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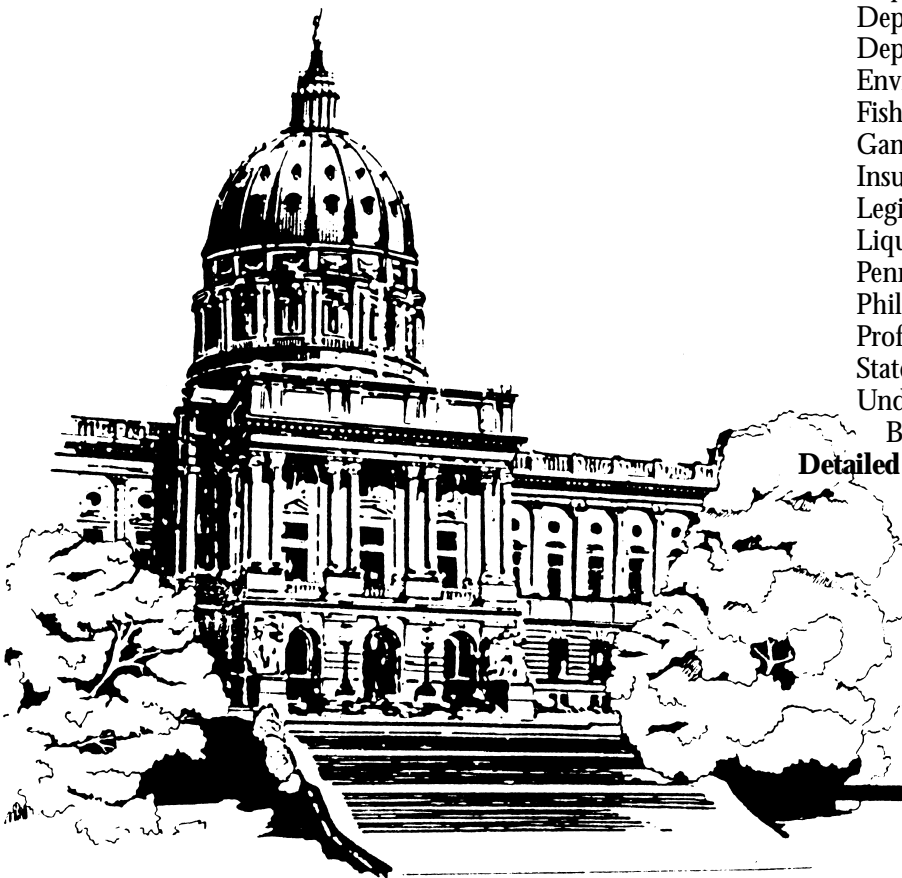

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READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where “no fiscal impact” is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Right to Counsel at Summary Trial

The Criminal Procedural Rules Committee is planning to recommend that the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania amend Rules 122 (Assignment of Counsel) and 454 (Trial in Summary Cases) to make it clear that no defendant in a summary case may be imprisoned or sentenced to probation if the right to counsel was not afforded at trial. This proposal has not been submitted for review by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania.

The following explanatory Report highlights the Committee's considerations in formulating this proposal. Please note that the Committee's Report should not be confused with the official Committee Comments to the rules. Also note that the Supreme Court does not adopt the Committee's Comments or the contents of the explanatory Reports.

The text of the proposed amendments precede the Report. Additions are shown in bold and deletions are shown in bold and are bracketed.

Rule 122. Assignment of Counsel.

No defendant may be sentenced to imprisonment or probation if the right to counsel was not afforded at trial. See *Alabama v. Shelton*, 535 U.S. 654 (2002) and *Scott v. Illinois*, 440 U.S. 367 (1979). See Rule 454 (Trial in Summary Cases) concerning the right to counsel at a summary trial.

Assignment of counsel can be waived, if such waiver is knowing, intelligent, and voluntary. See *Faretta v. California*, 422 U.S. 806 (1975). Concerning the appointment of standby counsel for the defendant who elects to proceed pro se, see Rule 121.

PART E. General Procedures in Summary Cases

Rule 454. Trial in Summary Cases.

(A) Immediately prior to trial in a summary case:

* * * * *

(2) [**when**] **if, in the event of a conviction**, there is a reasonable likelihood of **a sentence of imprisonment or probation**, the defendant shall be advised of the right to counsel and [**shall,**]

(a) upon request, **the defendant shall** be given a reasonable opportunity to secure counsel [**;** **and**], **or**

(b) **if the defendant is without financial resources or is otherwise unable to employ counsel, counsel shall be assigned as provided in Rule 122; and**

Comment

[**The defendant has a right to counsel at trial in all summary cases in which the issuing authority determines there is a likelihood of imprisonment.] No defendant may be sentenced to imprisonment or probation if the right to counsel was not afforded at trial. See *Alabama v. Shelton*, 535 U.S. 654 (2002) and *Scott v. Illinois*, 440 U.S. 367 (1979). See Rules 121 and 122 [**and 121**].**

REPORT

Amendment to Pa.Rs.Crim.P. 122 and 454

RIGHT TO COUNSEL AT SUMMARY TRIAL

The Committee received correspondence from the Court asking us to review *Alabama v. Shelton*, 122 S.Ct. 1764 (2002) holding that a sentence that may end up in actual deprivation of personal liberty, e.g., imprisonment following probation violation, may not be imposed "unless the defendant was accorded the guiding hand of counsel in the prosecution for crime charged;" "without a knowing and intelligent waiver, no person may be imprisoned for any offense unless he was represented by counsel at his trial" (quoting *Argersinger v. Hamlin*, 407 U.S. 25 (1972)); imprisonment following a probation violation does not result from the violation itself but from the underlying conviction. The correspondence pointed out that some concerns had arisen concerning whether the Criminal Rules in Pennsylvania are consistent with the holding in *Shelton*, and requested the Committee to consider whether, in view of *Shelton*, any changes to the Criminal Rules concerning the right to counsel in summary cases are necessary.

The Committee reviewed the Criminal Rules in light of *Shelton*, and agreed that although the rules are clear concerning the right to counsel in court cases, there might be a gap in the rules concerning summary cases. Counsel in a summary case is required when "there is a likelihood that imprisonment will be imposed" (see Rule 122); the Committee believes that this language, in view of *Shelton*, may be ambiguous, and could result in confusion for members of the bench and bar. As a result, we agreed to reference in the rules the *Shelton* case to highlight the potential consequences when counsel is not afforded at trial.

