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

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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva-nia Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 et seq. Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

 - II. Rule 3286 is rescinded.

TITLE 231. RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURES PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 3000. JUDGMENTS

Subchapter E. ENFORCEMENT OF JUDGMENTS IN SPECIAL ACTIONS

DEFICIENCY JUDGMENTS
GENERAL PROVISIONS

Rule 3277. Definitions.

As used in this chapter,

["judgment" means any judgment which is subject to the provisions of Section 8103 of the Judicial Code and includes a judgment de terris, a judgment in rem and a judgment in personam.

Official Note: The inclusion of judgments de terris, in rem, and in personam is intended to implement Section 8103(a) of the Deficiency Judgment Law which provides that the "petition shall be filed as a supplementary proceeding in the matter in which the judgment was entered." This changes the practice under prior case law which did not permit the filing of the proceeding supplementary to a matter in which the judgment obtained was not in personam.

The bringing of a deficiency judgment proceeding supplementary to an action in rem or de terris such as mortgage foreclosure does not change the character of the action as in rem or de terris. See Rule 3286.

"judgment creditor" means the holder of a judgment as defined by this rule;]

- (1) "prior lien amounts" means the amounts of any prior liens, costs, taxes and municipal claims not discharged by the sale, and the amounts of any such items paid at distribution on the sale[.];
- (2) "special allocations" means the special allocations required by Section 8103(f) of the Judicial Code;

Official Note: Section 8103(f) of the Judicial Code provides for certain special allocations when judgment has been entered with respect to a partial recourse obligation or an obligation of which only a portion is guaranteed.

(3) the following words shall have the meanings set forth in Section 8103(g) of the Judicial Code: "judgment," "judgment creditor," and "nonconsumer judgment creditor."

Official Note: Section 8103(g) of the Judicial Code contains several definitions relating to deficiency judgments. The words set forth in paragraph (3) are common to both the rules and the Code.

"Judgment" is defined by Section 8103(g) as "[t]he judgment which was enforced by the execution proceedings referred to in subsection (a), whether that judgment is a judgment in personam such as a judgment requiring the payment of money or a judgment de terris or in rem such as a judgment entered in an action of mortgage foreclosure or a judgment entered in an action or proceeding upon a mechanic's lien, a municipal claim, a tax lien or a charge on land."

"Judgment creditor" is defined by Section 8103(g) as "[t]he holder of the judgment which was enforced by the execution proceedings."

"Nonconsumer judgment creditor" is defined by Section 8103(g) as "[a]ny judgment creditor except a judgment creditor whose judgment was entered with respect to a consumer credit transaction."

PROCEEDINGS UNDER SECTION 8103(A) TO FIX FAIR MARKET VALUE OF REAL PROPERTY SOLD Rule 3282. Petition. Averments. Notice to Defend.

(a) The petition shall set forth:

* * * * *

(5) the date [that] the property was [sold by the sheriff] struck down to the successful bidder and the date [that] the sheriff's deed was [executed and acknowledged] delivered,

* * * * *

(8) a description of all prior lien amounts if the petitioner desires credit for such amounts, [and]

Official Note: For the definition of prior lien amounts, see Rule 3277.

- (9) if the petition requests a special allocation, a statement that the judgment creditor is a nonconsumer judgment creditor;
- (10) any special allocation required by Section 8103(f) of the Judicial Code, and
- [(9)] (11) a request that the court fix the fair market value of the real property at the value set forth in the petition and that the court determine any prior lien amounts and any special allocation as set forth in the petition.

Rule 3284. Order Upon Default or Admission.

The court shall, without further notice or hearing, enter an order determining the fair market value of the real property to be the value alleged in the petition, [and] determining the prior lien amounts to be in the amounts alleged in the petition and making any special allocation requested by the petition if

* * * * *

(2) an answer is filed which does not deny the allegations in the petition as to the fair market value, [or] the prior lien amounts or any special allocation.

Rule 3285. Trial.

If an answer is filed which denies the allegations in the petition as to the fair market value, [or] the prior lien amounts or the entitlement of the petitioner to any special allocation, the trial shall be limited to such of those [two] issues as are raised by the answer, which shall be heard by a judge sitting without a jury in accordance with Rule 1038.

* * * * *

Rule 3286. Order. Effect.

[(a) The order of the court, whether upon default, admission or after trial, determining the fair market value of the real property and of the prior lien amounts shall release the respondents named and served to the extent of the fair market value so determined less the prior lien amounts.

Official Note: Section 8103(c)(2) of the Judicial Code provides for a decree to be entered "directing the judgment creditor to file release of the debtors, obligors, guarantors or any other persons directly or indirectly liable for the debts, to the extent of the fair value so fixed."

(b) No order entered in a proceeding pursuant to these rules shall determine or be deemed to have determined whether any respondent is personally liable to the petitioner.

Rescinded.

Explanatory Comment

These amendments to the rules of civil procedure governing deficiency judgments are prompted by the passage of Act No. 144 of 1998 which amended provisions of the Judicial Code relating to the Statute of Limitations, 42 Pa.C.S. § 5522(b)(2), and the Deficiency Judgment Act, 42 Pa.C.S. § 8103.

Statute of Limitations

Section 5522(b)(2) of the Judicial Code provides that a petition for the establishment of a deficiency judgment must be commenced within six-months. Act No. 144 of 1998 revised the language specifying the date from which the six month period is calculated. Prior to amendment, the section used the language that the period commenced "following sale of the collateral of the debtor under the provisions of section 8103 (relating to deficiency judgments)." Act No. 144 deleted the words "sale of the collateral of the debtor under" and revised the provision to read:

(b) *Commencement of action required.*—The following actions and proceedings must be commenced within six months

* * * * *

(2) A petition for the establishment of a deficiency judgment following execution and delivery of the sheriff's deed for the property sold in connection with the execution proceedings referenced in the provisions of section 8103 (relating to deficiency judgments).

* * * * *

Prior to the present amendment, Rule 3282(a)(5) required the petition to fix the fair market value under the Code to set forth "the date that the property was sold by the sheriff and the date that the sheriff's deed was executed and acknowledged". In light of the revision to the Judicial Code, the rule is revised to require the petition to set forth:

(5) the date the property was struck down to the successful bidder and the date the sheriff's deed was delivered.

Deficiency Judgment Act

Definitions

The Deficiency Judgment Act contained no provision defining terms until Act No. 144 of 1998 amended Section 8103 of the Judicial Code by adding new subsection (g). However, the rules of civil procedure governing deficiency judgments did contain Rule 3277 defining three terms: judgment, judgment creditor and prior lien amounts.

New Section 8103(g) includes definitions of the terms "judgment" and "judgment creditor" which are substantially identical to the definitions of those terms formerly found in Pa.R.C.P. 3277. The definitions of those terms in Rule 3277 are deleted by the present amendments and the duplication of definitions thus eliminated. The statutory definitions have been incorporated into the rules by Rule 3277(3).

The definition of the term "prior lien amounts" found in Rule 3277 remains unchanged.

At the same time, Act No. 144 introduced the concept of "special allocations" into the Deficiency Judgment Act. To alert the bench and bar to this concept, a definition has been added to Rule 3277:

(2) "special allocations" means the special allocations required by Section 8103(f) of the Judicial Code.

Section 8103(g) of the Code defines terms relating to special allocations including "nonconsumer judgment creditor". That term is used in Rule 3282(a)(9) and the statutory definition is incorporated by reference in Rule 3277(3).

Special Allocations

Act No. 144 also amended Section 8103 by adding new subsection (f) entitled "Certain special allocations" which is specific in its application. The subsection applies only if the judgment creditor is a nonconsumer judgment creditor. Further, it applies to two particular types of obligations: a partial recourse obligation and an obligation of which only a portion is guaranteed. The term "partial recourse obligation" is defined by Section 8103(g) the Code as "[a]n obligation which includes both a nonrecourse portion and a recourse portion."

Rule 3282(a) has been revised to accommodate the new provisions of Section 8103(f). The text of paragraph (9) has been transferred to new paragraph (11) with the addition of a reference to "any special allocation." New text has been added to paragraph (9) and new paragraph (10) has been added to provide that, if a special allocation is requested, the petition contain averments that the judgment creditor is a nonconsumer judgment creditor and that a special allocation is required by Section 8103(f) of the Code.

Rule 3284 governing the order to be entered upon default or admission and Rule 3285 governing the trial if an answer denies the allegations of the petition are also amended to accommodate the new Code provision requiring "certain special allocations".

