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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Title 255—LOCAL COURT RULES

CHESTER COUNTY

Amendments to Civil Procedure

Order

And Now, this 22nd day of June, 1999, the following amendments to the Chester County Rules of Civil Procedure are hereby adopted effective thirty (30) days after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, in accordance with Pa.R.C.P. No. 239(d). Wording which is crossed out is deleted from the rules and wording which is underlined is added thereto. Comments which accompany the rules were prepared for the convenience of the bench and bar but are not part of the rules and are not officially adopted.

I. Amend Rule 200.B by amending the second sentence thereof to read as follows:

If it is later discovered that two or more matters are related, the judge to whom the latter case has been assigned may refer the case to the [**President Judge**] Court Administrator for reassignment to the judge to whom the earlier related case was assigned.

II. Amend Rule 249.3 as follows:

Rule 249.3. Trial Readiness.

(a) A Category A matter shall be presumptively deemed ready for trial twelve months from the date of the initiation of the suit, **which is the earliest date on which the case may be tried for purposes of Pa.R.C.P. No. 212.1(a)**. A Category C matter. . .

III. Post-trial Motions

Amend C.C.R.C.P. No. 227.2 as follows:

(g) Post-trial motions will be brought before the Court by filing a praecipe for determination under C.C.R.C.P. No. 206.2. **The praecipe for determination shall be filed at the time of the filing of the post-trial motion. Upon the filing of the praecipe for determination accompanying a post-trial motion, oral argument shall be scheduled forthwith by the Court.**

Comment: In view of Pa.R.C.P. No. 227.4(1)(b), which permits entry of judgment if an order disposing of all post-trial motions is not entered within one hundred and twenty (120) days after the filing of the first such motion, oral argument will be scheduled for approximately ninety (90) days following the date of the filing of the first such motion.

. . .

(i) [**Where oral argument of post-trial motions will not be held, the assigned judge shall determine the briefing schedule and notify the parties accordingly.] Oral argument may be waived by agreement of all parties but, even if oral argument is waived, briefs shall nevertheless be due pursuant to paragraph (h) above, based upon the date originally set for oral argument.**

Add the following as a comment following subparagraph (c):

Comment: It is the responsibility of the party or parties requiring a transcript of the notes of testimony to obtain such transcript in a timely fashion. Counsel and parties are warned that, in light of Pa.R.C.P. No. 227.4(1)(b), the schedule for the filing of briefs cannot be extended.

IV. Delay Damages

Amend Rule 238.1 by deletion of entire current rule. See Pa.R.C.P. No. 238.

Amend Rule 206.2 by adding the words "motion requesting damages for delay to which an answer has been filed," after the words "post-trial motion".

V. Amend Rule 1302.1(f) by adding the following at the end of the existing rule:

The notice of the date, time and place of arbitration hearing on the cover sheet shall include the following statement:

"This matter will be heard by a board of arbitrators at the time, date and place specified but, if one or more of the parties is not present at the hearing, the matter may be heard at the same time and date before a judge of the court without the absent party or parties. There is no right to a trial de novo on appeal from a decision entered by a judge."

VI. Amend Rule 206.1.A.(1)(a) by adding the following sentence at the end of the existing paragraph:

No motion, petition or preliminary objection shall be dismissed for failure to be accompanied by a form of proposed order or for failure to refer to the procedural rule, statute, or other authority relied upon or for failure to display counsel's name, address, I.D. number or telephone number.

Administrative Order Establishing Duty District Justice Office, Operating Procedures for Duty Office, and Procedures for Disposing of Warrants and Other Matters After Established Court Business Hours; No. 99 MI 00225

Administrative Order

And Now, this 24th day of June, 1999, pursuant to the authority and responsibility of the President Judge to exercise general supervision and administrative control over District Justices within the 19th Judicial District, (Pa.R.C.P.D.J. 17), to insure that the Courts of this District remain always open for the transaction of judicial business (42 Pa.C.S.A. Sec. 324), and to insure that there shall be available at all times within this Judicial District, at least one issuing authority, (Pa.R.Crim. P. Sec. 23(a)), and for the purpose of consolidating and clarifying prior orders and procedures concerning the establishment and operation of a "Duty District Justice Office," it is hereby Ordered as follows:

I. Duty District Justice Office:*(A) Establishment, Location and Hours of Operation:*

There shall be established an office for the transaction of court business, which office shall be known as the "Duty District Justice Office," and which shall be open for business twenty-four hours per day, seven days per week, every day of the year. The office shall be staffed by a District Justice, who shall be assigned, from time to time, to duty in the Duty District Justice Office, upon such scheduled dates and times as shall be established by the President Judge and published by the District Court Administrator.

The District Justice on duty need not be present in the Duty District Justice Office the entire time the District Justice is on duty. The times throughout the day during which a Duty District Justice may be required to be physically present at the Duty District Justice Office may be published, from time to time, by the District Court Administrator.

However, consistent with the obligation of District Justices to "devote the time necessary for the prompt and proper disposition of the business of [the] office, which shall be given priority over any other . . . activity" (Pa.R.S.C.D.J. 3) the District Justice on duty shall be physically present in the office within a reasonably prompt time after his or her services are requested. Any delay for longer than one hour after one's presence is requested at the Duty District Justice Office is generally not considered to be a reasonably prompt time.

The Duty District Justice Office shall be located at 118 Pleasant Acres Road, York, Pennsylvania, 17402, and/or at such other address as may be established from time to time.

(B) Staffing of the Office:

The District Justice on duty shall be assisted by such staff as is approved from time to time by the District Court Administrator and the President Judge of this Judicial District.

II. Duties of Duty District Justice:

The Duty District Justice shall have the authority to exercise the powers and duties of the office of District Justice to the same extent that he or she would if otherwise situated in the office in the judicial district in which that District Justice normally sits.

The Duty District Justice shall not be expected to do the following while serving duty at the Duty District Justice Office:

(a) Issue new citations, summonses or warrants on new summary charges which can be issued during normal business hours unless:

1) The facts giving rise to the new summary charge allege danger to a person or a serious breach of the peace; or

2) The individual sought to be charged with a new summary offense has outstanding, from any source, two (2) or more summary warrants; or

3) The individual sought to be charged with a new summary offense has unpaid fines, from any source, in a total amount of at least \$500; or

4) The individual sought to be charged with a new summary offense has been arrested on a misdemeanor or felony warrant, or is to be charged with a misdemeanor or felony, whether or not the misdemeanor or felony warrant or charge is related to the new summary offense.

Law enforcement officers are requested to observe the provisions of Pa.R.Crim.P. 71(b) providing for the release of defendants arrested on summary matters if the defendant is a resident of the Commonwealth, the defendant poses no threat of immediate harm to anyone, the officer believes the defendant will appear when required, and the defendant has not demanded to be brought before the District Justice.

(b) Issue new complaints, summonses or warrants on new misdemeanor or felony charges which can be issued during normal business hours, unless

1) The facts giving rise to the new charge allege danger to a person or a serious breach of the peace; or

2) The individual to be charged is presently in the custody of a law enforcement officer or agency; or

3) The criminal activity alleged to be the basis for the new charge has recently occurred at such a time as to reasonably preclude obtaining a complaint, summons or warrant from a Judge or District Justice during normal business hours; or

4) There is prompt necessity to obtain a complaint, summons or warrant to insure the prompt apprehension of the individual to be charged.

Law enforcement officers are requested to observe the provisions of Pa.R.Crim.P. 102(b) providing for the release of defendants arrested on misdemeanor matters without a warrant if the most serious matter charged is a misdemeanor of the second degree, the defendant is a resident of the Commonwealth, the defendant poses no threat of immediate harm to anyone, the officer believes the defendant will appear when required, and the defendant has not demanded to be brought before the District Justice.

(c) Respond to the Duty Office, if not otherwise present, to dispose of existing summary warrants, unless the existing summary warrants, or any one of them, meet the conditions noted in (a) (1) through (4) above, or, the individual is being brought to the Duty Office pursuant to Pa.R.Crim.P. 76(B)(4) (providing that in lieu of issuing a "field receipt" the arresting officer elects to bring the individual "without unnecessary delay" before the proper issuing authority.)

III. Disposition of Warrants:*(A) Summary Warrants:*

When a District Justice determines to issue a warrant for the arrest of an individual pursuant to Pa.R.Crim.P. 75, or otherwise pursuant to law, whether for a new charge, an unresolved pending charge, a failure of the individual to appear, or a failure of the individual to pay fines and costs, the District Justice shall, to the extent possible, note on the warrant the reason for issuance of the warrant, such as "failure to respond", "failure to appear" or "failure to make payment".

(B) Disposition of Summary Warrant/Bench Warrant on Arrest:

If an individual is arrested after regular court hours, and it appears that, in addition to any outstanding summary warrants, there is one or more outstanding bench warrants, warrants of arrest, or attachments issued by a Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, the individual shall be served with all warrants outstanding, but shall not be taken before the Duty District Justice. The individual shall be taken directly to prison, to be returned the next business day, to the Court of Common Pleas pursuant to the bench warrant. The District Justice or Justices who issued the outstanding summary war-

rants also lodged against the individual shall be notified by facsimile or other reasonably prompt means, as provided herein, and the individual shall be transported to the office of the respective District Justice who issued the warrant or warrants, during normal business hours, or to the nearest appropriate District Justice with authority to dispose of some or all of the outstanding warrants pursuant to previous Administrative Orders.

(C) *Disposition of Summary Warrants Generally:*

When a warrant of arrest is executed by a police officer, the officer may, in any circumstance permitted by law, either:

- (1) accept from the defendant a signed guilty plea and the full amount of the fine and costs, if stated on the warrant;
- (2) accept from the defendant a signed not guilty plea and the full amount of collateral if stated on the warrant;
- (3) accept from the defendant the amount of fine and costs due as specified in the warrant if the warrant is for collection of fine and costs after a guilty plea or conviction; or
- (4) cause the defendant to be taken without unnecessary delay before the proper issuing authority.

