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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 31—INSURANCE

INSURANCE DEPARTMENT

[31 PA. CODE CHS. 33 AND 67a]

Pennsylvania Assigned Risk Consumer Protection

The Insurance Department (Department) hereby amends § 33.29 (relating to the Pennsylvania Assigned Risk Plan) and establishes Chapter 67a (relating to Pennsylvania Assigned Risk Plan consumer protection) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Statutory Authority

The final-form regulations are adopted under the authority of The Insurance Company Law of 1921 (40 P. S. §§ 341—991); The Insurance Department Act of 1921 (40 P. S. §§ 1—321); sections 206, 506, 1501 and 1502 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. §§ 66, 186, 411 and 412); and section 3 of the act of February 12, 1984 (P. L. 28, No. 11), known as the Pennsylvania Auto Insurance Plan.

Comments and Response

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 28 Pa.B. 5246 (October 17, 1998) with a 30-day comment period. During the 30-day comment period, comments were received from the Insurance Federation of Pennsylvania, Inc. (IFP), the Professional Insurance Agents of Pennsylvania (PIA) and Duane, Morris & Heckscher. During its regulatory review, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) submitted comments to the Department. The following is a response to those comments.

The IFP supported the Department's efforts in revising the regulations and raised no objections.

Both Duane Morris & Heckscher, counsel for the Assigned Risk Plan (plan), and IRRC recommended that § 67a.2(f) (relating to consumer protections) refer to the recently enacted legislation that amended 75 Pa.C.S. (relating to Vehicle Code) (code). The Department agreed with this and has changed the section accordingly.

In § 67a.1 (relating to definitions), both the PIA and IRRC recommended that the Department follow the definition of "assigned risk plan" that is provided in the statute. Since this is a stylistic change, the Department has no objection to this request and has made the change accordingly.

Both the PIA and IRRC also requested a clarification to the terms "producer" and "producer of record." The Department agreed with the clarification and has revised the language to reflect that agents and brokers are "certified or licensed" by the Department. The Department issues certificates of qualification to agents, thus certifying them, and licenses to brokers. Both the PIA and IRRC also suggested that the definition of "voluntary market" include the term "ordinary," as reflected in section 1741 of the code (relating to establishment of the plan). The Department agrees with the recommendation and has made this change.

Section 67a.2 required that producers perform a reasonable search of the ordinary market prior to placing business with the plan. Both the PIA and IRRC raised the objection that the statute does not require that a reasonable search be made.

The statute provides that an agent or broker may place an insured in the plan if coverage is not available in the ordinary market. Plan applications, approved by the Department, provide that the insured and agent or broker confirm that the insured attempted to obtain the coverage through the ordinary market and could not. In light of this, the Department believes that the statutory provisions and current practices obviate the need to include an explicit requirement in the rulemaking that a reasonable search of the ordinary market be made. Consistent with the PIA and IRCC's suggestion, the Department has deleted the express requirement in the rulemaking requiring a reasonable search of the ordinary market.

The PIA objected to the requirements in § 67a.2(c) that state a producer may not accept cash as a method of payment. This objection seems tenuous, considering that the current regulations already prohibit this activity. The Department obviously believes that the current regulations are valid and enforceable; also, the prohibition against accepting cash is clearly an important tool to prevent abuse or misuse of funds. If current practice is to abide by the current regulations, then the proposed rulemaking does not place an additional burden on agents or brokers. Therefore, the Department believes that this provision should remain in the rulemaking and has retained the language in § 67a.2(c).

IRCC recommended that the rulemaking include a definition of the "Assigned Risk Plan Rules" and explain where they may be obtained. The Department does not believe that this would be of substantive or procedural benefit appropriate for inclusion in the rulemaking. The intent of Chapter 67a is to ensure consumer protection, with regard to coverage through the plan. Adding language on the availability of plan rules, and agents' access thereto, does not constitute a regulatory mandate that would enhance consumer protection. Further, the Assigned Risk Plan Governing Committee develops the rules, which are filed with, and approved by, the Department. Certified producers for the plan must have access to the rules, obtainable through the plan itself. Also, most agents know of the availability of the plan rules or access to the plan. If an agent or broker is not aware of the plan, that agent or broker usually obtains this information from either the Department, a trade association, of which the agent or broker may be a member, or experienced agents and brokers in the marketplace. Therefore, the Department has not included a definition of the "plan rules" or how the plan rules may be obtained.

Affected Parties

The final-form rulemaking applies to insurance companies doing the business of property and casualty insurance in this Commonwealth.

Fiscal Impact

State Government

There will be no increase in cost to the Department due to the adoption of Chapter 67a.

General Public

There will be no fiscal impact to the public.

Political Subdivisions

The final-form rulemaking will not impose additional costs on political subdivisions.

Private Sector

The final-form rulemaking will not impose additional costs on insurance companies doing the business of property and casualty insurance in this Commonwealth.

Paperwork

The adoption of the final-form rulemaking will not impose additional paperwork on the Department or the insurance industry.

Effectiveness/Sunset Date

This final-form rulemaking becomes effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. No sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on October 5, 1998, the Department submitted a copy of this rulemaking to IRRC and to the Chairpersons of the House Insurance Committee and the Senate Banking and Insurance Committee.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC and the Committees were provided with copies of the comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when regulated. In preparing these final-form regulations, the Department has considered all comments from IRRC, the Committees and the public.