Order and Its Effect

Rule 3286 governing the order of the court and its effect has been rescinded. Subdivision (a) relating to the effect of the order determining the fair market value of the real property was based upon language in Section 8103(c)(2) of the Deficiency Judgment Act which has been deleted by Act No. 144. Subdivision (b) relating to the order as affecting personal liability of the respondent is no longer necessary in view of the Act as amended.

Addendum to Administrative Order No. C.A.D. 5 May 1996; Consolidation of Cases for Purposes of a Plea of Guilty or Nolo Contendere; Administrative Order No. C.A.D. 3, 2001

Order

And Now, to-wit, this 1st day of August, 2001, it is hereby *Ordered* that Administrative Order No. C.A.D. 5 May 1996 is hereby amended as follows:

- C. Consolidation of Cases for the Purpose of an Expedited Plea Disposition
- 1. When a defendant is tendered and accepts an expedited plea offer, which encompasses pending criminal cases previously assigned to a judge, then the following procedure shall be observed to effectuate consolidation for the purpose of entering the negotiated plea(s).
- 2. An expedited plea is defined as a tendered and accepted plea offer, which occurs at the time of a defendant's preliminary hearing. When such a defendant also has pending criminal case(s) assigned to a judge and the Commonwealth's plea offer regarding said criminal case(s) (is) (are) accepted, then for the purpose of judicial economy said criminal case(s) shall be consolidated and transferred to the presiding PDQ judge for the entry of a negotiated guilty plea for all such pending criminal matters. The plea shall be entered on a regular assigned PDQ hearing date.
- 3. The consolidation petition shall contain a copy of the negotiated plea terms and shall possess signatures of the Commonwealth and the defendant.

4. If, after the granting of a petition to consolidate, the defendant fails to plead as set forth in the petition, each information shall be promptly scheduled for trial before the judge originally assigned to the case. Furthermore, the PDQ designated case shall be assigned as per the normal course of judge assignment procedure.

ACCELERATED REHABILITATIVE DISPOSITION

What is ARD?

ARD is a ONE-TIME alternative to trial, conviction, and the mandatory jail sentence.

Upon application and completion of a probation period, which is established at a minimum of one year by the Court, the criminal charges are dismissed.

Who Qualifies for ARD?

You may be eligible for ARD if you meet the following required standards for the program:

- 1. You have no prior DUI offenses.
- 2. NO serious injury, if an accident was involved.
- 3. Good Driving Record—An absence of excessive moving violations.
 - 4. No extensive prior criminal history.
- 5. If applicant pleads guilty to any summary offense, he/she must sign a Waiver of Double Jeopardy Rights.

How Do I Get Into the ARD Program?

- 1. You must complete the application for the ARD program and send or bring it with you to the Preliminary Hearing at the District Justice's Office. Upon approval of the application, the matter is referred to the ARD Program Director for investigation. You will receive a notice to appear for an appointment with the ARD Director.
- 2. The District Justice's secretary will call and obtain an appointment for a CRN evaluation at the Carbon-Monroe-Pike Drug and Alcohol Office, First Street, Lehighton, Pennsylvania. If the ARD applicant is found to meet all of the criteria for qualification which have been established by the ARD/DUI Program, the applicant may then be recommended by the District Attorney to the Court for placement into the ARD Program and will receive notice to appear for an ARD Hearing.

What Does Placement into the Standard ARD Program Require You to Do?

- 1. Serve ONE YEAR probationary period.
- 2. SIX-MONTH SUSPENSION of driving privileges.
- 3. ATTENDANCE AND COMPLETION of an ALCO-HOL SAFE DRIVING PROGRAM at the Carbon-Monroe-Pike Drug and Alcohol Office.
- 4. COMPLETE a counseling program, if deemed necessary, and pay for same.
- 6. COMPLIANCE with such rules and regulations as may be set forth by the Carbon County Courts and DUI Program.

NO JAIL TERM, IF ACCEPTED FOR ACCELERATED REHABILITATIVE DISPOSITION AND IT IS COMPLETED SATISFACTORILY.

Fast Track Accelerated Rehabilitative Disposition

What Is Fast Track ARD?

Like ARD, FAST TRACK is a ONE-TIME alternative to trial, conviction and mandatory jail sentencing.

Unlike Standard ARD, FAST TRACK ARD offers an incentive program for you to have your case handled in an accelerated manner.

Are There any Additional Requirements for Fast Track ARD?

Yes. There are additional requirements for you to become a candidate for FAST TRACK ARD.

You Must:

- 1. Complete the enclosed application and have it not arized.
- 2. SIGN an ARD written Waiver of your Preliminary Hearing and Arraignment.

FAILURE TO ATTEND ANY APPOINTMENTS OR SCHEDULED COURT APPEARANCES WILL RESULT IN DENYING YOUR ACCEPTANCE IN FAST TRACK

What Does Placement into the ARD Fast Track Program Involve?

- 1. ONE YEAR probationary period.
- 2. TWO-MONTH SUSPENSION of your operating privileges on the day of placement on the FAST TRACK ARD PROGRAM if you have a valid Pennsylvania license.
- 3. ATTENDANCE AND COMPLETION of an ALCOHOL SAFE DRIVING PROGRAM at the Carbon-Monroe-Pike Drug and Alcohol Office.
- 4. COMPLETION of a counseling program, if deemed necessary, and payment for same.
- 5. COMPLIANCE with such rules and regulations as may be set forth by the Carbon County Courts and the DUI Program.
- 7. PAY ALL the FAST TRACK ARD program costs as may be set from time to time by Administrative Order.

NO JAIL TERM, IF ACCEPTED, FOR THE FAST TRACK ACCELERATED REHABILITATIVE DISPOSITION AND THE PROGRAM IS COMPLETED SATISFACTORILY.

DAUPHIN COUNTY

Promulgation of Dauph.R.Crim.P. 573; No. 461 M.D. 2001

Order

And Now, this 7th day of August, 2001, Dauphin County Local Rule of Criminal Procedure 573 is promulgated as follows:

Discovery in Child Abuse/Assault Cases

Pursuant to the Juvenile Act, 42 Pa.C.S. § 6307, and the Child Protective Services Law, 23 Pa.C.S. § 6840, any

party to litigation seeking discovery of confidential reports and records of Dauphin County Social Services for Children and Youth (Child Protective Service Agency) shall file a petition for a Show Cause Order stating with particularity the scope, necessity and authority for the discovery sought.

The petition and rule shall be served on any adverse party, on the Dauphin County Children and Youth Agency, and on the guardian ad litem (if any) for the child.

Any objection must identify that portion of the reports or records sought to be withheld and state with particularity any privilege asserted thereto.

Thereafter, the court shall either a) schedule a hearing on the motion; or b) schedule an in-camera conference; or c) issue an order based on the averments in the motion and in any response filed thereto.

Comments:

Nothing in this rule shall preclude a party from filing a motion for a protective order.

Certain privileges are absolute and are not overcome by a defendant's Sixth Amendment right to cross-examine a witness or to due process of law. Examples of the foregoing are:

- Domestic Violence Advocate/Counselor
 23 Pa.C.S. § 6116; V.B.T. v. Family Services of Western
 Pa., 705 A.2d 1325 (Pa. Super. 1998).
- Sexual Assault Counselor Privilege
 42 Pa.C.S. § 5945; Commonwealth v. Wilson,
 602 A.2d 1290 (Pa. 1992).
- Psychotherapist Privilege
 42 Pa.C.S. § 5944; Commonwealth v. Counterman,
 719 A.2d 284 (Pa. 1998).

This amendment shall be effective 30 days after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Lehigh County Rule 1940.3

- (a) Upon commencement of an action for custody, partial custody or visitation of minor children, or the filing of a petition seeking modification of an existing order for same, or the filing of a request for a custody mediation or conference in a divorce action containing a count for same, the case will be scheduled for a mediation orientation session unless:
- (1) The case meets the domestic violence or child abuse standard of Pa. R.C.P. No. 1940.3(b), in which event an affidavit in appropriate form shall be filed with the child custody office; or
- (2) The assigned judge or, if none, the family court motions judge, upon good cause shown, grants a petition to bypass the requirement to attend the mediation orientation session. Notwithstanding the foregoing, cases not assigned to a judge may be exempted from the mediation orientation session if the administrative judge of the civil/family division, upon recommendation of the custody conference/hearing officer, determines that the history of the case or the parties' circumstances render the case unsuitable for mediation.
- (b) Cases that are not scheduled for mediation orientation sessions in accordance with the foregoing shall be scheduled for conference or hearing before the custody conference/hearing officer.
- (c) Any request to continue a scheduled mediation or conference shall be presented to the custody conference/hearing officer. Any party aggrieved by such officer's decision may appeal to the assigned judge or, if none, to the family court motions judge.
- (d) All cases referred to mediation by the child custody office or by the court shall be scheduled for an initial orientation session that, with the parties' agreement, may be immediately followed by a mediation session. This initial mediation orientation session shall be scheduled for one to one and one-half hours. Upon agreement of the parties, additional mediation sessions may be scheduled. The parties' attorneys shall not attend the orientation or any mediation sessions.
- (e) A copy of the mediation orientation scheduling notice and/or the custody conference scheduling notice must be served upon the responding party at least ten (10) working days prior to the date of the scheduled mediation orientation session or the custody conference.

