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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Rule 212.1. Civil Actions to be Tried by Jury. Notice of Earliest Trial Date. Time for Completing Discovery and Filing Pre-Trial Statement.

(a)* The Court hereby extends Pa.R.C.P. 212.1 and 212.2 to apply to civil actions to be tried non-jury, and to equity actions. The notice of [first listing for trial] scheduling for Pre-Trial Conference, generated by the Court Administrator's Office at least 50 days prior to said [trial] conference date, shall serve as notice of the earliest trial date required by Pa.R.C.P. 212.1(a).

(b)* All pre-trial statements are to be filed in the Prothonotary's Office, and a hard copy provided to the Pre-Trial Conference Judge's Chambers, not later than [14] 7 days prior to the [earliest trial] Pre-Trial Conference date.

Comment: Pursuant to Pa.R.C.P. 212.1(c)(2), Montgomery County has altered the times set for the filing of pre-trial statements as set forth in Pa.R.C.P. 212.1(b). This Rule applies to matters that are certified for trial pursuant to Local Rule of Civil Procedure 212.1*(d).

COMMONWEALTH COURT

Notice to Election Bar and Administrative Order; Objections to Nomination Papers for Statewide Office, August, 2010

Pursuant to Pennsylvania law, the number of qualified signers on papers nominating an independent or third party candidate for national or statewide office must equal two percent of the largest entire vote cast for any elected candidate in Pennsylvania at the last preceding election involving statewide candidates. In 2010, the required number of valid signatures amounts to 19,082. Because of the logistics inherent in resolving challenges to such a large number of signatures, objections filed to nomination papers for statewide or national office must be filed in a manner that is readily accessible and flexible for use by the Court and the parties.

Therefore, the Court Orders, as follows:

And Now, this 28th day of July, 2010, it is hereby Ordered that all Petitions to Set Aside Nomination Papers (objection petitions) of candidates seeking national or statewide office shall, and objection petitions to all other nomination papers may, be filed in electronic format as well as filed in the usual paper format (original and one copy), utilizing the following guidelines:

- 1. The objection petition shall specify objections to individual signature lines in nomination papers and these shall be set forth in an EXCEL® spreadsheet format, *i.e.* as an "xls" or "xlsx" file (not as a "pdf" or similar file) using the downloadable spreadsheet provided on the Court's web site at: http://www.aopc.org/T/Commonwealth.
- 2. Spreadsheet columns shall include, for each challenged signature line: page number, line number, county, and the reason or reasons for each challenge, as designated in the spreadsheet on the Court's web site. The spreadsheet shall designate the grounds for challenge by codes, as follows:

NR = Not Registered

NRA = Not Registered at Address

NRDS = Not Registered on Date Signed

OC = Out of County

Ill = Illegible

LIO = Line Information Omitted

DUP = Duplicate

IHA = Line Information in Hand of Another

N/I = Nickname/Initial

PRI = Printed Signature

DCA = Defective Circulator Affidavit

SAC = Signed After Circulator's Affidavit Dated Other = Any ground for objection not listed above

- 3. The objection petition shall clearly state the number of signature lines challenged as well as the total number of completed signature lines on the face of the nomination papers.
- 4. Any "global" legal challenges must be clearly and separately stated in the objection petition.
- 5. When an objection petition is filed using the spread-sheet:
- (a) Objector shall attach to the objection petition as an exhibit a printed copy of the spreadsheet printed on 81/2 x 14 inch paper, with all grid lines showing, and column headers appearing on each printed sheet, as well as a printed copy of the Election Spreadsheet Directions page setting forth the legend of the codes for grounds for challenge;
- (b) Objector shall file two disks containing an electronic version of the spreadsheet and Election Spreadsheet Directions page as specified in Paragraph 1 above, and;
- (c) In addition to the usual service requirements, Objector shall serve upon Candidate one disk containing a read-only electronic version of the spreadsheet and Election Spreadsheet Directions page as specified in Paragraph 1 above.

The requirement that an objection petition to nominating papers filed for national or statewide office be filed on the designated spreadsheet according to the procedures set forth above may be modified by the Court upon a showing of good cause.

Upon the filing of an objection petition, the Court will issue a scheduling and case management order. Counsel should be prepared to litigate in multiple courtrooms simultaneously, and to review contested signature lines and enter into appropriate stipulations prior to any court hearings.

- (b) to the Secretary of the Commonwealth who shall post this order conspicuously in the Bureau of Commissions, Elections and Legislation and in such other manner as he deems appropriate;
- (c) to the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, and;
- (d) for publication in *The Legal Intelligencer* and the *Pennsylvania Law Weekly*.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 58—RECREATION

GAME COMMISSION [58 PA. CODE CH. 131]

Preliminary Provisions; Disclosure of Certain Records

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its June 29, 2010, meeting, added § 131.9 (relating to disclosure of certain records) to establish and define the manner that the Commission will respond to certain types of record requests.

The final-form rulemaking will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the final-form rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

Notice of proposed rule making was published at 40 Pa.B. 3126 (June 12, 2010).

1. Purpose and Authority

It is the duty of the Commission to propagate, manage and preserve the game or wildlife of this Commonwealth. To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Commission participates in various reviews for development projects across this Commonwealth. The two most common types of records and reviews are those collected under the Voluntary Wind Power Cooperative Agreements and those collected through the screening process with the Pennsylvania Natural Heritage Program. While some records may overlap, these are two distinct bodies of records. Many times the information gathered and shared is with regard to threatened and endangered species and even more often the information is with regard to species of special concern and greatest conservation need. In many cases, it is developed by developers themselves and is proprietary with regard to the site, the protocol and the findings. In all cases, information gathered and shared during these reviews is necessary to formulate policy and recommendations regarding policy and actions, including regulations and decisions about legal actions with regard to various types of development. In addition, the Commission keeps records regarding hunting and furtaking licenses to effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth. Finally, many records contain personal identifying information which is necessary to predeliberative action, proprietary or the disclosure of which carries substantial and demonstrable risk of physical harm.

The Commonwealth established the Right-to-Know Law (act) (65 P. S. §§ 67.101—67.3104), effective January 1, 2009. Under the act, the definition of "public record" has changed and the list of exemptions to disclosure has grown. Under the prior law, documents regarding reviews would not have been of the kind or character to be a public record; under the act, they are classified as public records. In addition, hunting and furtaking license records were specifically exempt from disclosure by section 325 of the code (relating to limitation on disclosure of certain records). However, with the passage of the act, questions have again arisen with regard to these two classes of sensitive information. To clarify for Commission staff and the public how the act will be implemented with regard to the classes of records indicated as those col-

lected for review and those regarding hunting and furtaking licenses, the Commission adds § 131.9.

Section 2722(g) of the code (relating to authorized license-issuing agents) directs the Commission to adopt regulations for the administration, control and performance of license issuing activities. Section 2102(a) of the code (relating to regulations) provides that "The commission shall promulgate such regulations as it deems necessary and appropriate concerning game or wildlife and hunting or furtaking in this Commonwealth, including regulations relating to the protection, preservation and management of game or wildlife and game or wildlife habitat, permitting or prohibiting hunting or furtaking, the ways, manner, methods and means of hunting or furtaking, and the health and safety of persons who hunt or take wildlife or may be in the vicinity of persons who hunt or take game or wildlife in this Commonwealth." The addition of § 131.9 was adopted under this authority.

2. Regulatory Requirements

The final-form rulemaking adds § 131.9 to establish and define the manner that the Commission will respond to certain types of record requests.

3. Persons Affected

Persons seeking wind power records, Pennsylvania Natural Heritage Program records or recreational license records from the Commission may be affected by the final-form rulemaking.

4. Comment and Response Summary

The Commission received one official comment in opposition to the final-form rulemaking.

5. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The final-form rulemaking should not result in additional cost or paperwork.

6. Effective Date

The final-form rulemaking will be effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

The Commission, acting under authorizing statute, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapter 131, are amended by adding § 131.9 to read as set forth at 40 Pa.B. 3126.

- (b) The Executive Director of the Commission shall certify this order and 40 Pa.B. 3126 and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (c) This order shall become effective upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

GAME COMMISSION [58 PA. CODE CH. 141]

Hunting and Trapping; Protective Material Required

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its June 29, 2010, meeting, amended § 141.20 (relating to protective material required) to eliminate the voluntary posting of protective material outside of manufactured blinds allowance. In the alternative, final-form rule-making requires that hunters hunting during any fire-arms season for deer, elk or bear post a minimum of 100 square inches of daylight fluorescent orange-colored material within 15 feet of a blind meeting the requirements in section 2308(a)(3) of the code (relating to unlawful devices and methods) in a manner that is visible within a 360° arc in addition to requirement of the wearing of protective material on their persons.

The final-form rulemaking will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the final-form rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

Notice of proposed rule making was published at 40 Pa.B. 3123 (June $12,\ 2010$).

1. Purpose and Authority

At its April 18, 2007, meeting, the Commission adopted amendments to § 141.20 that permitted the posting of protective material within 15 feet of a blind meeting the requirements in section 2308(a)(3) of the code instead of wearing the required protective material on their person while hunting during any firearms season for deer, elk or bear. These amendments were made in response to concerns raised by hunters regarding the then current requirement that protective material be worn only on their person inside a manufactured blind where its visual effectiveness is severely diminished. This requirement did not afford adequate safety for hunters. Upon further reflection of this issue, the Commission determined that a mandatory posting of protective material outside a manufactured blind for hunters who choose to utilize them while hunting during any firearms season for deer, elk or bear will better protect their safety rather than the current voluntary alternative. To this end, the Commission amends § 141.20 to eliminate the voluntary posting of protective material outside of manufactured blinds allowance and in the alternative require that hunters hunting during any firearms season for deer, elk or bear post a minimum of 100 square inches of daylight fluorescent orange-colored material within 15 feet of a blind meeting the requirements in section 2308(a)(3) of the code

in a manner that is visible within a 360° arc in addition to the requirement of the wearing of protective material on their persons.

Section 2102(a) of the code (relating to regulations) provides that "The commission shall promulgate such regulations as it deems necessary and appropriate concerning game or wildlife and hunting or furtaking in this Commonwealth, including regulations relating to the protection, preservation and management of game or wildlife and game or wildlife habitat, permitting or prohibiting hunting or furtaking, the ways, manner, methods and means of hunting or furtaking, and the health and safety of persons who hunt or take wildlife or may be in the vicinity of persons who hunt or take game or wildlife in this Commonwealth." The amendments to § 141.20 were adopted under this authority.

2. Regulatory Requirements

The final-form rulemaking amends § 141.20 to eliminate the voluntary posting of protective material outside of manufactured blinds allowance and in the alternative require that hunters hunting during any firearms season for deer, elk or bear post a minimum of 100 square inches of daylight fluorescent orange-colored material within 15 feet of a blind meeting the requirements in section 2308(a)(3) of the code in a manner that is visible within a 360° arc in addition to the requirement of the wearing of protective material on their persons.

3. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to hunt during any firearms season for deer, elk or bear from a blind meeting the requirements in section 2308(a)(3) of the code will be affected by the final-form rulemaking.

4. Comment and Response Summary

There were no official comments received regarding the final-form rulemaking.

5. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The final-form rulemaking should not result in additional cost or paperwork.

6. Effective Date

The final-form rulemaking will be effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

The Commission, acting under authorizing statute, orders that:

- (a) The regulations of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapter 141, are amended by amending § 141.20 to read as set forth in Annex A.
- (b) The Executive Director of the Commission shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (c) This order shall become effective upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Annex A

TITLE 58. RECREATION PART III. GAME COMMISSION CHAPTER 141. HUNTING AND TRAPPING Subchapter A. GENERAL

§ 141.20. Protective material required.

- (a) The following requirements apply:
- (1) General. Except as otherwise provided in subsection (b), it is unlawful to hunt or assist to hunt game or wildlife or move to or from a hunting location, from 1 hour before legal hunting hours to 1 hour after legal hunting hours outside of a motorized vehicle, at any time without wearing a minimum of 250 square inches of daylight fluorescent orange-colored material on the head, chest and back combined so that it is visible in a 360° arc. This shall include going to or from a hunting location before or after legal shooting hours. Except as provided in subsection (b)(2) and (3), camouflage orange clothing is lawful provided it contains the minimum amount of fluorescent orange-colored material.
- (2) Additional requirements. It is unlawful to hunt during any firearms season for deer, elk or bear from any blind meeting the requirements in section 2308(b)(3) of the act (relating to unlawful devices and methods) without placing a minimum of 100 square inches of daylight fluorescent orange-colored material within 15 feet from the blind so it is visible in a 360° arc.
 - (b) Permitted acts. It is lawful to:
- (1) Hunt without wearing daylight fluorescent orangecolored material for:
 - (i) Crows.
 - (ii) Doves.
 - (iii) Waterfowl.
- (iv) Any wildlife that can be lawfully harvested while hunting under the authority of a valid falconry permit.
- (v) Deer during the flintlock muzzleloader season with lawful firearms and ammunition for the flintlock muzzleloader season by properly licensed flintlock muzzleloader hunters.
- (vi) Deer during the archery deer season with a bow and arrow or crossbow and bolt by properly licensed archery hunters except as provided in paragraphs (3)(ii) and (4).
- (vii) Bear during the archery bear season with a bow and arrow by properly licensed bear hunters except as provided in paragraph (3)(iii).
 - (viii) Furbearers.

- (ix) Coyotes except from the first day to the last day inclusive of the regular firearms deer season, any firearms bear season and spring turkey season within each wildlife management unit.
 - (x) Turkey during the spring turkey season.
- (2) Hunt for woodchucks while wearing a hat made of solid daylight fluorescent orange-colored material on the head only.
- (3) Move about or relocate while wearing a hat containing a minimum of 100 square inches of a solid daylight fluorescent orange-colored material on the head only and be stationary without wearing the required orange-colored material when hunting for:
- (i) Turkey during the fall turkey season in Wildlife Management Units 1A, 1B, 2A, 2B, 5B, 5C and 5D.
- (ii) Deer with a bow and arrow or crossbow and bolt during any deer archery season which is concurrent with the fall turkey season within each wildlife management unit.
- (iii) Bear with a bow and arrow during any bear archery season, which is concurrent with the fall turkey season within each wildlife management unit.
- (4) Be on stand and stationary while hunting for turkey during the fall season in Wildlife Management Units 2C, 2D, 2E, 2F, 2G, 3A, 3B, 3C, 3D, 4A, 4B, 4C, 4D, 4E and 5A or deer during any firearms deer season that precedes the regular firearms deer season and in lieu of the required 250 square inches place a minimum of 100 square inches of daylight fluorescent orange-colored material within 15 feet of the hunter's location so it is visible in a 360° arc.
- (c) A person who violates this section shall be subject to the penalties as provided in the act.

GAME COMMISSION [58 PA. CODE CH. 141]

Hunting and Trapping; Wild Pheasant Recovery Areas

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its June 29, 2010, meeting, amended § 141.28 (relating to wild pheasant recovery areas) to create and define the geographic location of the Hegins-Gratz Valley wild pheasant recovery area (WPRA) and prohibit the hunting of small game and dog training activities from the first Sunday in February through July 31st within any area designated as a WPRA.

The final-form rulemaking will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the final-form rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 40 Pa.B. 3124 (June 12, 2010).