Under section 5.1(d) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(d)), this final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the House and Senate Committees on August 9, 2000. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on August 10, 2000, and approved the final-form rulemaking.

Findings

The Commissioner finds that:

(1) Public notice of intention to adopt this rulemaking as amended by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) The adoption of this final-form rulemaking in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for the administration and enforcement of the authorizing statutes.

Order

The Commissioner, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Department, 31 Pa. Code, are amended by deleting § 33.29 and adding §§ 67a.1 and 67a.2 to read as set forth in Annex A.

(b) The Commissioner shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of General Counsel and Office of Attorney General for approval as to form and legality as required by law.

(c) The Commissioner shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) The final-form rulemaking adopted by this order shall take effect upon final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

§ 67a.1. Definitions.

The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meaning unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Assigned Risk Plan—As defined in 75 Pa.C.S. § 1702 (relating to definitions).

Department—The Insurance Department of the Commonwealth.

Producer—An agent or broker, certified or licensed, by the Insurance Department to conduct business and certified by the Assigned Risk Plan.

Producer of record—The agent or broker, certified or licensed, by the Department to conduct business, certified by the Assigned Risk Plan and whose signature appears on the application for insurance.

Voluntary market—The ordinary market where a person obtains insurance without the assistance from government and through an insurer of the consumer's own selection.

§ 67a.2. Consumer protections.

(a) A producer may submit an application to the Assigned Risk Plan and may deliver the policy of the company to which the risk is assigned.

(b) A producer may submit an application to the Assigned Risk Plan only after having been unable to obtain coverage for the applicant, in the voluntary market, within the time frame established by the Assigned Risk Plan rules.

(c) Upon completion of the original application, premium moneys from the applicant to the producer of record shall be in the form of a money order, cashier's check, certified check, personal check or other method approved by the Insurance Commissioner, made payable to the "Pennsylvania Assigned Risk Plan." The producer of record may not accept cash.

(d) Upon receipt of the premium moneys for an original application, the producer of record shall issue a receipt showing the amount received, and the date and time that the money was received. The receipt shall also contain

the applicant's name and address, the signature of the producer of record and a statement indicating that it was received for the Pennsylvania Assigned Risk Plan. The electronic mail reference number shall be included, if applicable.

(e) A producer of record shall maintain appropriate records of original applications, including the electronic mail reference number, noting the date and time of coverage. The producer of record shall make available for inspection these records to the Assigned Risk Plan, a representative of the assigned company or the Department.

(f) If the applicant produces reasonable documentation of payment of the required premium to the producer of record in accordance with subsection (c) and a completed application for insurance under the Assigned Risk Plan, payment to the producer of record shall be deemed payment to the Assigned Risk Plan in accordance with the Assigned Risk Plan rules. Coverage shall be effective as of the date and time specified in the application in accordance with the Assigned Risk Plan rules. See 75 Pa.C.S. § 1742(4) (relating to scope of plan).

(g) A producer may not charge referral fees or other fees for placing or servicing any coverage in the Assigned Risk Plan. A producer's remuneration shall be limited to the method of compensation established by the Assigned Risk Plan rules.

(h) Producers shall comply with the Assigned Risk Plan rules. Violation of the Assigned Risk Plan rules may be construed to be a violation of section 604 of The Insurance Department Act of 1921 (40 P. S. § 234).

Title 58—RECREATION

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CHS. 63, 65 AND 111]

Baitfish; Special Fish Regulations; Special Boating Regulations

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) by this order amends Chapters 63, 65 and 111 (relating to general fishing regulations; special fishing regulations; and special regulations counties). The Commission is publishing these amendments under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code). The amendments relate to fishing and boating.

A. Effective Date

The amendments will go into effect upon publication of an order adopting the amendments in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. Contact Person

C. Statutory Authority

The amendments to Chapter 63 are published under the statutory authority of section 2102 of the code (relating to rules and regulations). The amendments to

Chapter 65 are published under the statutory authority of section 2307 of the code (relating to waters limited to specific purposes). The amendments to Chapter 111 are published under the statutory authority of section 5124 of the code (relating to particular areas of water).

D. Purpose and Background

The amendments are designed to update, modify and improve Commission regulations relating to fishing and boating. The specific purpose of the amendments is described in more detail under the summary of changes.

E. Summary of Changes

(1) *Section 63.44 (relating to illegal baitfish)*. Until 1980, when the code was recodified, it was illegal to use goldfish as a baitfish. However, during the recodification, this prohibition was inadvertently omitted. Recently, the Commission's Bureau of Fisheries took action to prohibit the sale of the four species of baitfish (specifically, Goldfish (*Carassius auratus*), Comets (*Carassius auratus*), Koi (*Cyprinus carpio*) and Common carp (*Cyprinus carpio*)) by individuals possessing a Live Bait Dealer's license. To be consistent with this current change and also correct the previous omission, the Commission added § 63.44. This section is adopted as proposed.

