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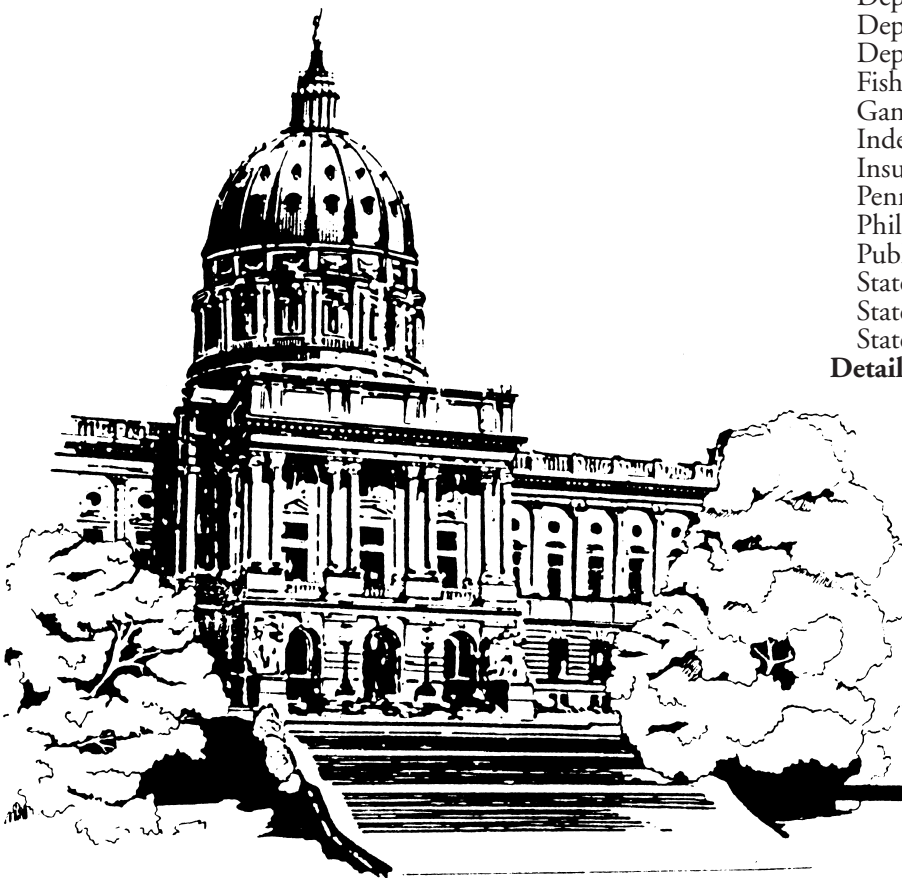

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Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances when the agency may omit the proposal step; it still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* before it can take effect. If the agency

wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, it must repropose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number, a page number and date. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801, January 9, 1971 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801 (January 9, 1971)).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa. Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*. The *Pennsylvania Code* is available at www.pacode.com.

Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

A chronological table of the history of *Pennsylvania Code* sections may be found at www.legis.state.pa.us.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is available at www.pabulletin.com.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where “no fiscal impact” is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Subchapter B. MISCONDUCT

Rule 214. Attorneys convicted of crimes.

* * * * *

(h) As used in this rule, the term “crime” means an offense that is punishable by imprisonment in the jurisdiction of conviction, whether or not a sentence of imprisonment is actually imposed. **Notwithstanding any other provision of this subdivision (h), the term “crime” shall include criminal contempt, whether direct or indirect, and without regard to the sentence that may be imposed or that is actually imposed.** It does not include parking violations or summary offenses, both traffic and non-traffic, unless a term of imprisonment is actually imposed.

CHAPTER 1930. RULES RELATING TO DOMESTIC RELATIONS MATTERS GENERALLY

Rule 1930.4. Service of Original Process in Domestic Relations Matters.

* * * * *

(c) *Service by Mail*. Except in Protection from Abuse matters unless authorized by special order of court pursuant to subdivision (b) above, original process may also be served by mailing the complaint and order to appear, if required, to the defendant’s last known address by both regular and certified mail. Delivery of the certified mail must be restricted to addressee only, and a return receipt must be requested.

(1) If the certified mail is refused by defendant, but the regular mail is not returned within fifteen days, service may be deemed complete.

(2) If the mail is returned with notation by the postal authorities that it was unclaimed, service shall be made by another means pursuant to these rules.

Official Note: Nothing in this rule is intended to preclude a judicial district from utilizing the United States Postal Service’s return receipt electronic option, or any similar service that electronically provides a return receipt, when using certified mail, return receipt requested.

(d) *Acceptance of Service*. In lieu of service pursuant to this rule, the defendant or the defendant’s authorized agent may accept service of original process by filing with the prothonotary a separate document which shall be substantially in the following form:

CHAPTER 3000. JUDGMENTS

**Subchapter D. ENFORCEMENT OF MONEY
JUDGMENTS FOR THE PAYMENT OF MONEY**

Rule 3111. Service of the [**writ on garnishee; effect**]
Writ on Garnishee. Effect.

(a) The writ shall be served by the sheriff upon the garnishee in the manner prescribed by Rule 402(a) except as otherwise provided by Rules 3112 and 3113. The sheriff shall furnish the garnishee with an additional copy of the writ for each defendant. If the garnishee served was not named in the writ he shall be added as a garnishee and return made accordingly.

(b) Service of the writ upon the garnishee shall attach all property of the defendant which may be attached under these rules which is in the possession of the garnishee. It shall also attach all property of the defendant which may be attached under these rules and which comes into the garnishee's possession thereafter until judgment against the garnishee even though no such property of the defendant was in the garnishee's possession at the time of service.

Official Note: For limitations on the power to attach tangible personal property see Rule 3108(a).

See Rule 3111.1 providing that service of the writ does not attach the first \$10,000 of each account of the defendant in which any funds are deposited electronically on a recurring basis and are identified as funds that upon deposit are exempt from attachment, or each account of the defendant in which funds on deposit exceed \$10,000 at any time, if all funds are deposited electronically on a recurring basis and are identified as being funds that upon deposit are exempt from attachment.

(c)(1) **If a garnishment has not been acted upon within one year of the filing of the garnishment, the garnishee or the defendant may file a petition to terminate the garnishment. The petition shall include a notice that the plaintiff has twenty days to respond to the filing of the petition and that upon failure to do so, the garnishment may be terminated.**

(2) **Any response to the petition shall be filed within twenty days of the filing of the petition and set forth the reasons not to terminate the garnishment.**

(3) **If no response to the petition is filed, upon praecipe, the writ of garnishment shall be terminated.**

Official Note: If a response is filed to the petition to terminate the garnishment, it shall be resolved pursuant to motion and answer practice. See Rule 208.1 et seq.

[(c)] (d) Service of the writ upon the garnishee shall also subject the garnishee to the mandate and injunctive orders of the writ restraining the garnishee from paying any debt to or for the account of the defendant and from delivering any property of the defendant which may be attached under these rules to anyone except the sheriff or otherwise disposing thereof until further order of the court or discontinuance or termination of the attachment.

[(d)] (e) Violation of the mandate and injunctive orders of the writ may be punished as a contempt.

Rule 3129.3. Postponement of Sale. New Notice. Failure of Plaintiff to Attend Sale.

(a) Except as provided by subdivision (b) or special order of court, new notice shall be given as provided by Rule 3129.2 if a sale of real property is stayed, continued, postponed or adjourned.

(b)(1) If the sale is stayed, continued, postponed or adjourned to a date certain within one hundred thirty days of the scheduled sale, notice of which sale was given as provided by Rule 3129.2, and public announcement thereof, including the new date, is made to the bidders assembled at the time and place fixed for the sale, no new notice as provided by Rule 3129.2 shall be required, but there may be only two such stays, continuances, postponements or adjournments within the one hundred thirty day period without new notice.

(2)(i) **When the sale is stayed, continued, postponed or adjourned as provided by subdivision (b)(1), the plaintiff shall file**

(A) a notice of the date of continued sheriff's sale with the prothonotary at least fifteen days before the continued sale date, and

(B) a certificate of filing with the sheriff confirming the filing of the notice of the date of continued sheriff's sale with the prothonotary.

