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READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where “no fiscal impact” is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

N211. Argument Lists, Requests for Findings and Conclusions

(d) Oral Argument—When each case is called, the parties shall state to the Court (1) whether briefs are filed and (2) whether any party requests oral argument

on the matter before the Court. Cases on the argument list may be submitted on briefs, if all parties agree to waive oral argument. If all parties agree to submission on briefs, counsel need not appear for the call of the argument list; rather, counsel for the moving party shall provide written notice to the Court Administrator that all parties agree that the case may be submitted on the briefs.

N1308. Appeal by Party not Present at Hearing

If a party who was not present at a hearing before a Board of Arbitration appeals the decision of the Board of Arbitration, the non-appealing party may petition for reasonable counsel fees and expenses for the arbitration proceeding. The court may award said fees and expenses unless the absence was for good cause. An award of said fees and expenses shall be paid within thirty days of the order; in default thereof, the court may impose sanctions.

N4008. Deposition by Oral Examination

Unless leave of Court is obtained or all parties agree otherwise, and excerpting videotape depositions for use at trial, all depositions in cases filed with this Court shall be taken in Northampton County, Pennsylvania.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 61—REVENUE

TREASURY DEPARTMENT

[61 PA. CODE CH. 951]

Estimation Calculations for Determining Unclaimed Property Liability

The Treasury Department (Treasury) adds § 951.8 (relating to estimation calculations) to read as set forth in Annex A. This final-form rulemaking sets forth the estimation procedures to be used by the Treasury where a holder of unclaimed property has insufficient records to determine its actual amount of liability.

Effective Date

The final-form rulemaking will be effective immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

Under section 1301.26(b) of The Fiscal Code (act) (72 P. S. § 1301.26(b)), the Treasury is required to promulgate regulations regarding estimation calculations applicable when a holder of unclaimed property has insufficient records to conduct an examination as authorized under section 1301.23(a) of the act (72 P. S. § 1301.23(a)).

Background and Purpose

Although holders of unclaimed property should maintain records to account for their liability, the Treasury routinely encounters holders who maintain partial or no records prior to an examination by the Treasury. Therefore, it is necessary for the Treasury to estimate this liability when holders cannot have their unclaimed property liability determined due to a lack of, or inadequate, recordkeeping.

Description of Final-Form Rulemaking

The final-form rulemaking adds § 951.8 to authorize the Treasury to apply estimation calculations when records are insufficient to conduct an examination as authorized under section 1301.23 of the act.

The final-form rulemaking is necessary to encourage better recordkeeping regarding unclaimed property within the holder community to ensure that rightful owners are notified of their right to claim this property in the custody of holders.

The final-form rulemaking is limited in its application and would not be authorized when records are available to conduct an examination by the Treasury.

Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirement

The final-form rulemaking has no fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. Furthermore, the final-form rulemaking is not anticipated to require any legal requirements or create any additional accounting, reporting or other paperwork not currently being performed by the Treasury during its examinations of holders.

Sunset Date

The Treasury continuously monitors the cost effectiveness of its regulations and, therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on February 6, 2003, the Treasury submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 32 Pa.B. 5893 (November 30, 2002), to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the House and Senate Standing Committees on Appropriations and Finance for review and comment.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC and the Committees were provided with copies of the comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. In preparing this final-form rulemaking, the Treasury has considered the comments received from IRRC, the Committees and the public.

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act, this final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the House and Senate Committees. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on May 8, 2003, and approved the final-form rulemaking.

Findings

The Treasury finds that:

(1) Public notice of the intention to adopt this final-form rulemaking was given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) A public comment period was provided as required by law and all comments were considered.

(3) The Treasury received a recommendation from IRRC to rephrase its proposed rulemaking to improve clarity. The Treasury has made the recommended changes to the final-form rulemaking as set forth in Annex A.

(4) The Treasury has not received any other comments, objections or recommendations pertaining to the final-form rulemaking.

(5) The final-form rulemaking is necessary and appropriate for the administration of the act.

Order

The Treasury, acting under authorizing statute, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Treasury, 61 Pa. Code Chapter 951, are amended by adding § 951.8 to read as set forth in Annex A.

(b) The Treasury shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General for review and approval as to legality and form as required by law.

(c) The Treasury shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) The order shall take effect immediately following final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

TITLE 61. REVENUE

PART VIII. TREASURY DEPARTMENT

**CHAPTER 951. ABANDONED AND UNCLAIMED
PROPERTY**

§ 951.8 Estimation calculations.

(a) A holder subject to an examination of records as provided for in section 1301.23(a) of The Fiscal Code (71 P. S. § 1301.23(a)) is required to comply with requests by the State Treasurer or an authorized third party to make records available for examination.

(b) When a holder's records do not exist or when a holder's records are insufficient for examination, the State Treasurer may apply sampling and estimation procedures to determine a holder's liability. Sampling and estimation procedures will be applied in accordance with standards of the American Institute of Certified Public Accounts (AICPA) and the United States General Accounting Office (USGAO).

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CHS. 51 AND 63] General Provisions; Fishing

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapters 51 and 63 (relating to administrative provisions; and general fishing regulations). The Commission is publishing this proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code).

A. *Effective Date*

The proposed rulemaking, if approved on final-form rulemaking, will go into effect upon publication of an order adopting the amendments in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. *Contact Person*

C. *Statutory Authority*

The proposed amendments to § 51.9 (relating to release of documents and records) are published under the statutory authority of section 8(a) of the Right-to-Know Law (65 P. S. § 66.8(a)) and section 506 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 186). The proposed amendments to §§ 51.84 and 63.8 (relating to review of permit applications; and long bows, spears and gigs) are published under the statutory authority of section 2102 of the code (relating to rules and regulations).

