements.

This is a new section consolidating record retention requirements from existing CDFAP SOP sections and adding the following:

(b) Any conservation district receiving funds under any program element under this subchapter shall maintain in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles all books, records, receipts, financial statements, and other documents pertaining to any program element or special project under this program. These records shall be retained a minimum of 3 years, commencing at the end of the fiscal year of funding. The records shall be made available to the Commission, PDA, DEP, or their agents upon request.

<u>Conservation District Management Cost Share</u> <u>Program</u>

§ 83.41. General requirements.

The Commission proposes to delete the local funding requirement for the manager's cost share program and delete the duplicate information that is proposed for consolidation in the *General Provisions* section.

§ 83.42. Application procedures.

The Commission proposes to delete the duplicate information that is proposed for consolidation in the *General Provisions* section.

§ 83.43. Reporting requirements.

The Commission proposes to delete the duplicate information that is proposed for consolidation in the *General Provisions* section.

§ 83.44. Reimbursement procedures.

The Commission proposes to delete the duplicate information that is proposed for consolidation in the *General Provisions* section.

§ 83.45. Procedures for allocating funds.

The Commission proposes to delete the duplicate information that is proposed for consolidation in the *General Provisions* section.

The Commission proposes to use current and anticipated salary and salary related costs to determine the conservation district management staff's cost-share. Currently the salary and salary related costs from the previous fiscal year are used.

§ 83.46. Record retention requirements.

The Commission proposes to delete the duplicate information that is proposed for consolidation in the *General Provisions* section.

Administrative Assistance Funding Program

§ 83.51. General requirements and eligibility.

The Commission proposes to delete the duplicate information that is proposed for consolidation in the *General Provisions* section.

The Commission proposes to add the ability to compensate conservation districts for the administrative work they provide to their local agricultural land preservation boards without the need for a special projects agreement.

§ 83.52. Procedures for allocating funds.

The Commission proposes to delete the duplicate information that is proposed for consolidation in the *General Provisions* section.

The Commission proposes moving subsections (a) and (b) from § 83.53 and including them in this section as paragraphs (1) and (3) and adding a paragraph (2).

- (c) Contingent on the availability of funds, the Commission, at its discretion, also has the option to reimburse conservation districts for:
- (1) Extraordinary travel and administrative expenses in excess of the initial administrative assistance grant.
- (2) Additional eligible expenses in providing administrative support, or other services to a county, state or Federal program where the conservation district accepts administrative responsibility and program implementation activities.
- (3) The Commission may also reimburse a district for the travel expenses of a district for the travel expenses of a district director, associate director or staff person to attend a meeting or conference at the request of the Commission.

§ 83.53. Application procedures for reimbursement.

The Commission proposes to delete the duplicate information that is proposed for $\S~83.52$ and add new language.

§ 83.54. Reimbursement procedures.

The Commission proposes to add the ability to reimburse for extraordinary travel and administrative expenses twice a year at the Commission's discretion.

§ 83.55. Reporting procedures.

The Commission proposes to add the current reporting requirement of the annual financial audit to the SOP. The Commission also proposes that a conservation district accepting funds for administrative activities of programs other than general conservation district programs or fulfillment of requirements of the act and this subchapter shall provide a quarterly report of activities and accomplishments that have resulted from the expenditure of these funds as required by the Commission or guidelines established for that program.

Technical Assistance Cost Share Program

§ 83.61. General requirements.

There are numerous additions proposed to this section describing the Agricultural Conservation Technical Assistance Cost Share Program and the cost share for agricultural technicians and engineers.

The Commission also proposes language to better describe the certifications that will be recognized for conservation district technicians and the deletion of the local funding requirement for the district technician and engineer cost share program.

§ 83.62. Application procedures.

The Commission proposes to delete the duplicate information that is proposed for consolidation in the *General Provisions* section.

§ 83.63. Reporting requirements.

The Commission proposes to delete the duplicate information that is proposed for consolidation in the *General Provisions* section.

§ 83.64. Procedures for allocating funds.

The Commission proposes to use current and anticipated salary and salary-related costs to determine the conservation district technician and engineer's cost-share. Currently the salary and salary-related costs from the previous fiscal year are used.

