

READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND THE PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency

wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacode.com.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylva-nia Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is available at www.pabulletin.com.

Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised. A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Reproduction, Dissemination or Publication of Information

Third parties may not take information from the *Pennsylvania Code* and *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and reproduce, disseminate or publish such information except as provided by 1 Pa. Code § 3.44. 1 Pa. Code § 3.44 reads as follows:

§ 3.44. General permission to reproduce content of Code and Bulletin.

Information published under this part, which information includes, but is not limited to, cross references, tables of cases, notes of decisions, tables of contents, indexes, source notes, authority notes, numerical lists and codification guides, other than the actual text of rules or regulations may be reproduced only with the written consent of the Bureau. The information which appears on the same leaf with the text of a rule or regulation, however, may be incidentally reproduced in connection with the reproduction of the rule or regulation, if the reproduction is for the private use of a subscriber and not for resale. There are no other restrictions on the reproduction of information published under this part, and the Commonwealth hereby consents to a reproduction.

Notice of Veto

June 30, 2015

To the Honorable House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania:

I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill 1192, Printer's Number 1959.

The citizens of Pennsylvania sent us here to do serious work and to address the problems facing this Commonwealth. This includes enacting a plan that contains fair and adequate education funding in part by implementing a commonsense severance tax, property tax relief to Pennsylvania families and seniors, a solution to fix the structural budget deficit, and a sound plan to create jobs across this Commonwealth. This bill fails to accomplish these essential tasks, so I cannot give it my approval.

This legislation falls short of a budget that I can endorse for the above broad and the following specific reasons. This budget is not balanced. If enacted, it will increase the deficit to over \$3 billion. That is irresponsible and it will lead to continued credit downgrades and fiscal crises. This budget fails to adequately pay our bills or plan for the future. It includes over \$1.5 billion in one-time revenues, payment delays into the next fiscal year, and fund transfers.

This budget does not restore the education cuts enacted over the last four years, nor does it provide adequate funding to ensure Pennsylvanians have schools that teach our children. Fixing our schools is the top priority for Pennsylvanians, but this budget invests only an additional \$8 million in our schools. This budget fails our children from early childhood to higher education. The budget proposal that I delivered to the General Assembly would have enabled at least 14,000 additional children to enroll in Pre-K programs and ensured that our superb institutions of higher education would not have to pass their increased costs on to students. This budget fails to meet any of these important needs.

For the foregoing reasons, I must withhold my signature from House Bill 1192, Printer's Number 1959.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 28—HEALTH AND SAFETY

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH [28 PA. CODE CH. 25]

Schedule of Controlled Substances; Clobazam

The Department of Health (Department) amends the schedules of controlled substances under the powers and duties in The Controlled Substance, Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act (act) (35 P. S. §§ 780-101—780-144). The Department amends § 25.72 (relating to schedules of controlled substances) to reschedule the substance clobazam from a Schedule I substance to a Schedule IV substance to read as set forth in Annex A.

A. Purpose of the Final-Omitted Rulemaking

Section 25.72 is amended to reschedule the substance clobazam from a Schedule I substance to a Schedule IV substance in accordance with controlled substance scheduling requirements in the act. The act recognizes the fact that there is a need to control substances that have potential for abuse while also recognizing that some of those substances have medical uses. The act provides for a system of five schedules of controlled substances as a means of grouping potentially dangerous substances based on their differing potentials for abuse and on their potential for medical use. Penalties for illegal use of the controlled substances vary according to the schedule on which the substance is listed. The health and safety of the public is protected by having a substance placed on the proper schedule. Additionally, proper scheduling ensures appropriate enforcement when a substance is abused or otherwise used illegally.

The act requires that a controlled substance be placed in Schedule I when there is: (1) a high potential for abuse; (2) no currently accepted medical use in the United States; and (3) a lack of accepted safety for use under medical supervision.

The act requires that a controlled substance be placed in Schedule IV when there is: (1) a low potential for abuse relative to substances listed in Schedule III; (2) currently accepted medical use in the United States; and (3) limited physical dependence or psychological dependence liability or both relative to the substances listed in Schedule III.