(2) *Section 65.24 (relating to miscellaneous special regulations)*. A recent review of the Commission's regulations revealed that there are two miscellaneous special regulations that state that the creel limit for trout is eight per day. When the Commission amended its State-wide trout regulations last year to reduce the creel limit from eight to five, these miscellaneous regulations should have been amended as well. Accordingly, the Commission adopted the amendments to this section. This section is amended as proposed.

(3) *Section 111.67 (relating to York County)*. Section 111.67(c)(3) and (d)(3) requires boaters 8 years of age and younger and nonswimmers to wear United States Coast Guard approved PFDs on Lake Redman and Lake Williams, respectively. The Commission promulgated this regulation prior to the Statewide regulation in § 97.1(h) (relating to personal flotation devices) requiring children 12 years of age and younger to wear an approved Type I, II, III or V PFD while underway on any boat 20 feet or less in length and all canoes and kayaks. To resolve this inconsistency, the Commission deleted § 111.67(c)(3) and (d)(3). The deletion is adopted as proposed.

F. Paperwork

The amendments will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements.

G. Fiscal Impact

The amendments will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The amendments will impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public.

H. Public Involvement

A notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 30 Pa.B. 2373 (May 13, 2000). The Commission did not receive any public comments regarding the proposals.

Findings

The Commission finds that:

(1) Public notice of intention to adopt the amendments adopted by this order has been given under sections 201

and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder in 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) A public comment period was provided, and no comments were received.

(3) The adoption of the amendments of the Commission in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing statutes.

Order

The Commission, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapters 63, 65 and 111, are amended by amending §§ 63.44, 65.24 and 111.67 to read as set forth at 30 Pa.B. 2373.

(b) The Executive Director will submit this order and 30 Pa.B. 2373 to the Office of Attorney General for approval as to legality as required by law.

(c) The Executive Director shall certify this order and 30 Pa.B. 2373 and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) This order shall take effect immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY BOARD

[25 PA. CODE CHS. 260a AND 269a]

Host Municipality Fund Allocation

The Environmental Quality Board (Board) proposes to amend Chapters 260a and 269a (relating to hazardous waste management system: general; and siting) to address concerns raised regarding the Host Municipality Fund Allocation. These concerns include clarification of the definition of a "qualifying facility" and simplification of the formula used to allocate funds if there is more than one "qualifying facility" in the Commonwealth in a single year. These amendments are set forth in Annex A.

This proposal was adopted by the Board at its meeting of June 20, 2000.

A. Effective Date

These amendments will go into effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* as final rulemaking.

C. Statutory Authority

The proposed rulemaking is being made under the authority of sections 105, 402 and 501 of the Solid Waste Management Act (SWMA) (35 P. S. §§ 6018.105, 6018.402 and 6018.501); sections 303 and 305(e)(2) of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (HSCA) (35 P. S. §§ 6020.303 and 6020.305(e)(2)); sections 5, 402 and 501 of The Clean Streams Law (35 P. S. §§ 691.5, 691.402 and 691.501); and section 1920-A of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. §§ 510-20). Under sections 105, 402 and 501 of the SWMA, the Board has the power and duty to adopt rules and regulations concerning the storage, treatment, disposal and transportation of hazardous waste that are necessary to protect the public's health, safety, welfare and property, and the air, water and other natural resources of this Commonwealth. Sections 303 and 305(e)(2) of HSCA grant the Board the power and duty to promulgate regulations to carry out the provisions of that act and establish an allocation formula for one-time payments to host municipalities, respectively. Sections 5, 402 and 501 of The Clean Streams Law grant the Board the authority to adopt regulations that are necessary to protect the waters of this Commonwealth from pollution. Section 1920-A of The Administrative Code of 1929 grants the Board the authority to promulgate rules and regulations that are necessary for the proper work of the Department.

D. Background and Purpose

The Department is proposing to amend Chapters 260a and 269a to simplify and clarify the Host Municipality Fund Allocation. Section 305 of HSCA establishes a Host Municipalities Fund. The purpose of this Fund is to provide financial assistance to municipalities that host certain categories of commercial hazardous waste treatment, storage or disposal facilities. Section 305 of HSCA contemplates two distinct types of financial assistance. The first is reimbursement to a host municipality for, among other things, the costs of training and employing host municipality inspectors.

The second type of financial assistance is the focus of this proposed rulemaking. This assistance consists of a one-time payment to municipalities for each new or expanded commercial facility permitted after December 18, 1988 (the effective date of HSCA) which fulfills hazardous waste treatment or disposal capacity needs as identified in the Pennsylvania Hazardous Waste Facilities Plan. Only those municipalities that host a facility that meets the definition of a "qualifying facility" are eligible for this financial assistance.

There has been some confusion and contention over the interpretation of the term "qualifying facility." The term is currently defined in § 260a.10 (relating to definitions). The Department is proposing to modify the definition to clarify the term. The proposal breaks the definition into new and existing facilities. The definition of new facility is intended to clarify that the facility is newly permitted and not newly regulated. Examples of facilities that would not meet the proposed "qualifying facility" definition include an existing facility that now requires a permit because of a regulatory change or a facility that operated under interim status. The Department has consistently implemented the one-time payment program in this way since passage of HSCA in 1988, but there has been confusion in some host municipalities that the issuance of a permit to a facility that operated prior to 1988 caused that facility to be a newly permitted facility. The Department believes that this is consistent with the intent of the General Assembly in creating the Host Municipalities Fund in HSCA.