1. Purpose and Authority

The Ring-necked Pheasant Management Plan calls for restoring self-sustaining and huntable ring-necked pheasant populations in suitable habitats by establishing at least four WPRAs by 2015. Wild-trapped pheasants will be released in WPRAs in an effort to establish populations of at least ten hens per square mile in the spring, while WPRAs will remain closed to game farm pheasant stocking, pheasant hunting and dog training activities. Small game hunting within WPRAs will also be restricted during critical periods during the population establishment phase. Three WPRAs were listed in 2009 and one additional area, the Hegins-Gratz Valley WPRA, was adopted to prepare for pheasant releases in 2011.

Section 322(c)(4) of the code (relating to powers and duties of commission) specifically authorizes the Commission to "Define geographic limitations or restrictions." Section 2102(c) of the code (relating to regulations) directs that "The commission shall promulgate regulations concerning the transportation, introduction into the wild, importation, exportation, sale, offering for sale or purchase of game or wildlife or the disturbing of game or wildlife in their natural habitat." Section 2102(a) of the code provides that "The commission shall promulgate such regulations as it deems necessary and appropriate concerning game or wildlife and hunting or furtaking in this Commonwealth, including regulations relating to the protection, preservation and management of game or wildlife and game or wildlife habitat, permitting or prohibiting hunting or furtaking, the ways, manner, methods and means of hunting or furtaking, and the health and safety of persons who hunt or take wildlife or may be in the vicinity of persons who hunt or take game or wildlife in this Commonwealth." The amendments to § 141.28 were adopted under this authority.

2. Regulatory Requirements

The final-form rulemaking amends § 141.28 to create and define the geographic location of the Hegins-Gratz Valley WPRA and prohibits the hunting of small game and dog training activities from the first Sunday in February through July 31st within areas designated as WPRAs.

3. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to hunt wild pheasants, release propagated pheasants, train dogs or hunt small game within areas designated as WPRAs may be affected by the final-form rulemaking.

4. Comment and Response Summary

There were no official comments received regarding the final-form rulemaking.

5. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The final-form rulemaking should not result in additional cost or paperwork.

6. Effective Date

The final-form rulemaking will be effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

- (a) The regulations of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapter 141, are amended by amending § 141.28 to read as set forth at 40 Pa.B. 3124.
- (b) The Executive Director of the Commission shall certify this order and 40 Pa.B. 3124 and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.
- (c) This order shall become effective upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

GAME COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CH. 139]

Seasons and Bag Limits; Private Property Coupons

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission) proposed, at its June 29, 2010, meeting, to amend § 139.4 (relating to seasons and bag limits for the license year) to reinstate 2,761 coupons on private land that would otherwise be denied.

The proposed rulemaking will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the proposed rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

The proposed rulemaking was made public at the June 29, 2010, meeting of the Commission. Comments can be sent until August 16, 2010, to the Director, Information and Education, Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797.

1. Purpose and Authority

The Commission is required to set hunting and furtaking seasons and bag limits on an annual basis. For the 2010-2011 seasons, the number of Deer Management Assistance Program permits was capped at the 2009-2010 totals within each wildlife management unit without further action by the Board. The Board subsequently learned that applying this cap would result in 2,761 coupons not being issued for private property that is not enrolled in the Commission's Public Access programs. After public comment, the Commission determined it was never its intent to take action that would result in these 2,761 coupons not being issued. This proposed rulemaking is to reinstate those coupons that would otherwise be denied.

Section 322(c)(1) of the code (relating to powers and duties of commission) specifically empowers the Commission to "fix seasons, daily shooting or taking hours, and any modification thereof, and daily, season and possession limits for any species of game or wildlife." Section 2102(b)(1) of the code authorizes the Commission to "promulgate regulations relating to seasons and bag limits for hunting or furtaking. . . . " The amendments to § 139.4 were proposed under this authority.

2. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed rulemaking amends § 139.4 by establishing when and where it is lawful to hunt deer and also place limits on the numbers that can be legally taken during the 2010-2011 license year.

3. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to hunt deer within this Commonwealth during the 2010-2011 license year may be affected by the proposed rulemaking.

4. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed rulemaking should not result in additional cost or paperwork.

5. Effective Date

The proposed rulemaking will be effective upon publication in the Pennsylvania Bulletin and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

The proposed rulemaking will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the proposed rulemaking is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

The proposed rulemaking was made public at the June 29, 2010, meeting of the Commission. Comments can be sent until September 30, 2010, to the Director, Information and Education, Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797.

1. Purpose and Authority

On October 6, 2009, the Commission finally adopted comprehensive changes to the various standards and conditions concerning falconry permits within this Commonwealth. See 39 Pa.B. 6760 (November 28, 2009). These amendments were primarily intended to bring the Commonwealth into compliance with new Federal permitting standards concerning falconry that become fully effective January 1, 2014. Since the adoption of these amendments, the Commission has come to the recognition that the standards concerning whom is eligible to sponsor new falconers are insufficient to ensure that sponsors have enough experience to properly guide new falconers. To this end, the Commission is proposing to amend § 147.101 to require that a sponsor for a new falconer be a general or master class falconer. The Commission is also proposing to amend § 147.103 to expand the list of eligible species of eagles that a master class falconer may

possess with additional written authorization to include eagles not covered by the act.

Section 2102(a) of the code (relating to regulations) provides that "The commission shall promulgate such regulations as it deems necessary and appropriate concerning game or wildlife and hunting or furtaking in this Commonwealth, including regulations relating to the protection, preservation and management of game or wildlife and game or wildlife habitat, permitting or prohibiting hunting or furtaking, the ways, manner, methods and means of hunting or furtaking, and the health and safety of persons who hunt or take wildlife or may be in the vicinity of persons who hunt or take game or wildlife in this Commonwealth." Section 2901(b) of the code (relating to authority to issue permits) provides "The commission may, as deemed necessary to properly manage the game or wildlife resources, promulgate regulations for the issuance of any permit and promulgate regulations to control the activities which may be performed under authority of any permit issued." The amendments to §§ 147.101 and 147.103 were proposed under this authority.

2. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed rulemaking amends §§ 147.101 and 147.103 to require that a sponsor for a new falconer be a general or master class falconer having at least 2 years experience as a general class falconer and expand the list of eligible species of eagles that a master class falconer may possess with additional written authorization to include eagles not covered by the act.

Persons wishing to engage in falconry activities within this Commonwealth may be affected by the proposed rulemaking.

The proposed rulemaking should not result in additional cost or paperwork.

TITLE 58. RECREATION PART III. GAME COMMISSION CHAPTER 147. SPECIAL PERMITS Subchapter F. FALCONRY

§ 147.101. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this subchapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

* * * * *

Sponsor—The holder of a general or master falconry permit with at least 2 years experience as a general class falconer, who has accepted the responsibility for the conduct and training of an apprentice falconer.

* * * * *

§ 147.103. Classes.

(a) Apprentice. Permittees of the apprentice class shall be subject to the following requirements and limitations:

* * * * *

(2) Permittees shall be sponsored, at all times, by a Pennsylvania general or master class falconry permit holder who has at least 2 years experience as a general class falconer. If a permittee's sponsorship is withdrawn or lost for any reason, the permittee shall provide written notification of the loss to the Commission within 5 days and shall be required to replace the sponsorship within 15 days.

* * * * *

(c) *Master*. Permittees of the master class shall be subject to the following requirements and limitations:

* * * * *

(5) Upon additional written authorization provided by the Commission, permittees may possess up to a maximum of three eagles, regardless of captive-bred or wild caught, limited to golden eagles, white-tailed eagles [and], Steller's sea-eagles or any other eagle not covered by the Migratory Bird Treaty Act (16 U.S.C.A. §§ 703—712), as part of their total possession allowance. An application to possess eligible eagles shall be accompanied by two written letters of recommendation from persons with experience handling or flying large raptors, such as eagles, ferruginous hawks (Buteo regalis), goshawks (Accipiter gentilis) or great horned owls (Bubo virginianus). Each letter of reference must contain a concise history of the author's experience with large raptors and an explicit representation that the permittee possess the competency and skills necessary to possess eagles.

