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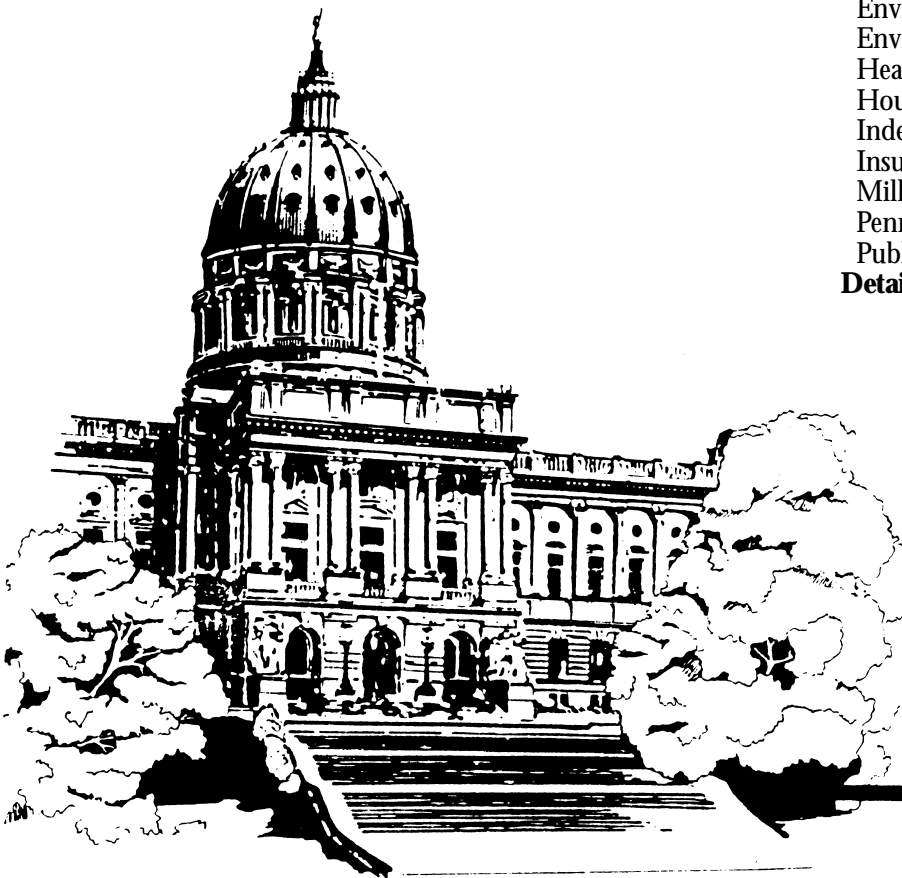

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READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where “no fiscal impact” is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

1. Rules 205(b) and (c) and 208(d) of the Pennsylvania Rules of Disciplinary Enforcement are amended as set forth in Annex A.

To the extent that publication of a notice of proposed rulemaking would otherwise be required with respect to the amendments adopted by this Order, such publication is hereby found to be unnecessary because the immediate adoption of this Order is required in the interest of justice and efficient administration; and,

3. This Order shall be processed in accordance with Rule 103(b) of the Pennsylvania Rules of Judicial Administration and the amendments shall be effective immediately.

CHAPTER 83. PENNSYLVANIA RULES OF DISCIPLINARY ENFORCEMENT

Subchapter B. MISCONDUCT

Rule 205. The Disciplinary Board of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania.

* * * * *

(b) The regular terms of members of the Board shall be for three years, and no member shall serve for more than two consecutive three-year terms. The terms of one-third of the members of the Board, as nearly as may be, shall expire on April 1 of each year. Except when acting under paragraphs (c)(5), (7) [and], (8) and (9) of this rule, the Board shall act only with the concurrence of not less than the lesser of:

* * * * *

(c) The Board shall have the power and duty:

* * * * *

(9) To administer, by the Board or through a designated panel of three members selected by the Board Chair, private reprimands to attorneys for misconduct.

* * * * *

Rule 208. Procedure.

* * * * *

(d) Review and action by Board.

* * * * *

(2) The Board shall either affirm or change in writing the recommendation of the hearing committee or special master by taking the following action, as appropriate, within 60 days after the adjudication of the matter at a meeting of the Board;

* * * * *

(ii) *Informal admonition or private reprimand.* In the event that the Board determines that the proceeding should be concluded by informal admonition or private reprimand, it shall arrange to have the respondent-attorney appear before Disciplinary Counsel for the purpose of receiving informal admonition or before a **designated panel of three members selected by the Board Chair pursuant to Pa.R.D.E. 205(c)(9)**, for the purpose of receiving private reprimand[, in which case the **Chairman shall deliver the private reprimand**].

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 25—ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY BOARD

[25 PA. CODE CH. 93]

Stream Redesignation (Browns Run)

The Environmental Quality Board (Board) by this order amends § 93.9q (relating to Drainage List Q) to read as set forth in Annex A.

This order was adopted by the Board at its meeting of July 15, 2003.

A. Effective Date

This final-form rulemaking is effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

C. Statutory Authority

This final-form rulemaking is being made under the authority of sections 5(b)(1) and 402 of The Clean Streams Law (35 P. S. §§ 691.5(b)(1) and 691.402), which authorize the Board to develop and adopt rules and regulations to implement the The Clean Streams Law, and section 1920-A of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 510-20), which grants to the Board the power and duty to formulate, adopt and promulgate rules and regulations for the proper performance of the work of the Department. In addition, section 303 of the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. § 1313) sets forth requirements for water quality standards and 40 CFR 131.32 (relating to Pennsylvania) sets forth certain requirements for portions of the Commonwealth's antidegradation program.

D. Background of the Final-Form Rulemaking

Water quality standards are in-stream water quality goals that are implemented by imposing specific regulatory requirements (such as treatment requirements and effluent limits) on individual sources of pollution.

The Department considers candidates for High Quality (HQ) or Exceptional Value (EV) waters and all other use designations in its ongoing review of water quality standards. In general, HQ and EV waters shall be maintained at their existing quality, and permitted activities, such as wastewater treatment requirements, shall ensure the attainment of all designated and existing uses.

The Department may identify candidates for redesignation during routine waterbody investigations. Requests for consideration may also be initiated by other agencies,

such as the Fish and Boat Commission (Commission). Organizations, businesses or individuals may submit a rulemaking petition to the Board.

Browns Run was evaluated in response to a request from the Commission, which requested that the stream be redesignated HQ-Cold Water Fishes (CWF).

Browns Run had been included in the French Creek, et al. proposed rulemaking package in January 1997, based on a field study conducted in 1994. During the public comment period on that proposed rulemaking, objections were raised to the recommendation for redesignation of most of the Browns Run basin to EV waters. These objections were based in part on the use of Cathers Run as the reference stream because it is designated HQ-CWF. It had been selected as the reference station because it was part of a "reference network" within the Water Quality Network, the Department's routine surface water monitoring system. The reference network contains streams minimally impacted by human activities. As a result of these public concerns, the Department agreed to resurvey Browns Run and compare it to a higher quality reference stream. The Department conducted the second field survey on June 2—4, 1998, and used East Hickory Creek, designated EV, as the reference. The redesignations in this final-form rulemaking are the result of this resurvey and comparison to the EV reference.