The sheriff shall continue the sale to the next available sale date if the notice of the date of continued sheriff's sale has not been timely filed. This continuance imposes a new obligation on the plaintiff to meet the requirements described in (b)(2)(i)(A) and (B).

(ii) **Non-compliance with this subdivision is not a basis for setting aside the sheriff's sale unless raised prior to the delivery of the sheriff's deed. The sale shall be set aside only upon a showing of prejudice.**

Official Note: This subdivision supersedes other provisions of these rules limiting the number of times a sale may be continued, including the provisions of subdivision (b)(1).

(3)(i) **The notice required by subdivision (b)(2) shall be substantially in the following form:**

(c) If the plaintiff or a representative of the plaintiff is not present at the sale, the real property shall not be sold. The sheriff shall return the writ of execution to the prothonotary and file a return pursuant to Rule 3139 indicating that the real property was not sold because the plaintiff or a representative of the plaintiff was not present at the sale. Thereafter, the writ may be reissued pursuant to Rule 3106.

Rule 3135. Sheriff's [deed to real property] Deed to Real Property. Correction of [deed] Deed.

(a) When real property is sold in execution and no petition to set aside the sale has been filed, the sheriff, at the expiration of twenty days but no later than 40 days after either the filing of the schedule of distribution or the execution sale if no schedule of distribution need be filed, shall execute and acknowledge before the prothonotary a deed to the property sold. The sheriff shall forthwith deliver the deed to the appropriate officers for recording and for registry if required. Confirmation of the sale by the court shall not be required.

Official Note: See Rule 3136(a) governing the filing of the schedule of distribution.

(b) If the sheriff has made a defective return of the execution proceeding or has executed a defective deed, including the erroneous description of the real estate, the court upon petition of the purchaser or the purchaser's successors in title may correct the return or deed or order that a new return or deed be executed.

(c) If the plaintiff has failed to give notice to a lienholder, junior in lien priority to the mortgage being foreclosed upon or the judgment being executed, the plaintiff, or its assigns, or the purchaser at the sheriff's sale may file a petition with rule to show cause requesting that:

(1) the lien held by the junior lienholder be divested, or

(2) if the plaintiff, or its assigns, is the purchaser at the sheriff's sale, another sheriff's sale be held in which only the junior lienholder specified in the petition may be the only bidder allowed other than the senior lienholder who acquired the property at the sheriff's sale, or

(3) such relief as may be approved by order of court.

Explanatory Comment

The Rules of Civil Procedure governing sheriff's sales have been amended in three respects:

Current Rule 3111 governing the service of the writ on the garnishee provides for a continuing garnishment of defendant's property until the underlying judgment is satisfied. Because garnishments can languish indefinitely without any action taken on them, the amendment introduces a procedure that would allow a defendant or a third-party garnishee to petition the court for termination of the garnishment provided that there has been no activity on the garnishment for at least one year. The plaintiff has the opportunity to respond to the petition and set forth the reasons the garnishment should not be terminated.

Current Rule 3129.3 governs the procedures for postponing or continuing a sheriff's sale. The rule, however, is silent as to providing notice of the date to which a sheriff's sale has been postponed. As a remedy, the amendment to Rule 3129.3 requires the plaintiff to file a notice of the date of continued sheriff's sale with the prothonotary at least 15 days before the continued sale date. The plaintiff must also file a certificate of filing with the sheriff's office confirming the filing of the notice with the prothonotary.

The failure to timely file the notice results in the sheriff continuing the sale until the next available sale date. However, noncompliance is not a basis for setting aside the sale unless it is raised prior to the delivery of the sheriff's deed. A sale will only be set aside upon a showing of prejudice.

The amendment to Rule 3135, which governs the correction of the sheriff's deed to real property, addresses the situation when a junior lienholder has failed to receive notice of mortgage foreclosure and has not been divested of its interest. Currently, the plaintiff is required to hold the sheriff's sale again even though the junior lienholder typically has no interest in purchasing the mortgage. To remedy this duplication of effort and resources, the amendment allows for a plaintiff, its assigns, or the purchaser at the previously held sheriff's sale to file a petition with a rule to show cause requesting that (1) the lien held by the junior lienholder be divested, (2) another sheriff's sale be held in which only the junior lienholder specified in the petition may be the only other bidder allowed other than the senior lienholder who acquired the property at the previously held sheriff's sale, or (3) other relief approved by the court.

Accelerated Rehabilitative Disposition in Summary Cases; 14-96; No. 4 AD 2014

Administrative Order

And Now, this 11th day of January, 2014, pursuant to Pennsylvania Rules of Criminal Procedure 300—302, it is *Ordered* that the following procedures are adopted for an Accelerated Rehabilitative Disposition program for certain summary cases in the Magisterial District Courts within the Twenty-third Judicial District of Pennsylvania.

The District Court Administrator of Berks County is *Ordered* and *Directed* to provide copies to the appropriate entities pursuant to Pa.R.Crim.P. 105:

1. File one (1) certified copy of this Administrative Order and Local Rule with the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts.

2. Distribute two (2) certified paper copies of this Administrative Order and Local Rule and one (1) computer diskette or CD-ROM containing this Order and Rule to the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

3. Publish a copy of the Administrative Order and Local Rule on the Unified Judicial System's web site at <http://ujportal.pacourts.us/localrules/ruleselection.aspx>.

4. Keep continuously available for public inspection copies of the Administrative Order and Local Rule in the office of the Prothonotary or Clerk of Courts.

This Administrative Order shall become effective thirty days after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

ACCELERATED REHABILITATIVE DISPOSITION (ARD)

Rule 300. Accelerated Rehabilitative Disposition in Summary Cases.

1. Upon request of the District Attorney of Berks County, a defendant charged with any one of the following summary offenses shall be eligible for Accelerated Rehabilitative Disposition (hereinafter ARD) to be supervised by the Magisterial District Judge (hereinafter MDJ) pursuant to Pa.R.Crim.P. 300—302 and 42 Pa.C.S.A. § 1520: criminal mischief, criminal trespass, disorderly conduct, harassment, public drunkenness, retail theft, truancy, or underage drinking.

Rule 301. Procedures for Accelerated Rehabilitative Disposition in Summary Cases before the Minor Judiciary.

1. The cost of the ARD program for summary cases is \$100.00.

2. The defendant shall make written application to the MDJ for admission into the summary ARD program.

a. Upon receipt of the application for admission into the summary ARD program, the MDJ shall forward to the District Attorney a copy of the defendant's application.

b. The District Attorney shall review said application and notify the MDJ of a decision to either approve or deny the application. If the District Attorney denies the application, the MDJ shall be notified of the reason(s) for denial.

3. If the District Attorney denies the defendant's application, the MDJ shall notify the defendant that his/her application has been denied and the case shall then proceed in accordance with Chapter 4 of the Pennsylvania Rules of Criminal Procedure. If the District Attorney approves the defendant's application, the MDJ shall notify the defendant of such approval and shall set a hearing date for admission into the program.

4. A defendant accepted into ARD may be referred to any of the following programs and shall pay any costs associated with a program:

- a. The Underage Drinking Program of Berks County
- b. STOPLIFT Adult Shoplifting Intervention Program
- c. STOPLIFT Juvenile Shoplifting Intervention Program
- d. Adult Probation Community Service Program
- e. Juvenile Probation Community Service Program
- f. A recommended program subject to approval by the District Attorney.

5. Community service program hours shall be assigned in 4-hour increments and shall not exceed 40 hours for offenders referred to the Adult Probation Community Service Program or shall not exceed 20 hours for offenders referred to the Juvenile Probation Community Service Program.