Rule WC300. Accelerated Rehabilitative Disposition in Summary Cases.

- (a) The District Attorney of Westmoreland County has filed a certification, and has elected that ARD in summary cases proceed before the Minor Judiciary pursuant to Pa.R.Crim.P. 300 and 301. The following summary charges are certified eligible for Summary A.R.D.
 - (1) Retail theft. 18 Pa.C.S.A. § 3929(a), (b)(1)(i).
- (2) Purchase, consumption, possession or transportation of intoxicating beverages by one less than 21 year of age. 18 Pa.C.S.A. § 6308.
- (3) Misrepresentation of age to secure liquor or malt or brewed beverages by one less than 21 years of age. 18 Pa.C.S.A. § 6307.
- (4) Carrying a false identification card. 18 Pa.C.S.A. § 6310.3
- (b) Admission shall be requested within ten (10) days of receipt of the citation or summons. The District Justice for good cause may grant extensions of the application period. The District Justice shall determine eligibility for summary A.R.D. within seventy-two (72) hours of the submission of the application.
- (c) No defendant who has previously been placed in an A.R.D. program in any court shall be admitted to A.R.D. in a summary matter.
- (d) Prior to placing a defendant in the Summary A.R.D. Program, the District Justice shall determine that the

defendant has not previously been placed in A.R.D. in a summary matter in this judicial district by contacting the Court Administrator.

(e) A defendant who applies for A.R.D. in a summary matter shall execute the following:

AFFIDAVIT

I have not previously been placed in an A.R.D. program in any court at either the Common Pleas or District Justice level. I make this statement subject to the penalties of 18 Pa.C.S.A. 4904, relating to unsworn falsification to authorities.

- (f) Costs of supervision and restitution must be paid in full before admission to the Summary A.R.D. program. These costs include court costs incident to a non-traffic summary offense and any costs incident to the program to which the defendant is referred.
- (g) The defendant shall be notified in writing of acceptance or rejection from A.R.D.
- (1) If accepted, the defendant shall appear at a time designated by the District Justice to complete all program documentation.
- (2) If rejected, the District Justice shall notify the defendant that he/she has ten days to enter a plea and that the case will proceed under Chapter 4 of the Pennsylvania Rules of Criminal Procedure.
- (h) The District Justice shall schedule and notify the defendant at the time of admission to A.R.D. of a hearing date to determine if all A.R.D. requirements have been met. The hearing shall be held within ninety days of the entry into A.R.D. Requests for continuance of said hearing shall be denied, except in compelling circumstances. No continuance shall be for more than seven days.
- (i) A defendant accepted into A.R.D. for retail theft shall be referred to the Allegheny Institute's Retail Theft Alternative Program. A defendant accepted for the alcohol-related offenses shall be referred to the Comprehensive Substance Abuse Services' Underage Drinking Program. Successful completion of the program shall be required.
- (j) The following are the reporting and record keeping requirements under this Rule:
- (1) The district Justice shall make every effort to assure that the defendant has not previously participated in the Summary ARD program.
- (2) Each District Justice shall file a report on a monthly basis setting forth the disposition and completion or non-completion of all program requirements with the Court Administrator. If a defendant eligible for A.R.D. is not admitted, the District Justice shall include the reasons therefore in the report.
- (k) Upon successful completion of all requirements, the defendant's case shall be dismissed and the defendant discharged.
- (l) If the defendant declines A.R.D. or fails to successfully complete the program, the case shall proceed in accord with Chapter 50 of the Pennsylvania Rules of Criminal Procedure.
- (m) No summary case shall remain "active" for purposes of A.R.D. supervision in excess of ninety days.

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(n) The following shall be displayed in each District Justice office:

NOTICE TO THOSE CHARGED WITH SUMMARY RETAIL THEFT OF UNDERAGE ALCOHOL-RELATED OFFENSES

You may be eligible to participate in a program (A.R.D.) which will result in dismissal of the charge against you. The A.R.D. program is available for defendants who have not previously been placed into an A.R.D. program. You must pay all costs and restitution before admission to the A.R.D. program. You will be required to attend a counseling program for up to ninety (90) days. If you successfully complete the program, the charge against you will be dismissed. If you want to apply for the A.R.D. program, notify the District Justice immediately.

- It Is Ordered that this Administrative Order shall be effective thirty (30) days after the publication thereof in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and shall govern all matters then pending.
- It Is Further Ordered that in accordance with Pa.R.Crim.P. 105 (C), the District Court Administrator shall:
- (a) furnish seven (7) certified copies hereto with the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts
- (b) distribute two (2) certified copies hereof with the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*;

- (c) file one (1) certified copy hereof with the Criminal Procedure Rules Committee;
- (d) cause to be printed an adequate supply of the Rules hereby adopted and promulgated for distribution to the Judges and the Members of the Bar of this Court, and for sale at cost to any other interested parties, such printing to be done at the expense of the County of York in accordance with the provisions of the Act of July 9, 1976, P. L. 586, Sec. 2, 42 Pa.C.S.A. § 3722.

CHAPTER 1—GENERAL PROVISIONS

Rule 102—Citation and Application:

- (A) These Rules may be cited and referred to as "York Rules of Criminal Procedure", or abbreviated as "York R.Crim.P."
- (B) These Rules shall apply to all proceedings of a criminal nature, including summary proceedings and court cases, pending before the Court of Common Pleas of York County.

(Effective ______, 2001/Former Rule 1)

Rule 103—Definitions:

- (A) Unless otherwise indicated, reference to "Judge" shall mean the Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of York County to whom the case is assigned, or in his absence, any other Judge of the Court.
- (B) Unless otherwise indicated, reference to the "District Attorney" shall also mean an assistant district attorney, deputy district attorney or prosecutor, assistant attorney general, or other special attorney assigned to prosecute a case.
- (C) In the cases where a defendant proceeds pro se, reference to a defendant's attorney shall mean the defendant.
- (D) The singular shall include the plural, and the plural the singular. Words used in their masculine gender shall include the feminine and neuter. Words used in the past or present tense shall include the future.

(Effective _______, 2001/Formerly Rule 3)

Part A—Business of the Court

Rule 111—Release of Information:

All Court House personnel, including, among others, Sheriffs, Sheriff's deputies, court clerks, law clerks, tipstaves, court reporters, secretaries and other support staff, are prohibited from disclosing any information relating to a pending criminal case that is not part of the public record of the case, unless authorized by the Court. This rule also precludes disclosure of any information whether acquired at a formal or informal judicial proceeding.

(Effective _______, 2001/Formerly Rule 20) Rule 111.1—Restriction on Removal of Records and Files:

- (A) No file containing original documents, nor any original documents contained therein, may be removed from the Office of the Clerk of Courts, except by special order of the Court, by anyone other than the following:
- (1) A Judge of the Court or his authorized representative;

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- (2) The District Court Administrator;
- (3) The Clerk of Courts and regularly employed and duly authorized employees of that office.
- (B) Every person authorized to remove a file or document shall, at the time of removal, give to the Clerk of Courts a written receipt for same, identifying the person by whom, or in whose behalf, the same is removed, and such person shall be personally responsible for the custody and return of the [same] file or document.

(Effective ______, 2001/Formerly Rule 20.1)

Part C—Venue, Location, and Recording of Proceeding Before Issuing Authority

Rule 135—Transmittal of Records to the District Attorney:

Upon receipt and filing of the records from District Justices, the Clerk of Courts shall forthwith cause to be made a copy of each complaint, citation, transcript, and other documents relevant and material to the cause of action, and shall forthwith transmit copies to the District Attorney, and, if an appeal is taken from a violation of a municipal ordinance, then also to the solicitor of the municipality or municipal agency involved.

(Effective ______, 2001/Formerly Rule 20.2)

Chapter 4—Procedure in Summary Cases

Part F—Procedures in Summary Cases for Appealing to Court of Common Please for a Trial De Novo

Rule 461—Appeal as Supersedeas:

An appeal filed with the Clerk of Courts shall operate as a supersedeas to the sentence imposed by the District Justice.