These aquatic surveys were conducted by the Department's Bureau of Water Supply and Wastewater Management. The physical and biological characteristics and other information on these waterbodies were evaluated to determine the appropriateness of the current and requested designations using applicable regulatory criteria and definitions. Based upon the data collected in these surveys, the Board has revised the designations to read as set forth in Annex A.

The Department's stream evaluation report is available from Edward R. Brezina whose address and telephone number are listed in Section B of this preamble.

E. Summary of Comments and Responses on the Proposed Rulemaking

The Board approved the proposed rulemaking on March 20, 2001, and it was published at 31 Pa.B 2375 (May 5, 2001) with provision for a 45-day public comment period that closed on June 19, 2001. A number of requests for a public hearing regarding Browns Run were received during the public comment period. A hearing was scheduled and announced at 31 Pa.B 3956 (July 21, 2001), at which time the public comment period for Browns Run was reopened. The public hearing was held in the Warren County Courthouse in Warren on September 4, 2001, and the public comment period closed 1 week later, on September 11, 2001.

Comments were received from 52 commentators and the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) as a result of the public comment period and the hearing. Fifteen commentators expressed support for the redesignation. Opposing comments included concerns with economic impacts and personal rights because of the redesignation, the choice of a reference water and that redesignation may cause impacts to the water because of increased use. The comment and response document explains that the EV redesignation is based on the current quality of the water, protection of EV waters is

accomplished through the Department's permitting and approval processes and current activities are not generally restricted.

No changes were made to the proposed rulemaking following the public comment period.

F. *Benefits, Costs and Compliance*

1. *Benefits*—Overall, the citizens of this Commonwealth will benefit from these recommended changes because they will reflect the appropriate designated use and maintain the most appropriate degree of protection for each stream in accordance with the existing use.

2. *Compliance Costs*—Generally, the changes should have no fiscal impact on, or create additional compliance costs for, the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The streams are already protected at their existing use, and therefore the designated use changes will have no impact on treatment requirements. No costs will be imposed directly upon local governments by this recommendation. Political subdivisions that add a new sewage treatment plant or expand an existing plant in these basins may experience changes in cost as noted in the discussion of impacts on the private sector.

Persons conducting or proposing activities or projects that result in new or expanded discharges to streams shall comply with the regulatory requirements relating to designated and existing uses. These persons could be adversely affected if they expand a discharge or add a new discharge point since they may need to provide a higher level of treatment to meet the designated and existing uses of the stream. These increased costs may take the form of higher engineering, construction or operating costs for wastewater treatment facilities. Treatment costs are site-specific and depend upon the size of the discharge in relation to the size of the stream and many other factors. It is therefore not possible to predict the actual change in costs.

Oil and gas and timbering operations may be required to implement antidegradation Best Management Practices to protect water quality. These practices are site-specific, so it is not possible to determine a precise estimate of costs. In addition, permit application fees for individual rather than general permits for stream encroachments or erosion and sedimentation control will be required.

3. *Compliance Assistance Plan*—The regulatory revision has been developed as part of an established program that has been implemented by the Department since the early 1980s. The revision is consistent with and based on existing Department regulations. The revision extends additional protection to selected waterbodies that exhibit exceptional water quality and are consistent with antidegradation requirements established by the Federal Clean Water Act and The Clean Streams Law. All surface waters in this Commonwealth are afforded a minimum level of protection through compliance with the water quality standards, which prevent pollution and protect existing water uses.

The redesignation will be implemented through the Department's permit and approval actions. For example, the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permitting program bases effluent limitations on the use designation of the stream. These permit conditions are established to assure water quality criteria are achieved and designated and existing uses are protected. New and expanding dischargers with water quality based effluent limitations are required to provide

effluent treatment according to the water quality criteria associated with existing and designated water uses.

4. *Paperwork Requirements*—The regulatory revision should have no direct paperwork impact on the Commonwealth, local governments and political subdivisions or the private sector. This regulatory revisions are based on existing Department regulations and simply mirror the existing use protection that is already in place for these streams. There may be some indirect paperwork requirements for new or expanding dischargers to streams upgraded to HQ or EV. For example, NPDES general permits are not currently available for new or expanded discharges to these streams. Thus, an individual permit, and its associated additional paperwork, would be required. Additionally, paperwork associated with demonstrating social and economic justification may be required for new or expanded discharges to certain HQ waters, and the nonfeasibility of nondischarge alternatives will be required for new or expanded discharges to certain HQ and EV waters.

G. *Pollution Prevention*

The antidegradation program is a major pollution prevention tool because its objective is to prevent degradation by maintaining and protecting existing water quality and existing uses. Although the antidegradation program does not prohibit new or expanded wastewater discharges, nondischarge alternatives are encouraged, and required when environmentally sound and cost-effective. Nondischarge alternatives, when implemented, remove impacts to surface water and reduce the overall level of pollution to the environment by remediation of the effluent through the soil.

H. *Sunset Review*

This final-form rulemaking will be reviewed in accordance with the sunset review schedule published by the Department to determine whether the final-form rulemaking effectively fulfills the goals for which it was intended.

I. *Regulatory Review*

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on April 23, 2001, the Department submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 31 Pa.B 2375, to IRRC and to the Chairpersons of the Senate and House Environmental Resources and Energy Committees for review and comment.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, the Department also provided IRRC and the Committees with copies of the comments received, as well as other documentation. In preparing the final-form rulemaking, the Department has considered all comments received from IRRC and the public. The Committees did not provide comments on the proposed rulemaking.

Under section 5.1(j.2) the Regulatory Review Act, this final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the House and Senate Committees on September 11, 2003. IRRC met on September 12, 2003, and approved the final-form rulemaking in accordance with section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(e)).

J. *Findings*

The Board finds that:

(1) Public notice of proposed rulemaking was given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) A public comment period was provided as required by law, and all comments were considered.

(3) The final-form rulemaking does not enlarge the purpose of the proposal published at 31 Pa.B 2375.

(4) This final-form rulemaking is necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing acts identified in Section C of this preamble.

(5) This regulatory amendment does not contain standards or requirements that exceed requirements of the companion Federal regulations.

K. Order

The Board, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Department, 25 Pa. Code Chapter 93, are amended by amending § 93.9q to read as set forth in Annex A, with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulation.

(b) The Chairperson of the Board shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of General Counsel and the Office of Attorney General for approval and review as to legality and form, as required by law.

(c) The Chairperson shall submit this order and Annex A to IRRC and the Senate and House Environmental Resources and Energy Committees as required by the Regulatory Review Act.

(d) The Chairperson of the Board shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau, as required by law.

(e) This order shall take effect immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

**TITLE 25. ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

Stream Redesignation (East Branch Codorus Creek)

The Environmental Quality Board (Board) by this order amends § 93.9o (relating to Drainage List O) to read as set forth in Annex A.

This order was adopted by the Board at its meeting of May 21, 2003.

A. *Effective Date*

This final-form rulemaking is effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

C. *Statutory and Regulatory Authority*

This final-form rulemaking is being made under the authority of sections 5(b)(1) and 402 of The Clean Streams Law (35 P. S. §§ 691.5(b)(1) and 691.402), which authorize the Board to develop and adopt rules and regulations to implement the provisions of The Clean Streams Law, and section 1920-A of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 510-20), which grants to the Board the power and duty to formulate, adopt and promulgate rules and regulations for the proper performance of the work of the Department. In addition, section 303 of the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. § 1313) sets forth requirements for water quality standards and 40 CFR 131.32 (relating to Pennsylvania) sets forth certain requirements for portions of the Commonwealth's antidegradation program.