The act provides that the Secretary of Health (Secretary) shall control the substances listed in Schedules I—V and may, by regulation, upon his own motion or on the petition of an interested party, add a substance as a controlled substance after requesting the advice of the Pennsylvania Drug, Device and Cosmetic Board (Board). Section 3 of the act (35 P. S. § 780-103) prohibits the Secretary from removing a substance from control unless authorized by the General Assembly and from rescheduling a controlled substance unless specifically authorized by the Board.

Until recently, there was not a legitimate medical use in the United States for clobazam. Accordingly, clobazam was listed as a Schedule I controlled substance and it was illegal to possess, administer, dispense, prescribe or distribute.

On October 21, 2011, the United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved the drug OnfiTM (chemical name: clobazam) for the treatment of a rare but severe form of epilepsy in adults and in children 2 years of age and older. When the Department learned of the action of the FDA to approve the use of OnfiTM to treat certain forms of epilepsy, the Secretary acted as Chairperson to convene a meeting of the Board. The purpose of the meeting on March 27, 2012, was to determine whether, in consideration of the FDA's action regarding OnfiTM, clobazam should be rescheduled as a Schedule IV controlled substance instead of a Schedule I controlled substance. The Board voted unanimously to authorize the rescheduling of clobazam as a Schedule IV controlled substance. The Secretary, upon being authorized by the Board, directed that the substance clobazam be rescheduled. The rescheduling was effective immediately upon the Secretary's action and the Department published notice of the rescheduling at 42 Pa.B. 1929 (April 7, 2012). The purpose of this final-omitted rulemaking is to amend § 25.72 to conform to the action taken by the Secretary under section 3(c) of the act to reschedule clobazam as a Schedule IV controlled substance.

Under section 204 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. § 1204), known as the Commonwealth Documents Law (CDL), notice of proposed rulemaking may be omitted if the agency for good cause finds that the procedures in sections 201 and 202 of the CDL (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) are, under the circumstances, impracticable, unnecessary or contrary to the public interest. The Department finds justification for a final-omitted rulemaking to reschedule clobazam from a Schedule I substance to a Schedule IV substance because, under the circumstances, it is unnecessary and contrary to the public interest.

B. Affected Persons

Patients using and physicians and other practitioners prescribing clobazam are affected by its rescheduling. Patients in need of the drug will be able to obtain it more readily and physicians and other practitioners will not be subject to criminal prosecutions for prescribing or dispensing it.

Pharmacies and pharmacist in this Commonwealth, physicians, drug distributors, manufacturers and distributors will also be affected.

The general public will be affected and will benefit from the rescheduling of clobazam to Schedule IV classification. Patients in need of clobazam for treatment will have access to it through their physicians.

C. Fiscal Impact

This final-omitted rulemaking does not have measurable fiscal impact on the Commonwealth, local government, the private sector or the general public. This final-omitted rulemaking does not significantly affect costs or savings by the regulated community. This final-omitted rulemaking does not require new legal, accounting or consulting procedures not already being undertaking by the regulated community. There is not a measurable fiscal impact on local governments or State government because a system exists for the oversight of controlled substances.

D. Paperwork Requirements

A system already exists for the handling of controlled substances under the act and this final-omitted rulemaking does not increase paperwork.

E. Statutory Authority

The amendments to the schedules of controlled substances are adopted under the authority in section 3 of the act and section 4 of the act (35 P. S. § 780-104). The final-omitted rulemaking is also adopted under the authority in section 2012(g) of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 532(g)).

Section 3 of the act provides that the Secretary may control the substances listed in Schedules I—V of the act. Section 3(c) of the act provides that the "[S]ecretary shall not reschedule any controlled substance unless specifically authorized by the [B]oard to do so." The Board authorized the Secretary to reschedule clobazam.

F. Effective Date and Sunset Date

This final-omitted rulemaking will be effective upon publication. A sunset date has not been assuaged as the regulation will be continually monitored and updated as needed.

G. Regulatory Review

Under section 5.1(c) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(c)), on May 7, 2015, the Department submitted a copy of the final-omitted rulemaking and a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the House Health and Human Services Committee and the Senate Public Health and Welfare Committee. On the same date, the regulations were submitted to the Office of Attorney General for review and approval under the Commonwealth Attorneys Act (71 P. S. §§ 732-101—732-506).