How to accomplish this presented a challenge. The Committee first considered amending Rule 122 (Assignment of Counsel) by adding language that would make it clear counsel must be assigned when there is a likelihood that a sentence to a period of probation will be imposed and including a reference to *Shelton* in the Comment. During our discussion of this change, we agreed Rule 122 which addresses the circumstances when counsel should be assigned merely should acknowledge *Shelton* in the Comment, and Rule 454 (Trial in Summary Cases) should be amended since the holding in *Shelton* directly applies of the defendant's right to counsel at the time of the conviction for the offense charged (imprisonment may not be imposed if the defendant was not afforded counsel at time of the trial). Accordingly, we are proposing the amendment of Rule 454(A) to make it clear that if there is a reasonable likelihood of a sentence of imprisonment or probation in a summary case, the defendant shall be given an opportunity to secure counsel or have counsel assigned pursuant to Rule 122. We also are proposing the revision of the Comments to Rules 122 and 454 by adding the language "No defendant may be imprisoned or sentenced to probation if the right to counsel was not afforded at trial. See *Alabama v. Shelton*, 122 S.Ct. 1764 (2002) and *Scott v. Illinois*, 440 U.S. 367??? 99 S.Ct. 1158 (1979)."¹

Charges for Copying Discovery Material

The Criminal Procedural Rules Committee is planning to recommend that the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania approve the revision of the Comment to Rule 573 (Pretrial Discovery and Inspection) to clarify that the attorney for the Commonwealth cannot charge the defendant for the costs of copying discoverable materials but the attorney, on a case-by-case basis, may request from the trial judge an order requiring the defendant to pay the copying costs. This proposal has not been submitted for review by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania.

Please note that the Committee's Report should not be confused with the official Committee Comments to the rules. Also note that the Supreme Court does not adopt the Committee's Comments or the contents of the explanatory Reports.

PART F. Procedures Following Filing of
Information

Rule 573. Pretrial Discovery and Inspection.

* * * * *

Comment

This rule is intended to apply only to court cases. However, the constitutional guarantees mandated in *Brady v. Maryland*, 373 U.S. 83 (1963), and the refinements of the *Brady* standards embodied in subsequent judicial decisions, apply to all cases, including court cases and summary cases, and nothing to the contrary is intended. For definitions of "court case" and "summary case," see Rule 103.

The attorney for the Commonwealth should not charge the defendant for the costs of copying pretrial discovery materials. However, nothing in this rule is intended to preclude the attorney for the Commonwealth, on a case-by-case basis, from requesting an order for the defendant to pay the copying costs. In these cases, the trial judge has discretion to determine the amount of costs, if any, to be paid by the defendant.

REPORT

Revision of the Comment to Pa.R.Crim.P. 573

Charges for Copying Discovery Material

The Committee received an inquiry from the Supreme Court's Common Pleas Automation Project¹ staff asking if the Criminal Rules should address whether the attorney for the Commonwealth may charge a fee to the defendant for the copying costs associated with discovery materials. They pointed out that this practice occurs in several judicial districts, and they could find nothing in the Criminal Rules specifically permitting this practice. As a result, there is no uniformity in procedures concerning whether and how these copying costs are assessed. The Committee agreed this issue merited consideration and that addressing it in the Criminal Rules would promote the Court's goals of statewide uniformity.

Rule 573 (Pretrial Discovery and Inspection) provides the procedures governing discovery in court cases. Paragraphs (B)(1) and (B)(2)(a) provide for "the defendant's attorney to inspect and copy or photograph" discoverable information. The Committee researched the history of Rule 573, but found nothing concerning the provisions for copying and who should be responsible for paying the costs of copying discovery material that was helpful to this inquiry.²

Agreeing the Criminal Rules should address the issue, the Committee members were divided on whether the attorneys for the Commonwealth should be permitted to charge the defendants for the costs associated with the copying of discoverable materials. Some members felt strongly that defendants should not be required to pay the costs of copying any discovery materials, especially mandatory discovery; other members thought the attorneys for the Commonwealth should not carry the burden of paying these costs in all cases. Ultimately, the members reached a compromise position and agreed generally that the attorney for the Commonwealth cannot charge a defendant for the costs of copying discovery materials, but

¹ The Supreme Court is in the process of developing a statewide automation system for the criminal divisions of the courts of common pleas. As part of this process, the Committee has been working with the project staff to ensure the automation system and the criminal rules are consistent.

² We also looked at other jurisdictions and found some courts permit the practice of assessing copying costs for discovery against defendants. See, e.g., *U.S. v. Freedman*, 688 F.2d 1364 (C.A. 11 1982) and *U.S. v. Green*, 144 F.R.D. 631 (1992). See also *State v. Williams*, 678 So.2d 1356 (Fl. 1996), in which the court held, inter alia, the defendant has the burden of paying the costs of copying discoverable materials.

a judge may order the defendant to pay the costs in a specific case. Accordingly, the Committee is proposing that the Rule 573 Comment be revised to explain that 1) the attorney for the Commonwealth cannot assess a fee against the defendant for the costs of copying discovery materials, but on a case-by-case basis, the attorney may request the trial judge to order costs charged against the defendant, and 2) the judge has the discretion to determine the amount to be paid by the defendant.

Title 249—PHILADELPHIA RULES

PHILADELPHIA COUNTY

**Continuance Policy—Domestic Relations Division;
Administrative Regulation No. 02-02**

Effective Immediately, the Domestic Relations Division institutes the following policy relating to continuance requests:

(1) Continuances shall be granted only for good cause shown, and agreements to continue the matter by the parties or counsel are not sufficient to stay the provisions of this Administrative Regulation.

(2) A continuance request by an attorney for a case will only be considered if the attorney has already filed a formal entry of appearance in the case.

(3) Except as otherwise provided by this Administrative Regulation, all requests for continuance must be submitted in writing and within ten (10) calendar days from the date that the notices for the proceeding were served. If the scheduled event is a courtroom proceeding the request must be submitted to the presiding judge; if the scheduled event is not a courtroom proceeding, the request must be submitted to the supervisor of the presiding quasi-judicial officer. The addresses and fax numbers for all judges and operational units within the Domestic Relations Division are available on its internet website at: <http://courts.phila.gov/cpfd.html>.

(4) If a continuance request is based on an emergency and/or other unanticipated situation, the request must be submitted in writing to the presiding judge or the supervisor of the presiding quasi-judicial officer within twenty-four (24) hours from the time that the party or attorney becomes aware of, or should have become aware of the situation, and at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to the proceeding, if possible. Failure of a party to retain counsel in a timely fashion shall not constitute an emergency and/or unanticipated situation.

