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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

The Criminal Procedural Rules Committee has prepared a Final Report explaining the July 23, 1999 amendments to Rules 1502 (Content of Petition for Post-Conviction Collateral Relief; Request for Discovery) and 1509 (Procedures for Petitions in Death Penalty Cases: Hearing; Disposition), and the revision of the Comments to Rules 1500 (Scope) and 1501 (Initiation of Post-Conviction Collateral Proceedings). These changes add a new paragraph (A) (Stays of Execution) to Rule 1509 to provide (1) the procedures for requesting a stay of execution in a death penalty case, and (2) the length of the stay. The Final Report follows the Court's Order.

Annex A

TITLE 234. RULES OF CRIMINAL PROCEDURE

PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 1500. POST-CONVICTION COLLATERAL PROCEEDINGS

Rule 1500. Scope.

The rules in Chapter 1500 apply to capital and noncapital cases under the Post Conviction Relief Act, 42 Pa.C.S. §§ 9541—9546, as amended by Act 1995-32 (SS1).

Comment

The 1995 amendments to the Post Conviction Relief Act specifically provide that, "except as specifically provided otherwise, all provisions of this subchapter shall apply to capital and noncapital cases." See 42 Pa.C.S. § 9542.

Rule 1501. Initiation of Post-Conviction Collateral Proceedings.

(1) A petition for post-conviction collateral relief shall be filed within one year of the date the judgment becomes final, except as otherwise provided by statute.

(2) A proceeding for post-conviction collateral relief shall be initiated by filing a petition and 3 copies with the clerk of the court in which the defendant was convicted and sentenced. The petition shall be verified by the defendant.

Rule 1502. Content of Petition for Post-Conviction Collateral Relief; Request for Discovery.

[(a)] (A) A petition for post-conviction collateral relief shall bear the caption, number, and court term of the case or cases in which relief is requested and shall contain substantially the following information:

* * * * *

(12) the facts supporting each such ground that:

[(i)] (a) appear in the record, and the place in the record where they appear; and

[(ii)] (b) do not appear in the record, and an identification of any affidavits, documents, and other evidence showing such facts;

* * * * *

[(b)] (B) * * *

[(c)] (C) * * *

[(d)] (D) * * *

[(e)] (E) Requests for Discovery

(1) Except as provided in paragraph [(e)] (E)(2), no discovery shall be permitted at any stage of the proceedings, except upon leave of court after a showing of exceptional circumstances.

(2) On the first counseled petition in a death penalty case, no discovery shall be permitted at any stage of the proceedings, except upon leave of court after a showing of good cause.

Comment

Pursuant to paragraph [(a)] (A)(6), the petition should include specific information about the sentence imposed, including whether the defendant is currently serving a sentence of imprisonment or probation for the crime; awaiting execution of a sentence of death for the crime; or serving a sentence which must expire before the defendant may commence serving the disputed sentence; the minimum and maximum terms of the sentence; the amount of fine or restitution, if any; and whether the defendant is released on parole. See 42 Pa.C.S. § 9543(a).

Sections 9543(a)(2), (3), and (4) of the Post Conviction Relief Act, 42 Pa.C.S. § 9543(a)(2), (3) and (4), require that to be eligible for relief, the defendant must plead and prove by a preponderance of the evidence all of the following:

“(2) That the conviction or sentence resulted from one or more of the following:

* * * * *

“(4) That the failure to litigate the issue prior to or during trial . . . , or on direct appeal could not have been the result of any rational, strategic or tactical decision by counsel.” See 42 Pa.C.S. § 9543(a)(2), (3), and (4). (Note: the statutory reference to unitary review in this paragraph is not shown in view of the Court’s 1997 suspension of the Capital Unitary Review Act.)

By statute, a court may not entertain a request for any form of relief in anticipation of the filing of a petition for post-conviction relief. See 42 Pa.C.S. § 9545(a). For stays of execution, see 42 Pa.C.S. § 9545(c) and Rule 1509(A).

Paragraphs [(a)] (A)(16) and [(e)] (E) were added in 1997 to address requests for discovery. Paragraph [(a)] (A)(16) requires that a request for discovery be included in the petition, if applicable. Paragraph [(e)] (E) sets

forth the standards for permitting discovery. Under paragraph [(e)] (E)(1), which applies in all cases except on the first counseled petition in a death penalty case, no discovery is permitted at any stage of the proceedings, except upon leave of the court with showing of exceptional circumstances. See 42 Pa.C.S. § 9545(d)(2). Under paragraph [(e)] (E)(2), which applies to first counseled petitions in death penalty cases, discovery is permitted only upon leave of court for good cause shown. For purposes of paragraph [(e)] (E)(2), “first counseled petition” includes petitions on which defendants have elected to proceed pro se.

Rule 1509. Procedures for Petitions in Death Penalty Cases: **Stays of Execution of Sentence;** Hearing; Disposition.

(A) Stays of Execution

(1) In a case in which the defendant has received a sentence of death, any request for a stay of execution of sentence should be made in the petition for post-conviction collateral relief.

(2) In all cases in which a stay of execution has been granted pursuant to 42 Pa.C.S. § 9545(c), the stay shall remain in effect through the conclusion of all PCRA proceedings, including review in the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, or the expiration of time for seeking such review.

[(a)] (B) * * *

[(b)] (C) * * *

(3) No later than 90 days from the date of the notice, or from the date of the oral argument, if granted, the judge shall:

[(i)] (a) * * *

[(ii)] (b) * * *

[(iii)] (c) * * *

[(c)] (D) If the judge determines that an evidentiary hearing is required, the judge shall enter an order setting a date certain for the hearing, which shall not be scheduled for fewer than 10 days or more than 45 days from the date of the order. The judge may, for good cause shown, grant leave to continue the hearing. No more than 90 days after the evidentiary hearing, the judge shall dispose of the petition.

[(d)] (E) Failure of the judge to dispose of the petition within 90 days as required by paragraphs [(b)] (C) (3) and [(c)] (D) may result in the imposition of sanctions.

Comment

Paragraph (A)(1) was added in 1999 to provide the avenue by which a defendant in a death penalty case may request a stay of execution. Failure to include a request for a stay in the petition for post-conviction collateral relief may not be construed as a waiver, and the defendant may file a separate request for the stay.

Paragraph (A)(2) provides that, if a stay of execution is granted, the stay will remain in effect throughout the PCRA proceedings in the trial court and during the appeal to the Pennsylvania Supreme Court.

It is intended that once a determination is made under this rule that an evidentiary hearing is required, the provisions of Rule 1508(c), (d), and (e) apply.

FINAL REPORT¹

Amendments to Pa.R.Crim.P. 1509, and Correlative Changes to Pa.Rs.Crim.P. 1500, 1501, and 1502

Length of Stays of Execution in Death Penalty Cases

On July 23, 1999, effective September 1, 1999, upon the recommendation of the Criminal Procedural Rules Committee, the Court amended Rules of Criminal Procedure 1502 (Content of Petition for Post-Conviction Collateral Relief; Request for Discovery) and 1509 (Procedures for Petitions in Death Penalty Cases: Hearing; Disposition), and approved the revision of the Comments to Rules 1500 (Scope) and 1501 (Initiation of Post-Conviction Collateral Proceedings). These changes add a new paragraph (A) (Stays of Execution) to Rule 1509 to provide (1) the procedures for requesting a stay of execution in a death penalty case, and (2) the length of the stay, and make correlative changes to the Comments to Rules 1500, 1501, and 1502.