6. All costs and restitution, if any, must be paid before completion of the ARD program.

7. If the MDJ deems that the defendant has met all of the requirements of the ARD program, the summary charge filed against the defendant shall be dismissed. In the MDJS, the summary case appears "ARD Open" while the defendant is on ARD. Upon completion of the ARD program, the MDJ shall record a "Dismissed by ARD" disposition to close the case. If the MDJ deems that the defendant has failed to complete all of the requirements of the ARD Program, the defendant shall be terminated from the ARD program, and the case shall proceed in accordance with Chapter 4 of the Pennsylvania Rules of Criminal Procedure. No summary case shall remain active for purposes of ARD supervision in excess of six (6) months.

In the MDJS, "ARD Open" and "Dismissed by ARD" shall not be used for any summary case that is not processed through the District Attorney's ARD program for summary cases.

8. Each MDJ shall submit to the District Attorney a monthly report on the disposition of all cases eligible for ARD, where applications were submitted for admission into the program. The District Attorney shall compile these monthly reports and monitor the cases. The monthly report submitted by each MDJ shall include: a record of defendants who participate in the ARD program; those who were eligible but not admitted to ARD and the reasons for not admitting the defendant; those who complete the ARD program; those who do not complete the program; and those defendants that pay in full the costs associated with the program.

9. The ARD application referred to in paragraph 2 shall be in substantially the following form:

Corrective Amendment to 22 Pa. Code Chapter 4, Appendices B and C

The State Board of Education has discovered a discrepancy between the agency text of 22 Pa. Code Chapter 4, Appendices B and C (relating to academic standards for science and technology and environment and ecology grades 6-12; and academic standards for civics and government and economics and geography and history; academic standards for history) as deposited with the Legislative Reference Bureau and the official text as published at 44 Pa.B. 1131, 1225 and 1232 (March 1, 2014). Ellipses were inadvertently omitted in Appendices B and C to indicate existing text in the *Pennsylvania Code*. This corrective amendment does not amend any text in Appendices B and C.

Therefore, under 45 Pa.C.S. § 901: The State Board of Education has deposited with the Legislative Reference

Bureau a corrective amendment to 22 Pa. Code Chapter 4, Appendices B and C. The corrective amendment to 22 Pa. Code Chapter 4, Appendices B and C is effective as of March 1, 2014, the effective date of adoption of the final-form rulemaking amending these appendices.

The correct version of 22 Pa. Code Chapter 4, Appendices B and C appears in Annex A, with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulations.

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

Administrative Provisions; Resident and Nonresident Fishing Licenses

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) amends Chapter 51 (relating to administrative provisions). The Commission is publishing this final-form rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code) (code).

A. *Effective Date*

The final-form rulemaking will go into effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. *Contact Person*

C. *Statutory Authority*

The amendment to § 51.32 (relating to resident and nonresident licenses) is published under the statutory authority of section 2102 of the code (relating to rules and regulations).

D. *Purpose and Background*

The final-form rulemaking is designed to improve, enhance and update the Commission's administrative regulations. The specific purpose of the amendment is described in more detail under the summary of change.

E. *Summary of Change*

Under former § 51.32(d), a Senior Resident Lifetime Fishing License became invalid when the holder establishes residency in another state. While not as specific as § 51.32(d), § 51.32(a) and (c) have been interpreted to mean that other fishing licenses become invalid upon a change in residency.

With the advent of multiyear fishing licenses, the Commission anticipates some confusion arising among anglers who purchase a multiyear license, move out-of-State and expect to be able to continue fishing with the multiyear license. The Commission believes that the benefits of providing clarity to anglers and encouraging fishing outweigh revenue to be gained by requiring license holders to purchase a new fishing license after they change their state of residence. License holders will still be required to display their license and possess a positive means of identification as required under section 2703(a) of the code (relating to possession and display of licenses).

The Commission amends § 51.32 to provide that a resident fishing license will remain valid for the year or years for which it is issued regardless of whether the holder is no longer a bona fide resident of this Commonwealth. The Commission amends § 51.32 to read as set forth in the proposed rulemaking published at 43 Pa.B. 5462 (September 14, 2013).

F. *Paperwork*

The final-form rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will not create new paperwork requirements.

G. *Fiscal Impact*

The final-form rulemaking will not have an adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. Fiscal impacts to the Commission will be nominal.

The final-form rulemaking will not impose new costs on the private sector or the general public. It will result in a cost savings to anglers who purchase a resident license and then move out of this Commonwealth prior to the expiration of the license. These anglers will not be required to purchase a nonresident license until their current license expires.

H. *Public Involvement*

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 43 Pa.B. 5462. The Commission did not receive public comments concerning the proposed rulemaking.

Findings

The Commission finds that:

(1) Public notice of intention to adopt the amendment adopted by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

Fishing; Authorized Devices

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) amends Chapter 63 (relating to general fishing regulations). The

Commission is publishing this final-form rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code) (code).

The final-form rulemaking will go into effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The amendments to §§ 63.6 and 63.10 (relating to authorized devices for game fish, baitfish and fishbait; and ice fishing) are published under the statutory authority of section 2102 of the code (relating to rules and regulations).

D. *Purpose and Background*

The final-form rulemaking is designed to improve, enhance and update the Commission's fishing regulations. The specific purpose of the amendments is described in more detail under the summary of changes.

E. *Summary of Changes*

Section 63.6 limits the number of hooks per line to three (a single hook, as defined in this Commonwealth, may contain up to three points). Recently, several individuals and a representative from a tournament angling organization requested that the Commission accommodate use of the "Alabama rig." The Alabama rig is an umbrella type rig that contains five lures on short wire lines that merge to one point for attachment to a fishing line. The Alabama rig has been observed to be used in this Commonwealth by the Division of Fisheries Management staff as fished with three hooked lures and two "teaser" lures not containing hooks. After the Bureau of Fisheries and the Bureau of Law Enforcement explored the issue, a sound biological or enforcement reason was not found to change the regulation to allow for this type of tackle.

Although initial interest to change the regulation came from a black bass organization, changes to the regulation would affect other species as well. Striped bass anglers also use this type of device.

With respect to black bass, it appears that use of the rig in other states has been directed to a rather small component of black bass populations, that is, bass that occupy habitats that were lightly exploited or that were previously not vulnerable to capture using conventional gear types. Where habitats exist and are occupied by black bass in this Commonwealth, the Commission might expect an increase in catch. The fraction of catch that is harvested is typically low for black bass, 7% as measured in the 2007 Susquehanna River Creel survey. Likewise, the percentage of released bass that perish is typically low (10-12%) as measured in reservoirs in this Commonwealth and elsewhere using conventional tackle. Commission staff presume that catch and release loss associated with the Alabama Rig will likewise be low.

Commission staff looked at the regulations of surrounding states and found that there is not a real consensus in terms of a limit on hooks. Several states allow more than three hooks or do not have a limit on hooks. New Jersey allows up to nine hooks or three treble hooks per line while New York allows five baits/lures. Virginia and West

Virginia do not have limits on rods or hooks except for trout fishing. Ohio is the only state that has a regulation that closely mirrors the Commonwealth's with a two-rod/three-hook maximum. The Commission therefore proposed that § 63.6 be amended to provide that there will not be a restriction on the number of hooks used for fishing for game fish or baitfish.

After the Commission approved the publication of the proposed rulemaking, staff discovered that there is a reference in § 63.10 to the number of hooks that are permitted to be attached to each line while fishing. That number is limited to three. To be consistent with the previously proposed changes to § 63.6, the Commission also adopts the change to § 63.10 in this final-form rulemaking.

In response to the proposed rulemaking, the Commission received a comment from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, Division of Wildlife, expressing concerns that implementing the new rule on the Pymatuning Reservoir where Pennsylvania and Ohio exercise concurrent jurisdiction will cause confusion among anglers fishing in the lake. The Commission, therefore, on final-form rulemaking, adopts the amendments except on the Pymatuning Reservoir.

The Commission amends §§ 63.6 and 63.10 to read as set forth in Annex A.

F. *Paperwork*

The final-form rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will not create new paperwork requirements.

G. *Fiscal Impact*

The final-form rulemaking will not have adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The proposed rulemaking will not impose new costs on the private sector or the general public.