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act, on June 17, 2015, the final-omitted rulemaking was deemed approved by the House and Senate Committees. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on June 18, 2015, and approved the final-omitted rulemaking.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

Rescission of Brucellosis Testing Requirements; Advance Notice of Proposed Rulemaking

The Department of Agriculture (Department) provides notice that it intends to pursue a proposed rulemaking to rescind regulations establishing Brucellosis testing standards and requirements. Interested individuals are invited to provide comments on this proposed action.

Section 3.22 (relating to Brucellosis requirements), which imposes general Brucellosis testing requirements for cattle, goats and buffalo, is targeted for rescission. Chapter 7 (relating to Brucellosis regulations), which contains more extensive provisions regarding Brucellosis, is also targeted for rescission.

The Department will propose to rescind § 3.22 and Chapter 7 because the prescribed testing is no longer necessary to protect the health of domestic animals in this Commonwealth. These regulations were amended in 1991, and in the intervening 24 years the threat posed by Brucellosis has lessened to the point the regulations are outdated, unnecessary and an impediment to commerce. In addition, the United States Department of Agriculture has, through its Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, established uniform methods and rules addressing Brucellosis eradication.

Written comments should be sent no later than July 18, 2015, to the Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Animal Health and Diagnostic Services, ATTN: Craig Shultz, DVM, Director, 2310 North Cameron Street, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9408. The Department will consider all comments received.

As of publication of this notice, the Department will cease active enforcement of § 3.22 and Chapter 7 and pursue the recission of these regulations.

School Bus Drivers; Medical Requirements and Standards

The Department of Transportation (Department), under the authority in 75 Pa.C.S. §§ 1504, 1508, 1508.1, 1509, 1517, 1518 and 6103, proposes to amend Chapter 71 (relating to school bus drivers) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Purpose

The purpose of Chapter 71 is to define more fully the requirements of 75 Pa.C.S. § 1509 (relating to qualifica-

tions for school bus driver endorsement) by listing minimum medical requirements for school bus drivers.

Purpose of the Proposed Rulemaking

The purpose of this proposed rulemaking is to update the medical requirements and standards for school bus drivers who have brain disease, a cognitive impairment or a mental/emotional disorder. Since medical testing and treatment methods continue to evolve, the Department is proposing to update the minimum standards to ensure that only school bus drivers who are in stable condition are qualified to transport children.

Summary of Significant Amendments

Section 71.2 (relating to definitions) is proposed to be amended to add the terms "brain disease," "cognitive functions," "dementia," "mental or emotional disorder," "neurologist," "psychiatrist" and "psychologist."

Proposed amendments to § 71.3(b)(11) (relating to physical examination) add minimum cognitive and mental/emotional requirements for school bus drivers.

Section 71.3(b)(11)(i) is proposed to be added to include brain disease or deficits of cognitive function in the list of disqualifying conditions.

Section 71.3(b)(11)(ii) is proposed to be added to outline the disqualifying symptoms for individuals who are not diagnosed with a mental/emotional disorder.

Section 71.3(b)(11)(ii)(A) is proposed to be added to outline the requirements for restoration of the school bus driving privilege.

Section 71.3(b)(11)(ii)(B) is proposed to be added to authorize the Department to require qualifying school bus drivers to pass a school bus knowledge and skills test.

Section 71.3(b)(11)(ii)(C) is proposed to be added to allow for a waiver to be granted provided the individual remains symptom free and in the treating health care provider's opinion, the individual has stabilized and symptoms are not likely to recur. The Department may require the individual to pass a school bus knowledge and skills test.

Section 71.3(b)(11)(iii) is proposed to be added to prohibit school bus drivers diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease or dementia in Stage 3 or greater from driving a school bus.

Persons and Entities Affected

This proposed rulemaking affects licensed school bus drivers and persons interested in becoming school bus drivers who have impairment from brain disease or deficits of cognitive function.

