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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the Pennsylvania Bulletin

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylva*nia Code. The *Pennsylvania* Code is available at www.pacode.com.

Source Notes give the history of regulations. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylvania Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state. pa.us/cfdocs/legis/CH/Public/pcde_index.cfm.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is available at www.pabulletin.com.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised. A fiscal note provides the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the 5 succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

PART VII. ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE OF PENNSYLVANIA COURTS

CHAPTER 215. [SPECIAL INDEPENDENT PROSECUTORS PANEL] (Reserved)

§ 215.1. [Special Independent Prosecutor's Panel] (Reserved).

[(a) Under 18 Pa.C.S. § 9311(a) (relating to selection of special independent prosecutor's panel), the Court Administrator of Pennsylvania is required to determine and supervise the procedure for selecting members of the panel.

(b) In accordance with 18 Pa.C.S. § 9311(a), a panel composed of one judge of the Commonwealth Court and two judges of the Courts of Common Pleas were chosen at random. The judges selected were: the Honorable Rochelle S. Friedman of Commonwealth Court, the Honorable Paul W. Tressler of Montgomery County Court of Common Pleas, and the Honorable Donald E. Machen of Allegheny County Court of Common Pleas.

(c) In accordance with § 9319(a), the Special Independent Prosecutor's Panel appointed Anthony M. Mariani, Esquire as independent counsel on February 4, 1999.

(d) In accordance with § 9319(a), the Special Independent Prosecutor's Panel appointed Anthony M. Mariani, Esquire as independent counsel on June 25, 1999 in an additional matter docketed at 1 I.C. 1998.

(e) In accordance with § 9319(a), the Special Independent Prosecutor's Panel appointed William F. Manifesto, Esquire as independent counsel on July 21, 1999 in a matter docketed at 1 I.C. 1999.

(f) Upon consideration of the Application for Appointment of Independent Counsel filed by Robert J. DeSousa, Esquire, Special Investigative Counsel for Preliminary Investigation No. 1 of 2000, the Application is granted and Carol A. Sweeney, Es-

quire is appointed as Independent Counsel pursuant to Section 9315(a)(2) of the Independent Counsel Authorization Act, Act of February 18, 1998, P.L. 24, No. 19.]

As required by Pa.R.J.A. 103(d)(6) one certified copy of this Administrative Order and following forms shall be filed with the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts, shall be published on the website of the First Judicial District at http://courts.phila.gov, and shall be incorporated in the compiled set of local rules no later than 30 days following publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Copies of the Administrative Order and following forms shall also be published in *The Legal Intel*- *ligencer* and will be submitted to American Lawyer Media, Jenkins Memorial Law Library, and the Law Library for the First Judicial District.

If you are represented by a lawyer, it is not necessary for you to call the information line. However, you and your attorney are responsible to communicate with the lender in advance of the conciliation conference.

To obtain admission to the Consumer Credit/Residential Mortgage Foreclosure Diversion Program, you or your attorney must complete a Request For Conciliation Conference form as provided at Butler County Local Rule L-1143(b), file the same with the Prothonotary, and serve a copy of said Request, by mail to the Plaintiff's address set forth below.

(c) Upon receipt of the Request for Conciliation Conference, the Court Administrator shall issue a case management order. Conciliation conferences shall be scheduled and conducted in conformity with Butler County Local Rule of Civil Procedure L-11431.1, et seq.

(d) Service of process.

Rule L1302. List of Arbitrators. Appointment to Board.

(a) The Prothonotary of Butler County shall compile and maintain a list of persons eligible and willing to serve as arbitrators. This list shall be comprised of members of the bar actively engaged in the practice of law primarily in Butler County. "Actively engaged in the practice of law primarily in Butler County" is defined as attorneys who regularly maintain an office in Butler County for the practice of law. Persons who have been determined to be eligible shall file a written consent to serve as an arbitrator with the Prothonotary. Arbitrators shall be selected by the Prothonotary from those persons who have filed their consents to serve.

(b) If an arbitrator is not able to serve on his or her appointed date, said arbitrator shall secure a replacement arbitrator from the list of attorneys who have consented to serve. Said arbitrator shall notify Court Administration and the Prothonotary of the replacement. The Prothonotary shall appoint said substitute attorney to replace arbitrator. Should a vacancy on the board of arbitrators occur prior to the hearing for any reason, or should a member of the board fail to attend the hearing, a member of the board shall notify the Prothonotary who shall immediately vacate that appointment and make an appointment to fill that vacancy. Should a vacancy on the board of arbitrators occur after the hearing takes place, but before an award is signed by all arbitrators, or should a member of the board fail to or refuse to perform his or her duties, the award shall be signed and filed by the remaining members of the board. If the remaining members of the board are unable to agree, they shall notify the Prothonotary who shall appoint a third member. Thereafter the Court Administrator shall schedule a re-hearing for the new board, which shall thereafter file an award.

(c) The board shall be chaired by a member of the bar admitted to the practice of law for at least ten (10) years. Other members of the panel must have been admitted to the bar.

(d) Each member of the board of arbitrators who has been duly sworn to hear a case shall receive as compensation a fee in the amount set by the court from time to time by administrative order. In cases requiring hearings that exceed one

half (1/2) day, the arbitrators may petition the court for additional compensation, which the court may grant for cause shown. The arbitrators shall be entitled to receive their compensation fees as follows:

(1) Following hearing, after filing the award with the Prothonotary as per Butler County L.R.C.P. L1306; or

(2) If a continuance is requested after the date of posting of a hearing time for the case as per Butler County L.R.C.P. L1303(d), the arbitrators shall be paid from the funds paid by the continuing party as per Butler County L.R.C.P. L1304; or

(3) If a case settles after the posting of a hearing time for the case as per Butler County L.R.C.P. L1303(d), but before the scheduled arbitration hearing, the arbitrators shall be paid by the county as per administrative order under Local Rule L1302(d) upon Order of Court that directs payment in the case.

(a) When counsel agree upon terms for settlement, they shall notify the Court, in writing, as soon as possible such that the case can be removed from the Arbitration hearing list. Any case that is removed from the list after posting of the time for arbitration under Local Rule L1303(d) which does not settle of record, shall not be re-listed for Arbitration unless the arbitrators fees paid to the original Arbitration panel as per Local Rule L1303(e) are reimbursed to the County by counsel for the parties.

Compensation fees paid to arbitrators shall not be taxed as costs or follow the award as other costs.

(e) Upon the filing of the arbitrators' award, discontinuance by the parties after the swearing of the arbitrators, Order of Court continuing the case after posting of a hearing time as per Butler County L.R.C.P. 1303(d)(2), Order of Court removing the case from Arbitration based upon settlement of the case of record as per Butler County L.R.C.P. Rule 205.4. Electronic Filing and Service of Legal Papers.

A. "Electronic Service" (e-service) means the electronic transmission of documents to a party, attorney or repre-

sentative under these rules. Electronic service does not include service of process or summons to gain jurisdiction over persons or property.

1. Civil Actions filed in the Court of Common Pleas of Lancaster County may be filed by electronic filing or eFiling. Also, parties may electronically serve other Advanced File & Serve registered users of the system.

2. *Registration.* Any person intending to use eFile must register with File and Serve Express (FileandServeXpress. com).

B. Form of Documents Electronically Filed.

1. *Format.* To the extent practicable it shall be formatted in accordance with the applicable rules governing formatting of paper documents, and in such other and further format as the Court may require from time to time. A document may exceed page limitation rules to a maximum of two (2) additional pages when the additional pages are attributed to the electronic conversion of filing process. The eFile system will automatically convert any filing to PDF format, but the original format will be available for downloading. The official record of the court is the PDF version.

2. *Title of Documents*. The title of each electronically filed document shall include: (1) Party or parties filing the document; (2) Descriptive title of the document; (3) Party or parties against whom relief, if any, is sought, and (4) Nature of the relief sought (e.g. Defendant ABC Corporation's Motion for Summary Judgment Against Plaintiff Jones).

3. Signature.

a. Each electronically filed document shall be deemed to have been signed by the attorney or party represented by an attorney authorizing such filing and shall bear a facsimile or typographical signature of such person, e.g. "/s/Adam Attorney". Each document eFiled by an attorney shall also include the typed name, address, and telephone number of the attorney or unrepresented party filing such document. Attorneys shall include their Pennsylvania bar number. Each electronically filed declaration and affidavit shall be deemed to have been signed by the declarant or affiant if an attorney or party not represented by an attorney has authorized such filing. Documents containing signatures of third-parties (i.e., unopposed motions, affidavits, stipulations, etc.) may also be filed electronically by indicating in the original signatures are maintained by the filing party in paper-format.

b. The electronic filing of a legal paper constitutes a certification by the filing party that the original hard copy was properly signed and, where applicable, verified; and a certification as provided by the signature to a legal paper under Pa.R.C.P. 1023(b), the violation of which shall be subject to the sanction provided in Pa.R.C.P. 1023(c). The filing party shall maintain the original hard copy of the document filed. Any other party at any time may require the filing party to file the original hard copy by filing with the Prothonotary and serving upon the filing party a notice to file the original hard copy with the Prothonotary within fourteen days of the filing of the notice.

4. Filing Related Documents.

a. Pleadings seeking judicial action such as Proposed Orders shall be filed separately.

b. Documents may be filed in electronic form, except that paper copies of any legal paper required by court rule or statute to be in paper form shall also be filed in

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the form required. In the case of original process filed to commence an action, the filing party shall provide a sufficient number of paper copies of an electronically filed document in order to permit service by the Sheriff.

C. Public Access to the Docket.

1. The Prothonotary shall make a Public Access Terminal available to the general public to allow access to the Court's electronic case record in all eFiled cases. Copies made from the Court's electronic case records system shall be printed by the Prothonotary and copying fees will be charged in accordance with the Prothonotary's usual fee schedule.

D. Filing Fees.

1. Filing fees will be billed by File and Serve Express using the billing arrangements established through the File and Serve Express registration process.

2. Filing fees billed by File and Serve Express shall include Prothonotary's statutory filing fees.

E. Sealed Documents.

1. Documents intended to be filed under seal shall be designated by the filing party as "sealed" in the eFile system.

2. The filing details and document title will appear in the eFile system. The document can be viewed only by the Court, the Prothonotary staff, the filer, and those case participants who received service of that particular document. A party that was not served with the document can see only the document title in the case details, however, that party is not able to open or view the document.

F. Time of eFiling and eService

1. Any document filed electronically by 11:59 p.m. ET shall be considered eFiled with the court once the transmission is successfully completed ("authorized date and time") as recorded on the File and Serve Express System.

2. Delivery of e-service documents through File and Serve to other registered users shall be considered as valid and effective service and shall have the same legal effect as an original paper document. file a Notice of Extension of Briefing Schedule setting forth the agreed upon extension. The motion(s) at issue will be sent to the assigned judge for disposition upon completion of the agreed upon briefing schedule or by praecipe of any party.

B. *Oral Argument*. Any party may request oral argument by filing a practice at the time a brief is filed pursuant to Local Rule 208.3(b)A., B., or C.

C. *Emergency Motions*. Emergency motions must be presented to the assigned judge, or in the assigned judge's absence the business judge who will advise the parties how to proceed.

