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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Title 234—RULES OF CRIMINAL PROCEDURE

PART I. GENERAL

[234 PA. CODE CH. 1100]

Order Adopting Amendments to Rule 1114; No. 257; Criminal Procedural Rules Doc. No. 2

The Criminal Procedural Rules Committee has prepared a Final Report explaining the November 18, 1999 amendments to Rule 1114 (Material Permitted in Possession of the Jury). These amendments make it clear that the trial court is prohibited from providing written jury instructions to the jury for use during deliberations. The Final Report follows the Court's Order.

Order

Per Curiam:

Now, this 18th day of November, 1999, upon the recommendation of the Criminal Procedural Rules Committee; this proposal having been submitted without publication pursuant to Pa.R.J.A. 103(a)(3), and a Final Report to be published with this Order:

It Is Ordered pursuant to Article V, Section 10 of the Constitution of Pennsylvania that Pa.R.Crim.P. 1114 is hereby amended in the following form.

This *Order* shall be processed in accordance with Pa.R.J.A. 103(b), and shall be effective January 1, 2000.

Annex A

TITLE 234. RULES OF CRIMINAL PROCEDURE

PART I. GENERAL

CHAPTER 1100. TRIAL

Rule 1114. Material permitted in possession of the jury.

[1.] (A) Upon retiring, the jury may take with it such exhibits as the trial judge deems proper, except as provided in paragraph [2] (B).

[2.] (B) During deliberations, the jury shall not be permitted to have:

- (1) a transcript of any trial testimony [, nor];
- (2) a copy of any written or otherwise recorded confession by the defendant [, nor];
- (3) a copy of the information [.]; or
- (4) written jury instructions.

Official Note: Adopted January 24, 1968, effective August 1, 1968; amended [, and second paragraph of Comment and the words "or information" added] June 28, 1974, effective September 1, 1974; Comment revised August 12, 1993, effective September 1, 1993; amended January 16, 1996, effective July 1, 1996; **amended November 18, 1999, effective January 1, 2000.**

Comment

This rule prohibits the jury from receiving a copy of the indictment or information during its deliberations. The rule also prohibits the jury from taking into the jury room

any written or otherwise recorded confession of the defendant. In *Commonwealth v. Pitts*, 301 A.2d 646, 650 n. 1 (Pa. 1973), the Court noted that "it would be a better procedure not to allow exhibits into the jury room which would require expert interpretation." [See *Commonwealth v. Oleynik*, 568 A.2d 1238 (Pa. 1990), in which the Supreme Court held that it was improper to permit a jury to take written jury instructions with them for use during deliberations.]

The 1999 amendment to paragraph (B) makes it clear that the trial court is prohibited from sending written jury instructions with a jury for use during deliberations. See *Commonwealth v. Karaffa*, 709 A.2d 887 (Pa. 1998), in which the Court held it was reversible error to submit written jury instructions to the jury.

The 1996 amendment adding "or otherwise recorded" in paragraph (B)(2) is not intended to enlarge or modify what constitutes a confession under this rule. Rather, the amendment is only intended to recognize that a confession can be recorded in a variety of ways. See *Commonwealth v. Foster*, 624 A.2d 144 (Pa. Super. 1993).

Although most references to indictments and indicting grand juries were deleted from these rules in 1993 because the indicting grand jury was abolished in all counties, see PA. CONST. art. I, § 10 and 42 Pa.C.S. § 8931(b), the reference was retained in this rule because there may be some cases still pending that were instituted prior to the abolition of the indicting grand jury.

[The amendment adding "or otherwise recorded" is not intended to enlarge or modify what constitutes a confession under this rule. Rather, the amendment is only intended to recognize that a confession can be recorded in a variety of ways. See *Commonwealth v. Foster*, 624 A.2d 144 (Pa. Super. 1993).]

FINAL REPORT¹

Amendments to Pa.R.Crim.P. 1114

Material Not Permitted in Possession
of the Jury During Deliberations

On November 18, 1999, effective January 1, 2000, upon the recommendation of the Criminal Procedural Rules Committee, the Court amended Rule 1114 (Material Permitted in Possession of the Jury). The amendments make it clear that the trial court is prohibited from providing written jury instructions to the jury for use during deliberations.

¹ The Committee's Final Reports should not be confused with the official Committee Comments to the rules. Also note that the Supreme Court does not adopt the Committee's Comments or the contents of the Committee's explanatory Final Reports.

Following the Court's decision in *Commonwealth v. Karaffa*, 709 A.2d 887, 888 (Pa. 1998), making it clear that "the submission of written jury instructions constitutes reversible error in this Commonwealth," the Committee reviewed Rule 1114 and jury instruction procedures in other jurisdictions. From our review, we concluded that, notwithstanding the Court's 1990 decision in *Commonwealth v. Oleynik*, 568 A.2d 1238 (Pa. 1990), and the subsequent addition of a citation to *Oleynik* in the Rule 1114 Comment, there continues to be confusion concerning the prohibition on submitting written jury instructions to the jury for use during deliberations. In view of this, the Committee agreed that the text of Rule 1114 should be amended to reflect the current state of the law in Pennsylvania and more clearly advise members of the bench and bar with regard to jury instructions. Accordingly, new paragraph (B)(4) adds written jury instructions to the list of materials the jury is not permitted to have during deliberations. In addition, the Comment has been revised by deleting the citation to *Oleynik* and adding a citation to *Karaffa* and has been reorganized.

Title 249—PHILADELPHIA RULES

PHILADELPHIA COUNTY

Civil Trial Division; Commerce Case Management Program; Administrative Docket 01 of 1999

And Now, this 9th day of November, 1999, it is hereby Ordered and Decreed that the following protocols shall apply to all civil cases within the Commerce Case Management Program on or after January 1, 2000:

Commerce Case Management Program: Procedure for Disposition of Commerce Program Cases Filed on and after January 1, 2000

A Commerce Case Management Program ("Commerce Program") is hereby established within the Trial Division of the Court of Common Pleas.

A. Organization

1. *Judges.* Initially, two judges shall be assigned by the Administrative Judge to the Commerce Program. The number of Commerce Program Judges may thereafter be adjusted by the Administrative Judge consistent with the caseload of the Program.

2. *Filings & Listings.* Upon consultation with the Administrative Judge and the Commerce Program Judges, with the goal of ease of access by the Commerce Program Judges and their staff, the parties and the public, the Prothonotary shall establish procedures for maintenance of filings and listings in actions assigned to the Commerce Program.

B. Assignment of Cases Subject to Commerce Program

1. *Cases Subject to Commerce Program.* Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in General Court Regulation 95-2 (Day Forward Program) or any other General Court Regulation, Jury, Non-Jury & Equity, and Class Action cases (boxes 6, 7, 8 on the Civil Cover Sheet) filed on or

after January 1, 2000, but not Arbitration cases (box 5 on the Civil Cover Sheet), shall be assigned to the Commerce Program if they are among the following types of actions:

1. Actions relating to the internal affairs or governance, dissolution or liquidation, rights or obligations between or among owners (shareholders, partners, members), or liability or indemnity of managers (officers, directors, managers, trustees, or members or partners functioning as managers) of business corporations, partnerships, limited partnerships, limited liability companies or partnerships, professional associations, business trusts, joint ventures or other business enterprises, including but not limited to any actions involving interpretation of the rights or obligations under the organic law (e.g., Pa. Business Corporation Law), articles of incorporation, by-laws or agreements governing such enterprises;

2. Disputes between or among two or more business enterprises relating to transactions, business relationships or contracts between or among the business enterprises. Examples of such transactions, relationships and contracts include:

- Uniform Commercial Code transactions;
- Purchases or sales of businesses or the assets of businesses;
- Sales of goods or services by or to business enterprises;
- Non-consumer bank or brokerage accounts, including loan, deposit cash management and investment accounts;
- Surety bonds;
- Purchases or sales or leases of, or security interests in, commercial, real or personal property; and
- Franchisor/franchisee relationships.

3. Actions relating to trade secret or non-compete agreements;

4. "Business torts," such as claims of unfair competition, or interference with contractual relations or prospective contractual relations;

5. Actions relating to intellectual property disputes;

6. Actions relating to securities, or relating to or arising under the Pennsylvania Securities Act;

7. Derivative actions and class actions based on claims otherwise falling within these ten types, and consumer class actions other than personal injury and products liability claims;

8. Actions relating to corporate trust affairs;

9. Declaratory judgment actions brought by insurers, and coverage dispute and bad faith claims brought by insureds, where the dispute arises from a business or commercial insurance policy, such as a Commercial General Liability policy, and;

10. Third-party indemnification claims against insurance companies where the subject insurance policy is a business or commercial policy and where the underlying dispute would otherwise be assigned to the Commerce Program, not including claims where the underlying dispute is principally a personal injury claim.