The definition of existing facility clarifies that an existing facility may qualify if a larger volume of hazardous waste is allowed through a permit modification. In addition, the proposal moves the definition to Chapter 269a since it is only used in that chapter and not generally in the hazardous waste regulations.

The proposal will modify the allocation formula for distribution of the one-time payment to remove the Hazardous Waste Site Ranking System (HRS) established by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in Appendix A of 40 CFR 300 (relating to uncontrolled hazardous waste site ranking system; a users manual) as a factor in determining the proper allocation when there is more than one qualifying facility in a year. This will result in a less costly determination, since an HRS report is expensive to prepare. It will also result in a more appropriate determination, since the HRS is designed to rank impacts from uncontrolled releases under CERCLA and not permitted facilities, which should have control of hazardous wastes.

The Solid Waste Advisory Committee (SWAC) reviewed the proposal at its March 9, 2000, meeting and recommended that the Board approve the proposed rulemaking

as written. A listing of the members of SWAC may be obtained from the contact persons listed in Section B of this Preamble.

E. Summary of Regulatory Requirements

Sections 260a.10 and 269a.1. Definitions.

The Board is proposing to move the definition of "qualifying facility" from § 260a.10 to the definitions section found in § 269a.1. The definition is expanded to address new and existing facilities in separate subsections. For existing facilities, the definition is clarified to apply to facilities that are authorized to accept a larger volume of hazardous waste through permit modification after December 18, 1988.

Section 269a.221. Allocation of the Fund.

The proposal modifies the allocation formula for the distribution of the one-time payment to replace the Hazardous Waste Ranking System established by EPA in Appendix A of 40 CFR 300 with a simpler, less costly and more appropriate method.

F. Benefits, Costs and Compliance

Executive Order 1996-1 requires a cost/benefit analysis of the proposed rulemaking.

Benefits

The proposed rulemaking will clarify the eligibility requirements for a host municipality to receive a one-time payment from the Host Municipalities Fund. This will reduce confusion and contention over the eligibility issue. In addition, it will modify the allocation formula on the distribution of the one-time payment to replace the EPA's HRS with a simpler, less costly and more appropriate method.

Compliance Costs

The proposed rulemaking is not expected to impose any additional costs on the regulated community, nor will it result in increased costs of implementation for the Commonwealth or local governments.

Compliance Assistance Plan

Because of the limited applicability of this proposed rulemaking, the Department will be able to specifically target compliance assistance and outreach efforts regarding one-time payments under the Host Municipalities Fund.

Paperwork Requirements

There will be no additional paperwork requirements as a result of the proposed amendment.

G. Sunset Review

These regulations will be reviewed in accordance with the sunset review schedule published by the Department to determine whether the regulations effectively fulfill the goals for which they were intended.

H. Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on September 5, 2000, the Department submitted a copy of the proposed amendments to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and the Chairpersons of the Senate and House Environmental Resources and Energy Committees. In addition to submitting the proposed amendments, the Department has provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a detailed regulatory analysis form prepared by the Department in compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, "Regu-

latory Review and Promulgation." A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, if IRRC has any objections to any portion of the proposed amendments, it will notify the Department within 10 days of the close of the Committees' review period. The notification shall specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met by that portion of the proposed amendments to which an objection is made. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review by the General Assembly and the Governor of objections raised by IRRC prior to final publication of the amendments by the Department.

CHAPTER 260a. HAZARDOUS WASTE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM: GENERAL

Subchapter B. DEFINITIONS

§ 260a.10. Definitions.

A term defined in this section replaces the definition of the term in 40 CFR 260.10, or, in situations for which no term exists in 40 CFR 260.10, the term shall be defined in accordance with this section. The substitution of terms in § 260a.3 (relating to terminology and citations related to Federal regulations) does not apply to the incorporated definition of "EPA region," "State," "United States," "Administrator" and "Regional Administrator."

* * * * *

[*Qualifying facility*—A commercial hazardous waste treatment or disposal facility, or expansion to an existing hazardous waste treatment or disposal facility, which was permitted after December 18, 1988, is operating, and fulfills the commercial hazardous waste treatment or disposal needs identified in the Pennsylvania Hazardous Waste Facilities Plan.]

CHAPTER 269a. SITING

Subchapter A. SITING HAZARDOUS WASTE TREATMENT AND DISPOSAL FACILITIES

GENERAL PROVISIONS

§ 269a.1. Definitions.

(a) The following words and terms, when used in this chapter, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

* * * * *

Qualifying facility—Is either:

(i) A new commercial hazardous waste treatment or disposal facility, which did not exist as a solid waste or recycling facility prior to December 18, 1988, that:

(A) Has been issued a written permit after December 18, 1988.

(B) Fulfills the hazardous waste treatment or disposal capacity needs identified in the hazardous waste facilities plan.

(C) Accepts hazardous waste under the conditions of the permit.

(ii) An existing permitted commercial hazardous waste treatment or disposal facility which was permitted before December 18, 1988, that:

(A) Has been issued a written modification to its permit to expand the facility after December 18, 1988.

(B) Fulfills the hazardous waste treatment or disposal capacity needs identified in the hazardous waste facilities plan.