D. *Purpose and Background*

The proposed rulemaking is designed to update, modify and improve the Commission's regulations pertaining to administrative provisions and fishing. The specific purpose of the proposed rulemaking is described in more detail under the summary of proposal.

E. *Summary of Proposal*

(1) *Section 51.9.* On December 26, 2002, amendments to the law went into effect. The amended law provides that agencies shall establish written policies and may promulgate regulations necessary to implement the law. The amended law also provides that written policies shall include the name of the office to which requests for access shall be addressed and a list of applicable fees. Although the Commission already has a regulation pertaining to the release of documents and records, the Commission proposes updating this regulation to read as set forth in Annex A.

(2) *Section 51.84.* A recent review of the Commission's regulations pertaining to permits to draw off impounded waters has revealed that a housekeeping change to this section is needed in that the Commission no longer has an environmental and technical liaison. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to amend this section to read as set forth in Annex A.

(3) *Section 63.8.* The Commission recently amended its Lake Erie regulations to prohibit spear fishing in or along

Lake Erie tributary streams. To be consistent, the Commission proposes to amend this section to read as set forth in Annex A.

F. *Paperwork*

The proposed rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements.

G. *Fiscal Impact*

The proposed rulemaking will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The proposed rulemaking will impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public with the exception of the proposed amendments to § 51.9, which impose a charge for certified copies of \$1 per page up to \$5 per document. The impact of this charge will be nominal. All other charges remain unchanged.

H. *Public Comments*

Interested persons are invited to submit written comments, objections or suggestions about the proposed rulemaking to the Executive Director, Fish and Boat Commission, P. O. Box 67000, Harrisburg, PA 17106-7000 within 30 days after publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Comments submitted by facsimile will not be accepted.

In addition, all electronic comments must be contained in the text of the transmission, not in an attachment. TITLE 58. RECREATION

PART II. FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

Subpart A. GENERAL PROVISIONS

CHAPTER 51. ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

Subchapter A. PRELIMINARY PROVISIONS

§ 51.9. Release of documents and records.

(a) Consistent with the act of June 21, 1957 (P. L. 390, No. 212), **as amended by the act of June 29, 2002 (P. L. 663, No. 100) and commonly known as Right-to-Know Law (65 P. S. §§ 66.1—[66.4.] 66.9)**, and section 324 of the code (relating to Commission records), the Commission will make public records contained in its files available to **[citizens of this Commonwealth] requesters** for inspection and **[examination at reasonable times and will allow requesters to make extracts and copies of the records subject to reasonable restrictions to safeguard the records and reasonable procedures on the time and place for making copies and extracts] duplication during the Commission's regular business hours of 8:00 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday (excluding Commonwealth holidays).**

(b) Requests for release of public records contained in Commission files shall be made in writing and submitted to: Executive Director, Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission, Post Office Box 67000, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania 17106-7000. **Written requests for release of public records may be sent by mail or by means of facsimile, or they may be delivered in person during the Commission's regular business hours. The Commission will not accept anonymous, oral or e-mail requests.**

(c) If a photocopier or reproduction device under the control of the Commission is used to **[copy] duplicate** information released under this section, the requester will be charged 25¢ per letter or legal size page for the copies. If the Commission copies oversize pages (in excess of legal size), the charge **[shall] will** be \$1 per page or the actual cost of **[reproduction] duplication**, whichever is greater. If the Commission copies documents to electronic media (such as, computer diskette), the requester will be charged \$1 per document copied (if 1 megabyte or less in size) plus \$2 per diskette. For electronic documents of more than 1 megabyte in size, the requester will be charged \$3 per document plus \$10 or the cost of the media on which the document is stored, whichever is greater. **The Commission will charge \$1 per page up to \$5 per document for certified copies.** If the Commission mails copies of documents **[copied] duplicated** under this section to the requester, the requester will be charged **[\$2 for handling, plus]** the actual cost of postage or shipping. All charges shall be payable **[in advance]** by check or money order made payable to "Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission." **The Commission may require a requester to prepay fees if the fees are expected to exceed \$100.** The Commission may waive copy charges and mailing charges for good cause or in the public interest. When the total copying **[, handling]** and mailing charges for a request are \$10 or less, **[collection ordinarily will be waived] the Commission ordinarily will waive collection.**

Subchapter I. PERMITS TO DRAW OFF IMPOUNDED WATERS

§ 51.84. Review of permit applications.

A permit application will be reviewed by the **[Fish and Boat Commission Environmental and Technical Liaison] Commission's Division of Environmental Services** and by the Department of Environmental Protection, Bureau of Dams and Waterways Management. The **[Environmental and Technical Liaison] Division of Environmental Services** will issue permits for the Commission.

Subpart B. FISHING

CHAPTER 63. GENERAL FISHING REGULATIONS

§ 63.8. Long bows, spears and gigs.

(a) *General.* Except as otherwise provided in this part, carp, gar, suckers and eels may be taken with a long bow, including compound, and arrow; a spear; or gig any hour of the day or night aided by a light at night if so desired,

in Commonwealth waters and waters bounding and adjacent thereto **[; except that there may be no spearing in the tributaries of Lake Erie from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. daily]**.

**[58 PA. CODE CHS. 65, 69 AND 97]
Fishing; Boating**

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapters 65, 69 and 97 (relating to special fishing regulations; fishing in Lake Erie and boundary lakes; and operator provided equipment). The Commission is publishing this proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code).

A. Effective Date

The proposed rulemaking, if approved on final-form rulemaking, will go into effect on January 1, 2004, or upon publication of an order adopting the amendments in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, whichever occurs later.