JOINT COMMITTEE ON DOCUMENTS

Preliminary Provisions; Definitions

The Joint Committee on Documents (JCD) proposes to amend 1 Pa. Code § 1.4 (relating to definitions).

Statutory Authority

Section 1.4 is proposed to be amended under 45 Pa.C.S. § 503 (relating to general administration of part) and section 506 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P.S. § 186).

Background of the Amendments

The Legislative Reference Bureau (LRB) purchases paper copies of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin (Bulletin)* and *Pennsylvania Code (Code)* for a variety of government entities enumerated in 1 Pa. Code Chapter 15 (relating to distribution of publications). This has been the policy of

the JCD since the inception of the *Bulletin* in 1970. Under 45 Pa.C.S. § 503, the JCD is required to encourage "the widest possible dissemination" of documents appearing in the *Code* and *Bulletin*.

The *Code* and *Bulletin* have been available at no charge on the Internet since 1996. The web sites receive approximately 500,000 visits each month. Subscribers to the print versions have steadily declined as a result of free electronic access.

This proposed rulemaking will amend § 1.4 to define a "copy" to include a printed or electronic version. As a result, most entities listed in Chapter 15 will no longer receive paper copies of the *Code* and *Bulletin* paid for by the LRB. Budgetary constraints require that the LRB cease these payments. Informal surveys conducted by the staff of the JCD indicate that most of the Chapter 15 entities use the electronic versions of the *Code* and *Bulletin*.

Effective Date

It is anticipated that the final-form regulation will go into effect on July 1, 2011.

Fiscal Impact

There will be no fiscal impact on the general public as a result of this proposed rulemaking. Political subdivisions may be slightly impacted if magisterial district judges choose to continue paper subscriptions. The LRB paid \$472,538 for Chapter 15 subscriptions in 2009. The Commonwealth will realize a savings but it is difficult to predict how many State entities will choose to purchase the print versions. It is anticipated that most will rely on the web sites, so substantial savings should result.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on July 28, 2010, the JCD submitted a copy of this proposed rulemaking and a copy of a Regulatory Analysis Form to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the House State Government Committee and the Senate Rules and Executive Nominations Committee. A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC may convey any comments, recommendations or objections to the proposed rulemaking within 30 days of the close of the public comment period. The comments, recommendations or objections shall specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review prior to final publication of the rulemaking, by the JCD, IRRC, the General Assembly and the Governor of comments, recommendations or objections raised.


Reorganization of the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency

DEPARTMENT OF STATE [4 PA. CODE CH. 165]

Notaries Public; Incompatible Crimes

The Secretary of the Commonwealth adds a statement of policy in § 165.1 to read as set forth in Annex A. This statement of policy establishes the policy and application review process of certain applications for appointment to the office of notary public under section 5 of The Notary Public Law (act) (57 P. S. § 151) regarding application to become a notary public. Section 5(b)(1) of the act requires that an applicant may not have been convicted of or pled guilty or nolo contendere to a felony or a lesser offense incompatible with the duties of a notary public during the 5-year period preceding the date of the application.

The purpose of this statement of policy is to provide notice of those misdemeanor crimes which the Secretary considers to be incompatible with the duties of a notary public.

This statement of policy is not intended to circumscribe administrative discretion given to the Secretary under any law, rule or regulation to appoint and commission notaries public. Other applicable laws include 18 Pa.C.S. § 9124 (relating to use of records by licensing agencies). Other applicable sections are section 5(b) of the act and section 22(a) of the act (57 P.S. § 168(a)), which permit the Secretary to reject an application for appointment "for good cause." Applicants must furthermore be "of good character, integrity and ability" under section 3(a) of the act (57 P. S. § 149(a)) to be eligible for the office of notary public. The Secretary must "be satisfied that the applicant is of good moral character" under section 5(b) of the act before issuing a commission. Therefore, while a crime may not directly preclude an applicant from appointment and commission under section 5(b)(1) of the act, conviction of a crime or a lengthy criminal history may nonetheless call into question an applicant's moral character or integrity and thus be good cause for rejection of the application.

Subpart C. COMMISSIONS CHAPTER 165. NOTARIES PUBLIC

Sec. 165.1

Statement of policy—lesser offenses incompatible with the duties of a notary public.

§ 165.1 Lesser offenses incompatible with the duties of a notary public Statement of Policy.

- (a) The Secretary of the Commonwealth reviews applications for appointment to the office of notary public under section 5 of The Notary Public Law (act) (57 P. S. § 151). Section 5(b)(1) of the act requires that the applicant may not have been convicted of or pled guilty or nolo contendere to a felony or a lesser offense incompatible with the duties of a notary public during the 5-year period preceding the date of the application.
- (b) Misdemeanor crimes involving a lack of honesty or elements of falsehood and fraud (crimen falsi) are considered incompatible with the duties of a notary public, regardless of the jurisdiction in which crimes were committed.
- (c) Under Pennsylvania law, misdemeanors include, but are not limited to, the following:
- (1) Forgery and fraudulent practices which includes bad checks, insurance fraud and identity theft. See 18 Pa.C.S. Chapter 41 (relating to forgery and fraudulent practices).
- (2) Theft which includes receiving stolen property and retail theft. See 18 Pa.C.S. Chapter 39 (relating to theft and related offenses).
- (3) Criminal conspiracy if the underlying crime is incompatible. See 18 Pa.C.S. § 903 (relating to criminal conspiracy).
- (4) Bribery. See 18 Pa.C.S. § 4701 (relating to bribery in official and political matters).
- (5) Perjury or falsification in official matter which includes false swearing, unsworn falsification to authorities and tampering with evidence. See 18 Pa.C.S. Chapter 49, Subchapter A (relating to perjury and falsification in official matters).
- (6) Obstructing governmental operations. See 18 Pa.C.S. Chapter 51, Subchapter A (relating to definition of offenses generally).
- (d) The Secretary will consider all similar crimes committed in the courts of the United States or any other state, territory, possession or country to be incompatible with the duties of a notary public.

Documentation to support the request was submitted to the Department on April 11, 2008 by Babst, Calland, Clements, and Zomnir, on behalf of Beazer East. These criteria apply to the sites that are located within an area approximately 60 square miles in size and that has been designated by the Department under the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (HSCA) as the "Bear Creek Area Chemical Site" (BCACS).

Because water quality criteria had not been developed for the sulfonates or resorcinol by either the Department or the U.S. EPA, AMEC used the U.S. EPA's National guidelines to develop aquatic life water quality criteria as stated in 25 Pa. Code § 16.22. In addition, the Department developed ambient water quality criteria for the protection of human health for resorcinol as stated in 25 Pa. Code § 16.32. The following documentation was used to support the resorcinol human health criterion: Resorcino—Concise International Chemical Assessment Document 71, published under the United Nations Environment Programme, the International Labour Organization, and the World Health Organization 2006. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. Written comments or objections related to a mining permit application should contain the name, address and telephone number of persons submitting comments or objections; application number; and a statement of sufficient detail to inform the Department on the basis of comment or objection and relevant facts upon which it is based.

Requests for an informal conference, or a public hearing, as applicable, on a mining permit application, as provided by 25 Pa. Code §§ 77.123 or 86.34, must contain the name, address and telephone number of the requestor; the application number; a brief summary of the issues to be raised by the requestor at the conference; and a statement whether the requestor desires to have the conference conducted in the locality of the proposed mining activities.