When the police officer accepts the fine and costs or collateral as provided above, the officer shall issue a receipt to the defendant setting forth the amount of fine and costs or collateral received and shall promptly, and in any event, within forty-eight (48) hours of the issuance, return a copy of the receipt, signed by the defendant and the police officer, to the proper issuing authority. (See Pa.R.Crim.P. 76.)

Prior to the police officer electing to take the defendant forthwith before the proper issuing authority, the officer shall consider the factors set forth above with respect to the duties of the Duty District Justice. Should the officer elect to take the individual, forthwith, before the Duty District Justice, or should the individual arrested request to be taken before the Duty District Justice (and provided the individual has no outstanding bench warrants issued by a Court of Common Pleas) the individual arrested shall be processed pursuant to Pa.R.Crim.P. 76, et seq., and if appropriate, shall be given the opportunity to post bail or other collateral. The Duty District Justice shall not, however, conduct a hearing pursuant to Pa.R.Crim.P. 85. Any hearing which must be conducted pursuant to that Rule shall be conducted by the proper issuing authority during the next business day.

(D) *Misdemeanor & Felony Warrants, Arrests Without Warrants:*

When an individual is arrested in a "court case" without a warrant, and the arresting officer deems it appropriate to detain the individual, the Duty District Justice shall afford the individual detained a preliminary arraignment, without unnecessary delay, pursuant to Pa.R.Crim.P. 102.

In court cases in which an individual has been arrested and detained upon a warrant issued within this judicial district or upon a warrant issued outside of this district, the Duty District Justice shall afford the individual detained a preliminary arraignment, or the opportunity to post bail, as appropriate, pursuant to Pa.R.Crim.P. 123 and 124, and Rule 4001(b) (permitting a defendant to be admitted to bail on any day at any time).

IV. "Missile" System:

A system for the filing, storage and retrieval of warrants issued in matters by Judges or District Justices in this Judicial District shall be maintained by the York County E911 Center. The system currently known as the "Magisterial Information System to Support Improved Law Enforcement" ("MISSILE") shall continue to be maintained for this purpose. The system shall be updated and upgraded from time to time to maintain efficiency and to purge outdated, invalid, erroneous, or useless warrants from the system.

(A) *Entry of Warrants into MISSILE System:*

Previous Orders and memoranda have been distributed setting forth procedures for the entry of warrants into the MISSILE system. To the extent that those Orders and memoranda are not in conflict with any provisions of this Order, they remain in full force and effect. Notwithstanding those memoranda, a District Justice is not required to enter a warrant issued in a summary matter into the MISSILE system until that District Justice determines that the warrant remains unserved and should remain active. Warrants issued in misdemeanor or felony cases shall be immediately forwarded by the District Justice to the MISSILE system for entry into that system.

District Justices are directed to institute a system within their offices to review recently issued warrants which remain unexecuted for a period of sixty days after their issuance. The review shall include a determination of whether due diligence has been exercised to execute the warrant, and whether the warrant should be recalled or remain issued. If a determination is made to recall a warrant, and the warrant has been entered in the MISSILE system, the administrator of the York County E911 Center, Records Division, or the administrator's designee, shall be notified and the warrant shall be removed from the MISSILE system.

(B) *Cancellation of Warrants in MISSILE:*

Previous Orders and memoranda have been issued concerning procedures for canceling warrants in the MISSILE System. To the extent that they do not conflict with any provisions of this Order, they remain in full force and effect.

In addition to the procedures set forth therein, it is hereby directed that the administrator of the York County E911 Center, Records Division, or the administrator's designee, shall send, by facsimile or other reasonably prompt means, a copy of every warrant canceled or released to a law enforcement officer or constable between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 8:30 a.m. the following day, together with the warrant's assigned cancellation number, to the Judge or District Justice who issued the warrant.

V. Directives from District Court Administrator:

The District Court Administrator and Deputy District Court Administrator have been delegated supervisory and administrative authority by the President Judge of this Judicial District.

Any memorandum, directive, or instruction received by a District Justice from the District Court Administrator of York County shall have the same force and effect as if the memorandum, directive, or instruction was sent by the President Judge of York County.

This Order shall supercede and take precedence over any previous order or memorandum previously issued which may be in conflict with the provisions herein.

Further Ordered that in accordance with Pa.R.C.P.230, the District Court Administrator shall:

(a) File seven certified copies hereof with the Administrative Office of the Pennsylvania Courts.

(b) Distribute two certified copies hereof to the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

(c) File one certified copy hereof with the Criminal Rules Committee.

(d) Cause a copy hereof to be published in the *York Legal Record* at the expense of the County of York.

(e) Supervise the distribution hereof to all Judges, District Justices, Municipal and State Police Agencies of the 19th Judicial District, and all members of the Bar of this Court.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 58—RECREATION

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CHS. 61 AND 65]

Seasons, Sizes and Creel Limits; Warmwater/ Coolwater Species Special Conservation Waters; Big Bass Special Regulations

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) by this order amends Chapters 61 and 65 (relating to season, sizes and creel limits; and special fishing regulations). The Commission is publishing these amendments under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code). The amendments relate to fishing.

A. *Effective Date*

These amendments will go into effect on January 1, 2000.

B. *Contact Person*

For further information on the amendments, contact Laurie E. Shepler, Assistant Counsel, (717) 657-4546, P. O. Box 67000, Harrisburg, PA 17106-7000. This final rulemaking is available electronically through the Commission's Web site at (<http://www.fish.state.pa.us>).

C. *Statutory Authority*

These amendments are published under the statutory authority of section 2102 of the code (relating to rules and regulations).

D. *Purpose and Background*

The amendments are designed to update, modify and improve Commission regulations pertaining to fishing. The specific purpose of the amendments is described in more detail under the summary of changes.

E. *Summary of Changes*

Acting on a recommendation of the Fisheries Committee, the Commission established a Bass Workgroup chaired by Commissioner Anderson and comprised of Commission staff and various public representatives with a demonstrated interest in bass fishing. The workgroup's discussions focused on ways to increase bass angling opportunity by permitting a catch-and-release fishery for bass in the spring while assuring that populations are adequately protected at other times of the year to compensate for any possible increase in fishing mortality resulting from the catch-and-release fishery. The workgroup met twice (details of discussions and results were provided in a briefing book at the Commission's July 1997 meeting) and developed recommendations for changes in regulations and for actions to be taken by Commission staff relative to public education and resource classification.

The results of workgroup discussions were presented to the Fisheries Committee, and the Committee recommended that the Commission accept the results. The report was accepted, and staff were instructed to bring the workgroup recommendations to the Commission at a subsequent Commission meeting as a proposed rulemaking item.

The proposed regulation package included several major changes. These were:

1. Rivers and streams (mostly smallmouth) will be under different regulations than lakes and ponds (mostly largemouth).

2. A catch-and-release fishery, a No Harvest-Immediate Release regulation, will be in effect for bass during the spring period when bass season (harvest) is not "open."

3. A 15-inch minimum size, 4-bass creel limit will be in effect on lakes and ponds from January 1 to mid-April and November through December (essentially a Big Bass regulation for the late fall through spring fishery).

4. A 20-inch minimum size, 1 bass creel limit will be in effect on rivers and streams from January 1 to mid-April and October through December (harvest limited to only the exceptional trophy-sized bass). This change also will apply to those river reaches contained within the Big Bass Program.

It was proposed that Commission staff develop a system of resource classification to identify those lakes and ponds where reproduction and production of bass is such that any increase in fishing mortality or disruption of reproductive activity could be expected to have a negative impact on populations. These waters should be excluded from the spring No Harvest-Immediate Release fishery. It was also proposed that the Commission initiate an informational campaign, including a publication or pamphlet to advise anglers on how to handle and release bass to assure maximum likelihood of survival of fish taken in a catch-and-release fishery. This could be done as a cooperative effort with organized bass angling groups or members of the workgroup, or both, who have writing/communication skills and who volunteer to assist.

A notice of proposed rulemaking containing the proposed changes was published at 28 Pa.B. 45 (January 3, 1998). After the publication of the notice of proposed rulemaking, the Bass Workgroup met again. The meeting included an extended discussion of several aspects of the proposed rulemaking in light of the public comment, the results of the public hearing and other available information. As a result of those discussions, the Bass Workgroup recommended that the Commission finally adopt the changes to the proposed bass season regulations with several changes:

1. A 15-inch minimum size, 4 bass per day creel limit will be in effect on rivers and streams from January 1 to mid-April and October through December. This change replaces the 20-inch size, 1 per day creel limit in the proposed regulation. From a biological standpoint, based on modeling, it appears that this change will have an extremely modest (about 1%) impact on populations of bass over 12". This change will not apply to those river reaches contained within the Big Bass Program.

2. For rivers and streams in the Big Bass Program, an 18-inch, 2 bass per day creel limit will be in effect from January 1 to mid-April and October 1 through December 31. This size and creel limit replaces the 20-inch size, 1 per day creel limit in the proposed regulation. Based on biological modeling, it appears that this change will have no numerically significant impact on populations of bass over 12" in length.

3. The Bass Workgroup recommended that bass season/size/creel limits for lakes (both Big Bass/Conservation Regulations and Statewide Regulations) remain the same as proposed in the notice of proposed rulemaking.

4. The Bass Workgroup recommended that the Commission create and implement a new special regulation category for lakes the biorankings of which indicate a possible need for additional protection during the period from mid-April through mid-June. These regulations would prohibit or substantially limit catch-and-release (no-harvest) fishing for bass on these lakes during the normal spawning period.

On final rulemaking, the Commission adopted the amendments as set forth in the notice of proposed rulemaking with the three changes recommended by the Bass Workgroup, effective January 1, 2000. The Commission also approved the publication of a separate notice of proposed rulemaking containing a change to the State-wide bass regulations to specify restrictions on catch and release fishing during the normal bass spawning period. This notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 29 Pa.B. 822 (February 13, 1999).