All of the above types of actions may involve individuals named as parties, in addition to business enterprises, so long as all other criteria are met and the essential nature of the litigation is a business dispute. For example, a dispute over a commercial loan may include

individual guarantors as either plaintiffs or defendants, as the case may be, but such a lawsuit would still be a commercial dispute.

2. *Cases Not Subject to the Commerce Program.* The following types of matters are not to be included in the Commerce Program:

1. Matters subject to Compulsory Arbitration in this Court or to the jurisdiction of the Municipal Court, including any appeals.

2. Personal injury, survival or wrongful death matters.

3. Individual (non-class) consumer claims against businesses or insurers, including products liability and personal injury cases.

4. Matters involving occupational health or safety.

5. Environmental claims not involved in the sale or disposition of a business and other than those addressed in Commerce Program types 9 or 10 above.

6. Matters in eminent domain.

7. Malpractice claims, other than those brought by business enterprises against attorneys, or accountants, architects or other professionals in connection with the rendering of professional services to the business enterprise.

8. Employment law cases, other than those referenced in Commerce Program type 3 above.

9. Administrative agency, tax, zoning and other appeals.

10. Petition Actions in the nature of Change of Name, Mental Health Act Petitions, Petitions to Appoint an Arbitrator, Government Election Matters, Leave to Issue Subpoena, Compel Medical Examination.

11. Individual residential real estate and non-commercial landlord-tenant disputes.

12. Domestic relations matters, and actions relating to distribution of marital property, custody or support.

13. Any matter required by statute, including 20 Pa.C.S. Chapter 7, §§ 711 & 713, to be heard in the Orphans' Court or Family Court Division of the Philadelphia Court of Common Pleas, or other matter which has heretofore been within the jurisdiction of the Orphans' Court or Family Court Division of this Court.

14. Any criminal matter other than criminal contempt in connection with a Commerce Program action.

15. Such other matters as the Court shall determine.

3. *Assignments Based on the Civil Cover Sheet.* The Civil Cover Sheet, effective January 1, 2000, shall include a box in which the attorney signing the sheet must certify that the action is, or is not, subject to the Commerce Program. A "Commerce Program Addendum to Civil Cover Sheet," a sample of which is attached as Exhibit "A," is hereby required to be filed with all initial filings (i.e., all filings requiring a Civil Cover Sheet) subject to the Commerce Program, filed on or after January 1, 2000. The attorney shall indicate on the Commerce Program Addendum filed with any filing denoted as a Commerce Program matter, the applicable type or types of action which result in the matter being assigned to the Commerce Program. An attorney's signature on the Civil Cover Sheet shall constitute certification that the matter is or is not subject to the Commerce Program, as indicated on the Civil Cover Sheet and Addendum. A copy

of the Civil Cover Sheet, including any Commerce Program Addendum, shall be served with the original process served on all parties.

All actions designated into the Commerce Program pursuant to the Commerce Program Addendum are hereby assigned to the Commerce Program and to the individual calendar of one of the Commerce Program Judges, who shall be assigned according to a random procedure established by the Administrative Judge. This assignment shall be noted on the Docket. All further filings in the matter shall state prominently in the caption and on any cover sheets that the matter is "ASSIGNED TO COMMERCE PROGRAM."

4. *Disputes Arising From the Civil Cover Sheet Designation.* If any party disagrees with the designation or lack of designation of a case into the Commerce Program, that party shall file with Civil Listings Room 296 City Hall, to be referred to the Administrative Judge for decision, and serve on all parties a Notice of Management Program Dispute, in the Form attached as Exhibit "B" and not exceeding three pages, as soon as practical, and no later than the earliest of (a) the filing by that party of any pleading, motion or response to motion, (b) ten days in advance of a noticed case management conference or thirty days after service of process. Any party opposing the Notice of Management Program Dispute may, but need not, submit a response thereto not exceeding three pages (to Civil Listings Room 296 City Hall) within ten days of service of the Notice.

In the event of the service of a Notice of Management Program Dispute, a copy of that Notice shall be attached to and referenced in all motions and responses to motions filed by any party pending the resolution of the management program dispute.

C. Commencement of Action

All subject actions shall be commenced as provided in Pa. R.C.P. 1007. Philadelphia Civil Rule *205.2 shall be followed. As noted above, in all cases, not just those designated into the Commerce Program, a copy of the Civil Cover Sheet, including any Commerce Program Addendum, shall be served with original process served on all parties.

All jury demands shall be perfected in accordance with Pa.R.C.P. 1007.1 and Phila.Civ.R. *1007.1.

A party seeking emergency relief immediately upon commencing an action subject to the Commerce Program shall follow the procedure set forth in part D.7. below (Rules to Show Cause and Emergency Motions and Petitions).

D. Case Management Procedures

1. *Authority Over Commerce Program Status:* When there is a dispute whether the case is properly assigned to the Commerce Program, the decision will be made by the Administrative Judge. If the Civil Case Manager conducting a case management conference or any party objects as to the Commerce Program assignment, the Case Manager will forward the dispute to the Administrative Judge.

2. *Alternative Procedures Available:* The Commerce Program Judge, in his/her discretion, may, upon application of any party or upon his/her own initiative, modify these procedures. Requests for changes in these procedures will be made by filing a Petition for Extraordinary Relief (which Petition calls for a ten-day response time).

3. *The Case Management Conference:* Typically, notice of a Case Management Conference ("CMC") will be sent

to counsel and unrepresented parties (sixty days after filing) scheduling the CMC for approximately ninety days after filing. In certain circumstances, the CMC may be scheduled through the Commerce Program Judge.

a. *Presiding Officer*: Unless otherwise ordered, the CMC shall be conducted by a Civil Case Manager designated by the Court, acting on behalf of the assigned Commerce Program Judge.

b. *Issues to be Addressed*: The following subjects, along with other appropriate topics, such as service of process, venue, pleadings, discovery, possible joinder of additional parties, theories of liability, damages claimed and applicable defenses (see also Pa.R.C.P. 213.3), will be discussed.

(1) Means for Early Disposition

a. Timing and potential forms of Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR). The case manager will make available the list of Commerce Program Judges Pro Tempore (as provided by the Business Litigation Committee of the Philadelphia Bar Association).

b. Scheduling pre-discovery dispositive motions, only if oral argument is needed. (Whether to hear oral argument is up to the Commerce Program Judge). The Commerce Program Judge will likely have a half day set aside for hearing Motions and Rules.

c. Scheduling limited-issue discovery in aid of early dispositive motions. The Case Manager will advise counsel of the half day Discovery Program set up for that Commerce Program Judge.

(2) Schedules and Deadlines

a. Assignment to a Case Management Track and issuance of a Case Management Order ("CMO"), which will set forth a target trial date, deemed the earliest trial date pursuant to Pa.R.C.P. 212.1.

b. A discovery plan and schedule based on the CMO date for the completion of discovery.

c. Anticipated areas of expert testimony, timing for identification of experts, responses to expert discovery, exchange of expert reports (reference to the CMO).

(3) Potential Use of a Commerce Court Judge Pro Tempore

a. On stipulation of all parties for supervision of discovery.

b. For mediation.

c. Identification of a particular Commerce Program Judge Pro Tempore acceptable to all parties.

d. The choice of a particular Judge Pro Tempore for these purposes must be approved by the Court.

e. Use of a Pro Tempore Judge for purposes of discovery or mediation cannot affect the deadlines set forth in the CMO.

The Commerce Program Judge may establish any informal procedures to achieve expeditious resolution of discovery disputes and other non-dispositive issues. Prior to the CMC, it shall be the obligation of the parties to confer concerning all of the above matters, for the purposes of reaching agreements.

5. *Case Management Order*: At the CMC, the case manager shall issue a Case Management Order ("CMO") setting forth dates for a Settlement Conference and for a Pretrial Conference (with Pretrial Statements typically to be filed in advance), and for Trial. The CMO will also

address cut-off dates for completion of discovery, for the service of expert reports and for the filing of Motions.

Based upon the nature and complexity of the case, the case manager with input from the parties at the CMC shall assign the case to a track. The Commerce Program shall typically employ the following management tracks: Commerce Expedited (Target Trial Date within 13 months of Complaint) and Commerce Standard (Target Trial Date within 18 months of Complaint). Only exceptionally complicated cases should be designated Commerce Complex (Target Trial Date within two years of Complaint). In the latter instance, the Commerce Program Judge may schedule status conferences at six month intervals or at other times upon application of the parties, if appropriate.

The Commerce Expedited Track shall consist of matters in which minimal discovery is needed and legal issues are anticipated to be routine. Examples of such actions, in the absence of complicating factors, are actions relating to commercial loans, and contract, UCC and foreclosure matters. Other matters should presumptively be designated Commerce Standard. Actions in which preliminary injunctive relief is sought may be appropriate for any of the tracks depending upon the circumstances.