(5) All continuance requests must specify the reason therefor and include documentation, to the extent possible, and all opposing parties and/or counsel must be copied with said request.

(6) In order for the court or supervisor to accurately and easily identify the specific event for which the continuance is being requested, the request must include the caption of the case, the names of the parties and presiding officer, the matter pending, the date, time and place of the scheduled event, the position of the opposing parties or counsel with regard to the continuance request, and a copy of the scheduling notice if a time conflict is alleged.

(7) Unless the party or attorney requesting the continuance receives approval of the continuance by the court or appropriate supervisor, the event shall proceed as scheduled. If either party fails to appear for the scheduled event, and a continuance request has not been approved, the underlying petition, complaint, motion, or other pleading may be disposed by the court or presiding officer under applicable law.

(8) Filing advance notices of unavailability with the Clerk of Family Court will only prevent an attorney from being scheduled on unavailable dates in custody, divorce, and protection from abuse cases in which the attorney has entered an appearance. The Pennsylvania Child Support Enforcement System (PACSES) on which support cases are administered does not have the ability to prevent scheduling an attorney for a support proceeding, notwithstanding that the attorney has previously filed a notice of unavailability with the Clerk of Family Court. Therefore, any attorney of record in a support case who receives a notice for a proceeding on a date that the attorney had previously filed as unavailable, must submit a request for continuance in accordance with this Administrative Regulation within ten (10) calendar days from the date that the notice for the proceeding was served, and include a copy of the letter of unavailability that had been filed with the Clerk of Family Court.

(9) This Administrative Regulation specifically supercedes Family Court Administrative Regulation #00-04, which is hereby *Rescinded*.

Rule 1910.12. Hearing Procedure

(a) Support actions shall proceed in accordance with the alternative hearing procedure set forth in Pa.R.C.P. 1910.12.

(b) The interim order entered pursuant to Pa.R.C.P. 1910.12(b)(1) shall state that any party may within ten (10) days after the mailing of a copy of the order file a written demand with the Domestic Relations Section for a hearing before the Hearing Officer.

A demand for a hearing before the Hearing Officer shall not stay the order entered under Pa.R.C.P. 1910.12 (b)(1) unless the Court so directs.

If no party demands a hearing before the Hearing Officer within the 10-day period, the order shall constitute a final order.

If a demand for a hearing is filed, there shall be a hearing de novo before the Hearing Officer. The Domestic Relations Section shall schedule the hearing and give notice to the parties.

(c) The Hearing Officer shall receive evidence, hear argument and file with the Court a report containing a recommendation with respect to the entry of an order of support, in conformance with Pa.R.C.P. 1910.12(d). Thereafter, the case shall proceed in accordance with Pa.R.C.P. 1910.12 (e) through (h).

(d) Testimony before the Hearing Officer shall be recorded by a monitor or stenographer, but shall not be transcribed unless exceptions are filed to the Hearing Officer's decision. If exceptions are filed, it shall be the responsibility of the party who first files exceptions to obtain an order directing that the notes of testimony be transcribed. The party filing the exceptions shall bear the cost of the original transcript. If both parties file exceptions, the cost of the original transcript shall be shared equally. Nothing herein shall prevent the Court from thereafter reallocating the costs of the transcript as part of a final order.

Som.R.C.P. 216. Continuances in Court Cases.

A. Motions for continuance must be made in writing or of record in open court, unless excused by the court for cause.

B. Absent exceptional circumstances, motions for continuance shall be presented no later than ten (10) days before the date of the proceedings for which the continuance is requested. Thereafter, no motions for continuance will be granted except for substantial reasons which were not previously known or reasonably ascertainable.

C. The motion shall state whether or not the proceedings previously have been continued, and, if so, the number of prior continuances, with identification of the party upon whose motion each continuance was granted.

D. Absent extraordinary circumstances, a request for a continuance based on proceedings scheduled in another Court of Common Pleas will be granted only if the other court's scheduling order was issued before the order scheduling the proceedings for which the continuance is requested.

If the motion is based on conflict with a matter scheduled in another Court of Common Pleas, the scheduling order from the other Court of Common Pleas shall be attached to the motion.

E. Motions for continuance of court cases shall be presented as follows:

- 1. When at a scheduled call of the list, to the presiding Judge.
2. When a case is on a current trial or argument schedule, to the assigned Judge.
3. In all other cases, Motions Judge practice.

F. Continuances shall operate to effect rescheduling:

- 1. To a date certain or specific trial session if the Court states a date certain or specific trial session in the continuance order.
2. In all other cases, only upon filing of a scheduling praecipe as provided in Som.R.J.A. 1010 et seq.

G. An order continuing a case "sec reg.," until the next available session, or in terms of similar generality, will not result in rescheduling, or placement on a new trial list.

H. Every motion for continuance shall specify the reasons for the request.

I. The moving party shall certify that prior notice of presentation of the motion has been given to opposing counsel and unrepresented parties.

J. Every motion for unopposed continuance, whether written or oral, shall be joined in by all other parties or counsel of record, or shall certify that all other parties or counsel have been notified of the presentation of the motion and join in or do not oppose the motion.

K. When a civil case is scheduled for pretrial conference, the motion for continuance shall clearly state whether it relates to pretrial conference, or to the trial, or both.

L. An approved form of continuance motion is set forth in Som.R.C.P. 216.1.

M. This Rule does not apply to

1. Continuances of trials before arbitrators which are governed by Som.R.C.P. 1303 F.

2. Continuances of Domestic Relations Section conferences, which are governed by Som.R.C.P. 1910.12.

3. Continuances of hearings before the Domestic Relations Hearing Officer and divorce hearings before the Master.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 22—EDUCATION

PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS AND PRACTICES COMMISSION

[22 PA. CODE CH. 237]

Definitions of Statutory Terms

The Professional Standards and Practices Commission (Commission) adopts amendments to Chapter 237 (relating to definitions of statutory terms). The final-form rulemaking is made under the authority of sections 5(a)(11) and 9.2 of the Professional Educator Discipline Act (act) (24 P. S. §§ 2070.5(a)(11) and 2070.9b).

The Commission was created by the act of December 12, 1973 (P. L. 397, No. 141) as amended by the act of November 21, 2000 (P. L. 918, No. 123) (Act 123). By virtue of the act, the General Assembly has empowered the Commission to discipline professional educators and charter school staff members. In addition, the General Assembly directed the Commission to establish definitions consistent with its authority to discipline under sections 5(a)(11) and 9.2 of the act. Accordingly, the Commission promulgated definitions in Chapter 237 in May of 1994. The Commission now adopts a final-form rulemaking to amend the definitions found in Chapter 237.