H. *Public Involvement*

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 43 Pa.B. 5466 (September 14, 2013). The Commission received five comments. Prior to the official public comment period, the Commission received three comments concerning the proposal, two of which supported it and one of which opposed it. The Commission received one comment opposing it during the official public comment period. After the public comment period, the Commission received the comment from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources. Copies of the public comments were provided to the Commissioners.

Findings

TITLE 58. RECREATION

PART II. FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

Subpart B. FISHING

CHAPTER 63. GENERAL FISHING REGULATIONS

§ 63.6. Authorized devices for game fish, baitfish and fishbait.

(a) It is unlawful to fish for game fish with more than three lines of any description, whether fished by rod or by hand, at one time except while ice fishing in accordance with § 63.10 (relating to ice fishing). There is not a restriction on the number of hooks used for fishing for game fish, except when fishing in the Pymatuning Reservoir where no more than three hooks shall be attached to each line used in fishing. Rods, lines and hooks shall be under the immediate control of the person using them. A fishing device shall be deemed to be under the immediate control of the person using it if, when the terminal device (hook, bait or lure) is taken by a fish, the person using the device has direct control over it and it is not connected at that point to a casting or depth placement aid such as a casting boat or downrigger. Casting or depth placement aids such as downriggers or small remote controlled boats are not prohibited by this chapter.

(b) It is unlawful to fish for baitfish with more than three lines of any description, whether fished by rod or by hand, at one time; a dip-net or minnow seine not over 4 feet square or 4 feet in diameter, and a minnow trap, with not more than two openings, which may not exceed 1 inch in diameter. There is not a restriction on the number of hooks used for fishing for baitfish, except when fishing in the Pymatuning Reservoir where no more than three hooks shall be attached to each line used in fishing. Rods, lines, hooks, nets and seines used in fishing for fishbait and baitfish shall be under the immediate control of the person using the same. For the purposes of this subpart, gizzard shad (*Dorosoma cepedianum*) 8 inches or less in length are considered baitfish.

(c) For purposes of this section, a hook is considered a fishing device with no more than three points or barbs.

(d) It is unlawful to use more than three lines at any time, except while ice fishing in accordance with § 63.10, when fishing for game fish, baitfish or both.

(e) It is unlawful to use any type of net or seine to catch or take game fish. A landing net may be used to land game fish legally caught by hook and line.

§ 63.10. Ice fishing.

(a) Ice fishing is fishing through holes in the ice.

(b) It is unlawful while ice fishing to use more than five fishing devices, which may consist of rods, hand lines, tip ups or any combination thereof. Each device shall contain a single fishing line. There is not a restriction on the number of hooks that may be used for ice fishing, except when fishing in the Pymatuning Reservoir where no more than three hooks shall be attached to each line used in fishing.

(c) Rods, lines and tip-ups used in ice fishing shall be under the immediate control of the person using the same.

(d) It is unlawful to fish through holes in the ice that measure more than 10 inches between the farthest points as measured in any direction.

Special Fishing Regulations; Mentored Youth Fishing Day Program

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) amends Chapter 65 (relating to special fishing regulations). The Commission is publishing this final-form rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code) (code).

A. *Effective Date*

The final-form rulemaking will go into effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

C. *Statutory Authority*

Section 65.20 (relating to Mentored Youth Fishing Day Program) is published under the statutory authority of section 2102 of the code (relating to rules and regulations).

D. *Purpose and Background*

Most often, parents or guardians are the source of both instruction and serve as mentors to young anglers and hunters. The role of a mentor is that of long-term development and socialization. An instructor can teach someone to fish, while a mentor helps them become an angler (Duda M.D., 2010). That is, while proper instruction is important, it alone does not guarantee adoption. This is especially true if a mentor or other social support is absent.

Benefits of mentored experiences also extend to the parents or mentors. A 2007 survey of trout anglers in this Commonwealth showed that 98% of those surveyed would go trout fishing more if asked by a child (Responsive Management, 2008). Of that number, 84% indicated that being asked by a child to take them fishing was a strong encouragement to go trout fishing more in this Commonwealth.

Mentored opportunities differ from educational programs significantly in that mentored experiences extend beyond the instructional period. Mentors plan and discuss the trip with apprentices before, during and after. An instructor only has contact with the young angler during the presentation. It is this premise on which youth hunts and mentored hunting programs are based (DJ Case & Associates, 2007) (Responsive Management, 2011) (Responsive Management and Southwick Associates, 2012). This premise is the supporting rationale behind the Commission's Mentored Youth Fishing Day Program.

On March 23, 2013, the Commission piloted a Mentored Youth Trout Fishing Day on 12 waters in the regional opening day zone, covering 18 southcentral and southeast counties. This day was accomplished by the Commission's Executive Director, acting under the authority of § 65.25 (relating to temporary changes to fishing regulations). The temporary change was published at 43 Pa.B. 114 (January 5, 2013).

To participate, anglers 16 years of age or older (adult anglers) were required to possess a valid Pennsylvania fishing license and current trout/salmon permit and be accompanied by a youth, less than 16 years of age, who registered with the Commission. Youth anglers must have been registered with the Commission and accompanied by an adult angler to participate. During the Mentored Youth Trout Fishing Day, the minimum size limit for trout was 7 inches and the creel limit was two trout per day (combined species). Other Commonwealth inland regulations applied. It was unlawful for adult anglers to fish in waters designated under the Mentored Youth Trout Fishing Day Program without a valid fishing license and trout permit and without being accompanied by a registered youth.

A total of 5,110 youth registered to participate in the Mentored Youth Trout Fishing Day pilot, accompanied by 3,846 adult mentors. A survey of mentors conducted by the Commission showed that 90% of the registered youth participated, resulting in an estimated 7,300 youth and their mentors taking part. These anglers fished an estimated 22,000 hours and released nearly 15,000 trout while harvesting slightly more than 6,000. Public, partner and staff feedback received before, during and immediately after the pilot day was predominantly positive. The results of the 2013 pilot program support expansion of the program to create additional opportunities for parents and mentors to take the children in their lives fishing as a way to reactivate anglers of all ages.

E. Summary of Change

Under this final-form rulemaking, the Executive Director may annually designate Mentored Youth Fishing Days and, when doing so, he will identify the species, waters, dates, creel and minimum size limits and other limitations that will apply. The specific details of these mentored youth fishing opportunities will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. The Commission also will post the Mentored Youth Fishing Day Program guidelines to the Commission's web site and promote it through various media outlets.

On final-form rulemaking, the Commission adopts § 65.20 with the following changes. In the proposed regulation, youth anglers (less than 16 years of age) were required to be "registered" with the Commission. However, the Commission determined that it is preferable to issue permits to youth anglers instead of registering them through other means. Youth anglers will be able to obtain a permit from the Commission free of charge through the

existing Pennsylvania Automated Licensing Service (PALS). Issuance of permits through PALS will allow the Commission to collect information regarding youth anglers. Specifically, this process will provide the Commission with more customer data for marketing purposes and allow for better assessment of lifelong license buying habits.

In addition to the free permit, the Commission will accept a voluntary youth fishing license for youth wishing to participate in the Mentored Youth Fishing Day Program. Voluntary youth fishing licenses will be available through PALS for \$1, and the Commission will be able to count them as licenses for the purpose of leveraging Sport Fish Restoration dollars from the United States Fish and Wildlife Service. Regardless of whether the youth opts for a free permit or a voluntary license, he will be issued a document that will resemble an adult license and will be able to be displayed for the purpose of participating in Mentored Youth Fishing Day opportunities.

On final-form rulemaking, the Commission also includes language requiring adult anglers to obtain a trout/salmon permit when the Mentored Youth Fishing Day Program relates to trout. This requirement is consistent with other special fishing regulations in Chapter 65 dealing with trout.

The Commission adds § 65.20 to read as set forth in Annex A.

F. Paperwork

The final-form rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will not create new paperwork requirements.

G. Fiscal Impact

The final-form rulemaking will not have an adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The final-form rulemaking will not impose new costs on the private sector or the general public.

H. Public Involvement

Notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 43 Pa.B. 7099 (December 7, 2013). The Commission did not receive public comments concerning the proposed rulemaking.