A suggested form Case Management Order is attached as Exhibit "C." A grid of time standards that will be employed depending upon the applicable Track Case Management Order is attached as Exhibit "D."

6. *Motion Practice and Discovery Motions*. The Commerce Program Judge to whom the action is assigned will hear all pretrial motions, including discovery motions, except that, to the extent that scheduling or other concerns so require, a Commerce Program Judge may make arrangements for certain discovery and other pretrial motions to be heard by another Commerce Program Judge. All motions (including discovery motions) shall be filed in Motion Court with a designation on the Motion Court Cover Sheet of the assigned Commerce Program Judge. Any Notice of Management Program Dispute that is pending or is being filed contemporaneously with the Motion filing, should be noted in the Motion Court Cover Sheet. Oral argument is at the discretion of the Commerce Program Judge.

A Commerce Program Discovery List for each Commerce Program Judge shall be established so that discovery matters ordinarily will be heard by that Judge on a particular day of the week. Each Judge may also scheduling hearings on non-discovery motions on the discovery day, or at such other times as the Court deems appropriate.

7. *Rules to Show Cause and Emergency Motions and Petitions*. Rules to show cause in cases assigned to the Commerce Program will be presented in the Motions Court, where they will be reviewed as to form, and forwarded to the assigned Commerce Program Judge for consideration.

Unless there is a dispute as to Commerce Program applicability, emergency motions or petitions in a newly filed action presented in a matter appropriate for assignment to the Commerce Program shall be referred to a Commerce Program Judge for disposition. If there is any dispute regarding Commerce Program applicability, that dispute shall be referred to the Administrative Judge or the designee of the Administrative Judge. Parties are encouraged to give the Motion Court advance notice of an emergency motion or petition, including notice that the action is assigned to the Commerce Program or may be appropriate for such assignment. If the assigned Com-

merce Program Judge is unavailable, an emergency motion or petition in an action already assigned to Commerce Program shall be heard by the other Commerce Program Judge, if available, with any subsequent hearing referred back to the assigned Commerce Program Judge. If no Commerce Program Judge is available to hear an emergency motion or petition, such motion or petition shall be referred to a Judge assigned to Motion Court (or, if necessary, the Emergency Judge), with any subsequent hearing referred back to the appropriate Commerce Program Judge. An emergency motion heard by a Commerce Program Judge in a case which has not yet gone through the random assignment procedure shall be subject to that procedure prior to any subsequent hearing and the subsequent hearing shall be scheduled before the Commerce Program Judge assigned.

8. *Settlement Conferences.* A settlement conference may be expeditiously scheduled in any case in which counsel concur that such a conference may be productive. Such requests shall be made in writing by letter to the assigned Commerce Program Judge, and in all other respects Local Civ.R. *212.1(B) should be applied.

Except as otherwise provided in Local Civil Rule *212.3 (Settlement Conferences—Non Jury Cases), Commerce Program Judges may assist the parties in reaching a fair and reasonable settlement or other resolution of the matter. To that end, the assigned Commerce Program Judge, in his or her discretion, may schedule one or more formal settlement conferences. The Commerce Program Judge may also encourage the parties to engage in settlement discussions and in any form of Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR), including the assistance of a Commerce Program Judge Pro Tempore, that may result in settlement, avoidance of trial or expeditious resolution of the dispute. Except upon order of the Court, the pendency of any form of ADR shall not alter the date for commencement of trial.

9. *Pretrial Conference.* A Pretrial Conference shall be held in all Commerce Program actions. At the conclusion of the Pretrial Conference, a Pretrial Order controlling the conduct of trial may be entered. The Court shall exercise its best efforts to try the matter as soon after the target trial date as practicable.

Typically, the CMO will require the filing of Pretrial Statements (Pa.R.C.P. 212.2) in advance of the Pretrial Conference. Prior to the Pretrial Conference, principal trial counsel shall confer on the matters set forth in Pa.R.C.P. 212.3, and attempt to reach agreement on any such matters.

Following the Pretrial Conference, the Commerce Program Judge shall enter a Trial Scheduling Order, identifying the date by which the matter should be prepared for trial, and, if applicable, the date to be placed into a trial pool or the date of any special listings. The Trial Scheduling Order may further provide specific dates, to the extent not already addressed in the Case Management Order, for such matters as:

A. Exchange of proposed stipulations and filing of stipulations in writing to facts about which there can be no reasonable dispute;

B. Pre-marking and exchanging copies of all documents or other exhibits to be offered in evidence at trial;

C. Service and filing of written objections to any documents or other exhibits as to which a party intends to object at trial, together with the legal basis for such objections;

D. Identification in writing of all deposition testimony, by page and line number, intended to be read into the record at trial, followed by counterdesignations and objections to deposition designations;

E. Exchange of trial briefs and proposed findings of fact and conclusions of law (nonjury) or requested points for jury charge (jury).

At such time prior to trial as may be fixed by the Court, it shall rule on all matters placed in issue under this procedure.

In addition, the Commerce Program Judge may establish procedures consistent with the requirements of each case to ensure close interaction with the parties in order to minimize trial time.

E. Commerce Program Judges Pro Tempore And Alternative Dispute Resolution

There shall be established in the Commerce Program, an Alternative Dispute Resolution program for Commerce Program actions, which may include, but is not limited to, mediation and the assistance of Commerce Program Judges Pro Tempore.

1. *Panel of Commerce Program Judges Pro Tempore.* The Administrative Judge or designee shall designate a panel of Commerce Program Judges Pro Tempore from among volunteers nominated and approved by the Philadelphia Bar Association Business Law Section, Business Litigation Committee, who shall be distinguished attorneys engaged in active practice of law with no less than fifteen (15) years trial experience including a practice focused on the type of litigation described in section B.1. above (Cases Subject to Commerce Program). Commerce Program Judges Pro Tempore shall serve without charge. Persons may be added to or removed from the panel as the Administrative Judge or designee may determine consistent with the qualifications above.

The Court may order a Commerce Program case to be assigned for Settlement Conference to a Commerce Program Judge Pro Tempore who shall, on a date certain, hold a Settlement Conference which must be attended by trial counsel representing the parties and any unrepresented parties. Counsel and unrepresented parties shall provide to the Commerce Program Judge Pro Tempore prior to the Settlement Conference a fully completed Settlement Memorandum, in a form to be established by the Commerce Program Judges. The Commerce Program Judge Pro Tempore on such a referral is not authorized to rule on any motions, but will attempt to facilitate a settlement between the parties.

2. *Mediation. a. Referral to Mediation and Selection of Mediator.* Commerce Program cases may be referred to nonbinding mediation at the discretion of the Commerce Program Judge, who may make such referrals at the time of the Case Management Conference, at a Trial Scheduling Conference referenced above, or at another time. Where appropriate and whether or not mediation is pursued at an early stage of the litigation, the Commerce Program Judge has the discretion to refer cases to nonbinding mediation at a later stage of the proceedings.

The Court may permit the parties to choose the mediator from among the panel of Commerce Program Judges Pro Tempore, or agree to pay for a mediator not on the panel. The order of reference to mediation shall not stay or delay any scheduling dates, unless the Court so orders.

b. *Conflicts of Interest.* A mediator to whom a case is assigned must disclose to the parties and to the Court any apparent conflict of interest. Unless the mediator

determines consistent with any applicable ethical requirements and guidelines that he or she should preside notwithstanding any such apparent conflict of interest and the parties and the Court agree that such mediator nevertheless shall preside, another mediator shall be selected.

c. *Confidentiality of Mediation.* The order referring an action to mediation shall require that the mediator report to the Court the disposition of the mediation in accordance with a schedule as determined by the Court, under the guidelines below. The order shall also provide that all information received by the mediator as to the merits of the matter, including the submitted memoranda, shall remain confidential and not be reported or submitted to the Court by the mediator or the parties, except as necessary in a stipulation of settlement agreed to by the parties.

d. *Mediation Procedure.* The first mediation session preferably shall be conducted within 30 days of the execution of the order of reference, unless the Court establishes a different schedule. At least ten days before the first session, each party shall deliver to the mediator a copy of its pleadings, any briefs filed in the action important to the mediation and a memorandum of not more than five pages (double-spaced), setting forth that party's contentions as to liability and damages. The memorandum shall be served on all parties, but shall be marked "Confidential, for Mediation Only," and may not be used, cited, quoted, marked as an exhibit or referenced in any proceedings. Attendance at the first mediation session shall be mandatory, and the mediator may require, in addition to the appearance of the attorneys, the presence of the parties or their representatives with authority to settle. If the first session is successful, the settlement shall be reduced to a stipulation, and the mediator shall submit forthwith the stipulation, the notice of discontinuance and the report of disposition to the Court. The report of disposition shall be on a form prescribed by the Court Administrator.

e. *Report; Extensions.* If the action is not settled upon completion of the first session, the mediator may schedule additional sessions on consent of the parties. However, at the end of the first session, any party or the mediator may terminate the mediation effort, and in that case the

mediator shall advise the Court forthwith that mediation has been terminated but shall not disclose the identity of any parties who terminated or did not terminate the mediation.