F. Paperwork

The amendments will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements.

G. Fiscal Impact

The amendments will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The amendments will impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public.

H. Public Involvement

A notice of proposed rulemaking containing the proposed amendments was published at 28 Pa.B. 45. The Commission provided for an extended public comment period until June 15, 1998. During the public comment period, the Commission received 1,869 comments, including letters from individuals and clubs, form letters and petitions. Of these comments, 123 were generally in favor of the proposal, 1,743 (which included a petition signed by 1,500 individuals) were generally against it, and 3 were unsure. The Commission also received many public comments prior to and after the public comment period. Some individuals wrote directly to the Commissioners (instead of the Executive Director as specified in the notice of proposed rulemaking). Commissioner Enoch "Inky" Moore received more than 500 comments in favor of the proposed amendments. Copies of all public comments submitted in accordance with the notice of proposed rulemaking (regardless of whether they were received before, during or after the public comment period) were provided to the Commissioners.

In addition, public hearings were held on March 4, 1998, in Harrisburg (with 21 persons in attendance); on March 11, 1998, in Leesport (with 26 persons in attendance); on March 19, 1998, in Monroeville (with 75 persons in attendance); and on April 8, 1998 in Hawley

(with about 45 persons in attendance). Copies of all hearing transcripts also were provided to the Commissioners.

Findings

The Commission finds that:

(1) Public notice of intention to adopt the amendments adopted by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) A public comment period was provided and that all comments received were considered.

(3) The adoption of the amendments of the Commission in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing statutes.

Order

The Commission, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapters 61 and 65, are amended by amending §§ 61.1, 65.8 and 65.9 to read as set forth in Annex A, with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulations.

(b) The Executive Director will submit this order and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General for approval as to legality as required by law.

(c) The Executive Director shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) This order shall take effect immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

CHAPTER 65. SPECIAL FISHING REGULATIONS

§ 65.8. Warmwater/coolwater species special conservation waters.

(a) The Executive Director, with the approval of the Commission, may designate waters as warmwater/coolwater special conservation waters. The designation of the waters shall be effective when the waters are posted after publication of a notice of designation in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

(b) It is unlawful to fish for the following species in designated and posted warmwater/coolwater special conservation waters except in compliance with the seasons established in § 61.1 (relating to the Commonwealth inland waters) and the following size and creel limits:

Fishing for Bass During Spring Season

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) by this order amends Chapter 63 (relating to general fishing regulations). The Commission is publishing this amendment under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code). The amendment relates to fishing for bass during the spring season.

A. Effective Date

The amendment will go into effect on January 1, 2000.

C. Statutory Authority

The amendment is published under the statutory authority of section 2102 of the code (relating to rules and regulations).

D. Purpose and Background

The amendment is designed to update, modify and improve Commission regulations relating to fishing for bass during the spring season. The specific purpose is described in more detail under the summary of change.

E. Summary of Change

One of the issues raised by the Commission's recent changes to bass season, size and creel limits was the perception that bass populations require special protection during the traditional closed season from mid-April until mid-June. Therefore, the Commission has adopted a regulation that provides that during the period from 12:01 a.m. on the first Saturday after April 11 until 12:01 a.m. on the first Saturday after June 11, it is unlawful to kill or possess (while in the act of fishing) any largemouth, smallmouth or spotted bass. Under the new regulation, no tournaments are permitted during this time period. Catch and release fishing for bass during this period is limited. It is unlawful for an angler to repeatedly cast into a clearly visible bass spawning nest or redd in an effort to catch or take bass. Otherwise, a bass caught and immediately returned unharmed to the waters from which taken during this period will not be considered a violation of the regulation.

F. Paperwork

The amendment will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements.

G. Fiscal Impact

The amendment will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The amendment will impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public.

H. Public Involvement

A notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 29 Pa.B. 822 (February 13, 1999). The Commission received five public comments concerning the proposal: two in favor, one opposed and two inquiries. Copies of all public comments were provided to the Commissioners.

Findings

The Commission finds that:

(1) Public notice of intention to adopt the amendment adopted by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) A public comment period was provided and all comments received were considered.

(3) The adoption of the amendment of the Commission in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing statutes.

(a) The regulations of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapter 63, are amended by adding § 63.43 to read as set forth at 29 Pa.B. 822.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CH. 65]

Panfish Enhancement Special Regulation

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapter 65 (relating to special fishing regulations). The Commission is publishing these amendments as a notice of proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code). The proposed amendments relate to fishing.

A. Effective Date

The proposed amendments, if approved on final rulemaking, will go into effect on January 1, 2000, or upon publication of an order adopting the amendments in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, whichever occurs later.

B. Contact Person

C. Statutory Authority

The proposed amendments are published under the statutory authority of sections 2102 and 2307 of the code (relating to rules and regulations; and waters limited to specific purposes).

D. Purpose and Background

The proposed amendments are designed to update, modify and improve Commission regulations relating to fishing. The specific purpose of each amendment is described in more detail under the summary of proposal.

E. Summary of Proposal

(1) *Section 65.11 (relating to panfish enhancement special regulation)*. When the Commission adopted this regulation last year, it opted to apply harvest restrictions to all species or species groups (sunfish, crappie and yellow perch) found in waters managed under the program. While this approach was straightforward, further reflection revealed that this approach was not the best fisheries management approach to the issue. Subsequently, the Commission substantially reduced the number of waters to which the regulation applies.

The Commission now proposes to amend the regulation to allow the Commission to apply the designation to only those species groups where angling has been observed to negatively affect panfish density and size structure, not all species groups. Application of the panfish enhancement special regulation to selected species groups within a water will yield several important benefits. First, differences in biological characteristics among species groups inhabiting a particular water will be able to be accounted for in a management program. For example, in a lake, one particular panfish population may be comprised of small individuals for reasons not associated with

angling (exhibited stunting) and in the same lake a different species may be comprised of small individuals due to angler removal of larger panfish. Improvements in size structure would be expected in association with greater harvest restrictions in one case but not the other. Indeed, there may be benefits to the less protected panfish species groups (without the panfish enhancement special regulation) if harvest shifted away from the protected species group (with panfish enhancement special regulation) to the less protected group. Here, thinning the population associated with harvest may improve growth and consequently improve the size structure of the less protected species, thereby enhancing the overall number of desirable size panfish available to anglers.

The second benefit is associated with maintaining appealing panfish fishing opportunities for anglers on a particular water. Application of harvest restrictions will constrain angler harvest of panfish that provide the basis for extremely popular fishing opportunities for Pennsylvania anglers. In 1991, anglers spent at least 8,023,000 days fishing for panfish in this Commonwealth, by comparison 11,125,000 angler days were directed to trout, and 7,186,000 angler days were directed to black bass. (United States Department of the Interior, Fish and Wildlife Service and United States Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census. 1991 National Survey of Fishing, Hunting, and Wildlife Associated Recreation, Pennsylvania. United States Government Printing Office, Washington D.C. 1993). The Commission does not want to constrain panfish harvest opportunities on a particular water so that angler participation is reduced if harvest regulations for a particular species are not expected to yield any improvement in number of desirable size fish in an angler's catch. In some cases, harvest of some panfish species is simply not great enough to substantially affect the species size structure. The principal intent of special panfish regulations is to enhance fishing opportunities. Constricting harvest of species groups affected by intense angling and maintaining harvest of species groups not affected by angling will maximize fishing opportunities. Simply stated, it is the Commission's goal to improve size structure where possible and not restrict angling opportunities unnecessarily for species groups where no benefit is expected. Therefore, the Commission has proposed amendments to § 65.11 so that harvest restrictions on a particular water may apply to one, two or all three panfish species groups as approved by the Commission.

(2) *Section 65.24 (relating to miscellaneous special regulations)*. Spring Creek, Centre County, supports an excellent Class A wild brown trout population and provides a very popular year round trout fishery for anglers in central Pennsylvania. Currently, no harvest is permitted on this water from SR 3010 in Oak Hall downstream to the mouth due to a fish consumption advisory. In recognition of the outstanding wild trout fishery provided by this water, the Commission believes that it is necessary to adopt special trout angling regulations for Spring Creek. The Commission therefore has proposed special trout management regulations for the 16.6 miles of Spring Creek extending from the SR 3010 bridge in Oak Hall downstream to the mouth (excluding the established Heritage Trout Angling project at Fisherman's Paradise and the exhibition area in Bellefonte). The proposed regulations will involve no change from the current management, as angling will be permitted year round (no

closed season) under no-harvest regulations with no tackle restrictions.

F. *Paperwork*

The proposed amendments will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements.

G. *Fiscal Impact*

The proposed amendments will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The proposed amendments will impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public.

H. *Public Comments*

Interested persons are invited to submit written comments, objections or suggestions about the proposed amendments to the Executive Director, Fish and Boat Commission, P. O. Box 67000, Harrisburg, PA 17106-7000, within 30 days after publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Comments submitted by facsimile will not be accepted.

Comments also may be submitted electronically at "regulations@fish.state.pa.us." A subject heading of the proposal and a return name and address must be included in each transmission. In addition, all electronic comments must be contained in the text of the transmission, not in an attachment. If an acknowledgment of electronic comments is not received by the sender within

2 working days, the comments should be retransmitted to ensure receipt.

CHAPTER 65. SPECIAL FISHING REGULATIONS

§ 65.11. Panfish enhancement special regulation.

(a) The Executive Director, with the approval of the Commission, may designate waters as "Panfish Enhancement Special Regulation" waters. **The designation may be limited to one, two or all three of the panfish species listed in subsection (b).** The designation shall be effective when the waters are so posted after publication of a notice of designation in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

(b) It is unlawful to fish in designated and posted "Panfish Enhancement Special Regulation" waters except in compliance with the following seasons and size and creel limits:

Annex A

TITLE 237. JUVENILE RULES

CHAPTER 201. STANDARDS GOVERNING THE QUALIFICATIONS AND TRAINING OF COURT-APPOINTED SPECIAL ADVOCATES

GENERAL

§ 201.1. Appointment.