Findings

The Commission finds that:

Subpart B. FISHING

CHAPTER 65. SPECIAL FISHING REGULATIONS

§ 65.20. Mentored Youth Fishing Day Program.

(a) The Executive Director may annually designate Mentored Youth Fishing Days. As part of the designation, the Executive Director will identify the species, waters, dates, creel and minimum size limits and other applicable limitations. The designation will be effective upon publication of a notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

(b) It is unlawful to fish in waters designated as part of the Mentored Youth Fishing Day Program except in compliance with the following requirements when participating in the Mentored Youth Fishing Day Program:

(1) Anglers shall adhere to the limitations as established by the Executive Director by notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

(2) An angler 16 years of age or older shall be accompanied by a youth, less than 16 years of age, who has obtained a mentored youth permit or a voluntary youth fishing license from the Commission.

(3) A youth angler shall obtain a mentored youth permit or a voluntary youth fishing license from the Commission and be accompanied by an angler 16 years of age or older.

(4) A current trout/salmon permit is required for an angler 16 years of age or older when participating in a Mentored Youth Fishing Day Program that relates to trout.

(c) Notwithstanding the requirements of this section, an angler in a boat may possess fish caught in compliance with the seasons, sizes and creel limits in effect for the water from which taken, provided that the boat angler floats through the water designated as part of the Mentored Youth Fishing Day Program without stopping or engaging in the act of fishing or the boat angler takes out his boat at an access point within the water designated as part of the Mentored Youth Fishing Day Program.

D. *Purpose and Background*

The final-form rulemaking is designed to improve, enhance and update the Commission's fishing regulations. The specific purpose of the amendments is described in more detail under the summary of change.

E. *Summary of Change*

At the October 2012 Commission meeting, 45 waters were moved from the Early Season Trout Stocked Waters Program to the Approved Trout Waters Open to Year-Round Fishing Program. Included in these changes were the Water Works Ponds (East Basin Pond and West Basin Pond) on Presque Isle Bay. Regulations under the Approved Trout Waters Open to Year-Round Fishing Program permit fishing for trout year-round; however, from March 1 through the opening day of trout season, only catch and release fishing is permitted for trout. The current regulations on Lake Erie tributary streams and the Water Works Ponds prohibit fishing from 12:01 a.m. on the Friday before the first Saturday after April 11 until 8 a.m. on the first Saturday after April 11. This was irrelevant under the Early Season Trout Stocked Waters Program since fishing was not permitted from April 1 to the opening day. However, with the change in designation to approved trout waters open to year-round fishing, fishing is permitted during the period that is currently closed to fishing immediately prior to the opening day. The Commission therefore amends § 69.12 so that the section does not conflict with the regulations for approved trout waters open to year-round fishing.

The Commission amends § 69.12 to read as set forth in the proposed rulemaking published at 43 Pa.B. 5467 (September 14, 2013).

F. *Paperwork*

The final-form rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will not create new paperwork requirements.

G. *Fiscal Impact*

The final-form rulemaking will not have an adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdi-

Boating; Registration and Numbering

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) amends Chapter 93 (relating to boat registration and numbering). The Commission is publishing this final-form rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code) (code).

The amendments to § 93.2 (relating to permanent and temporary registration) are published under the statutory authority of section 5122 of the code (relating to registrations, licenses, permits, plates and statistics). The amendments to § 93.13 (relating to issuing agents) are published under the statutory authority of section 5304 (relating to issuing agents).

D. Purpose and Background

The final-form rulemaking is designed to improve, enhance and update the Commission's boating regulations. The specific purpose of the amendments is described in more detail under the summary of changes. The Commission solicited the advice of its Boating Advisory Board regarding the amendments prior to final adoption.

E. Summary of Changes

Currently, the Commission and authorized issuing agents issue temporary boat registrations to persons applying for the registration of boats in this Commonwealth. Temporary boat registration is used for boats that are new or were not previously registered in this Commonwealth, boats being transferred between owners and boats currently registered in this Commonwealth as unpowered that are being changed to a power boat registration status. Under current regulations, applicants complete Form REV-336, Application for Pennsylvania Boat Registration and/or Title, and are issued a Temporary Validation Decal (T-decal) to affix to the boat.

The annual cost to the Commission to produce, distribute and account for the T-decals is estimated to be \$42,000. The Commission proposes to eliminate the use of the T-decal to save approximately \$42,000 annually in decal production costs, postage for mailing decals to issuing agents and personnel costs associated with accounting and inventorying of the decals. Elimination of the T-decals will also result in time and cost savings to issuing agents in that they will no longer have to issue T-decals, maintain a supply or pay \$52 for each lost decal.

Issuing agents will continue to collect currently required registration information on Form REV-336. Form REV-336 is a carbonless, three-copy form used in the registration process. The green copy, or customer copy, is provided to the applicant upon completion of the registration process by the issuing agent. Boaters will continue to be required to produce the green customer copy of Form REV-336 to verify a temporary registration but will no longer be required to display T-decals on the side of the boat that has been registered.

Currently, boaters shall remove previously issued or expired registration decals from boats. With the elimination of the T-decals, an empty space following the registration number sequence on the hull of the boat will indicate that the boat may have a temporary registration status. Upon request by a waterways conservation officer (WCO), a boater will be required to produce the green customer copy of Form REV-336 as proof of the temporary registration. Elimination of the T-decal will not change the current requirement to carry and produce the customer copy of Form REV-336. It is also expected that elimination of the T-decal may increase customer contact between boaters and WCOs and provide WCOs with an opportunity to share additional educational information with boaters.

The Commission therefore amends §§ 93.2 and 93.13 to read as set forth in the proposed rulemaking published at 43 Pa.B. 5463 (September 14, 2013).

F. Paperwork

The final-form rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will not create new paperwork requirements.

G. Fiscal Impact

The final-form rulemaking will not have adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The final-form rulemaking will result in cost savings to the Commission in the amount of approximately \$42,000 per year in decal production costs, postage for mailing decals to issuing agents and personnel costs associated with accounting and inventorying of the decals. The final-form rulemaking will not impose new costs on the private sector or the general public. The final-form rulemaking will result in cost savings to issuing agents in that they will no longer have to issue T-decals, maintain a supply or pay \$52 for each lost decal.

Fishing; General Fishing Regulations

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapter 63 (relating to general fishing regulations). The Commission is publishing this proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code) (code).

A. *Effective Date*

The proposed rulemaking, if approved on final-form rulemaking, will go into effect upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

C. *Statutory Authority*

The proposed amendment to § 63.2 (relating to display of fishing license and verification of license purchase) are published under the statutory authority of section 2703 of the code (relating to possession and display of licenses). The proposed amendments to § 63.20 (relating to permits for protection and management of trout and salmon) are published under the statutory authority of section 2904 of the code (relating to permits for protection and management of particular fish).

D. *Purpose and Background*

The proposed rulemaking is designed to improve, enhance and update the Commission's fishing regulations. The specific purpose of the proposed amendments is described in more detail under the summary of proposals.

E. *Summary of Proposals*

Under § 63.2(b), anglers required under Chapter 27 of the code (relating to fishing licenses) to purchase a license to fish in the waters of this Commonwealth or boundary waters shall display the actual fishing license certificate on a hat or outer garment while fishing. Starting sometime in March 2014, the Commission will make license buttons available for sale. Therefore, § 63.2 must be amended to allow for the display of license buttons as an alternative to the current display requirement. Under the proposal, a license holder will be required to carry the license certificate on his person if a license button is displayed instead of the license certificate.

In the notice published at 43 Pa.B. 7602 (December 28, 2013), the Executive Director exercised his authority under § 65.25 (relating to temporary changes to fishing regulations) to allow the display of license buttons as an alternative to the current display requirement. The temporary modification went into effect on January 1, 2014, and will remain in effect until the Commission, by appropriate action, amends § 63.2. In the absence of action, the temporary modification will expire on December 31, 2014.