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 32 Pa.B. 2994 (June 22, 2002) with an invitation to submit written comments within 30 days. On September 9, 2002, the Commission voted to adopt the rulemaking as proposed. On November 7, 2002, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) voted to approve the rulemaking as proposed.

Purpose

Chapter 237 establishes definitions under sections 5(a)(11) and 9.2 of the act. The act recently was amended by Act 123 and this final-form rulemaking reflects the amendments to the act.

Summary of Regulations

The most significant new requirements under the final-form rulemaking are:

1. The recognition of the extended jurisdiction of the Commission to discipline charter school staff members, as well as professional educators, as contemplated by the recent amendments to the act.

2. The standard for “morals of a community” within the definition of immorality has been changed from a local standard to a Statewide standard to comport with the overall mission of the Commission.

3. A definition for the term “surrender in lieu of discipline” has been added to this chapter to reflect the recent amendments to the act, which designated a surrender in lieu of discipline as a specific type of discipline. The most significant impact of this designation is that surrenders in lieu of discipline are now considered public under the act.

Public Comments

The Commission received no public comments during the official public comment period. In addition, neither the House Education Committee nor the Senate Educa-

tion Committee submitted comments. The Commission did consider the comments submitted by IRRC on August 22, 2002.

In its comments, IRRC objected to the phrase “morals of the Commonwealth” within the definition of “immorality” in § 237.3 (relating to immorality) as vague and undefined. The Commission is entrusted with the responsibility of determining the present, continuing and future fitness and ability of a person to serve as a professional educator in this Commonwealth. In exercising its responsibilities, the Commission must consider the Statewide impact and effect of its decisions, as distinguished from individual employment or contractual discipline imposed by a local school entity. The vagaries of any one community’s standards within this Commonwealth cannot be allowed to determine the level and extent of discipline against Commonwealth issued certification. Accordingly, the Commission decided that the appropriate moral standard should emanate from the Commonwealth community at large and not the community attendant to the educator’s place of employment.

While the concept of the “morals of the Commonwealth,” as well as the “morals of the community,” is not defined specifically, the concepts have acquired a well-established construction through judicial and Commission decisions. The construction of the concept, as applied by the courts and the Commission, does not lend itself to definitive explication. As is true with any adjudicatory matter, professional discipline should be decided on a case-by-case basis, after consideration of all relevant facts and circumstances as presented in a due process hearing. The nature of the conduct within any particular context is critical to the Commission’s determination in each case. In the judgment of the Commission, it would be inappropriate and imprudent, not to mention nearly impossible, to condense the breadth of the concept into any single comprehensive statement. The Commission thus respectfully disagrees with IRRC that the phrase “morals of the Commonwealth” needs further clarification.

With respect to § 237.9 (relating to crimes involving moral turpitude), IRRC had two comments. First, IRRC suggested that the Commission include specific examples or descriptions of actions that constitute “moral turpitude” within the definition. As with the concept of “morals of the Commonwealth,” the Commission does not believe that the inclusion of specific examples within the definition is warranted. To the contrary, the Commission believes that the inclusion of examples might actually prove misleading and may lead to unintended limitations of the Commission’s adjudicatory discretion.

In addition, specific applications of the definition of “moral turpitude” can be found in countless judicial decisions in this Commonwealth as well as in the adjudications of the Commission. The Commission does not wish to replace well-established judicially crafted definitions with specific examples.

Finally, IRRC commented on § 237.9(c), which sets forth the mechanism for the Commission to consider crimes added or deleted from section 111(e) of the Public School Code of 1949 (code) (24 P. S. § 1-111(e)) to determine if the crimes involve moral turpitude per se. IRRC advised the Commission to include the criteria for determining whether a crime involves moral turpitude within the definition.

The Commission believes that Chapter 237 already establishes the criteria for the moral turpitude determination. Section 237.9 specifically mandates that the Commission, in determining whether a specific crime involves moral turpitude, limit its consideration to the elements of the crime as juxtaposed against the stated definition of "moral turpitude." The underlying facts of each case are not relevant. Under § 237.1 (relating to purpose), the Commission may look to judicial interpretations and decisions of the Secretary of Education for guidance in the prescribed analysis. It is the opinion of the Commission that the moral turpitude determination does not need further elaboration.

IRRC also queried how the Commission will notify the public of its decisions relating to crimes that are added to or deleted from section 111(e) of the code. The Commission's decisions are made in public at its regularly scheduled and advertised meetings. In addition, its written decisions are available to the public with the exception of those decisions that remain confidential under the act. The Commission agrees that its decisions, in this area as well as in others, should be more readily accessible to the public. To that end, the Commission will publish in its Annual Report a more comprehensive summary of its decisions, including the grounds for discipline, the level of discipline imposed and the crimes that have been determined to involve moral turpitude. The Commission does not believe, however, that the regulations need to specify the particular means of communicating its decisions to the public.

Affected Parties

Chapter 237 primarily affects all professional educators who have been certified by the Department of Education, as well as charter school staff members, who are employed by a charter school in a position for which Commonwealth certification would be required in a public school other than a charter school, but who are not required to hold State certification under section 1724-A of the code (24 P. S. § 17-1724-A).

Cost and Paperwork Estimates

The final-form rulemaking will not create any additional costs or paperwork for affected parties, which include professional educators, charter school staff members, local school districts and the Department.

Effective Date

This final-form rulemaking will become effective upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Sunset Date

The Commission will review the effectiveness of Chapter 237 on an ongoing basis. Thus, no sunset date is necessary.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on October 8, 2002, the Commission submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking, published at 32 Pa.B. 2994, to IRRC and to the Chairpersons of the House and Senate Committees on Education for review and comment.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC and the Committees were provided with copies of the comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. In preparing this final-form rulemaking, the Commission has considered the comments received from IRRC, the Committees and the public.

Under section 5.1(d) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(d)), on November 28, 2002, this final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the House and Senate Committees. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on November 7, 2002, and approved the final-form rulemaking.

Findings

The Commission finds that:

(1) Public notice of the intention to adopt the regulations was given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder at 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) The regulations are necessary and appropriate for the administration of the act.

Order

The Commission, acting under authorizing statute, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Commission, 22 Pa. Code Chapter 237, are amended by amending §§ 237.1—237.4, 237.8 and 237.9; by deleting § 237.6; and by adding § 237.10 to read as set forth at 32 Pa.B. 2994.

(b) The Executive Director of the Commission shall submit this order and 32 Pa.B. 2994 to the Office of General Counsel and the Office of Attorney General for review and approval as to legality and form as required by law.