(C) Accepts a larger volume of hazardous waste than was authorized in the permit prior to modification to expand the facility.

* * * * *

Subchapter C. HOST MUNICIPALITY FUND ALLOCATION

ALLOCATION

§ 269a.221. Allocation of the Fund.

* * * * *

(d) When more than one qualifying facility is identified, the Department will allocate the available moneys using the following [**formula and method of calculation**] criteria:

[(1) The Hazardous Waste Site Ranking System established by the EPA, under Appendix A of 40 CFR 300 (relating to uncontrolled hazardous waste site ranking system; a users manual) will be used to assign a numerical value to each qualifying facility ranging from 1 to 100, considering:

(i) The toxicity, mobility and other characteristics of the hazardous waste.

(ii) The proximity of the facility to persons or natural resources which would be endangered by the escape of the hazardous waste from the facility.

(2) For scoring purposes, an assigned value of 1 will be used for the observed release and containment factors in the hazard ranking system calculation.]

[(3)] (1) * * *

[(4)] (2) * * *

[(5)] (3) * * *

[(6)] (4) The numerical values derived in paragraphs (1)—[(5)] (3) will be [**multiplied**] **added** together to obtain a [**rating**] score for the qualifying facility.

[(7)] (5) The [**rating**] scores will then be compared and a pro rata share of the available Fund moneys will be allocated to the host [**municipality**] **municipality** based on these scores.

Exclusive Fishing Areas

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapter 65 (relating to special fishing regulations). The Commission is publishing this amendment as a notice of proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code). The proposed amendment relates to fishing.

A. *Effective Date*

The proposed amendment, if approved on final rulemaking, will go into effect upon publication of an order adopting the amendment in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

D. *Purpose and Background*

The proposed amendment is designed to update, modify and improve the Commission's fishing regulations. The specific purpose of the proposed amendment is described in more detail under the summary of proposal.

E. *Summary of Proposal*

The Commission has received a request to consider revising the definition of "special populations" in § 65.21 (relating to waters limited to specific purposes—exclusive fishing areas). Under current regulations, persons who are exempt from the fishing license requirement by section 2709(b) of the code (relating to exemptions from license requirements) or persons permanently deprived of the full use of a leg or both legs are permitted to fish in exclusive use fishing areas.

Section 2709(b) of the code requires that a person be "totally blind" to qualify for an exemption from the license requirements. The Commission received a request for regulations stating that although the requester agrees that this standard is appropriate for free fishing licenses, it is too restrictive for use of exclusive use fishing areas. This criterion excludes individuals who are "legally blind" but not "totally blind" from fishing in exclusive use areas. The requester points out that exclusive use areas often have characteristics that would make them better for persons whose vision meets State and Federal standards for legal blindness. For example, in his experience, exclusive use areas often are somewhat clearer of overhanging branches that pose a particular issue for persons with visual disabilities.

The Commission has reviewed other Commonwealth regulations, including those of the Department of Public Welfare and the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs. These regulations use a definition for "legal blindness" that would permit more people with vision disabilities to use the Commission's exclusive use areas. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to amend § 65.21(b) to read as set forth in Annex A.

F. *Paperwork*

The proposed amendment will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements.

G. *Fiscal Impact*

The proposed amendment will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The proposed amendment will impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public.

The term "special populations" means persons who are exempt from fishing license requirement by section 2709(b) of the code (relating to exemptions from license requirements), **persons whose visual acuity with best correcting lens is 3/60 or 10/200 or poorer in the better eye, persons whose vision is such that the widest diameter of the visual field of the better eye has contracted to such an extent that it subtends an angular distance of not greater than 20°** or persons permanently deprived of the full use of a leg or both legs.

D. *Purpose and Background*

The proposed amendments are designed to update, modify and improve the Commission's special boating regulations. The specific purpose of the proposed amendments is described in more detail under the summary of proposal. The Commission's Boating Advisory Board (Board) has considered the proposals and has recommended that the Commission approve the publication of a notice of proposed rulemaking containing the amendments.

E. *Summary of Proposal*

(1) *Sections 111.3, 111.20, 111.24, 111.26, 111.27, 111.32, 111.42, 111.43, 111.56, 111.62 and 111.65 (relating to Armstrong County; Crawford County; Elk County; Fayette County; Forest County; Indiana County; McKean County; Mercer County; Somerset County; Warren County; and Westmoreland County).* At a recent meeting, the Board recommended that the Commission adopt regulations to require the wearing of personal flotation devices by persons on board boats on Pittsburgh District Corps of Engineers lakes. The Corps of Engineers put this requirement in place in 1990 to address a concern it had with the safety of boaters in small boats. The Commission did not adopt concurrent regulations, thus leaving enforcement up to Corps of Engineers rangers. This disparity has caused some confusion for the boaters, although compliance has been high and enforcement has not been a significant problem. The Commission believes that incorporating these regulations will enhance public understanding and assist enforcement and compliance, thus improving safety. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to amend these sections to read as set forth in Annex A.