2. *Stipulated Matters.* If the parties agree to the relief sought, the preliminary objections shall be accompanied by a stipulation signed by all affected counsel or unrepresented parties, a proposed order and a praecipe to assign the stipulated matter for disposition.

3. *Brief.* The party filing preliminary objections shall file a supporting brief within ten days of the date of filing of the preliminary objections. If a supporting brief is not filed within ten days of the filing of the preliminary objections, the preliminary objections shall be deemed withdrawn upon praceipe of the respondent. In that event, the objecting party shall file an answer to the complaint within twenty days of the date the praceipe is filed.

4. *Responsive Brief.* If a supporting brief is filed, the respondent shall file a responsive brief within twenty days after service of the supporting brief.

5. *Reply Brief.* The moving party may file a reply brief within five days after service of the responsive brief.

6. Assignment. After all briefs are filed the Prothonotary shall deliver the file to the assigned judge for disposition.

7. Oral Argument. Any party may request oral argument by filing a praceipe at the time of the filing of their brief. Oral argument shall be at the discretion of the judge.

B. Preliminary Objections Pursuant to Pa.R.C.P. No. 1028(a)(1), (5) or (6).

C. If the parties agree to extend the briefing schedule, the parties shall file a Notice of Extension of Briefing Schedule setting forth the agreed upon extension. This final-form rulemaking will be effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The increased biennial renewal fee will be implemented with the September 30, 2017, biennial renewal.

Statutory Authority

Section 9(a) of the Engineer, Land Surveyor and Geologist Registration Law (act) (63 P.S. § 156(a)) requires the Board to increase fees by regulation to meet or exceed projected expenditures if the revenues raised by fees, fines and civil penalties are not sufficient to meet expenditures over a 2-year period.

Description and Need for this Final-Form Rulemaking

Under section 9 of the act, the Board is required by law to support its operations from the revenue it generates from fees, fines and civil penalties. In addition, the act provides that the Board shall increase fees if the revenue raised by fees, fines and civil penalties is not sufficient to meet expenditures over a 2-year period. The Board raises the majority of its revenue through biennial renewal fees. A small percentage of its revenue comes from other fees, fines and civil penalties. If fees are inadequate to meet the minimum enforcement efforts required, section 9(b) of the act requires the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (Bureau), after consultation with the Board, to increase the fees so that adequate revenues are raised to meet the required enforcement effort.

At the Board's meeting on March 12, 2014, representatives from the Department of State's (Department) Bureau of Finance and Operations (BFO) presented a summary of the Board's actual revenue and expenses for FY (FY) 2006-2007 through FY 2012-2013 and projected revenue and expenses through FY 2026-2027. At the end of FY 2012-2013 (a nonrenewal year), the Board accrued a deficit of approximately 660,000. The BFO projected that, without an increase in the renewal fee, at the end of FY 2016-2017 (a nonrenewal year) the accumulated deficit would swell to approximately \$2.27 million and would continue to grow thereafter. The BFO projected that the Board's biennial expenses would increase from a total of \$2.704 million in FY 2013-2014 and FY 2014-2015 to \$3.228 million in FY 2020-2021 and FY 2021-2022. With approximately 32,200 licensees at that time, the BFO projected that these expenses would increase from \$85 to over \$100 per licensee per biennium. Therefore, the Board determined that it was necessary to raise fees to meet or

exceed projected expenditures in compliance with section 9(a) of the act. As a result, the Board voted at its March 12, 2014, meeting to propose increasing the biennial renewal fees from \$50 to \$100. Three years later, the BFO now projects that the accumulated deficit at the end of FY 2016-2017 will be \$1,187,926, with an operating deficit of \$617,140 in the 2015—2017 biennium. The BFO further projects that, without an increase in the renewal fee, the operating deficit will be \$687,000 in FY 2017-2018 and FY 2018-2019 and continue to increase to \$1.426 million by FY 2025-2026 and FY 2026-2027, adding to the accumulated deficit. Without the increase, the BFO projects that the accumulated deficit will soar to \$6,416,926 by the end of FY 2026-2027.

Summary of Comments to the Proposed Rulemaking and the Board's Response

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 45 Pa.B. 2368 (May 16, 2015), with a 30-day public comment period. The Board received public comments from the following licensees: Bill Adams, PG, PE; Gregg A. Davis, PLS; Lee Geisler, PLS; Mark B. Ioos, PG, on behalf of the Pennsylvania Council of Professional Geologists; James Mulry, PG; Michael Napolitan, PG; Kevin R. Sech, PG, PE; Timothy M. Stahl, PE; Robert O. Taylor, II, PE; and David H. Widmer, PLS. The Board received comments from the House Professional Licensure Committee (HPLC) and the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC). The Board did not receive comments from the Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee (SCP/PLC).

The licensees who commented objected to an increase in the renewal fee. Many licensees pointed out that the increased renewal fee is in addition to the recently imposed cost to comply with mandatory continuing education.

Some commentators suggested that a licensee who holds multiple licenses should pay a lower renewal fee for the second license and an even lower renewal fee for a third license. For congruency, the Board has never charged differing renewal fees, whether based upon the type of license or the number of licenses held. In addition to the greater difficulty of administration, varying the fees would require the Board to weigh the relative value of each license; the Board will not perform this task. Regardless of the number of licenses held, each license authorizes the holder to practice that profession without limitation other than the holder's proficiency. A licensee who qualifies for and chooses to hold an additional license receives that same full authorization as a licensee who holds only the single license. Were the Board to authorize a lesser renewal fee based upon the classification of the license or the number of licenses held, that would reduce the amount of revenue and require the Board to increase the renewal fees elsewhere to meet expenses.

A commentator suggested that the Board assess a renewal fee on engineers-in-training (and presumably the surveyors-in-training and geologists-in-training) who are not currently assessed a renewal fee. Under sections 4.2(b)(3), 4.3(b)(2) and 4.4(d) of the act (63 P.S. §§ 151.2(b)(3), 151.3(b)(2) and 151.4(d)), after completing the required education or experience instead of education and passing the fundamentals examination, a candidate for licensure receives the "in-training" certificate that is valid without time limitation until the individual becomes licensed. The issuance of the "in-training" certificate does

nothing more than act as the starting point for calculating the years of "progressive experience" required for licensure, and the Board does not renew this certification. The holder of an "in-training" certificate is receiving no authorization or other license from the Board and thus should not be expected to share in the overall cost of operating the Board, other than payment of the costs of processing the application for the "in-training" certificate.

A commentator pointed out that paying any increased renewal fee is more difficult for those licensees who have retired. However, a licensee who is retired and not practicing need not renew and is not required to complete continuing education. A retired licensee who wishes only to hold himself out as a retired licensee may take active-retired status under section 4.5(g)(1)(iii) of the act (63 P.S. § 151.5(g)(1)(iii)) and pay the renewal fee, but is exempt from the continuing education requirement.

Almost all of the public commentators suggested that the Board should first take steps to reduce its costs before considering an increase in the renewal fee. As discussed as follows, the vast majority of the Board's costs are for the labor of the Department employees who process applications and other paperwork in the Board's office, investigate complaints against licensees, prosecute those complaints or perform other legal services on behalf of the Board. The Board relies upon Department managers to assure that those employees charging time to the Board are actually performing those services, the services are necessary and the services are efficiently provided.

Some public commentators suggested increasing revenue through civil penalties, essentially putting more of the burden on those who create the need for investigation, prosecution and adjudication of violations of the act. Civil penalties are not levied as a revenue source; these financial disincentives are designed to deter the respondent licensee and others from committing violations. After years of being limited to a maximum civil penalty of \$1,000, by the act of July 17, 2009 (P.L. 95, No. 25), the General Assembly authorized the Board and other licensing boards within the Bureau to levy civil penalties of up to \$10,000 per violation. See section 5(b)(4) of the act of July 2, 1993 (P.L. 345, No. 48) (Act 48) (63 P.S. § 2205(b)(4)). Yet, the civil penalty imposed in any given case must be designed for its deterrent effect and not simply to raise funds. Under section 5(b)(5) of Act 48, the General Assembly authorized boards in the Bureau to assess the costs of investigation against a respondent who has violated a law. The Board has recently seen an increase in revenue from civil penalties and costs of investigation, although it is not enough to avoid a renewal fee increase. It is worth noting that an increase in the number of complaints would be expected to increase the Board's costs in investigating, prosecuting and adjudicating those complaints prior to an increased revenue from assessed civil penalties or costs is realized.

A public commentator suggested that the number of licensed professional land surveyors is decreasing, and spreading the same amount of costs over fewer licensees would result in a larger renewal fee even though, with fewer licensees, there should be reduced costs of regulation. The number of Board licensees has actually increased slightly in all three classes from FY 2013-2014 through FY 2016-2017, as follows:

A public commentator suggested that the Board's renewal fee should be kept comparable to the registration fees for a professional engineer in Ohio of \$40 per year and in Maryland of \$76 per 2 years. The biennial registration renewal fee in Delaware is \$50 for professional engineers. The biennial registration fee for professional engineers and professional land surveyors in New Jersey is \$80 (\$40 if retired). In addition to the mandatory continuing education fee of \$45, in New York the triennial renewal fee is \$210 for a professional engineer and \$210 for a professional land surveyor. The registration fee in West Virginia is \$70 biennially for professional engineers (\$30 if retired) and \$100 annually for professional land surveyors. The \$100 biennial renewal fee charged by the Board in this final-form rulemaking is not out of line with the fees charged in the surrounding states.

The HPLC requested that the Board provide the following information: major cost centers of the Board and any significant increases in its expenditures; actual revenue and expense numbers for FY 2013-2014 and an updated projection for FY 2014-2015; and any other measures the Board has considered that would help reduce the projected deficits, either reduction in expenses or increase in other forms of revenue. IRRC also asked the Board to provide more detailed information in the final-form rulemaking to support the need for the increased fee.

The cost centers of the Board fall into two broad categories—administrative costs and legal costs. Administrative costs include those associated with Board administration, the Commissioner of Professional and Occupational Affairs' (Commissioner) office, the Revenue office and Departmental services (human resources, finance and operations, management information systems, press office, Legislative and policy offices, Secretary of the Commonwealth and deputies, and office of chief counsel). Legal costs include those costs associated with the legal office (prosecution division, Board counsel and services of experts), the Office of Hearing Examiners, the Professional Compliance Office and the Bureau of Enforcement and Investigation (BEI).

The largest cost center for the Board has historically been Board administration, which includes costs associated with the Board's administrative staff, printing and mailing, publications, supplies, operating and fixed assets, and so forth. Board administration costs tend to fluctuate depending on whether a given year is a renewal year or not, as more administrative staff and resources are dedicated to the Board during a renewal year. This cost center has ranged from a low of \$315,529 during FY 2008-2009, a nonrenewal year, to a high of \$682,939 in FY 2015-2016, a renewal year. The expenses of this cost center have averaged approximately \$499,126 per year from FY 2007-2008 through FY 2015-2016. During this time frame, this cost center has accounted for 43% of the Board's expenses.