When a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) number is listed, the mining activity permit application was accompanied by an application for an individual NPDES permit. The Department has made a tentative determination to issue the NPDES permit in conjunction with the mining activity permit, but the issuance of the NPDES permit is contingent upon the approval of the associated mining activity permit.

For coal mining activities, NPDES permits, when issued, will contain effluent limits that do not exceed the technology-based effluent limitations. The proposed limits are listed in Table 1.

For noncoal mining activities, the proposed limits are found in Table 2. Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description below specifies the parameters. The limits will be in the ranges specified in Table 1.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume, or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur, will be incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 362-0600-001, NPDES Program Implementation—Memorandum of Understanding Concerning Water Quality Management, NPDES Program Implementation and Related Matters. Other specific factors to be considered include public comments and Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDLs).

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES permit application should submit a statement to the Department at the address of the district mining office indicated previously each application within 30 days of this public notice. Comments received within the comment period will be considered in the final determinations regarding the NPDES permit applications. Comments must include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based.

The Department will also accept requests or petitions

for a public hearing on NPDES permit applications, as provided in 25 Pa. Code § 92.61. The request or petition for a public hearing shall be filed within 30 days of this public notice and shall contain the name, address, telephone number and the interest of the party filing the request, and shall state the reasons why a hearing is warranted. A public hearing may be held if the Department considers the public interest significant. If a hearing is scheduled, a notice of the hearing on the NPDES permit application will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and a newspaper of general circulation within the relevant geographical area. In the case where a public hearing is held, the Department will consider comments from the public hearing in the final determination on the NPDES permit application.

This paragraph does not, in and of itself, create any right of appeal beyond that permitted by applicable statutes and decision law.

For individuals who wish to challenge an action, appeals must reach the Board within 30 days. A lawyer is not needed to file an appeal with the Board.

Permit Extensions Law (Act 46); Notice of Applicability

Pursuant to Section 1607-I of the Act of April 9, 1929 (P. L. 343, No. 176), known as the Fiscal Code, added July 6, 2010 (P. L. ___, Act No. 46) (hereafter "Act 46"), this notice hereby identifies the applicability of the extension period provided under Act 46 to certain approvals granted under programs administered by the Department of Environmental Protection (Department).

Act 46 was passed by the General Assembly on July 6, 2010, to provide relief to the building industry impacted by the economic downturn and to that end is focused on land development for residential and commercial purposes. The Act automatically extends the expiration date of certain types of approvals, permits, decisions, agreements and other authorizations or decisions (hereafter "approvals") that were in effect, or issued, after December 31, 2008. The extension provided under Act 46 lasts until July 1, 2013.

By its express terms, Act 46 does not apply to: (1) an approval issued to comply with federal law, the duration or terms of expiration of which is specified or determined by federal law; or (2) requirements that are necessary to retain federal delegation to, or assumption by, the Commonwealth of the authority to implement a federal law or program. For example, Act 46 does not extend any of the NPDES permits administered by the Department or County Conservation Districts, including those for construction activities, for both of those reasons.

The following approvals issued by the Department, County Conservation Districts and local agencies are subject to Act 46 when they are associated with land development and related construction, subject to the exceptions listed below in this Notice:

- 1. Dam, Water Obstruction and Encroachment permits, and General Permit authorizations, under 25 Pa. Code Chapter 105. According to the Army Corps of Engineers, the related Pennsylvania State Programmatic General Permit ("SPGP") authorizes pursuant to Section 404 of the federal Clean Water Act will also be extended. Neither the Department nor any delegated County Conservation District or holder of such an authorization under Chapter 105 will have to take any action to effectuate this extension of any related SPGP authorization.
- 2. Water Quality Certifications under Section 401 of the Federal Clean Water Act that are issued by the Department for General Permits issued under Chapter 105. The extension is for the same length of time that the applicable Chapter 105 coverage approval is extended.
- 3. The following permits and general permit authorizations issued for beneficial use of residual waste, under 25 Pa. Code Chapter 287:

WMGR065—Beneficial use of the following types of residual wastes related to the manufacturing of iron and

steel: refractories, foundry sands, slags, air emission control solids and the media associated with their excavation as construction fill at an Act 2 remediation site.

WMGR070—Beneficial use of baghouse fines from air pollution devices generated at hot-mixed asphalt plants as a construction material or as levee core impermeable fill and pipe bedding.

WMGR072—Beneficial use of dewatered dredge waste for use as a roadbed material in roadway construction.

WMGR079—Processing and beneficial use of waste asphalt shingles as an aggregate in the production of hot mix asphalt paving material and as a sub-base for road and driveway construction.

WMGR082—Processing and beneficial use of steel and iron slag and refractory bricks mined from an existing slag pile for use as a construction material.

WMGR090—Processing and beneficial use of reclaimed asphalt pavement (RAP) materials as roadway construction material.

- 4. Deadlines for commencement of construction in public water system construction permits issued under 25 Pa. Code § 109.503.
- 5. Approvals for on-lot systems issued by local agencies under 25 Pa. Code Chapter 72.
- 6. Plan approvals under Act 167, 32 P.S. \S 680.1 et seq. (relating to storm water management).
- 7. Part II permits for construction of sewage treatment facilities under 25 Pa. Code Chapter 91.

Holders of approvals (i.e., permittees) granted under programs administered by the Department should not assume that an expiration date has been extended under Act 46 unless it is one of the types of approvals listed in this Notice and the holder has received a verification according to guidelines included in the Department's Guidance for Implementation of Act 46, which is available on the Department's website at www.depweb.state.pa.us under the "Licensing, Permits & Certification" link.

Certain approvals granted under programs administered by the Department, as well as particular circumstances, are not applicable to the extensions provided under Act 46. These include:

- 1. An approval issued to comply with federal law, the duration or terms of expiration of which is specified or determined by federal law.
- 2. Requirements that are necessary to retain federal delegation to, or assumption by, the Commonwealth of the authority to implement a federal law or program.
- 3. Approvals where, after the approval and during the extension period, the surface waters became classified as High Quality pursuant to 25 Pa. Code Section 93.1, 93.4b(A) or classified as Exceptional Value pursuant to 25 Pa. Code § 93.4b(B)(1).
- 4. An approval that was issued in connection with Exceptional Value surface waters under 25 Pa. Code § 93.4b(B)(1).

5. An administrative consent order or other enforcement action relating to an approval that is subject to the extension period.

6. The revocation or modification of an approval or extension of an approval, when the approval authorizes the modification or revocation for cause.

The Department's interpretation of Act 46 referred to herein is not an adjudication or a regulation. There is no intent on the part of the Department to give the contents of this Notice, and the Department's guidance referred to in this Notice, that weight or deference. This Notice explains the framework within which the Department will exercise its administrative discretion in the future, and the Department reserves the discretion to deviate from that framework if circumstances warrant.

Payment for Nursing Facility Services; Nonpublic **Nursing Facility Medical Assistance Enhanced Supplemental Payments**

Purpose

The purpose of this announcement is to provide advance public notice that the Department of Public Welfare (Department) intends to change its methods and standards for payment of Medical Assistance (MA) nursing facility services to offer a new category of supplemental payment to qualified nonpublic MA nursing facilities.

Specific Requirements

The Department is the Single State Agency responsible for the administration of the MA Program. The Department reimburses nonpublic MA nursing facilities for the services they render to MA recipients through a combination of per diem rate payments, which are computed under the case-mix payment methodology in 55 Pa. Code Chapter 1187 (relating to nursing facility services), and various supplemental payments, which are authorized in Chapter 1187 and the Commonwealth's approved Title XIX State Plan.