Under 42 Pa.C.S. § 6342 (relating to court-appointed special advocates), court-appointed special advocates (CASAs) may be appointed to participate as advocates for children who are dependent or alleged to be dependent. CASAs shall be appointed only by the court and shall be

sworn in by the court in recognition of both the importance and confidential nature of their duties.

§ 201.2. Program.

Court-appointed special advocates (CASAs) shall, at all times, be under the supervision of a CASA program which has the legal authority to operate, and which is recognized and supported by the court. Unless the CASA program is administered by the court, the program shall likewise have a written agreement with the court defining the working relationship between the CASA program and the court. CASAs may not be assigned to a case until it is determined that all preservice training and qualification requirements have been met.

QUALIFICATIONS

§ 201.11. Qualifications.

(a) A court-appointed special advocate (CASA) shall be 21 years of age or older.

(b) Prior to appointment, a CASA shall:

(1) Successfully pass all screening requirements, including criminal history and child abuse background checks.

(2) Complete a written application containing information about educational background and training, employment history and experience working with children.

(3) Submit the names of three or more references of persons unrelated to the prospective CASA.

(4) Authorize the CASA program and other appropriate agencies to conduct a criminal record check, a child protective services background check as permitted by the laws of the Commonwealth and, if the duties of the CASA could include the transportation of children, a driving record check.

(5) Attend and participate in personal interviews with CASA program personnel.

(6) Be able to make a 12-month minimum commitment to a case, in addition to the time required for preservice training.

(c) A CASA shall respect a child's inherent right to grow up with dignity, in a stable, safe, loving and nurturing environment.

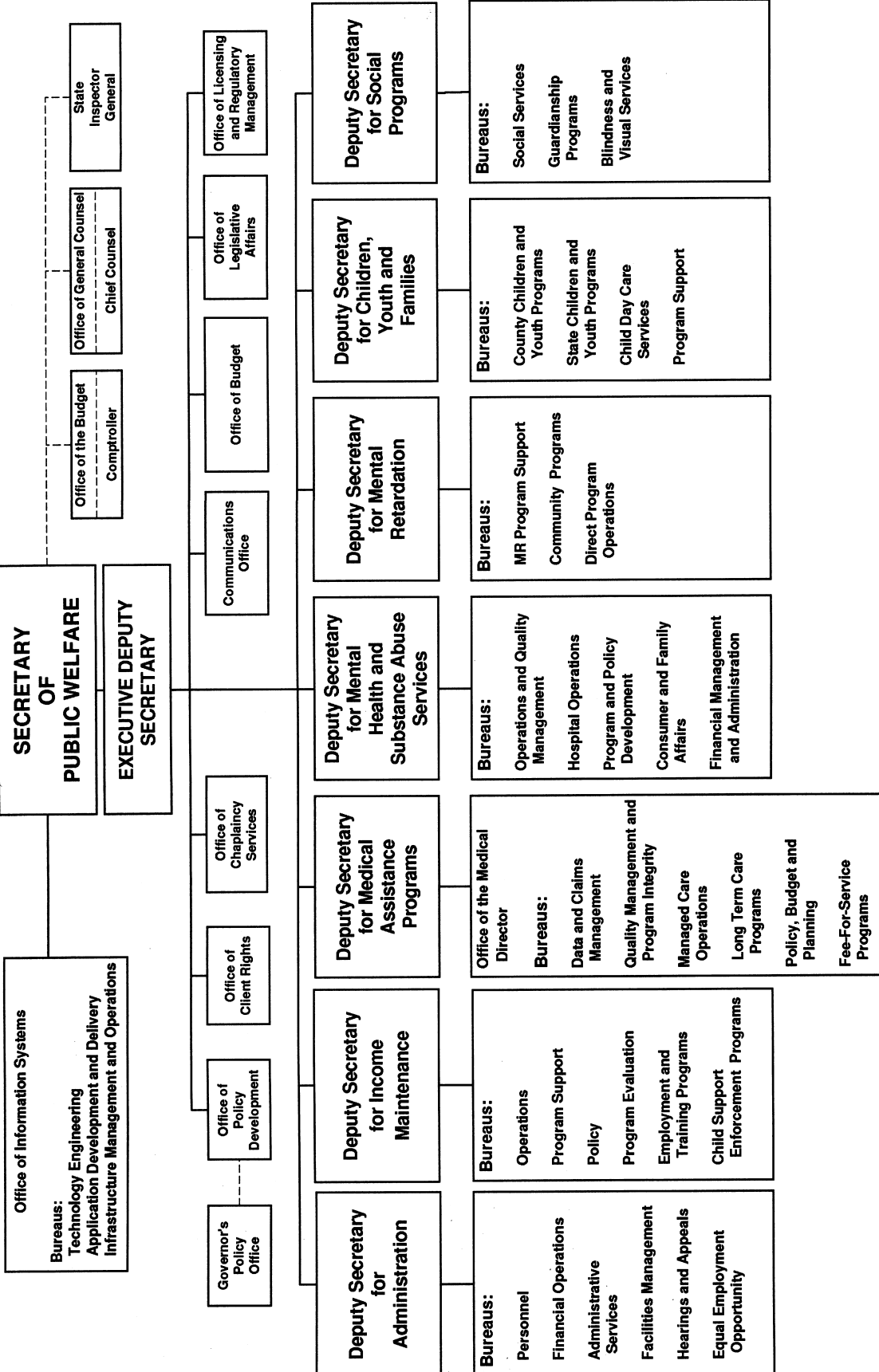
(d) A CASA shall have the ability to relate effectively to the children and families to whose cases the CASA may be assigned.

(e) A CASA shall keep information confidential and work within the scope of established program guidelines and orders of the court, maintain objectivity and relate to a variety of people.

(f) A CASA may not accept reimbursement for time, or for routine travel or other expenses ordinarily incurred in the discharge of assigned duties, and shall comply with the requirements established by the CASA program under whose supervision the CASA is providing services.

(g) An individual may not be appointed as a CASA who is found to have been convicted of, or to have charges pending for, a felony or a misdemeanor involving a sex offense, child abuse or neglect, or related acts that would pose risks to children or the credibility of the CASA program. If a prospective CASA is found to have committed a misdemeanor or felony that is unrelated to or would not pose a risk to children and would not negatively

impact the credibility of the CASA program, the program may consider the extent of the prospective volunteer's rehabilitation and other factors that may be relevant in determining whether to accept the applicant as a CASA volunteer.

(h) Grounds for dismissal of a CASA include the following:

(1) Taking action without CASA program or court approval that endangers a child or is outside the role or powers of the CASA program.

(2) Engaging in ex parte communication with the court.

(3) Violation of a program policy, court rule or law.

(4) Failure to complete required in-service training.

(5) Failure to demonstrate an ability to effectively carry out assigned duties.

(6) Falsification of an application, or a misrepresentation of facts during the preappointment screening process.

(7) Allegations that the CASA is the subject of child abuse or neglect allegations.

(8) Existence of a conflict of interest that cannot be resolved.

TRAINING

§ 201.21. Training.

(a) The Court-appointed special advocate (CASA) shall have the benefit of a training and skill development program that is offered by a CASA program and which is reviewed annually and revised based on the program's assessment of its training needs.

(b) Training provided to CASAs shall conform to the curriculum "Comprehensive Training for the CASA/GAL," available from the National Court Appointed Special Advocate Association, or its equivalent.

(c) The training that is offered to CASAs shall utilize a variety of instructors, including CASA program staff, attorneys, judges, agency representatives and volunteers.

(d) CASAs shall successfully complete at least 30 hours of preservice training before being assigned to a case. This preservice training shall, at a minimum, include the following:

(1) The roles and responsibilities of a CASA volunteer.

(2) Court process, including dependency proceedings under 42 Pa.C.S. §§ 6301—6365 (relating to the Juvenile Act) and involuntary termination of parental rights proceedings under 23 Pa.C.S. §§ 2101—2910 (relating to the adoption act).

(3) The dynamics of human behavior associated with child abuse and neglect.

(4) Relevant State and Federal laws.

(5) Confidentiality and recordkeeping practices.

(6) Child development.

(7) Child abuse and neglect.

(8) Permanency planning and resources.

(9) Community agencies and resources.

(10) Communication and information gathering, to include interviewing and report writing skill development.

(11) Advocacy.

(12) Special needs of the children served, including differences in cultural and socioeconomic norms, values and heritage.

(13) The identification of personal and institutional bias or discrimination as it relates to the children and families being served.

(14) The opportunity to visit and observe court proceedings conducted by judges and masters involving hearings under 42 Pa.C.S. §§ 6301—6365, as well as proceedings involving the involuntary termination of parental rights under 23 Pa.C.S. §§ 2101—2910.

(15) Ethics relating to the role of the CASA.

(16) Expectations regarding appearance and demeanor.

(e) CASA volunteers shall be provided with at least 12 hours of in-service training annually.