Background

The Committee, at the Court's request following communications from the Third Circuit Court's Task Force on Management of Death Penalty Litigation, considered whether the Criminal Rules should be amended to provide procedures governing the length of stays of execution. The Task Force's recommendation was that, when a stay of execution has been granted, the stay should remain in effect for the duration of the Post Conviction Relief Act, 42 Pa.C.S. §§ 4541 et seq. (hereinafter PCRA), proceedings at the trial level and any appeal to the Pennsylvania Supreme Court. After reviewing the Criminal Rules, the PCRA, and the Task Force's recommendation, the Committee agreed that procedures concerning the length of stays of execution in post-conviction collateral relief cases should be included in the Criminal Rules within Chapter 1500, and that the changes should incorporate the substance of the Task Force's recommendation.

¹ The Committee's Final Reports should not be confused with the official Committee Comments to the rules. Also note that the Supreme Court does not adopt the Committee's Comments or the contents of the Committee's explanatory Final Reports.

Discussion

Determining the placement of the stay provision presented a challenge for the Committee, particularly trying to work within the context of the present Chapter 1500 numbering scheme and 42 Pa.C.S. § 9545(c). Section 9545(c) provides:

(C) Stay of executive.—

(1) No court shall have the authority to issue a stay of execution in any case except as allowed under this subchapter.

(2) Except for first petitions filed under this subchapter by defendants whose sentences have been affirmed on direct appeal of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania between January 1, 1994, and January 1, 1996, no stay may be issued unless a petition for postconviction relief which meets all the requirements of this subchapter has been filed and is pending and the petitioner makes a strong showing of likelihood of success on the merits.

(3) If a stay of execution is granted, all limitations periods set forth under sections 9574 (relating to answer to petition), 9575 (relating to disposition without evidentiary hearing) and 9576 (relating to evidentiary hearing) shall apply to the litigation of the petition,

and appears to be the only statutory or rule provision to address stays of execution in death penalty cases. Because this statutory provision limits the granting of stays of execution to cases in which a PCRA petition has been "filed and is pending," the Committee agreed that the new stay provision should be added somewhere after Rule 1502 (Contents of Petition for Post-Conviction Collateral Relief; Request for Discovery). The Committee concluded that the most suitable placement for the new provision is Rule 1509 (Procedures for Petitions in Death Penalty Cases: Hearing; Disposition), reasoning that, because Rule 1509 addresses procedures specific to death penalty cases, it makes sense to include the death penalty stay provisions too. Accordingly, a new paragraph (A) (Stays of Execution) has been added to Rule 1509.

Rule 1509 (A) is divided into two subparagraphs. Paragraph (A)(1) provides that a request for a stay should be included in the PCRA petition. This provision has been added to the rule to provide guidance about requesting stays because the PCRA is silent in this regard. Providing that the request for a stay is to be made as part of the petition insures that the court has the request at the earliest time, thus reducing the likelihood of delay in the disposition of these requests. Furthermore, the additional provision for the request for a stay to be included in the petition does not place an undue burden on the defendant. Although agreeing with the foregoing reasoning, several members expressed concern about making the petition provision mandatory—with a mandatory provision, a failure to include the request for the stay in the petition might be construed as a waiver. Agreeing that we did not want waiver to play a role at this stage in the proceedings concerning stays, and, in an exercise in caution, the Committee has used "should" instead of "shall" in paragraph (A)(1). In addition, the Rule 1509 Comment cautions that a failure to include a request for a stay in the PCRA petition does not preclude the defendant from filing a separate request for a stay.

Paragraph (A)(2) establishes the length of the stay, and is taken from the Task Force's recommendation. If a stay is granted pursuant to 42 Pa.C.S. § 9545(c), the stay is to remain in effect through the conclusion of all PCRA

proceedings, including Supreme Court review, or the expiration of the time for seeking such review.

Finally, to insure that members of the bench and bar are aware of the provisions of Rule 1509(A), the Comments to Rules 1500, 1501, and 1502 have been revised by the addition of cross-references to Rule 1509(A).

Inactive Cases Not At Issue

Rule 228. The Prothonotary shall list, for general call on the last Tuesday of October of each year, all civil matters which are not at issue, and in which no proceedings of record have occurred during the two years or more immediately prior thereto. The Prothonotary shall, in the manner provided by Pa.R.J.A. 1901(c), notify counsel of record and any parties for whom no appearance has been entered, that the matter has been so listed. If no action is taken, and no written objection is filed in a listed matter prior to the time set for the general call, the Prothonotary shall strike the matter from the list, and enter an order as of course dismissing the matter for failure to pros-

ecute. If, at the call of the list, no good cause is shown why a matter should be continued, the court shall enter an order dismissing the matter with prejudice.

Rule WJ507A. Retention of Court Exhibits Civil Cases.

A. Subject to the provisions of subsection B, the Prothonotary shall have the authority to purge, dispose or destroy all civil court exhibits after a case has been finalized. In determining whether a case has been finalized, the Prothonotary shall consider:

1. whether the appeal period has run without an appeal being perfected,
2. whether the appellate court has ruled on the appeal and no further appeal has been perfected, and
3. whether the case is settled, discontinued, satisfied, and ended on the record.

B. Prior to disposing of a civil court exhibit, the Prothonotary shall notify by first class mail any self represented party and all counsel of record of the following:

1. the exhibit will be disposed of if no claim is made within 30 days and
2. the exhibit will be returned to the party claiming the exhibit at the expiration of the 30 days unless another party files an objection.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

GAME COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CH. 147]

Special Permits; Sale of Inedible Parts of Wildlife

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission) at its June 8, 1999, meeting, proposed the following amendments:

Amend § 147.2 (relating to general) by the addition of subsection (d) that will require new permit applicants to show proof they are authorized by their local governmental body to conduct the activity specified on the permit.

Add § 147.146 (relating to sale of inedible wildlife parts) which provides for the sale of inedible parts of wildlife under certain conditions as provided in the amendment to section 2312 of the Game and Wildlife Code with the passage of the act of December 21, 1998 (P. L. 986, No. 166) (Act 166).

These proposed amendments will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for this proposal is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

These proposals were made public at the June 8, 1999, meeting of the Commission, and comments on these proposals can be sent to the Executive Director of the Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797, until August 31, 1999.

Proposed Amendment to § 147.2

1. Introduction

To more effectively administer the wildlife permit system of the Commonwealth, the Commission at its June 8, 1999, meeting proposed changing § 147.2 to add subsection (d) requiring documentation that the privilege granted by a permit does not violate any local zoning ordinances or other local rule. This addition is being proposed under authority contained in section 2901(b) of the code (relating to regulations for permits).

2. Purpose and Authority

The Commission is charged with the responsibility of regulating and issuing permits for the possession of game and wildlife and activities associated with that possession. Current permit regulations do not take into account local land use and other ordinances which may impact on that possession or those activities. As a result, the Commission may issue a permit which allows possession of wildlife or an activity that violates local law. A good example would be a permit for possession of a tiger in a residential neighborhood. The proposed addition would deal with these types of situations.