(c) The Executive Director of the Commission shall certify this order and 32 Pa.B. 2994 and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau, as required by law.

(d) This order will take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Corrective Amendment to 25 Pa. Code § 93.9w

The Department of Environmental Protection has discovered a discrepancy between the agency text of 25

Pa. Code § 93.9w (relating to Drainage List W), as deposited with the Legislative Reference Bureau and as published at 30 Pa.B. 6059, 6105 (November 18, 2000), and the official text as published in the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter* (Master Transmittal Sheet No. 315), and as currently appearing in the *Pennsylvania Code*. The amendments made by the Department at 30 Pa.B. 6059, 6105 were codified incorrectly.

Therefore, under 45 Pa.C.S. § 901: The Department of Environmental Protection has deposited with the Legisla-

tive Reference Bureau a corrective amendment to 25 Pa. Code § 93.9w. The corrective amendment to 25 Pa. Code § 93.9w is effective as of February 3, 2001, the date the defective official text was announced in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The correct version of 25 Pa. Code § 93.9w appears in Annex A, with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulation.

**INSURANCE DEPARTMENT
UNDERGROUND STORAGE TANK
INDEMNIFICATION BOARD
[25 PA. CODE CH. 977]
Fees and Collection Procedures**

The Insurance Department (Department) and the Underground Storage Tank Indemnification Board (Board) amend §§ 977.12 and 977.33 (relating to owner and operator fees; and fund coverage and exclusions) to read as set forth in Annex A. Sections 206, 506, 1501 and 1502 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. §§ 66, 186, 411 and 412) provide the Insurance Commissioner with the authority to promulgate regulations governing the enforcement of the laws relating to insurance. Section 705 of the Storage Tank and Spill Prevention Act (act) (35 P. S. § 6021.705) provides the Board with the authority to promulgate regulations concerning the establishment of fees to be paid by participants in the Underground Storage Tank Indemnification Fund (Fund). Public notice of this amendment is impractical and unnecessary because the proposed changes are needed to ensure the solvency of the Fund and any input from the public would not decrease the necessity to increase the fees collected.

Notice of proposed rulemaking is omitted in accordance with section 204(3) of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769,

No. 240) (45 P. S. § 1204(3)), known as the Commonwealth Documents Law (CDL). In accordance with section 204(3) of the CDL, notice of proposed rulemaking may be omitted when the agency for good cause finds that public notice of its intention to amend an administrative regulation is, under the circumstances, impracticable and unnecessary.

Purpose

The amendments will bring the regulation's fees to the appropriate levels as recommended by an actuarial report that was completed on September 12, 2002. After reviewing this report, the Board determined that this increase is necessary to maintain the solvency of the Fund for the public health and safety of this Commonwealth's citizens and their environment. The actuarial study, performed by MMC Enterprise Risk Consulting, Inc., determined that an increase in the gallon and capacity fees was necessary to maintain the actuarial soundness of the Fund in the future.

Explanation of Regulatory Requirements

Section 977.12 is being changed to reflect the fees that the Board approved after extensive review and discussion of the report.

Section 977.33 is being changed to reflect the changes made to the act by the amendments contained in the act of December 13, 2002 (P. L. 900, No. 99). These amendments increase the limits of liability for corrective action

costs and bodily injury and property damage claims that may occur from an underground release.

Fiscal Impact

An owner or operator transacting business in this Commonwealth will be affected by these amendments. The fee increases approved by the Board are significant; however, despite these increases, the fees are only half as much as they were when the program began in 1994.

The costs that the 2,045 local governments/school districts are currently paying will increase by approximately \$482 per quarter or \$1,928 per year for each municipality/school district.

State-owned tanks are exempt from all Fund fees.

General Public

Because the public is a consumer of goods and services provided by owners and operators of an underground storage tank (UST) or a heating oil tank (HOT), any increase to the fees could result in higher prices to consumers. However, it is expected that this increase in fees will result in an additional \$.81 per month to motorists, in accordance with a survey on vehicle fuel consumption and expenditures by United States' households, conducted by the Energy Information Administration, Office of Energy Markets and End Use.

This increase is proposed to keep the Fund solvent after an actuarial study completed in September 2002 indicated the need for additional revenue to maintain the Fund's actuarial soundness.

Effectiveness/Sunset Date

This final-omitted rulemaking will become effective January 1, 2003.

Paperwork

Adoption of this final-omitted rulemaking should not require significant paperwork for the owners or operators of USTs or HOTs. The paperwork necessary after the increase is expected to be the same as before the increase was implemented.

Persons Regulated

This final-omitted rulemaking applies to owners or operators of USTs and HOTs in this Commonwealth.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5.1(c) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(c)), on October 25, 2002, the Department and the Board submitted a copy of this rulemaking with the proposed rulemaking omitted to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the House Committee on Insurance and the Senate Committee on Banking and Insurance. On the same date, the final-omitted rulemaking was submitted to the Office of Attorney General for review and approval under the Commonwealth Attorneys Act (71 P. S. §§ 732-101—732-506).

In accordance with section 5.1(d) of the Regulatory Review Act, this final-omitted rulemaking was deemed approved by the Senate and House Committees on No-

vember 14, 2002. The Attorney General approved this final-omitted rulemaking on November 8, 2002. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on November 21, 2002, and approved this final-omitted rulemaking.

Findings

The Insurance Commissioner finds that:

(1) There is good cause to amend §§ 977.12 and 977.33 effective upon publication with the proposed rulemaking omitted. Deferral of the effective date of these regulations would be impractical and not serve the public interest. Under section 204(3) of the CDL, there is no purpose to be served by deferring the effective date. An immediate effective date will best serve the public interest by ensuring that fees have the full potential that the actuarial study predicted.

(2) There is good cause to forego public notice of the intention to amend §§ 977.12 and 977.33 because notice of proposed rulemaking under the circumstances is unnecessary and impractical because the changes proposed are necessary to ensure the solvency of the Fund and any input from the public would not decrease the necessity to increase the fees collected.

Order

The Insurance Commissioner, acting under the authority in sections 206, 506, 1501 and 1502 of The Administrative Code of 1929, orders that:

(1) The regulations of the Department, 25 Pa. Code Chapter 977, are amended by amending §§ 977.12 and 977.33 to read as set forth in Annex A, with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulations.

(2) The Department shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General and the Office of General Counsel for approval as to form and legality as required by law.

(3) The Department shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(4) This order shall take effect January 1, 2003.