Christmas Tree Marketing and Research Program

Under the applicable provisions of the Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act, a referendum was held from June 1 to June 15, 1999, to determine if the producers affected by the proposed Pennsylvania Christmas Tree Marketing and Research Program desired to have the Program established. To pass, a majority of eligible producers voting, both by number of producers and by the number of trees cut and sold during the previous marketing season, had to vote in favor of the Program's establishment. An impartial Teller Committee met on June 22, 1999, to count the ballots. The following results were submitted by the Teller Committee: a total of 81 eligible votes were cast, with 58 producers voting in favor of and 23 producers voting against the establishment of the program by number of producers. There were 347,885 trees eligible for inclusion in the referendum count. Producers voted 268,066 trees in favor of and 79,819 trees against the establishment of the program by volume of trees cut and sold during the previous marketing season. The eligible votes favoring establishment of the Program by number of producers represented 72% of the eligible votes and those against establishment of the program represented 28% of the eligible votes. The eligible votes favoring establishment of the Program by number of trees cut and sold during the previous marketing season represented 77% of the eligible votes and those against establishment of the Program by number of trees cut and sold during the previous marketing season represented 23% of the eligible votes by number of trees. There were 20 spoiled or ineligible ballots. Because a majority of the votes were cast in favor of the Program, the Pennsylvania Christmas Tree Marketing and Research Program shall become effective 21 days from publication of this notice in

accordance with section 4509 of the Agricultural Commodities Marketing Act.

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302, 303, 304 and 305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate identifies a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, or a combination of the cleanup standards, or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific cleanup standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified as proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved, and comments, should be directed to the remediator of the site.

APPLICATIONS TO CONDUCT COAL AND NONCOAL ACTIVITIES

Applications under the Surface Mining Conservation and Reclamation Act (52 P. S. §§ 1396.1—1396.19a); the Noncoal Surface Mining Conservation and Reclamation Act (52 P. S. §§ 3301—3326); The Clean Streams Law (35 P. S. §§ 691.1—691.1001); the Coal Refuse Disposal Control Act (52 P. S. §§ 30.51—30.66); The Bituminous Mine Subsidence and Land Conservation Act (52 P. S. §§ 1406.1—1406.21). Mining activity permits issued in response to the applications will also address the applicable permitting requirements of the following statutes: the Air Pollution Control Act (35 P. S. §§ 4001—4015); the Dam Safety and Encroachments Act (32 P. S. §§ 693.1—693.27); and the Solid Waste Management Act (35 P. S. §§ 6018.101—6018.1003).

The following permit applications to conduct mining activities have been received by the Department of Environmental Protection (Department). A copy of the application is available for inspection at the District mining office indicated above each application. Where a 401 water quality certification is needed for any aspect of a particular proposed mining activity, the submittal of the permit application will serve as the request for the certification.

Written comments or objections, or requests for informal conferences on applications, may be submitted by any person or any officer or head of any Federal, State or local government agency or authority to the Department at the same address within 30 days of this publication, or within 30 days after the last publication of the applicant's newspaper advertisement, as provided by 25 Pa. Code §§ 77.121—77.123 and 86.31—86.34 (relating to public notices of filing of permit applications, opportunity for comment, and informal conferences).

Where any of the mining activities listed will have discharges of wastewater to streams, the Department will incorporate NPDES permits into the mining activity permits issued in response to these applications. The NPDES permits will contain, at a minimum, technology-based effluent limitations (as described in the Department's regulations—25 Pa. Code §§ 77.522, 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.242, 89.52 and 90.102) for iron, manganese, suspended solids, settleable solids, alkalinity and pH. In addition to the above, more restrictive effluent limita-

tions, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining which may occur will be incorporated into a mining activity permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 93 and 95). Persons or agencies which have requested review of the NPDES permit requirements for a particular mining activity within the above-mentioned public comment period will be provided with a 30-day period to review and submit comments on those requirements.

Written comments or objections should contain the name, address and telephone number of persons submitting comments or objections; application number; and a statement of sufficient detail to inform the Department on the basis of comment or objection and relevant facts upon which it is based. Requests for an informal conference must contain the name, address and telephone number of requestor; application number; a brief summary of the issues to be raised by the requestor at the conference; and a statement whether the requestor desires to have the conference conducted in the locality of the proposed mining activities.

ENCROACHMENTS

To remove a single span steel truss bridge (Bucks County Bridge 145) which spans over Mill Creek (WWF) and to construct and maintain, in its place, a single span prestressed concrete bridge with a clear span of approximately 63 feet and underclearance of approximately 4.6 feet. The skew angle will also be modified from 71 degrees to 72.35 degrees. This project proposes to impact 30 linear feet of Bobby Run which is designated a high quality cold water fishery and does not propose to impact any wetlands.

Estimated stream disturbance is 150 feet; stream classification is CWF; permanent wetland impact is 0.003 acre.

The Department has reviewed and approved an Official Sewage Facilities Plan Update for Plainfield Township, Northampton County.

This Update Revision addresses the extension of the Wind Gap Municipal Authority sanitary sewer franchise area so as to include the entire Chandler Estates property. All sewage collection and conveyance facilities on the property will be privately owned and maintained. Two small pump stations will move the sewage to an existing manhole on the Chandler Estates property which is connected by a gravity system to the Wind Gap Municipal Authority sewer main on Teels Road. The Wind Gap Municipal Authority has indicated that conveyance and treatment capacity is available in their facilities for the proposed 2,970 gpd of sewage flows.

Under section 1113 of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (35 P. S. §§ 6020.101—6020.1305) (HSCA), notice is hereby provided that the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has entered into a Consent Order and Agreement (CO&A) with FMC Corporation (FMC) concerning the environmental investigation of the mercury release at the Avtex Fibers, Inc. Site (Site) wastewater treatment plant.

The Site is a former manufacturing facility that produced synthetic fibers between 1929 and 1986. FMC owned the facility between 1963 and 1976. The Crawford County Development Corporation (CCDC) currently owns the Site. The facility at the Site utilized a wastewater treatment plant that gradually leaked mercury into the media within the trickling filter tanks. Further amounts of mercury were also released during demolition activities conducted by the CCDC in 1995 through early 1997.

As an owner of the Site subsequent to the releases at the Site, and during a period of time that the release and threatened release of hazardous substances occurred at the Site, FMC is a "responsible party" as defined in section 103 of the HSCA. Under the terms of the CO&A, FMC will conduct an environmental investigation at the wastewater treatment plant, to determine the nature and extent of the release of mercury associated with the

trickling filter tanks. The Department has approved a Work Plan submitted by FMC, which delineates the work to be conducted for the aforementioned environmental investigation at the Site.

The specific terms of this settlement are set forth in the CO&A between the Department and FMC. The Department will receive and consider comments relating to the CO&A for 60 days from the date of this public notice. The Department has the right to withdraw its consent to the CO&A if the comments concerning the CO&A disclose facts or considerations which indicate that the CO&A is inappropriate, improper or not in the public interest. After the public comment period, the Department's settlement with FMC shall be effective upon the date that the Department notifies FMC, in writing, that this Consent Order and Agreement is final and effective in its present form, and that the Department has filed a response to significant written comments to the CO&A, or that no comments were received.

**Settlement Under the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act
Quality Container Corporation Site**

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department), under the authority of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (HSCA) (35 P. S. §§ 6020.101—6020.1305), has entered into a Consent Decree with BASF Corporation (BASF) to settle the Department's claims against BASF in the matter of *Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Department of Environmental Protection v. Quality Container Corporation et al.*, Civil Action No. 99-CV-644. The Department filed a complaint in the referenced matter on February 5, 1999, seeking reimbursement of the Department's costs incurred for conducting response activities at the Quality Container Corporation (QCC) site. The QCC site is a parcel of land of approximately 1.25 acres located in the City of Philadelphia, Philadelphia County, at the intersection of Collins Street and E. Ontario Street. The surrounding area is zoned commercial and residential.

QCC operated a drum reconditioning facility from 1977 through 1990. QCC stopped operations in 1990 and subsequently abandoned the site leaving roll-off containers, drums and wastes generated by facility operations. In addition, process equipment on the site was not cleaned of wastes at the time the facility was abandoned. The roll-off containers, drums, process equipment and abandoned wastes were not contained and were accessible to the public.

Because of the threat to human health and the environment posed by the QCC site, the site was deemed as an HSCA site on August 12, 1994, under section 502 of the HSCA. The Department subsequently implemented and completed an interim response from March 20, 1995, through February 8, 1996, to address the release or threat of release of hazardous substances. To date, the Department has incurred response costs of approximately \$1.85 million related to the release or threat of release of hazardous substances.

The proposed Consent Decree with BASF was lodged with the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Pennsylvania on June 29, 1999. Under the terms of the Consent Decree subject to this notice, the Department will receive a total of \$48,500.

This notice is provided under section 1113 of the HSCA. The proposed Consent Decree is subject to final approval by the Department following the receipt and review of comments submitted by the public. The proposed Consent Decree contains the specific terms of the settlement and is available for public review and comment. Certified Emission Reduction Credits in Pennsylvania's ERC Registry

Emission reduction credits (ERCs) are surplus, permanent, quantified and Federally enforceable emission reductions used to offset emission increases of oxides of nitrogen (NOx), volatile organic compounds (VOCs) and the following criteria pollutants: carbon monoxide (CO), lead (Pb), oxides of sulfur (SOx), particulate matter (PM), PM-10 and PM-10 precursors.

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) maintains an ERC registry in accordance with the requirements of 25 Pa. Code § 127.209. The ERC registry system provides for the tracking of the creation, transfer and use of ERCs. Prior to registration of the credits, ERC Registry Applications are reviewed and approved by the Department to confirm that the ERCs meet the requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.206—127.208. Registration of the credits in the ERC registry system constitutes certification that the ERCs satisfy applicable requirements and that the credits are available for use. The following registered, and certified ERCs in the ERC Registry are currently available for use as follows:

- (1) To satisfy new source review (NSR) emission offset ratio requirements.
- (2) To "net-out" of NSR at ERC-generating facilities.
- (3) To sell or trade the ERCs for use as emission offsets at new or modified facilities.