Except as set forth below, subsequent sessions should be concluded within 15 days from the date by which the first session was to have been held according to the order of reference. The mediator shall report to the Court as to the outcome of the mediation session(s) no later than 20 days from the date by which the first session was to have been held according to the order of reference.

If mediation cannot be concluded within 15 days from the date by which the first session was to have been held according to the order of reference, upon consent of all parties a 30-day extension of time to conduct further sessions may be granted by the mediator. If such extension is granted, the mediator shall report to the Court as to the success or lack of success of the additional sessions as soon as practicable but in any event no later than 5 days after the final mediation session.

All deadlines and relevant procedures shall be set forth in a standard form order of reference.

Rule 205.3. Praecepto to Transmit.

All filings which require action by a judge, or an assignment by the Court Administrator shall be accompanied by a praecipe to transmit on Prothonotary Form 205.3, and shall indicate the nature of the filing and what

action is being sought to move the matter forward. The purpose of the praecipe is to advise the Court of what may be necessary for a disposition (i.e., when a hearing is required; when a matter is ripe for disposition on the record; matters that can be immediately addressed) and to expedite action on the filing. When a non-jury trial or a hearing involving witnesses is being required, then the moving party shall list the witnesses to be presented and include an estimate as to the time required to present the case. In matters requiring a non-jury trial or hearing, opposing counsel is required to submit a report in WRITING to the Court Administrator within 10 days of the moving party's filing of the praecipe to transmit, (1) listing the names of the witnesses they will use at trial or hearing; and (2) an estimate of time required to present their case. Failure to file the praecipe to transmit or to indicate what action is required from the Court may result in denial of the relief sought. Failure to list witnesses may result in the preclusion of their testimony.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 58—RECREATION

GAME COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CH. 147]

Issuance of Special Permits

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its October 5, 1999, meeting, adopted the following changes:

Amend § 147.2 (relating to general) by the addition of subsection (d) that requires new permit applicants to show proof they are authorized by their local governmental body to conduct the activity specified on the permit.

This amendment is adopted under the authority of 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

Amendment to § 147.2

1. Introduction

To more effectively administer the wildlife permit system of the Commonwealth, the Commission at its June 8, 1999, meeting proposed, and at its October 5, 1999 meeting, finally adopted a change in § 147.2 to add subsection (d) requiring documentation that the privilege granted by a permit does not violate any local zoning ordinances or other local rule. This addition was adopted under authority contained in section 2901(b) of the code (relating to regulations for permits).

2. Purpose and Authority

The Commission is charged with the responsibility of regulating and issuing permits for the possession of game and wildlife and activities associated with that possession. Former permit regulations did not take into account local land use and other ordinances, which may impact on that possession or those activities. As a result, the Commission may have issued permits which allowed possession of wildlife or an activity that violated local law. A good example would have been a permit for possession of a tiger in a residential neighborhood. The adopted addition deals with these types of situations.

Section 2901(b) of the code authorizes the Commission to promulgate regulations "... for the issuance of any permit or ... to control the activities which may be performed under authority of any permit issued." This provision is the basis for the adopted change.

3. Regulatory Requirements

The adopted change requires all new applicants for permits to provide documentation that the proposed possession or activity complies with local requirements. It is anticipated that this will ordinarily be done in letter form.

4. Persons Affected

Persons wishing to apply for a Commission permit will be affected by the requirement.

5. Comment and Response Summary

One written comment was received from the Association of Township Supervisors totally in support of the adopted change.

6. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

There will be no additional charges imposed by the Commission. Municipalities may charge for furnishing the required documentation.

7. Effective Date

The change is effective on final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

Findings

The Commission finds that:

(1) The public notice of intention to adopt the administrative amendments adopted by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) The adoption of this amendment of the Commission in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for the administration and enforcement of the authorizing statute.

Order

The Commission, acting under authorizing statute, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Game Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapter 147, are amended by amending § 147.2 to read as set forth at 29 Pa.B. 4169 (August 7, 1999).

(b) The Executive Director of the Game Commission shall submit this order and 29 Pa.B. 4169, and deposit it with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(c) This order amending § 147.2 shall become effective upon final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Inheritance Tax; Disclaimers of Nonprobate Taxable Assets

The Department of Revenue (Department), under the authority contained in section 2103 of the Tax Reform Code of 1971 (TRC) (72 P. S. § 9103), by this order amends Chapter 93 (relating to Inheritance Tax Division),

by adding § 93.141 (relating to disclaimers of nonprobate taxable assets) and deleting § 94.1 (relating to disclaimers of nonprobate taxable assets) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Purpose of Amendments

Based on the opinion and order issued from the Commonwealth Court in *In Re Estate of Bernecker*, 654 A.2d 246 (Pa. Cmwlth. 1995), the Department is revising its policy on the effectiveness of disclaimers of nonprobate taxable assets for Inheritance Tax purposes.

Explanation of Regulatory Requirements

Section 93.141(a) sets forth the scope and application of the regulation. Subsection (b) defines "disclaimer," "disclaimant" and "nonprobate taxable assets." Subsection (c) sets forth specific conditions the Department will utilize to determine whether a disclaimer executed in regard to nonprobate taxable assets and nontrust assets of a decedent is valid for Inheritance Tax purposes, when made by the disclaiming party, or the personal representative of a deceased individual, or the guardian or attorney-in-fact of an incapacitated person or minor to whom the interest would have devolved, absent the disclaimer. Filing requirements are in subsection (d) and notice requirements are in subsection (e).

With the adoption of § 93.141, the Department is deleting the statement of policy in § 94.1. The statement of policy provided the public with an explanation of the Department's policy on the effectiveness of disclaimers of nonprobate taxable assets for Inheritance Tax purposes pending the adoption of § 93.141.

Affected Parties

Resident and nonresident decedent estates containing nonprobate taxable assets subject to Pennsylvania Inheritance Tax may be affected by this regulation.

Comment and Response Summary

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 27 Pa.B. 4750 (September 13, 1997). This regulation is being adopted with changes to the proposed rulemaking.

The Department did not receive comments during the public comment period. No comments were received from the House Finance Committee or the Senate Finance Committee. Comments were received from the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC).

To adequately address the comments raised by IRRC and to provide a clear statement of the Department's policy relating to disclaimers of nonprobate taxable assets, the Department found it necessary to delete the proposed text of § 93.81 and adopt new language in a new Subchapter F, Disclaimer of Nonprobate Taxable Assets, § 93.141, to read as set forth in Annex A.

In response to IRRC's comments, the following revisions have been made to the regulation:

(1) IRRC's first comment concerned proposed subsection (a) of § 93.81. The subsection explained that the Department was revising its policy regarding disclaimers of nonprobate taxable assets to reflect the Commonwealth Court decision in *Bernecker*. IRRC indicated that the text should be set forth in the preamble and deleted from the regulation. In addition, the citation to *Bernecker* should be referenced in the notes of decision section in the *Pennsylvania Code*. The Department agrees with IRRC's comment and has deleted the language from the regulation and placed it in the preamble. The Department will

suggest that the *Bernecker* citation be incorporated in the notes of decisions section when the regulation is codified in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

(2) Proposed § 93.81(b)(2) provided, "The same rule applies to nonresident decedents with nonprobate taxable assets subject to Pennsylvania Inheritance Tax." IRRC's comment regarding this paragraph was that the provision was ambiguous and its location could be confusing. IRRC recommended that the Department move the provision to subsection (a) of the rulemaking and reword the provision to more clearly provide, "This regulation is applicable to all resident and nonresident decedents with nonprobate taxable assets subject to Pennsylvania Inheritance Tax." The Department agrees that the provision was not properly placed; however, instead of moving the provision to subsection (a), the Department has placed the language in the preamble.

(3) Proposed paragraph (3) under § 93.81(b) provided that the disclaimer shall be in writing and satisfy the requirements of 20 Pa.C.S. Chapter 62 (relating to disclaimers) in effect at the time the disclaimer is made. IRRC suggested that the phrase "in effect at the time the disclaimer is made" was unnecessary and should be deleted because disclaimers must satisfy the statutory requirements in effect at the time the disclaimer is executed. The Department agrees with IRRC's suggestion and has deleted the phrase from the final-form regulation (§ 93.141(c)(2)).

(4) In its comments, IRRC indicated that within proposed subsection (b), paragraphs (1)(i), (5) and (6) of § 93.81 do not use consistent terminology when referring to an individual who may be making a disclaimer. For clarity purposes, IRRC suggested that the Department use a uniform description when referring to individuals who may disclaim. The Department agrees with the suggestion and has completely reworded the provision in the final-form regulation (§ 93.141(c)).