The second largest cost center for the Board is the legal office, which includes personnel-related costs for Board counsel, prosecuting attorneys, regulatory counsel and legal support staff. It also includes direct charges such as expert witness fees and costs associated with legal notices published on behalf of the Board. Legal office costs are also dependent to a large degree on the number of complaints that are filed, investigated and prosecuted. However, it also includes costs associated with the Board's counsel and regulatory counsel, which tend to remain fairly constant unless there are significant special projects. For example, in FY 2010-2011 and FY 2011-2012, counsel prepared a final-form rulemaking to implement required continuing education, and in FY 2012-2013 and FY 2013-2014 counsel researched and prepared exposure drafts and a proposed rulemaking to address use of electronic seals and signatures. This cost center has ranged from a low of \$124,760 in FY 2008-2009 to a high of \$399,643 in FY 2013-2014, with an average cost of \$254,527 per year from FY 2007-2008 through FY 2015-2016. During this time frame, this cost center has accounted for 22% of the Board's expenses.

Another large cost center for the Board is the BEI, ranging from a low of \$78,930 in FY 2015-2016 to a high of \$157,791 in FY 2009-2010, with an average of \$129,277 from FY 2007-2008 through FY 2015-2016. These are the costs associated with investigatory services provided by the BEI to the Board and are entirely dependent upon how many complaints are filed, and how many of those complaints merit investigation. It is difficult to predict how many complaints may be filed in a given year, and historically the numbers have fluctuated dramatically, ranging from a low of 59 in FY 2004-2005 to a high of 326 in FY 2012-2013, with an average of 187 each year from FY 2012-2016, this cost center has accounted for 11% of the Board's expenses.

These three cost centers made up 76% of the Board's total expenses from FY 2007-2008 through FY 2015-2016. The remaining cost centers (Commissioner's office, Revenue office, Departmental services, Office of Hearing Examiners, Professional Compliance Office and Board members) comprise the remaining 24%.

In response to IRRC's request for updated financial information as the basis for the fee increase, the Board attached information prepared by the BFO to the Regulatory Analysis Form for this final-form rulemaking. This detailed information is also available upon request. The BFO reports that the Board's actual expenses were \$1,394,146 in FY 2013-2014 and \$1,227,117 in FY 2014-2015. The BFO also reports that the Board's actual revenue was \$1,787,824 in FY 2013-2014 and \$228,467 in FY 2014-2015, resulting in a biennial deficit of \$664,972. The BFO further reports that the Board's actual expenses were \$1,366,832 in FY 2015-2016 and are projected to be \$1,284,000 in FY 2016-2017 and that its actual revenue was \$1,809,692 in FY 2015-2016 and is projected to be \$224,000 in FY 2016-2017, resulting in a projected biennial operating deficit of \$617,140.

By increasing the renewal fee to \$100 beginning with the 2017—2019 biennium, the BFO projects that, following an additional operating deficit in the 2015—2017 biennium, there will be an operating surplus of \$1.022 million in the 2017—2019 biennium that will be used to recoup part of the accumulated deficit. Based upon the BFO's projections, the biennial renewal fee in this finalform rulemaking should be sufficient to recover the accumulated deficit by the end of FY 2021-2022. The BFO further projects that the amount of the operating surplus each biennium will continue to decrease as follows: \$853,000 in the 2019—2021 biennium; \$674,000 in the 2021—2023 biennium; \$484,000 in the 2023—2025 biennium; and \$283,000 by the 2025—2027 biennium. Expenditures are expected to outpace revenues and become an operating deficit during the 2027—2029 biennium or shortly thereafter. At that time, if these projections hold, the Board will be required to again evaluate the need for a fee increase.

Fiscal Impact

The increased biennial renewal fee will impact licensees of the Board. There are currently approximately 29,937 licensed professional engineers, 1,966 licensed professional land surveyors and 2,282 licensed professional geologists, a total of approximately 34,185 licensees who all will be required to pay more to renew their licenses in 2017 and thereafter. The vast majority of licensees are considered to be working for small businesses. This final-form rulemaking will have no other adverse fiscal impact on the private sector, the general public, or the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions.

Paperwork Requirements

This final-form rulemaking will require the Board to alter some of its forms to reflect the new renewal fee. However, this final-form rulemaking will not impose additional paperwork requirements upon the Commonwealth, political subdivisions, the regulated community or the private sector.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on May 4, 2015, the Board submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 45 Pa.B. 2368, to IRRC and the Chairpersons of the HPLC and the SCP/PLC for review and comment.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, the Board shall submit to IRRC, the HPLC and the SCP/PLC copies of comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. In preparing the final-form rulemaking, the Board has considered all comments from IRRC, the HPLC and the public.

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(j.2)), on August 23, 2017, the final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the HPLC and the SCP/PLC. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on August 24, 2017, and approved the final-form rulemaking.

Order

The Board, acting under the act, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Board, 49 Pa. Code Chapter 37, are amended by amending § 37.17 to read as set forth in Annex A.

(b) The Board shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General and the Office of General Counsel for approval as required by law.

(c) The Board shall submit this order and Annex A to IRRC, the HPLC and the SCP/PLC as required by law.

(d) The Board shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(e) This final-form rulemaking shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR LICENSURE

§ 37.17. Schedule of fees.

(a) *Renewal fee*. The Board will charge the following renewal fee:

Certification, licensure or registration\$50
Temporary permit\$25
(c) Other fees. The Board will charge the following fees:

(d) *Fees to testing organizations*. Examination fees for state-specific examinations are established by agreement between the Commonwealth and the third-party testing

organizations that develop, administer and grade the examinations. Examination fees for the National examinations are established by NCEES or ASBOG. Examination candidates shall pay the required examination fees directly to the relevant testing organizations. Examination fees are paid separate from the application fees.

BUREAU OF PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL AFFAIRS [49 PA. CODE CH. 43b]

Schedule of Civil Penalties—Podiatrists

The Commissioner of Professional and Occupational Affairs (Commissioner) adds § 43b.27 (relating to schedule of civil penalties—podiatrists) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Effective Date

This final-form rulemaking will be effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will apply to violations that occur on or after the effective date.

Statutory Authority

Section 5(a) of the act of July 2, 1993 (P.L. 345, No. 48) (Act 48) (63 P.S. § 2205(a)) authorizes the Commissioner, after consultation with licensing boards in the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (Bureau), to promulgate a schedule of civil penalties for violations of the acts or regulations of the licensing boards.

Background and purpose

Act 48 authorizes agents of the Bureau to issue citations and impose civil penalties under schedules adopted by the Commissioner in consultation with the Bureau's boards and commissions. Act 48 citations streamline the disciplinary process by eliminating the need for formal orders to show cause, answers, adjudications and orders, and consent agreements. At the same time, a licensee who receives an Act 48 citation retains his due process rights to a hearing prior to the imposition of judgment. The use of Act 48 citations has increased steadily since 1996, when the program was first implemented, and they have become an important part of the Bureau's enforcement efforts. Section 5(b)(4) of Act 48 authorizes the State Board of Podiatry (Board), as a licensing board within the Bureau, to levy a civil penalty of not more than \$10,000 on a licensee or unlicensed person who violates a provision of the Podiatry Practice Act (act) (63 P.S. §§ 42.1-42.21c) or regulations of the Board. However, section 5(a)of Act 48 limits the civil penalty that may be levied by citation to no more than \$1,000 per violation.

This is the first time that the Board will participate in the Act 48 citation program. The Commissioner and the Board believe that it is necessary to implement the civil penalties in this final-form rulemaking to streamline the disciplinary process for lapsed license and continuing education violations.

Summary and Responses to Comments

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 45 Pa.B. 2704 (June 6, 2015), with a 30-day public comment period. No public comments were received. The House Professional Licensure Committee (HPLC) responded on July 14, 2015, that it wishes to take no formal action

until the final-form rulemaking is promulgated. The Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee (SCP/PLC) did not submit comments. On August 5, 2015, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) submitted comments.

With regard to the proposed schedule of civil penalties for failure to complete required hours of continuing education during the 2 years preceding renewal or reactivation, IRRC asked whether the intent was to impose a civil penalty and not renew a license when a licensee fails to complete the required continuing education. Furthermore, IRRC also asked about how the Board intends to follow section 9.1 of the act (63 P.S. § 42.9a)) that licensees may not renew a license if the licensee has not completed the required hours of continuing education.

The civil penalty schedule for failure to complete the required hours of continuing education in accordance with § 29.61(a) (relating to requirements for biennial renewal and eligibility to conduct educational conferences) is in addition to, and not in lieu of, the statutory requirement under section 9.1 of the act that licensees may not renew a license if the licensee has not completed the required hours of continuing education. That is, the Board will not renew a license unless the licensee certifies to the Board, subject to the penalties of 18 Pa.C.S. § 4904 (relating to unsworn falsification to authorities), that all required continuing education has been completed in accordance with § 29.61(c). If the licensee cannot certify that the licensee has completed 50 clock hours of continuing education in approved courses by the renewal deadline, the Board does not renew the individual's license and the license expires. Thereafter, the Board will reactivate the license only if the licensee subsequently proves compliance with the continuing education requirement. Upon review, it became apparent that because a license is not reactivated without proof of compliance, there could never be a situation when a citation would be issued for "failure to complete required hours of continuing education during the 2 years preceding. . . reactivation." For that reason, the final-form rulemaking was revised to delete this language and apply only to renewal.

Conversely, it is possible that after a licensee has certified compliance with the continuing education requirements and been renewed, a postrenewal audit may demonstrate that a licensee failed to complete all 50 required clock hours, or failed to complete at least 30 clock hours in courses and programs in podiatry approved by the Board or the Council on Podiatric Medical Education, or exceeded the maximum of 10 hours that may be completed in courses and programs that involve the use of the Internet or the reading of professional journals or magazine articles. See § 29.61(a). It is a postrenewal audit that identifies deficiencies that would trigger the issuance of a citation under this civil penalty schedule.

Additionally, the Commissioner is in the process of developing a system for the boards and commissions within the Bureau to track compliance with the continuing education requirements as part of the new Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS). Initially, each licensee will be able to track completion of continuing education and upload certificates of completion to the licensee's dashboard. The Bureau's intent is that ultimately, when the continuing education modules of PALS are fully implemented, completion of the continuing education requirements will be validated up front and a licensee will be unable to renew until full compliance has been verified, in much the same way that the Bureau currently validates completion of the mandatory continuing education in child abuse recognition and reporting required under 23 Pa.C.S. § 6383(b)(2) (relating to education and training).

With regard to the civil penalty schedule for practicing or offering to practice podiatry by a person whose license is expired, IRRC raised two concerns. First, IRRC asked whether, under a first offense, a licensee would be subject to a fine of \$500 or \$1,000 if the licensee practiced on a lapsed license for a period of 5 months and 1 day. IRRC also asked whether a month would mean a whole month and suggested that the Bureau clarify this in the finalform rulemaking. IRRC's second concern with the schedule was that first and second offenses were being treated differently so that a licensee who practiced on a lapsed license for 5 months and 1 day could receive a \$1,000 civil penalty for a first offense (5-12 months) and receive only a \$500 civil penalty for a second offense (less than 6 months). IRRC also observed that under the proposed schedule a licensee being charged with a first offense for practicing on an expired license for 3 or 4 months would pay the same civil penalty as a licensee being charged with a second offense for the same period of time (\$500). IRRC stated that it would be more reasonable if the penalties for second offenses are higher than the penalties for first offenses.