The certified ERCs shown as follows, expressed in tons per year (tpy), satisfy the applicable ERC requirements contained in 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.206—127.208. ERCs created from the curtailment or shutdown of a source or facility expire for use as offsets 10 years after the emission reduction occurs. ERCs generated by the over-control of emissions by an existing facility do not expire for use as offsets. However, credits in the registry which are not used in a plan approval will be discounted if new air quality requirements are adopted by the Department or United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

The policy also stated that the civil penalty waiver and recommendation against criminal prosecution are limited to testing-related violations disclosed to EPA by February 1, 2000, and are subject to certain conditions, such as the need to design and conduct the tests for the shortest possible period of time necessary, the need to correct any testing-related violations immediately, and other conditions to ensure that protection of human health and the environment is not compromised. Advance Notice of Intent to Revise Guidance

DEP ID: 391-0300-002 Title: Special Protection Waters Implementation Handbook.

Description: The existing guidance document (Special Protection Waters Implementation Handbook, First Edition, November 1992), document number 391-0300-002, for implementation of the antidegradation elements of Pennsylvania's water quality standards program is being revised and rewritten to reflect new regulations regarding antidegradation requirements. These new regulations, set forth in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 93, were adopted in final rulemaking by the Environmental Quality Board at its meeting of May 19, 1999. The new regulations encompass changes to the criteria governing the official classification of surface waters as High Quality and Exceptional Value Waters, and they refine the scope of Department/public antidegradation review for activities requiring a DEP

permit or approval, so as to protect existing uses of all surface waters. The new regulations were developed to replace Federal antidegradation regulations which were promulgated by EPA for Pennsylvania as a result of litigation in Federal court. The Federal regulations became effective on January 9, 1997. Pennsylvania's new regulations are consistent with the Federal regulations, and the adopted refinements to the rule now necessitate revisions to the implementation guidance.

Proposed Development and Review Process: The Department will initially work closely with the Water Resources Advisory Committee (WRAC) to identify, develop, and discuss the various antidegradation classification and implementation issues. To provide more comprehensive expertise, the WRAC membership has been expanded to assist with this process. Department staff from programs affected by the antidegradation regulations and from the regional offices will also participate in the process and will attend the WRAC meetings. At the end of the initial process, WRAC will develop final conclusions and recommendations to the Department on the issues.

The Department will then consider all recommendations from WRAC and Department program/regional staff on the key issues, and will incorporate and expand the findings into a first draft of the revised Special Protection Waters Implementation Handbook. Target date for production of the first draft is October 20, 1999. This draft will be distributed to the WRAC, for discussion at its regular meeting on November 10, 1999, and will also be distributed for comment to affected programs and regional offices. After consideration of comment and subsequent revision, a second draft of the Handbook will be prepared for general public participation review, to include public meetings across the State, publication on the Department's web site, and notice of availability in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. After review of general public comments received, and subsequent revision, a final version of the Handbook will be prepared and published. Target date for the final version is March 1, 2000.

All drafts of the Handbook will be reviewed and approved by the Department before distribution to the expanded WRAC team, so that all requirements regarding public access to information may be observed.

Under the authority contained in the Transportation Act for the 21st Century, Act of June 9, 1998, Pub. L. No. 105-178, 112 Stat. 113 (23 U.S.C. § 101) and in keeping with the requirements of 49 C.F.R. Part 26, the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (Department) hereby provides the following public notice concerning its new goal for participation by Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBEs) in its federally-assisted contracts.

As a recipient of federal funds from the United States Department of Transportation through various organizations including the Federal Highway Administration, the Department must comply with the goal setting provisions of the new DBE regulation that took effect on March 4, 1999. The new regulation is set forth at 49 C.F.R. Part 26. The Department is mandated to submit a revised DBE program including a new goal and a methodology for projecting the overall goal for DBE participation on its federally-assisted contracts consistent with the provisions of 49 C.F.R. Sections 26.45 and 26.51. The new goal and methodology must be submitted to the Federal Highway Administration by September 1, 1999. Providing notice to the public concerning the goal and the methodology used to arrive at a final goal and affording the public the opportunity to provide comment is an important part of the process.

To comply with the goal setting provisions of the final rule, the Department has employed a two step process. This process is outlined in 49 C.F.R. Section 26.45.

Under step one, the Department has created a baseline figure for the relative availability of "ready, willing, and able DBEs" in its relevant market. This determination has evolved from demonstrative evidence of local market conditions. To this end, the Department has developed definitions of "ready, willing and able DBEs" relative to all businesses "ready, willing and able" to perform on its federally assisted contracts. The Department has considered historical activity within specified market areas including research, engineering and design consulting, contractors (prime, subcontractors, suppliers, trucking) and other consulting activities. Additionally, the Department has developed a ratio within market areas of the "ready, willing and able DBEs" relative to the universe of all other "ready, willing and able" enterprises.

Under step two, the Department has examined all relevant evidence in its jurisdiction to determine what adjustments, up or down, are needed to arrive at the overall goal. Step two also takes into consideration other conditions or variables impacting DBEs in the Commonwealth. As part of the adjustment phase, the Department has given due consideration to market potential based upon census data and other public data as well as potential geographical accessibility and location issues.

Consistent with the public participation requirement for this process, the Department is hereby informing the general public that the proposed goal and its rationale are available for inspection and review for forty-five days from the date of this notice. State Board of Psychology Regulation No. 16A-636 Application Fees

We have reviewed this proposed regulation from the State Board of Psychology (Board) and submit for consideration the following objections and recommendations. Section 5.1(h) and (i) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) specify the criteria the Commis-

sion must employ to determine whether a regulation is in the public interest. In applying these criteria, our Comments address issues that relate to fiscal impact and clarity. We recommend that these Comments be carefully considered as you prepare the final-form regulations.

1. Section 41.12. Fees—Fiscal Impact and Clarity.

Administrative overhead costs

In the proposed regulation's fee report forms, there are significant differences in the costs covered by different fees except for "administrative overhead" costs. The overhead costs for three of the proposed fee revisions are identical; and the overhead costs for the remaining two fee revisions are also identical. According to staff at the Department of State and its Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (BPOA), the allocated share of overhead cost for each fee category is calculated by dividing total overhead costs by the number of active licensees. This methodology for overhead cost allocation is not unreasonable and has been consistently applied. On the other hand, the staff cost allocations are based on estimates of the actual time BPOA staff spends performing the tasks related to each fee.

For overhead cost allocations, there appears to be no relationship to the services covered by the fees or frequency of fee payments. Therefore, there is no indication that the fees will recover actual or projected overhead costs. In addition, the allocated costs are based on past expenditures rather than estimates or projections of future expenditures. Hence, there is no certainty that the fees' "projected revenues will meet or exceed projected expenditures" under section 3.3(a) of the Professional Psychologists Practice Act (63 P. S. § 1203.3(a)).

We question the use of a constant overhead cost allocation that appears to be unrelated to the actual costs of activities covered by different fees. Even though this process was used to determine other fees, why should BPOA maintain this approach? The Board and BPOA should specifically identify the overhead costs, or portion of the total overhead, to be recouped by these fees, and review their methodology for allocating these overhead costs. Is it the Board's goal to allocate all overhead costs by category to each fee? If so, we do not believe the current allocation formula gives the desired result.

Similarity in tasks

The Board's staff time and administrative costs for the verification of license or registration as outlined in the fee report form are 0.08/hour and \$1.62, respectively. The staff time and administrative costs for the certification of scores, license or registration outlined in the fee report form are 0.75/hour and \$15.23, respectively. Yet the descriptions of the administrative functions the Board staff performs for both are identical. The Board should explain the cost and time differentials when it submits its final-form rulemaking.

Tentative Order

By the Commission:

I. Introduction

On June 22, 1999, Governor Thomas J. Ridge signed into law the Natural Gas Choice and Competition Act, P.L. xxx, No. xxx effective July 1, 1999, 66 Pa.C.S. § 2201—2211 (act). Under the act, beginning on November 1, 1999, retail customers will have the ability to choose their natural gas supplier. Previously, consumers procured their natural gas supply requirements as a package from the jurisdictional public utility. The pack-

age, mentioned above, included what are now the basic components of competitive natural gas service, commodity, capacity and storage, balancing and aggregation services of the natural gas utility. The focus of this Tentative Order is the requirements for natural gas suppliers under section 2208 of the act and other issues regarding licensing of natural gas suppliers. The act, at section 2202, defines a natural gas supplier as:

An entity other than a natural gas distribution company, but including natural gas distribution company marketing affiliates, which provides natural gas supply services to retail gas customers utilizing the jurisdictional facilities of a natural gas distribution company. The term includes a natural gas distribution company that provides natural gas supply services outside its certificated service territories. The term includes a municipal corporation, its affiliates or any joint venture, to the extent that it chooses to provide natural gas supply services to retail customers located outside of its corporate or municipal limits, as applicable, other than:

(i) as provided prior to the effective date of this chapter, pursuant to a certificate of public convenience if required under this title;

(ii) total natural gas supply services in de minimis amounts;

(iii) natural gas supply services requested by, or provided with the consent of, the public utility in whose certificated territory the services are provided; or

(iv) natural gas supply services provided to the municipal corporation itself or its tenants on land it owns or leases, or is subject to an agreement of sale or pending condemnation, as of September 1, 1999, to the extent permitted by applicable law independent of this chapter.

The term excludes an entity to the extent that it provides free gas to end-users under the terms of an oil or gas lease. Notwithstanding any other provision of this title, a natural gas supplier that is not a natural gas distribution company is not a public utility as defined in section 102 (relating to definitions) to the extent that the natural gas supplier is utilizing the jurisdictional distribution facilities of a natural gas distribution company or is providing other services authorized by the Commission.

As used in the above definition of a natural gas supplier, the term natural gas supply services includes (i) the sale or arrangement of the sale of natural gas to retail customers; and (ii) services that may be unbundled by the Commission under section 2203(3) of the act, (relating to standards for restructuring of the natural gas utility industry). Natural gas supply service does not include distribution service.

II. Requirements for Natural Gas Suppliers

A. License Requirements

In accordance with section 2208(a) of the act, all natural gas suppliers including a natural gas distribution company that provides natural gas supply service outside of its chartered or certificated territory, must hold a license issued by the Commission. A license shall not be required for customers who make de minimis incidental sales or resales to themselves, an affiliate or to other nonresidential retail gas customers.