Section 2901(b) of the code authorizes the Commission to promulgate regulations "... for the issuance of any permit or ... to control the activities which may be performed under authority of any permit issued." This provision is the basis for the proposed change.

3. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed change would require all new applicants for permits to provide documentation that the proposed possession or activity complies with local requirements.

4. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to apply for a Commission permit would be affected by the proposed requirement.

5. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

There would be no additional charges imposed by the Commission. Municipalities may charge for furnishing the required documentation.

Proposed Addition of § 147.146

1. Introduction

To more effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Commission at its meeting held on June 8, 1999, proposed adding § 147.146 to allow the sale of inedible wildlife parts in very limited circumstances. This addition is authorized by sections 2102 and 2312(c)(2) of the code (relating to regulations; and buying and selling game) as recently amended by Act 166.

2. Purpose and Authority

Act 166, added a new subsection (2), to section 2312(c) of the code which provides as follows: "(2) The commission may by regulation, authorize the buying and selling of inedible parts of game and wildlife as it deems appropriate." One of the primary reasons for this change was the illegality of "forced sales" such as when owners of preserved wildlife died and their heirs did not wish to keep the wildlife. This proposed addition would legalize these sales and establish procedures to be followed.

Act 166 specifically authorizes the Commission to legalize buying and selling of inedible parts of game and wildlife by regulation. In addition, section 2102 of the code directs the Commission to promulgate regulations as it deems necessary and appropriate concerning game or wildlife. These provisions form the basis for the proposed change.

3. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed changes would require those wishing to sell lawfully taken inedible parts of wildlife to obtain a permit from the Commission, which would be good for 60 days.

4. Persons Affected

Those wishing to buy or sell lawfully taken wildlife in this Commonwealth under the appropriate circumstances would be affected by the proposed addition.

5. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

Those desiring to sell wildlife shall first obtain a permit from a Game Commission Officer by submitting an application on a Form PGC-12 and paying a \$25 permit fee.

6. Effective Date

These proposed changes would be effective on final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and would remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

TITLE 58. RECREATION

PART III. GAME COMMISSION

CHAPTER 147. SPECIAL PERMITS

Subchapter A. GENERAL PROVISIONS

§ 147.2. General.

* * * * *

(d) Applications for permits issued under this part and Chapter 29 of the act (relating to special licenses and permits) shall be accompanied by written documentation from the applicant's local governmental body where the activity will take place, that the privilege granted by the permit does not violate any enacted zoning, ordinance or other local rule. Documentation shall be provided in writing by official correspondence from an authorized officer of the municipality involved.

Subchapter H. PROTECTED SPECIMEN

§ 147.146. Sale of inedible wildlife parts.

(a) Wildlife lawfully taken within this Commonwealth that has been mounted, tanned or completely prepared for study or display in accordance with generally accepted taxidermy procedures may be sold if one of the following conditions is met:

- (1) The original owner is deceased.
- (2) The original owner's assets are being liquidated.
- (b) Before selling a specimen, a permit shall be obtained from a Commission officer.
- (c) An executed copy of the permit application (PGC-12) shall list the items to be sold. The permit is not valid for more than 60 days.
- (d) The fee for a permit issued under this section is \$25.
- (e) The original owner of a specimen may donate the specimen to a wildlife conservation organization, which may then sell the specimen without a permit for fund raising purposes.
- (f) Second and subsequent owners of wildlife parts acquired in accordance with section 2312(c)(1) of the act (relating to buying and selling of game) may sell the parts if included as part of a manufactured or finished product.
- (g) A person violating this section shall be subject to the penalties provided in section 2312 of the act.

LICENSURE BOARD**

[49 PA. CODE CH. 9]

Fees

The State Architects Licensure Board (Board) proposes to amend § 9.3 (relating to fees) by revising certain fees to read as set forth in Annex A.

A. Effective Date

The proposed amendment will be effective upon publication of the final-form regulation in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. Statutory Authority

The proposed amendment is authorized under section 11 of the Architects Licensure Law (63 P. S. § 34.11).

C. Background and Purpose

The Architects Licensure Law requires the Board to set fees by regulation so that revenues meet or exceed expenditures over a biennial period. General operating expenses of the Board are funded through biennial license renewal fees. Expenses related to applications or services which are provided directly to applicants are excluded from general operating revenues and are funded through fees in which the cost of providing a service forms the basis for the fee.

In a recent systems audit of the operations of the Board within the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, the fees for services to licensees and applicants were analyzed to determine if the fees reflected the actual cost of providing the services. Actual costs are based upon the following formula:

$$\begin{aligned} & \text{Number of minutes to perform the function} \\ & \times \\ & \text{Pay rate for the classification of personnel performing the} \\ & \text{function} \\ & + \\ & \text{A proportionate share of administrative overhead} \end{aligned}$$

The analysis determined that certain fees currently charged by the Board were insufficient to capture the actual costs of providing the service, as follows: initial license application by exam; license by reciprocity with NCARB certification; license by reciprocity without NCARB Certification, (NCARB is the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards and NCARB certification provides information confirming the qualifications of licensees); license reactivation fee; and certification of registration or examination scores. Currently, no fees are charged by the Board for providing two services, verification of licensure or registration; and registration or modification of firm practice. Existing fees have not been revised since 1987.

In this proposal, fees for the services identified would be adjusted to allocate costs to those who use the service or application. The Board would continue to apportion its enforcement and operating costs to the general licensing population when the Board makes its biennial reconciliation of revenues and expenditures.

D. Compliance with Executive Order 1996-1

In accordance with the requirements of Executive Order 1996-1 (February 6, 1996), in drafting and promulgating the proposed amendment, the Board considered the least restrictive alternative to regulate costs for services requested by licensees and applicants.

E. Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed amendment will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fees will have a modest fiscal impact on those members of the private sector who apply for services from the Board. The proposed amendment will impose no additional paperwork requirements upon the Commonwealth, political subdivisions or the private sector.

F. Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the cost effectiveness of its regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

G. Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on July 22, 1999, the Board submitted a copy of this proposed amendment to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and the Chairpersons of the House Professional Licensure Committee and the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee (Committees). In addition to submitting the proposal, the Board has provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a detailed regulatory analysis form prepared by the Board in compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, "Regulatory Review and Promulgation." A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, if IRRC has objections to any portion of the proposed amendment, it will notify the Board within 10 days of the close of the Committees' review period. The notification shall specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met by that portion. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the regulation, by the Board, the General Assembly and the Governor, of objections raised.

The State Real Estate Commission (Commission) proposes to amend § 35.203 (relating to fees) by revising certain application fees to read as set forth in Annex A.

A. Effective date

The amendment will be effective upon publication of the final form regulation in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. Statutory Authority

The amendment is authorized under section 407(a) of the Real Estate Licensing and Registration Act (act) (63 P. S. § 455.407(a)).

C. Background and Purpose

The act requires the Commission to set fees by regulation so that revenues meet or exceed expenditures over a biennial period. General operating expenses of the Commission are funded through biennial license renewal fees. Expenses related to applications or services which are provided directly to individual licensees or applicants are excluded from general operating revenues and are funded

through fees in which the cost of providing the service forms the basis for the fee.