To address IRRC's two concerns regarding civil penalties for expired licenses, the Commissioner, with approval of the Board, revised the schedule of civil penalties to set the civil penalty for each month or portion of a month of practice on an expired license. For a first offense, the penalty for practicing on an expired license would be \$50 per month or portion of a month, not to exceed \$1,000. Violations exceeding 20 months would result in formal disciplinary action. For a second offense, the penalty would be increased to \$100 per month or portion of a month, not to exceed \$1,000, with violations continuing more than 10 months resulting in formal disciplinary action. Finally, for subsequent offenses, the penalty would be determined through formal disciplinary action. In this way, the civil penalties could not result in the inequities identified by IRRC in its comments.

Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

This final-form rulemaking will not have adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions, and will reduce the paperwork requirements of the Commonwealth and the regulated community by eliminating the need for orders to show cause, answers, consent agreements and adjudications/orders for violations subject to the Act 48 citation process. The only fiscal impact of this final-form rulemaking will be borne by persons who violate the act or regulations of the Board and are subject to the civil penalties in § 43b.27.

Sunset Date

The Bureau and the Board continuously monitor the effectiveness of regulations. As a result, a sunset date has not been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5(a)), on May 20, 2015, the Board submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 45 Pa.B. 2704, to IRRC and the Chairpersons of the HPLC and the SCP/PLC for review and comment.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, the Board shall submit to IRRC, the HPLC and the SCP/PLC copies of comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. In preparing the final-form rulemaking, the Board has considered all comments from IRRC and the HPLC.

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P.S. § 745.5a(j.2)), on August 23, 2017, the final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the HPLC and the SCP/PLC. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on August 24, 2017, and approved the final-form rulemaking.

Findings

The Commissioner finds that:

(1) Public notice of proposed rulemaking was given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P.L. 769, No. 240) (45 P.S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) A public comment period was provided as required by law and all comments were considered.

(3) This final-form rulemaking is necessary and appropriate for administering and enforcing the authorizing act identified in this preamble.

Order

The Commissioner, acting under the authority of Act 48, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Commissioner, 49 Pa. Code Chapter 43b, are amended by adding § 43b.27 to read as set forth in Annex A.

(b) The Commissioner shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of General Counsel and the Office of Attorney General as required by law.

(c) The Commissioner shall submit this order and Annex A to IRRC, the HPLC and the SCP/PLC as required by law.

(d) The Commissioner shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(e) This final-form rulemaking shall take effect on publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

UNDER ACT 2, 1995 PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P.S. §§ 6026.101—6026.907)

Sections 302-305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) (35 P.S. §§ 6026.302-6026.305) require the Department to publish in the Pennsylvania Bulletin an acknowledgment noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. A person who demonstrates attainment of one or a combination of cleanup standards or receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the following site, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified as follows. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified as the remediator of the site develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

The Department has determined that the proposed facility satisfies best available control technology (BACT), lowest achievable emission rate (LAER), and the Department's BAT requirements.

HTEC has conducted air quality analyses which satisfy the requirements of the Prevention of Significant Deterioration (PSD) regulations codified in 40 CFR 52.21 and 25 Pa. Code § 127.83.

In accordance with 40 CFR 52.21(k)—(n), HTEC provided air quality analyses of HTEC's emissions of CO, NO_x , particulate matter less than or equal to 2.5 micrometers in diameter ($PM_{.2.5}$), and particulate matter less than or equal to 10 micrometers in diameter ($PM_{.10}$). Hill Top Energy Center's source impact analyses demonstrate that the Hill Top Energy Center's emissions would not cause or contribute to air pollution in violation of the National Ambient Air Quality Standards for CO, nitrogen dioxide (NO_2), $PM_{.2.5}$, or $PM_{.10}$. Additionally, Hill Top Energy Center's source impact analyses demonstrate that the HTEC's emissions would not cause or contribute to air pollution in violation of the Class II or Class I PSD increments for NO_2 , $PM_{.2.5}$, or $PM_{.10}$.

MINING ACTIVITY NPDES DRAFT PERMITS

This notice provides information about applications for a new, amended or renewed NPDES permits associated with mining activity (coal or noncoal) permits. The applications concern industrial waste (mining) discharges to surface water and discharges of stormwater associated with mining activities. This notice is provided in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91 and 92a and 40 CFR Part 122, implementing provisions of The Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1—691.1001) and the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. §§ 1251—1376).

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has prepared a draft NPDES permit and made a tentative determination to issue the NPDES permit in conjunction with the associated mining activity permit.

Effluent Limits for Coal Mining Activities

For coal mining activities, NPDES permits, when issued, will contain effluent limits that are the more stringent of technology-based (BAT) effluent limitations or Water Quality Based Effluent Limits (WQBEL).

The BAT limits for coal mining activities, as provided in 40 CFR Part 434 and 25 Pa. Code Chapters 87—90 are as follows:

A settleable solids instantaneous maximum limit of 0.5 ml/l applies to: surface runoff (resulting from a precipitation event of less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from active mining areas; active areas disturbed by coal refuse disposal activities; mined areas backfilled and revegetated; and all other discharges and drainage (resulting from a precipitation event of greater than 1-year 24-hour to less than or equal to a 10-year 24-hour event) from coal refuse disposal piles. Similarly, modified BAT limits apply to iron, manganese and suspended solids in surface runoff, discharges and drainage resulting from these precipitation events and those of greater magnitude in accordance with 25 Pa. Code \$\$ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Exceptions to BAT effluent limits may be applicable in accordance with 25 Pa. Code §§ 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.292, 89.52 and 90.102.

Effluent Limits for Noncoal Mining Activities

The limits for noncoal mining activities as provided in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 77 are pH 6 to 9 and other parameters the Department may require.

Discharges from noncoal mines located in some geologic settings (for example, in the coal fields) may require additional water quality based effluent limits. If additional effluent limits are needed for an NPDES permit associated with a noncoal mining permit, then the permit description specifies the parameters.

In addition to BAT or WQBEL limits, coal and noncoal NPDES permits establish effluent limitations in the form of implemented Best Management Practices (BMPs) identified in the associated Erosion and Sedimentation Plan, the Reclamation Plan and the NPDES permit application. These BMPs restrict the rates and quantities of associated pollutants from being discharged into surface waters in this Commonwealth.

More restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume or restrictions on the extent of mining that may occur are incorporated into an NPDES permit when necessary for compliance with water quality standards and antidegradation requirements (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 91—96).

The procedures for determining the final effluent limits, using a mass-balance equation or model, are found in Technical Guidance Document 563-2112-115, Developing National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permits for Mining Activities. Other specific factors to be considered include public comments and Total Maximum Daily Load(s). Additional discharge limitations may apply in the event that unexpected discharges occur.

Discharge rates for surface mining activities are precipitation driven. Discharge rates for proposed discharges associated with underground mining are noted in the permit description.

Persons wishing to comment on an NPDES draft permit should submit a written statement to the Department at the address of the district mining office indicated before each draft permit within 30 days of this public notice. Comments received within the comment period will be considered in the final determinations regarding the NPDES permit applications. On September 7, 2016, Applicant requested a State water quality certification from the Department of Environmental Protection (Department), as required by Section 401 of the Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. § 1341), to ensure that the construction, operation and maintenance of the Project will protect water quality in Pennsylvania through compliance with State water quality standards and associated State law requirements, which are consistent with the requirements of the Clean Water Act.

The Applicant operates and maintains approximately 12.1 miles of an existing 20-inch-diameter, natural gas pipeline, referred to as the H-125 Pipeline, from Applicant's existing Greenlee Station in Somerset Township, Washington County (Hackett, PA USGS Topographic Quadrangle N: 40°, 8′, 39.0336″; W: -80°, 0′, 25.2864″), to Applicant's existing Tepe Meter and Regulation (M&R) Station in Jefferson Hills Borough, Allegheny County (Glassport, PA USGS Topographic Quadrangle N: 40°, 16', 52.4244''; W: -79°, 55', 2.3586''). The Applicant is proposing to hydrostatically test two (2) sections of the existing, H-125 Pipeline, (approximately 2.72 miles in total), for the purpose of increasing the maximum allowable operating pressure of the line to 546 pounds per square inch gauge (psig) from 328 psig, to allow more flexibility for Equitrans' customers, to better serve the Pittsburgh and surrounding markets. The first segment consists of approximately 0.5 mile (MP 3.7 to MP 4.2), and the second segment consists of approximately 2.12 miles (MP 6.3 to $M\bar{P}$ 8.4). The Project, as proposed, will also include the removal or replacement of twenty-two (22) existing farm taps in Allegheny County and thirteen (13) existing farm taps in Washington County; installation of one aboveground valve set within the existing graveled facility in Allegheny County; construction of an interconnect to supply gas to Equitrans' existing M-78 pipeline in Washington County; pipe modifications to remove connections between the existing H-125 pipeline and various foreign pipelines in Washington County due to the increase in pipeline pressure; relocation of three existing meters in Washington County; and the venting of gas and siphoning of air at the Greenlee Station (MP 0), Courtney Gates Station (MP 5.7), Meredith Gates Station (MP 8.4), and Tepe Station (MP 12) in Washington County. The Project, as proposed, will require approximately 19 acres of earth disturbance, and impacts to 42 linear feet of Lobbs Run (WWF) and Dry Run (WWF), 0.46 acre of floodway, 0.04 acre of temporary PEM wetland impacts, and 0.03 acre of PSS permanent impacts.

The Department published notice of its proposed State water quality certification in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at 47 Pa.B. 2781 (May 13, 2017) and received no comments from the public.

The Department certifies to Applicant that the construction, operation and maintenance of the Project will not violate applicable State water quality standards set forth in 25 Pa. Code Chapter 93, provided Applicant complies with the permitting programs, criteria and conditions established pursuant to State law:

1. Discharge Permit—Applicant shall obtain and comply with a Department National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit for the discharge of water from the hydrostatic testing of the pipeline pursuant to Pennsylvania's Clean Streams Law (35 P.S. §§ 691.1—691.1001), and all applicable implementing regulations (25 Pa. Code Chapter 92a).

2. Erosion and Sediment Control Permit—Applicant shall obtain and comply with the Department's Chapter 102 Erosion and Sediment Control General Permit for Earth Disturbance Associated with Oil and Gas Exploration, Production, Processing or Treatment issued pursuant to Pennsylvania's Clean Streams Law and Storm Water Management Act (32 P.S. §§ 680.1—680.17), and all applicable implementing regulations (25 Pa. Code Chapter 102).

3. Water Obstruction and Encroachment Permits— Applicant shall obtain and comply with a Department Chapter 105 Water Obstruction and Encroachment Permits for the construction, operation and maintenance of all water obstructions and encroachments associated with the project pursuant to Pennsylvania's Clean Streams Law, Dam Safety and Encroachments Act (32 P.S. §§ 673.1—693.27), and Flood Plain Management Act (32 P.S. §§ 679.101—679.601.), and all applicable implementing regulations (25 Pa. Code Chapter 105).

4. Water Quality Monitoring—The Department retains the right to specify additional studies or monitoring to ensure that the receiving water quality is not adversely impacted by any operational and construction process that may be employed by Applicant.

5. *Operation*—Applicant shall at all times properly operate and maintain all Project facilities and systems of treatment and control (and related appurtenances) which are installed to achieve compliance with the terms and

conditions of this State Water Quality Certification and all required permits, authorizations and approvals. Proper operation and maintenance includes adequate laboratory controls, appropriate quality assurance procedures, and the operation of backup or auxiliary facilities or similar systems installed by Applicant.