(Effective ______, 2001/Formerly Rule 86)

Rule 462—Pre-Trial Summary Motions:

- (A) The Court shall hear and dispose of all pre-trial motions directly prior to the summary appeal trial.
- (B) Only motions to dismiss a case for technical defects that are evident from an inspection of the record, or motions upon a stipulated set of facts may be considered prior to the summary appeal trial.
- (C) The motions shall be made, in writing, and filed with the Clerk of Courts at least five (5) days prior to the date set for trial. The motions shall contain a specific averment of the defect, with reference to the record and a citation to any authorities relied upon. A brief need not accompany any motion.
- (D) A copy of all motions shall be forthwith served upon the District Attorney, or if applicable, the opposing attorney or to the solicitor of the municipality or municipal agency involved. An answer is not required.
- (E) No case will be continued unless application, by motion or on a form approved by the Court, is made to the Court at the time set for the summary appeal trial, except for cause arising subsequent to that date.

(Effective ______, 2001/Formerly Rule 88)

Chapter 5—Pretrial Procedures in Court Cases

Part C(1)—Release Procedures

Rule 526—Notification to Bondsmen:

(A) During the period of time that any defendant shall be released from custody by the posting of bail, notices of the requirement of the defendant's appearance before the Court, pursuant to the terms and conditions of said bail, shall be given by the District Attorney and/or Clerk of Courts, both to the defendant and to his surety. Such notice shall be sufficient if the same shall be placed in the mail, post-paid, ordinary mail, and addressed to the address given in the bail document for the defendant and the surety, unless a newer address is provided.

(Effective ______, 2001/Formerly Rule 4016)

Part C(2)—General Procedures in All Bail Cases

Rule 531—Supervision of Bondsmen:

(A) Subject to the approval of the Court, the District Attorney shall supervise the professional bondsmen. A list of all duly licensed bondsmen shall be maintained by the District Attorney, who shall provide copies to the District Justices. The District Attorney may promulgate such regulations as are deemed reasonably necessary to insure that the bondsmen are financially responsible and able to meet all bail bonding requirements.

(Effective _______, 2001/Formerly Rule 4007)

Part F—Procedures Following Filing of Information

Rule 570—Pre-Trial Conference

- (A) Notice of Judge assignment and a pre-trial conference date shall be handed to defendant or defense counsel at arraignment. Notice may be mailed in the case of a written waiver of formal arraignment.
- (B) Defendant and defense counsel shall attend a pretrial status conference with the intention of discussing the disposition of the case with the Judge and the assigned District Attorney.

(Effective ______, 2001/Formerly Rule 311)

Rule 571—Arraignments:

- (A) Arraignments shall be conducted at such time and place as shall be determined by Order of Court. The Court shall provide notice of such times and places with as much advance notice as is practical, to allow adequate notice of arraignment to be given to the defendant.
- (B) Unless otherwise provided, a defendant may waive, in writing, formal arraignment by the Court, provided, however, that:
- (1) The defendant shall be advised of the charges against him and shall receive a copy of any information filed against him.
- (2) The defendant shall be advised, in writing, of the following rights:
- (a) The right to pre-trial discovery and to file pre-trial motions, and the time periods to initiate pre-trial discovery and requests for particulars, and the time within which to file pre-trial motions;
- (b) The earliest date that the case could be called for trial;
- (c) That the defendant is entering a plea of not guilty and requesting a trial by jury.
- (C) A waiver of formal arraignment can be made by a defendant without appearing in court provided:
- (1) The waiver is in writing, on a form prescribed by the District Attorney which contains the disclosures set forth in subsection (B)(2) of this rule, and which is signed by the defendants; and
- (2) The waiver is accompanied by a written entry of appearance by counsel for the defendant; and

- (3) The waiver form and appearance form specifically identify the case to which the waiver and appearance apply, either by case number or other unique identifier; and
- (4) The completed waiver form and entry of appearance form is received in the Office of the District Attorney at least three (3) business days prior to the date scheduled for arraignment. The District Attorney shall forthwith file the completed waiver form with the Office of the Clerk of Courts. In the event it is not so completed and received, the defendant shall appear in Court as scheduled; and
- (5) For purposes of time limitations for pre-trial matters, the date of arraignment shall be deemed the date on which the defendant was originally scheduled to appear in Court for arraignment or waiver of arraignment; and
- (6) In cases in which the defendant waives arraignment without appearing, it shall be the responsibility of the defendant or his counsel to obtain a copy of the information or indictment; and
- (7) A waiver of formal arraignment is not available to defendants who are without counsel.

(Effective ______, 2001/Formerly Rule 303)

Rule 571.1—Arraignment of Pro Se Defendant:

- (A) If a defendant appears without counsel at the time set for arraignment or waiver of arraignment, and the defendant indicates a desire to proceed without counsel, the defendant shall not be permitted to waive arraignment, but shall be given a return with counsel date. At that date, if the defendant is again without counsel, he shall be informed of his right to secure counsel by the presiding Judge. That Judge shall formally arraign the defendant.
- (B) If the defendant appears without counsel at the time set for arraignment or waiver of arraignment, and the defendant indicates a desire to proceed without counsel, and chooses to proceed with a disposition such as a plea of guilt at that time, the defendant shall be scheduled for disposition forthwith, formally arraigned, and informed of his right to counsel. A plea may be taken at that time.
- (C) If the defendant appears on the return of counsel date and indicates his desire to proceed without counsel, and chooses a disposition such as a plea of guilt at that time, the defendant shall be formally arraigned and a plea may be taken at that time.

Part F(1)—Motion Procedure

Rule 578—Content of Pre-Trial Motions:

All pre-trial motions [for pretrial discovery and inspection under Pa.R.Crim.P. 305, and all omnibus pretrial motions for relief under Pa.R.Crim.P. 306,] shall set forth the specific date on which the defendant was arraigned, or waived arraignment, or if the defendant has not yet been arraigned or waived arraignment, the motion shall so state. [Any such motion not complying with this requirement shall be summarily refused without prejudice.]

(Effective ______, 2001/Formerly Rule 306)

Rule 579—Filing of Pre-Trial Motions:

(A) The original of any pre-trial motion requiring a Court order, rule, or other Court action, shall first be filed

- with the Clerk of Courts, who shall time-stamp the original and any copies which may also be presented.
- (1) A party shall, concurrently with filing the motion, serve the attorney for the Commonwealth and all parties, or their counsel, with a copy of the motion.
- (2) The Clerk of Courts shall note the filing of the motion on the docket, and cause to be transmitted to the appropriate Judge any original motion which requests or requires Court action. A courtesy copy shall be served on the assigned Judge by the moving party.
- (B) When action by the Court is taken on the motion, or the action requested in the motion is denied, the Clerk of Courts shall time-stamp the order, rule, or other Court action, and shall note the filing upon the docket. The Clerk of Courts shall forthwith furnish a copy of the order, rule or other Court action to all parties, or their counsel, by personal delivery, first class mail, or any other means authorized by the Court.
- (C) A motion is deemed filed when the original motion is filed with the Clerk of Courts.

(Effective ______, 2001/Formerly Rule 307)

Rule 580—Assignment of Pre-Trial Motions:

All pre-trial motions requiring court action prior to trial shall be assigned to the Judge assigned to the case. Notice of such assignment shall be given at the time of the arraignment. Early assignment shall be made through the District Court Administrator.

(Effective ______, 2001/Formerly Rule 308)

Chapter 6—Trial Procedure in Court Cases

Part C(2)—Conduct in Jury Trial Rule 642—Contact With Jurors:

Before or during the trial of a case, no attorney, party or witness, shall communicate, or cause another to communicate, with any member of the jury, or anyone known to be a member of the venire from which the jury is selected for the trial of a case.

(Effective ______, 2001/Formerly Rule 1111)

Rule 647—Admission and Custody of [Tangible]

Exhibits:

- (A) Counsel for the respective parties shall retain possession, and shall be responsible for, the care and custody of all tangible exhibits used at hearings and trials, whether or not they have been presented, marked, identified and used, until such time as they have been formally offered into evidence.
- (B) From and after an order of admission, or if admission is denied, if the Court should so order, the Clerk of Courts shall take possession, and shall be responsible for the care and custody of all such tangible exhibits during the remainder of the hearing or trial, and thereafter, until further order of the Court.

Immediately upon the termination of the hearing or trial, the Clerk of Courts shall assemble and identify all such exhibits to the particular case, and shall be responsible for their secure care, custody and maintenance, and no such exhibits shall thereafter be removed or destroyed except upon order of the Court.]