B. Contact Person

C. Statutory Authority

The proposed amendment to § 65.24 (relating to miscellaneous special regulations) is published under the statutory authority of section 2307 of the code (relating to waters limited to specific purposes). The proposed amendments to § 69.12 (relating to seasons, sizes and creel limits—Lake Erie and Lake Erie tributaries) are published under the statutory authority of section 2102 of the code (relating to rules and regulations). The proposed amendments to § 69.33 (relating to use of trap nets) are published under the statutory authority of section 2903 of the code (relating to boats and net licenses for boundary lakes). The proposed amendments to § 97.2 (relating to fire extinguisher) are published under the statutory authority of section 5123 of the code (relating to general boating regulations).

D. Purpose and Background

The proposed rulemaking is designed to update, modify and improve the Commission's regulations pertaining to fishing and boating. The specific purpose of the proposed rulemaking is described in more detail under the summary of proposal. The Commission's Boating Advisory Board (BAB) considered the proposed amendments to Chapter 97 and recommended that the Commission publish a notice of proposed rulemaking containing the proposed amendments.

E. Summary of Proposal

(1) *Section 65.24.* In the mid-1990s, miscellaneous special regulations were established on 228-acre Duck Harbor Pond to enhance management for larger trout. A 14-inch minimum length limit and two trout per day creel limit were imposed to enable hatchery fingerling and adult trout to attain a larger size given suitable habitat

and forage for year around trout survival and growth. Results of sampling efforts have not given Commission staff reason to continue with the more restrictive regulations. In addition, it is suspected that the more restrictive regulations have discouraged trout anglers from fishing the lake as spring stocked trout averaging 10 inches or so in length are smaller than the legal size. Commission staff would like to continue stocking trout in Duck Harbor Pond but with Statewide regulations to encourage greater use at the lake. Accordingly, the Commission proposes deleting the miscellaneous special regulation on Duck Harbor Pond as set forth in Annex A. By removing the miscellaneous special regulation, Duck Harbor Pond will be considered approved trout waters open to year-round fishing. Trout may be harvested during the regular and extended trout seasons in accordance with Statewide regulations.

(2) *Sections 69.12 and 69.33.* Under § 69.12, walleye in Lake Erie and Presque Isle Bay are currently regulated by a season (January 1 to March 15, and first Saturday in May to December 31), a minimum length of 15 inches and a creel limit of six per day. The commercial trap net fishery is regulated by the same season in § 69.31, an annual total allowable catch (set annually) and a 15-inch minimum length limit in § 69.33.

Walleye abundance in Lake Erie has continued to decline since population levels reached historic highs in the late 1980s. The reasons for the decline are not fully known but include repeated years of poor recruitment due in part to weather patterns and temperature variations, a shift in lake productivity due to zebra mussels and increased fishing rates. Sampling by Commission biologists and fisheries managers from the other Lake Erie jurisdictions has revealed that poor to almost nonexistent year classes of walleyes have been produced during 2000 and 2002. The 1999 and 2001 year classes have been stronger and represent the future spawning stock of Lake Erie walleye. Lakewide, the 1999 year class is the strongest since 1986. Thus, steps must be taken to protect these stronger year classes until they have the opportunity to grow and become a part of the adult spawning population.

The Lake Erie Committee (Committee), a subcommittee of the Great Lakes Fishery Commission, which includes representatives of Lake Erie's various jurisdictions, has recognized that walleye populations have dramatically declined. At its annual meeting in March 2003, the Committee held the lakewide total allowable catch (TAC) of walleye, which includes sport and commercial harvest, at a level equal to the last 2 years. The Committee also stated that based on current population and harvest information, a reduction in the TAC is warranted and should be expected in 2004. Additional discussion occurs at the Committee's June 2003 meeting. Jurisdictions are expected to take measures to reduce the harvest of walleye accordingly.

Fishery data collected by Commission biologists indicate that an increased minimum length limit is the most appropriate method for this Commonwealth to reduce the harvest of walleye beginning in 2004. A creel limit reduction will not effectively conserve enough fish to meet the goals. When walleye populations are low, catch rates are down and few people catch their limit of six walleyes. On the other hand, length limits have been shown to be an effective tool in protecting specific segments of a fish population. Creel survey data collected by the Commission from 1993–2002 show that a 20-inch minimum length limit would protect, on average, 31% of walleyes

caught from harvest, including the important 1999 and 2001 year classes. This protection should result in an increased abundance of walleyes less than 20 inches and improve the stability of future spawning stocks. The Commonwealth currently has one licensed commercial fisherman. The proposed length limit would also apply to his activities.

The Commission proposes to amend these sections to read as set forth in Annex A.

(3) *Section 97.2.* This section currently requires a fire extinguisher in all gasoline-powered boats that have the probability for entrapping gasoline vapors in closed compartments. This section is intended to reduce the incidence and severity of fires from ignition of gasoline vapors. The section tracks the Federal regulations on this subject with one exception. The Federal regulations contain examples of boat construction or situations when fire extinguishers are or are not required.

Commission staff's original concept was to present a clarifying amendment to § 97.2 to deal with situations with jon boats and similar craft with after-installed flooring in them. When the Commission's BAB considered this item, it recommended that the Commission approve the publication of a notice of proposed rulemaking containing a broader amendment to require fire extinguishers on all boats with internal combustion motors. Although this proposed rulemaking goes beyond Federal requirements, it has the advantage of setting forth a clear line for requiring fire extinguishers. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to amend § 97.2 to require fire extinguishers on all boats equipped with internal combustion motors.

F. Paperwork

The proposed rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements.