§ 83.65. Reimbursement procedures.

The Commission proposes to delete the duplicate information that is proposed for consolidation in the *General Provisions* section.

§ 83.66. Special requirements.

The Commission proposes to delete the duplicate information that is proposed for consolidation in the *General Provisions* section.

Special Projects Funding Program

§ 83.73. Procedures for allocating funds.

The Commission proposes to delete the reference to maintaining a reserve fund for special projects. Due to the creation of the nonlapsing Conservation District Fund, there is no longer a need for this ability.

§ 83.74. Reporting requirements.

The Commission proposes to delete the duplicate information that is proposed for consolidation in the *General Provisions* section.

Forfeiture and Special Provisions

§ 83.81. Forfeiture.

The Commission proposes consolidation of language and additional language to clarify how funds will be handled in case of forfeiture.

§ 83.82. Special provisions.

The Commission proposes to expand its ability to delegate its authority to additional Commonwealth departments and staff.

Under section 16 of the act, the Department of Education on May 22, 2007, advised the Commission that it did not oppose the reinstatement application. In accordance with the act and 1 Pa. Code Part II (relating to General Rules of Administrative Practice and Procedure), the Commission will appoint a hearing examiner to serve as presiding officer to conduct the proceedings and hearings as might be necessary and to prepare a proposed

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report to the Commission containing findings of fact, conclusions of law and a recommended decision on the application.

Interested parties wishing to participate in these hearing procedures must file a notice of intervention or a petition to intervene in accordance with 1 Pa. Code §§ 35.27—35.32 (relating to intervention) within 30 days after publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Persons objecting to the approval of the application may also, within 30 days after publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, file a protest in accordance with 1 Pa. Code § 35.23 (relating to protest generally).

For NPDES renewal applications in Section I, the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has made a tentative determination to reissue these permits for 5 years subject to effluent limitations and monitoring and reporting requirements in their current permits, with appropriate and necessary updated requirements to reflect new and changed regulations and other requirements.

For applications for new NPDES permits and renewal applications with major changes in Section II, as well as applications for MS4 individual permits and individual stormwater construction permits in Sections IV and VI, the Department, based upon preliminary reviews, has made a tentative determination of proposed effluent limitations and other terms and conditions for the permit applications. These determinations are published as proposed actions for comments prior to taking final actions.

Unless indicated otherwise, the EPA Region III Administrator has waived the right to review or object to proposed NPDES permit actions under the waiver provision in 40 CFR 123.24(d).

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES application are invited to submit a statement to the regional office noted before an application within 30 days from the date of this public notice. Persons wishing to comment on a WQM permit application are invited to submit a statement to the regional office noted before the application within 15 days from the date of this public notice. Comments received within the respective comment periods will be considered in the final determinations regarding the applications. Comments should include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests for a public hearing on applications. A public hearing may be held if the responsible office considers the public response significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. The Department will postpone its final determination until after a public hearing is held.

LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

UNDER ACT 2, 1995

PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to

Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the Background Standard, Statewide Health Standard, the Site-Specific Standard or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department, A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, a combination of the cleanup standards or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under $\S\S 304(n)(1)(ii)$ and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a Site-Specific Standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a Site-Specific Standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality within which the site is located may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified as the remediator of the site develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

For further information concerning the content of a Notice of Intent to Remediate, contact the environmental cleanup program manager in the Department regional office before which the notice appears. If information concerning this acknowledgment is required in an alternative form, contact the community relations coordinator at the appropriate regional office. The plan approval will include monitoring, testing, recordkeeping and reporting requirements designed to keep the facility operating within all applicable air quality requirements.

The Department of Environmental Protection's (Department) review of the plan approval application and information submitted by White Pines Corporation indicates that the proposed landfill gas extraction, collection and flaring system will meet all applicable air quality requirements pertaining to air contamination sources and the emission of air contaminants, including the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12. Based on these findings, the Department intends to issue a plan approval for the landfill gas extraction, collection and flaring system. Additionally, if the Department determines that the landfill gas extraction, collection and flaring system are operating in compliance with all plan approval conditions, the conditions established in the plan approval will be incorporated into the State-only operating permit No. 19-322-002E by means of an administrative amendment under 25 Pa. Code § 127.450.