D. *Background of the Final-Form Rulemaking*

Water quality standards are in-stream water quality goals that are implemented by imposing specific regulatory requirements (such as treatment requirements and effluent limits) on individual sources of pollution.

The lower reaches of the East Branch Codorus Creek, including Lake Redman and Lake Williams, were evaluated in response to a rulemaking petition submitted by The York Water Company. The petition requested redesignation of the main stem of the East Branch Codorus Creek from the inlet of Lake Redman to the mouth from Cold Water Fishes (CWF) to Warm Water Fishes (WWF).

The Department's evaluation involved review of data in the petition and data obtained from the Fish and Boat Commission. The data shows that Lake Redman, Lake Williams and the East Branch Codorus Creek downstream from Lake Williams support a WWF community. The existence of a warm water fishery in Lake Redman has been documented since 1970. Surveys beginning in

1983 have shown a warm water community in Lake Williams. The warm water fishery in the lower main stem was documented in 1996. The hydrologic modification of the stream—the construction of the lakes—preclude attainment of the CWF use.

The Department's evaluation report is available from Edward R. Brezina whose address and phone number are listed in Section B.

E. *Summary of Comments and Responses on the Proposed Rulemaking*

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Region 3 office provided the only comments on the proposed rulemaking. The EPA's comments were: "The Department of Environmental Protection has documented to EPA's satisfaction that this redesignation is appropriate. In accordance with Federal regulation at 40 CFR 131.10(g), DEP has demonstrated that attaining the cold water fisheries designated use is not feasible because dams, diversions or other types of hydrologic modifications preclude the attainment of the use, and it is not feasible to restore the water body to its original condition or to operate such modification in a way that would result in the attainment of the use."

F. *Benefits, Costs and Compliance*

Benefits—Overall, the citizens of this Commonwealth will benefit from this final-form rulemaking because it will reflect the appropriate designated use and maintain the most appropriate degree of protection for this stream. In addition, the York Water Company will benefit by being able to meet projected future water demands and ensuring an adequate water supply for its customers. The change in designation would allow water withdrawn from the Susquehanna River to be pumped, as needed, into Lake Redman for water supplies.

Compliance Costs—Generally, the final-form rulemaking should have no fiscal impact on or create additional compliance costs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. No costs will be imposed directly upon local governments by this redesignation.

Persons conducting or proposing activities or projects that result in new or expanded discharges to streams must comply with the regulatory requirements relating to the designated use. Treatment costs are site-specific and depend upon the size of the discharge in relation to the size of the stream and many other factors.

Compliance Assistance Plan—The final-form rulemaking has been developed as part of an established program and is consistent with water quality standards requirements established by the Federal Clean Water Act and The Clean Streams Law. All surface waters in this Commonwealth are afforded a minimum level of protection through compliance with the water quality standards, which prevent pollution and protect designated water uses.

The redesignations will be implemented through the Department's permit and approval actions. For example, the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permitting program bases effluent limitations on the use designation of the stream. These permit conditions are established to assure water quality criteria are achieved and designated and existing uses are protected. New and expanding dischargers with water quality based effluent limitations are required to provide effluent treatment according to the water quality criteria associated with existing and designated water uses.

Paperwork Requirements—This final-form rulemaking should have no direct paperwork impact on the Commonwealth, local governments, political subdivisions or the private sector. This final-form rulemaking is based on existing Department regulations.

G. *Pollution Prevention*

The water quality standards program is a major pollution prevention tool because the objective is to protect in-stream water uses.

H. *Sunset Review*

This final-form rulemaking will be reviewed in accordance with the sunset review schedule published by the Department to determine whether the final-form rulemaking effectively fulfills the goals for which it was intended.

I. *Regulatory Review*

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on September 24, 2002, the Department submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 32 Pa.B. 4866 (October 5, 2002), to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and the Chairpersons of the Senate and House Environmental Resources and Energy Committees for review and comment.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC and the Committees were provided with copies of the comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. In preparing the final-form rulemaking, the Department has considered all comments from IRRC, the Committees and the public.

Under section 5.1(j.2) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(j.2)), on August 27, 2003, the final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the House and Senate Committees. The final-form rulemaking was deemed approved under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, effective August 27, 2008.

J. *Findings*

The Board finds that:

(1) Public notice of proposed rulemaking was given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) A public comment period was provided as required by law, and all comments were considered.

(3) This final-form rulemaking does not enlarge the purpose of the proposed rulemaking published at 32 Pa.B. 4866.

(4) This final-form rulemaking is necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing acts identified in Section C of this preamble.

(5) This final-form rulemaking does not contain standards or requirements that exceed requirements of the companion Federal regulations.

K. *Order*

The Board, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Department, 25 Pa. Code Chapter 93, are amended by amending § 93.90 to read as set forth in Annex A, with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulations.

(b) The Chairperson of the Board shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of General Counsel and the Office of Attorney General for review and approval as to legality and form, as required by law.

(c) The Chairperson shall submit this order and Annex A to IRRC and the Senate and House Environmental Resources and Energy Committees as required by the Regulatory Review Act.

(d) The Chairperson of the Board shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau, as required by law.

(e) This order shall take effect immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

S. §§ 691.5(b)(1) and 691.402), which authorize the Board to develop and adopt rules and regulations to implement the provisions of The Clean Streams Law, and section 1920-A of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 510-20), which grants to the Board the power and duty to formulate, adopt and promulgate rules and regulations for the proper performance of the work of the Department. In addition, section 303 of the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. § 1313) sets forth requirements for water quality standards and 40 CFR 131.32 (relating to Pennsylvania) sets forth certain requirements for portions of the Commonwealth's antidegradation program.

D. Background of the Final-Form Rulemaking

The Department considers candidates for High Quality (HQ) or Exceptional Value (EV) waters designation in its ongoing review of water quality standards. In general, HQ and EV waters shall be maintained at their existing quality. The Department may identify candidates for

redesignation during routine waterbody investigations. Requests for consideration may also be initiated by other agencies, such as the Fish and Boat Commission (Commission). Organizations, businesses or individuals may submit a rulemaking petition to the Board.

These streams were evaluated in response to five petitions, as well as a request from the Commission:

Petitions: Oysterville Creek (Berks County); West Branch Perkiomen Creek (Berks County); Unnamed Tributary to Chester Creek (Delaware County); Cove Creek (Bedford County); and Trout Run (York County)

Commission: Rambo Run (York County)

The Department's Bureau of Water Supply and Wastewater Management conducted aquatic surveys on these streams. The physical, chemical and biological characteristics and other information on these waterbodies were evaluated to determine the appropriateness of the current and requested designations using applicable regulatory criteria and definitions. In reviewing whether waterbodies qualify as HQ or EV waters, the Department considers the criteria in § 93.4b (relating to qualifying as High Quality or Exceptional Value Waters). Based on the data collected in these surveys, the Board has made the designations in Annex A.