6. Inspection—The Project, including all relevant records, are subject to inspection at reasonable hours and intervals by an authorized representative of the Department to determine compliance with this State Water Quality Certification, including all required State water quality permits and State water quality standards. A copy of this certification shall be available for inspection by the Department during such inspections of the Project.

7. Transfer of Projects—If Applicant intends to transfer any legal or equitable interest in the Project which is affected by this State Water Quality Certification, Applicant shall serve a copy of this certification upon the prospective transferee of the legal and equitable interest at least thirty (30) days prior to the contemplated transfer and shall simultaneously inform the Department Regional Office of such intent. Notice to the Department shall include a transfer agreement signed by the existing and new owner containing a specific date for transfer of certification responsibility, coverage, and liability between them.

Request for comments on the Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) Developed for Stony Run, Westmoreland County

The Department of Environmental Protection will accept comments as of October 30, 2017, for the proposed TMDL proposed address aquatic life use impairments in Stony Run noted in the 2016 Pennsylvania Integrated Water Quality Monitoring and Assessment Report (Integrated List), initially listed in 2006 (see Table 2). Stony Run is a tributary of the Kiski-Conemaugh River and the larger Allegheny River Basin. The watershed is in Derry Township, Westmoreland County.

The impairments were noted during bioassessments in the watershed (2005). Excessive siltation due to agriculture activities was the source identified as causing impairment to the designated aquatic life use (Cold Water Fishery) in Stony Run. No additional assessments have been conducted in this watershed as of the original impairment assessment (2005) and consecutive listing (2006). Because PA does not currently have water quality criteria for sediment, a TMDL endpoint was identified using a reference watershed approach. Based on a comparison to the similar, unimpaired Champion Run (tributary to Indian Creek and the greater Youghiogheny River basin, Fayette County), the maximum sediment loading (or TMDL) identified in Table 1. will allow water quality objectives to be met in the impaired segments of Stony Run. Allocations from the calculated TMDLs are summarized below:

This proposed TMDL sets allowable loadings within the specifically impaired stream segments of the Stony Run watershed. The loading was allocated among the land uses of cropland, hay/pasture, and associated stream banks present in the watershed. Data used in these TMDLs was generated using a water quality analysis model (MapShed—GWLF) designed by the Penn State University. The following table shows the estimated current loadings for the watershed. Overall load reductions necessary in order to meet the TMDLs are also identified. The data and all supporting documentation used to develop the proposed TMDLs are available from the Department. The proposed TMDLs and information on the TMDL program can also be viewed on the Department's website (www.dep.state.pa.us/ watermanagement_apps/tmdl/). Alternative Fuels Incentive Grant Program; FAST Act Alternative Fuel Corridor Infrasturcture Opportunity

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department), Office of Pollution Prevention and Energy Assistance announces an opportunity to apply for grants under the new PA's FAST Act Alternative Fuel Corridor Infrastructure Program (Program). This Program is a special solicitation under the Alternative Fuels Incentive Grant Program (AFIG) which will provide up to a 50% reimbursement grant to install public refueling infrastructure along highway corridors in this Commonwealth designated as alternative fuel corridors by the Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act (FAST Act) (Pub.L. No. 114-94) as "signage ready" or "signage pending" by the Federal Highway Administration. These corridors include specific sections of interstates I-76, I-276, I-476, I-70, I-95 and I-80.

Approximately \$1 million in grants will be available to municipal authorities, political subdivisions, nonprofit entities, corporations, and limited liability companies or partnerships incorporated or registered in this Commonwealth to install public-use electric, hydrogen, propane and compressed natural gas refueling infrastructure. The infrastructure must support public vehicles seeking to undertake alternative fuel refueling, including electric vehicle charging, or hydrogen, propane or compressed natural gas refueling. Individual project awards will be capped at \$500,000.

Eligible project infrastructure must: be publicly accessible 24/7; incorporate roadway signage compliant with the FAST Act; offer an open and common payment platform; feature standardized nozzles and connectors; be co-located with convenient consumer amenities at safe locations; and provide travelers with measures of assurance that the fuel will be available during their planned stop. Project infrastructure must be designed to meet 5-year future projections of anticipated usage for the public at the proposed public stations. To be eligible, projects must be sited within approximately 5 roadway miles of the FAST Act designated corridor segment.

The substantive revisions clarify the procedures for the review of completion reports for Closure Bonds and the release of Water Loss Coverage Bonds. The Department also eliminated the Bond Rollover section because the Department has replaced the bonding mechanism that utilized bond rollovers, making this section obsolete.

Federal Consistency under the Coastal Zone Management Act; Deploy Temporary Buoys in the Schuylkill River

This notice is published under section 306(d)(14) of the Federal Coastal Zone Management Act of 1972 (16 U.S.C.A. § 1455(d)(14)), regarding public participation

during consistency determinations. The Department of Environmental Protection (Department), Coastal Resources Management Program has received notice that the City of Philadelphia—Bartram's Garden is proposing to deploy temporary buoys in the Schuylkill River to display local tidal changes for educational purposes.

The proposed project will consist of 7 1/2-inch diameter hard styrofoam fishing industry buoys, strung in lengths of 6 feet on 1/8-inch stainless steel wire rope with stainless steel thimble and ferrule hardware. The buoy strands will be attached to anchor weights placed on the riverbed. The colored buoys will submerge in sequence as the tide flows and re-emerge as the tide ebbs to provide a visualization of the tidal change for observers. A total of 310 buoys will be deployed in 13 locations within the open waters of the Schuylkill River within the City of Philadelphia for a total proposed impact of 1,217 linear feet. The temporary display will be in place for a maximum of 2 years. The applicant is seeking Federal authorization from the United States Army Corps of Engineers to complete the project.

This project is subject to Department review for Federal consistency because it is a Federal license and permit activity and will have reasonably foreseeable effects on this Commonwealth's coastal resources or uses.

Pennsylvania Lake Erie Phosphorus Reduction Domestic Action Plan

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) finalized the Pennsylvania Lake Erie Phosphorus Reduction Domestic Action Plan (DAP) to assist in the elimination of nutrient pollution in Lake Erie.

The Commonwealth is one of eight state governments with coastline and contributing tributaries to the Great Lakes, and one of five states that share jurisdictional responsibilities for water quality in the Lake Erie Basin. In 1972, the United States and Canada signed the Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement (GLWQA) to provide a framework for the restoration, protection and management of the Great Lakes water resources shared between the countries. The states in the United States and Canadian provinces fully participate in this process to assure cooperative restoration success.

The GLWQA was amended and reaffirmed in 2012 to include a process to develop new phosphorus reduction targets for Lake Erie, which was adopted formally by the parties in February 2016 to address over-nutrification problems identified within Lake Erie and develop United States and Canadian DAPs for phosphorus reductions in each country. The United States Environmental Protection Agency is developing the United States DAP that will coordinate and integrate each United States state-written DAP. The United States DAP also will include those actions to be completed by each United States Federal agency with programs that affect Lake Erie water quality. The United States and Canada are bound by the GLWQA to complete these plans by February 2018, and the DAPs will be included as components of the Lake Erie Lakewide Action and Management Plan to be completed by the end of 2018.

The Department announced a 30-day public comment period at 47 Pa.B. 3045 (May 27, 2017) which allowed for submittal of comments on the draft DAP from May 27, 2017, to June 26, 2017, through the Department's eComment system, by e-mail and mail. A public webinar was conducted on June 15, 2017, to review the draft DAP. The Department received one formal comment on the DAP pertaining to Section 5, "Measuring Progress and Achieving Consensus," and Section 5.1 was revised accordingly to address the comment. The formal Comment and Response Document was added as Appendix 1. Additionally, minor revisions were completed to Sections 3.4, 3.4.1, 3.4.2, 3.5, 3.6, 4.2, 4.2.1, 5 and 5.3 to provide updated information and more detailed program descriptions.

Payment for Nursing Facility Services Provided by Nonpublic and County Nursing Facilities; Notice of Change for Supplemental Payments

This announcement is to provide notice that the Department of Human Services (Department) is proposing to adopt regulations and amend the Commonwealth's Title XIX State Plan to change its methods and standards for payment of Medical Assistance (MA) nursing facility services provided by nonpublic and county nursing facilities beginning January 1, 2018.

Background

On February 27, 2015, Governor Tom Wolf unveiled a package of legislative and budgetary actions which re-

sulted in the Department working in partnership with the Department of Aging to pursue the implementation of the Commonwealth's new managed care program Community HealthChoices (CHC). CHC will begin in the Southwest zone on January 1, 2018, the Southeast zone on July 1, 2018, and the Lehigh Capital, Northwest and Northeast zones on January 1, 2019. A list of the counties in each zone is available at http://www.healthchoices.pa.gov/ cs/groups/webcontent/documents/document/c_227013.pdf.

To prepare for the implementation of CHC, the Department is proposing to amend 55 Pa. Code §§ 1187.111(a), 1187.117(b) and 1189.105(a) and (c)(2) (relating to disproportionate share incentive payments; supplemental ventilator care and tracheostomy care payments; and incentive payments) to limit disproportionate share incentive payments and supplemental ventilator care and tracheostomy care payments to nursing facilities that are not located in a geographic zone where CHC operates. These supplemental payments will be phased out of the Fee-for-Service (FFS) delivery system in conjunction with the phase in of CHC, with payments continuing to be a part of FFS in non-CHC zones.

As CHC is implemented, nursing facility services provided under the FFS delivery system will be minimal. Therefore, payment history related to these payments was used in the development of CHC capitated rates. The capitated rates are certified as actuarially sound by an actuary and submitted to the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services for review and approval. CHC managed care organizations will then use the revenue they receive from the Department to pay their network providers, including nursing facilities, for the services they provide.

Fiscal Impact

No fiscal impact is anticipated as a result of these changes.

Social Security Number Exemption

The Department of Human Services (Department) is announcing that it has been granted an extension of the exemption from the Title IV-D Child Support Enforcement law requiring the collection of Social Security numbers (SSN) for the Commonwealth's recreational license applications.

Under the Social Security Number Privacy Act (act) (71 P.S. §§ 2601—2608), the Department is required to apply

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to the United States Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) for an exemption from the Federal law that requires an individual applying for or renewing a recreational license for hunting and fishing to include the individual's SSN on the application. See section 466(a)(13)(A) of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C.A. § 666(a)(13)(A)). The act further provides that if the exemption is granted, an applicant shall be permitted to provide a driver's license number or a Department of Transportation (DOT)-issued nondriver identification card number as an alternative to disclosing the applicant's SSN. The Department's previous exemption requests were granted by DHHS. See 39 Pa.B. 2058 (April 18, 2009), 41 Pa.B. 4917 (September 10, 2011) and 44 Pa.B. 3823 (June 21, 2014).

DHHS granted the Department's request to extend the exemption and continue the collection of a driver's license number or a DOT-issued nondriver identification card number instead of an SSN for any applicant applying for a recreational license. The Department's request was granted because of privacy concerns with the current collection process of SSNs on recreational license applications and because compliance with section 466(a)(13)(A) of the Social Security Act would not increase the efficiency and effectiveness of the Commonwealth's Title IV-D Child Support Enforcement Program. However, any recreational license applicant who does not possess a DOT-issued driver's license number or nondriver identification card number is required to supply a SSN on the recreational license application.