(5) IRRC also commented on the citations to various county court of common pleas orphans' court division decisions set forth in the regulation. Their first concern was that the Department was applying county or local court holdings on a Statewide basis. Secondly, though the citations clarify the Probate, Estates and Fiduciary Code provisions regarding disclaimers and the TRC regarding disclaimers or renunciation for Inheritance Tax purposes, the subject regulation was promulgated under the Department's authority under the TRC. The subject regulation sets forth the treatment of disclaimers for Inheritance Tax purposes, not for probate purposes.

IRRC suggested that the Department delete the citations from the regulation. In addition, if the Department believes the cases will provide assistance to individuals and practitioners, the Department should explain the cases in the preamble and reference them in the notes of decisions section contained in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The Department understands IRRC's concerns and has deleted the citations from the body of the regulation. The Department will suggest that the citations be incorporated in the notes of decisions section when the regulation is codified in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

(6) With regard to proposed § 93.81(b)(7), IRRC stated that the paragraph was ambiguous because it appears to require subparagraphs (i)—(iii) to occur in order to allow a personal representative to make a disclaimer on behalf of a decedent without court authorization. However, section 6202 of the Probate, Estates and Fiduciary Code (20 Pa.C.S. § 6202) allows a disclaimer to be made without

court authorization only when the will of the decedent so authorizes. To resolve this issue, IRRC proposed language to restructure the paragraph. The Department agrees that the proposed language could be confusing and has restructured the provision in the final-form regulation (§ 93.141(d)).

(7) IRRC's final comment related to the deletion of the Department's statement of policy relating to disclaimers of nonprobate taxable assets that appeared in § 94.1. IRRC noted that the preamble for the proposed rulemaking did not mention the statement of policy, nor did it indicate that the statement of policy would be deleted upon adoption of § 93.81; therefore, IRRC suggested that the statement of policy be deleted upon adoption of § 93.81.

It was the Department's intention to delete § 94.1 with the adoption of the regulation; however, reference in the proposal was not possible because the statement of policy was not codified when the proposed regulation began the review process. Consistent with IRRC's comment and the Department's intent, language has been added to the regulation which deletes § 94.1 upon the adoption of § 93.141.

Fiscal Impact

The Department has determined that the revenue impact of the regulation may be a nominal loss to the Commonwealth. In most cases, disclaimers are used to reduce the beneficiary's Federal Estate Tax, rather than Pennsylvania Inheritance Tax. Use of disclaimers would most likely be by beneficiaries whose rate or level of taxation would exceed that of parties receiving assets through probate. It is believed that disclaimers from lower rates of tax to higher rates of tax through the estate would be rare.

Paperwork

The amendments will not generate significant additional paperwork for the public or the Commonwealth.

Effectiveness/Sunset Date

The amendments will become effective upon final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The regulation is scheduled for review within 5 years of final publication. No sunset date has been assigned.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on September 3, 1997, the Department submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 27 Pa.B. 4750, to IRRC and the Chairpersons of the House Committee on Finance and the Senate Committee on Finance for review and comment. In compliance with section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act the Department also provided IRRC and the Committees with copies of all comments received, as well as other documentation.

In preparing this final-form regulation, the Department has considered the comments received from IRRC, the Committees and the public.

This final-form regulation was deemed approved by the Committees on October 14, 1999, and was approved by

IRRC on October 21, 1999, in accordance with section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745a(e)).

Findings

The Department finds that:

(1) Public notice of intention to amend the regulations has been duly given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) The amendments are necessary and appropriate for the administration and enforcement of the authorizing statute.

Order

The Department, acting under the authorizing statute, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Department, 61 Pa. Code, are amended by adding § 93.141 and by deleting a statement of policy in § 94.1 to read as set forth in Annex A. (*Editor's Note:* The proposal to add § 93.81 at 27 Pa.B. 4750 has been withdrawn by the Department.)

(b) The Secretary of the Department shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of General Counsel and the Office of Attorney General for approval as to form and legality as required by law.

(c) The Secretary of the Department shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) This order shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Subchapter F. DISCLAIMERS OF NONPROBATE TAXABLE ASSETS

§ 93.141. Disclaimers of nonprobate taxable assets.

(a) *Scope and application.* Subsection (c) sets forth specific criteria the Department will utilize to determine whether a disclaimer executed in regard to either nonprobate taxable assets or nontrust assets of a decedent is valid for Inheritance Tax purposes, when the disclaimer is made by the disclaiming party, or the personal representative of a deceased individual, or the guardian or attorney-in-fact of an incapacitated person or minor to whom the interest would devolve, absent a disclaimer.

(b) *Definitions.* The following words and terms, when used in this section, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Disclaimant—Any party in an individual capacity, or a personal representative on behalf of a deceased indi-

vidual, or a guardian or attorney-in-fact on behalf of an incapacitated person or a minor who renounces or refuses to accept a transfer of property.

Disclaimer—A signed renunciation or refusal to accept an interest in property that describes the interest disclaimed. The disclaimer may disclaim, in whole or in part, any present or future interest, vested or contingent, including a possible future right to take as an appointee under an unexercised power of appointment or under a discretionary power to distribute income or principal.

Nonprobate taxable asset—Property transferred upon a decedent's death that is subject to Inheritance Tax but is not subject to administration by the personal representative of the decedent's estate.

(c) *Conditions.* Disclaimers of nonprobate taxable assets, including rights of survivorship interests in multiple-party accounts, titled tangible personal property or real estate, beneficial interests in third-party beneficiary contracts (that is, retirement benefit plans, annuity contracts, individual retirement accounts, Keogh Plan proceeds, matured endowment insurance policies and certain out-of-State government lottery contracts) and *intervivos* gifts are valid for Inheritance Tax purposes if the following conditions are met:

- (1) The disclaimer is made by a disclaimant.
- (2) The disclaimer is in writing and satisfies 20 Pa.C.S. Chapter 62 (relating to disclaimers).
- (3) The disclaimer is signed and dated by the disclaimant.
- (d) *Filing.*

(1) When the will of the decedent authorizes the personal representative to make a disclaimer on behalf of a decedent without court authorization, or when a disclaimant acts in his individual capacity, the personal represen-

tative or the individual shall sign and date the disclaimer within 9 months of the date of death of the decedent as provided in section 2116(c) of the TRC (72 P. S. § 9116(c)), attach a copy of the probated last will and testament to the Inheritance Tax return and file the documents referenced in this section with the Department.

(2) When the disclaimer is made by the personal representative of a deceased individual, or the guardian or attorney-in-fact, in accordance with 20 Pa.C.S. § 6202 (relating to disclaimers by fiduciaries or attorneys-in-fact), a petition, motion or other pleading as required by local rule shall be filed with the applicable county orphans' court and, within 9 months of the date of death of the decedent, the personal representative of a deceased individual, or the guardian or attorney-in-fact, shall attach a copy of the probated last will and testament to the inheritance tax return and file the documents referenced in this section with the Department. Filing the disclaimer with the applicable county orphans' court within 9 months of the date of death of the decedent satisfies the filing requirement. The disclaimer is not valid until the court authorizes the disclaimer.

(e) *Notice.* Notice of the filing of an estate's account and of its call for audit or confirmation shall include notice of the disclaimer under section 2116(c) of the TRC. This notice shall be given to the Pennsylvania Department of Revenue, Bureau of Individual Taxes, Inheritance Tax Division, Department 280601, Harrisburg, Pennsylvania 17128-0601.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CH. 51] Administrative Provisions

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapter 51 (relating to administrative provisions). The Commission is publishing this amendment as a notice of proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code) (code). The proposed amendment relates to counties where the use of the field acknowledgment of guilt is authorized.

A. *Effective Date*

The proposed amendment, if approved on final rulemaking, will go into effect on January 1, 2000, or upon publication of an order adopting the amendment in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, whichever occurs later.

B. *Contact Person*

C. *Statutory Authority*

The proposed amendment is published under the statutory authority of Act 1999-41, which Governor Ridge signed on November 3, 1999. Section 5 of Act 41, among other things, limits the power of waterways conservation officers to accept field acknowledgments of guilt for summary violations as set forth in section 925 of the code (relating to acknowledgment of guilt and receipts for payment). The law will go into effect on January 1, 2000.

D. *Purpose and Background*

The proposed amendment is designed to implement Act 41, which provides that field acknowledgments of guilt shall be used only in counties the Commission may designate by regulation for that use upon a finding that the county has summary offense procedures that differ from those used in other counties. The Commission has found that Philadelphia County is a county that uses summary offense procedures that differ from Statewide procedures.

E. *Summary of Proposal*

The Commission proposes to designate Philadelphia County as a county where the use of the field acknowledgment of guilt is authorized.

F. *Paperwork*

The proposed amendment will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements.