CHAPTER 977. UNDERGROUND STORAGE TANK INDEMNIFICATION FUND

Subchapter B. FEES AND COLLECTION PROCEDURES

§ 977.12. Owner and operator fees.

* * * * *

(b) *Tank and gallon fees.* A UST owner or operator storing gasoline, new motor oil, hazardous substances,

gasohol, aviation fuel, mixture, farm diesel and other types of substances based on the tank registration information maintained by the DEP may be assessed the following fees:

* * * * *

(2) *Gallon fee.* A gallon fee on all regulated substances entering a UST of \$.01 per gallon. (For example, 10,000 gallons at \$.01 per gallon equals \$100).

* * * * *

(d) *Capacity fee.* An owner or operator which stores regulated substances including diesel, heating oil, used motor oil, kerosene and unknown substances based on the tank registration information maintained by the DEP may be assessed a capacity fee of \$.075 per gallon of capacity, which amount is established in accordance with section 705(d)(2) of the act (35 P. S. § 6021.705(d)(2)). (For example, 10,000 gallons at \$.075 per gallon equals \$750).

Subchapter C. COVERAGE AND CLAIMS PROCEDURES

§ 977.33. Fund coverage and exclusions.

(a) *Fund coverage.*

* * * * *

(4) *Limits of liability.* Payment of corrective action costs and bodily injury and property damage claims (See section 704 of the act (35 P. S. § 6021.704)) are subject to the following limits of liability:

(i) Payments for reasonable and necessary corrective action costs, and bodily injury or property damage may not exceed a total of \$1.5 million per tank per occurrence and may not exceed the annual aggregate limit.

(ii) Payments may not exceed:

(A) An annual aggregate of \$1.5 million for each owner and operator of 100 or less USTs or an owner or operator of 100 or less HOTS.

(B) An annual aggregate of \$3 million for each owner or operator of 101 or more USTs or an owner or operator of 101 or more HOTS.

Commission Property

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapter 53 (relating to Commission property). The Commission is publishing this amendment as a notice of proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code).

The proposed rulemaking, if approved on final-form rulemaking, will go into effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The proposed amendment to § 53.8 (relating to boats) is published under the statutory authority of section 741 of the code (relating to control of property).

D. *Purpose and Background*

The proposed rulemaking is designed to update, modify and improve the Commission's regulations pertaining to its property. The specific purpose of the proposed rulemaking is described in more detail under the summary of proposal.

E. *Summary of Proposal*

A Commission waterways conservation officer recently cited an individual for retrieving an unregistered and unpermitted canoe from the Commission's Upper Black Eddy access on the Delaware River. At the hearing before the district justice, the individual argued that he was not in violation of the Commission's regulations because the registration requirement of § 53.8(h) does not apply to noncommercial users of all accesses on the Delaware River. The district justice ruled in his favor. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to amend this section to avoid further misinterpretation.

F. *Paperwork*

The proposed rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements.

G. *Fiscal Impact*

The proposed rulemaking will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The proposed rulemaking will impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public.

Special Permits; Exotic Wildlife

To effectively manage the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth, the Game Commission (Commission), at its October 8, 2002, meeting, proposed the following change:

Amend §§ 147.241, 147.261 and 147.281 (relating to scope) to require applicants to have 2 years of experience of hands-on work with exotic wildlife.

The proposed rulemaking will have no adverse impact on the wildlife resources of this Commonwealth.

The authority for the proposed amendments is 34 Pa.C.S. (relating to Game and Wildlife Code) (code).

The proposed rulemaking was made public at the October 8, 2002, meeting of the Commission. Comments can be sent to the Director, Information and Education, Game Commission, 2001 Elmerton Avenue, Harrisburg, PA 17110-9797, until December 27, 2002.

1. *Introduction*

The Commission is proposing to amend Chapter 147 (relating to special permits) by adding §§ 147.241(g), 147.261(f) and 147.281(g).

2. *Purpose and Authority*

Currently, permits to acquire, possess and dispose of wild animals can be issued to individuals without any education or experience in caring for and safeguarding the public from these animals. This can result in mistreatment of the animals and endangerment of the public. The proposed rulemaking will remedy this situation by requiring permit applicants to have at least 2 years of hands-on work experience with the species involved.

Section 2901(b) of the code (relating to authority to issue permits) provides that "the Commission may, as deemed necessary to properly manage the game or wildlife resources, promulgate regulations for the issuance of any permit and promulgate regulations to control the activities which may be performed under the authority of any permit issued." This section provides the authority for the proposed rulemaking.

3. *Regulatory Requirements*

The proposed rulemaking will require applicants to have 2 years of experience of hands-on work with exotic wildlife.

4. *Persons Affected*

Persons applying for exotic wildlife possession, exotic wildlife dealer and menagerie permits will be affected by the proposed rulemaking.

5. *Cost and Paperwork Requirements*

The proposed rulemaking should not result in any additional cost or paperwork.

6. *Effective Date*

The proposed rulemaking will be effective on final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and will remain in effect until changed by the Commission.

Maximum Lawful Rate of Interest for Residential Mortgages for the Month of January 2003

The Department of Banking (Department), under the authority contained in section 301 of the act of January 30, 1974 (P. L. 13, No. 6) (41 P. S. § 301), hereby determines that the maximum lawful rate of interest for residential mortgages for the month of January 2003, is 7%.

The interest rate limitations under the State's usury statute were preempted to a great extent by Federal law, the Depository Institutions Deregulation and Monetary Control Act of 1980 (Pub. L. No. 96-221). Further preemption was instituted with the signing of Pub. L. No. 96-399, which overrode State interest rate limitations on any individual who finances the sale or exchange of residential real property which the individual owns and which the individual occupies or has occupied as a principal residence.

Each month the Department is required by State law to compute and announce the ceiling rate on residential mortgages in this Commonwealth. This maximum rate is determined by adding 2.50 percentage points to the yield rate on long-term government bonds as published by the Federal Reserve Board and/or the United States Treasury. The latest yield rate on long-term government securities is 4.55 to which was added 2.50 percentage points for a total of 7.05 that by law is rounded off to the nearest quarter at 7%.

LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

UNDER ACT 2, 1995

PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908)

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (Act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to, or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the background standard, Statewide health standard, the site-specific standard or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area, must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the

intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one, a combination of the cleanup standards or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the Act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the Act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part, and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments, should be directed to the remediator of the site.

NEW SOURCES AND MODIFICATIONS

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) has developed an "integrated" plan approval, State Operating Permit and Title V Operating Permit program. This integrated approach is designed to make the permitting process more efficient for the Department, the regulated community and the public. This approach allows the owner or operator of a facility to complete and submit all the permitting documents relevant to its application one time, affords an opportunity for public input and provides for sequential issuance of the necessary permits.