(C) At any time after final disposition of the case, including the expiration of any applicable appeal period, the Clerk of Court may, after notice to counsel for all parties, petition the Court for an order authorizing the removal and disposition by destruction, or otherwise, of

any tangible exhibit of a size or weight precluding its enclosure in a regular case file.

Chapter 7—Post-Trial Procedures in Court Cases

Part B—Post-Sentence Procedures Rule 720—Post-Sentence Motions:

- (A) Filing
- (1) Post-sentence motions shall be filed with the Clerk of Courts in accordance with Pennsylvania Rule of Criminal Procedure No. 720, and copies thereof shall forthwith be served upon the District Attorney.
 - (B) Procedure
 - (1) Briefing Schedule.
- (a) Within ten (10) days after a post-sentence motion is filed, if the judge determines that briefs or memoranda of law are required for a resolution of the motion, the judge shall schedule a date certain for the submission of briefs or memoranda of law by the defendant and the Commonwealth.
 - (2) Hearing; Argument.
- (a) If the Judge determines that a hearing is required, seven (7) days before the date fixed for argument of any post-sentence motions, the defendant and counsel shall file with the Clerk of Courts two (2) copies of a brief in support of all issues raised, and shall forthwith serve a copy thereof upon the District Attorney.

- (3) Three (3) days before the date fixed for argument of any post-sentence motions, the District Attorney shall file with the Clerk of Courts two (2) copies of a brief in opposition, and at the same time shall serve a copy of thereof on the defendant or counsel, who may at or before the case is called for argument, file and serve a reply brief. No brief may be filed thereafter without leave of Court.
- (4) Failure of either party or counsel to file a brief in support of, or in opposition to, any issue in the case may be considered by the court to constitute a waiver of the position of such party as to such issue.
 - (C) Briefs
- (1) All briefs shall be typewritten, and shall contain complete and accurate citations of all authorities. Briefs shall contain a procedural history of the case, a statement of the questions involved, and argument. All briefs more than ten (10) pages in length shall contain an index.
 - (D) Trial Transcripts
- (1) Argument on and briefing of such motion shall be had without a transcript of the trial or other proceedings, unless grounds for the necessity of such transcription are detailed in the motion.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 58—RECREATION

GAME COMMISSION [58 PA. CODE CHS. 139 AND 147] Deer Damage Areas; Deer Control

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its June 12, 2001, meeting, adopted the following changes:

Deleted § 139.16 (relating to deer damage areas). Since the antlered and antlerless deer seasons will run concurrently, this program is no longer needed.

Amended §§ 147.552—147.554 (relating to application; permit; and subpermit), by removing reference to the Deer Damage Area.

These amendments are adopted under the authority of 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Game and Wildlife Code).

Amendments to §§ 139.16 and 147.552—147.554

1. Introduction

To deal with damage being done by deer on farmland in this Commonwealth, the Commission promulgated regulations providing for the designation of deer damage areas and allowing antlerless deer to be taken with the appropriate antlerless license on those areas during the antlered deer season. The primary provisions providing for these areas are contained in § 139.16. At its meeting on April 10, 2001, the Commission finally adopted seasons and bag limits which provide for concurrent antlered and antlerless deer seasons. As a result, the Deer Damage Area designation becomes meaningless. The Commission adopted, at its June 12, 2001, meeting, the elimination of provisions relating to Deer Damage Areas. These changes were adopted under section 2102 of the code (relating to regulations).

2. Purpose and Authority

As was indicated in the Introduction, the Commission has established concurrent antlered and antlerless deer seasons throughout this Commonwealth for 2001. As a result, the provision contained § 139.16 for the killing of antlerless deer during the antlered deer season has become meaningless. The Commission has therefore adopted changing sections referring to Deer Damage Areas to eliminate those references.

Section 2102 of the code authorizes the Commission to promulgate regulations relating to seasons and bag limits and game and wildlife. This section provides the authority for the adopted changes.

3. Regulatory Requirements

The adopted changes would eliminate a program that has become obsolete so there would be no additional requirements.

4. Persons Affected

Since deer hunters will be able to take antlerless deer during the antlered seasons throughout this Commonwealth, the adopted changes should have no impact.

5. Comment and Response Summary

No official comments were received regarding these adopted changes.

6. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The adopted changes would not result in any additional cost or paperwork, either to the Commonwealth or to hunters.

7. Effective Date

The adopted changes will be effective on final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by Commission.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

STATE BOARD OF SOCIAL WORKERS, MARRIAGE AND FAMILY THERAPISTS AND PROFESSIONAL COUNSELORS

[49 PA. CODE CHS. 47—49] Fees

The State Board of Social Workers, Marriage and Family Therapists and Professional Counselors (Board) proposes to amend §§ 47.4 and 47.34 (relating to licensure fees; and registration of continuing education providers, courses and programs); and add §§ 48.4 and 49.3 (relating to applicability of general provisions in Chapter 47) to read as set forth in Annex A.

A. Effective date

The proposed rulemaking will be effective upon publication of the final-form rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. Statutory Authority

The proposed rulemaking is authorized under section 6(2) of the Social Workers, Marriage and Family Therapists and Professional Counselors Act (act) (63 P. S. § 1906(2)).

C. Background and Purpose

The act requires the Board to set fees by regulation so that revenues meet or exceed expenditures over a biennial period. General operating expenses of the Board are funded through biennial license renewal fees. Expenses related to applications or services which are provided directly to individual licensees or applicants are excluded from general operating revenues and are funded through fees in which the cost of providing the service forms the basis for the fee.

Three licensure groups were added to the Board under the enactment of the act of December 21, 1998 (P. L. 1017, No. 136) (Act 136), which necessitated a determination of fees for services to the new licensees and applicants. Additionally, existing fees for services to licensees and applicants were analyzed to determine if the fees reflected the actual cost of providing the services. Actual cost calculations are based upon the following formula:

Number of minutes to perform the function

pay rate for the classification of personnel performing the function

a proportionate share of administrative overhead.

The analysis determined that the existing fees for applications for licensure and original license issuance as a licensed social worker, and approval as a continuing education provider or program, did not accurately reflect the actual cost involved of providing the services. Fees for the Board in these categories fell short of the cost to provide the service. The analysis also determined the actual cost for application fees for licensure and original

license issuance for clinical social workers, marriage and family therapists and professional counselors.

Biennial renewal fees for the three new licensure groups were determined by applying the existing biennial renewal fee for licensed social workers.

In this proposal, fees for the services identified will allocate costs to those who use the service or application. The Board would continue to apportion the enforcement and operating costs to the general licensing population when the Board makes its biennial reconciliation of revenue and expenditures.

D. Compliance with Executive Order 1996-1

In accordance with the requirements of Executive Order 1996-1, in drafting and promulgating the proposed rulemaking, the Board considered the least restrictive alternative to regulate costs for services requested by licensees and applicants. The Board also extended the invitation to the following boards, associations and interested licensees and educators to preliminarily review and comment on the Boards draft regulatory proposal: James Gavin, National Association of Social Workers; Association of Social Work Boards; Morgan Plant/PA Alliance of Counseling; Council on Social Work Education; Donna F. Derr, Ph.D., LSW. Director of Family and Comm. Ed.; Pennsylvania Society for Clinical Social Work; Edward Beck, Ed.D., CCMHC, NCC/Susquehanna Institute/East Shore Med. Ctr.; David W. Hall, Ph.D. Associate $\label{professor/Counseling/University} \mbox{ of Scranton; John } \mbox{ M.}$ Sutton, Jr.; Robert C. Nielsen, President, American Assoc. of State Counseling Bds.; Sally J. Tice, Ph.D./The Marriage & Family Life Ctr.; and Donald B. Kaveny, Director/ American Association of Marriage and Family Therapists.

E. Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed rulemaking will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fees will have a modest fiscal impact on those members of the private sector who apply for services from the Board. The proposed rulemaking will impose no additional paperwork requirements upon the Commonwealth, political subdivisions or the private sector.

F. Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the cost effectiveness of its regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

G. Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on August 9, 2001, the Board submitted a copy of these proposed amendments to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and the Chairpersons of the House Professional Licensure Committee and the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee. In addition to submitting the proposed amendments, the Board has provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a detailed Regulatory Analysis Form prepared by the Board in compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, "Regulatory Review and Promulgation." A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, if IRRC has objections to any portion of the proposed amendments, it will notify the Board within 10 days of the close of the Committees' review period. The notifica-

tion shall specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met by the portion of the proposed amendments to which an objection is made. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the amendments, by the Board, the General Assembly and the Governor of objections raised.