Under § 63.20(d)(3), a person who purchases a senior resident lifetime fishing license and who wishes to fish for trout or salmon is required to purchase one trout/salmon permit and is then exempt from the requirement to purchase a trout/salmon permit for subsequent years. This effectively means that those licensees may purchase one trout/salmon permit that is valid for the licensee's lifetime. About 70% of seniors purchase a trout/salmon permit, which mirrors the rate for other anglers.

Since it was instituted in 1979, the Commission has sold 463,714 senior resident lifetime fishing licenses. In 1979, that category of license sales accounted for 1.31% of total license sales (13,179 out of 1,004,003). When license sales peaked in 1990, the sale of senior resident lifetime fishing licenses also reached an all-time high of 18,645. As this Commonwealth's population has aged, so too has the percentage of senior resident lifetime fishing licenses compared to total license sales, with that category accounting for 1.97% of total sales in 2013 (17,004 out of 860,672).

Even more significantly, senior resident lifetime fishing licenses have grown to comprise nearly 50% of all senior licenses sold. Residents 65 years of age and older may purchase either a senior resident lifetime fishing license for \$50 or a senior resident annual fishing license for \$10. In 1979, senior resident lifetime licenses and senior resident annual licenses totaled 87,247, but the lifetime category only accounted for 15.11% of that total. In 2013, of the 34,790 combined senior resident lifetime and senior resident annual licenses, 48.9% were for the lifetime license. As this Commonwealth's seniors continue to account for a larger percentage of the total population (and of anglers), the relative number of anglers buying the lifetime license is expected to continue to rise.

According to the Commission's Stocked Trout Program: Cost Report (March 2009), the Commission's trout program accounts for 36% of the Fish Fund annual expenditures, and the cost of trout production continues to rise. The Commission can no longer afford to allow anyone required to purchase a senior resident lifetime fishing license to fish for trout without paying for the privilege to do so annually.

One thing that the Commission can do by regulation is to require senior resident lifetime license holders to purchase a trout/salmon permit each year that the license holder desires to fish for trout. At the same time, the Commission can establish that a senior resident lifetime license holder who purchased a trout/salmon permit before a certain date will remain exempt from the requirement to purchase a permit annually. To use a common term, those individuals will be grandfathered.

With the grandfathering clause, there will not be additional revenues generated in the first year of the proposed amendment since the licensees who purchase a permit under the regulation will presumably buy it anyway. Assuming senior resident lifetime license holders continue to make up about 50% of all senior license buyers, an estimated 8% drop in sales and associated Federal funds due to the new annual requirement, and 70% of seniors will continue to purchase a trout/salmon permit, staff estimate the generation of about \$300,000 in additional annual revenues by the fifth year that the change is in place.

Similar to § 63.20(d)(3), a person who purchases a senior resident lifetime license and fishes in Lake Erie or

its tributaries is only required to purchase one special permit which is valid for the licensee's lifetime under section 2907.2(c) of the code (relating to Lake Erie fishing permits). However, requiring those anglers to annually purchase a special permit to fish in Lake Erie and its tributaries will require an act of the General Assembly.

The Commission also noted the need for a number of housekeeping changes to § 63.20. In § 63.20(b), eliminating the list of licenses to which the requirement applies makes it clear that any license holder must possess a trout/salmon permit or a combination trout/salmon permit and Lake Erie permit to fish for trout. While section 2907.2(c) of the code already requires all anglers to have a special permit to fish in Lake Erie and its tributaries or a combination trout/salmon permit and Lake Erie permit to fish in those parts of the Lake Erie watershed, adding the combination trout/salmon permit and Lake Erie permit makes it clear that the license holder shall have a valid permit to fish for trout in other parts of the Lake Erie watershed (for example, lakes stocked with trout). Since license holders no longer need to affix a stamp to their licenses, that requirement in § 63.20(b) should be deleted. In addition, because the Commission no longer issues trout stamps, § 63.20(c) is no longer necessary and should be deleted.

The Commission proposes to amend §§ 63.2 and 63.20 to read as set forth in Annex A.

F. Paperwork

The proposed rulemaking will not increase paperwork and will not create new paperwork requirements.

G. Fiscal Impact

The proposed amendment to § 63.2 will not have adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The proposed amendment to § 63.2 will not impose new costs on the private sector or the general public because the license button is purely voluntary.

The proposed amendments to § 63.20 will not have adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The proposed amendments to § 63.20 will not impose new costs on the private sector or the general public except that future purchasers of a senior resident lifetime fishing license will be required to purchase a trout/salmon permit annually. The fee for a trout/salmon permit is set at \$8 by section 2715(a.1)(1) of the code (relating to license, permit and issuing agent fees).

CHAPTER 63. GENERAL FISHING REGULATIONS

§ 63.2. Display of fishing license and verification of license purchase.

* * * * *

(b) *Display on [outergarment] an outer garment.*

It is unlawful for a person required by Chapter 27 of the code (relating to fishing licenses) to purchase a fishing license to fish in the waters of this Commonwealth or in boundary waters unless the person displays the license certificate, **a license button or other device approved by the Executive Director** on a hat or outer garment while fishing. A warning will be issued for a first violation of this section if the person has a valid fishing license in his possession and about his person and shows it upon request. An institutional license issued under section 2708 of the code (relating to institutional licenses) may be displayed or maintained by the person fishing or by the person attending the person who is fishing. **If a license button or other device is displayed instead of the license certificate, the person shall carry the license certificate about his person.**

* * * * *

§ 63.20. Permits for the protection and management of trout and salmon.

* * * * *

(b) *Permit required.* It is unlawful for a person required by Chapter 27 of the code (relating to fishing licenses) to procure a [**resident**] fishing license[, a **nonresident fishing license, a senior resident lifetime fishing license or an annual senior resident fishing license,**] to fish for trout or salmon unless that person has first procured a valid trout/salmon permit [**and affixed it to his fishing license**] or a combination trout/salmon permit and Lake Erie permit.

[(c) *Form.* Trout/salmon permits issued under this section shall be in the form of a stamp which shall be affixed to the person's fishing license and signed over the face of the stamp. The stamp shall bear a design as may be approved by the Commission together with the year for which it is valid.

(d)] (c) *Exceptions.*

* * * * *

(3) A person who purchased a senior resident lifetime fishing license **and a trout/salmon permit or a combination trout/salmon permit and Lake Erie permit** prior to January 1, [1991] 2015, shall be exempt from the requirements of this section. [**A person who purchases a senior resident lifetime fishing license after January 1, 1991, who desires to fish for trout or salmon shall be required to purchase one valid trout/salmon permit and affix it to his fishing license and shall be exempt from the requirements of this section for second and subsequent years.**]

[(e)] (d) *Fish for trout or salmon.* A person fishes for trout or salmon when one of the following applies:

On January 9, 2014, the Commission entered an Order at Docket No. C-2012-2307244 disposing of a joint petition filed by the Commission's Bureau of Investigation and Enforcement (I&E) and West Penn Power Company (West Penn) on February 13, 2013. The petition sought approval of a settlement entered into by I&E and West Penn to resolve an investigation undertaken by I&E relating to a fatal accident that occurred in June 2009 when West Penn's electric distribution line fell onto a tree. A woman residing on the affected property located in Westmoreland County was killed when she came into contact with the line.

As part of the non-monetary remedies in the West Penn Order, the Commission approved provisions that required West Penn to, among other things, (1) modify its training program to ensure that its linemen and line supervisors are properly trained in automatic splice installations, including preparation of the conductor, and that refresher

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CH. 57]

Class A Wild Trout Streams

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) amends § 57.8a (relating to Class A wild trout streams). The Commission publishes this statement of policy under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to Fish and Boat Code) (code).

A. *Effective Date*

The amendments to § 57.8a will go into effect upon final-form publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. *Contact Person*

C. *Statutory Authority*

The amendments to § 57.8a are published under the statutory authority of section 321 of the code (relating to administration and enforcement) that provides that the Commission shall administer and enforce the code and other laws of the Commonwealth regarding the protection, propagation and distribution of fish.