In a recent systems audit of the operations of the Commission within the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, the fees for services to licensees and applicants were analyzed to determine if the fees reflected the actual cost of providing the services. Actual cost calculations are based upon the following formula:

$$\begin{aligned} & \text{number of minutes to perform the function} \\ & \quad \times \\ & \text{pay rate for the classification of personnel performing the function} \\ & \quad + \\ & \text{a proportionate share of administrative overhead.} \end{aligned}$$

The analysis determined that the fees for the listed services do not accurately reflect the actual cost of providing those services. The costs for the following services exceed the fees charged for the services: review of qualifications for licensing examination, applications for licensure and registration, initial licensure and registration, reapplication following a first examination failure; reapplication following subsequent examination failure; certification of examination scores and experience; and fictitious and corporate name registration. The application fees for initial approval of a real estate school, change and location of a real estate school, and registration of promotional property exceeded the actual cost of providing the service. Most of the fees have not been revised since August 1992, while fees for the approval of real estate schools, certification of licensure history and registration of promotional property were adopted in March 1986. No fee is in place for reinspection of real estate offices and schools after failures of an initial inspection.

In this proposal, fees for the services identified would be adjusted to allocate costs to those who use the service or make application. The Commission would continue to apportion enforcement and operating costs to the general licensing population by means of its license renewal fee through the biennial reconciliation of revenue and expenditures.

D. Compliance with Executive Order 1996-1

In accordance with Executive Order 1996-1 (February 6, 1996), in drafting and promulgating the proposal the Commission considered the least restrictive alternative to regulate costs for services requested by licensees and applicants.

E. Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The fees will have a modest fiscal impact on those members of the private sector who apply for services from the Commission. 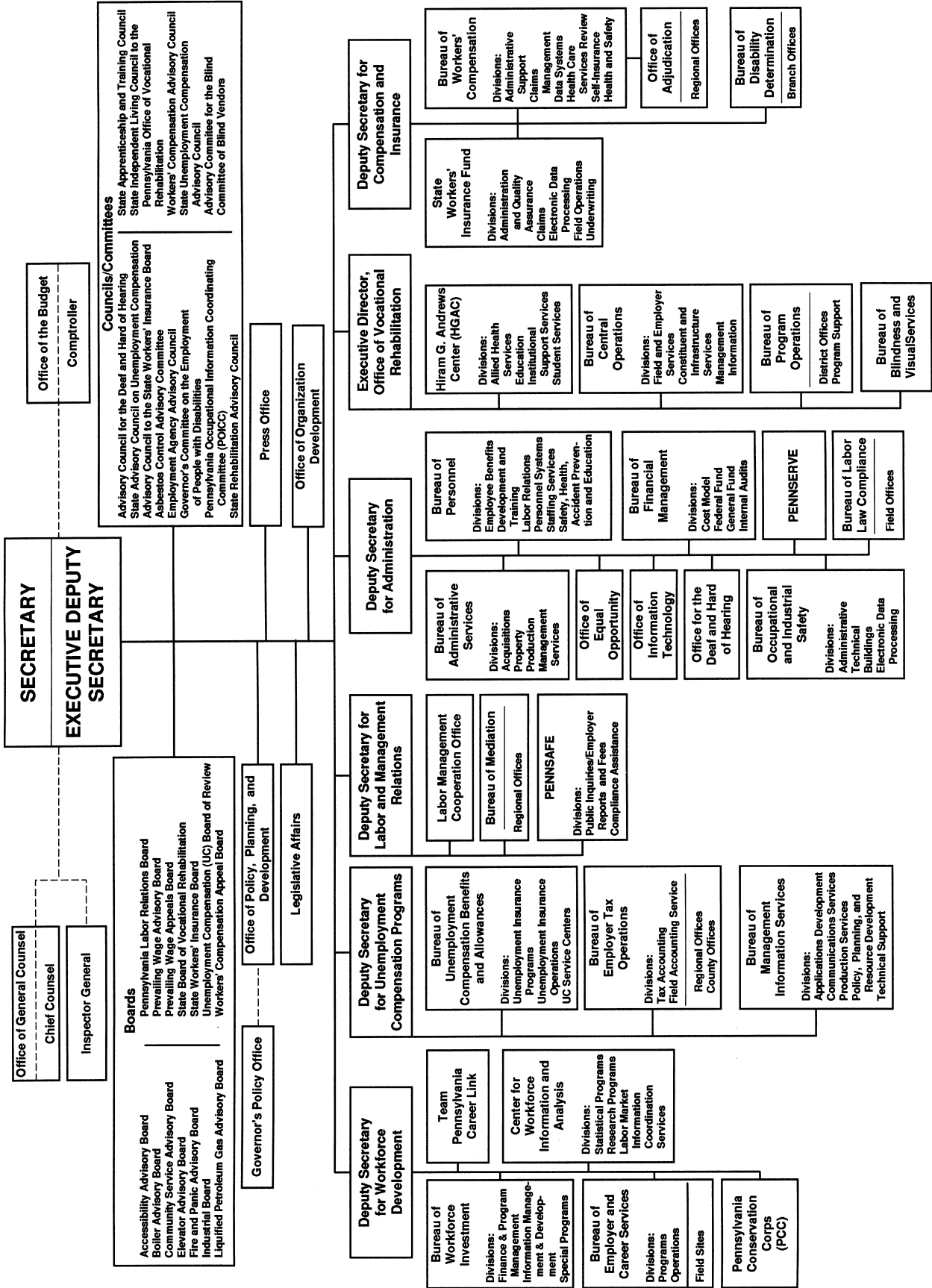
The Executive Board approved a reorganization of the Department of Labor and Industry effective July 21, 1999.

FY99-2000 Annual Plan for Awarding Grants under the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act

The Department of Agriculture (Department), under authority of section 8 (a) of the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Act (act) (3 P. S. §§ 1501—1508.1), hereby announces that the Secretary of Agriculture, with the advice and assistance of the Agricultural Fair Advisory Committee at its meeting of July 22, 1999, adopted the FY99-2000 Annual Plan on the awarding of grants to eligible organizations under the provisions of the act.

The act authorizes the Department to make grants to organizations conducting eligible agricultural fairs, Statewide agricultural organizations which contribute to the development of agriculture and agribusiness and to eligible agricultural youth groups for support of their programs. The Secretary, with the advice and assistance of Advisory Committee created by the act, is to adopt an annual plan for awarding of grants subject to the limitations specified in section 5 of the act.

The annual plan, as adopted by the Secretary, provides for the award of grants to each eligible organization subject to the availability of funds on the following basis:

1. For operating expenses, the maximum payment allowed for each Class Fair under section 5(1)(i)(A) of the act will be paid.

2. For premium reimbursement, the maximum payment allowed under section 5(1)(i)(B) of the act will be paid.

3. For reimbursement to each eligible organization conducting harness horse racing at its annual fair, other than races for 2 and 3 year old colts and fillies, the maximum amount of reimbursement allowed under section 5(1)(iii) of the act will be paid.

4. For reimbursement to each eligible organization conducting races for 2 and 3 year colts and fillies at its annual fair, the maximum amount of reimbursement allowed under section 5(1)(iv) of the act will be paid.