B. Entities Currently Operating as Natural Gas Suppliers

Section 2208(a) of the act states that no entity shall engage in the business of a natural gas supplier unless it holds a license issued by the Commission. We believe this

requirement is applicable to all entities currently operating as natural gas suppliers, in gas pilot programs, as well as all entities yet to engage in such practices. Each entity currently doing business as a natural gas supplier, as defined in the act, should apply for a Natural Gas Supplier's License from the Commission no later than Monday, August 2, 1999. This will provide staff sufficient time to perfect the applications prior to the November 1, 1999, implementation date.

C. License Application and Issuance

Natural gas suppliers shall submit, in writing to the Commission, under section 2208(b) of the act, an application for a license. The application shall be verified by oath or affirmation. Attachment A to this Tentative Order contains the Commission's natural gas supplier license application. The application may also be downloaded from the Commission's webpage.¹

A license shall be issued to any applicant, authorizing the whole or any part of the service covered by the application, if it is found that the applicant is fit, willing and able to perform properly the service proposed and to conform to the applicable provisions of the act and the orders and regulations of the Commission, including those concerning standards and billing practices, and that the proposed service to the extent authorized by the license, will be consistent with the public interest. Otherwise, the application shall be denied.

D. Financial Fitness

We place a high priority on maintaining the safety and reliability of the current natural gas supply service in this Commonwealth, therefore, no natural gas supplier license shall be issued or remain in force unless the applicant or holder of the license complies with each of the following:

(i) Furnishes a bond or other security in a form and amount to ensure the financial responsibility of the natural gas supplier. The Commission shall periodically review the criteria upon petition of any party. The amount and form of the bond or other security may be mutually agreed to between the natural gas distribution company and the natural gas supplier or the alternate supplier of last resort or failing that shall be determined by criteria approved by the Commission.

(ii) Provides the Commission with the address of the participant's principal office in this Commonwealth or the address of the participant's registered agent in this Commonwealth, the latter being the address at which the participant may be served process.

Failure of a natural gas supplier to comply with any provision of the act, or the rules, regulation, orders or directives of the Department of Revenue or of the Commission, including, but not limited to, engaging in anticompetitive behavior, shall be cause for the Commission to revoke the license of the natural gas supplier.

E. Transferability of License

Under section 2808(d) of the act, a licensed natural gas supplier may not transfer its license without prior Commission approval. The Commission requires the licensee to provide this notice at least 90 days in advance of the transfer.

F. *Form of Regulation of Natural Gas Suppliers*

The Commission may forbear from extending its regulation of natural gas suppliers, except where a natural gas supplier serves as a supplier of last resort, beyond licensing, bonding, reliability and consumer services and protections, including all applicable portions of 52 Pa. Code Chapter 56, relating to standards and billing practices for residential utility service.² Subject to section 2207 of the act (relating to obligation to serve), nothing in this section shall preclude a natural gas supplier, upon appropriate and reasonable notice to the retail gas customer, supplier of last resort and the natural gas distribution company, from canceling its contract with any customer for legal cause, subject to the customer's right to have continued service from the supplier of last resort. After receiving notice the customer could then attempt to repair their relationship with the natural gas supplier, seek a new natural gas supplier, or default to the natural gas distribution company, at current tariffed rates or to the provider of last resort. The customer would only be disconnected from the distribution system under Chapter 56 if the customer failed to meet his obligations to the utility of the provider of last resort.

G. *City Natural Gas Distribution Operation License Application and Issuance*

The act defines a City Natural Gas Distribution Operation at section 102 as follows:

A collection of real and personal assets used for distributing natural gas to retail gas customers owned by a city or a municipal authority, nonprofit corporation or public corporation formed pursuant to section 2212(m) (relating to city natural gas distribution operations).

Section 2212(p) of the act states that a city natural gas distribution operation may apply for a license under the procedures under section 2208 (relating to requirements for natural gas suppliers). Subject to the requirement that it qualify for and obtain a natural gas supplier license under section 2208, a city natural gas distribution operation is authorized to engage in the business of a natural gas supplier outside its municipal or corporate limits.

H. *Open and Nondiscriminatory Access*

A municipal corporation shall, before it is permitted to provide natural gas supply services as a licensed natural gas supplier, demonstrate, and the Commission shall determine, that by the date of the issuance of the license, it will provide other natural gas suppliers open and nondiscriminatory access to its gas distribution system under standards that are comparable to the act, taking into consideration the particular circumstances of the municipal corporation's ownership and /or operation of its gas distribution system.

III. *Other Issues*

A. *Publication of Notice of Filing*

Commission regulations at 52 Pa. Code § 54.35 address the publication requirements regarding notice of filing as follows:

(a) Notice of filing an application shall be published in newspapers of general circulation covering each county in which the applicant intends to provide service as required by § 5.14(a)(2) (relating to applications requiring notice). Applicants may contact the

Commission's Press Secretary³ to confirm the identity of the newspapers of general circulation in which notice shall be published.

(b) The notice shall be written in plain language and include the name, address and telephone number of the applicant, a description of the proposed services to be provided and the geographic area to be served. The notice shall include the application docket number and a statement that protests related to the technical or financial fitness of the applicant shall be filed within 15 days of the publication date of the notice with the Commission's Secretary, Public Utility Commission, P. O. Box 3265, Harrisburg, PA 17105-3265. The notice in an acceptable electronic format shall be submitted to the Commission's Secretary for posting on the Commission's Internet web site.

B. *Protests to Applications*

Commission regulations at 52 Pa. Code § 54.36 address the requirements regarding protests to applications as follows:

(a) Consistent with § 5.14(b) (relating to applications requiring notice), a 15-day protest period commences on the date notice of the application filing is published in newspapers. An interested party may file a protest to an application in compliance with § 5.52(a) (relating to content of a protest to an application) and shall set out clearly and concisely the facts upon which challenge to the fitness of the applicant is based. An applicant may file an answer to the protest within 10 days of when the protest is filed. Protests that do not fully comply with § 5.52(a) will be rejected.

(b) Protests may challenge only the applicant's financial and technical fitness to provide the service for which a license is requested. Consistent with the requirements of due process, sanctions, such as revocation or suspension of a supplier's license or the imposition of a fine, may be imposed on parties who intentionally misuse the protest process by repeated filing of competitive protests.

(c) A protest to the applicant's technical or financial fitness to provide service will be assigned to Commission staff for review. Staff will determine if the protest fully complies with § 5.52(a) and sets out clearly and concisely the facts upon which the challenge to the fitness of the applicant is based. Staff will determine if the protest is sufficiently documented. If a protest is not sufficiently documented, Commission staff will prepare a recommendation for Commission consideration dismissing the protest and granting the application. If a protest is sufficiently documented, the application will be transferred to the Office of Administrative Law Judge for hearings or mediation as deemed appropriate.

C. *Technical Fitness*

The Commission issued a policy statement addressing the fitness of a natural gas marketer or broker (including a natural gas distribution company's affiliate), which has been published at 52 Pa.C.S. § 69.195. In this policy statement the phrase marketers or brokers, or both, includes all natural gas distribution company affiliates, subsidiaries, parents, divisions, and the like providing natural gas supply to respective natural gas distribution company's customers. The Commission will be interpreting the terms marketer and broker as contained in 52

Pa.C.S. § 69.195 et. seq. as applying to natural gas suppliers as defined in the act.

The Commission seeks to insure that natural gas suppliers operating in this Commonwealth possess the financial or technical, or both, fitness necessary to meet their obligations consistent with the public interest in system reliability and gas supplies. Assurance of the continuation of reliable service and secure supplies is a prerequisite for opening Pennsylvania's gas markets to full retail competition.

Gas suppliers that wish to deliver gas to retail customers should demonstrate that they have the requisite financial and technical fitness to meet their obligations consistent with the public interest in system reliability and natural gas distribution company's underlying supplier-of-last-resort obligation. The financial and technical fitness is expected for any natural gas supplier that wants to serve any or all retail commercial, industrial or retail classes. Financial and technical fitness is aimed at ensuring that a marketer or broker has the requisite ability to offer service to the public.

Under the act, "a license shall be issued to any applicant, authorizing the whole or any part of the service covered by the application, if it is found that the applicant is fit, willing and able to perform properly the services proposed and to conform to the applicable provisions of this title and the orders and regulations of the Commission, including those concerning standards and billing practices, and that the proposed service, to the extent authorized by the license, will be consistent with the public interest." Applicants who are currently providing natural gas services in Pennsylvania will be presumed to have demonstrated technical fitness.

D. *Financial Fitness—Bond or Other Security*

To ensure the safety and reliability of natural gas supply services, section 2208 of the act, states that no natural gas supplier license shall be issued or remain in force unless the applicant furnishes a bond or other security in a form and amount to ensure the financial responsibility of the natural gas supplier.

The criteria used to determine the amount and the form of these bonds or other securities are to be set forth in the natural gas distribution company's restructuring filings. Furthermore, the amount and form of the bond or other security may be mutually agreed to between the natural gas distribution company and the natural gas supplier or the alternative supplier of last resort and the natural gas supplier.

The license applicant must supply the Commission with proof that it has obtained the necessary bond or other financial security for each natural gas distribution company in whose service territory the license applicant will provide service to retail customers. The license applicant must demonstrate that they have met the criteria required by the applicable Commission restructuring Order or that they have arrived at a mutually agreed alternative. The license applicant shall provide the Commission with a copy of the bonds, other financial security or other negotiated alternatives.