G. Fiscal Impact

The proposed rulemaking will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The proposed rulemaking will impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public.

H. Public Comments

Interested persons are invited to submit written comments, objections or suggestions about the proposed rulemaking to the Executive Director, Fish and Boat Commission, P. O. Box 67000, Harrisburg, PA 17106-7000 within 30 days after publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Comments submitted by facsimile will not be accepted.

Temporary Order Designating Monkey Pox a Dangerous Transmissible Disease

The Department of Agriculture (Department) issues a temporary order designating Monkey Pox a "dangerous transmissible disease" under the authority of 3 Pa.C.S. § 2322(d) (relating to neoplastic diseases, metabolic diseases and heritable diseases). This designation will facilitate the Department's efforts to detect and contain Monkey Pox and to assist the Department of Health and other public health agencies in monitoring and treatment efforts.

Monkey Pox is a disease of public health significance. It also poses a threat to domestic animal health and to the economic well-being of domestic animal industries. Section 2322(c) of 3 Pa.C.S. requires the Department to proceed with the agreement of the Department of Health when it adds a disease of public health significance to the list of designated dangerous transmissible diseases. Both this Department and the Department of Health agree upon adding Monkey Pox to the list of dangerous transmissible diseases.

Monkey Pox is a contagious viral infection that may spread from infected animals to humans. Human to human transmission is also possible. Although previously unknown in the western hemisphere, Monkey Pox has recently been discovered in the United States. The initial outbreak was associated with the importation in April 2003 of Gambian rats from Africa for the pet trade. As these mammals entered wholesale and retail pet marketing channels, the disease spread to a number of states and species—including human infections.

Infected animals may exhibit a variety of signs ranging from no visible symptoms to fever, cough, blepharconjunctivitis, lymphadenopathy, nodular rash or death. In

humans, symptoms may include rash, sore throat, cough, shortness of breath, headache, backache, fever, lymphadenopathy and even death.

Humans and animals can acquire Monkey Pox through direct contact with an infected animal or person, through inhalation or contact with infected body fluids or through contaminated bedding materials. Veterinarians and their staff have been infected by Monkey Pox at a particularly high rate. Infected humans must undergo a 30-day quarantine period. This has a significant impact on both the human and animal health professions when caregivers become infected.

The Department has authority under 3 Pa.C.S. §§ 2301—2389 (relating to the Domestic Animal Law) to regularly monitor the domestic animal population of this Commonwealth to determine the prevalence, incidence and location of transmissible diseases. The designation of Monkey Pox as a "dangerous transmissible disease" will facilitate the Department's surveillance of animals for the presence of Monkey Pox virus or disease.

This order is a temporary order, as required under 3 Pa.C.S. § 2322(d). This order shall take effect on June 18, 2003, and shall remain in effect until no later than June 18, 2004. The Department may: (1) reissue this temporary order to extend the designation beyond June 18, 2004; (2) allow this temporary order to expire June 18, 2004; (3) supplant this temporary order with a formal regulation designating Monkey Pox a "dangerous transmissible disease"; or (4) modify this temporary order.

Andrew Laffey has submitted an application for an individual NPDES permit for an existing and proposed addition to CAFO known as Glenville Farms, 2391 Glenville Road Cochranville, PA 19330 in West Fallowfield Township, **Chester County**.

The existing HDPE-lined manure storage has the capacity of 1.66 million gallons will stay continued in use while two, earthen manure storage lagoons, one at 2391 Glenville Road, has a capacity of 1.2 million gallons and another at 650 Gum Tree Road has a capacity of approximately 0.38 million gallons will be modified by the end of 2005. Persons wishing to comment on the proposed permit are invited to submit written comments to the previous address within 30 days from the date of this public notice. Comments received within this 30-day period will be considered in formulating the Department's final determination regarding the application. Comments should include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the basis of the comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

Following the 30-day comment period, the water management program manager will make a final determination regarding the proposed permit. Notice of this determination will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at which time the determination may be appealed to the Environmental Hearing Board.

LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

UNDER ACT 2, 1995

PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the Background Standard, Statewide Health Stan-

dard, the Site-Specific Standard or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area, must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, a combination of the cleanup standards or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a Site-Specific Standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

For further information concerning the content of a Notice of Intent to Remediate, contact the Environmental Cleanup Program Manager in the Department Regional Office after which the notice appears. If information concerning this acknowledgment is required in an alternative form, contact the Community Relations Coordinator at the appropriate Regional Office listed. 6. Emissions of CO from the thermal oxidizer stack shall be limited to 10.3 tons in any consecutive 12-month period. Compliance with this condition shall be determined through stack testing required in this approval (25 Pa. Code § 127.12b).

7. Stack testing shall be performed within 90 days after the initial start-up of the RTO to determine the following emission rates (25 Pa. Code Chapter 139):

(a) VOCs (as propane) inlet to the RTO expressed in lbs/hr.

(b) VOCs (as propane) exhaust to the atmosphere expressed in lbs/hr.

(c) NO_x (as NO₂) exhaust to the atmosphere expressed in lbs/hr.

(d) CO exhaust to the atmosphere expressed in lbs/hr.

8. The owner/operator shall submit a pretest protocol to the Department for approval at least 30 days prior to the performance of the stack test (25 Pa. Code Chapter 139).

9. Stack testing shall be performed in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapter 139 regulations and the Department's source testing manual.

10. The Department shall be notified at least 2 weeks prior to the date of the stack test so that an observer may be present (25 Pa. Code Chapter 139).

11. Two copies of the stack test results shall be supplied to the Department for review within 60 days of completing the testing (25 Pa. Code Chapter 139).