G. *Fiscal Impact*

The proposed amendment will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The proposed amendment will impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public.

H. *Public Comments*

Hunting hours; conditions for appointment

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission) at its October 5, 1999, meeting proposed the following amendments:

Amend § 141.4 (relating to hunting hours) by making an editorial change to paragraph (2). The proposed change is required as a result of the deletion of a subparagraph and resulting renumbering of the subsections.

Amend § 143.27 (relating to conditions for appointment) by raising the minimum security required for license issuing agents.

These proposed amendments will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the proposal of these regulations is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

These proposals were made public at the October 5, 1999, meeting of the Commission, and comments on these proposals may be sent to the Executive Director of the Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797, until December 31, 1999.

Proposed Amendment to § 141.4

1. Introduction

To more effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Commission at its meeting held on October 5, 1999, proposed an editorial change to § 141.4. The proposed change is required as a result of the deletion of a subparagraph and resulting renumbering of the subsections by a regulation finally adopted at the Commission's June 8, 1999, meeting. This change was proposed under sections 322(c)(1) and 2102(a) of the code (relating to powers and duties of the Commission and regulations).

2. Purpose and Authority

At its June 8, 1999 meeting, the Commission expanded hunting hours for hunting mourning doves by deleting paragraph (1) of § 141.4. In doing so, the Commission failed to change a reference in then paragraph (3) to "paragraph (2)," which became paragraph (1). The proposed change will remedy this situation.

Section 322(c)(1) of the code empowers the Commission to fix daily shooting or taking hours. Section 2102(a) of the code authorizes the Commission to promulgate regulations relating to the hunting of game or wildlife in this Commonwealth. The change was proposed under this authority.

3. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed change would not result in any additional regulatory requirements but rather would only clarify the existing regulation.

4. Persons Affected

The proposed change is editorial in nature and would not impact anyone.

5. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed change should not result in any additional cost or paperwork.

Proposed Amendment to § 143.27

1. Introduction

To more effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth and administer its license issuing system, the Commission at its meeting held on October 5, 1999, proposed changing § 143.27 to raise the minimum security required for license issuing agents from \$10,000 to \$18,000. This change was proposed under section 2722(g) of the code (relating to regulations).

2. Purpose and Authority

With the July 1, 1999, effective date of amendments to the code providing for license fee increases, many hunting license issuing agents discovered that they did not have sufficient security to allow them to obtain adequate supplies of licenses for issuance. In addition to reducing the availability of licenses, this resulted in greater workload for the agents and the Commission by reason of the need to order licenses more frequently. As a result, the Commission has decided to propose amending § 143.27 to raise the minimum security to be posted by agents from \$10,000 to \$18,000.

Section 2722(g) of the code directs the Commission to adopt regulations for the administration, control and performance of license issuance. The proposed change is made under that authority.

3. Regulatory Requirements

The proposed change would increase the amount of security which must be posted by most hunting license issuing agents but should reduce the amount of time and effort required to order licenses.

4. Persons Affected

Hunting license issuing agents who post bonds would be affected by the proposed change.

5. Cost and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed change will result in additional cost to agents for security. At the same time, it should decrease the amount of paperwork and ordering costs. Also, agents did receive a fee increase when the license fees were increased.

Effective Date

The proposed changes will be effective on final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

CHAPTER 141. HUNTING AND TRAPPING
Subchapter A. GENERAL

§ 141.4. Hunting hours.

During open hunting seasons, wild birds and animals may be taken 1/2 hour before sunrise to sunset unless further restricted.

(2) Raccoon, fox, skunk, opossum, coyote and weasel may be taken any hour, day or night, except during restricted periods in paragraph [(2)] (1), and woodchuck, coyote, opossum, skunk and weasel may not be hunted prior to 12 noon during the spring gobbler season.

LICENSES

Subchapter B. APPOINTMENT OF AGENTS

§ 143.27. Conditions for appointment.

A person desiring consideration for appointment as an agent shall meet the following conditions:

(6) Provide security to the Commission in an amount [not less than \$10,000] at least \$18,000.

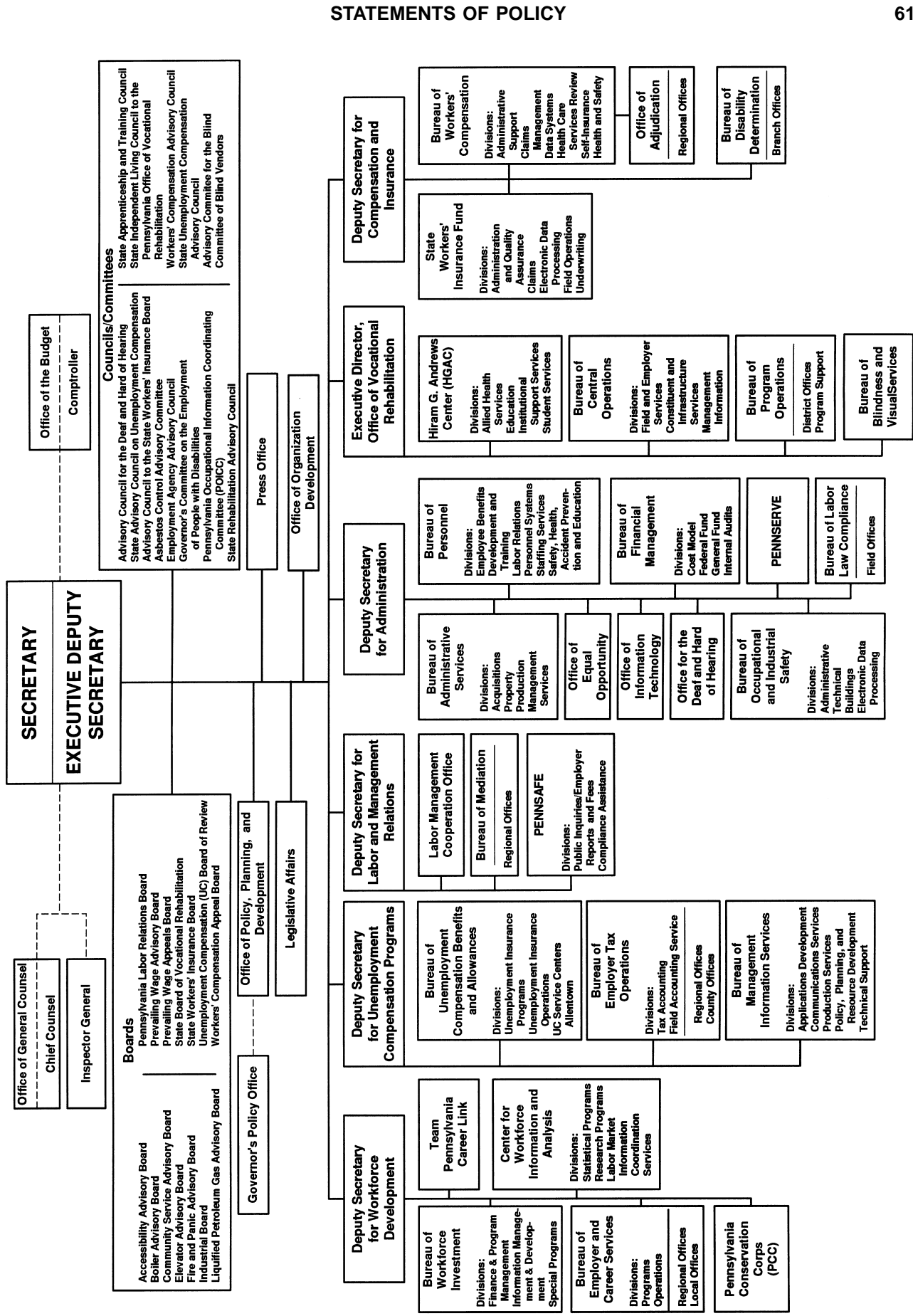
The Executive Board approved a reorganization of the Department of Labor and Industry effective November 16, 1999.

DELAWARE RIVER BASIN COMMISSION

Commission Meeting and Public Hearing

The Delaware River Basin Commission (Commission) will hold an informal conference followed by a public hearing on Wednesday, December 8, 1999. The hearing will be part of the Commission's regular business meeting. Both the conference and business meeting are open to the public and will be held in the Goddard Conference Room of the Commission's offices at 25 State Police Drive, West Trenton, NJ.

The conference among the Commissioners and staff will begin at 9:30 a.m. and will include a presentation on the inaugural meeting of the Water Management Advisory Committee, including a presentation on trends in potable water supplied by the Commission. Additional items for the conference session include a report on hydrologic conditions in the Basin; a report on activities of the Flow Management Technical Advisory Committee; a report on the Flood Response Meeting of December 2, 1999; a report on talks with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers regarding alternative funding for the Commission and temporary drought storage at F.E. Walter Reservoir; and revisions to the Commission's proposed meeting schedule for 2000.