The Department has received applications for plan approvals and/or operating permits from the following facilities.

Copies of these applications, subsequently prepared draft permits, review summaries and other support materials are available for review in the Regional Office identified in this notice. Persons interested in reviewing the application files should contact the appropriate Regional Office to schedule an appointment.

Persons wishing to receive a copy of the proposed Plan Approval or Operating Permit must indicate their interest to the Department Regional Office within 30 days of the date of this notice and must file protests or comments on a Proposed Plan Approval or Operating Permit within 30 days of the Department providing a copy of the proposed document to that person or within 30 days of its publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, whichever comes first. Interested persons may also request that a hearing be held concerning the proposed plan approval and operating permit. Comments or protests filed with Department Regional Offices must include a concise statement of the objections to the issuance of the plan approval or operating permit and relevant facts, which serve as the basis for the objections. If the Department schedules a hearing, a notice will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at least 30 days prior the date of the hearing.

Final plan approvals and operating permits will contain terms and conditions to ensure that the source is constructed and operating in compliance with applicable requirements in 25 Pa. Code Chapters 121—143, the Federal Clean Air Act and regulations adopted under the Act.

The modifications include the installation of a paint spray booth for repair coating of small parts and assemblies. The modifications may increase VOC emissions from the facility by as much as 40 tons per year. The plan approval and amended operating permit will contain emission limits along with monitoring, recordkeeping and reporting requirements to ensure the facility complies with the applicable air quality requirements.

The proposed boiler will replace an existing boiler and will incorporate a low NOx burner and flue gas recirculation system to minimize the emission of NOx. Natural gas will be the primary fuel burned with propane to be used as a backup fuel. The boiler will emit up to 2.66 tons of NOx, 5.4 tons of carbon monoxide and .44 ton of particulate matter in any 12 consecutive month period.

The Department has determined that the proposed boiler will comply with all applicable regulatory requirements pertaining to air contamination sources and the emission of air contaminants, including the best available technology requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12. The Department consequently intends to approve the application and issue a plan approval for the construction of the proposed boiler.

The following is a summary of the conditions the Department proposes to place in the plan approval to be issued to ensure compliance with all applicable air quality regulatory requirements:

1. The boiler shall incorporate a low NOx burner and flue gas recirculation system.
2. The boiler shall only be fired with natural gas or propane.
3. The NOx concentration in the boiler's exhaust shall not exceed 30 parts per million, dry volume basis, corrected to 3% oxygen and the carbon monoxide concentration shall not exceed 100 parts per million, dry volume basis, corrected to 3% oxygen.

Where any of the mining activities listed will have discharges of wastewater to streams, the Department will incorporate NPDES permits into the mining activity permits issued in response to these applications. NPDES permits will contain, at a minimum, technology-based effluent limitations (as described in the Department's regulations—25 Pa. Code §§ 77.522, 87.102, 88.92, 88.187, 88.242, 89.52 and 90.102) for iron, manganese, suspended solids, settleable solids, alkalinity and pH. In addition to the previous, more restrictive effluent limitations, restrictions on discharge volume, or restrictions on the extent of mining which may occur will be incorporated into a mining activity permit, when necessary, for compliance with water quality standards (in accordance with 25 Pa. Code Chapters 93 and 95). Persons or agencies which have requested review of the NPDES permit requirements for a particular mining activity within the previously-mentioned public comment period will be provided with a 30-day period to review and submit comments on those requirements.

Written comments or objections should contain the name, address and telephone number of persons submitting comments or objections; application number; and a statement of sufficient detail to inform the Department on the basis of comment or objection and relevant facts upon which it is based. Requests for an informal conference must contain the name, address and telephone number of requestor; application number; a brief summary of the issues to be raised by the requestor at the conference; and a statement whether the requestor desires to have the conference conducted in the locality of the proposed mining activities.

FEDERAL WATER POLLUTION CONTROL ACT, SECTION 401

The following permit applications and requests for Environmental Assessment approval and requests for Water Quality Certification have been received by the Department of Environmental Protection (Department). Section 401 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (FWPCA) (33 U.S.C.A. § 1341(a)), requires the State to

certify that the involved projects will not violate the applicable provisions of sections 301—303, 306 and 307 of the FWPCA (33 U.S.C.A. §§ 1311—1313, 1316 and 1317) as well as relevant State requirements. Initial requests for 401 Water Quality Certification will be published concurrently with the permit application. Comments should contain the name, address and telephone number of the person commenting, identification of the certification request to which the comments or objections are addressed and a concise statement of comments, objections or suggestions including the relevant facts upon which they are based.

The Department may conduct a fact-finding hearing or an informal conference in response to comments if deemed necessary. Each individual will be notified, in writing, of the time and place of a scheduled hearing or conference concerning the certification request to which the comment, objection or suggestion relates. Maps, drawings and other data pertinent to the certification request are available for inspection between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. on each working day at the office noted before the application.

This notice of proposed remedial response is being issued by the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to provide a description of the proposed remedial response related to contaminated groundwater (OU2) of the Bear Creek Area Chemical Site (Site). The document will be included in the Administrative Record for the Site, which has been compiled for this response

under section 506 of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (HSCA) (35 P. S. § 6020.506).

The Site is located in Fairview, Parker, Washington and Concord Townships and Petrolia, Fairview, Karns City and Bruin Boroughs, Butler County and in Perry Township, Armstrong County. The Site includes at least 24 areas where the Department knows or has evidence to suggest that industrial wastes were historically disposed or otherwise released and the surface water, groundwater, soils and sediments that have been contaminated from hazardous substances and contaminants that have migrated from the areas of disposal and other release areas. The industrial wastes were generated at the Site by Koppers Company, Witco Chemical Corporation and Penreco and were disposed and otherwise released from approximately the 1950s to at least the 1970s.

Various hazardous substances and contaminants are present in the disposal areas and associated surface water, groundwater and soils within the Site. Those hazardous substances and contaminants have been detected in numerous private and public water supply wells.

The following persons are liable under section 701(a) of the HSCA (35 P. S. § 6020.701(a)) for the release and threat of release of hazardous substances and contaminants at the Site: Beazer East, Inc., Crompton Corporation, the Francis C. Spitzer Estate, Shaler Contracting Development Corp., JTC Industries, Inc., Penreco, Indspec Chemical Corporation, Fred Bradford, Dennis Kelly, Janice E. Kelly, Dana Craig, David L. Alworth and Rhonda Alworth.