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CHS. 51 AND 63] Administration and Fishing

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapters 51 and 63 (relating to administrative provisions; and general fishing regulations). The Commission is publishing these amendments as a notice of proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code). The proposed amendments relate to administration and fishing.

A. Effective Date

The proposed amendments, if approved on final-form rulemaking, will go into effect upon publication of an order adopting the amendments in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. Contact Person

C. Statutory Authority

The proposed amendments to § 51.25 (relating to demand for or waiver of hearing) are published under the statutory authority of section 928 of the code (relating to revocation, suspension or denial of license, permit or registration). The proposed amendments to § 51.41 (relating to general) are published under the statutory authority of sections 928, 2102, 2305, 2711, 2903 and 2904 of the code. The proposed amendments to §§ 51.89, 63.5, 63.11, 63.15 and 63.21 are published under the statutory authority of section 2102 of the code (relating to rules and regulations).

D. Purpose and Background

The proposed amendments are designed to update, modify and improve the Commission's regulations pertaining to administration and fishing. The specific purpose of the proposed amendments is described in more detail under the summary of proposal.

E. Summary of Proposal

- (1) Section 51.25. The Commission's regulations provide that before the Commission may suspend, deny or revoke an individual's license, permit, special license or boat registration issued under the authority of the code, the Commission must give that individual an opportunity to be heard. The individual must submit a timely demand for a hearing, and the demand must be in writing. After an individual requests a hearing, the Executive Director appoints a presiding officer to conduct the hearing on the Commission's behalf. Although the Game Commission's regulations provide for a nonrefundable filing fee of \$35, the Commission currently does not charge a fee. The Commission accordingly proposes to amend this section to provide for a \$35 nonrefundable filing fee. The Commission also proposes to amend this section to provide that if an individual demands a hearing and subsequently fails to appear, the individual waives the right to a hearing, and a hearing will not be conducted.
- (2) Sections 51.41, 51.89, 63.11 and 63.15. When the General Assembly amended the law to transfer administrative responsibility related to commercial artificial propagation from the Commission to the Department of Agriculture, it repealed Chapter 33 of the code (relating to propagation and sale of fish). Therefore, any references to this chapter or any of the sections contained in the chapter must be removed from the Commission's regulations. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to amend these sections as set forth in Annex A.
- (3) Sections 63.5 and 63.21 (relating to methods of fishing; and designation of fishing regulations). The code provides that if a person violates a regulation promulgated under section 2102(a), the Commission has designated as being for the protection of fish or fish habitat or for the health and safety of persons who fish, that person commits a summary offense of the second degree. The penalty is a \$100 fine or imprisonment not exceeding 20 days. If a person violates a regulation promulgated under section 2102(b), that person commits a summary offense of the third degree. The penalty is a \$50 fine. As such, an individual who is caught intentionally snagging steelhead, for example, pays a \$100 fine, whereas an individual who is caught netting steelhead pays only a \$50 fine. This disparity occurs because the Commission promulgated § 63.9 (relating to snatch fishing, foul hooking and snag fishing) under section 2102(a) of the code and designated it as being for the protection of fish or fish habitat or for the health and safety of persons who fish. The Commission, on the other hand, promulgated § 63.5 (relating to fishing devices) under section 2102(b) of the

To correct the inconsistency in the current fine structure for using various illegal methods of taking fish from Commonwealth waters, the Commission proposes the amendments set forth in Annex A.

F. Paperwork

The proposed amendments will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements.

G. Fiscal Impact

The proposed amendments will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. Currently, no more than 20 individuals per year request administrative hearings regarding the proposed suspension, denial or revocation of their licenses, permits, special licenses or boat registrations issued under the authority of the code. Therefore, the fiscal impact of the amendments to § 51.25 will be minimal. With the exception of the proposed changes to § 51.25, the proposed amendments will impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public. The proposed amendments to § 51.25, as previously stated, will impose a \$35 nonrefundable filing fee.

TITLE 58. RECREATION PART II. FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION Subpart A. GENERAL PROVISIONS CHAPTER 51. ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS Subchapter A. PRELIMINARY PROVISIONS

§ 51.25. Demand for or waiver of hearing.

- (a) A respondent shall submit a timely demand for hearing with the answer to the order to show cause. The demand shall be in writing and shall be accompanied by a nonrefundable filing fee of \$35 in the form of a money order, certified check or bank cashier's check made payable to "Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission." A hearing will not be conducted nor a demand deemed filed until the complete filing fee is received by the Commission in the form specified and within the time frame designated. Failure to file a demand for a hearing or to submit the filing fee in the amount and form specified within the time limit set for filing an answer will be deemed a waiver of the right to hearing. The Commission will return to the respondent any filing fee that it receives that does not comply with this subsection.
- (c) If a respondent demands a hearing and subsequently fails to appear at the hearing after being given written notice of the date and time, the respondent's failure to appear will be deemed a

waiver of the right to a hearing, and a hearing will not be conducted and the filing fee will not be refunded.

(d) Subsection (a) supplements 1 Pa. Code §§ 33.21 and 33.22 (relating to filing fees; and mode of payment of fees).

Subchapter E. PERMIT PROCEDURES

§ 51.41. General.

This subchapter establishes the **[agencies]** agency **practices** and procedures to be followed in consideration and disposition of applications for permits the granting or denial of which is discretionary, including permits issued under sections 2902, 2903, 2905, 2906, 3106**[, 3301, 3309]** and 3509 of the code and including permits issued under provisions of the code which contain the word, "may."

Subchapter I. PERMITS TO DRAW OFF IMPOUNDED WATERS

§ 51.89. General permits.

* * * * *

(b) Notwithstanding the other provisions of this subchapter, this section constitutes a general permit for the Commission [,] and cooperative nurseries recognized by the Commission [and holders of artificial propagation licenses under section 3301 of the code (relating to artificial propagation licenses)] to draw down impounded waters without applying for an individual permit when the waters to be drawn down are located on hatchery property and the draw down is in connection with hatchery operations. The general permit authorized by this subsection does not waive a requirement for a permittee to apply for and obtain other necessary permits.

Subpart B. FISHING

CHAPTER 63. GENERAL FISHING REGULATIONS

§ 63.5. [Fishing devices] Methods of fishing.

It is unlawful to use a method for taking fish from the waters of this Commonwealth, including boundary lakes and rivers, unless the use of the method is specifically authorized by this part.

§ 63.11. Eel chutes.

It is unlawful to operate an eel chute except in compliance with the following terms and conditions:

* * * * *

(13) The Commission hereby determines under section [3311] 2507 of the code (relating to sale of certain fish, reptiles and amphibians prohibited) that eels caught lawfully under this section may not be sold or offered for sale.

§ 63.15. Field dressing of fish.

* * * * *

(c) This section does not apply to fish caught or sold in compliance with [Chapters] Chapter 31 [and 33] of the code (relating to regulated fishing lakes[; and propagation and sale of fish]). This section applies to catches of fish caught under a Lake Erie commercial

license under Chapter 29 of the code (relating to special licenses and permits) only until the fish reach established retail or wholesale markets.

* * * * *

§ 63.21. Designation of fishing regulations.

(a) The following regulations are designated under section 2102(a) of the code (relating to rules and regulations) as being for the protection of fish or fish habitat or for the health and safety of persons who fish:

* * * * *

(4) Section 63.5 (relating to methods of fishing).

GAME COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CH. 137] Possession of Live Wildlife

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission) at its June 12, 2001, meeting, proposed the following amendments:

Amend § 137.31 (relating to possession of live wildlife) by limiting the number of live foxes that may be taken from the wild for the purpose of collecting fox urine, and establishing guidelines relating to same.

This amendment will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for this proposal is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

This proposal was made public at the June 12, 2001, meeting of the Commission, and comments on this proposal can be sent to the Director of Information and Education, Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797, until September 21, 2001.

1. Introduction

To better manage the number of live foxes being collected and held from the wild, the Commission at its June 12, 2001, meeting proposed placing a limit on the number of foxes that can be held for urine collection purposes. The possession of live foxes for urine collection by a permittee under § 137.31(a)(1), is an exception to § 137.31(a), which makes it unlawful to take or possess live wildlife taken from the wild. The proposal would limit the number of live foxes that can be held for urine collection to five. This change is proposed under authority contained in section 2901(b) of the code (relating to authority to issue permits).

2. Purpose and Authority

As indicated in the Introduction, § 137.31(a) makes it unlawful to possess game or wildlife unlawfully taken from the wild. Section 137.31(a)(1) currently makes an exception for a person to possess live foxes taken from a wild state in this Commonwealth, under a permit issued for the collection of fox urine. The proposed change would limit this exception to five foxes.