E. Summary of Comments and Responses on the Proposed Rulemaking

The Board approved the Oysterville Creek, et al. proposed rulemaking package at its March 19, 2002, meeting. The proposed rulemaking was published at 32 Pa.B. 2219 (May 4, 2002) with provision for a 45-day public comment period that closed on June 18, 2002. A request for a public hearing regarding Oysterville Creek and the West Branch Perkiomen Creek was received during the public comment period. A Board hearing was scheduled and an announcement was published at 32 Pa.B. 2994 (June 22, 2002), at which time the public comment period for these two streams was reopened. The public hearing was held in the Brandywine Heights High School in Topton (Berks County) on August 7, 2002, and the public comment period closed 2 weeks later, on August 21, 2002. Because of the public interest, the Department held a public informational meeting immediately preceding the hearing. The purposes of the meeting were to present information on the antidegradation program and the recommended redesignations of the two streams and to answer questions from the public.

Comments were received from 72 commentators and the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) as a result of the public comment period and the public hearing. Comments were received concerning Cove Creek, Oysterville Creek, West Branch Perkiomen Creek, Rambo Run and Trout Run.

IRRC was concerned that no new biological sampling was conducted on Cove Creek. The recommended redesignation of the lower reaches of the stream to EV is based on a revised implementation method for the Percent Dominant Taxon metric. The lower portion of Cove Creek was not initially recommended for EV designation because of the dominance of a single species, a pollution-sensitive mayfly. Dominance by one taxon often indicates an aquatic community stressed by pollution. Both the Department and the Commission recognized that biological communities may be naturally dominated by one or two species or temporarily dominated by one or two taxa because their reproductive cycle has yielded large numbers of individuals over a very brief interval. The revised implementation gives this metric the highest score in a candidate stream reach if the aquatic community is dominated by a single taxon that is a pollution-sensitive species, because this condition does not indicate a pollution problem. The new scoring method was applied to the data already collected from lower Cove Creek.

A total of 50 commentators provided comments on Oysterville and West Branch Perkiomen Creeks. Of these, 38 were in favor of the proposed redesignation of portions of these basins, 8 were in opposition and 4 provided general comments. Those opposed were concerned with the possible costs of redesignation to landowners and the potential loss of property rights. The comment and response document explains that redesignation will primarily affect new or expanding point source discharges and that current activities will generally not be restricted.

There were 21 comments concerning the redesignation of Rambo Run. All supported the redesignation of the Rambo Run basin to EV.

Four commentators addressed Trout Run. Two specifically endorsed the redesignation, while the other two commentators questioned the change in the Department's recommendation from that proposed in 1997. The comment and response document explains that Trout Run was resurveyed using a more appropriate cold water reference stream. As a result, the biological condition score comparison for the upper portion of the stream fell in the regulatory range for HQ designation.

F. Summary of Changes to the Proposed Rulemaking

No changes were made to the redesignations recommended in the proposed rulemaking.

G. Benefits, Cost and Compliance

Benefits—Overall, the citizens of this Commonwealth will benefit from the final-form rulemaking because it will reflect the appropriate designated use and maintain the most appropriate degree of protection for each stream in accordance with the existing use.

Compliance Costs—Generally, the final-form rulemaking should have no fiscal impact on or create additional compliance costs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The streams are already protected at their existing use, and therefore the designated use changes will have no impact on treatment requirements. No costs will be imposed directly upon local governments by the final-form rulemaking. Political subdivisions that add a new sewage treatment plant or expand an existing plant in these basins may experience changes in costs.

Persons conducting or proposing activities or projects that result in new or expanded discharges to streams must comply with the regulatory requirements regarding designated and existing uses. These persons could be adversely affected if they expand a discharge or add a

new discharge point since they may need to provide a higher level of treatment to meet the designated and existing uses of the stream. These increased costs may take the form of higher engineering, construction or operating costs for wastewater treatment facilities. Treatment costs are site-specific and depend upon the size of the discharge in relation to the size of the stream and many other factors. It is therefore not possible to precisely predict the actual change in costs.

Compliance Assistance Plan—The final-form rulemaking has been developed as part of an established program that has been implemented by the Department since the early 1980s. The final-form rulemaking is consistent with and based on existing Department regulations. The final-form rulemaking extends additional protection to selected water bodies that exhibit exceptional water quality and are consistent with antidegradation requirements established by the Federal Clean Water Act and The Clean Streams Law. All surface waters in this Commonwealth are afforded a minimum level of protection through compliance with the water quality standards, which prevent pollution and protect existing water uses.

The redesignations will be implemented through the Department's permit and approval actions. For example, the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permitting program bases effluent limitations on the use designation of the stream. These permit conditions are established to assure water quality criteria are achieved and designated and existing uses are protected. New and expanding dischargers with water quality based effluent limitations are required to provide effluent treatment according to the water quality criteria associated with existing and designated water uses.

Paperwork Requirements—The final-form rulemaking should have no direct paperwork impact on the Commonwealth, local governments, political subdivisions or the private sector. The final-form rulemaking is based on existing Department regulations and simply mirrors the existing use protection that is already in place for these streams. There may be some indirect paperwork requirements for new or expanded discharges to streams upgraded to HQ or EV. For example, NPDES general permits are not currently available for new or expanded discharges to these streams. Thus an individual permit, and its associated paperwork, would be required. Additionally, paperwork associated with demonstrating social and economic justification may be required for new or expanded discharges to certain HQ waters and the nonfeasibility of nondischarge alternatives will be required for new or expanded discharges to certain HQ and EV waters.

H. Pollution Prevention

The antidegradation program is a major pollution prevention tool because its objective is to prevent degradation by maintaining and protecting existing water quality and existing uses. Although the antidegradation program does not prohibit new or expanded wastewater discharges, nondischarge alternatives are encouraged and required when environmentally sound and cost effective. Nondischarge alternatives, when implemented, remove impacts to surface water and reduce the overall level of pollution to the environment by remediation of the effluent through the soil.

Department to determine whether the regulations effectively fulfill the goals for which they were intended.

J. Regulatory Review

(a) The tables in §§ 93.9a—93.9z display designated water uses and water quality criteria in addition to the water uses and criteria specified in Tables 2 and 3. Designated uses shall be protected in accordance with Chapters 95 and 96 (relating to wastewater treatment requirements; and water quality standards implementation) and any other applicable State and Federal laws and regulations. The tables also indicate specific exceptions to Tables 2 and 3 on a stream-by-stream or segment-by-segment basis by the words “add” or “delete” followed by the appropriate symbols described elsewhere in this chapter. The county column in §§ 93.9a—93.9z indicates the county in which the mouth of the stream is located. Abbreviations used in the “Zone” column are as follows:

- T—Township Road
- LR—Pennsylvania Legislative Route
- SR—Pennsylvania State Route
- FAS—Federal Aid Secondary Highway
- US—United States Federal Route
- I—Interstate Highway
- RM—River Mile; river miles are used to indicate the distance from a point on the waterbody to its mouth and are based on the Department’s River Mile Index
- UNT—Unnamed Tributary

PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the Background Standard, Statewide Health Standard, the Site-Specific Standard or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, a combination of the cleanup standards or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the act will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any

contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n) (1) (ii) and 305(c) (2) of the act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a Site-Specific Standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a Site-Specific Standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period, the municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments should be directed to the remediator of the site.

All vapors extracted from the contaminated soil will be directed to the biofilter which will consist of a 900 square foot surface area mulch bed in which the VOCs and volatile HAPs contained in the vapors will decompose due to the presence of microorganisms. The resultant emission of combined VOCs and volatile HAPs to the atmosphere will be no greater than 3.6 tons per year.