E. *Nontraditional Natural Gas Service Marketers*

The definition of "natural gas supplier" at section 2202 of the act is very broad. This section also defines "natural gas supply services" to include the sale or arrangement of the sale of natural gas to retail gas customers. As the

competitive natural gas market place develops, we anticipate that there may be certain community-based organizations (CBOs), civic, fraternal or business associations, common interest groups and other entities that work with a licensed natural gas supplier to market services to their members or constituents. We believe that it may be unnecessarily duplicative to require these nontraditional natural gas service marketers to obtain their own licenses under certain circumstances. We therefore will not require nontraditional marketers to be licensed if they meet the following criteria:

- The nontraditional marketers must conduct their transactions through a licensed natural gas supplier.
- The nontraditional marketer:
 - (1) May not collect revenues directly from retail customers due to the provision of natural gas services.
 - (2) May not require its members or constituents to obtain their natural gas service through the nontraditional marketer or the licensed natural gas suppliers with which the nontraditional marketer arranges retail services.
 - (3) Is not responsible for the scheduling of natural gas supplies, the payment or remission of taxes due from the sales of natural gas services and are not responsible for the payment of the costs of the natural gas to its suppliers or producers.

Additionally, the licensed natural gas suppliers who provide services to retail customers through the activities of a nontraditional marketer must retain responsibility for these sales under the act. The licensed natural gas supplier must maintain the appropriate bonding requirements for the sales. The licensed natural gas supplier must meet the same supply reliability requirements with the natural gas sales as it is required to provide for its own retail sales. The licensed natural gas supplier is also responsible for the nontraditional marketers activities and will be held responsible for any violations of the act, the Commission's regulations, including Chapter 56, or the Public Utility Code, committed by the nontraditional marketer.

Each nontraditional marketer and each licensed natural gas supplier must provide Commission notification of their agreement to market natural gas services to retail customers prior to the nontraditional marketer engaging in any natural gas service sales activity.

F. *Market Power Remediation—Standards of Conduct*

The act addresses standards of conduct under section 2209. Under section 2209(a) of the act the Commission is required to provide interim guidelines for standards of conduct governing the activity of and relationships between natural gas distribution companies and their affiliated natural gas suppliers and other natural gas suppliers. The Commission is also required to monitor and enforce compliance with these standards. Section 2209(c) of the act requires that the standards of conduct provide:

- (1) No discrimination against or preferential treatment of any natural gas supplier, including an affiliated natural gas supplier.
- (2) No disclosure or preferential sharing of any confidential information to or with any individual natural gas supplier.
- (3) Adequate rules prohibiting cross-subsidization of an affiliated natural gas supplier by a natural gas distribution company.

(4) Maintenance of separate books and records by the natural gas distribution company and its affiliated natural gas suppliers.

(5) Sufficient physical and operational separation, but not including legal divestiture to accomplish the preceding noted requirements.

(6) An informal dispute resolution procedure and a system of penalties for noncompliance with the final set of standards of conduct consistent with existing Commission regulations.

The Commission has addressed the relationship of the natural gas distribution company and their affiliates as the natural gas industry moved towards full competition through a policy statement at 52 Pa.C.S. §§ 69.191 and 69.192. The Commission is of the opinion that these policy statements, to the extent they are consistent with the requirements of the act, may form the basis for the interim standards of conduct for the natural gas distribution companies and their affiliates. Specifically section 69.192 states that the following policies should be applied by the natural gas distribution company or natural gas distribution companies (as defined by the act):

(1) The [natural gas distribution company] should apply its tariffs in a nondiscriminatory manner to its affiliate, its own marketing division and any nonaffiliate.

(2) The [natural gas distribution company] should likewise not apply a tariff provision in any manner that would give its affiliate or division an unreasonable preference over other marketers with regard to matters such as scheduling, balancing, transportation, storage, curtailment or nondelivery.

(3) If a tariff provision is mandatory, the [natural gas distribution company] should not waive the provision for its affiliate or division absent prior approval of the Commission.

(4) If a tariff provision is not mandatory or provides for waivers, the [natural gas distribution company] should grant the waivers without preference to affiliates and divisions or non-affiliates.

(5) The [natural gas distribution company] should maintain a chronological log of tariff provisions for which it has granted waivers. Entries should include the name of the party receiving the waiver, the date and time of the request, the specific tariff provision waived and the reason for the waiver. Any chronological log should be open for public inspection during normal business hours.

(6) The [natural gas distribution company] should process requests for transportation promptly and in a nondiscriminatory fashion with respect to other requests received in the same or a similar period. The [natural gas distribution company] should maintain a chronological log showing the processing of requests for transportation services. Any chronological log should be open for public inspection during normal business hours.

(7) Transportation discounts provided to the [natural gas distribution company's] or its marketing affiliate's favored customers should be offered to other similarly situated customers and should not be tied to any unrelated service, incentive or offer on behalf of either the parent or affiliate. A chronological log should be maintained showing the date, party, time and rationale for the action. Any chronological

log should be open for public inspection during normal business hours.

(8) The [natural gas distribution company] should not disclose any customer proprietary information to its marketing affiliate or division, and to the extent that it does disclose customer information, it should do so to other similarly situated marketers in a similar fashion so as not to selectively disclose, delay disclosure or give itself or its affiliate any undue advantage related to the disclosure. A chronological log should be maintained showing the date, time and rationale for the disclosure. Any chronological log should be open for public inspection during normal business hours.

(9) The [natural gas distribution company] should justly and reasonably allocate to its marketing affiliate or division the costs or expenses for general administration or support services.

(10) The [natural gas distribution company] selling surplus gas supplies and/or upstream capacity on a short-term basis (as defined to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission) to its affiliate should make supplies available to similarly situated marketers on a nondiscriminatory basis. The [natural gas distribution company] should not make any gas supplies and/or upstream capacity available through private disclosure to the [natural gas distribution company's] affiliate unless the availability is made simultaneously with public dissemination in a manner that fairly apprises interested parties of the availability of the gas supplies and/or upstream capacity. The [natural gas distribution company] should maintain a chronological log of these public disseminations. Any chronological log should be open for public inspection during normal business hours.

(11) The [natural gas distribution company] should not condition or tie agreements to release interstate pipeline capacity to any service in which the [natural gas distribution company] or affiliate is involved.

(12) The [natural gas distribution company] should not directly or by implication . . . represent to any customer, supplier or third party that an advantage may accrue to any party through use of the [natural gas distribution company's] affiliate or subsidiary.

(13) The [natural gas distribution company] should establish and file with the Commission a complaint procedure for dealing with any alleged violations of any of the standards listed in paragraphs (1) through (12), this paragraph or paragraphs (14) and (15), excepting for paragraph (9), which should be exclusively under the purview of the Commission. These procedures should be developed in consultation with interested parties during consideration of any tariff guided by this section and § 69.191 (relating to general). The Commission may expect establishment of a complaint procedure or other recordkeeping requirements if warranted by subsequent facts or circumstances.

(14) The [natural gas distribution company] should keep a chronological log of any complaints, excepting paragraph (9), regarding discriminatory treatment of natural gas suppliers. This chronological log should include the date and nature of the complaint and the [natural gas distribution company's] resolution of it. Any chronological log should be open for inspection during normal business hours.

(15) Parties alleging violations of these standards may pursue their allegations through the Commission's established complaint procedures. A complainant bears the burden of proof consistent with 66 Pa.C.S. (relating to Public Utility Code) in regard to the allegations.

Additionally, the Commission would propose the following interim standards of conduct related to the activities of natural gas suppliers:

(1) Licensees shall provide accurate information about their natural gas supplier services using plain language and common terms. Where new terms are used, the terms must be defined again using plain language: Information should be provided in a format which will allow for comparison of the various natural gas supply services offered and the prices charged for each type of service.

(2) Licensees shall provide notification of the change in conditions of service, intent to cease operation as an natural gas supplier, explanation of denial of service, proper handling of deposits and proper handling of complaints in accordance with Commission regulations where applicable.

(3) Licensees shall maintain the confidentiality of customers' historic payment information and right of access to their own load and billing information.

(4) Licensees shall not discriminate in the provision of natural gas supply services as to availability and terms of service based on race, color, religion, national origin, sex, marital status, age receipt of public assistance income and exercise of rights under the Consumer Credit Protection Act, 15 U.S.C. §§ 1691—1691f; Regulation B, 12 CFR 202—202.14.

(5) Licensees will be responsible for any fraudulent deceptive or other unlawful marketing or billing acts performed by their agents or representatives. Licensee shall inform consumers of state consumer protection laws that govern the cancellation or rescission of natural gas supply service contracts. 73 P.S. § 201-7.

To facilitate public comment to these proposed interim natural gas supplier licensing requirements, a 14-day comment period is established. We urge that all interested persons file comments as soon as possible. Note that reply comments will not be permitted; *Therefore,*

It Is Ordered That:

1. The Requirements for Natural Gas Suppliers—Guidelines under Act 21-1999 Section 2208 as set forth in this tentative order are issued to the public for comment.

2. A comment period ending 14-days after the entry date of this order is hereby established.

3. Written comments, an original and 15 copies, shall be submitted to the Secretary, Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission, P. O. Box 3265, Harrisburg, PA 17105-3265. No reply comments will be permitted. A diskette containing the comments in Microsoft Word 6.0 electronic format must also be submitted. Comments should specifically reference the above-referenced docket number.

4. A copy of this order, any accompanying statements of the Commissioners and the appendices be served upon all jurisdictional natural gas distribution companies, the Office of Consumer Advocate, the Office of Small Business Advocate, the Office of Trial Staff, Legislative stakeholders, and shall be made available to all other interested parties and posted on the Commission's web page.

6. A final Opinion and Order shall be issued subsequent to the receipt and evaluation of any comments filed in accordance with this tentative order.

7. All natural gas suppliers as defined in 66 Pa.C.S. § 2201 wishing to provide natural gas supply services to retail gas customers utilizing the jurisdictional facilities of a natural gas distribution company, or aggregate residential, commercial and/or industrial natural gas load in this Commonwealth shall first apply for a license from this Commission under the licensing instructions and procedures established herein.

8. A copy of this order without Appendix A be submitted to the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