Section 2901(b) of the code permits the Commission to adopt regulations to properly manage game and wildlife

and control activities performed under to a permit. This section provides the authority for the proposed change.

3. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed change would limit the number of live foxes a permittee may keep under the current exception provision in § 137.31.

4. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to keep live foxes may be affected by the proposed change.

5. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed change should not result in any additional cost or paperwork.

6. Effective Date

The proposed change will be effective on final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

§ 137.31. Possession of live wildlife.

- (a) It is unlawful for a person to possess live wildlife taken from a wild state within this Commonwealth [.] except:
- (1) [A permit issued to a person for the collection of fox urine is excepted from this section. A permittee may possess live fox only.] A permit to possess no more than five live foxes may be issued to a person for the sole purpose of collecting fox urine. The permit to possess live fox will expire on the last day of the fox-trapping season. Any foxes held under the authority of this permit shall be euthanized and may be pelted and the pelt may be sold. No fox held under the authority of this permit may be released into the wild.
- (2) A person **lawfully** operating under the authority of a permit issued in accordance with the act is excepted from this section.


Reorganization of the Liquor Control Board

Maximum Lawful Rate of Interest for Residential Mortgages for the Month of September 2001

The Department of Banking of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, under the authority contained in section 301 of the act of January 30, 1974 (P. L. 13, No. 6) (41 P. S. § 301), hereby determines that the maximum lawful rate of interest for residential mortgages for the month of September, 2001, is 8%.

The interest rate limitations under the State's usury statute were preempted to a great extent by Federal law, the Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980 (Pub.L. 96-221). Further preemption was instituted with the signing of Pub.L. 96-399, which overrode State interest rate limitations on any individual who finances the sale or exchange of residential real property which such individual owns and which such individual occupies or has occupied as a principal residence.

Each month the Department of Banking is required by State law to compute and announce the ceiling rate on residential mortgages in Pennsylvania. This maximum rate is determined by adding 2.50 percentage points to the yield rate on long-term government bonds as published by the Federal Reserve Board and/or the United States Treasury. The latest yield rate on long-term government securities is 5.53 to which was added 2.50 percentage points for a total of 8.03 that by law is rounded off to the nearest quarter at 8%.

Comments received within this 30-day comment period will be considered in the formulation of the final determinations regarding this application. The comments should include the name, address and telephone number of the writer and a concise statement to inform the Department of the exact basis of a comment and the relevant facts upon which it is based. A public hearing may be held if the responsible office considers the public response significant. Following the comment period, the Department's Water Management Program Manager will make a final determination regarding these applications. Notice of this final determination will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at which time this determination may be appealed to the Environmental Hearing Board.

The renewal application, including proposed effluent limitations and special conditions, is available on file. For new permit applications, information submitted with the applications is available on file. The information may be inspected and arrangements made for copying at the office indicated before the application.

Sections 302-305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (Act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the Pennsylvania Bulletin an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the background standard, Statewide health standard, the site-specific standard, or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area, must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, or a combination of the cleanup standards, or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the Act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the Act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation

to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments, should be directed to the remediator of the site.

S. §§ 1406.1—1406.21). Mining activity permits issued in response to the applications will also address the appli-

cable permitting requirements of the following statutes: the Air Pollution Control Act (35 P. S. §§ 4001—4015); the Dam Safety and Encroachments Act (32 P. S. §§ 693.1—693.27); and the Solid Waste Management Act (35 P. S. §§ 6018.101—6018.1003).

The following permit applications to conduct mining activities have been received by the Department of Environmental Protection (Department). A copy of the application is available for inspection at the District Mining Office indicated before each application. Where a 401 Water Quality Certification is needed for any aspect of a particular proposed mining activity, the submittal of the permit application will serve as the request for certification.

Written comments or objections, or requests for informal conferences on applications, may be submitted by any person or any officer or head of any Federal, State or local government agency or authority to the Department at the same address within 30 days of this publication, or within 30 days after the last publication of the applicant's newspaper advertisement, as provided by 25 Pa. Code §§ 77.121—77.123 and 86.31—86.34 (relating to public notices of filing of permit applications, opportunity for comment and informal conferences).

Where any of the mining activities listed will have discharges of wastewater to streams, the Department will incorporate NPDES permits into the mining activity permits issued in response to these applications. NPDES permits will contain, at a minimum, technology-based effluent limitations (as described in the Department's regulations—25 Pa. Code §§ 77.522, 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.242, 89.52 and 90.102) for iron, manganese, suspended solids, settleable solids, alkalinity and pH. In addition to the previous, more restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume, or restrictions on the extent of mining which may occur will be incorporated into a mining activity permit, when necessary, for compliance with water quality standards (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 93 and 95). Persons or agencies which have requested review of the NPDES permit requirements for a particular mining activity within the previously-mentioned public comment period will be provided with a 30-day period to review and submit comments on those requirements.

Written comments or objections should contain the name, address and telephone number of persons submitting comments or objections; application number; and a statement of sufficient detail to inform the Department on the basis of comment or objection and relevant facts upon which it is based. Requests for an informal conference must contain the name, address and telephone number of requestor; application number; a brief summary of the issues to be raised by the requestor at the conference; and a statement whether the requestor desires to have the conference conducted in the locality of the proposed mining activities.

Plan Approval and Operating Permit Exemptions

Under the authority contained in 25 Pa. Code § 127.14, the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) may determine sources or classes of sources which may be exempt from the plan approval and permitting requirements of 25 Pa. Code Chapter 127. In accordance with § 127.14(d), the listing of these determinations is being revised and a draft is now available. After a 30-day comment period, the listings will be revised, as appropriate, and published in final-form in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The following changes are proposed to the listing as last published on April 29, 2000 (30 Pa.B. 2165).

- 1. A plan approval exemption has been added for portable, temporary generators used for 14 days or less at special events (such as county fairs, circuses and concerts).
- 2. A plan approval exemption has been added for one or more generators regardless of size, with combined NO_{x} emissions less than 100 lbs/hr, 1,000 lbs/day, 2.75 tons per ozone season and 6.6 tons per year on a 12-month rolling basis for all exempt generators at the site.
- 3. A plan approval exemption has been revised to include storage vessels containing nonVOC, nonmalodorous or nonhazardous air pollutant materials.

Notice of Quick Response Service Program Recognition Requirements

Under 28 Pa. Code § 1015.1(a) (relating to quick response service), the following equipment and supplies shall be maintained and readily available in working order for use by a quick response service (QRS) recognized by the Department of Health under 28 Pa. Code § 1015.1 and by an applicant for QRS recognition.

A. Vehicle Requirements

Although a vehicle is not a requirement for a QRS, if a QRS does not have a dedicated vehicle, it must provide a statement to the regional emergency medical services council explaining how the personnel will be responding to the scene of emergencies with the required equipment.

B. Minimum Essential Equipment and Supplies

The container and the bags must be labeled with the appropriate biohazard warnings. If bags are used, there must be three of them and they must be color-coded (red) and constructed of heavy duty plastic.

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P. S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 819.203 (relating to notice of instant game rules), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following instant lottery game:

- 1. Name: The name of the game is Pennsylvania Wheel of Fortune.

- 4. *Prize Play Symbols*: The prize play symbols and their captions located in the four "Prize" areas are: \$1^{.00} (ONE DOL), \$3^{.00} (THR DOL), \$6^{.00} (SIX DOL), \$9^{.00} (NIN DOL), \$12\$ (TWLV), \$18\$ (EGHTN), \$36\$ (TRY SIX), \$72\$ (SVY TWO), \$288 (TWOETYEGT), \$500 (FIV HUN) and \$30,000 (TRY THO).
- 5. *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game are \$1, \$3, \$6, \$9, \$12, \$18, \$36, \$72, \$288, \$500 and \$30,000. The player can win up to four times on a ticket.

- (c) Holders of tickets where the player completely uncovers all of the letters in the "Person," "Place," "Thing" or "Phrase" puzzle in the puzzle grid area, using only the letters found in the "Your Letters" area and a prize play symbol of \$288 (TWOETYEGT) appears in the "Prize" area for that puzzle, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$288.
- (d) Holders of tickets where the player completely uncovers all of the letters in the "Person," "Place," "Thing" or "Phrase" puzzle in the puzzle grid area, using only the letters found in the "Your Letters" area and a prize play symbol of \$72\$ (SVY TWO) appears in the "Prize" area for that puzzle, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$72.
- (e) Holders of tickets where the player completely uncovers all of the letters in the "Person," "Place," "Thing" or "Phrase" puzzle in the puzzle grid area, using only the letters found in the "Your Letters" area and a prize play symbol of \$36\$ (TRY SIX) appears in the "Prize" area for that puzzle, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$36.
- (f) Holders of tickets where the player completely uncovers all of the letters in the "Person," "Place," "Thing" or "Phrase" puzzle in the puzzle grid area, using only the letters found in the "Your Letters" area and a prize play symbol of \$18\$ (EGHTN) appears in the "Prize" area for that puzzle, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$18.