D. *Purpose and Background*

In October 2009, the Commission approved the Strategic Plan for Management of Trout Fisheries in Pennsylvania 2010-2014 (plan). The plan was developed based on input provided by a work group that consisted of Commission staff, anglers affiliated with a variety of sportsmen's organizations and independent trout anglers that are not affiliated with an organized group. This plan has guided the direction of trout management for the Commission since that time.

The plan identifies opportunities for improvement of trout management in this Commonwealth, issues that affect the improvements and strategies for addressing those issues. One of the key issues addressed in the plan is the protection of Class A wild trout waters. Issue 2 of the plan states "There are a number of streams that may hold Class A biomass trout populations that have not been officially designated as Class A streams by the [Commission]. This leads to inadequate water quality protection for these waters and inconsistent application of fisheries management strategies." The identified strategy to address this specific issue is "By 2014, sample waters identified by [Commission] staff as likely to support a Class A wild trout biomass and designate appropriately." These evaluations have been ongoing. It should be noted that this issue is separate from the identification of unassessed Class A waters, which the Commission has been addressing since adoption of the plan. The waters to which Issue 2 of the plan applies are waters for which historical data is present but which have not been officially designated as Class A.

A work group, comprised of several Commissioners and Commission staff, was formed to gather background

information related to the Class A issue. Using this information, the Commission identified several changes to the current policy that should be made so that Class A waters can be properly identified and protected.

E. *Summary of Revisions*

One change to § 57.8a addresses the criteria that must be met to designate a stream section with a mixed wild brown trout/rainbow trout or wild brook trout/rainbow trout population as a Class A water. These populations are not addressed in the current policy.

Another change addresses the criteria for removing a water from the Class A list. With the change, removal of a water from Class A status will be limited to those waters in which some environmental or human induced physical change has occurred that is highly unlikely to be reversible and thus renders the stream incapable of sustaining a Class A trout population.

The Commission adopts these changes to § 57.8a as set forth in proposed statement of policy published at 43 Pa.B. 5469 (September 14, 2013).

F. *Paperwork*

This final-form statement of policy will not increase paperwork and will not create new paperwork requirements.

G. *Fiscal Impact*

This final-form statement of policy will not have an adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. This final-form statement of policy will not impose new costs on the private sector or the general public.

H. *Public Involvement*

Although not required to publish a proposed statement of policy to adopt revisions to a statement of policy, the Commission published the proposed amendments at 43 Pa.B. 5469 and sought public comments because of the heightened public interest in this issue. The Commission did not receive public comments concerning the proposed statement of policy.

Finding

The Commission finds that the adoption of the amendments to § 57.8a is necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing statutes.

Order

The Commission, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

(a) The statements of policy of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapter 57, are amended by amending § 57.8a to read as set forth at 43 Pa.B. 5469.

(b) The Executive Director shall certify this order and 43 Pa.B. 5469 and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(c) This order shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

5. Each wet centrifugal collector shall be equipped with instrumentation to continuously monitor the water pressure and flow rate to each collector. An alarm shall be activated when the flow rate is below the required rate.

6. The water feed rate to each wet centrifugal collector associated with the vertical coolers shall not be less than 12 gallons per minute at any time.

7. The vertical coolers shall be equipped with interlocks to prevent the operation of said coolers without the simultaneous operations of the respective wet centrifugal collector.

8. The air contaminant emissions from each vertical cooler shall be controlled by an independent wet centrifugal collector at all times each cooler is operational.

The facility's potential emissions are calculated to be 0.40 tpy NO_x, 0.60 tpy CO, 0.01 tpy SO_x, 0.25 tpy VOC, and 0.50 tpy PM. The facility is required to perform weekly visual inspections of the site. The facility must maintain records of the temperature of the sand bath and afterburner every two hours during operation and amount of fuel used on a monthly basis. The afterburner is limited to 0.04 gr/dscf PM. The proposed authorization is subject to State and Federal Regulations. The permit includes additional operational requirements, monitoring requirements, and recordkeeping requirements.

Copies of the application, DEP's analysis and other documents used in the evaluation of the application are available for public review during normal business hours at the Department's Southwest Regional Office, 400 Waterfront Drive, Pittsburgh, PA 15222. All requests for a public hearing, and all protests to a proposed action, shall be filed with the Department within 30 days of the date that notice of the proposed action was published under 25 Pa. Code § 127.424. A protest must include the name, address and telephone number of the person filing the protest, identification of the proposed permit issuance being opposed (Operating Permit 63-00895) and a concise statement of the objections to the permit issuance and the relevant facts upon which the objections are based.

A public hearing may be held in accordance with 25 Pa. Code § 127.429, if the Department, in its discretion, decides that such a hearing is warranted based on the information received. If a public hearing is held, all persons who have properly filed a protest under 25 Pa. Code § 127.426 may appear and give testimony. The applicant, the protestant and other participants will be notified of the decision to hold a hearing (and the time, place and purpose of such hearing) by publication in the

newspaper or by the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, or by telephone, where the Department determines such notification by telephone is sufficient.

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department), under the authority of the Hazardous Sites Cleanup Act (HSCA) (35 P. S. §§ 6020.102—6020.1303), is proposing an interim response action at the Churchville TCE Site, Upper Southampton and Northampton Townships, Bucks County, Pennsylvania.

The Churchville TCE Site is located near the intersection of Bustleton Pike, Churchville Lane and Bristol Road on the border of Upper Southampton and Northampton Townships. The Department sampled forty private residential wells between May 2011 and December 2013. To date, this sampling revealed that five residences have Tetrachloroethylene (PCE) and/or Trichloroethylene (TCE) in their private drinking water supply above their respective Safe Drinking Water Act Maximum Contaminant Levels.

To address the release and threat of release of hazardous substances at the Site and corresponding threats to human health and the environment, the Department proposes to implement a response action at the Site under Section 501(a) of HSCA, 35 P. S. § 6020.501(a). The Department hereby proposes the installation of a waterline, including the water mains and the lateral connections to the public water supply. This proposed alternative complies with Applicable, Relevant and Appropriate Requirements (ARARs) and is feasible and cost-effective. Other possible alternatives include no action or the installation and continued monitoring and maintenance of whole-house carbon filtration units and/or supplying bottled water. All alternatives with the exception of the no action alternative include groundwater use restrictions.

This notice is being provided pursuant to Section 506(b) of HSCA, 35 P. S. § 6020.506(b). The administrative record which contains the information that forms the

basis and documents the selection of this response action is available for public review and comment. Clean Air Interstate Rule; 2014 Allocation of 2013 Vintage Nitrogen Oxides Allowances Set Aside to Offset Sulfur Dioxide Emissions

In accordance with 25 Pa. Code § 145.212(f)(2) (relating to CAIR NO_x allowance allocations), the Department of

Environmental Protection (Department) is providing notice of the issuance of 2013 vintage Clean Air Interstate Rule (CAIR) nitrogen oxides (NO_x) allowances to owners or operators of certain CAIR sulfur dioxide (SO₂) units for the purpose of offsetting SO₂ emissions. These units were exempted under the Federal Acid Rain Program provisions in section 405(g)(6)(A) of the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C.A. § 7651(g)(6)(A)) and therefore did not receive SO₂ allowances, yet are subject to the CAIR SO₂ Trading Program. The Department allocated the CAIR NO_x allowances identified in this notice on a ratio of 1 CAIR NO_x allowance to every 8 tons of SO₂ emitted in 2013 in response to written requests submitted to the Department by January 31, 2014. Up to 1.3% of the Commonwealth's CAIR NO_x Annual Trading Program budget is available for allocation to these units, as described in 25 Pa. Code § 145.212(f)(2) and (4).

The Commonwealth's CAIR NO_x Annual Trading Program budget contained 99,049 CAIR NO_x allowances for 2013; 97,761 of the CAIR NO_x allowances were allocated at 40 Pa.B. 297 (January 9, 2010). The remaining 1,288 CAIR NO_x allowances, 1.3% of the CAIR NO_x Annual Trading Program budget for 2013, were set aside for this allocation. Six requests were dated prior to the January 31, 2014, deadline for additional CAIR NO_x allowances.