12. This Plan Approval authorizes temporary operation of the sources covered by this Plan Approval provided the following conditions are met (25 Pa. Code § 127.12b).

(a) The Department must receive written notice from the owner/operator of the completion of construction and the operator's intent to commence operation at least 5 working days prior to the completion of construction. The notice should state when construction will be completed and when operator expects to commence operation.

(b) Operation is authorized only to facilitate the start-up and shake-down of sources and air cleaning devices, to permit operations pending the issuance of an Operating Permit or to permit the evaluation of the sources for compliance with all applicable regulations and requirements.

HAZARDOUS SITES CLEAN-UP UNDER THE ACT OF OCTOBER 18, 1988

Proposed Consent Order and Agreement

East Tenth Street Site, Marcus Hook, Marcus Hook Borough, Delaware County

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department), under the authority of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (HSCA) (35 P.S. §§ 6020.101—6020.1305), has entered into a Consent Order and Agreement (CO&A) with FMC Corporation (FMC) to investigate and remediate certain hazardous substances at the East Tenth Street HSCA Site (Site), Marcus Hook Borough, Delaware County.

The Department has conducted a prompt interim response action at the Site, documented in a public hearing held on September 27, 2000, and a Final End of Project Report dated August 13, 2001, and a site investigation documented in a Final Report dated June 2002. Based on the findings of the investigation, the Department has selected an Interim Response, documented in a Statement of Decision and Response to Comments (SOD) issued December 19, 2002, and an expanded investigation into certain conditions at the Site.

By this agreement, FMC agrees to complete the actions described in the SOD with regard to the Interim Response action and to perform the work described to complete the expanded investigation.

Under section 1113 of the HSCA (35 P.S. § 6020.1113), the Department is publishing notice of this CO&A and will provide a 60-day period for public comment on the CO&A commencing on July 5, 2003. Copies of the CO&A may be examined at the Southeast Regional Office, Lee Park, Suite 6010, 555 North Lane, Conshohocken, PA 19428. Comments should be submitted to April Flipse, Project Officer, at the previous address.

The Department has reserved the right to withdraw its consent to the CO&A if comments submitted during the public comment period disclose facts or considerations which indicate, in the Department's discretion, that the CO&A is inappropriate or not in the public interest.

Pennsylvania Priority List of Hazardous Sites For Remedial Response

1. Background

The HSCA was enacted in 1988 to provide for the cleanup of sites in this Commonwealth that are releasing or threatening the release of hazardous substances. Section 502(a) of the HSCA requires that the Department publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a priority list of sites with releases or threatened releases for the purpose of taking remedial response. This list is called the Pennsylvania Priority List of Hazardous Sites for Remedial Response (PAPL).

2. Placement of Sites on the PAPL

The Department places sites on the PAPL when the Department has determined through investigation that there are releases or threatened releases of hazardous substances or releases or substantial threatened releases of contaminants which present a substantial danger. In accordance with the requirements of section 502(a) of the HSCA, the Hazard Ranking System (HRS) (40 CFR Part 300, Appendix A), established under the Federal Superfund Act, is utilized to rank the sites for placement on the PAPL. The HRS uses mathematical formulas that

reflect the relative importance and interrelationships of the various human health and environmental factors to arrive at a final score on a scale of 0 to 100. The values are assigned using information obtained from site investigations. Section 502(a) of the HSCA also directs the Department to consider its administrative, enforcement and financial capabilities when placing sites on the PAPL.

Placement of a site on the PAPL is used to identify sites which require a remedial response to address threats to the public health, safety or the environment. The Department will decide on a case-by-case basis whether to take enforcement or other actions under the HSCA or other authorities or to proceed directly with HSCA-funded remedial response actions and seek cost recovery after the cleanup. Remedial response actions will not necessarily be taken in the same order as a site's ranking on the PAPL. The investigation conducted to place a site on the PAPL may not be sufficient to determine either the extent of contamination or the appropriate response actions for a site. The Department may undertake further investigations to determine appropriate response actions. The length of time needed to complete these studies will vary due to the complexity of a site. The Department may decide not to immediately proceed with an HSCA remedial action or that no remedial action is necessary.

3. Removal of Sites from the PAPL

Sites are removed from the PAPL in accordance with the requirements section 502(d) of the HSCA. Section 502(d) of the HSCA requires that sites shall be removed from the list upon determination by the Department that the remedial response has been initiated. In cases where a responsible person will be conducting the remedial response under the terms of a settlement with the Department, section 502(d) of the HSCA states that the site "shall be removed upon the determination by the Department that the responsible person has complied with the terms of the settlement and has initiated a cleanup."

4. Statutory Authority

The PAPL is published under the authority of section 502(a) of the HSCA. Under section 502(b) of the HSCA, a decision to place a site on the list or to remove a site from the list is not a final action subject to review under the Environmental Hearing Board Act (35 P.S. §§ 7511-7515), nor shall it confer a right or duty upon the Department or any person.

5. Review and Public Comment

The HSCA provides for a 30-day public comment period subsequent to publication of the PAPL. This announcement opens a 30-day comment period for the sites being removed with this publication. Written comments should be submitted to the regional office in which the site is located. The contact person for each region and their address can be found in the Additional Information section.

The regional office site files contain all information considered by the Department in placing a site on the list or removing a site from the list. The regional office files are available for review in the appropriate regional office, by appointment only, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, excluding State holidays. Arrangements to review the site file can be scheduled by contacting the regional office in which the site is located. The regional contact person for each region and their address can be found in the Additional Information section.

The Department considers all written comments received during the comment period. Written comments and the Department's responses will be placed into the site file and will later be incorporated into the Administrative Record.