There is no fiscal impact.

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101— 3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

1. *Name*: The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania Comic Cash (hereinafter "Comic Cash"). The game number is PA-5015.

2. Definitions:

(a) Authorized Retailer or Retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.

(b) *Bar Code*: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.

(c) *Game Ticket*: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.

(d) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.

(e) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, and transmitting reports, and performing inventory functions.

(f) *Play*: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.

(g) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.

(h) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.

(i) *PRIZE*: A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.

(j) *Progressive Top Prize*: The top prize available for this game that begins with a minimum prize amount that grows at a pre-determined rate every time a ticket is purchased, and then resets to the minimum prize amount whenever a top prize winning ticket is sold.

(k) *WINNING SYMBOLS*: The symbols found in the "WINNING SYMBOLS" area and generated via quick pick that, when matched against the symbols found in the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.

(1) *Winning Ticket*: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.

(m) YOUR COMIC STRIP: The symbols found in the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" area and generated via quick pick that, when matched against the "WINNING SYMBOLS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.

3. Price: The price of a Comic Cash ticket is \$1.

4. Description of the Comic Cash lottery game:

(a) The Comic Cash lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. With the exception of the Progressive Top Prize amount, all prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select his or her own play symbols. Comic Cash tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.

(b) Comic Cash is played by matching the play symbols in the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" area to the play symbols located in the "WINNING SYMBOLS" area. A player matching a play symbol in the "WINNING SYMBOLS" area with the same play symbol in the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" area will win the prize shown under the matching "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbol. A bet slip is not used to play this game.

(c) Players can win the prize identified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).

(d) A Comic Cash game ticket cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.

(e) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer by verbally requesting a Comic Cash game ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

(f) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a Comic Cash game ticket and select the Comic Cash option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

5. Pennsylvania Comic Cash ticket characteristics:

(a) A Comic Cash ticket shall contain a play area, the cost of the play, the date of sale, and a bar code.

(b) *Play Symbols*: Each Comic Cash ticket play area will contain a "WINNING SYMBOLS" area and a "YOUR COMIC STRIP" area. The play symbols located in the "WINNING SYMBOLS" area and the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" area are: WHAP! (WHAP) symbol, CRASH!! (CRASH) symbol, BANG! BANG! BANG! (BANG) symbol, Stars (STARS) symbol, ARGH! (ARGH) symbol, Stars (STARS) symbol, ARGH! (ARGH) symbol, WHOOOSH (WHOOOSH) symbol, SPLAT! (SPLAT) symbol, WOW (WOW) symbol, ZAP!! (ZAP) symbol, POW! (POW) symbol, BAM (BAM) symbol, ??? (WHAT) symbol, KABOOM! (KABOOM) symbol, KRUNCH! (KRUNCH) symbol, and a POOF (POOF) symbol.

(c) *Prize Symbols*: The prize symbols and their captions located in the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" area are: FREE (TICKET), $\$^{1.00}$ (ONE DOL), $\$^{2.00}$ (TWO DOL), $\$^{5.00}$ (FIV DOL), $\$^{6.00}$ (SIX DOL), $\$^{10.00}$ (TEN DOL), $\$^{15.00}$ (FIFTN), $\$^{20.00}$ (TWENTY), $\$^{25.00}$ (TWY FIV), $\$^{40.00}$ (FORTY), $\100 (ONE HUN) and PROGRESSIVE (TOP PRIZE).

(d) *Prizes*: The prizes that can be won in this game are: Free Ticket, \$1, \$2, \$5, \$6, \$10, \$15, \$20, \$25, \$40, \$100 and the Progressive Top Prize. The Progressive Top Prize amount starts at \$1,000 and increases by 8¢ every time a Comic Cash ticket is purchased. When Progressive Top Prize winning ticket is sold, the Progressive Top Prize resets to \$1,000.

(e) A player can win up to 6 times on a ticket.

(f) Approximate Number of Tickets Available for the Game: Approximately 4,800,000 tickets will be available for sale for the Comic Cash lottery game.

6. Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:

(a) All Comic Cash prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.

(b) A winning Comic Cash ticket is entitled only to the highest prize won by the winning combinations described below on each game ticket.

(c) Holders of tickets upon which any of the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbols match any of the "WIN-NING SYMBOLS" play symbols and a prize symbol of PROGRESSIVE (TOP PRIZE) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of a "Progressive Top Prize." The amount won under this paragraph is the amount of the Progressive Top Prize, determined by the Lottery Central Computer System, as of the time the winning ticket was purchased. The amount won will be a minimum of \$1,000.

(d) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING SYMBOLS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$100 (ONE HUN) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$100.

(e) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING SYMBOLS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$40^{.00} (FORTY) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$40.

(f) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbols matches any of the "WIN-NING SYMBOLS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$25^{.00} (TWY FIV) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$25.

(g) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING SYMBOLS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$20^{.00} (TWENTY) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$20.

(h) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING SYMBOLS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$15^{.00} (FIFTN) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$15.

(i) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbols matches any of the "WIN-NING SYMBOLS" play symbols and a prize symbol of 10^{00} (TEN DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$10.

(j) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbols matches any of the "WIN-NING SYMBOLS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$6^{.00} (SIX DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$6.

(k) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING SYMBOLS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$5.⁰⁰ (FIV DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$5.

(1) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbols matches any of the "WIN-NING SYMBOLS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$2.00 (TWO DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$2.

(m) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING SYMBOLS" play symbols and a prize symbol of \$1^{.00} (ONE DOL) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1.

(n) Holders of tickets upon which any one of the "YOUR COMIC STRIP" play symbols matches any of the "WINNING SYMBOLS" play symbols and a prize symbol of FREE (TICKET) appears in the "PRIZE" area under the matching "YOUR COMIC STIP" play symbol, on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of one Comic Cash game ticket.

7. Number and Description of Prizes and Approximate Chances of Winning: The following table sets forth the approximate number of winners, amounts of prizes, and approximate chances of winning:

8. Ticket Responsibility:

When Any Of YOUR COMIC

(a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person so named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.

(b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.

(c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.

9. Ticket Validation and Requirements:

(a) *Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets*. To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:

 $\left(1\right)$ The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.

(2) The game ticket must be intact.

(3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.

(4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.

(5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.

(6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.

(7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.

(8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.

(b) *Invalid or defective game tickets*: A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.

10. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:

(a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.

(b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.

(c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters.

(d) Pursuant to the preceding paragraphs, the retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:

(1) The game ticket is scanned and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;

(2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;

(3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and

(4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 12 (relating to unclaimed prizes).

(e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.

(f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.

11. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this subsection. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.

12. Unclaimed prizes: Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.

13. Purchase and prize restrictions: A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.

14. Progressive Top Prize Restrictions:

(a) An amount of 8ϕ from the sale of each Comic Cash ticket will be accumulated in the Progressive Top Prize pool.

(b) *Prize Amount*: The amount of the Progressive Top Prize at the time a ticket is purchased can only be verified through the Lottery's Central Computer System. Any advertisement or any materials describing the amount of the Progressive Top Prize are only valid as of the time they are posted. If any discrepancy exists between this notice and any material describing or advertising the Comic Cash game, this notice and the data contained in the Lottery's Central Computer System shall govern.

(c) The Progressive Top Prize and all other prizes are subject to availability at the time of purchase. The Lottery is not responsible for prizes that are not awarded due to technical issues. In the event of a Progressive Top Prize being reset without the actual sale of a Progressive Top Prize winning ticket, all prize money that had accumulated into the Progressive Top Prize pool (i.e. 8ϕ from the sale of each ticket) shall be awarded as part of the next Progressive Top Prize won.

15. Governing Law:

(a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary, and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play Comic Cash lottery game.

(b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.

16. Retailer Compensation:

(a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.

(b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.

17. *Retailer Incentive Programs*. The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play Comic Cash lottery game tickets.

18. *Retailer Bonus*: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in

a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which he qualifies on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

19. Termination of the Game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Comic Cash or through normal communications methods.

20. *Applicability*: This notice applies only to the Comic Cash lottery game announced in this notice.

Pennsylvania Lucky You Fast Play Game 5014

Under the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. §§ 3761-101— 3761-314) and 61 Pa. Code § 803.11 (relating to powers and duties of the Secretary of Revenue), the Secretary of Revenue hereby provides public notice of the rules for the following lottery game:

1. *Name*: The name of the lottery game is Pennsylvania Lucky You (hereinafter "Lucky You"). The game number is PA-5014.

2. Definitions:

(a) Authorized Retailer or Retailer: A person who is properly licensed by the Lottery pursuant to 61 Pa. Code §§ 805.1—805.17.

(b) *Bar Code*: The symbology on the ticket containing certain encrypted validation and accounting data used for identifying winning and losing tickets.

(c) *Game Ticket*: A bearer instrument produced through a Lottery Terminal that is the player's record of a play for a Fast Play lottery game and sold by an authorized retailer containing the play and validation data as published in this game notice.

(d) Lottery Central Computer System: The computer gaming system on which all Fast Play plays are recorded.

(e) Lottery Terminal: A device authorized by the Lottery to function in an interactive mode with the Lottery Central Computer System for the purpose of issuing plays, executing Quick Pick selections, and entering, receiving, and processing lottery transactions, including making purchases, validating plays, and transmitting reports, and performing inventory functions. (f) *Play*: A chance to participate in a particular Fast Play lottery game.

(g) *Play Area*: The area on a ticket which contains one or more play symbols.

(h) *Play Symbol*: A number, letter, symbol, image or other character found in the play area which is used to determine whether a player wins a prize.

(i) *Prize*: A non-monetary item, money, or experience that can be won as specified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners) of this game notice.

(j) *PRIZE LEGEND*: The area on the ticket that shows a player the corresponding prize that can be won by matching different winning combinations.

(k) *Progressive Top Prize*: The top prize available for this game that begins with a minimum prize amount that grows at a pre-determined rate every time a ticket is purchased, and then resets to the minimum prize amount whenever a top prize winning ticket is sold.

(1) WINNING NUMBERS: The numbers found in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area and generated via quick pick that, when matched against the numbers found in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.

(m) *Winning Ticket*: A game ticket which has been validated and qualifies for a prize.

(n) YOUR NUMBERS: The numbers found in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area and generated via quick pick that, when matched against the "WINNING NUMBERS" area, determine whether a player wins a prize.

3. Price: The price of a Lucky You ticket is \$5.

4. Description of the Lucky You lottery game:

(a) The Lucky You lottery game is an instant win game printed from a Lottery Terminal. With the exception of the Progressive Top Prize amount, all prizes are predetermined, and the player does not have the ability to select his or her own play symbols. Lucky You tickets may be purchased from an authorized retailer or at a Lottery self-service terminal that sells terminal-based Lottery game tickets. Tickets purchased from an authorized retailer shall be printed on-demand at the time of purchase and may not be preprinted by the retailer.

(b) Lucky You is played by matching six or more of "YOUR NUMBERS" with any "WINNING NUMBER". Players matching six or more "YOUR NUMBERS" in this manner will win the prize shown in the PRIZE LEGEND. A bet slip is not used to play this game.

(c) Players can win the prize identified in section 6 (relating to prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners).

(d) A Lucky You game ticket cannot be canceled or voided once printed by the Lottery Terminal, even if printed in error.