5. For reimbursement of operating costs and premiums, a maximum amount of \$2,000 and in addition a maxi-

imum amount of \$10,000 based on a sum equal to 50% of the amount spent by the eligible Statewide agricultural organizations for premiums that are not in the \$2,000 payment as provided under section 5(2) of the act. The total maximum payment hereunder shall not exceed \$12,000.

6. For actual expenses incurred for activities which contribute to the advancement of agriculture or agribusiness by 4-H Youth groups, a payment which will be calculated according to the following formula will pay for maximum of 4,000 members per county: 4-H groups with 500 members or less will receive base funding of \$2,000, groups with more than 500 will receive \$2,000 for the first 500 members and an additional \$2 per member for every member over 500 with a total maximum funding of \$9,000.

7. For actual expenses incurred for activities which contribute to the advancement of agriculture or agribusiness by FFA Youth groups, a payment which will be calculated according to the following formula:

Tier I: FFA Chapters with 100 members or less will receive base funding of \$1,000 with an additional \$2 per member.

Tier II: FFA Chapters with 101 to 210 members inclusive will receive a \$2,000 base funding with no additional moneys on a per member basis.

Tier III: FFA Chapters with 211 members or more will receive funding of \$2,000 with an additional \$2 per member for every member over 210.

8. Any funds remaining after the above grants have been awarded shall be utilized for capital improvement as provided in section 5-(1) (ii) of the act.

9. The Secretary will endeavor to disburse the above payments in accordance with the following schedule:

(a) By February 1, 2000 for payment under paragraph 1—7 above.

(b) By September 30, 2000 for payment approved and authorized in FY99-2000 under paragraph 8 above.

Funding Available for Recreational Trail Grants

The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) has begun to accept applications for the next grant round for the Pennsylvania Recreational Trails Program. Funding for the program is made available to the Commonwealth through the Federal Highway Administration and the Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century.

The Recreational Trails Program provides grants to develop and maintain trails and trail-related facilities for both motorized and nonmotorized recreational trails uses. Applicants may submit projects for the maintenance and restoration of existing recreational trails, development and rehabilitation of trailside and trailhead facilities and trail linkages, purchase and lease of recreational trail construction and maintenance equipment, construction of new recreational trails, and acquisition of easements or property for recreation trails or recreation trail corridors. Consideration will also be given to projects that provide for the redesign, reconstruction, nonroutine maintenance, or relocation of recreational trails to benefit the natural environment. Up to 5% of the funds may be used for the operation of educational programs to promote safety and environmental protection related to the use of recreational trails.

The Commonwealth anticipates receiving \$1.0 million in Federal funding from the Federal Highway Administration for this grant round. In addition another \$1.0 million in State funding has been allocated to the Pennsylvania Recreational Trails Program by the Pennsylvania General Assembly for this grant round. At least 30% of the funding will be utilized for motorized recreational trail uses and 30% for nonmotorized recreational trail uses. The remaining 40% will be used for diverse trail use projects that provide for two or more trail uses. Projects that benefit both motorized and nonmotorized trail uses, such as common trailhead facilities or innovative trail corridor sharing can earn extra credit in the selection criteria.

Applicants eligible for trail funding from this program are local governments, State and Federal agencies and private organizations. Eligible grant amounts will range in size from a minimum of \$2,500 to a maximum of \$100,000. Match requirements are 80% grant funds and 20% project sponsor funds. However, acquisition projects

will require a 50/50 match. A "soft match" such as donations of materials and services is permitted.

All project sponsors are encouraged to enter into contracts and cooperative agreements with qualified youth conservation or service corps to perform trails construction and maintenance. Project proposals that utilize youth conservation or service corps will earn extra credit in the selection criteria.

The Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) has announced an open application period for funding of acquisition, development, planning, implementation, and technical assistance projects from the Keystone Recreation, Park and Conservation (Keystone) Fund. These Keystone grants will be administered by DCNR's Bureau of Recreation and Conservation under their Community Grant Program, Rails-to-Trails Grant Program and Rivers Conservation Grant Program.

The Keystone Fund was established by passage of the Keystone Recreation, Park and Conservation Fund Act (Act 1993-50) signed on July 2, 1993. On November 2, 1993 the voters of the Commonwealth overwhelmingly approved a public referendum incurring bond indebted-

ness by the Commonwealth in the amount of \$50 million to provide for the funding of nature preserves and wildlife habitats and for improvements to and expansion of state parks, community parks and recreation facilities, historic sites, zoos and public libraries. The Keystone Fund is currently supported by a 15% allocation from the State Realty Transfer Tax revenues. Approximately \$11-12 million will be available in this round of funding under the Community Grant Program and \$1 million each in the Rails-to-Trails and Rivers Conservation grant programs.

An announcement of this open application period, fact sheet and information on how to obtain the application forms has been sent to Commonwealth municipalities, rails-to-trails organizations and rivers conservation organizations. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, or a combination of the cleanup standards, or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as

a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified as proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of a site.

Emergency Medical Services Office; Notice of Funding Priorities

Under 28 Pa. Code § 1001.23(b)(relating to allocation of funds), the Department of Health (Department) hereby gives notice of priorities for the distribution by the regional emergency medical services (EMS) councils of funding from the Emergency Medical Services Operating Fund (EMSOF) for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999 and ending June 30, 2000.

The purpose of the EMSOF is to provide funding to maintain, improve and develop the quality of the EMS System within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The EMSOF is not sufficient to fully fund the EMS System. Consequently, as a general guideline, rural providers of EMS will be required to contribute 40% of the funds and non-rural providers of EMS will be required to contribute 50% of the funds for approved acquisitions. All purchases and acquisitions must be made by the providers of EMS within the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1999 and ending June 30, 2000.

The Department may increase the amount of the initial payment or reimbursement from EMSOF based upon the EMS Development Plans (State and regional) or documented financial hardship of a provider of EMS. A provider of EMS that seeks additional funds due to financial hardship shall be required to submit a financial disclosure statement and other documentation deemed necessary by the Department.

A provider of EMS applying for EMSOF must be in compliance, or aggressively pursuing full compliance with all requirements established for the EMS System by the regional EMS council having responsibility for the EMS region in which the provider of EMS operates.

The regional EMS council shall prioritize funding distribution based on the EMS Development Plans (State and regional). The regional EMS council shall notify the provider of EMS of the established funding priorities, the application process, acquisition documentation requirements and processing deadlines. All applications for funding and all actions on those applications are to be completed by June 30, 2000.

The following are examples of eligible EMS activities for funding through the Emergency Medical Service Operating Fund:

- Expenditures necessary for Year 2000 compliance
- Regional EMS Development Plan Initiatives
- Quality Assurance/Improvement Initiatives
- Data Collection (Department approved data programs and hardware)
- Training Equipment (for Department certification programs)
- EMS Management Development Training Programs
- Recruitment and Retention Programs
- Eligible equipment for ALS/BLS/QRS (see Attachment)

The list identifies the eligible services for equipment purchases and the allowable cost. In addition, the list identifies the percentage contribution for urban/rural approved acquisitions.

The Department will retain an engineering firm to perform periodic NBIS inspection for various locally owned bridges located in Engineering District 3-0, that is Columbia, Lycoming, Tioga, Bradford, Sullivan, Montour, Northumberland, Snyder, and Union Counties.