Fiscal Impact

Implementation of this proposed rulemaking will not require the expenditure of additional funds by the Commonwealth or local municipalities. This proposed rulemaking will not impose additional costs on the medical community and may reduce costs by providing clearer medical criteria and thus reduce unnecessary reporting by physicians and the need for follow-up medical examinations for drivers.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on June 29, 2015, the Department submitted a copy of this proposed rulemaking and a copy

of a Regulatory Analysis Form to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the House and Senate Transportation Committees. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC may convey any comments, recommendations or objections to the proposed rulemaking within 30 days of the close of the public comment period. The comments, recommendations or objections must specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the rulemaking, by the Department, the General Assembly and the Governor of comments, recommendations or objections raised.

Effective Date

This proposed rulemaking will be effective upon finalform publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* following the appropriate evaluation of comments, suggestions or objections received during the public comment period.

Sunset Date

The Department is not establishing a sunset date for these regulations, as the regulations are needed to administer provisions required under 75 Pa.C.S. (relating to Vehicle Code). The Department will continue to closely monitor these regulations for their effectiveness, in coordination with the Medical Advisory Board.

CHAPTER 71. SCHOOL BUS DRIVERS

§ 71.2. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Brain disease—A condition of the brain that may impair important functions such as memory, speech, vision, spatial perception, strength or coordination of movement, and cognitive functions.

CRNP—Certified registered nurse practitioner—A registered nurse licensed in this Commonwealth who is certi-

fied by the State Board of Nursing in a particular clinical specialty area and who, while functioning in the expanded role as a professional nurse, performs acts of medical diagnosis or prescription of medical therapeutic or corrective measures in collaboration with and under the direction of a physician licensed to practice medicine in this Commonwealth.

Chiropractor—A practitioner of chiropractic as defined in 75 Pa.C.S. § 1508.1(b) (relating to physical examinations).

Cognitive functions—Human abilities such as speech and language, complex levels of perception, attention, reasoning, judgment, reading and writing, and several types of memory.

Dementia—Brain diseases, including, but not limited to, Alzheimer's disease and vascular dementia, that are characterized by deficits in multiple cognitive functions. In the early stages, it can manifest as absentmindedness or forgetfulness. As the condition progresses, symptoms become more numerous and more severe. The stages of dementia, as defined by the Alzheimer Association, are:

Stage 1—No impairment

Stage 2—Very mild cognitive decline

Stage 3—Mild cognitive decline

Stage 4—Moderate cognitive decline

Stage 5—Moderately severe cognitive decline

Stage 6—Severe cognitive decline

Stage 7-Very severe cognitive decline

Hypoglycemic reactions—Different degrees of hypoglycemia which are classified as follows:

Mild—Hypoglycemia that signals a blood glucose drop, which the individual can self-correct with oral carbohydrates.

Severe—Hypoglycemia that requires outside intervention or assistance of others or that produces confusion, loss of attention or a loss of consciousness.

Mental or emotional disorder—A condition, whether organic or without known organic cause—as described and defined in the current Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, including its Introduction or International Classification of Diseases—manifested by important symptoms and functional changes such as psychosis (often with hallucinations or delusions), excessive anxiety and severe mood swings (mania and severe depression). Some mental disorders cause poor judgment, excessive aggressiveness, suicidal thinking or other behaviors that might affect driving performance.

Neurologist—A licensed physician who is Boardeligible or Board-certified in neurology.

Physical examination—An examination, including an eye examination, given to determine the physical and mental fitness of a person to drive a school bus safely.

Physician—A licensed physician as defined in § 83.2 (relating to definitions).

Physician assistant—A person certified by the State Board of Medicine to assist a physician or group of physicians in the provision of medical care and services and under the supervision and direction of the physician or group of physicians.

Psychiatrist—A licensed physician who is Boardeligible or Board-certified in psychiatry.

Psychologist—A person who is licensed as a psychologist.

Pupil Transportation Section—The Pupil Transportation Section of the Bureau of Driver Licensing of the Department.

§ 71.3. Physical examination.