Bottled water has been provided to residences, businesses and institutions by the Department in increasing numbers as sampling has warranted since March 13, 2002. To date, over 680 homes, businesses and institutions have been provided bottled water by the Department on an ongoing basis. The provision of bottled water has been undertaken as a prompt interim response under section 505(b) of the HSCA (35 P. S. § 6020.505(b)).

Since 2001, Beazer East has provided bottled water to a number of other residents of Fairview and Parker Townships and Fairview Borough, Butler County whose well samples have contained resorcinol or any of the Site contaminants.

The Department considered three remedial response alternatives for OU2 to achieve the previous objective:

Alternative 1—Providing a reliable permanent source of potable water to residents and other users within the proposed Site service area from the Parker Area Authority (PAA) water supply source.

Alternative 2—Providing a reliable permanent source of potable water to residents and other users within the proposed Site service area from the Pennsylvania American Water Company (PAWC) water supply source.

Alternative 3—Providing a reliable permanent source of potable water to residents and other users within the proposed Site service area from the Kittanning Suburban Joint Water Authority (KSJWA) water supply source.

Since the same core service area is served under each alternative previously described, the alternatives are equally protective and equally meet all State and Federal requirements. In addition, the three alternatives are similar with respect to their effectiveness in managing short and long-term risks to human health and the environment. Therefore, the analysis of the remedial alternatives deals primarily with their relative costs and implementability, including the timeliness until construction completion.

The evaluation matrix in Table 1 summarizes the estimated construction cost, operation and maintenance cost, implementability features and construction schedule for each of the water supply alternatives. As can be seen in the evaluation matrix, the PAA supply option is the least expensive alternative and requires the least amount of time to construct. The PAWC alternative is the most expensive and is estimated to take the longest time to construct. The KSJWA supply alternative has the advantage of being able to supply water to the service area with relatively minor system improvements, but is the second most-costly option.

Based on the previous comparative analysis and under section 505(a) of the HSCA, the Department proposes to implement Alternative 1 as a remedial response related to OU2 at the Site (that is, to abate the risks and potential risks to public health from the release and threatened release of hazardous substances and contaminants into the groundwater (OU2) at the Site). Alternative 1 would include providing a new public water supply system to a site service area encompassing the homes, businesses and institutions whose public or private water supply wells have been contaminated or threatened with contamination by impacted site groundwater. The raw water supply would originate in the Allegheny River, be treated by the Parker Area Authority (Authority) in Parker, PA and be provided by that Authority to the Site service area. The estimated cost of this response is \$11.8 million. Periodic Site reviews would be conducted to evaluate the effectiveness of the measures implemented.

The Department's proposed remedial response would protect public health; comply with or otherwise address State and Federal requirements; be feasible, implementable, permanent and effective; and be cost effective. A minimum 90-day public comment period will be opened during which the public may formally comment on the

Department's proposed remedial response at the Site. At the close of the public comment period, an evaluation will be made of the public's acceptance of the alternative proposed in this document.

An Administrative Record, which contains additional, more detailed information regarding the Site and the proposed remedial response action is available for public inspection. The Administrative Record can be examined from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Department's Northwest Regional Office, 230 Chestnut Street, Meadville, PA 16335. Persons interested in examining the Administrative Record should contact the Department's Hazardous Sites Cleanup Program, (814) 332-6648 to make advance arrangements.

The public will have an opportunity to present oral comments regarding the proposed remedial response at a public hearing. The public hearing has been scheduled for January 22, 2003, at 6:30 p.m. at the Karns City High School Auditorium, 1446 Kittanning Pike, Karns City, PA. Persons wishing to present formal oral comments at that hearing must register on or before January 8, 2003, by calling the Department's Community Relations Coordinator, Freda Tarbell, (814) 332-6945. A general question and answer period will follow the formal oral comment period of the public hearing. The public may also submit written comments regarding the Department's proposed remedial response action during the period for public comment, which runs from the date of this notice through March 21, 2003. The Department has taken action on the following plans and reports under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Provisions of 25 Pa. Code § 250.8, Administration of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (Act) requires the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a notice of its final actions on plans and reports. A final report is submitted to document cleanup of a release of a regulated substance at a site to one of the remediation standards of the Act. A final report provides a description of the site investigation to characterize the nature and extent of contaminants in environmental media, the basis of selecting the environmental media of concern, documentation supporting the selection of residential or nonresidential exposure factors, a description of the remediation performed and summaries of sampling methodology and analytical results which demonstrate that the remediation has attained the cleanup standard selected. Plans and reports required by provisions of the Act for compliance with selection of remediation to a site-specific standard, in addition to a final report, include a remedial investigation report, risk assessment report and cleanup plan. A remedial investigation report includes conclusions from the site investigation, concentration of regulated substances in environmental media, benefits of refuse of the property and, in some circumstances, a fate and transport analysis. If required, a risk assessment report describes potential adverse effects caused by the presence of regulated substances. If required, a cleanup plan evaluates the abilities of potential remedies to achieve remedy requirements. A work plan for conducting a baseline remedial investigation is required by provisions of the Act for

compliance with selection of a special industrial area remediation. FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

Designation of Wilderness Trout Streams

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) is considering adding 9.38 miles of streams in the Fishing Creek

Watershed, Schuylkill County, to its Wilderness Trout Streams Program. Under 58 Pa. Code § 57.4 (relating to wilderness trout streams), it is the Commission's policy to manage the wilderness trout streams program where the stream remoteness and populations of naturally reproducing trout combine to offer a sport fishing opportunity for the recreation of anglers in a wilderness setting away from roads or vehicular access. It is the Commission's intent to advocate proper watershed management to maintain the wilderness setting and to advance and seek the highest water quality standards through the Department of Environmental Protection.

The limits for the four streams proposed for the Wilderness Trout Streams designation are as follows:

(1) *Fishing Creek*—from the confluence of Fishing Creek, West Branch and Baird Run downstream to the mouth at Lebanon Reservoir (2.05 miles).

(2) *Baird Run*—from the headwaters downstream to the confluence with Fishing Creek, West Branch (1.37 miles).

(3) *Fishing Creek, Evening Branch*—from the headwaters downstream to the mouth at Lebanon Reservoir (3.6 miles).

(4) *Fishing Creek, West Branch*—from the headwaters downstream to the confluence with Baird Run (2.36 miles).

The Commission intends to consider the designation of Wilderness Trout Streams at its meeting on January 25, 2003. 

 The net payment date stated on the business' invoice.

A 15-day grace period after the required payment date is provided to the Commonwealth by the Act.