6. *Contents of the PAPL*

This notice removes two sites from the PAPL. The site summaries for the sites addressed by this notice are listed as follows. Table 1 lists the sites being removed by this notice. Table 2 lists all sites remaining on the PAPL. The name of the sites, HRS score, municipality, county and region are included in this table. The sites are listed in decreasing order of HRS score.

7. *Site Summaries*

H. K. Porter Site, Hopewell Township, Beaver County—The H. K. Porter Site is on property that includes approximately 17.5 acres approximately 1/4 mile west of the Ohio River. The property is owned by Mount Olivet Catholic Cemetery and consists of a steep ravine with an unnamed tributary flowing through it to the Ohio River. The site consisted of an unpermitted landfill where bulk wastes and drums were end-dumped over the hillside. The Department excavated approximately 95,000 cubic yards of PCB and RCRA contaminated waste and soils from the site and shipped these materials to a permitted offsite facility. Underlying soils were sampled to confirm that established soil cleanup levels were met. Based on this information, the Department determined that no further action was necessary to protect human health or the environment at the Porter site. Wetland areas affected by the Department's action were re-established and continue to be monitored by Department staff to confirm the growing success of the re-established plants. Prior to the Department undertaking an action at this site, the Department entered into a CO&A with the H. K. Porter

Company (Porter), which required Porter to commit \$5.3 million towards the cleanup of the site. No further enforcement action could be taken against Porter based on the stipulations spelled out in the CO&A.

Quakertown Foundry Site, Quakertown Borough and Richland Township, Bucks County—The Quakertown Foundry Site is a 22-acre property used as a foundry from 1929 to 1984 when ownership was transferred to the Borough of Quakertown. Waste materials including casting sands and bag house dust were used as fill both on the original foundry property and on a portion of an adjacent public park used for athletic fields. During the site characterization, the Department determined that these waste materials were from historic foundry operations and contained hazardous levels of lead, cadmium, mercury and chromium. In 1991, the Department conducted an Interim Response Action to erect a security fence around the site. The Department completed the Final Response Action in 2000. The Final Response Action involved the excavation and offsite disposal of contaminated soil and waste material. The Department continues to work with the municipality to help facilitate reuse of the property.

Proposed Consent Order and Agreement

Fayette Equipment/Pete Claim Site, South Union Township, Fayette County

Under section 1113 of the HSCA, the Department is proposing a settlement for the Fayette Equipment/Pete Claim Site (Site). The Site comprises approximately 1 acre located off of Jamison Lane, South Union Township, Fayette County.

From the mid-1950s—1961, Pete Claim (Claim) was authorized by the Site's property owner to operate the Site as a facility at which Claim reclaimed lead cores from used automobile batteries. Claim broke open the

batteries, drained the batteries' acid onto the ground and removed the lead contents to be sold for profit. Claim disposed of broken and whole battery casings, empty drums, copper wire, scrap metal, paint cans, tires and other materials at the Site.

The Department's soil and waste samples showed that the Site had areas of lead and cadmium contamination resulting from Claim's disposal activities. The Department's surface water samples showed that the unnamed tributary of Lick Run contained pollutants above Water Quality Criteria for iron, lead, manganese and cadmium resulting from Claim's disposal activities.

In 1998, the Department conducted an interim response under the authority of the HSCA to clean up the waste Claim disposed of at the Site and to clean up soil contamination related to the waste. The Department subsequently entered into negotiation with Claim over reimbursement of costs the Department expended during its interim response at the Site. As a result of those negotiations, the Department executed a proposed Consent Order and Agreement (CO&A) with Claim on May 30, 2003.

This notice is being provided under section 1113 of the HSCA to advise that the proposed CO&A is now available for public review and comment. A copy of the CO&A can be obtained by contacting Terry Goodwald, (412) 442-4000.

The proposed CO&A will be open for comment from July 5, 2003, until September 5, 2003. Persons may submit written comment into the record, during this time only, by sending them to Terry Goodwald, Department of Environmental Protection, 400 Waterfront Drive, Pittsburgh, PA 15222 or by delivering them to this office in person.

Proposed Interim Response

Washington County Drum Dump, Robinson Township, Washington County

The Department, under the HSCA, is proposing an interim response at the Washington County Drum Dump (Site), Robinson Township, Washington County.

The Site is off of the Bulger-Candor Road approximately 1 mile southwest of the McDonald Interchange on U. S. Route 22. A disposal area in a ravine that affects approximately 2 acres of the property. There are approximately 30 drums disposed of at the site. The drums contain a white powder material, resin-like material or black liquid. Some of the drums are open and/or leaking. In addition to the drums, construction/demolition waste, household appliances and trash are present. The Department completed an investigation of the site in March 1999 and determined that a release or a threat of a release of hazardous substances exists from waste in open and leaking drums dumped in a ravine at this Site. The waste disposed of at this Site poses a direct contact threat to the public and a threat of soil and groundwater contamination.

The Department considered several alternatives at the Site, including: no action, securing of the site and removal and disposal of the hazardous substances at the Site. The Department has determined that removal and disposal of the hazardous materials at the site is the appropriate course of action. This alternative was selected because it complies with all applicable laws and regulations and is determined to be the most environmentally sound procedure for this site.

This notice is being provided under section 506(b) of the HSCA. The administrative record which contains the information that forms the basis and documents the selection of this response action is available for public review and comment. The administrative record is at the Department's Southwest Regional Office in Pittsburgh and is available for review Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The administrative record will be open for comment from July 5, 2003, until October 4, 2003. Persons may submit written comments into the record, during this time only, by sending them to Paul Vogel, Environmental

Cleanup Program, 400 Waterfront Drive, Pittsburgh, PA 15222 or by delivering them to the Southwest Regional Office in person.