(2) *Sections 111.52 and 111.64 (relating to Pike County; and Wayne County).* During 1999, the Commission considered amendments to the regulations governing the operation of boats on the Upper Delaware Scenic and Recreational River that were intended to bring the regulations in substantial compliance with Federal regulations for enforcement purposes. The Commission adopted these changes at its September 1999 meeting. The Superintendent of the UDSRR has recently informed the Commission that the Interior Department has banned the operation of personal watercraft from all waters under the jurisdiction of the National Park Service. Consequently, the recently enacted regulations no longer are in conformance with the Federal requirements.

In a letter dated April 12, 2000, the Superintendent requested that the Commission further amend its regulations to ban the operation of personal watercraft from all Delaware River waters within the boundaries of the Upper Delaware Scenic and Recreational River. In the spirit of cooperation with the National Park Service, the Commission proposes to amend these sections to read as set forth in Annex A.

The proposed amendments will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The proposed amendments will impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public.

The ARYOG Program was created by the General Assembly through the passage of Act 33, effective August 6, 1991. The program is funded through the Rural Rehabilitation Corporation assets. Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the background standard, Statewide health standard, the site-specific standard, or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area, must file a Notice of

Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, or a combination of the cleanup standards, or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified as proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved, and comments, should be directed to the remediator of the site.

The Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (Department), under the authority of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (35 P. S. §§ 6020.101—6020.1304) (HSCA), is conducting a prompt interim response action at the Filmore Site (site). The site is located in Millcreek Township, Erie County, PA, between Filmore and the CSX railroad line. The site size is approximately 19.86 acres. The following materials, among others, were dumped, spilled, leaked, placed or otherwise "disposed" at the site: automobiles, automobile parts, automobile tires, scrap metal, empty drums, drum remnants, household wastes, demolition wastes, foundry wastes, containers of automobile paints; and other containers of industrial wastes. The major hazardous substance of concern at the site is lead.

For this prompt interim response, the Department divided the site into two operable units and considered response alternatives for both. Operable Unit 1 ("OU-1") consists of the contaminated surface soils, subsurface soils, wastes, surface water and sediment at the site. Operable Unit 2 ("OU-2") consists of the contaminated site groundwater.

The Department considered six alternatives for OU-1: 1) no action with institutional controls; 2) excavation and consolidation of soils, sediments and wastes containing hazardous substances under a soil cap at the site; 3) off-site disposal of hazardous wastes with excavation and consolidation of other wastes, sediments, and soils under a soil cap at the site; 4) excavation of contaminated wastes, sediments, and soils for soil washing followed by off-site disposal of a fraction and onsite disposal of the remaining fraction under a soil cap at the site; 5) onsite consolidation of contaminated wastes, sediments, and soils; in-situ solidification or stabilization and onsite disposal under a soil cap at the site; 6) excavation to a

depth of two feet and consolidation of contaminated wastes, sediments, and soils followed by onsite disposal under a soil cap at the site.

The Department considered four alternatives for OU-2: 1) no action with institutional controls; 2) installation of water treatment units on the affected, or potentially affected, potable wells; 3) tap-in to the local public water supply for the affected or potentially affected potable wells; 4) restoration of aquifer to groundwater standards using an active cutoff trench combined with the tap-in to the local public water supply.

Each alternative was evaluated with respect to four comparison criteria of: (1) the extent to which each alternative protects the public health and the environment; (2) the extent to which each alternative complies with or otherwise addresses Applicable or Relevant and Appropriate Requirements; (3) the extent to which each alternative is feasible, effective, implementable and permanent; and (4) the relative cost of each alternative. This comparative analysis evaluated the relative performance of each alternative in relation to each specific comparison criterion. The comparative analysis identified advantages and disadvantages of each alternative, so that tradeoffs between the alternatives could be determined.

Based on that comparative analysis, the Department proposes to implement Alternative 6 for OU-1 and Alternative 1 for OU-2 as the prompt interim responses for the site. These alternatives are proposed because they would, in the most cost-effective manner, protect the public and environmental receptors from direct contact with site-related hazardous substances, and eliminate the ongoing release and threat of release of hazardous substances into the environment.

This notice is being provided pursuant to Section 506(b) of HSCA. The administrative record, which contains the information that forms the basis and documents the selection of this response, is available for public review and comment. Technical Assistance Grants Through the Growing Greener Program

As part of the second year of the Department of Environmental Protection's (DEP's) Growing Greener Program, applications are now being accepted for technical assistance grants. The Environmental Stewardship and Watershed Protection Act authorizes the DEP to make grants available for technical assistance to eligible organizations involved in implementing watershed conservation efforts. These grants will meet the growing need for technical assistance from the increasing number of organizations interested in watershed protection.

Technical assistance grants will provide funding to local nonprofit organizations and other eligible Growing Greener grantees who, in turn, will provide needed technical assistance to watershed groups and others who are pursuing eligible Growing Greener activities. These technical assistance providers, through supporting other private and public watershed conservation organizations, will facilitate the use of Growing Greener grants as well as other resources.

Eligible applicants include: 1) counties, municipalities and municipal authorities; 2) county conservation districts; 3) watershed organizations recognized by DEP and established to promote local watershed conservation efforts in an identified watershed; 4) educational institutions and 5) other authorized organizations, including nonprofit entities involved in research, restoration, rehabilitation, planning, acquisition, development, education or other activities which further the protection, enhancement, conservation, preservation or enjoyment of Pennsylvania's environmental, conservation, recreation or similar resources.