* * * * *

(b) Requirements of physical examination. [A person] An individual is physically qualified to drive a school bus if the [person] individual:

* * * * *

- [(11) Has no mental, emotional or psychiatric disorder whether functional or organic which may be manifested in a condition likely to impair the ability to drive a school bus safely, such as inattentiveness, despondency, aggressiveness, or lack of concern for the safety of self or others.]
- (11) Meets the following cognitive and mental or emotional requirements:
- (i) Has no impairment from brain disease or deficit of cognitive function, which is likely to impair the ability to drive a school bus safely, such as inattentiveness, despondency, aggressiveness, impulsivity or lack of concern for the safety of self or others.
- (ii) Has not been diagnosed with a mental or emotional disorder and does not manifest one or more of the symptoms described in subparagraph (i). An individual diagnosed with a disorder or who manifests these symptoms will be disqualified to drive a school bus.
- (A) Restoration of the school bus driving privilege requires the individual to submit a satisfactory psychiatric or cognitive impairment form, or both,

- which includes an examination of the individual's cognitive and emotional functioning completed by a psychiatrist, neurologist or licensed psychologist.
- (B) If the psychiatric or cognitive impairment form, or both, is satisfactory, the individual may be required to successfully pass a school bus specific knowledge and skills test.
- (C) A disqualified individual may be granted a waiver from disqualification provided that the individual remains symptom free and the individual's condition, in the treating health care provider's opinion, has stabilized and symptoms are not likely to recur. Additionally, the individual may be required to successfully pass a school bus specific knowledge and skills test.
- (D) Provided the condition of the individual remains under good control, additional examinations will not be required unless recommended by the treating health care provider.
- (iii) Has not been diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease or dementia in Stage 3 or greater.
- (12) Has no hearing loss greater than 40 decibels in the better ear, without a hearing aid, at frequencies of 500, 1,000, and 2,000 Hz. (Reference American National Standards Institute (ANSI) 1969 for earphones: Dirks and others, Journal of Speech and Hearing Disorders, J.S.H.D. Vol. 44, 2/79, 34-54- in a sound field for warble tones). A person who is required to wear a hearing aid to meet the standards of this paragraph shall be tested by an audiologist or a licensed physician-M.D. or D.O.who specializes in the treatment of otolaryngology. An audiologist is an individual who has a certificate of clinical competence in audiology awarded by the American Speech, Language and Hearing Association or is licensed as an audiologist under the Speech-Language and Hearing Licensure Act (63 P.S. §§ 1701—1719). The individual who performs the test shall certify that the person has passed the test. A person who requires a hearing aid to meet the requirements of this paragraph shall also:


Reorganization of the Department of General Services

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

General Quarantine Order; Virus Control for Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza Poultry and Poultry Products at Competitions, Shows, Fairs and Exhibitions

Recitals.

- A. Under the authority established in the Domestic Animal Law (3 Pa.C.S.A. §§ 2301—2389) and specifically the authority to establish quarantine orders as set forth at section 2329 of the Domestic Animal Law (3 Pa.C.S.A. §§ 2329(a) and 2329(d)), the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (Department) hereby establishes a General Quarantine Order related to poultry and poultry products, including eggs, at the annual Pennsylvania Farm Show and competitions, shows, fairs and exhibitions within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania which receive funding pursuant to the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act, 3 P.S. § 1501 et seq.
- B. This General Quarantine Order is established to address all highly pathogenic avian influenza strains, including the H5N2 and H5N8 avian viruses that have developed into a virulent form of the disease. These sub-types are easily spread, and may mutate into strains that are communicable to or among humans.
- C. Avian influenza is designated a "dangerous transmissible disease" of animals under the provisions of the Domestic Animal Law (3 Pa.C.S.A. §§ 2301—2389), at 3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2321(d).
- D. The Department has broad authority under the Domestic Animal Law to establish and enforce quarantine orders, with regard to any infected, exposed, contaminated, suspected or susceptible domestic animal, whenever a dangerous transmissible disease exists within or outside of this Commonwealth, or whenever it is deemed advisable to test or treat any domestic animal upon the reasonable suspicion that it has contacted or been exposed to a dangerous transmissible disease, or whenever the testing or treatment of a domestic animal indicates that the domestic animal has been exposed to a dangerous transmissible disease so as to render future accurate testing for recent exposure of that domestic animal to that dangerous transmissible disease impractical or impossible.
- E. Avian Influenza, including the current virulent strains of HPAI, may be transferred and spread through the movement of poultry, eggs, and products of poultry.
- F. Avian Influenza has caused significant loss in the past to the Pennsylvania poultry industry and the current virulent forms of the disease have caused wide-spread loss to the poultry industry in states in which it has been detected and confirmed.