In addition, persons may present oral comments, for inclusion in the administrative record, at a public hearing. If required, a cleanup plan evaluates the abilities of potential remedies to achieve remedy requirements. A work plan for conducting a baseline remedial investigation is required by provisions of the act for compliance with selection of a special industrial area remediation. The baseline remedial investigation, based on the work plan, is compiled into the baseline environmental report to establish a reference point to show existing contamination, describe proposed remediation to be done and include a description of existing or potential public benefits of the use or reuse of the property. The Department may approve or disapprove plans and reports submitted. This notice provides the Department's decision and, if relevant, the basis for disapproval.

Proposed 8-Hour Ozone Attainment/Nonattainment Designation Recommendations Public Meetings

Ground-level ozone concentrations above the Federal health-based standard are a serious human health threat. Ozone can also cause damage to crops, forests and wildlife. In July 1997, the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) promulgated the 8-hour ozone National ambient air quality standard (NAAQS). The revised ozone standard of 0.08 part per million, measured over an 8-hour period, is more protective of public health than the 1-hour health-based ozone standard. Section 107 of the Federal Clean Air Act (CAA) requires the EPA to make designations (attainment, nonattainment or unclassifiable) for new or revised NAAQS within 1 year of promulgation of the standard. However, implementation of the 8-hour ozone health-based standard had been delayed due to legal challenges.

The governor of each state must now submit designation recommendations to the EPA in accordance with section 107(d) of the CAA. These recommendations will be based on air quality monitoring data (and other criteria) obtained for the 3-year period preceding the recommendations.

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) is seeking public input on the proposed 8-hour ozone designation recommendations. Air quality information obtained during 2000-2002 indicates that the EPA may designate at least 33 counties in this Commonwealth as 8-hour ozone nonattainment areas. The Commonwealth will recommend to the EPA that boundaries for the designated areas generally follow metropolitan area and county boundaries. This approach is similar to the methodology used for designating areas under the 1-hour ozone health-based standard.

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

Removal of Temporary Changes to Fishing Regulations; Upper Hereford Manor Lake, Beaver County

By notice published at 33 Pa.B. 1547 (March 22, 2003), the Executive Director of the Fish and Boat Commission (Commission), acting under the authority of 58 Pa. Code § 65.25 (relating to temporary changes to fishing regulations), took immediate action to modify temporarily fishing regulations at Upper Hereford Manor Lake, Beaver County, in anticipation of a draw down of the lake. Specifically, the Executive Director lifted all seasons, sizes and creel limits for all species except trout.

The draw down of the lake is now complete. Thus, the Commission is removing these temporary changes to fishing regulations effective immediately. Statewide seasons, sizes and creel limits are now in effect for Upper Hereford Manor Lake.

Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission v. Alexa Cab Company; R-00038492

Order

By the Commission:

On March 24, 2003, Michael R. Etemad, the owner of the Alexa Cab Company, filed an application, in the form of a letter-petition, seeking approval to increase the citywide taxi fares charged by Philadelphia taxi medallion owners and drivers. The letter-petition was filed on behalf of the Philadelphia Taxi Medallion Owners/Drivers.

Insofar as the Public Utility Code only allows changes in rate increases to be sought by public utilities, including common carriers (66 Pa.C.S. § 1308), and limits requests for PUC investigations into the uniform rates for medallion taxi cabs in Philadelphia to medallion holders and licensed drivers (66 Pa.C.S. § 2410(c)), a request for an increase in these rates by an association of medallion holders and drivers has not been made by an appropriate entity. We recognize, however, that Mr. Etemad, as the owner of the Alexa Cab Company and a medallion holder, may lawfully make a request. Therefore, we will treat this as a request for an increase in rates by the Alexa Cab Company.

Mr. Etemad alleges that there has not been a rate increase in taxicab fares in Philadelphia since 1990 and that insurance prices have gone up over 200%, vehicle depreciation has gone up over 350%, gasoline has risen 150% and auto repair parts/labor have increased over 300%. He further alleges that SEPTA has substantially increased its fares from 1990 when it cost \$1.25 per ride to its present rate of \$2 per ride, a 60% increase.

Mr. Etemad also contends that the City of Philadelphia and the tourism industry of Philadelphia in many respects view the taxicabs in Philadelphia as its first line of making an impression on tourists and business travelers. In 2000, during the National Republican Convention, the PUC auctioned 161 taxi medallions that all required a new "A" titled vehicle to be placed on the street. Not only did the city get an immediate face-lift with the introduction of 161 new cabs, but also many other cab operators bought newer vehicles to compete. Mr. Etemad claims the taxicab medallion owners absorbed the associated costs.

As a result, Mr. Etemad proposes the following rate increases for citywide Philadelphia taxi medallion holders and drivers:

1. Flag drop should increase to \$2.60.
2. Mileage should increase to \$1.95 per mile.
3. Waiting time should increase to \$22 per hour.
4. Flat charge from Center City to the Airport, and vice versa, should increase to \$25.

Mr. Etemad, however, included no affidavit, verification, proposed tariff pages, financial information or other supporting information with his letter-petition.

Discussion

In addressing this matter, we must note at the outset that due to the uniform rates requirement of section 2410(b) the existing and the proposed rates do not apply to any one company, but to all taxi medallion companies doing business in Philadelphia (66 Pa.C.S. § 2410(b)). Comparing the proposed rates to existing rates shows that an increase in the flag drop from the current \$1.80 to \$2.60 would be a 44% increase, that an increase in the per mile rate from the current \$1.80 to \$1.95 per mile would be an 8% increase, that an increase in the waiting time from the current \$20 per minute or fraction thereof (\$12 per hour) to \$37 per minute or fraction thereof (\$22 per hour) would be an 83% increase, and that an increase in the flat charge from and to the Philadelphia International Airport from the current \$20 to \$25 would be a 25% increase. Given the level of increases sought in the letter-petition, we find that this would be a request for a general increase in rates pursuant to 66 Pa.C.S. § 1308(d), if Mr. Etemad had filed proposed tariffs and appropriate supporting data.