In addition to the following dockets, which are scheduled for public hearing at the 1 p.m. business meeting, the Commission will address the following: Minutes of the October 27, 1999 business meeting; announcements; report on Basin hydrologic conditions; reports by the Executive Director and General Counsel; and public dialogue. The Commission will also consider resolutions to: establish a Monitoring Advisory Committee; renew the Toxics Advisory Committee; expand the Water Quality Advisory Committee by adding members of the regulated community; authorize the Executive Director to contract for a flow management study; and amend Docket No. D-68-20 CP (Revised)—PSE&G Salem Nuclear Generating Station—to extend the expiration date of the docket to provide adequate time for its review.

The subjects of the hearing will be as follows:

1. *Holdover: Bucks County Water & Sewer Authority D-99-13 CP.* A project to rerate the Harvey Avenue sewage treatment plant (STP) from 0.9 million gallons per day (mgd) to 1.2 mgd for treatment of wet weather inflow. Located at the end of Harvey Avenue in Doylestown Borough, Bucks County, PA, the STP will continue to serve Doylestown Township, Doylestown Borough and Plumstead Township. Following high quality secondary treatment, effluent will continue to discharge to Cooks Run, a tributary of Neshaminy Creek.

2. *Telford Borough Authority D-86-7 CP Renewal.* A renewal of a ground water withdrawal project to supply up to 38.6 million gallons (mg)/30 days of water to the applicant's distribution system from Wells No. 1, 3, 4, 5 and 6. Commission approval on September 28, 1988 was extended to 10 years. The applicant requests that the total withdrawal from all wells remain limited to 38.6 mg/30 days. The project is located in Telford Borough, Bucks and Montgomery Counties and West Rockhill Township and Hilltown Township, Bucks County, in the Southeastern Pennsylvania Ground Water Protected Area.

3. *Panther Creek Partners D-87-66 (Revision 2) Renewal.* A renewal of a water allocation to supply up to 67 mg/30 days to the applicant's 84 megawatt culm-fired power plant which supplies electricity to the Metropolitan Edison power grid. Commission approval on June 27, 1990 was limited to 10 years and will expire unless renewed. No expansion of the approved withdrawal is proposed. A seasonal alternate water source will be provided by the Nesquehoning Borough Authority to offset pretreatment costs of the applicant's existing Lusanne Tunnel mine pool overflow withdrawal. Since treated wastewater will continue to be used to stabilize ash, no effluent discharge will occur. The project is located just west of the Nesquehoning Creek in Nesquehoning Borough, Carbon County, PA.

4. *Borough of East Stroudsburg D-92-72 CP.* A ground water withdrawal project to supply up to 28.2 mg/30 days of water to the applicant's distribution system from new Well No. 4, and to increase the withdrawal limit from all wells from 28.2 mg/30 days to 56.4 mg/30 days. The total combined withdrawal for the applicant's ground water and surface water withdrawals will remain at 75 mg/30 days. The project is located in the Borough of East Stroudsburg, Monroe County, PA.

5. *Citizens Utilities Water Company of Pennsylvania D-99-30 CP.* A project to transfer up to 2 mgd of potable water to the applicant's Glen Alsace District service area through an interconnection with the Reading Area Water Authority Maiden Creek Filtration Plant which draws from Lake Ontelaunee Reservoir; no increase in Reading's allocation is needed. The applicant will continue to serve development in Exeter Township and St. Laurence Borough, and has included design capacity for a projected future service area expansion in Robeson Township, all within Berks County, PA. The applicant currently supplies an average of 1.125 mgd from 17 wells and an existing interconnection with Mount Penn Water Authority, Berks County.

6. *Lonza, Inc. D-99-38.* A project to upgrade and expand the applicant's existing 0.06 mgd industrial wastewater treatment plant (IWTP) to provide Best Available Technology for treatment of 0.08 mgd for the applicant's Riverside Plant organic chemical manufacturing facility located on River Road in Upper Merion Township, Montgomery County, PA. Treated effluent will continue to discharge to the Schuylkill River by way of the Matsunk Creek culvert.

7. *Municipal Authority of the Borough of Minersville D-99-44 CP.* A project to modify the applicant's existing potable water treatment plant residual/wastewater management system by constructing two filter backwash holding tanks to replace the existing slow sand filter process. The 0.11 mgd treated effluent will be conveyed to the applicant's Reservoir No. 3 on Dyer Run, a tributary of the West Branch Schuylkill River, located in Cass Township, Schuylkill County, PA. No expansion of capacity is proposed.

8. *Gladys Brittingham Farm D-99-58.* A ground water withdrawal project to supply a maximum of 5.6 mg/30 days of water for irrigation of the applicant's farm crops from new Wells No. 162541 and 167042 in the Columbia aquifer. The water will irrigate approximately 26 acres of grain and vegetables. The project is located near the Town of Milton, Sussex County, DE.

Proposal to Amend Public Service Electric & Gas Company Docket D-68-20 CP (Revised), Salem Nuclear Generating Station, to extend the expiration date of the docket until 6 months after completion of review and approval by the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection. The project is located in Lower Alloways Creek Township, Salem County, NJ and will continue to withdraw and discharge in the Delaware River in Water Quality Zone 5.

Preamble 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6027.908).

Sections 302, 303, 304 and 305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the background standard, statewide health standard, the site-specific standard, or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area, must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site, and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, or a combination of the cleanup standards, or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the Act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the Act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the site(s) identified below proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified below, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved, and comments, should be directed to the remediator of the site.

2. Broad Run (EV, MF) located approximately 1,300 feet south of the intersection of Broad Run Road and Chestnut Lane (Unionville USGS Quadrangle N: 15.5 inches, W: 15.95 inches) in West Bradford Township, Chester County (Resource No. PA-38).

3. Unnamed tributary of Broad Run (EV, MF) located approximately 3,300 feet northeast of the intersection of Broad Run Road and Beacon Hill Road (Unionville USGS Quadrangle N: 18.1 inches, W: 15.3 inches) in West Bradford Township, Chester County (Resource No. PA-38A).

This project is a segment of the Chesapeake Network Fiber Optic Project, which will be installed along existing Columbia Gas Pipeline right-of-way. In Pennsylvania, this project will extend through **Lancaster, Chester, Montgomery, Bucks, Lehigh and Northampton Counties**. Wetland disturbance will be temporary and minimized. In Chester County this linear project will extend from a point in West Nottingham Township (Kirkwood USGS Quadrangle N: 7.6 inches, W: 6.25 inches) to a point in East Coventry Township Phoenixville USGS Quadrangle N: 15.1 inches, W: 11.5 inches) and will traverse East Nottingham, Lower Oxford, Upper Oxford, Londonderry, Highland, East Fallowfield, West Bradford, Caln, East Brandywine, Upper Uwchlan, West Vincent and East Vincent Townships. The descriptions and locations of all crossings are listed on the following Table 1.1.

Giving its consent to install and maintain a fiber optic utility line communication system across the Green Lane Reservoir (TSF) located approximately 2,400 feet southwest of the intersection of Gravel Pike (S.R. 0029) and Knight Road (Perkiomenville USGS Quadrangle N: 18.00 inches, W: 15.8 inches) in Upper Frederick and Marlborough Townships.

In addition, the permittee agrees to follow the recommendations made by the PA Fish and Boat Commission and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service regarding the construction methods for various wetland crossings along the fiber optic line route which may be potential habitat for the Bog turtle (threatened and endangered species).

This project is a segment of the Chesapeake Network Fiber Optic Project, which will be installed along existing Columbia Gas Pipeline right-of-way. In Pennsylvania, this project will extend through **Lancaster, Chester, Montgomery, Bucks, Lehigh and Northampton Counties**. Wetland disturbance will be temporary and minimized. In Montgomery County this linear project will extend from a point in Limerick Township (Phoenixville USGS Quadrangle N: 15.1 inches, W: 11.5 inches) to a point in Marlborough Township (Milford Square USGS Quadrangle N: 3.5 inches, W: 9.5 inches) and will traverse Upper Frederick Township. The descriptions and locations of all crossings are listed on the following Table 1.1.

Department of Revenue Regulation No. 15-410

Utility Gross Receipts Tax

November 18, 1999

We have reviewed this proposed regulation from the Department of Revenue (Department) and submit for consideration the following objections and recommendations. Subsections 5.1(h) and 5.1(i) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) specify the criteria the Commission must employ to determine whether a regulation is in the public interest. In applying these criteria, our Comments address issues that relate to statutory authority, consistency with the statute, legislative intent, reasonableness, need and clarity. We recommend that these Comments be carefully considered as you prepare the final-form regulation.

1. Section 160.21. Scope.—Consistency With Statute and Clarity.

This section appears to accurately describe the Department's scope. However, portions of the regulation give the impression that the Department is responsible for areas beyond this scope.