- (h) Holders of tickets where the player completely uncovers all of the letters in the "Person," "Place," "Thing" or "Phrase" puzzle in the puzzle grid area, using only the letters found in the "Your Letters" area and a prize play symbol of $\$9^{.00}$ (NIN DOL) appears in the "Prize" area for that puzzle, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$9.
- (i) Holders of tickets where the player completely uncovers all of the letters in the "Person," "Place," "Thing" or "Phrase" puzzle in the puzzle grid area, using only the letters found in the "Your Letters" area and a prize play symbol of \$6.00 (SIX DOL) appears in the "Prize" area for that puzzle, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$6.
- (j) Holders of tickets where the player completely uncovers all of the letters in the "Person," "Place," "Thing" or "Phrase" puzzle in the puzzle grid area, using only the letters found in the "Your Letters" area and a prize play symbol of $\$3^{.00}$ (THR DOL) appears in the "Prize" area for that puzzle, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$3.
- (k) Holders of tickets where the player completely uncovers all of the letters in the "Person," "Place," "Thing"

or "Phrase" puzzle in the puzzle grid area, using only the letters found in the "Your Letters" area and a prize play symbol of $\$1^{.00}$ (ONE DOL) appears in the "Prize" area for that puzzle, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1.

- (g) Envelopes containing more than one completed nonwinning Pennsylvania Wheel of Fortune instant lottery ticket shall be disqualified.
- (h) Completed nonwinning Pennsylvania Wheel of Fortune instant lottery tickets received in envelopes larger than 4.5 inches by 9.5 inches shall be disqualified.
- (i) Winning Pennsylvania Wheel of Fortune instant lottery tickets submitted to the Wheel of Fortune Play-at-Home Bonus address may not be paid or honored.
- (j) Completed nonwinning Pennsylvania Wheel of Fortune instant lottery tickets must be received by the Pennsylvania Lottery no later than December 28, 2001, to be eligible for the Wheel of Fortune Bonus Drawing.
 - 11. Wheel of Fortune Bonus Drawing Procedures:
- (a) Drawing. The Wheel of Fortune Bonus Drawing will be held at Lottery Headquarters on January 9, 2002, or on a date to be determined by the Secretary.
- (b) Eligibility for the Wheel of Fortune Bonus Drawing. To be eligible for the Wheel of Fortune Bonus Drawing, a

player must have complied with the requirements of section 10.

- (1) The Lottery will make a reasonable effort to ensure that each entry is entered into the Wheel of Fortune Bonus Drawing. The Lottery assumes no responsibility for a lost or misplaced entry not entered into the Wheel of Fortune Bonus Drawing.
- (2) If an entry is rejected during or following the Wheel of Fortune Bonus Drawing, the sole remedy is to select another entry to replace the rejected entry in accordance with Lottery procedure.
- (c) Manner of conducting the Wheel of Fortune Bonus Drawing.
- (1) Entries will be placed into containers and the containers will be sealed. A mechanical device will be used to randomly select one of the containers.
- (2) The contents of the selected container will be placed in a tumbler and one entry envelope will be selected. The envelope will be opened to determine if the entry is valid.
- (3) If the selected entry does not meet the requirements of section 10, another entry will be selected and so on, until a qualified entry has been chosen.
- (4) Determination of the winner will be made by the Secretary, whose judgment will be final and binding.
- (d) The Wheel of Fortune Bonus Drawing winner will be notified of its selection after all validation procedures have been conducted.
- (e) The Wheel of Fortune Bonus Drawing winner will be required to furnish their Social Security number to the Lottery.
- (f) The odds of winning a trip and cash prize depend upon the number of entries received.
- (g) The awarding of a trip and cash prize in the Wheel of Fortune Bonus Drawing to a person who dies before receiving the trip and cash prize or to a person 17 years of age or younger shall be undertaken according to 61 Pa. Code §§ 811.16 and 811.27 (relating to prizes payable after death of prize winner; and payment of prizes to persons under 18 years of age).
- 12. Trip to Hollywood, California and Audition for the Wheel of Fortune Television Game Show information and restrictions:
- (a) The trip includes two roundtrip airfares, one hotel accommodation for two for 4 days and 3 nights, an onsite host and an audition for a chance to become a contestant on the Wheel of Fortune television game show and \$30,000 in cash.
- (b) If a player is selected as a result of the player's audition to be a contestant on the Wheel of Fortune television game show, the player and a guest will receive a complimentary 3 day and 2 night round trip to California to compete on the Wheel of Fortune television game show.
- (c) Trip scheduling is dependent upon the timing of the auditions in Hollywood for the Wheel of Fortune television game show.

- (d) Trips must be taken within 1 year of the date of the Wheel of Fortune Bonus Drawing.
 - (e) There is no cash equivalent for the trip prize.
- (f) The winner of a trip will be responsible for any income tax due to the Federal government for the value of the prize.
- 13. Retailer Incentive Awards: The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Game for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Wheel of Fortune instant lottery game tickets. The conduct of the game will be governed by 61 Pa. Code § 819.222 (relating to retailer bonuses and incentives).
- 14. Unclaimed Prize Money: For a period of 1 year from the announced close of Pennsylvania Wheel of Fortune, prize money from winning Pennsylvania Wheel of Fortune instant lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto. If no claim is made within 1 year of the announced close of the Pennsylvania Wheel of Fortune instant lottery game, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by the ticket, if any, will expire and the prize money will be paid into the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes provided for by statute.
- 15. Governing Law: In purchasing a ticket, the customer agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P. S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), the regulations contained in 61 Pa. Code Part V (relating to State Lotteries) and the provisions contained in this notice.
- 16. Termination of the Game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Pennsylvania Wheel of Fortune or through normal communications methods.

The Department of State, Corporation Bureau (Bureau) proposes to amend 19 Pa. Code Appx. A (relating to official forms), to read as set forth in the Annex A.

A. Effective Date

The proposed amendments will be effective upon publication of the final-form in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. Statutory Authority

The Department has the authority to promulgate Bureau forms and instructions under 15 Pa.C.S. § 133 (relating to powers of Department of State) (Associations Code). Section 133(a) of the Associations Code designates that these forms shall not be agency regulations. See section 133(a) of the Associations Code. Therefore, they are explicitly excluded from the requirements of section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232), and review under the Commonwealth Attorneys Act (71 P. S. §§ 732-101—732-506) and the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. §§ 745.1—745.15). Section 133 of the Associations Code does, however, require that the forms and instructions be subject to the opportunity for public comments under section 201 of the July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. § 1201) (CDL).

C. Description of Proposed Revisions

This proposal revises the existing forms and instructions currently published in the *Pennsylvania Code* so that the published forms and instructions are the same as those currently being used by the Bureau. The Department has updated the forms and instructions to eliminate references to executive staff personnel, which will eliminate the need to revise the Bureau's forms whenever there are changes in the executive staff. Some additional changes have also been to improve the appearance of the forms and to clarify the instructions.

The forms and instructions currently published in 19 Pa. Code are being deleted. These outdated forms and

instructions will be replaced by those set forth in Annex A. Even though Rule 2.10(a) of the *Pennsylvania Code and Bulletin Style Manual* recommends that forms be referenced in regulations rather than adopted in regulations, section 133 of the Associations Code requires that the forms and instructions be published in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

D. Fiscal Impact

While this proposal would have no measurable fiscal impact upon the Commonwealth, its political subdivisions, or the private sector and is actually likely to provide a savings to the Commonwealth by eliminating the situation where the Corporation Bureau's forms become obsolete, a formal fiscal analysis was not conducted because these forms are exempt from the requirements of section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929.

E. Paperwork Requirements

This proposal would not create new paperwork.

F. Regulatory Review

Under section 133(a) of the Association Code, these forms are exempt from the requirements of the Regulatory Review Act, but shall be subject to the opportunity of public comment requirement under section 201 of the CDL.

G. Public Comment

Under section 133(a) of the Associations Code that requires that publication of these forms be subject to the opportunity for public comment, the Department invites interested persons to submit written comments, suggestions or objections regarding this proposal to Janet Warfield-Warren, Operations Manager, Corporation Bureau, Department of State, 308 North Office Building, Harrisburg, PA 17120, within 30 days following publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