(e) To purchase a ticket at an authorized retailer, a player must remit the purchase price to the retailer by verbally requesting a Lucky You game ticket. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

(f) To purchase a ticket at a Pennsylvania Lottery self-service terminal, the player must insert into the self-service terminal a dollar amount equal to the total purchase price of a Lucky You game ticket and select the Lucky You option on the Lottery self-service terminal. The ticket shall be the only valid proof of the bet placed and the only valid receipt for claiming a prize.

5. Pennsylvania Lucky You ticket characteristics:

(a) A Lucky You ticket shall contain a play area, a "PRIZE LEGEND," the cost of the play, the date of sale, and a bar code.

(b) Play Symbols: Each Lucky You ticket play area will contain a "WINNING NUMBERS" area and a "YOUR NUMBERS" area. The play symbols located in the "WINNING NUMBERS" area are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN), 30 (THIRTY), 31 (THYONE), 32 (THYTWO), 33 (THYTHR), 34 (THYFOR), 35 (THYFIV), 36 (THYSIX), 37 (THYSVN), 38 (THYEGT), 39 (THYNIN), and 40 (FORTY). The play symbols located in the "YOUR NUMBERS" area are: 1 (ONE), 2 (TWO), 3 (THREE), 4 (FOUR), 5 (FIVE), 6 (SIX), 7 (SEVEN), 8 (EIGHT), 9 (NINE), 10 (TEN), 11 (ELEVN), 12 (TWLV), 13 (THRTN), 14 (FORTN), 15 (FIFTN), 16 (SIXTN), 17 (SVNTN), 18 (EGHTNN), 19 (NINTN), 20 (TWENT), 21 (TWYONE), 22 (TWYTWO), 23 (TWYTHR), 24 (TWYFOR), 25 (TWYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN), 30 (THIRTY), 31 (THYONE), 32 (THYTWO), 33 (THYTHR), 34 (THYFOR), 35 (THYFIV), 26 (TWYSIX), 27 (TWYSVN), 28 (TWYEGT), 29 (TWYNIN), 30 (THIRTY), 31 (THYONE), 32 (THYTWO), 33 (THYTHR), 34 (THYFOR), 35 (THYFIV), 36 (THYSIX), 37 (THYSVN), 38 (THYEGT), 39 (THYNIN), and 40 (FORTY).

(c) *Prizes*: The prizes, located in the "PRIZE LEG-END," that can be won in this game are: \$5, \$10, \$15, \$20, \$30, \$50, \$100, \$500, \$1,000 and the Progressive Top Prize. The Progressive Top Prize amount starts at \$47,000 and increases by 18¢ every time a Lucky You ticket is purchased. When Progressive Top Prize winning ticket is sold, the Progressive Top Prize resets to \$47,000.

(d) A player can win up to one time on a ticket.

(e) Approximate Number of Tickets Available for the Game: Approximately 7,200,000 tickets will be available for sale for the Lucky You lottery game.

6. Prizes available to be won and determination of prize winners:

(a) All Lucky You prize payments will be made as one-time, lump-sum cash payments.

(b) A winning Lucky You ticket is entitled only to the highest prize won by the winning combinations described below on each game ticket.

(c) Holders of tickets upon which fifteen of "YOUR NUMBERS" match any "WINNING NUMBER" on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of a "Progressive Top Prize." The amount won under this paragraph is the amount of the Progressive Top Prize, determined by the Lottery Central Computer System, as of the time the winning ticket was purchased. The amount won will be a minimum of \$47,000.

(d) Holders of tickets upon which fourteen of "YOUR NUMBERS" match any "WINNING NUMBER" on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$1,000.

(e) Holders of tickets upon which thirteen of "YOUR NUMBERS" match any "WINNING NUMBER" on a single ticket, shall be entitled to a prize of \$500.

*PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE: The minimum value of the PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE is \$47,000. The PROGRESSIVE TOP PRIZE increases by 18¢ every time a ticket is purchased, and resets to \$47,000 whenever a top prize winning ticket is sold.

Prizes, including top prizes, are subject to availability at the time of purchase.

8. *Ticket Responsibility*:

(a) A Fast Play lottery game ticket is a bearer document deemed to be owned by the person holding the game ticket, except that if a name is contained on the back of the game ticket, the person so named will, for all purposes, be considered the owner of the game ticket.

(b) The holder of a Fast Play lottery game ticket has the sole responsibility for checking the accuracy and condition of the data printed on the game ticket.

(c) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a lost or stolen Fast Play lottery game ticket, or a Fast Play ticket redeemed by a player in error.

9. Ticket Validation and Requirements:

(a) *Valid Fast Play lottery game tickets*. To be a valid Fast Play lottery game ticket, the presented game ticket must meet the following requirements:

(1) The game ticket's bar code shall be present in its entirety.

(2) The game ticket must be intact.

(3) The game ticket may not be mutilated, altered, reconstituted or tampered with.

(4) The game ticket may not be counterfeit or a duplicate of a winning ticket.

(5) The game ticket must have been validly issued.

(6) The game ticket data shall have been recorded on the Lottery Central Computer System and the game ticket data shall match the computer record in every respect.

(7) The game ticket must not be defectively printed or printed or produced in error such that it cannot be processed or validated by the Lottery.

(8) The game ticket must pass other confidential security checks of the Lottery.

(b) *Invalid or defective game tickets*: A game ticket not passing the validation requirements in subsection (a) will be considered invalid and no payment will be made on account of any play recorded thereon. The determination of the Secretary in this regard is final.

10. Procedures for claiming and payment of prizes:

(a) A prize may be claimed through an authorized retailer or the Lottery, as provided in this section. A prize must be claimed within 1 year of the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket.

(b) An authorized retailer is authorized to pay prizes of \$2,500 or less. The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize of \$2,500 or less may be paid by a participating authorized retailer if a proper validation pay ticket was issued by the retailer's Lottery Terminal.

(c) The holder of a game ticket evidencing a winning play representing a prize in excess of \$2,500 may present the game ticket to an authorized retailer, Lottery District Office, or Lottery Headquarters. (d) Pursuant to the preceding paragraphs, the retailer or the Lottery will issue payment if:

(1) The game ticket is scanned and the play is validated through the Lottery Terminal or the Lottery Central Computer System;

(2) A claim form is properly and fully completed;

(3) The identification of the claimant is confirmed; and

(4) The winning ticket has not expired, pursuant to this section or section 12 (relating to unclaimed prizes).

(e) The Commonwealth shall not be responsible for a winning play paid in error by an authorized retailer.

(f) In the event a prize described in these rules is not available, the Lottery may either provide a substitute prize, determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won, or make a cash payment to the winner, in an amount determined by the Secretary to have an equivalent value to the prize won.

11. Funding for prizes: Moneys will be drawn from the State Lottery Fund, to the extent necessary, to fund the payment of prizes under this subsection. If this lottery game is terminated for any cause, prize moneys remaining undistributed will remain in the State Lottery Fund and used for purposes otherwise provided for by law.

12. Unclaimed prizes: Unclaimed prize money on winning Fast Play lottery game tickets will be retained by the Secretary for payment to the persons entitled thereto for 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket. If no claim is made within 1 year from the sale date of the Fast Play lottery game ticket, the right of a ticket holder to claim the prize represented by that ticket, if any, shall expire.

13. Purchase and prize restrictions: A Fast Play lottery game ticket may not be purchased by, and a prize may not be paid, to an officer or employee of the Lottery, Lottery professional services contractors or subcontractors, or to a spouse, child, brother, sister or parent residing in the same household of an officer, employee, contractor or subcontractor who is involved in the production, distribution or operation of systems for the validation or accounting of Fast Play games.

14. Progressive Top Prize Restrictions:

(a) An amount of $18 \not e$ from the sale of each Lucky You ticket will be accumulated in the Progressive Top Prize pool.

(b) *Prize Amount*: The amount of the Progressive Top Prize at the time a ticket is purchased can only be verified through the Lottery's Central Computer System. Any advertisement or any materials describing the amount of the Progressive Top Prize are only valid as of the time they are posted. If any discrepancy exists between this notice and any material describing or advertising the Lucky You game, this notice and the data contained in the Lottery's Central Computer System shall govern.

(c) The Progressive Top Prize and all other prizes are subject to availability at the time of purchase. The Lottery is not responsible for prizes that are not awarded due to technical issues. In the event of a Progressive Top Prize being reset without the actual sale of a Progressive Top Prize winning ticket, all prize money that had accumulated into the Progressive Top Prize pool (i.e. 18¢ from the sale of each ticket) shall be awarded as part of the next Progressive Top Prize won.

15. Governing Law:

(a) By purchasing a ticket, the purchaser agrees to comply with and abide by the State Lottery Law (72 P.S. \$ 3761-101—3761-314), this notice, instructions, conditions and final decisions of the Secretary, and procedures established by the Secretary for the conduct of the Fast Play Lucky You lottery game.

(b) Decisions made by the Secretary, including the declaration of prizes and the payment thereof, in interpretation of this notice are final and binding on players and persons making a claim in respect thereof.

16. Retailer Compensation:

(a) Authorized retailers may be entitled to compensation as determined by the Lottery.

(b) No authorized retailer or employee of an authorized retailer shall request, demand, or accept gratuities or any compensation other than as provided in subsection (a) in exchange for the performance of duties authorized pursuant to the Lottery retailer's license without the Lottery's prior written authorization.

17. *Retailer Incentive Programs*. The Lottery may conduct a separate Retailer Incentive Program for retailers who sell Pennsylvania Fast Play Lucky You lottery game tickets.

18. Retailer Bonus: The Lottery may offer a retailer bonus in connection with the sale of Pennsylvania Fast Play lottery game tickets. If a retailer bonus is offered, a Lottery retailer shall be eligible for a bonus as described in this section. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$100,000 and not exceeding \$500,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$500. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$500,001 and not exceeding \$1,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$5,000. Lottery retailers who sell a winning ticket that entitles the ticket holder to a prize, either payable in a single installment or having a guaranteed minimum payout, of at least \$1,000,001 and not exceeding \$10,000,000 shall be paid a bonus of \$10,000. A Lottery retailer is entitled only to the largest bonus for which he qualifies on a winning ticket. A bonus will be initiated for payment after the Fast Play game ticket is claimed and validated. A bonus will not be awarded to a Lottery retailer that sells a non-winning Pennsylvania Lottery Fast Play game ticket used to enter a Pennsylvania Lottery second-chance drawing or promotion that is subsequently selected to win a prize.

19. Termination of the Game: The Secretary may announce a termination date, after which no further tickets from this game may be sold. The announcement will be disseminated through media used to advertise or promote Lucky You or through normal communications methods.

20. *Applicability*: This notice applies only to the Lucky You lottery game announced in this notice.

Under 25 Pa. Code § 1021.141(b)(3) (relating to termination of proceedings) the Sierra Club, the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) and FirstEnergy Generation, LLC (FirstEnergy) have agreed to a settlement of Doc. No. 2015-093-R.

FirstEnergy owns and operates the Hatfield's Ferry Landfill (Landfill), which is a captive residual waste disposal facility located in Monongahela Township, Greene County. The Landfill is located on property across and south of the Hatfield's Ferry Power Station, which is a deactivated coal-fired electric generating station owned by Allegheny Energy Supply Company, LLC. The Landfill is regulated under 25 Pa. Code Chapter 287 (relating to residual waste management-general provisions) and is permitted under Solid Waste Permit No. 300370 (Permit) issued by the Department.