The Department is allocating these allowances on a ratio of 1 CAIR NO_x allowance to every 8 tons of SO₂ emitted by the unit in 2013, minus any excess CAIR NO_x allowances already allocated to the unit for the 2013 control period that were not used to cover NO_x emissions for the 2013 control period. The result is an allocation of 988 CAIR NO_x allowances.

Sexual Assault Victim Emergency Services Regulation; Listing of Hospitals that may not Provide Emergency Contraception and Hospitals that may not Provide any Sexual Assault Emergency Services

The Department of Health (Department) published final-form sexual assault victim emergency services regulations at 38 Pa.B. 573 (January 26, 2008). The sexual assault victim emergency services regulations became effective on January 26, 2008, and amended 28 Pa. Code Part IV, Subpart B (relating to general and special hospitals) to add specific requirements for hospitals relating to the provision of sexual assault emergency services. See 28 Pa. Code §§ 117.51—117.58 (relating to sexual assault victim emergency services).

Hospitals that decide they may not provide emergency contraception due to a stated religious or moral belief contrary to providing this medication are required to give notice to the Department of the decision. See 28 Pa. Code § 117.57 (relating to religious and moral exemptions). Hospitals that refer all emergency patients to other hospitals after institution of essential life-saving measures and decide not to provide any sexual assault emergency services are required to give notice to the Department of the decision. See 28 Pa. Code § 117.58 (relating to exemption for hospitals providing limited emergency services).

Sections 117.57(1)(ii) and 117.58(1)(ii) of 28 Pa. Code state that the Department will annually publish the lists of hospitals in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* that have chosen not to provide emergency contraception under 28 Pa. Code § 117.57 or any sexual assault emergency services under 28 Pa. Code § 117.58. The following lists are published in accordance with those provisions and do not create any new obligations for hospitals or relieve hospitals of any existing obligations.

Regulation No. 3-51 (#3021)*

On September 10, 2013, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this proposed regulation from the Department of Banking and Securities (Department). This rulemaking adds Chapter 5 to 10 Pa. Code. The proposed regulation was published in the September 14, 2013 *Pennsylvania Bulletin* with a 30-day public comment period. The final-form regulation was submitted to the Commission on January 8, 2014.

This final-form rulemaking establishes an assessment schedule for the Commonwealth's state-chartered institutions. Section 5.5(a) of the rulemaking sets forth criteria for the adjustment of assessments based upon an optional adjustment for inflation. We find that this section of the rulemaking is not in the public interest. We believe the inflation adjustment would be difficult to implement because the mechanism for determining what the adjustment should be is unclear. 71 P.S. § 745.5b(3).

As explained by the Department at the Commission's meeting, if the Department determines that an adjustment is needed, it will be based on the June Consumer Price Index indicated by the "Consumer Price Index—All Urban Consumers: U.S. All Items 1982-1984 = 100" (CPI) published by the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, or other similar index published by the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics of the prior year. The Department will determine the rate of adjustment by calculating the percentage change of the immediate prior June CPI to the

June CPI issued twelve months prior. This percentage increase will be applied to the next two semi-annual assessments. While this method of implementing the inflation adjustment may be appropriate, Section 5.5(a) does not clearly set forth that this is the methodology that will be used in implementing the CPI. Therefore, we suggest that the methodology be clarified in the regulation. This will ensure a more stable and predictable regulatory environment as the assessment schedule and the inflation adjustment is implemented in the future.

We have determined that this regulation is consistent with the statutory authority of the Department (71 P. S.

§ 733-202.C) and the intention of the General Assembly. However, after considering all of the other criteria of the Regulatory Review Act discussed above, we find promulgation of this regulation is not in the public interest.

By Order of the Commission:

This regulation is disapproved.

Affordable Care Act; Guidance for Compliance Submissions; Notice 2014-04

The Affordable Care Act—that is, Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (Pub. L. No. 111-148) and the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010 (Pub. L. No. 111-152), collectively and as amended—along with regulations and subregulatory guidance issued pursuant thereto (collectively, the ACA), sets forth market reform requirements for plan years beginning on or after January 1, 2015, for, inter alia, individual and small group health insurance policies that provide “major medical” coverage, which is comprehensive health coverage, including PPO and HMO coverage. The ACA also sets forth requirements for a plan to be a qualified health plan (QHP), so that the plan may be certified for offering on an exchange. Finally, the ACA contains several provisions that will impact rate development.

The Insurance Department (Department) provides the following guidance to insurance entities seeking to demonstrate compliance with the ACA relative to new or modified policy forms offered, issued or renewed in this Commonwealth. This guidance applies to new policy forms, as well as to policy forms for which an insurance entity (insurer) is not seeking to make any changes other than as necessary to make the policy form comply with the ACA. Further, it applies to any plan an insurer anticipates may be certified as a QHP.

If an insurer is required under the act of December 22, 2011 (P. L. 614, No. 134) to file a policy form or policy form modification with the Department for prior approval, it should file the form in SERFF and is requested to submit a “Compliance Checklist and Certification” as described as follows to assist the Department in its review. If an insurer is intending to use after January 1, 2015, a form not required to be filed, that is, a “product” as contemplated by the ACA, the Department requests that the form be submitted in SERFF in conjunction with any rate filing. For any form not required to be filed, the Commonwealth will accept as evidence of satisfying the ACA market reform requirements a “Compliance Checklist and Certification,” with the Market Reform portion of the Compliance Checklist filled out and the Certification executed by an authorized representative of the insurer. In each case, it is suggested that the Compliance Checklist and Certification be substantially identical to the “Compliance Checklist and Certification” as Attachment A. Attachment A is also available on the Department’s web site at www.insurance.pa.gov. File a form with each policy form or policy form modification being submitted.

If an insurer is anticipating that any form/product along with its associated plans may be certified as a QHP and offered on an exchange, the Commonwealth will accept as evidence of satisfying the ACA QHP requirements a Compliance Checklist and Certification, with both the Market Reform and the QHP portions of the Compliance Checklist filled out and the Certification executed by an authorized representative of the insurer,

where the Compliance Checklist and Certification is substantially identical to the “Compliance Checklist and Certification” following as Attachment A. Attachment A is also available on the Department’s web site. File a Compliance Checklist and Certification with each form/product and its associated plans being submitted. In addition to any Federally-facilitated exchange filing requirement (that is, HIOS), also include the QHP Application Templates in the SERFF filing, as instructed in SERFF.

Further, with respect to the ACA rating requirements, including those amending the Public Health Service Act (PHSA) (42 U.S.C.A. §§ 201—300mm-61) and as further explained in Federal regulations, the Department requests that an actuarial memorandum be submitted as part of a rate filing for a product or plan subject to the ACA. In that actuarial memorandum, submitters are requested to:

- State the anticipated loss ratio (see ACA § 1001, PHSA § 2718, noting also compliance with 31 Pa. Code § 89.83(b) (relating to rates)).
- State the actuarial level of coverage (see ACA § 1302(d)).
- State the insurer’s intention regarding whether the product or plan will be offered on or off the Federal Marketplace.
- Specify compliance with the rating requirements in the ACA, that is, use of no rating factors other than: (i) age (premium band ratio not exceeding 3:1 and Federally approved standard age curve); (ii) tobacco use (premium band ratio not exceeding 1.5:1); (iii) family size (as specified in Federal regulation); and (iv) geography (State rating regions as Federally approved, listed in Attachment B and also shown in map form on the Department’s web site) (see ACA § 1201, PHSA § 2701).
- Specify compliance with the single risk pool per market (individual or small group) requirement (see ACA § 1312).

Additional information may be found in the general instructions in SERFF.

Finally, while certain forms and rates referenced in this notice are subject to review and approval by the Department prior to use, the Department reminds filing entities that those forms and rates (and all forms and rates used in this Commonwealth) remain subject to, and must comply in all respects with, the Commonwealth’s insurance laws and regulations and the Department retains its ability to take after-use enforcement action and seek any available remedy for noncompliant forms or rates. An insurer will be responsible for assuring that all of its insureds are provided the full benefits provided by the ACA.