- G. Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza is of particular concern to the entire Pennsylvania poultry industry as it may cause wide-spread loss of poultry, severely limit the market for Pennsylvania product and cause severe economic damage to the poultry industry in Pennsylvania.
- H. Poultry and poultry products, including eggs, are susceptible to Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza and the dangerous transmissible disease may be spread through exposure to such poultry and poultry products. The transportation of, display or exhibition of poultry, poultry products, including eggs, materials contacting poultry, containers, conveyances and goods at competitions, shows, fairs, exhibitions and other venues within the Commonwealth has the potential to transfer and spread Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza.

Order.

In consideration of the previous recitals, and with those recitals incorporated into this Order by reference, the Department hereby establishes a General Quarantine under authority of the Domestic Animal Law, at 3 Pa.C.S.A §§ 2329(a) and (d), and section 1702 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 442). The following are the conditions and requirements of this General Quarantine Order:

- 1. No poultry, poultry products, including eggs, or any goods or items containing or made up of poultry products, such as feathers, shall be brought onto the premises or displayed or exhibited at the annual Pennsylvania Farm Show or any competitions, shows, fairs, exhibitions or other such venues, within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania which receive funding pursuant to the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act, 3 P.S. § 1501 et seq.
- 2. Quarantine Area and Term. The area covered by this General Quarantine Order is the entire Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and shall be in effect until further order of the Department.
 - 3. Applicable definitions:

Poultry.—For purposes of this Order, poultry shall include, chickens, turkeys, waterfowl and any other commercial species of bird, including gallinaceous birds and ratites, of any age, that may contract or harbor Avian Influenza virus, but shall exclude processed poultry purchased at wholesale for cooking and re-sale for human consumption.

Poultry products.—For purposes of this Order shall include eggs, unprocessed dead poultry, feathers or other parts of poultry, items made from poultry or poultry parts, but shall exclude those items purchased at wholesale for cooking and re-sale for human consumption.

THE CLEAN STREAMS LAW AND THE FEDERAL CLEAN WATER ACT APPLICATIONS FOR NATIONAL POLLUTION DISCHARGE ELIMINATION SYSTEM (NPDES) PERMITS AND WATER QUALITY MANAGEMENT (WQM) PERMITS

This notice provides information about persons who have applied for a new, amended or renewed NPDES or WQM permit, a permit waiver for certain stormwater discharges or submitted a Notice of Intent (NOI) for coverage under a General Permit. The applications concern, but are not limited to, discharges regarding industrial, animal or sewage waste, discharges to groundwater, discharges associated with municipal separate storm sewer systems (MS4), stormwater associated with construction activities or concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFO). This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92a and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing The Clean Streams Law (35 P. S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. §§ 1251—1376).

For NPDES renewal applications in Section I, the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has made a tentative determination to reissue these permits for 5 years subject to effluent limitations and monitoring and reporting requirements in their current permits, with appropriate and necessary updated requirements to reflect new and changed regulations and other requirements.

For applications for new NPDES permits and renewal applications with major changes in Section II, as well as applications for MS4 Individual Permits and Individual Stormwater Construction Permits in Sections IV and VI, the Department, based upon preliminary reviews, has made tentative determinations of proposed effluent limitations and other terms and conditions for the permit applications. In accordance with 25 Pa. Code § 92a.32(d), the proposed discharge of stormwater associated with construction activities will be managed in accordance with the requirements of 25 Pa. Code Chapter 102. These determinations are published as proposed actions for comments prior to taking final actions.

Unless indicated otherwise, the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Region III Administrator has waived the right to review or object to proposed NPDES permit actions under the waiver provision in 40 CFR 123.24(d).

Persons wishing to comment on NPDES applications are invited to submit statements to the contact office noted before the application within 30 days from the date of this public notice. Persons wishing to comment on WQM permit applications are invited to submit statements to the office noted before the application within 15 days from the date of this public notice. Comments received within the respective comment periods will be considered in the final

determinations regarding the applications. A comment submittal should include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests for public hearings on applications. A public hearing may be held if the responsible office considers the public response significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. The Department will postpone its final determination until after a public hearing is held.

Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. PLAN APPROVAL AND OPERATING PERMIT APPLICATIONS

This integrated approach is designed to make the permitting process more efficient for the Department, the regulated community and the general public. This approach allows the owner or operator of a facility to submit permitting documents relevant to its application for all sources related to a facility or a proposed project, affords an opportunity for public input, and provides for a decision on the issuance of the necessary permits.

MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed NPDES permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Effluent Limits for Noncoal Mining Activities

The limits for noncoal mining activities as provided in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 77 are pH 6 to 9 and other parameters the Department may require.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 563-2112-115, Developing National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permits for Mining Activities. Comments received within the comment period will be considered in the final determinations regarding the NPDES permit applications. Comments must include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

Availability of the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System General Permit for Discharges from Hydrostatic Testing of Tanks and Pipelines (PAG-10)

Under The Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and sections 1905-A, 1917-A and 1920-A of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. §§ 510-5, 510-17 and 510-20), the Department of Environmental Protection (Department), by this notice, informs the public of the availability of the National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) PAG-10 General Permit for Discharges from Hydrostatic Testing of Tanks and Pipelines (PAG-10). The General Permit will become effective at 12 a.m. on July 11, 2015.

PAG-10 is intended to provide NPDES permit coverage to those who wish to conduct hydrostatic testing and discharge the water used for this testing to surface waters of the Commonwealth that are not considered high quality or exceptional value.

Notice of the availability of a draft PAG-10 General Permit was published at 45 Pa.B. 1454 (March 21, 2015). A 30-day comment period was provided for as part of the draft permit publication. During the 30-day comment period, the Department received comments from Bankson Engineers, Inc., Columbia Pipeline Group, the Marcellus Shale Coalition, the Fish and Boat Commission and the United States Environmental Protection Agency. No hearings were held with respect to the draft PAG-10 General Permit.

The annual installment of the Notice of Intent (NOI) fee for coverage under PAG-10 is \$500 per each year the permittee operates under the General Permit. The fee will be paid in installments, with the initial fee of \$500 submitted with the NOI for permit coverage and an installment of \$500 to be submitted with the annual report due March 1 of each year if the permittee does not wish to terminate permit coverage. The Department anticipates that after coverage under PAG-10 is autho-

rized, coverage will continue without the need to submit an NOI for renewal of coverage as long as the PAG-10 General Permit is renewed, unless the Department specifically requires the submission of an NOI in writing.

The following changes were made to the final PAG-10 General Permit in comparison to the draft PAG-10 General Permit published at 45 Pa.B. 1454:

- Language in Part C II.A.4 of the General Permit has been revised from "average volume of the stream" to "volume of the stream at the time of withdrawal."
- Language in Part C II.A.5 of the General Permit has been revised from "The discharge must be controlled to the lowest possible rate (preferably less than 100 GPM) to minimize any potential impact on aquatic life and reduce erosion" to "The permittee shall limit the volume to be discharged to the lowest possible rate to minimize any potential impact on aquatic life and to reduce the potential for erosion."
- Clarification was made in Part C II.A.5 of the General Permit that discharges to stocked trout streams during the trout stocking season from March 1 to June 15 are not authorized.
- Reporting of the anticipated number of discharges per year was added as a requirement to the 15-Day Notification Form.
- Reporting of the anticipated volume of water per discharge event was added as a requirement to the NOI.
- Submission of an additional copy of the NOI and the 15-Day Notification Form to the Susquehanna River Basin Commission, when applicable, was added as a requirement.
- A requirement was added for owners of an existing Natural Gas Transmission Line to monitor for Polychlorinated Biphenyls.
- While the draft General Permit included average monthly and instantaneous maximum (IMAX) limitations for Total Residual Chlorine of 0.02 mg/L and 0.05 mg/L, respectively, the Department has decided to establish only the IMAX limit in the final General Permit, consistent with the previous version of the PAG-10 General Permit.