Consistent with its focus on ensuring the sustainability of quality MA long-term living services to the consumers of those services, the Department intends to submit a State Plan Amendment (SPA) to the Federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) to authorize an Enhanced Supplemental (ES) Payment to nonpublic MA nursing facilities that meet specified criteria and agree to certain conditions. Under the proposed SPA, the Department would provide nonpublic nursing facilities that serve a disproportionate number of MA residents or serve MA residents with high care needs, or both, the opportunity to receive enhanced MA Program funding. Making this enhanced funding available is part of the Department's ongoing efforts to ensure that MA recipients continue to receive access to medically necessary nursing facility services and that those services result in quality care that improves the lives of those who receive them.

In addition, consistent with the Department's focus on ensuring efficient use of tax dollars, the Department intends to include provisions in the proposed SPA to eliminate existing and potential litigation challenging the adequacy of the case-mix per diem rate payments. These measures will allow the Commonwealth and MA nursing facilities to direct more of their financial and staff resources into the delivery of services to consumers, rather than to underwriting the costs of protracted rate litigation. In addition, they will remove uncertainties and afford greater stability and predictability to the Commonwealth and to MA nursing facilities for budgeting and planning purposes.

If CMS approves the SPA, the Department will make the ES Payments in two installments. Each installment will be comprised of several components. The amount of a qualifying nursing facility's ES Payment will depend on how many components the facility is eligible to receive. The Department will use its best efforts to process the first installment within 20 days of the date it receives notice from CMS that the SPA is approved. The Department will use its best efforts to process the second installment within 14 days after the first installment payment is made.

Additions to List of Class A Wild Trout Waters

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) has approved the additions to its list of Class A Wild Trout Streams as set forth at 40 Pa.B. 3027 (June 5, 2010). Under to 58 Pa. Code § 57.8a (relating to Class A wild trout streams), it is the Commission's policy to manage self-sustaining Class A wild trout populations as a renewable natural resource and to conserve that resource and the angling that it provides. Class A wild trout populations represent the best of this Commonwealth's naturally reproducing trout fisheries. The Commission manages these stream sections for wild trout with no stocking.

Removal of Certain Refuge Areas

Under 58 Pa. Code § 67.2 (relating to refuge areas), the Executive Director of the Fish and Boat Commission (Commission), with the approval of the Commission, may designate waters as refuge areas to which 30 Pa.C.S. § 2306 (relating to refuge areas), shall apply. Section 2306 of 30 Pa.C.S. provides that the Commission may set aside, in its discretion, areas as it may judge best as refuge areas in which fishing or entry shall be prohibited for periods of time as the Commission prescribes. According to the regulation, the designation of waters as refuge areas shall be effective upon posting of the waters after publication of a notice that the waters have been so designated in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Refuge areas are closed to public fishing except during the period from June 15 until the last day of February of the following year. It is unlawful to disturb fish or other aquatic life in refuge areas by any means, including wading, throwing stones, rocks or other objects or otherwise agitating the waters. The regulation will not be construed to prohibit fishing in such areas during the extended trout season.

Based on current conditions, there are reasons to remove the refuge area designation from 18 streams. For example, some streams are no longer being maintained as marked refuge areas, some streams are no longer stocked with trout and some streams are simply not being well utilized by anglers. These conditions are inconsistent with the premise for the use of refuge areas. Therefore, the Commission removed the refuge area designations from the sections of the following waters that have been so designated for the following reasons, consistent with its

In addition to the above indices, the Department of Banking maintains interpretive letters addressing the applicability of statutes and regulations administered by the Department of Banking to specific fact patterns. The Department may provide a summary of the Department's position on a particular issue or a redacted interpretive letter when appropriate in response to particular questions previously addressed by the Department, in order to assist the public and members of the lending industry in complying with laws administered by the Department. The Department of Banking will continue to issue interpretive letters on a case by case basis when appropriate regarding new issues raised by persons requesting such interpretive information.

BOARD OF PARDONS

Factors Considered by the Board of Pardons In Evaluating Pardon/Commutation Requests

Many individuals call, write or email the Board of Pardons seeking information about what factors the

Board deems most important in considering pardon/commutation requests. Some wish to use this information to help them decide whether to apply for clemency. Others seek the information to assist them in completing their applications after they have decided to apply.

Neither the Pennsylvania Constitution nor the laws or regulations governing the Board establish minimum eligibility requirements in order to apply for executive clemency. Also, the law does not establish a specific list of factors that the Board must consider in evaluating applications. As a result, each of the five Board members is free to rely upon the information that he/she feels is most important both in deciding to grant a public hearing and in deciding to recommend clemency to the Governor.

The Board believes that it will be helpful to clemency applicants and the public generally to provide a list of some of the factors that have been considered by the Board in the past in evaluating clemency applications. This list is by no means exclusive, and is not applied by every Board member in every case. Satisfaction of the criteria identified below does not entitle the applicant to clemency, nor does failure to satisfy the criteria automatically result in rejection of the application. Rather, the Board evaluates every application on a case-by-case basis to determine whether clemency is appropriate.

Factors Considered in Pardon Applications

- 1. How much time has elapsed since the commission of the crime(s)? Obviously, this factor, coupled with being crime free after the offense, is one of the best indicators of whether the applicant has been successfully rehabilitated. Further, the more serious, or numerous, the crime(s), the greater the period of successful rehabilitation that the applicant should be able to demonstrate.
- 2. Has the applicant complied with all court requirements? The applicant should be able to demonstrate successful completion of all court-imposed requirements such as probation, parole, and payment of all fines and costs. If unsure of the latter, applicants should check with the County Clerk of Courts, and get receipts for any recent payments.
- 3. Has the applicant made positive changes to his/her life since the offense(s)? Successful rehabilitation may also be demonstrated by positive changes since the offense(s) in applicant's career, education, family or through community or volunteer service, particularly in areas that relate to the offense(s).
- 4. What is the specific need for clemency? The applicant should identify a specific need for clemency, e.g., a particular job that applicant cannot get, or some particular activity that he/she cannot participate in without clemency, as opposed to the more general answers of "employment purposes" or "to put this behind me" that applicants frequently use.
- 5. What is the impact on the victim(s) of the offense(s)? The Board's regulations require that victims or next of kin be notified and given the opportunity to appear at the hearing or make a confidential submission in writing. Applicants should be aware that victims or next of kin may be present and, in any event, will have their viewpoint considered by the Board.

Factors Considered in Commutation of Sentence Applications

1. Does the applicant still have appeals pending in any court? The Board views clemency as an extraordinary remedy that should ordinarily be resorted to only after all legal remedies have been exhausted.

- 2. Is the applicant eligible for parole or will he/she be eligible within a reasonable period of time? In most cases, parole is the more appropriate avenue for release by applicants eligible for parole.
- 3. Has an appropriate period of incarceration been served based on the circumstances of the offense?
- 4. Has the applicant maintained an appropriate conduct record for consideration of clemency? The Board looks to the number of both serious and minor misconducts as a reliable indicator of the rehabilitation of the applicant.
- 5. Has the applicant had a successful work record and/or availed himself/herself of the programming opportunities for self-improvement that are available through the correctional facility? Again, the Board views these factors as reliable indicators of the rehabilitation of the applicant.
- 6. What is the impact on the victim(s) of the offense(s)? The Board's regulations require that victims or next of kin be notified and given the opportunity to appear at the hearing or make a confidential submission in writing. Applicants should be aware that victims or next of kin may be present and, in any event, will have their viewpoint considered by the Board.

Final Order

By the Commission:

In this order, the Commission revisits the issue of area code exhaust¹ and the implementation of relief to address such exhaust. On July 1, 2009, the North American Numbering Plan Administrator ("NANPA"), NeuStar, Inc. (Neustar), in its role as the neutral third party Numbering Plan Area ("NPA") Relief Planner for Pennsylvania,² acting on behalf of the Pennsylvania telecommunications industry ("industry") filed a petition with the Commission requesting approval of its plan for the 570 Numbering Plan Area ("NPA" or "area code"). The Commission, therefore, is faced with deciding which form of area code relief should be implemented for the 570 area code and when the new area code must be added.