The following is a summary of the conditions the Department proposes to place in the plan approval to ensure compliance with all applicable regulatory requirements:

- 1. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the PM emissions from the exhaust of ID C001, associated with Source ID P101, shall not exceed 0.01 grains per dry standard cubic foot (gr/dscf).
- 2. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the SOx emissions from the exhaust of ID C001, associated with Source ID P101, shall not

- exceed 65 parts per million on a dry volume basis (ppmdv) and $0.38~{\rm lb/hr}$ and $1.66~{\rm tons}$ in any 12-consecutive month period.
- 3. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the NOx emissions from the exhaust of ID C001, associated with Source ID P101, shall not exceed 1.08 lb/hr and 4.73 tons in any 12-consecutive month period.
- 4. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the CO emissions from the exhaust of ID C001, associated with Source ID P101, shall not exceed 3.88 lb/hr and 17.0 tons in any 12-consecutive month period.
- 5. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the nonmethane organic compound emissions from the exhaust of ID C001, associated with Source ID P101, shall not exceed 0.14 lb/hr and 0.61 ton in any 12-consecutive month period.
- 6. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the HAP emissions from the exhaust of ID C001, associated with Source ID P101, shall not exceed 1.86 lb/hr and 8.15 tons in any 12-consecutive month period.
- 7. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12 and in compliance with 25 Pa. Code 123.41, there shall be no visible air contaminant emissions from the flare exceeding 10% opacity at any time.
- 8. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the total amount of waste disposed of in the landfill shall not exceed 930,764 tons at any time.
- 9. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, at no time shall more than 2,500 cubic feet of landfill gas per minute be burned in the flare (ID C001).
- 10. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the permittee shall perform stack testing to determine the nonmethane organic compounds emission rate as well as the nonmethane organic compounds destruction efficiency on the exhaust from ID C001 (associated with Source ID P101) within 180 days from the initial date of operation of ID C001 (associated with Source ID P101) to demonstrate compliance with their respective emission limitations. All testing is to be done while ID C001 is operating at its normal operating rate and using reference method test procedures acceptable to the Department.
- 11. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the permittee shall conduct monitoring in the first week of every January, April, July and October for positive pressure, temperature and percent oxygen at each gas collection wellhead and for the offsite migration of landfill gas at each of the perimeter wells. When the wellhead monitoring data shows that sufficient landfill gases are being generated or the perimeter well monitoring data shows that offsite migration of landfill gases is occurring, the permittee shall begin the active collection and flaring of the landfill gases. Regardless of the results of the monitoring data, the permittee shall begin the active collection and flaring of landfill gas from a cell within 2 years of its respective final closure date unless the permittee can demonstrate to the Department's satisfaction that said collection and control is not yet warranted. The results of the monitoring shall be forwarded to the Department within 7 days of performing said monitoring and shall be in a format acceptable to the

Department. The Department reserves its' right to alter the frequency of said monitoring if it determines it is necessary.

- 12. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, The permittee shall keep accurate and comprehensive records of the following information:
- (1) The number of tons of waste disposed of each month.
 - (2) The date that each cell begins accepting waste.
- (3) The results of the quarterly monitoring conducted at the gas collection wellheads and perimeter wells required by the monitoring requirements of this plan approval.
- (4) Continuous temperature records generated by the flare temperature monitoring and recording system and all landfill gas flow rate records generated by the flare inlet landfill gas flow rate monitoring and recording system.
- (5) The date of final closure of each cell and the date the perimeter gas wells are installed.
- All records required by this condition shall be retained for at least 5 years and shall be made available to the Department upon request.
- 13. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the permittee shall notify the Department within 15 days of selecting any specific flare intended for construction at this site and shall provide detailed specifications for the respective flare at the same time for Department approval.
- 14. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, the Department reserves the right to require the permittee to make any or all of the following modifications or improvements to the landfill gas collection system and/or practices in use at this site should the Department determine that such modifications or improvements are needed for the landfill to comply with the malodorous air contaminant emission requirement of 25 Pa. Code § 123.31 or the requirements specified in any other applicable rule or regulation of the Department:
- (1) The use of a cementitious material identified as "Posi-Shell" (or an alternate material determined by the Department to be equivalent to "Posi-Shell") for alternate daily cover.
- (2) The use of a temporary geomembrane cover over the intermediate cover.
- (3) The use of temporary landfill gas collection lines beneath the temporary geomembrane cover.
- (4) The use of leachate recirculation lines as landfill gas collection lines.