Approximately 314 bridges will be required to be periodically inspected in 2001 and 2003 in Lycoming, Northumberland, Sullivan, Union, and Bradford Counties. Subsequently, approximately 144 interim bridge reinspections of certain bridges in these counties will also be made in 2000, 2002, and 2004. These bridge reinspections will be determined by condition and posting.

There may be a possibility that certain bridges in Columbia, Montour, Snyder, and Tioga Counties will also

be required to be inspected. Also, possibly 72 unforeseen bridge flood, closed, and initial inspections may be required in the entire District.

Bridges of various structure type and material could be involved; i.e. reinforced concrete, prestressed concrete, steel beam, steel truss, and others. A detailed listing of the bridge categories will be distributed during the scope of work meeting.

- 2/19/99: Kytril® and Zofran®: Reminder to providers that PACE will reimburse only on the 20% not reimbursed by DMER
- 2/19/99: Optometrists's Prescribing Privileges: Provides PACE Providers with a list of medications permitted by Department of Health regulation to be prescribed by optometrists. Warns providers to not dispense and bill the Program for pharmaceuticals that are prohibited by regulation from being prescribed by optometrists.
- 2/19/99: Optometrist's License Numbers: Notifies providers that Optometrists certified to prescribe and administer pharmaceutical agents for therapeutic purposes under section 4.1 of the Optometric Practice and Licensure Act are being issued a license with a suffix of "T".
- 3/5/99: PACENET Deductible: Reminder to PACE Providers that the \$500 PACENET deductible is accumulated based on each individual cardholder's enrollment year; not the calendar year.

INDEPENDENT REGULATORY REVIEW COMMISSION

Notice of Comments Issued

Section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(g)) provides that the designated standing committees may issue comments within 20 days of the close of the public comment period, and the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) may issue comments within 10 days of the close of the committee comment period. The Commission comments are based upon the criteria contained in section 5a(h) and (i) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)).

Department of Health Regulation No. 10-129 Head Injury Program July 22, 1999

We have reviewed this proposed regulation from the Department of Health (Department) and submit for your consideration the following objections and recommendations. Section 5.1(h) and (i) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) specify the criteria the Commission must employ to determine whether a regulation is in the public interest. In applying these criteria, our Comments address issues that relate to statutory authority; fiscal impact; protection of the public health, safety and welfare; duplication of regulations; reasonableness; need; and clarity. We recommend that these Comments be carefully considered as you prepare the final-form regulations.

1. Enrollment status.—Clarity.

The regulation does not clearly state when an applicant becomes enrolled in the Head Injury Program (HIP). The term “enrollment” is used inconsistently throughout the regulation including the following:

- A “client” is defined in § 4.2 as an individual enrolled in the HIP.
- Time periods in § 4.6 begin with the date of enrollment in the HIP.

- Section 4.7 requires enrollment (that is, client status) for payment for services, including assessments.
- Under § 4.8, the provider has 30 days after enrollment to submit a rehabilitation service plan (plan).
- Section 4.10(a)(1) restricts administrative review to applicants.

These and other substantive provisions are tied to the date when an individual actually becomes enrolled. Does enrollment occur when an applicant is deemed eligible, when a plan is approved, or when services actually begin? The regulation should provide a clear distinction of when a person is considered to be enrolled in the HIP.

2. Financial eligibility for services.—Implementation procedures; reasonableness; fiscal impact; and protection of the public health, safety and welfare.

The regulation requires an applicant to meet financial tests to be eligible for services. Subsection 4.4(a)(3) provides the following criterion: “The applicant exhausted all alternate financial resources to pay for services covered by HIP as determined in accordance with HIP financial eligibility criteria.” We have two concerns with how financial eligibility for services will be determined.

First, the regulation does not include the HIP financial eligibility criteria which will be used to determine eligibility. It is our understanding from information provided by the Department that these financial criteria include measures such as discounting income up to 300% of the Federal poverty line. However, these important criteria, used in determining an applicant’s financial eligibility, must be included in the regulation to give adequate notice to applicants.

Our second concern is with the requirement that the client exhaust all alternative financial resources to pay for services covered by the HIP. The relationship between “exhausting all alternative resources” and “services covered by HIP” is unclear. For example, the definition of “alternative financial resources” includes income which is used for many needs, such as housing, food or medical bills. The definition also includes interest payments, court awards and the like. Senator Vincent Hughes, Minority Chairperson of the Senate Public Health and Welfare Committee, questions whether a client will be expected to be fully impoverished before obtaining the HIP services. The regulation does not clearly establish how an applicant’s income will be reviewed to meet the financial eligibility criteria. We recommend the final-form regulation specify the income or assets the Department will consider in determining eligibility.

3. Clients currently enrolled in the HIP.—Protection of the public health safety and welfare; and reasonableness of implementation procedures.

According to the Department, there are approximately 19 rehabilitation and 278 case management clients receiv-

ing services from the HIP. There are also 178 clients on the HIP waiting list. The proposed regulation does not address the status of these individuals once the regulations are promulgated.

The regulation should contain a provision that clearly states the status of those currently either enrolled in the program or on the waiting list. The provision should also outline the process of notifying these clients and applicants of the Department's change in policy regarding the HIP.

4. Section 4.2. Definitions.—Need; duplication of regulations; and clarity.

Case manager

This section defines "case manager" as an individual approved and assigned by the HIP to provide case management for a client. However, the proposal should describe the qualifications and the approval process to become a case manager. We recommend that a section be inserted in the regulation to clarify these two points.

Division

This definition reads: "The organizational unit, within the Department, having responsibility for the administration of the HIP." It is our understanding that the program will be administered through the Special Healthcare Programs Division. The definition should specify which division will be responsible.

Exhausted

This term is defined as the point when alternative financial resources for a HIP service have been denied or fully utilized. In light of Comment No. 2 above, this definition may not be needed if the financial eligibility criteria are specified in more detail.

Legal representative

This term is not defined in the regulations. However, it should be. In §§ 4.8, 4.10 and other sections, the regulation refers to the applicant or client, or the parent, guardian or representative of the applicant or client. Department staff indicated that the representative should be legally capable to make decisions for the applicant or client. This is especially important when the decisions for the applicant or client involve developing the plan or appealing an adverse initial review.

To clarify who can act on behalf of an applicant or client, we recommend the Department adopt a definition for the term "legal representative." The definition of "responsible person" in the Department's recently revised Long Term Care regulations at 28 Pa. Code §§ 201.3 (Definitions) and 201.29(L) (Residents rights) is an example. With this definition in place, §§ 4.8 and 4.10 and other parts of the regulation, could simply include the phrase "applicant, client or legal representative" rather than a list of several terms such as "parent, guardian or representative." As noted in our Comments below, this phrase should also be included in § 4.10, to clarify that a legal representative may seek administrative review and file an appeal on behalf of an applicant or client.

Consistent with our question in Comment No. 6 of why eligibility is limited to applicants over 21 years of age, the definition of "legal representative" should include a reference to minor.

Rehabilitation service plan

The last sentence of the definition of "rehabilitation service plan" states the purpose and function of the goals within the plan. These substantive provisions are not

appropriate in a definition. Additionally, this sentence duplicates language concerning goals in § 4.8(b). The Department should delete this sentence from the definition.