The Department has determined that the proposed construction and installation will comply with all applicable regulatory requirements pertaining to air contami-

nation sources and the emission of air contaminants including the best available technology requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12. The Department consequently intends to issue a plan approval.

The following is a summary of the conditions the Department plans to place in the plan approval to be issued to ensure compliance with all applicable regulatory requirements:

1. All vapors from the soil vapor extraction system shall be directed to the biofilter.

2. The total volume of gases (soil vapors and ambient air) directed to the biofilter shall never exceed 600 cubic feet per minute.

3. The biofilter bed surface shall be 30 feet long by 30 feet wide and the bed shall contain at least 213 cubic yards of filter material (mulch).

4. The biofilter shall achieve a combined VOC and volatile HAP destruction and removal efficiency of at least 92% at all times, including initial startup of the biofilter. Additionally, the total combined VOC and volatile HAP emissions from the biofilter shall not exceed 3.6 tons in any 12 consecutive month period.

5. Upon startup of the soil vapor extraction system and biofilter, the soil vapors from the soil vapor extraction system shall be diluted with ambient air so that the resultant gas stream ducted to the biofilter consists of 10% soil vapors and 90% ambient air (by volume). The percentage of soil vapors shall thereafter be gradually increased and the percentage of ambient air decreased until the gas stream to the biofilter is 100% soil vapors.

6. The permittee shall monitor and record the total flow of all gases to the biofilter, the biofilter influent gas humidity, the biofilter bed temperature, the concentration of VOC/volatile HAPs at the biofilter bed inlet and the concentration of VOC/volatile HAPs emitted from the biofilter bed surface. The permittee shall additionally perform visible inspections of the biofilter bed surface and the biofilter air handling system. The monitoring and inspection shall be performed frequently enough prior to the introduction of 100% soil vapors to the biofilter to ensure compliance with the 92% destruction and removal efficiency requirement and shall thereafter be performed on a weekly basis for the remainder of the first 90 days of operation and twice per month thereafter.

9. The vapor pressure of the fountain solution additive shall be no greater than 16 millimeters of mercury at 20°C unless prior approval has been obtained from the Department.

10. The fountain solution shall not contain more than 6 ounces of additive for every gallon of water.

11. The amount of blanket wash solution used by the printing press shall not exceed 600 gallons during any 12 consecutive month period.

12. The blanket wash solution shall not contain more than .11 pound of volatile HAPs per gallon unless prior approval has been obtained from the Department.

13. The vapor pressure of the blanket wash solution shall be no greater than 3 millimeters of mercury at 20°C unless prior approval has been obtained from the Department.

14. All solvent-laden rags used for cleanup shall be stored in closed containers after use until properly disposed of. Solvent-laden rags shall not be treated by allowing solvents to evaporate into the atmosphere.

15. The total combined VOC emissions from the printing press shall not exceed 5.25 tons in any 12 consecutive month period.

16. The total combined volatile HAP emissions from the printing press shall not exceed 2.12 tons in any 12 consecutive month period.

17. The VOC emissions from the Goss press, Harris press and Tensor Tower press shall not exceed 8.05 tons, 5.51 tons and 6.16 tons of VOCs, respectively, in any 12 consecutive month period.

18. Records shall be maintained of the identity and amount of each ink, fountain solution additive and blanket wash solution used for each individual press for each month.

The UV topcoats used in the prefinish line shall have a maximum theoretical VOC content of 0.13 pound of VOCs per gallon of coating (based on the identities and quantities of coating constituents mixed together to produce the coating) but may be shown by Method 24 to have a VOC content of up to 0.68 pound of VOCs per gallon of coating.

3. The VOC content of the coating used in the three spray booths (other than strippable booth coating) shall not exceed 1.5 pounds of VOCs per gallon of coating. The VOC content of all strippable booth coating used in the three spray booths shall not exceed 1.2 pounds of VOCs per gallon of coating.

4. No more than 100 gallons of strippable booth coating shall be used in the prefinish line and three spray booths combined in any 12 consecutive month period.

The approval of coverage for land application of sewage sludge or residential septage under applicable general permit is subject to pollutant limitations, pathogen and vector attraction reduction requirements, operational standards, general requirements, management practices and other conditions set forth in the respective permit. The permits and related documents, effluent limitations, permitting requirements and other information are on file and may be inspected and arrangements made for copying at the contact office noted before the action.

Persons aggrieved by an action may appeal, under section 4 of the Environmental Hearing Board Act (35 P. S. § 7514) and 2 Pa.C.S. §§ 501—508 and 701—704 (relating to the Administrative Agency Law), to the Environmental Hearing Board, Second Floor, Rachel Carson State Office Building, 400 Market Street, P. O. Box 8457, Harrisburg, PA 17105-8457, (717) 787-3483. TDD users may contact the Environmental Hearing Board (Board) through the Pennsylvania Relay Service, (800) 654-5984. Appeals must be filed with the Board within 30 days of publication of this notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, unless the appropriate statute provides a different time period. Copies of the appeal form and the Board's rules of practice and procedure may be obtained from the Board. The appeal form and the Board's rules of practice and procedure are also available in Braille or on audiotape from the Secretary to the Board at (717) 787-3483. This paragraph does not, in and of itself, create any right of appeal beyond that permitted by applicable statutes and decision law.

For individuals who wish to challenge an action, appeals must reach the Board within 30 days. A lawyer is not needed to file an appeal with the Board.

For the past several years, 21 55-gallon drums of used motor oil (nonaqueous) sludge have been abandoned on the Site. The sludge was generated from the clean-out of an onsite sludge pit. The drums are currently stored on the property, but the building is in disrepair and not secure. Sampling of the drummed motor oil sludge has shown it to contain hazardous substances. East Pennsboro Township officials have concerns for safety and protection of public health with respect to the abandoned drums.

The Department considered two alternatives: (1) no action, which allows the drums to remain in place; and

(2) drum removal and disposal at an appropriate treatment/disposal facility. The Department chose alternative 2 and removed the drums prior to developing the Administrative Record to be protective of human health and safety and the environment. The cost of this action is estimated at \$12,215.

The Department is providing this notice under sections 505(b) and 506(b) of the HSCA (35 P. S. §§ 6020.505(b) and 6020.506(b)) and the publication of this notice starts the Administrative Record period under the HSCA. The Administrative Record, which contains information about the Site and supports the Department's decision to perform this action at the Site, is available for public review and comment. The Administrative Record can be examined from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Department's Southcentral Regional Office, 909 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110 by contacting Asuquo Effiong, (717) 705-4853.

The Administrative Record will be open for comment from November 1, 2003, and will remain open for 90 days. Persons may submit written comments regarding this action to the Department before January 24, 2003, by mailing them to Asuquo Effiong at the previous address.