On May 22, 2015, the Department renewed and reissued the Permit in FirstEnergy's name. Sierra Club filed a Notice of Appeal on July 6, 2015, challenging the Department's renewal and reissuance of the Permit to FirstEnergy, which was docketed at EHB Doc. No. 2015-093-R.

On September 21, 2015, the Department issued a minor modification of the Permit to FirstEnergy, which allowed FirstEnergy to barge dewatered flue gas desulfurization materials from its Bruce Mansfield Power Station for disposal at the Landfill. Sierra Club filed a Notice of Appeal on October 22, 2015, challenging the Department's issuance of the minor modification of the Permit, which was docketed at EHB Doc. No. 2015-159-R. The Board subsequently consolidated the two appeals at EHB Doc. No. 2015-093-R.

The parties have agreed to a settlement, the major provisions of which provide for FirstEnergy's continued implementation and long-term maintenance of a remedy for the leachate detection zone of the Landfill, FirstEnergy's submission to the Department of a Part II

Water Quality Management Permit application for its leachate storage impoundment caustic drip system, FirstEnergy's implementation of a written plan for improvements to the existing Landfill surface, FirstEnergy's final closure of Phase 3 of the Landfill on a rolling basis and a deferral in shipments of coal combustion byproducts from the Bruce Mansfield Power Station to the Landfill until December 1, 2017.

We submit for your consideration the following comments on the proposed rulemaking published in the June 17, 2017 *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Our comments are based on criteria in Section 5.2 of the Regulatory Review Act (RRA) (71 P.S. § 745.5b). Section 5.1(a) of the RRA (71 P.S. § 745.5a(a)) directs the Environmental Quality Board (EQB) to respond to all comments received from us or any other source.

1. Determining whether the regulation is in the public interest; Clarity and lack of ambiguity; Reasonableness of requirements, implementation procedures and timetables for compliance.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Region III (EPA) cites several concerns in its comments related to the new rule in Section 129.63a and proposed amendments to the RACT II rule in Section 129.96. Because EPA's comments relate to our criteria regarding implementation, ambiguity, reasonableness and clarity, we share EPA's comments on this proposed regulation. EQB should carefully review EPA's comments and work closely with it to make the necessary amendments to bring this regulation into compliance with federal requirements. We will consider EQB's response to EPA in making a final determination as to whether the regulation is in the public interest.

2. Section 129.63a. Control of VOC emissions from industrial cleaning solvents.—Reasonableness of requirements.

Members of the regulated community request revisions to and clarification of the exemptions under Subsection (c) (relating to exceptions and exemptions) and Subsection (e) (relating to emissions limitations). Comments include the following:

 Lockheed Martin asks EQB to modify the regulation to include an exemption for other non-coating application/ activities that are critical to aerospace manufacturing and rework facilities. Likewise, Boeing Company states that the term "aerospace coatings" could be interpreted to limit the exemption to aerospace solvent cleaning activities associated with "coatings" only.

• East Penn Manufacturing states that it is "technically infeasible to use an alternate solvent wiping solution for battery cleaning operations" and that the use of an emissions capture system and add-on air pollution control device to abate volatile organic compound emissions from a battery cleaning operation is not cost-effective.

Opinion and Order

By the Commission:

By this Opinion and Order, we are initiating a review of the vegetation management practices of Electric Distribution Companies (EDCs) in Pennsylvania. We are of the opinion that proper vegetation management within transmission line rights-of-way is critical to ensuring that our electric grid operates in a safe and reliable manner.

The issue of vegetation management came to the forefront following a widespread power outage in the Northeastern United States in 2003, after which the attention of the Federal government focused sharply on the behavior of the operators of transmission lines. Congress passed the Energy Policy Act of 2005, Energy Policy Act of 2005, Pub.L. No. 109-58, 119 Stat. 594 (2005), with the authorization for a new electric reliability organization responsible for creating and enforcing man-datory reliability standards.¹ The North American Electric Reliability Corporation (NERC) assumed watchdog responsibility under the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) for federal enforcement of reliability standards, which include mandatory vegetation clearance standards. The clearance standards, known collectively as FAC-003-14, apply to owners of transmission lines rated at 200 kilovolts (kV) and higher, as well as any lowervoltage lines designated as critical to reliability by regional reliability organizations that report to NERC. The standards also set direct applicable line owners to "manage vegetation to prevent encroachments into the Minimum Vegetation Clearance Distance (MVCD)." The calculated MVCDs are outlined in FAC-003-Table 2.

To comply with the NERC standards, the EDCs implemented plans for their high voltage transmission rightsof-way (ROW) called the "wire zone/border zone" approach to eliminating all vegetation directly under the transmission lines and clearing the areas between the wires and the edges of the rights-of-way. This approach has been quite successful as evidenced by the quarterly NERC vegetation-related transmission outage reports. Reported Category 1 outages (those caused by grow-ins of vegetation from inside or outside of the ROW), have gone from 16 in 2007 to 0 in 2016.²

With this Opinion and Order, we restate and reinforce our unwavering belief that reliable electric service is essential to the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of this Commonwealth. To this end, we have promulgated regulations which require the EDCs to establish plans for the periodic inspection, maintenance, and replacement of their facilities and to file those plans with the Commission every two years.³ At the state level, our Regulations require each EDC to memorialize in writing and to submit to the Commission its plans for the routine and emergency inspection and maintenance of all facilities used to deliver electricity to customers (I&M Plans). This includes a condition-based plan involved in the clearance of vegetation surrounding its distribution system facil-ities. 52 Pa. Code § 57.198(n). The I&M Plans must also include a program for the maintenance of clearances of vegetation from the EDC's overhead system facilities. 52 Pa. Code § 57.198(f). The I&M Plans must be designed to reduce the risk of outages, and must be consistent with the National Electrical Safety Code and Practices of the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE), FERC regulations, and the provisions of the American National Standards Institute, Inc. (ANSI). 52 Pa. Code § 57.198(b).

Our review of the I&M Plans filed by the EDCs reveals that each of them is reasonable and consistent with the requirements. However, the I&M Plans are very general in nature and do not include a detailed account of the vegetation management specifications and operational procedures. As shown below, it has become obvious that our Regulations themselves may need to be amended to include a level of detail that would facilitate proper oversight of the plans. This lack of specificity in our current Regulations also makes it difficult to identify potential vegetation management best practices for the EDCs.

Through cases brought by property owners, it has come to our attention that EDCs have begun to apply the "wire zone/border zone" standard to lower level transmission lines, many of which are located much closer to residences. See Yanling Chen and Jianming Hu v. Metropolitan Edison Company, Docket No. C-2013-2397061 (Order entered November 5, 2015); Marlene Broman v. West Penn Power Company, Docket No. C-2013-2356237 (Order en-tered April 23, 2014); Marlene Broman v. West Penn Power Company, Docket No. C-2015-2485454 (Initial Decision issued November 4, 2016); Richard and Sandy Lehet v. PPL Electric Utilities Corporation, Docket No. C-2014-2449983 (Order entered October 28, 2015); Sarah Bernardi v. West Penn Power Company, Docket No. C-2014-2453852 (Order entered May 5, 2016); Jan and Joyce Spirat v. Metropolitan Edison Company, Docket No. C-2013-2367044 (Opinion and Order entered Sept. 11, 2014); Robert Mattu v. West Penn Power Company, Docket No. C-2016-2547322 (Tentative Opinion and Order entered July 14, 2017). While we are encouraged by the EDCs' zeal for improving reliability and recognize that proper vegetation management within transmission line rights-of-way is critical to ensuring that our electric grid operates in a safe and reliable manner, we also recognize the concerns of those landowners alarmed by the EDCs' methods of clearing rights-of-way adjacent to their homes and businesses. In our view, this change has been implemented without meaningful discussion between the industry and this Commission. Also, because the I&M Plans do not include detailed information on the specific vegetation management procedures, we find that there presently is no meaningful mechanism to evaluate the EDCs' actions as it relates to individual landowners. A landowner with concerns regarding an EDC's vegetation management practice near his or her land does not have a clear avenue through which to dispute the practice or request the use of a different management technique (e.g., the use of slash and burn clearance instead of the application of an

herbicide). A landowner also does not have easy access to the vegetation management specifications and procedures applicable to his or her property.

We note that the action we take today will not change or amend the federal requirements imposed on high voltage lines subject to NERC standards. NERC itself understands the distinction between high voltage, systemcritical lines and others in discussing the stricter standards of vegetation management:

This standard focuses on transmission lines to prevent those vegetation related outages that could lead to Cascading. It is not intended to prevent customer outages due to tree contact with lower voltage distribution system lines. For example, localized customer service might be disrupted if vegetation were to make contact with a 69kV transmission line supplying power to a 12kV distribution station. However, this standard is not written to address such isolated situations which have little impact on the overall electric transmission system.

NERC FAC-003-4 at page 4.

This Opinion and Order directs Commission Staff to form a collaborative that includes staff from the Commission's Bureau of Technical Utility Services, EDCs, public advocates, and interested stakeholders in order to explore vegetation management best practices. The goal of this endeavor will be to explore avenues to create EDC vegetation management plans that will: (1) include more detail; (2) explain the EDCs' approaches under stated circumstances; and (3) provide for additional customer education and accurate written materials. Additionally, our procedural Regulations may need to be amended in order to provide a mechanism for a customer to challenge an EDC's methodology for vegetation management and provide an appeal opportunity, such as a petition for relief, before this Commission. Based on this collaborative, we further direct Commission Staff to formulate a recommendation for the next step in the process of updating Commission oversight of vegetation management for consideration at a regularly scheduled Public Meeting in January 2018.

In our view, another procedure is necessary to afford due process to the affected property owners. Our current method provides for a dissatisfied customer to file a formal complaint with the Commission. 52 Pa. Code §§ 5.21—5.31. We then evaluate the formal complaint based on our standard review of determining whether the utility has violated a regulation, statute or Order of the Commission. As it is possible to find that a utility has acted consistently with a duly approved and wholly reasonable albeit vague vegetation management plan while producing an unacceptable outcome, we are not convinced that the complaint process is the optimal course to take in deciding these types of concerns.

We emphasize that this initiative is not intended to prevent an EDC from clearing and maintaining clearance on a right-of-way but to work towards establishing standards by which each EDC will act, and to provide a process for landowners who wish to question the EDC's decision regarding that methodology under appropriate circumstances; *Therefore*,

It Is Ordered That:

1. The Commission's Bureau of Technical Utility Services, in conjunction with the Commission's Law Bureau, convene a collaborative within thirty (30) days of the date

of entry of this Opinion and Order to discuss best industry practices and to find common ground in matters of vegetation management.

2. The Commission's Bureau of Technical Utility Services, in conjunction with the Commission's Law Bureau, prepare a recommendation for this Commission's consideration at a regularly scheduled Public Meeting in January 2018, outlining the next steps in the process of updating Commission oversight of vegetation management.

3. This Opinion and Order be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

4. A copy of this Opinion and Order be served upon the Office of Consumer Advocate, the Office of Small Business Advocate, the Commission's Bureau of Investigation and Enforcement, and all jurisdictional Electric Distribution Companies.