Background

A. Creation of the 570 Area Code

Much of the information leading to the establishment and implementation of the 570 area code can be found in prior Commission orders. Essentially, on June 28, 1996, the telecommunications industry asked the Commission to decide how to relieve the shortage of numbering resources in the original 717 area code as the industry could not reach a consensus.³ Accordingly, the Commission opened a docket at P-00961071 that ultimately led to the creation of the 570 area code on May 21, 1998.⁴ The 570 NPA was a geographic split⁵ of the original 717 area code and was activated on April 8, 1999. The geographic area covered by the new 570 area code is comprised of 21 north-central counties and includes the cities of Williamsport, Wilkes-Barre, Hazelton, Scranton, and Stroudsburg.

B. Dismissal of the First 570 Relief Plan

Neustar projected that the 570 NPA would have a life of approximately six years before the numbering resources would exhaust. Nevertheless, on May 4, 2000, or approximately one year later, the Commission was notified that relief planning for the 570 NPA was necessary yet again. According to the NANPA, the projected exhaust date for the 570 area code was now the first quarter of 2002.6 Accordingly, a 570 NPA Relief Meeting was held on June 1, 2000, where the industry reached a consensus⁷ to implement an all-services distributed overlay for the 570 area code with implementation of this overlay to begin on October 2, 2000.

On July 19, 2000, NeuStar filed the petition with the Commission requesting approval of its relief plan to implement an overlay for the geographic area covered by the 570 NPA ("July 19th Petition"). After receipt of this petition, the Commission requested comments from interested parties on the July 19th Petition and scheduled public input hearings regarding what type of relief should be implemented in the 570 NPA and when this relief should be implemented.

During the course of its deliberations regarding the July 19th petition, the Commission had received from the Federal Communications Commission ("FCC") the authority to implement such number conservation measures as 1,000-block number pooling⁸ and NXX code reclamation⁹ in the 570 area code.¹⁰ Furthermore, the FCC had

The Commission implemented NXX code reclamation in the 570 NPA in August 2000, while mandatory 1,000-block pooling was implemented in February 2002. See Petition of Representative Keith R. McCall and Members of the Northeast Delegation of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives Requesting that Additional Authority be Delegated to the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission to Implement Additional Number Conservation Measures, CC Docket No. 99-200 and NSD-L-01-113 (Order released December 28, 2001). By order entered on August 9, 2001, at Docket No. M-00001427, the Commission, with the consensus of the industry, ordered the implementation of a voluntary pool in 570, which subsequently became mandatory at the direction of the FCC in the McCall Order.

mandated that all wireless carriers participate in pooling as of November 24, 2002.11 Thus, wireless carriers began participating in Pennsylvania's mandatory pools, including the pool in 570. As a result of the implementation of these various number conservation measures, the 570 area code experienced an unprecedented, efficient use its numbering resources, which, in turn, lengthened the life expectancy of the 570 area code.

In May of 2003, the NANPA, after taking into account the effects of the number conservation measures, revised the projected exhaust date for the 570 NPA to the third quarter of 2008. A relief plan may be withdrawn prior to its approval if it is determined that the NPA will not exhaust in the next five years. 12 Accordingly, by Order entered August 1, 2003, at P-00961071F002, the Commission concluded that the data on which the 570 relief plan had been filed was outdated and that the various number conservation measures that had been implemented had resulted in more numbers becoming available in the 570 area code. Consequently, the Commission determined that there was good cause to dismiss the July 19th Petition.

C. Current 570 Relief Plan

On March 30, 2009, the NANPA again notified the Industry and the Commission that it needed to meet to discuss relief alternatives for the 570 NPA. According to the April Number Resource Utilization Forecast ("NRUF") and NPA Exhaust Analysis April 24, 2009 Update ("2009 NRUF Report"),¹³ the 570 NPA was projected to exhaust all available NXX codes during the third quarter 2011. Further, the 570 NPA was declared to be in jeopardy on April 1, 2009.14

The Industry met via conference call May 27, 2009, to discuss various relief alternatives proposed by the NANPA. At this meeting, the NANPA proposed four relief alternatives to alleviate the situation in the 570 NPA. Two of the proposed relief alternatives were two-way geographic splits and the other two were all-services distributed overlays. The industry reached a consensus to recommend an all-services distributed overlay as the form of relief for the 570 NPA for several reasons.

On July 1, 2009, NeuStar filed a petition with the Commission requesting approval of this plan for the 570 Numbering Plan Area ("NPA" or "area code"). 15 According to the petition, the industry reached a consensus to implement an all services distributed overlay for the geographic area covered by the 570 NPA which would create a new area code to service the area. By an Order entered July 29, 2009, the Commission denied the industry's recommendation and requested written comments from interested parties on the four relief alternatives that had initially been presented by Neustar to the telecommunications industry. Thereafter, by an Order entered

December 23, 2009, the Commission scheduled five public input hearings in various cities located throughout the 570 NPA.¹⁶

The Commission has reviewed the written comments and the transcripts of public input hearings regarding which form of area code relief should be implemented upon exhaust of the 570 NPA and the timeframe for the implementation. The Commission would like to express its sincere thanks to those that submitted written comments in this proceeding and to those who attended and participated in the public input hearings and offered their concerns and suggestions regarding which form of area code relief the Commission should implement for the 570 area code. The Commission has taken all of this into consideration in resolving the question of area code relief for the 570 area code.

Discussion

When the supply of numbers available within an NPA, or area code, is estimated to exhaust, some form of area code relief must be implemented so that customers in that area can continue to obtain the services they desire from the carrier of their choice. Pursuant to Section 251(e) of the Act, 47 U.S.C. § 251(e), the FCC delegated authority to state commissions to direct the form of area code relief in such situations.

The FCC has adamantly maintained that state commissions cannot engage in number conservation measures to the exclusion of, or as a substitute for, timely area code relief.¹⁷ Therefore, when Pennsylvania's area codes are about to exhaust their supply of NXX codes, the Commission must implement timely area code relief, i.e., add a new area code. When faced with the need to implement new area codes, the Commission must decide two very important issues. First, the Commission must decide how to implement the new area code (i.e., a geographic split or an overlay). Second, the Commission must determine when the new area code needs to be implemented.

When confronted with resolving area code exhaust and implementing area code relief, state commissions generally have the ability to use four viable options to introduce a new area code. However, the two most common methods of introducing new area codes are the geographic split or an overlay. Both of these options have their advantages and drawbacks. We note that local calling areas do not change no matter which method of area code relief is implemented.

With a geographic split, the geographic area covered by the existing area code is split into two smaller sections. One of the sections retains the existing area code while the other geographic section receives the new area code, which causes residential customers and businesses in that section to have to change their telephone numbers. Nevertheless, local calling areas do not change and both sections retain the ability to use seven-digit dialing when making calls within each corresponding geographic area. Conversely, telephone calls between the two geographic areas, even if rated as "local" calls by the telephone company, cannot be completed without the use of ten-digit dialing.

The other option is an all-services overlay. An overlay area code "covers" the pre-existing area code, most often serving the identical geographic area. This option puts an end to further shrinking of the geographic size of the area

code. Additionally, all existing numbers in the overlaid geographic area are able to keep the old area code, and only new telephone lines are assigned the new area code if the old area code has run out of numbers. Consequently, a customer might have two different area codes for telephone lines serving his or her home or place of business. Furthermore, since with an overlay there are multiple area codes for the same geographic area, all calls, including local calls, require ten-digit dialing in order to be completed. In fact, per FCC mandate, states are required to impose ten-digit dialing for all calls, even if those calls are made within the same area code. This purportedly eliminates a dialing disparity between customers in the old area code and those in the new overlay area code.