5. Section 4.3. HIP services and objectives.—Clarity.

Subsection 4.3(c) consists of a lengthy sentence describing how the Department will use the HIP Fund (Fund) to pay for clients' HIP services. The provision states that the Department "... will use the Fund to pay for clients' HIP services which would not otherwise be available to clients with traumatic brain injury who have exhausted alternative financial resources."

Under the eligibility requirements in § 4.4(a)(3), an applicant must exhaust all financial resources to pay for services covered by the HIP. For an applicant to become a client they must have met the eligibility requirement. Because § 4.3 addresses services and objectives for a client, we question why the alternative financing provision is necessary in this section. For clarity, we recommend the Department delete the language that follows "clients' HIP services" unless the Department provides a reason to retain it.

6. Section 4.4. Eligibility for services.—Fiscal impact; protection of public health, safety and welfare; reasonableness; need; and clarity.

In subsections (a) to (e), the phrase "the Department will deem" is used. Why is this phrase necessary? The regulation should simply state the eligibility and ineligibility criteria. For example, subsection (a) could state "An applicant must meet the following conditions: . . ."

Neither subsection (a) nor (b) indicates that the Department will conduct evaluations to determine an applicant's initial eligibility and a client's continuing enrollment in the HIP. These evaluations are mentioned in subsection 4.6(a). The language in subsection 4.6(a) would be better placed in § 4.4. The Department should also describe the procedures and standards it will use for these evaluations.

Subsection 4.4(a) Conditions.

Subsection (a) sets forth the basic conditions for eligibility. It includes four paragraphs that describe these conditions.

Subsection (a)(1) reads: "The applicant sustained a traumatic brain injury on or after July 3, 1985." The use of "on or after" is confusing and unnecessary. The Department should amend this subsection to read: "The applicant sustained a traumatic brain injury after July 2, 1985."

Subsection (a)(2) contains three residency requirements for eligibility. We question the requirement that the applicant must demonstrate the intent to maintain a permanent home in Pennsylvania for the indefinite future. It is unclear how the Department would enforce this requirement or why it is needed. The Department should either delete this requirement or justify its retention.

Subsection (a)(3) reads: "The applicant exhausted all alternate financial resources to pay for services covered by HIP as determined in accordance with HIP financial eligibility criteria." As discussed in Comment No. 2, the term "HIP financial eligibility criteria" is not defined in the proposal, nor does the proposal include any specific eligibility criteria. The proposal should describe this term and the criteria used in determining an applicant's eligibility.

Subsection (a)(4) provides an age limit for applicants. To be eligible for the HIP, an applicant must be 21 years of age or older. The Department has stated that people under 21 years of age are eligible to receive coverage for services through programs administered by the Departments of Education (Education), Labor and Industry (L&I) and Public Welfare (DPW). Commentators noted that people less than 21 years of age do not automatically receive services from these other programs. The Department indicated that the HIP previously had clients under the age of 21 years. However, these clients were eventually transferred to other programs. Since subsection 4.4(a)(3) requires that an applicant exhaust all alternate financial resources to be eligible for HIP services, the Department should clarify the need for the age limit in subsection 4.4(a)(4). The Department should also explain how the programs provided by Education, L&I and DPW are appropriate alternatives to the HIP for people under 21 years of age.

Subsection 4.4(b) Eligibility.

Subsection (b) states that an applicant will be eligible for HIP services only if the Department determines that the applicant has the potential to benefit from the services. There are two concerns with this subsection. First, the phrase "and other neuropsychological evaluations as deemed appropriate by the Department" is confusing and unclear. It is our understanding that the Department intends each applicant to undergo at least one neuropsychological evaluation. The regulation should clearly establish this requirement.

Second, commentators expressed concern with what appeared to be an undue emphasis placed on the case manager's recommendation. They indicated that a board-certified physician, neurosurgeon or neurologist should also be involved in the evaluation process to determine the potential benefit of HIP services to an applicant. The Department should respond to these concerns by clearly establishing the procedures for eligibility determinations.

In 1991, the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee (LB&FC) produced a report on the HIP. It included a detailed description of the case manager's duties in reviewing applicants' diagnostic information for completeness and developing recommendations. The LB&FC's description can be found in Appendix A of its report entitled "Performance Audit of the Health Department's Administration of the PA Head Injury Program" dated June 1991. The Department should clarify the case manager's current role in its determination of an applicant's potential to benefit from HIP services. In addition, the Department should describe what is included in a neuropsychological evaluation. The Department should also explain how applicants' medical histories would be utilized in the evaluation and determination process. Medical histories should include the prognoses provided by physicians, neurosurgeons or neurologists.

Subsection 4.4(c) Ineligibility due to impairment.

Subsection (c) states that an applicant will be ineligible for HIP services if the applicant's impairment is the result of one or more of the listed conditions.

Two areas in the subsection raise questions. First, one of the conditions leading to ineligibility in paragraph (c)(4) is "significant preexisting psychiatric, organic or degenerative brain disorders." Who makes the determination that the impairment is the result of a preexisting condition?

Second, the Department should define the term "cerebral vascular accident" used in paragraph (c)(5).

Stedman's Medical Dictionary (Williams & Wilkins, 1982) lists a similar term "cerebrovascular accident" under the term "accident" and defines it as "an obsolete and inappropriate term for stroke."

Subsection 4.4(f) Notification of eligibility.

Subsection (f) states that the Department will notify an applicant of eligibility within 30 days from the date of receipt of a complete application. The provision raises three questions. First, how will the date when an application is complete be determined and recorded? Second, why doesn't the subsection also require notification of ineligibility? This written notice should include the reasons the applicant is ineligible and a reference to § 4.10 relating to appeals. Finally, is the notice of eligibility considered to be the starting date for enrollment?

7. Section 4.5. Payment for services.—Fiscal impact and clarity.

Subsection (b) states that HIP will maintain a waiting list. It is not clear how this list would be prioritized (that is, by date of application, or degree of injury); the need to reapply once an applicant is on the list; and the priority assigned to a re-applicant. The purpose for, and protocols surrounding, the waiting list should be further defined in the final-form rulemaking.

Subsection (f) is unclear regarding conditions for which payment may be discontinued. In paragraph (2), how and when are the maximum funds available for treating the client determined?

Paragraph (4) does not specify what amounts of alternative financial resources or services would result in the discontinuation of HIP services. What if some minor amount of alternative resources becomes available? Or what if certain services could be obtained from another source? The regulation should specify some reasonable threshold at which alternative finances would result in discontinuing HIP services.

Paragraph (5) would result in stopping payments if "... it is no longer feasible to implement a rehabilitation service plan." Who makes these determinations, and how will the patient be notified? We request the Department include provisions to clarify the process and conditions under which it would discontinue payment for the plan.

8. Section 4.6. Duration of funding.—Fiscal impact; protection of public health, safety and welfare; reasonableness; and clarity.

The preamble states the Department's intent is to protect the financial integrity of the Fund and to provide services to as many individuals as possible. In addition to limitations in § 4.6, a periodic review or audit of program expenditures would ensure the limited dollars in the Fund are being used as efficiently as possible to meet the program goals. The Department should explain how it will review the program expenditures to protect the financial integrity of the Fund.