The DEP is soliciting technical assistance in the following areas: 1) legal counsel; 2) data management; 3) program management; 4) engineering; and 5) scientific expertise. Technical assistance in one or more of these areas must be provided throughout at least one of Pennsylvania's three major river basins (Delaware, Susquehanna and Ohio). Proposals will be selected based on the applicant's ability to provide the needed types of technical assistance, to adequately cover at least an entire major river basin, to generate sustainable technical assistance, to provide assistance to most of the eligible environmental organizations in the applicable river basins, to provide assistance tailored specifically to the nature and scope of the work involved as well as other factors described in the detailed guidance that accompanies the application form. Detailed information on the types of technical assistance needed is provided in the application package.

The deadline for submitting technical assistance grant applications to the DEP Grants Center is November 17, 2000. A technical assistance grant workshop is planned at the Pennsylvania Watersheds/Growing Greener Conference on October 14, 2000, at the Penn Stater Conference Center in State College.

Environmental Quality Board Regulation No. 7-349 Licensing of Blasters and Storage, Handling and Use of Explosives

September 1, 2000

We submit for your consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) which have not been met. The Environmental Quality Board (EQB) must respond to these Comments when it submits the final-form regulation. If the final-form regulation is not delivered by August 2, 2002, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

1. Section 210.13. General.—Public safety and Clarity.

Subsection (b) states that certain individuals may be exempted from obtaining a blaster's license if they are detonating "extremely small amounts of explosives." What qualifies as "extremely small amounts of explosives"?

2. Section 210.14. Eligibility requirements.—Public safety and Clarity.

Subsection (b)(1) requires an applicant to be "of good moral character." It is unclear whether the applicant needs a character witness or whether an applicant who

has been convicted of a crime will be excluded. The EQB should clearly state the qualifications it will use to determine "good moral character."

Subsection (b) has a substantive typographical error. It states "the Department will not issue or renew a license unless the following conditions are met." (Emphasis added.) The second condition to be met in Paragraph (2) states the "applicant has demonstrated an inability or lack of intention to comply. . . ." Paragraph (2) should state that the "applicant has demonstrated an ability and intention to comply. . . ."

3. Section 210.15. License application.—Public safety and Clarity.

This section provides application requirements, but does not state how an applicant can obtain the application form. For clarity, this section should state where applications can be obtained.

Subsection (b) requires a notarized statement from the blaster who supervised the applicant, "or the applicant's employer." Given the broad range of employment situations, it is possible the applicant's employer may not have supervised the applicant. It is also possible the supervising blaster's employer could vouch for the applicant if the supervising blaster is no longer available.

The EQB should review this provision to ensure the notarized statement is from the person or organization with direct knowledge of the applicant's expertise.

Subsection (b)(1) requires a notarized statement which describes "how the applicant assisted in preparation of the blasts and for how long." Since there are different categories of blasting licenses, this subsection should also require a description of the types of materials that the applicant worked with.

4. Section 211.101. Definitions.—Public safety, Need and Clarity.

Blast site

"Blast site" is defined as "the area where the explosive charges are located." (Emphasis added.) The use of the term "area" could cause confusion with the defined term "blast area." For clarity, the definition of "blast site" should use another term such as "point(s)" instead of "area."

Building

The term "building" is used throughout Chapter 211. For example, Section 211.124(a)(14) requires the blasting activity permit application to include the distance and direction to the nearest building. In the definition of "building," use of the phrase "regularly occupied" raises three questions.

First, whether a building is occupied only matters if the building is occupied when the explosives are detonated. Why is the frequency of occupation relevant?

Second, since property must be protected, why doesn't the definition of "building" include unoccupied buildings?

Finally, assuming "regularly occupied" remains in the definition, what criteria would the blaster use to actually determine if a structure is "regularly occupied"?

5. Section 211.121. General requirements.—Clarity.

Subsection (d) states "a permit will not be issued unless the application is complete and demonstrates that the proposed activities comply with the applicable requirements of this chapter." If the EQB determines an application is incomplete, will it notify the applicant? In addition,

can the applicant amend the application to provide the necessary information or materials to complete the application? If so, the regulation should indicate that the EQB will notify applicants of an incomplete application and identify the missing items necessary to complete the application.

6. Section 211.124. Blasting activity permits.—Clarity.

Subsection (a)(17) requires a permit application to include proof that residents within 200 feet of the blast site were informed of the proposed blasting operation. This notification could be "personal notification, written material left at each residence or first class mail." We have two questions. What constitutes proof of notification? In situations involving rental units or business properties, should the blaster notify the current tenants or property owner?

7. Section 211.133. Blast report.—Need and Clarity.

Subsection (a) has a typographical error. It requires the blaster-in-charge to prepare a report of "each blast report." (Emphasis added.) This phrase should read "each blast" rather than "each blast report."

Subsection (a) includes the sentence: "The Department may develop and require a blast report form to be used." (Emphasis added.) How and when will licensees and permittees be notified that the EQB has opted to require a report form? How and where will people obtain copies of the form?