PREAMBLE 3

The Department has taken action on the following plans and reports under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Provisions of 25 Pa. Code § 250.8 and the administration of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a notice of its final actions on plans and reports. A final report is submitted to document cleanup of a release of a regulated substance at a site to one of the remediation standards of the act. A final report provides a description of the site investigation to characterize the nature and extent of contaminants in environmental media, the basis of selecting the environmental media of concern, documentation supporting the selection of residential or nonresidential exposure factors, a description of the remediation performed and summaries of sampling methodology and analytical results which demonstrate that the remediation has attained the cleanup standard selected. Plans and reports required by provisions of the act for compliance with selection of remediation

tion to a Site-Specific Standard, in addition to a final report, include a remedial investigation report, risk assessment report and cleanup plan. A remedial investigation report includes conclusions from the site investigation, concentration of regulated substances in environmental media, benefits of refuse of the property and, in some circumstances, a fate and transport analysis. If required, a risk assessment report describes potential adverse effects caused by the presence of regulated substances. If required, a cleanup plan evaluates the abilities of potential remedies to achieve remedy requirements. A work plan for conducting a baseline remedial investigation is required by provisions of the act for compliance with selection of a special industrial area remediation. The baseline remedial investigation, based on the work plan, is compiled into the baseline environmental report to establish a reference point to show existing contamination, describe proposed remediation to be done and include a description of existing or potential public benefits of the use or reuse of the property. The Department may approve or disapprove plans and reports submitted. This notice provides the Department's decision and, if relevant, the basis for disapproval.

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) certifies that there is reasonable assurance that the Lake Wallenpaupack Hydroelectric Project (Project), owned and operated by PPL Holtwood, LLC (Owner), on the Lackawaxen River will comply with section 401 of the Federal Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C.A. § 1341) and 25 Pa. Code Chapters 93 and 96, provided that the Project is operated and monitored in a manner consistent with the following conditions.

Conditions of Certification under section 401(d) of the Clean Water Act:

1. *Water Quality Limitations*

a. Operation of the Project shall not cause the dissolved oxygen concentration, measured as follows, to be less than the instantaneous minimum and/or the minimum daily average as specified in 25 Pa. Code § 93.7.

b. Operation of the Project shall not cause the pH, measured as follows, to be less than or greater than the standards as specified in 25 Pa. Code § 93.7.

2. *Monitoring and Reporting*

a. The Owner shall conduct effluent monitoring of the turbine discharge for the following parameters at the railroad bridge (discharge location) as follows:

<i>Parameter</i>	<i>Minimum Measurement Frequency</i>
DO	Daily
pH	Daily
Temperature	Daily
Total—Iron	Weekly
Flow	Daily

Analytical methods promulgated in 40 CFR Part 136 must be used.

Samples shall be taken when discharging at a time representative of the entire discharge period. Iron samples shall be a composite sample (minimum of four grabs) evenly spaced throughout the discharge period. Dissolved oxygen sampling shall consist of a minimum of four grab samples evenly spaced throughout the discharge period. Grab samples shall be taken for the other parameters. Flow shall be measured and reported as a daily average. The Owner may request the Department to change the monitoring schedule in this paragraph after the completion of a 1-year monitoring cycle conducted in accordance with this paragraph. The Owner retains the right to challenge any Department decision concerning a request to change the monitoring schedule submitted in accordance with this paragraph.

Monitoring results obtained during each month shall be summarized for that month and submitted to the Department and received no later than the 28th day of the following month. The monthly reports shall include sample results, collection time and date, discharge start and end times and comments.

b. The Owner shall conduct annual in-stream benthos monitoring for 5 consecutive years at two stations: Station 1 above the discharge approximately 600 feet and Station 2 below the discharge approximately 1,300 feet, in accordance with *PADEP—RBP Benthic Macroinvertebrate Sample Collection and Processing Methodology for Cause/Effect Surveys*. Thereafter, the Owner shall conduct in-stream benthos monitoring as set forth in this paragraph once every 3 years. The station locations are fixed and should not change without prior approval from the Department. The Owner will follow the sample collection protocol set forth for a stream greater than 50 feet in width. Samples must be collected between August 1 and October 31 during normal to low stream flow conditions. The benthic macroinvertebrate report shall be submitted by February 1st of the following year to the Department.

c. The Department retains the right to specify additional studies or monitoring to ensure that the receiving water quality is not adversely impacted by any hydrogen sulfide treatment process that may be employed by the Owner.

3. *Operation*—The Owner shall at all times properly operate and maintain all facilities and systems of treatment and control (and related appurtenances) which are installed by the Owner to achieve compliance with the terms and conditions of this Certification. Proper operation and maintenance includes, but is not limited to, adequate laboratory controls and appropriate quality assurance procedures. This provision also includes the operation of backup or auxiliary facilities or similar systems that are installed by the Owner.

4. *Inspection*—The Project, including all relevant records, is subject to inspection at reasonable hours and intervals by an authorized representative of the Department to determine compliance with this Certification and the Commonwealth's water quality standards. A copy of this Certification shall be available for inspection by the Department during inspections of the Project.

5. *Transfer of Project*—If the Owner intends to transfer any legal or equitable interest in the Project which is affected by this Certification, the Owner shall serve a copy of this Certification upon the prospective transferee of the legal and equitable interest at least 30 days prior to the contemplated transfer and shall simultaneously

inform the Regional Office of the Department of intent. Notice to the Department shall include a transfer agreement signed by the existing and new owner containing a specific date for transfer of Certification responsibility, coverage and liability between them.

6. *Correspondence*—Correspondence with and submittals to the Department concerning this Certification should be addressed to Department of Environmental Protection, Water Management Program Manager, 2 Public Square, Wilkes-Barre, PA 18711.

7. *Reservation of Rights*—The Department may suspend or revoke this Certification if it determines that the Owner has not complied with the terms and conditions of this Certification. The Department may require additional measures to achieve compliance with applicable law, subject to the Owner's applicable procedural and substantive rights.

8. *Other Laws*—Nothing in this Certification shall be construed to preclude the institution of any legal action or relieve the Owner from any responsibilities, liabilities or penalties established under any applicable Federal or State law or regulation.

9. *Severability*—The provisions of this Certification are severable and should any provision of this Certification be declared invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of the Certification shall not be affected thereby.

Certified emission inspection stations in the Pittsburgh region must be capable of performing the OBD—inspection/maintenance (I/M) check by March 31, 2004. Certified emission inspection stations in the Philadelphia

region must be capable of performing the OBD—I/M check by June 30, 2004. From January 1, 2004, to March 31, 2004, vehicles of model year 1996 and newer in the Pittsburgh region may comply with the I/M program (emissions inspection) through the performance of either an I/M emission test (tailpipe test) or the OBD—I/M check. From April 1, 2004, to June 30, 2004, vehicles of model year 1996 and newer in the Philadelphia region may comply with the I/M program through the performance of either an I/M emission test (tailpipe test) or the OBD—I/M check.

Department of Transportation Regulation No. 18-374

Physical and Mental Criteria, Including Vision Standards Relating to the Licensing of Drivers

October 22, 2003

We submit for consideration the following comments that include references to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5b) which have not been met. The Department of Transportation (Department) must respond to these comments when it submits the final-form regulation. The public comment period for this regulation closed on September 22, 2003. If the final-form regulation is not delivered within 2 years of the close of the public comment period, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

1. Section 83.2. Definitions.—Clarity.

“Aura” is defined as “an epileptic seizure which does not alter an individual’s ability to think clearly or interfere with an individual’s mechanical or sensory ability to operate a motor vehicle.” This differs from the description of “aura” in the preamble. The preamble describes an “aura” as the physical warning many people experience prior to a seizure. The definition of “aura” in the final-form regulation should be amended to rectify the inconsistency between the proposed definition and the description in the preamble.

2. Section 83.3. Visual standards.—Clarity.

Subsections (a) and (b)

Under subsections (a)(1) and (b), the phrase “less visual acuity than” should be changed to “visual acuity less than” for consistency with the wording in subsection (a)(2).