The permittee may voluntarily make any of the previously listed modifications or improvements at any time without obtaining plan approval from the Department.

- 15. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, if waste is still being disposed of in a cell more than 2 years after the date of initial waste deposition in the respective cell, the company shall collect and control the landfill gas generated in that cell unless the company can demonstrate to the Departments' satisfaction that said collection and control is not yet warranted.
- 16. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, ID C001 (associated with Source ID

P101) shall incorporate the following design features and/or meet the following criteria:

- (a) The flare shall be equipped with a continuous pilot ignition source using propane as fuel.
- (b) The flare shall be equipped with instrumentation that shall measure and record the landfill gas flow rate continuously.
- (c) The flare shall be equipped with a low-fire burner assembly to fire landfill gas at flow rates as low as 3 cubic feet per minute.
- (d) A sufficient flow of propane shall be fed to the flare during startup or restart so that a flame is supported and unburned landfill gas is not emitted to the atmosphere.
- (e) There shall be no visible flame from the exhaust of the flare.
- (f) The flare shall, at all times landfill gas is being ducted to it, achieve a nonmethane organic compound destruction efficiency of at least 98%, by weight.
- (g) The flare shall maintain a temperature of at least 1,600° F at any time landfill gas is ducted to the flare and the landfill gas shall be held at this temperature within the flare for at least 1.0 second by the time the gas temperature is monitored.
- (h) The flare shall be equipped with a continuous temperature monitoring and recording system having an accuracy of plus or minus 1°F which shall log the temperature of the effluent gas from the flare at all times it is in use. The temperature sensor incorporated in this system shall be positioned at the location within the flare such that the landfill gas being burned will have been in the flare for at least 1.0 second by the time the gas temperature is monitored.
- (i) The flare shall be equipped with an ultraviolet (heat-sensing) flame scanner.
- (j) In the event that the ultraviolet (heat-sensing) flame scanner does not detect a flame or the flare is not operating at a minimum temperature of $1,600^{\circ}$ F or is operating in excess of $2,000^{\circ}$ F, an automatic shut-off device shall immediately stop the flow of landfill gas to the flare, the flare shall be automatically shut-down, and an alarm will be activated.
- (k) The flare shall at any point in time be capable of accommodating the maximum landfill gas collection rate that will exist at that respective point in time.

The permittee shall not, however, commence the construction of any flare until specifications for the specific flare the permittee intends to construct have first been submitted to the Department and the Department has subsequently informed the permittee that it has determined that the respective flare is capable of complying with all requirements specified herein.

- 17. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, Source ID P101 is the landfill gas extraction and collection system and ID C001 is the flaring system for the control of air contaminant emissions from Source ID P101 at the White Pines residual waste landfill in Pine Township, Columbia County.
- 18. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, There shall be no landfill gas leaks which result in concentration of 500 ppmv or more measured as propane (or 1,375 ppmv or more measured as methane) at a distance of 0.5 inch from any equipment. Nonrepeatable and momentary readings shall not be considered. The landfill equipment subject to this

- requirement shall include the gas wells, piping or any other connections or fittings along the landfill gas transfer paths of a landfill gas collection system, energy recovery, gas purification and/or any other disposal system. If leaks of landfill gas are occurring from the system, any such leaks shall be immediately repaired and reported to the Department.
- 19. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, once a cell has gone through final closure, the permittee shall install perimeter gas monitoring wells within 180 days of final closure as described in the application and supplemental materials submitted for plan approval.
- 20. Under the BAT requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12, under no circumstance shall the landfill gas be vented to the atmosphere without first being exposed to the flare (ID C001) in accordance with all requirements of this plan approval. In addition, under no circumstance shall the landfill gas be vented directly from the gas collection wells to the atmosphere.

The entire project is located in Manheim Township, Lancaster County.