Subsection (a), dealing with initial eligibility and continuing enrollment, is not germane to this section. We recommend that this paragraph be placed in § 4.4 (Eligibility for services). Additionally, evaluations to determine continuing enrollment should also be discussed at the beginning of § 4.5(f) (Payment for services).

Subsections (b) and (c) state time limits for HIP participation of 12 consecutive months for rehabilitation and 18 consecutive months for case management. We have three questions regarding these time limits. First, page nine of the preamble states data shows the average

client completes a rehabilitation program in 1 to 3 years. Why then, is it appropriate to limit rehabilitation in the HIP to 1 year under subsection (b)?

Second, why is it necessary to limit services to consecutive months? If the patient had to discontinue services due to an illness such as pneumonia, would the time limit for services continue?

Finally, the regulation defines time limits. However, the regulation does not specify a maximum dollar limit in the regulation. Does the Department intend to use a per client funding cap? If so, the Department should specify this maximum limit in the regulation.

9. Section 4.7. Services eligible for payment.—Clarity.

The opening sentence of this section appears to limit payment to clients. Subsection (1) (Assessments) would be for applicants, not necessarily clients. These provisions should be revised for consistency.

Subsection (4) (Rehabilitation services) contains two references to the "appropriate National accrediting body" as approved by the Department. It is unclear what these accrediting bodies are and how the public could find the list of approved accrediting bodies. The regulation should include the accrediting bodies or state how a list of approved accrediting bodies could be obtained.

10. Section 4.8. Rehabilitation service plan.—Reasonableness and clarity.

Subsection 4.8(a)

Subsection (a) requires the plan to be submitted to HIP for approval within 30 days after the date the client is enrolled in HIP. We have two concerns with subsection (a).

First, there is no time limit placed on HIP to approve or disapprove the plan. In contrast, subsection 4.4(f) directs the Department to notify an applicant within 30 days of eligibility for HIP services. The Department should specify in the regulation how long HIP has to approve or disapprove a plan.

Second, rehabilitation services are limited by § 4.6 to 12 months, beginning with the date of the client's enrollment in HIP. Subsection (a) of § 4.8 uses the same starting date to develop a plan. A client would lose significant and valuable rehabilitation time while waiting for approval. The regulation should be revised to provide that the 12 consecutive months for service begins when actual services are commenced.

Subsection 4.8(c)

Subsection (c) requires a procedure for evaluation of progress, but does not specify the content of the procedure. The result of an evaluation is significant. An evaluation could result in modifying the plan under subsection (d), or discontinuing services under § 4.5(f). The regulation should specify the minimum requirements the procedure for evaluation of progress must include.

Subsection 4.8(d)

Subsection (d) allows modification of the plan. Subsection (a) requires joint development of a plan by the provider, case manager, client or client's representative. It also requires the HIP's approval of the plan. Subsection (b) states that the plan must contain certain components including specific goals, necessary services, time frames and financial responsibilities. In contrast, the scope of modifications that could occur under subsection (d) is

unclear. There is also no indication of whether client involvement or the HIP approval is required.

As written, the regulation could allow modification of any aspect of the plan. The Department should specify which components of the plan listed in subsection (b) could be modified, whether joint development would be required, who can make modifications to the plan and whether the HIP's approval would be required.

11. Section 4.10. Appeal procedures.—Statutory authority; fiscal impact; protection of public health, safety and welfare; reasonableness; need; and clarity.

We have several concerns with respect to this section. Our concerns are outlined as follows.

Subsection 4.10(a) Administrative review.

Subsections 4.10(a)(1)—(2) are confusing. First, there is a discrepancy between the two subsections. Subsection 4.10(a)(1) states that an applicant may file the request for an administrative review. However, subsection 4.10(a)(2) states that the applicant or client must file a request for an administrative review within 30 days of the date of the eligibility determination. Why does the first subsection reference only an applicant and not also a client, while the second subsection includes both?

Second, both subsections limit a request for an administrative review to the issue of the HIP eligibility determinations. What elements in the HIP eligibility determinations are subject to review or appeal?

Third, there is no time limit for administrative review. To insure an expeditious resolution of adverse determinations, the Department should impose a time limit on its internal review. Finally, the regulation does not indicate who is involved in an administrative review or whether the applicant or client may attend or participate in an administrative review. This should be clarified.

Subsection 4.10(b) Administrative hearing.

We have several concerns with this subsection. First, as noted above, the regulation does not indicate which issues may be appealed. Examples of other decisions or determinations that could be subject to appeal include the following:

1. The determination under § 4.5 of the specific condition or impairment deemed eligible for treatment.
2. The determination under § 4.5 whether the client has the potential to benefit from treatment and live more independently as a result of services.
3. The maximum allocation of funds under § 4.5.
4. The duration of funding under § 4.6.
5. The services eligible for payment under § 4.7.
6. The modification of the plan under § 4.8.

Second, it is unclear whether a person may immediately appeal an adverse determination or whether the person must first request an administrative review. The preamble of this proposed rulemaking explains that an applicant or client must first request an administrative review. If the person is not satisfied with the results, the person may then appeal. This would lead to the scheduling of an administrative hearing. However, this two-step process is not clear in the regulation. Subsections 4.10(b)(1)—(2) do not mention the need for an administrative review before filing for a hearing. They simply state

that the Division will advise the person of the right to appeal an adverse decision within 15 days of the mailing of that decision.

The regulation should clarify that an applicant or client must first complete the administrative review process before he can file an appeal. A solid start towards clarifying this two-step sequence would be to place the procedures for the administrative review and the hearing into two separate sections.

As noted above, subsection 4.10(b)(2) gives an applicant or client 15 days to file an appeal. This period begins on the date that the Division mails its decision to the applicant or client. Depending on the postal service's efficiency in delivering the decision, the period in which an applicant or client may file an appeal could shrink dramatically. To account for unforeseeable postal delays, the rule should provide that 3 days should be added to the time required for filing an appeal when the decision is sent by mail.

Third, the regulation should insure that hearing locations are accessible to applicants or clients. Senator Hughes suggests that the regulation include a provision similar to one proposed for the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program. The provision requires that the hearing location be accessible to the applicant or client. We agree that accessibility to a hearing location would be important to the HIP population.

Fourth, subsection 4.10(b)(4)(ii)(B) indicates that an applicant or client may be represented at a formal hearing by a relative, friend or another person of the applicant's, or client's choice. Allowing a non-lawyer to represent another individual constitutes the unlawful practice of law, prohibited by 42 Pa.C.S. § 2524. An administrative agency does not have the authority to permit a practice that is prohibited by the Judicial Code. (see *Westmoreland County v. Rodgers, et al.*, 693 A.2d 996 (1997); *Kohlman v. Western Pennsylvania Hospital*, 652 A.2d 849 (1994), petition for allowance of appeal denied, 663 A.2d 692 (1995)).

Fifth, this section does not clarify that a legal representative may seek administrative review and file an appeal on behalf of an applicant or client. As noted in Comment No. 3 above, this section should contain a reference to "legal representative," which should be a defined term.

Finally, will HIP services and funding continue during the pendency of a review or hearing? If not, the regulation should include a specific time limit for the administrative review. Also, the regulation should provide that immediately upon issuance of a favorable decision, services will be reinstated for the time remaining of the 12 month period based upon the date on which services are terminated.