Subsection (c)

Subsection (c)(1)(iii) uses the term “freeway.” The final-form regulation should contain a cross-reference to the definition of “freeway” in 75 Pa.C.S. § 102.

Subsection (c)(1)(v) states that a person’s driving privilege could be limited to a certain geographic area if “determined by the Department to be appropriate.” Under what circumstances would the Department limit a driver to a specific geographic area? What criteria would be used to establish the boundaries of the geographic area?

3. Section 83.4. Seizure disorder.—Clarity.

The last sentence of subsection (a) states that a person who has experienced only “an aura” during a 6-month period will not be disqualified to drive. A strict reading of this provision would disqualify from driving a person who experienced more than one aura during the 6-month period. It is our understanding that this is not the Department’s intent. Therefore, the phrase “an aura” should be changed to “auras.”

4. Section 83.5. Other physical and medical standards.—Clarity.

Subsection (b)

Subsection (b)(2)(i) and (3)(i) states the following: “The provider shall inform the patient of the prohibition against driving due to the functional impairment.” How does the Department intend to enforce this provision against both providers and patients?

In its comments, the Pennsylvania Psychological Association (PPA) suggests that the phrase “examination by the physician” in subsection (b)(5) be changed to “examination by the provider” since psychologists as well as physicians use the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders. The PPA’s proposed revision would be consistent with the terminology used throughout subsection (b), and we suggest the Department include this revision in the final-form regulation.

In subsection (b)(5), the last sentence refers to the “applicant’s history as provided by self or *others*.” (Emphasis added.) The final-form regulation should clarify who is included in “others.”

Subsection (c)

Subsection (c) provides that a person with any of certain conditions “*may* be required to undergo a special driving examination to determine driving competency.”

(Emphasis added.) What does a special driving exam entail? Under what circumstances will a special driving examination be required?

5. Miscellaneous clarity issues.

Throughout this rulemaking, the word “physician” and the phrase “licensed physician” are used interchangeably. “Physician” is used in §§ 83.2 (definition of “seizure”), 83.4(a) and (c), 83.5(b)(5) and 83.6. “Licensed physician” is used in 83.3(c)(1), 83.4(b) and 83.5(b)(6). The term “licensed physician” is defined in § 83.2. For consistency, the Board should use the defined term “licensed physician” in the sections previously noted.

Department of Transportation
Regulation No. 18-385
Vehicle Equipment and Inspection
October 22, 2003

We submit for consideration the following comments that include references to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5b) which have not been met. The Department of Transportation (Department) must respond to these comments when it submits the final-form regulation. The public comment period for this regulation closed on September 22, 2003. If the final-form regulation is not delivered within 2 years of the close of the public comment period, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

1. Vehicles exempted from emission inspections—Reasonableness; Consistency with other regulations; Need; Economic impact.

The proposed regulation incorporates a visual inspection of emission control equipment into the annual safety vehicle equipment inspection for passenger cars and light trucks covered by Chapter 175, Subchapter E. The proposed regulation will apply only to the counties that are not subject to the emission inspection program under Chapter 177. Although both Chapters 175 and 177 contain the same provisions for visual inspections, the exemptions from these requirements are not the same.

Chapter 177 is the comprehensive emission inspection program for nonattainment areas as required by the Clean Air Act. Chapter 177 contains various types of exemptions from emission inspections. For example, the exemptions in § 177.101(c)(4) and (12) include “classic, antique or collectible motor vehicles” and “vehicles driven less than 5,000 miles in the previous 12 months.” Vehicles that meet any of the exemptions under § 177.101(c) are not required to have any visual inspection or emission test. On the other hand, the exemptions for owners of passenger cars in Chapter 175 are limited essentially to “antique” and “specially constructed” vehicles.

In addition to this proposed regulation, the Department is promulgating amendments to Chapter 177 in a final-omitted regulation (No. 18-384). Section 177.51(c) of the final-omitted regulation contains new provisions for “pre-MY (model year) 1996 vehicles.” These provisions reduce or eliminate the emission inspection requirements for pre-MY 1996 vehicles if certain conditions apply. For example, these cars will not be subject to the emission program if they represent less than 20% of the total subject vehicles in a county provided that emissions in the county are at or below levels that are in compliance with the State Implementation Plan.

The exemptions that apply to the proposed regulation are limited compared to Chapter 177. The result will be

an inconsistent application of the rules. Some vehicles in attainment areas will be required to undergo visual inspections and make repairs while similar vehicles in nonattainment areas (or areas with greater pollution) will be exempt. We question why the exemptions in Chapter 177 are not being allowed for the visual inspection of emission control equipment in Chapter 175. If the exemptions will not be the same, the Department should explain the need for this more stringent implementation of the rules in less polluted areas. Additionally, the Department should provide an estimate of the compliance costs for affected vehicle owners.

2. Section 175.80. Inspection procedure.—Reasonableness; Economic impact; Consistency with other regulations; Clarity.

Equivalent aftermarket replacement component meeting the same standards

The language added to subsection (d) allows use of original vehicle equipment or “an equivalent aftermarket replacement component meeting the same standards.” A commentator has suggested revisions to allow aftermarket parts that meet equivalency standards of the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) or California Air Resources Board (CARB). If these parts achieve equivalent pollution reductions as prescribed by the EPA or CARB, they should be explicitly permitted by the regulation.

Inconsistent language

The visual inspection provisions in subsection (d)(2) require the inspector to reject a component if it “. . . appears to be the wrong type for the certified vehicle configuration.” (Emphasis added.) The phrase “appears to be” may allow a vehicle to be rejected based on an appearance rather than an actual problem. It is also not completely consistent with the language in Chapter 177. The phrase “appears to be” is used to describe “visual inspection procedures” in § 177.203(d) of the recently submitted final-omitted regulation. However, the final-omitted regulation retains existing language in § 177.204(4) entitled “basis for failure” that states:

A vehicle shall fail the visual inspection if applicable required emission control equipment specified in § 177.203(d) *is not present, is not properly connected or is not the correct type for the certified equipment.* (Emphasis added.)

In the final-form regulation, the Department should use similar language in § 175.80(d)(2) since the objective is to require that emission control components are present and connected.

Medical Care Availability and Reduction of Error Fund; Notice of and Amount of Assessment Action; Notice 2003-09

The Insurance Department (Department), Medical Care Availability and Reduction of Error Fund, by Sarah H. Lawhorne, Special Assistant to the Insurance Commissioner, under section 712 of the Medical Care Availability and Reduction of Error (MCARE) Act (act) (40 P.S. § 1303.712), has determined that the annual assessment to be levied for calendar year 2004 shall be 46% applied to the prevailing primary premium for each participating health care provider.

The act defines "prevailing primary premium" as the schedule of occurrence rates approved by the Insurance Commissioner for the Joint Underwriting Association (JUA). For purposes of the 2004 annual assessment, the JUA rates to be used are \$500,000 per occurrence/\$1.5 million per annual aggregate for participating health care providers other than hospitals and \$500,000 per occurrence/\$2.5 million per annual aggregate for hospitals.

Participating health care providers having approved self-insurance plans shall be assessed an amount equal to the assessment imposed on a participating health care provider of like class, size, risk and kind as determined by the Department.

Payment of this assessment will be deferred until April 1, 2004. Therefore, for all policies which incept or renew before April 1, the assessment is not due until 60 days later.