The Commission prefers to implement the form of area code relief that is the least disruptive to the residential customers and businesses that reside within the 570 area code. The Commission notes that the industry reached a consensus to implement an all-services distributed overlay for the geographic area covered by the 570 NPA, which would create a new area code to service the area and require ten-digit dialing to complete all calls. Additionally, upon our review of the written comments received and the transcript from the various public input hearings, many agree with the industry's consensus recommendation to implement an all-services distributed overlay for the geographic area covered by the 570 NPA.

We agree with the industry's recommendation and the sentiments of the majority of the commenters. We believe that the geographic size of the 570 area code lends itself to the imposition of an overlay. On the other hand, implementing a geographic split would create smaller and smaller geographic sections that result in arbitrary regions that make no geographic sense at all. A geographic split can divide communities of interest, such as neighborhoods, school districts and municipalities. Thus, the area code loses its meaning because there are too many areas and too many codes.

Furthermore, we believe that the imposition of an overlay would be the least disruptive to the customers and, more importantly, the businesses that reside within the 570 area code. With a geographic split, individuals and businesses in the area that changes or receives the new area code would have to re-print stationery and signs, write letters and send e-mails announcing the change of their phone number, or risk having their incoming calls misdirected. Additionally, the persons who call the affected numbers typically have to call twice and then update their paper and computer records. For these reasons, we will direct Neustar to implement an all-service distributed overlay for the 570 area code.

Next, we must determine the implementation timeline for the overlay of the 570 area code. In the instant petition, the industry initially requested thirteen months for full implementation of the new NPA for the 570 area code. Specifically, the industry recommended the following implementation schedule:

The FCC has noted that state commissions are uniquely positioned "to ascertain and weigh the very local and granular information inherent in area code relief decision making." ¹⁸ Additionally, FCC regulations at 47 CFR 52.19(a) state that "state commissions may resolve matters involving the introduction of new area codes within their states, which includes establishing the necessary dates for the implementation of relief plans."

The Commission notes that the 570 area code is projected to exhaust its remaining supply of NXX codes by the third quarter 2011, or approximately July 1, 2011. We acknowledge that we can no longer accommodate the industry's initial request of thirteen months due to the timing of this decision. Nevertheless, the Commission believes that the time line for the implementation of the new area code in the 570 geographical region did not necessarily have to be a length of thirteen months and could be shortened. The Commission's past experience with area code overlays is that they have been fully implemented within as little as 6 months. Therefore, having temporarily delayed the proposed implementation schedule to request input from the public has not compromised the ability of area code relief to be implemented in the 570 NPA on a timely basis nor adversely impact consumers.

We will revise the implementation schedule proposed by the telecommunications industry accordingly. We will direct that all network preparation for the implementation of the new overlay be completed within 8 months or no later than March 1, 2011, at 12:01a.m (EST). We believe that this timeframe is sufficient for telecommunications carriers to prepare their individual networks for the overlay area code.

While a state commission may not utilize numbering optimization measures in lieu of implementing timely area code relief, it may minimize the consumer impact of traditional area code relief by not implementing new area codes sooner than necessary. Even the FCC has noted that the implementation of new area codes before they are necessary forces consumers to go through the expense, trouble and dislocation of changing telephone numbers or dialing patterns earlier or more often than necessary. ¹⁹

In view of the well-documented disruption to customers caused by changes in their area code, it is in the public interest to assure that new area codes are opened only when it is necessary, and only after the existing number resources in the existing area code are close to exhaustion. The mere fact that we are implementing timely area code relief does not mean we should not be diligent in ensuring that the remaining NXX codes in the existing area code are properly allocated or allow the premature exhaust of the existing area code. Thus, we direct Neustar to continue the rationing of two codes per month

for the 570 area code per the Jeopardy Procedures that were previously established. 20 This rationing will continue until exhaust of the 570 area code.

Moreover, the FCC recently granted the Commission additional delegated authority to implement mandatory number pooling throughout each and every rate center within the 570 area code. We believe that the implementation of mandatory pooling throughout all rate centers within the 570 area code will eventually add to the number of NXX codes available for assignment in this NPA. Consequently, we direct that Neustar not activate the new NPA or assign any NXX or central office codes from the new overlay until three months to NXX code exhaust in the 570 area code. The NANPA will comply with this directive until this threshold has been met and will continue to honor code requests for NXXs in the existing NPA in accordance with the aforementioned jeopardy procedures for as long as resources are available.

Additionally, as we directed Neustar to do for us with the proposed 445 and 835 NPAs, NANPA will provide the Commission with monthly updates on the projected exhaust date of the 570 NPA so that the Commission can ensure that no NXX code holders in Pennsylvania will be without adequate numbering resources to meet customer demand. The Commission will inform all NXX code holders in Pennsylvania when the 570 NPA is three months away from exhaust.

When introducing a new area code, there is an adjustment period commonly known as a permissive dialing period. During the permissive dialing period, customers may reach numbers in the area that is to be overlaid by either dialing the area code plus the number or the old

way by using the seven-digit number. During the permissive period, customers are encouraged to make calls using ten-digits. At the end of the permissive period, the mandatory dialing period commences and all calls must be made using the area code plus the seven-digit number. If only the seven-digit number is dialed at this time, the customer will reach a recorded announcement stating they must hang up and redial the number using the area code plus the seven-digit number. This recording will be available permanently. Once the 'three months to exhaust' threshold mentioned above has been reached, the permissive dialing period will begin and the telecommunications industry can start customer education programs for the new NPA, including the fact that when the new overlay area code is finally activated the FCC requires that all calls be made dialing ten digits, dialing the area code and the seven-digit number.

During the public input hearings, some commenters expressed reservations regarding the introduction of tendigit dialing in the 570 area code. In fact, we understand that this was a primary motive of some who commented that the Commission implement a geographic split. As noted above, the implementation of an overlay requires the adoption of ten-digit dialing for all calls within and between the 570 NPA and the new NPA. However, we acknowledge that ten-digit dialing has become more prevalent nationwide and overlays, with ten-digit dialing, have been implemented in southeastern and western Pennsylvania. Nonetheless, if our conservation measures prove to be effective then possibly the activation of the new area code could be delayed indefinitely and ten-digit dialing would have been unnecessarily imposed upon the residents and businesses that are located in the 570 area code. Accordingly, we determine that the requirement of mandatory ten-digit dialing be suspended for the new overlay NPA until the actual assignment of an NXX code from the new overlay NPA.

With the assignment of an NXX code from the new overlay NPA, the dialing plan will be as follows:

Conclusion

We encourage the industry and NANPA to work together with the Commission to ensure that new area codes are not unnecessarily opened in the Commonwealth when other viable alternatives are available. Nevertheless, the policy of the Commission is to ensure that numbering resources are made available on an equitable, efficient and timely basis in Pennsylvania; *Therefore*,

carriers, including nonpooling carriers, will have nondiscriminatory access to numbers when needed to meet customer demand.

- 6. All NXX code holders in Pennsylvania shall not commence their customer education program for the new overlay code until the Commission informs them that the 570 area code will exhaust within 3 months.

Sheila V. Wells, t/d/b/a Broadway Auto Sales, of Red Lion, York County, was revoked and assessed a civil penalty of \$10,000 based upon criminal convictions for felony crimes of moral turpitude.

This adjudication and final order represents the State Board of Vehicle Manufacturers, Dealers and Salespersons's (Board) final decision in this matter. It may be appealed to the Commonwealth Court of Pennsylvania by the filing of a petition for review with that court in accordance with the Pennsylvania Rules of Appellate Procedure. Individuals who take an appeal to the Commonwealth Court, must serve the Board with a copy of their petition for review.