The regulation appears to address Electric Generation Supplier (EGS) licensing in Section 160.41, and the possibility of double taxation of customers in Section 160.31. Under section 2809 of the Electricity Generation

Customer Choice and Competition Act (act) (66 Pa.C.S. § 2809), the Public Utility Commission (PUC) is authorized to handle these issues. The PUC has authority over the EGS' license and the associated bond ensuring financial responsibility. Section 2809(c)(2) of the act allows an Electric Distribution Company (EDC) that had to pay an EGS' tax to "collect or seek reimbursement of the tax so paid from the electricity provider [EGS] or any other appropriate party that used the electricity in this Commonwealth." (Emphasis added.) While the potential exists for a double tax, this would occur in ratemaking proceedings under the PUC's jurisdiction, not collection proceedings undertaken by the Department.

Therefore, the Department should clarify the scope of the regulation both within this section and in other sections as stated later in these comments.

2. Section 160.22. Definitions.—Consistency With Statute, Legislative Intent, Reasonableness, Need and Clarity.

Failure to otherwise comply.

The Department should explain the intent of the definition for "failure to otherwise comply." What is the meaning of the phrase "all applicable taxes under the TRC [Tax Reform Code]?" (Emphasis added.) Section 2809(c) of the act directs an EGS to certify to the PUC payment of taxes imposed by Articles II and XI of the TRC. Does the Department intend this phrase to apply to all taxes or just to the gross receipts tax?

The definition should also clarify the meaning of the phrase "within the time period and in the manner provided by law" by citing the appropriate statute. Additionally, how was the compliance standard "paying less than 75%" derived?

Related services.

The definition of "related services" is vague. Further, it appears this term is used only in the definition of "sales of electric energy." The Department should explain the need for this term. If it's needed, the Department should clarify the meaning of the term by incorporating its substance in the definition of "sales of electric energy."

Retail electric customer.

This regulation refers to the statutory definition of "retail electric customer." However, the Department uses terms such as "end-use customer" and "end-user" in different parts of the regulation. Since terms such as end-user are included in the statutory definition of "retail electric customer," we recommend consistent use of that term.

Sales of electric energy.

The regulation's definition of "sales of electric energy" appears to be broader than subsection 2810(j) of the act. The regulation's definition includes items such as "capacity charges," "demand charges" and "related services" not mentioned in the act. What is the basis for including these additional items and expanding the statutory term in the regulation?

State tax information.

This term is defined as "the information maintained by the Department that is necessary for the administration of 66 Pa.C.S. §§ 2806 and 2809. . . ." Since it is only used in subsection 160.41(d), it may be clearer to define the specific information in subsection 160.41(d).

3. Section 160.31. Tax on the use of electricity.—Statutory Authority, Reasonableness, Need and Clarity.

Subsection (a) Tax imposed.

The Preamble states that subsection (a) describes when the tax on the use of electricity will be imposed on an EDC under sections 2806(g)(3)(iii) and 2809(c)(2) of the act. As written, subsection (a) is confusing. It rephrases the statute and uses terms not found in sections 2806(g)(3)(iii) and 2809(c)(2). Since the statute provides a clear description of the circumstances under which an EDC must remit the unpaid tax of an EGS, language is not needed beyond the statutory citations.

Subsection (b) Failure of electricity supplier to report and pay tax on gross receipts.

In Subsection (b)(2), the Department uses the EDC's "shopping credit provided to customers" to estimate unpaid taxes. The PUC commented that shopping credits are a transition device that will cease to exist when the transition to competition is completed. The PUC believes a better surrogate for estimating gross receipts is the "Provider of Last Resort" generation rate. Therefore, the Department should use a reasonable rate that will continue to exist after the transition to competition is complete.

Subsection (c) Indemnification of electric distribution company that has paid use tax.

There are three concerns with this subsection.

First, subsection (c) is confusing. This subsection addresses problems that occur after the Department has collected the tax. The resolution of these problems is under the PUC's jurisdiction. Therefore, subsection (c) is not needed or appropriate.

Second, the phrase "may collect or seek indemnification or reimbursement" is vague. For clarity, the Department should explain the difference between these terms. If there is no difference, the Department should eliminate one of the terms.

Finally, the phrase "or from the end-user of the electricity in this Commonwealth" is vague. Why would an EDC file with the Department when seeking reimbursement from an end-user? Additionally, as noted above, the term "end user" should be replaced with "retail electric customer."

Subsection (d) Duplicate payments.

Subsection (d) doesn't describe how and when the Department will refund an over-collection of tax. Also, it doesn't require notification to the PUC, which may have separate ongoing proceedings involving the EGS and EDC. The Department should add procedures for reimbursement to the EDC when duplicate payments are made and explain how notice of the outcome of these procedures would be given to the PUC.

Subsections (d)(2) and (d)(3) specify how an EDC must reflect taxes on the customer's bill. Billing is under the PUC's jurisdiction. Therefore the Department should delete subsections (d)(2) and (d)(3).

Subsection (e) Effect on unpaid gross receipts tax.

Subsection (e) states that the liability of the EGS for unpaid tax, interest or penalties is not extinguished when the EDC is forced to pay the EGS' tax. This subsection should also specify that the EDC is not responsible for penalties or interest assessed against the EGS.

4. Section 160.41. Electric generation license procedures.—Statutory Authority, Reasonableness, Need and Clarity.

Licensing.

Naming this section "Licensing" is unclear. This section relates to actions the Department, with the cooperation of the PUC, may initiate against an EGS that hasn't settled its tax liability. The title of this section could also cause confusion with the actual licensing procedures contained in the PUC's regulations. For clarity, the Department should consider renaming this section "Electric Generation Supplier Tax Liability."

Coordination of information.

Subsection (a) states "Upon request from the Commission, the Department will confirm that an applicant has no tax liabilities. . . ." Subsection (b) requires that "the Commission shall provide the Department with a list of licensed electric generation suppliers. . . ." Subsection (d) states that "the Commission may request the state tax information necessary to ascertain compliance with the requirements for licensure or to institute licensure revocation proceedings."

The PUC objects to being directed by the Department to provide information. However, in the same comments, the PUC affirms it will continue its practice of cooperating with the Department. Clearly, the Department and the PUC must coordinate information. However, this information could be exchanged by means other than directives in regulation, such as through a Memoranda of Understanding. The Department should explain the need and authority for placing this requirement on the PUC in this regulation.

Subsection (a) License application.

Subsection (a) uses the phrase "an applicant has no liabilities not subject to appeal." The use of a double negative affects the clarity of this sentence. The Department should rewrite Subsection (a).

Subsection (b) Licensed electric generation suppliers.

We have four questions on this subsection. First, subsection (b) requires the PUC to provide the Department with specific information about any EGS. This directive does not appear in the act. Therefore, we request the Department provide the statutory basis for this provision. As an alternative, the language could state the Department will "request" the information from the PUC.

Second, among the information the PUC shall provide the Department is "similar identification numbers." We are unsure as to the meaning of this phrase. The Department should define or clarify "similar identification numbers."

Third, the Department asks for "any other information the Department will require." This phrase is vague. Is this information related to the gross receipts tax status of an EGS or other tax liability? The Department should revise this phrase to state what other information the PUC will be required to submit.

Finally, we question the inclusion of the dates, May 1, 1998, and July 30, 1998, in this subsection. We understand that these dates are specifically stated in the act. However, using "1998" is confusing, as these dates have passed. To improve clarity, the Department should consider using solely "May 1" and "July 30."

Subsection (c) Procedures.

Subsection (c)(1) uses the terms "applicant," "EGS" and "entity." For clarity, the Department should replace "entity" with "applicant or EGS."

Additionally, subsections (c)(2) and (c)(3) outline the timeline for actions the Department may take to correct the failure to otherwise comply for an "entity." The Department should insert "applicant or EGS" in these two subsections.

In subsections (c)(1) and (c)(2), the Department uses a 45-day compliance period. How did the Department arrive at this 45-day period? For clarity, the Department should cite where the 45-day period is found or explain why this time period is appropriate.

Subsection (c)(3) states the Department will make a recommendation to the PUC to "deny an application for licensure or institute license revocation proceedings, as applicable." The Department should notify the PUC when an EGS has not paid its taxes. However, what is the purpose of the recommendation, since the PUC makes the final determination? The Department should explain the need for, and usefulness of, its recommendations relating to licensure.

Subsection (d) State tax information.

This subsection states "The Commission may request the State tax information necessary to ascertain compliance. . . ." We have two concerns with this subsection.

First, does the "State tax information" consist of information on all taxes as outlined in the TRC, or just gross receipts taxes? The regulation should clarify this.

Second, the Department should explain why the regulation directs the PUC to ask the Department for State tax information in the instance of a licensure revocation proceeding. Why wouldn't the Department disclose this information in the notice to the PUC as proposed in subsection (c)(3)?