In addition, Governor Rendell continues to pursue abatement of this 2003-2005 assessment through the legislative process.

On July 17, 2003, Frontier Communications of Breezewood, Inc., Frontier Communications of Canton, Inc., Frontier Communications of Lakewood, Inc., Frontier Communications of Oswayo River, Inc. and Frontier Communications of Pennsylvania, Inc. (together, the Frontier Utilities or applicants) filed jointly under Chapter 11 of the Pennsylvania Public Utility Code, 66 Pa.C.S. § 1101 et seq., an application for approvals of the applicants restructuring from business corporations to limited liability companies (LLCs). A copy of the application was served upon the Office of Consumer Advocate and the Office of Small Business Advocate. Further notice was not required and no protest period was established. No protests or comments have been received.

On September 25, 2003, the Frontier Utilities filed an amendment to their joint application clarifying the relation of the current corporate utilities to the new LLCs. Specifically, the applicants confirmed that: (a) the new LLCs will be the successor utilities to the existing corporations; and (b) that all the managerial, technical and financial resources available to each of the existing corporate utilities will be unchanged and available to the respective successor LLCs.

Each of the Frontier Utilities is an incumbent local exchange carrier (ILEC), and together they serve over 40,000 access lines in largely rural areas in eight counties of Pennsylvania. They are currently direct subsidiaries of Frontier Subsidiary Telco, LLC which, in turn, is a direct subsidiary of Citizens Communications Company (Citizens), a publicly held company.

The joint applicants propose restructurings by which each of the utilities would change its type of business entity from a Pennsylvania business corporation to a Pennsylvania LLC.¹ The change will be accomplished by the merger of each corporate ILEC into its similarly-named LLC counterpart, with the LLC thereby becoming the jurisdictional ILEC. The parties have averred that the new entities will remain under the direct or indirect control of Frontier Telco and Citizens, and that there will be no adverse effect upon customers. Each successor utility will continue to provide the same services to customers under the tariff currently effective for each of the present Frontier Utilities. The parties have also pointed to the expected realization of organizational efficiencies as constituting an affirmative public benefit as required by *City of York v. Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission*, 446 Pa. 136, 295 A.2d 825 (1972).

In the past we have interpreted a utility's change in its type of business entity to constitute the entry into public service by the new entity and the abandonment of service by the former entity, and we have assigned a new utility code to the successor utility. With the instant changes by the Frontier Utilities, we find that a more streamlined approach to granting the authority necessary under Chapter 11 of the Code is in order. If a new business entity will indeed be the successor to a utility in good standing, succeeding to all rights and responsibilities of the incumbent utility, and if all the resources—technical, managerial and financial—of the incumbent utility will be at the disposal of the new business entity, then we can

¹ The applicants have cited Delaware law as providing that a change from a corporation to an LLC results in no change in business entity. 6 Del. Code § 18-214(e)—(g). We fail, however, to recognize the relevance of Delaware law to the present situation. The cited statute three times includes the phrase "for all purposes of the laws of the State of Delaware," but this application is before a Pennsylvania agency. Moreover, all of the Frontier Utilities are, and will remain, Pennsylvania business entities, not Delaware entities.

grant the appropriate authority forthwith, and the existing utility code will apply to the successor utility. It will not be necessary for the successor utility to demonstrate fitness to provide service, as for all practical purposes the entities are one and the same. Moreover, since there will be no change in control of the utility services nor any change in the resources available to the incumbent and successor utilities, it will not be necessary to demonstrate an affirmative public benefit or the promise thereof under *City of York* as is normally required for acquisitions and changes in control of a utility.

However, if the change in business entity is accompanied by any change in the ownership of the utility, changes in senior management or diminution of resources, a conventional application will be required and the standards of *City of York* will apply.

Having reviewed the instant joint application, we have determined that the proposed succession of each of the Frontier Utilities by an LLC is necessary or proper for the service, accommodation, convenience or safety of the public, and that the application should be approved; *Therefore,*

It Is Ordered That:

1. The application of Frontier Communications of Breezewood, Inc. concerning its succession by Frontier Communications of Breezewood, LLC is hereby approved.
2. The application of Frontier Communications of Canton, Inc. concerning its succession by Frontier Communications of Canton, LLC is hereby approved.
3. The application of Frontier Communications of Lakewood, Inc. concerning its succession by Frontier Communications of Lakewood, LLC is hereby approved.
4. The application of Frontier Communications of Oswayo River, Inc. concerning its succession by Frontier Communications of Oswayo River, LLC is hereby approved.
5. The application of Frontier Communications of Pennsylvania, Inc. concerning its succession by Frontier Communications of Pennsylvania, LLC is hereby approved.
6. Within 30 days of the consummation of the succession by a limited liability company, each of the successor Frontier Utilities file with this Commission notice of consummation together with: (a) a copy of the Department of State's registration of the entity's certificate of organization; and (b) a tariff adoption supplement by which the successor utility adopts as its own the tariff in effect for its predecessor utility.
7. If the parties determine that the successions by LLCs will not be implemented, the Frontier Utilities promptly file notice with this Commission of determination.
8. A copy of this order be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Ratification and Adoption of Amendment to Part 192 of Title 49 of the Code of Federal Regulations; Doc. No. M-00031766

Order

By the Commission:

At 52 Pa. Code § 59.33(b) the Commission has adopted, except as otherwise indicated, the Federal safety standards for natural gas transmission and distribution facilities. The Federal standards are established by the United States Department of Transportation (DOT) at 49 U.S.C.A. § 60101 et seq. and are set forth in Parts 191, 192, 193 and 199 of Title 49 of the *Code of Federal Regulations*. Section 59.33(b) provides, in pertinent part, that amendments to Title 49 will become effective in this Commonwealth upon the date of entry of a Commission ratification order where that order is served upon all jurisdictional natural gas companies or, alternatively, upon the date of such order's publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A. On August 6, 2002, at 67 *Federal Register* 50824, amendment 192-77 was adopted and codified by the DOT at 49 CFR 192. The primary purpose of this amendment is to define areas where a pipeline rupture would lead to the greatest consequences to the public. The rule defines areas of high consequence where a gas pipeline accident could do considerable harm to people and their property. The definition includes: current class 3 and 4 locations; facilities with persons who are mobility impaired, confined or hard to evacuate and places where people gather for recreational and other purposes. For facilities with mobility impaired, confined or hard-to-evacuate persons and places where people gather, the corridor of protection from the pipeline is 300 feet, 660 feet or 1,000 feet depending on the pipeline's diameter and operating pressure.

Copies of the aforementioned *Federal Register* publications follow the original order.

Keeping in mind the safety of the public, we have reviewed the previously-referenced amendments in accordance with the provisions of 52 Pa. Code § 59.33. Based upon this review, we find that the DOT amendment to be in the public interest and adopt them as our own. The effective date of our adoption of the aforementioned amendments shall be the date upon which this order is entered.

Therefore:

It Is Ordered That:

1. The following amendment adopted by the DOT is hereby ratified and adopted in accordance with the provisions of 52 Pa. Code § 59.33(b).

(a) On August 6, 2002, at 67 *Federal Register* 50824, to 49 CFR 192.761.

2. The Secretary shall serve copies of this order together with its attachments upon all jurisdictional gas utilities. Accordingly, the effective date shall be the entry

date of this order. Concurrently, the Secretary shall cause this order, without attachments, to be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.
