## EDITORS' FOREWARD

*The following articles are based on papers delivered at the VILLANOVA LAW REVIEW Symposium on THE MORALITY OF LAW which was held at the Law School on April 2, 1965. The Symposium is an attempt to bring about intellectual exchange of ideas between legal philosophers of our day. In an effort to further this goal three papers were delivered by Professors Dworkin, Cohen and Fuller followed by a question period from a panel of philosophers and law professors.*

*The papers are centered around a probe of the relationship between law and morality which grew out of Professor Fuller's incisive analysis of this interaction in his recent book, THE MORALITY OF LAW. The articles are preceded by a short synopsis of Professor Fuller's book; however, to fully grasp the discussion a complete reading of THE MORALITY OF LAW is strongly recommended. Following the three main articles by Professors Dworkin, Cohen and Fuller are short critiques of their speeches delivered at the Symposium by members of the panel, which are reprinted here in place of the question period.*

*We made little attempt to convert these papers into orthodox law review articles. In general, the subject dealt with was not susceptible to such treatment, mainly because the authors' purpose was to probe and prod the new ideas of Professor Fuller's book.*