Draft Assessment and Listing Methodology; Notice of Availability for Public Comment

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) is making available for public comment its draft Assessment and Listing Methodology (methodology). Sections 305(b) and 303(d) of the Federal Clean Water Act require states to report on the condition of all their waters in the biannual Integrated Report (report). The report combines the comprehensive Section 305(b) report concerning the status of water quality in this Commonwealth and the Section 303(d) list of waters including those for which Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDLs) are required.

Stream and lake evaluations presented in the report must be supported by assessment methodologies based on sound science and technical procedures that are clear and complete. This methodology is a compilation of the protocols used to assess waters that will appear in the 2008 Integrated Report.

The protocols comprising the methodology describe the field data collection procedures and data analysis methods used to both obtain and evaluate water quality data. The individual protocols apply to a wide range of water resource types, data sources and environmental indicators. The Instream Comprehensive Evaluation document describes the Department's assessment strategy for freestone streams. Other field protocols are presented for use in surface waters that present different aquatic habitats.

The draft methodology is available on the Department's website at www.depweb.state.pa.us (Select "Water" in the top menu bar and then "Water Quality" in the drop down menu. The methodology appears under the heading "What's New" on this page). Due to the large number of pages the methodology will not be available in hardcopy.

Proposed Addition to List of Class A Wild Trout Waters

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) is considering changes to its list of Class A Wild Trout Streams. Under 58 Pa. Code § 57.8a (relating to Class A wild trout streams), it is the Commission's policy to manage self-sustaining Class A wild trout populations as a renewable natural resource to conserve that resource and the angling it provides. Class A wild trout populations represent the best of this Commonwealth's naturally reproducing trout fisheries. The Commission manages these stream sections solely for the perpetuation of the wild trout fishery with no stocking.

Criteria developed for Class A Wild Trout fisheries are species specific. Wild Trout Abundance Class Criteria include provisions for:

- (i) Wild Brook Trout Fisheries.
- (A) Total brook trout biomass of at least 30 kg/ha (26.7 lbs/acre).
- (B) Total biomass of brook trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 0.1 kg/ha (0.089 lb/acre).

- (C) Brook trout biomass must comprise at least 75% of the total trout biomass.
 - (ii) Wild Brown Trout Fisheries.
- (A) Total brown trout biomass of at least 40 kg/ha (35.6 lbs/acre).
- (B) Total biomass of brown trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 0.1 kg/ha (0.089 lb/acre).
- (C) Brown trout biomass must comprise at least 75% of the total trout biomass.
 - (iii) Mixed Wild Brook and Brown Trout Fisheries.
- (A) Combined brook and brown trout biomass of at least 40 kg/ha (35.6 lbs/acre).
- (B) Total biomass of brook trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 0.1 kg/ha (0.089 lb/acre).
- (C) Total biomass of brown trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least $0.1\ kg/ha$ (0.089 lb/acre).
- (D) Brook trout biomass must comprise less than 75% of the total trout biomass.
- (E) Brown trout biomass must comprise less than 75% of the total trout biomass.
 - (iv) Wild Rainbow Trout Fisheries.

Total biomass of rainbow trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 2.0 kg/ha (1.78 lbs/acre).

For a water to be removed from the Class A Wild Trout Streams designation, total trout biomass must be documented below the set criteria for two consecutive stream examinations.

At its meeting on July 16 and 17, 2007, the Commission intends to consider adding Middle Spring Creek, Section 01, in Cumberland County to its list of Class A Wild Trout Streams. Section 01 of Middle Spring Creek extends from its source downstream 1.48 miles to Avon Road (T-303). On August 10 and 18, 2006, a Petersen mark-recapture population estimate was conducted at two stations within this section to quantify the wild brown trout population. The stations encompassed 27% of the total length of Section 01. During the survey, a total of 462 wild brown trout, which ranged in total length from 75 mm to 475 mm, were collected. The Section 01 wild brown trout biomass estimate was 76.60 kg/ha. Fish less than 150 mm in total length had a biomass of 17.00 kg/ha. The wild brown trout population documented in Section 01 of Middle Spring Creek exceeds the minimum Class A criteria of a total population biomass estimate of 40 kg/ha with the biomass of trout less than 150 mm comprising at least 0.1 kg/ha.