We recognize that operating expenses, such as insurance, fuel, vehicles and their maintenance, depreciation and taxes, may have changed since the uniform rates for medallion taxicabs were established in 1991. Alexa Cab which operates 20 medallion taxicabs and, as such, has standing to petition the Commission to reopen the prior rate investigation regarding Philadelphia medallion taxis. 66 Pa.C.S. § 2410(c). At the same time, since taxi rates have not been decoupled from earnings, the Commission needs to investigate the effect on earnings of the rate structure proposed in the letter-petition before it can determine whether the proposed rates are just and reasonable. In the transportation industry, the typical method is with reference to an operating ratio, that is, the ratio of reasonable and legitimate operating expenses to annual operating revenues. Moreover, while Chapter 24 did provide for the initial establishment of taxi rates for medallion owners and drivers, nothing in Chapter 24 indicates that general ratemaking provisions contained in Chapter 13 are not applicable to subsequent motor carrier utility rate increase requests.

Given the percent rate increases sought in the letter-petition, these proposed increases for all customers, if approved, would likely exceed the gross annual intrastate revenues threshold for a general rate increase defined in section 1308(d) of the Public Utility Code. 66 Pa.C.S. § 1308(d). Section 1308(d) applies to any public utility defined in paragraph 1(i), (ii), (vi) or (vii) in 66 Pa.C.S. § 102 (definition of "public utility") and to any public utility which the Commission designates by rule or regulation. 66 Pa.C.S. § 1308(d). The utilities described in the subsections described do not include common carriers by motor vehicle. However, our regulations at 52 Pa. Code § 23.114(f) states:

The provisions of 66 Pa.C.S. § 1308(d) apply to every public utility described in 66 Pa.C.S. § 102 (relating to definitions), except common carriers of property.

Therefore, a common carrier by motor vehicle, except those which carry only property, is a public utility to which section 1308(d) applies as long as the common carrier's tariff filing satisfies the percentages stated in section 1308(d) which qualify the tariff filing as a general rate increase.

In general, section 1308(d) requires that a utility seeking an increase in rates provide sufficient information concerning, but not limited to, wages, maintenance,

taxes, depreciation and fuel expenses as well as all revenues derived from the regulated service such as fares and leases. An application for an increase in rates should contain the necessary schedules, tables and related material to show that the requested increase is justified. As previously noted, that is not the case here.

As such, Mr. Etemad's letter-petition contains insufficient information on which to determine whether the proposed changes in rates for citywide taxi service in Philadelphia may be lawful, just, reasonable and in the public interest. Normally, under these circumstances, we would suspend the filed tariff for a period not to exceed 7 months; however, no proposed tariffs have been filed. Therefore, to perfect its application for a rate increase, we will direct Alexa Cab Company to file appropriate data concerning its annual expenses and revenues to support its request for an increase in rates. It should also file a proposed tariff with a 60 day notice period.

In addition, Mr. Etemad's letter-petition does not request an investigation into the prevailing wage rate or a prevailing maximum lease amount. These two items may well be intertwined with medallion taxicab rate structure. Our January 10, 1991, Order at Doc. Nos. I-900003, R-901702 and R-901703 established a prevailing wage rate and prevailing maximum lease amount. Twelve years have also passed since the prevailing wage rate and prevailing maximum lease amount have been examined. Therefore, any Commission investigation of uniform medallion taxicab rates should also include an investigation of the prevailing wage rate and prevailing maximum lease amount.

Finally, we would remind Alex Cab Company and any other parties to this proceeding that, under section 315(a) of the Public Utility Code (66 Pa.C.S. § 315(a)), the party advocating the change in rates has the burden of proof to show that the proposed rate is just and reasonable. Because the rates which may be established as a result of this proceeding shall apply to all medallion taxi cab companies in Philadelphia, it will be necessary for the Commission staff to obtain information on the annual expenses and revenues previously mentioned from many companies to verify and evaluate the proposed rates. We will expect that all taxi cab companies thus contacted will cooperate with the staff in the provision of information. We would also caution that, under Commonwealth law and Commission regulations, any corporation or company appearing before an administrative agency in an adjudicatory proceeding must be represented by counsel.

Therefore,

It Is Ordered That:

1. Alexa Cab Company shall have 60 days to file appropriate tariffs and supporting data; if not, the letter-petition will be deemed denied.
2. If Alexa Cab Company does file the tariffs and information referenced in ordering paragraph 1, the matter will be assigned to the Office of Administrative Law Judge for the prompt scheduling of such hearings as may be necessary culminating in the issuance of a Recommended Decision.
3. The Commission's Bureau of Transportation and Safety is hereby directed to participate as a party and to conduct an investigation into the lawfulness, justness and reasonableness of the existing rates, prevailing wage rate and prevailing maximum lease amount paid by drivers to owners.
4. A copy of this Order shall be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

5. A copy of this Order shall be served upon the Philadelphia taxi medallion owners, the City of Philadelphia and the Philadelphia Parking Authority.

6. Notice of the request for an increase in rates by the Alexa Cab Company in cities of the first class be published in the *Philadelphia Inquirer* and the *Philadelphia Daily News*.

 The net payment date stated on the business' invoice.

A 15-day grace period after the required payment date is provided to the Commonwealth by the Act.