One provision in Subsection (a)(23) goes into effect in three years and requires monitoring records to be made part of the report within seven days of the blast. A commentator notes that some blasters have to collect data from a number of monitoring points from varied locations and suggests that 14 days would be more reasonable. The EQB should consider allowing 14 days or explain why seven days is sufficient time for collection of the required data.

Subsection (a)(24) states the report will include "the actions taken to make a site safe" if a misfire occurred. For clarity, Subsection 211.133(a)(24) should reference the appropriate actions to take when there is a misfire listed in Subsection 211.157(e).

Subsection (b) states the Department "may" require monthly summaries. The EQB should explain the necessity for monthly summaries, the circumstances when monthly summaries would be required and how the blaster will be notified.

8. Section 211.141. General requirements.—Reasonableness and Clarity.

Subsection (11)(i) and (ii) establish requirements for fire extinguishers based on vehicle weight. These provisions should be consistent with the requirements of the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation.

Subsection (12) requires explosives to be loaded into a vehicle so that the "explosives containers are not exposed to sparks or hot gases from the exhaust tailpipe." This subsection further recommends the use of exhaust systems that discharge upwards to avoid possible exposures of the explosives to sparks or hot gases. If the explosive containers are loaded onto the bed of a truck, how will an upward exhaust discharge protect the containers from exposure to sparks?

9. Section 211.151. Prevention of damage.—Reasonableness and Clarity.

Subsection (b) states:

Blasting may not cause flyrock. If flyrock occurs, the blaster-in-charge shall notify the Department within 4 hours of learning of the flyrock.

Commentators believe flyrock is so common that blasters will be required to notify the Department after every blast. Is this the EQB's intent? If the goal is to prevent flyrock from being ejected from the blast area, the regulation should be amended to clarify this objective.

Subsection (c) requires a blast to achieve either a scaled distance of 90 or the maximum peak velocity as indicated in Figure 1. One commentator believes these standards may be too restrictive when applied to unconsolidated materials in the vicinity of a blast. Should geologic variations be considered in the determination of vibration limits?

10. Section 211.154. Preparing the blast.—Clarity.

Subsection (b) allows the EQB to establish a different distance limitation. The EQB should explain the necessity for this provision. The regulation should provide information regarding the circumstances for which the EQB would establish a different distance limitation and how the blaster will be notified.

Subsection (c) states a "person may not prepare or detonate a blast unless another person is present. . . ." However, Section 211.156(b) states that only the "blaster-in-charge may detonate a blast." Further Subsection (e) states that "only the blaster-in-charge, other blasters, and up to six assistants per blaster may be at a blast site. . . ." To make these subsections consistent, the first reference to the term "person" in Subsection (c) should be changed to "blaster-in charge." The second reference to "person" in Subsection (c) should be changed to "blaster or assistant" to be consistent with Subsection (e).

Subsection (f)(2) states that sectional poles connected by brass fittings are permitted, if only the wooden end of the pole is used for tamping. The reference to the "wooden end" of the pole should be changed to the "nonsparking material end" of the pole.

Subsection (f)(4) requires blast holes to be checked for obstruction with a wooden tamping pole. Consistent with the previous comment, the reference to the "wooden" tamping pole should be replaced with "a tamping pole made of nonsparking material."

Subsection (f)(7) states the EQB may specify the type and amount of stemming. The EQB should explain the necessity for this provision. The regulation should provide information regarding the circumstances for which the EQB would establish a different limitation for stemming and how the blaster will be notified.

11. Section 211.171. General provisions for monitoring.—Reasonableness and Clarity.

Subsection (d) states monitoring instruments with variable "trigger levels" are to set the trigger for ground vibration at a particle velocity of no more than 50% of the compliance limit. However, commentators indicate that this subsection could require a setting as low as 0.1, which could be triggered by traffic activity. The commentators recommend that the trigger be set at "50% of the conservative compliance level of 0.5 inches per second (0.25)." The EQB should consider establishing a more reasonable minimum setting that would not be triggered by traffic activity.

Subsection (e) requires a printout from the instrumentation. There are two issues. Commentators note that older model and brick seismographs do not provide a date and time indicating when the instrument was turned on and off. The EQB should consider adding language, which would allow a blaster to manually supply the on/off times for these instruments. Further the EQB should consider including a 3-year phase-in period in this section to be consistent with the requirement for blast reporting equipment in Section 211.133(a)(23).

12. Section 211.173. Monitoring records.—Need and Clarity.

Subsection (c) states:

The Department may require a ground vibration or airblast recording to be analyzed or certified by an independent qualified consultant who is not related to the blasting activity permittee or its customer.

Under what circumstances would the EQB require this type of analysis or certification? The EQB should explain the need for this provision. The regulation should provide information regarding the circumstances when it may require this type of analysis and how the blaster will be notified.

13. Section 211.182. General provisions.—Clarity.

Subsection (c) establishes limits for blasting within 200 feet of a utility line. This would apply to all blasting regardless of whether the permittee is also the owner of the utility line. The EQB should consider exempting the owners of the utility line from this requirement.

The EQB should also consider revising the language to allow blasting to accommodate "other measures, as approved by the Department and agreed to by the utility" to permit some flexibility for blasting in the vicinity of utility lines.

The Keystone Health Plan West factor would apply to the approved association pooled rate methodology, and is proposed at 51%.