Closure of the HIV/AIDS Home and Community-Based Waiver (Waiver 0192)

The Department of Human Services (Department) is announcing its intent to close Waiver 0192 and transition current Waiver 0192 participants to other Medicaid Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) waiver programs.

This notice shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Background

Waiver 0192 has provided services to individuals 21 years of age or older with symptomatic human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) disease or acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) since 1990. The number of individuals being served in this waiver has decreased over time to a current number of 52 individuals. The Department has found that these individuals qualify for, and can be equally or better served in, one of the other Medicaid HCBS waivers administered by the Department's Office of Long-Term Living (OLTL).

Transition

The OLTL intends to personally contact and work with individuals enrolled in Waiver 0192 to transition them to other Medicaid HCBS waivers and provide them with a choice of qualified providers. Each individual will be transitioned to the Medicaid HCBS waiver that best meets the individual's assessed needs to provide for continuity of services.

The Department anticipates that all current Waiver 0192 participants will be transitioned to other Medicaid HCBS waivers by September 30, 2015. The Department has communicated its intention to close Waiver 0192 through discussions with various stakeholders including the HIV/AIDS Planning Group, AIDS Service Organizations and Ryan White Part C providers. This will also be discussed at upcoming meetings of the Medical Assistance Advisory Committee (MAAC), the Long Term Care Subcommittee of the MAAC and the Consumer Subcommittee of the MAAC.

Fiscal Impact

No fiscal impact is anticipated as a result of these changes.

Designated Exceptional Durable Medical Equipment

In accordance with the Department of Human Services (Department) currently approved State Plan, the Department is required to publish an annual list of exceptional Durable Medical Equipment (DME) by notice in the Pennsylvania Bulletin in July of each year. Interested persons may petition the Department to consider additions to the exceptional DME list by submitting a written request to the Department. Requests received on or before December 31 will be considered in developing the list for the following July.

During calendar year 2014, the Department received no written requests to add or remove items of DME from the list of exceptional DME. Therefore, this notice makes no changes in either the acquisition cost or the list of qualifying DME.

"Exceptional DME" is defined as DME that has an acquisition cost of \$5,000 or more and is either Specially Adapted DME or other DME that is designated as exceptional DME by the Department annually by notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

"Specially Adapted DME" is DME that is uniquely constructed or substantially adapted or modified in accordance with the written orders of a physician for the particular use of one resident, making its contemporaneous use by another resident unsuitable.

The list of exceptional DME that has been designated by the Department is as follows:

- (1) Air fluidized beds. The pressure relief provided by this therapy uses a high rate of airflow to fluidize fine particulate material (for example, beads or sand) to produce a support medium that has characteristics similar to liquid. May have a Gortex cover.
- (2) Powered air flotation bed (low air loss therapy). A semi-electric or total electric bed with a fully integrated powered pressure-reducing mattress which is characterized by all of the following:
- (a) An air pump or blower with a series of interconnected woven fabric air pillows which provides sequential inflation and deflation of the air cells or a low interface pressure throughout the mattress allowing some air to escape through the support surface to the resident. May have a Gortex cover.
- (b) Inflated cell height of the air cells through which air is being circulated is 5 inches or greater.
- (c) Height of the air chambers, proximity of the air chambers to one another, frequency of air cycling (for alternating pressure mattresses) and air pressure provide adequate patient lift, reducing pressure and prevent bottoming out.
 - (d) A surface designed to reduce friction and shear.
 - (e) May be placed directly on a hospital bed frame.
- (f) Automatically readjusts inflation pressures with change in position of bed (for example, head elevation, and the like).
- (3) Augmentative communication devices. Used by residents who are unable to use natural oral speech as a primary means of communication. The specific device requested must be appropriate for use by the resident and the resident must demonstrate the abilities or potential abilities to use the device selected. Portable devices need to supplement, aid or serve as an alternative to natural speech for residents with severe expressive communication disorders. Nonportable devices may be covered only if required for visual enhancement or physical access needs that cannot be accommodated by a portable device.
 - (4) Ventilators (and related supplies).
- (a) Used by residents 21 years of age and older who require full ventilator support for a minimum of 8 hours per day to sustain life.
- (b) Used by residents 20 years of age and younger who require ventilator support to sustain life (no minimum time requirement).
