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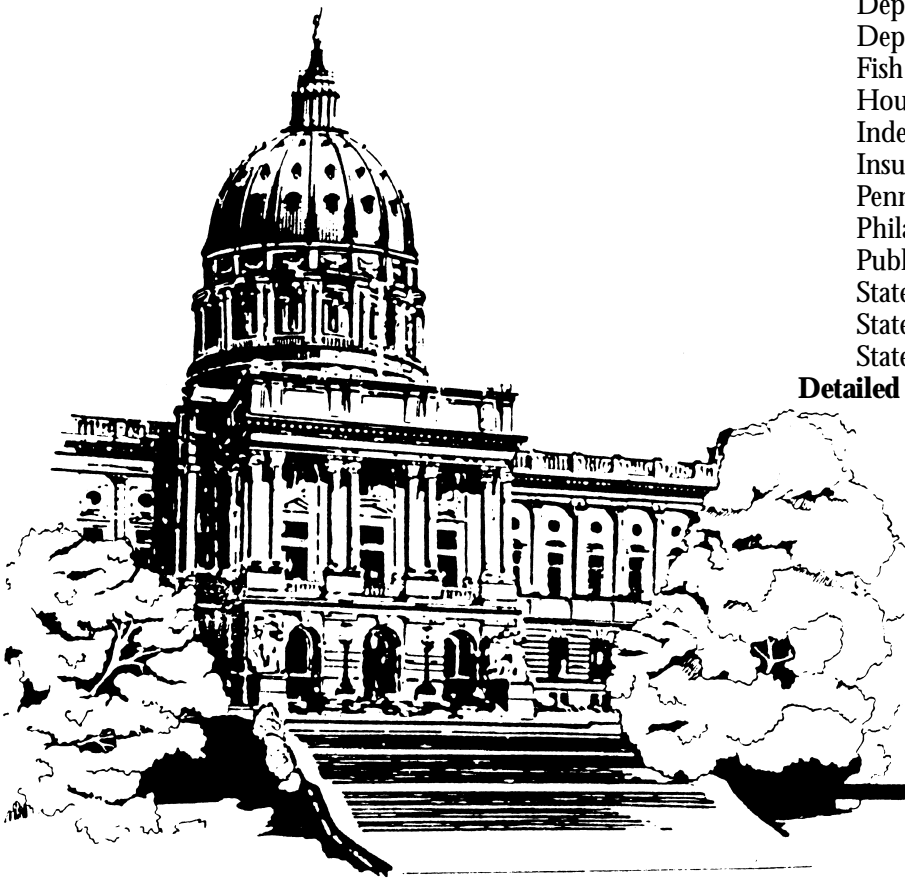

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READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

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Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where “no fiscal impact” is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Effective Dates of Statutes

The effective dates specified above for laws and appropriation acts were contained in the applicable law or appropriation act. Where no date is specified or where the effective date specified is prior to the date of enactment, the effective date is 60 days after final enactment except for statutes making appropriations or affecting budgets of political subdivisions. See 1 Pa.C.S. §§ 1701—1704 (relating to effective dates of statutes).

Advance Copies of Statutes

Section 1106 of Title 1 of the *Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes* provides that the prothonotaries of each county shall file advance copies of statutes in their offices for public inspection until the Laws of Pennsylvania are generally available. Section 2406(h) of The Administrative Code of 1929 provides that the Department of General Services shall distribute advance sheets of the Laws of Pennsylvania to each law judge of the courts, to every county and public library of this Commonwealth and to each member of the General Assembly. These copies shall be furnished without charge. The Department shall also mail one copy of each law enacted during any legislative session to any person who pays to it the sum of \$20.

Telecommunications Carriers

The Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (Commission) on November 30, 2001, adopted a final order which streamlines certain financial reporting requirements for both competitive local exchange carriers (CLECs) and local exchange carriers (ILECs), while still providing the Commission with necessary information needed to effectively monitor the telecommunications industry in this Commonwealth.

Executive Summary

In September 2000, the Commission established a collaborative consisting of all interested telecommunications carriers, Commission staff and other interested parties (Collaborative) to determine what, if any, modifications should be adopted to the Commission's accounting procedures and financial reporting requirements in response to the opening of the local and toll telecommunications markets to competition. In particular, the Collaborative was charged with resolving a number of important issues, including whether CLECs should be held to the same financial reporting requirements as incumbent ILECs, what reports should be treated as proprietary and whether CLECs should be required to maintain separate accounting systems for their various operations.

At the conclusion of its deliberative process, the Collaborative filed a final report detailing its findings and recommendations. The recommendations significantly streamline the reporting requirements for both CLECs and ILECs; however, several of the recommendations require changes in the Commission's regulations.

Specifically, these final-form regulations redefine the classes of telephone utilities in § 63.31 (relating to classification of public utilities) based on whether a carrier is an incumbent or new entrant, and, if an incumbent, whether the utility is subject to an alternative form of regulation or some type of rate based, rate-of-return regulation. The current class definitions are based solely on access lines or minimal operating revenues, or both, which results in CLECs and ILECs filing the same reports even though the Commission's informational needs for these two types of carriers are completely

different. These final-form regulations also amend § 63.32 (relating to systems of accounts) to recognize that CLECs not required by the Federal Communications Commission to conform to the Uniform System of Accounts must inform the Commission of this fact in their annual reports and state what method of accounting is being utilized. Finally, these final-form regulations clarify that the quarterly or annual rate-of-return financial reports required under § 71.3 (relating to filing requirements) only apply to ILECs and that the quarterly reports for the larger ILECs are reduced to a semi-annual basis.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on August 21, 2001, 2002, the Commission submitted a copy of the notice of proposed rulemaking published at 31 Pa.B. 5110 (September 8, 2001), to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the House and Senate Committees for review and comment.

Under section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC and the Committees were provided with copies of the comments received during the public comment period, as well as other documents when requested. In preparing this final-form rulemaking, the Commission has considered the comments received from IRRC, the Committees and the public.

Under section 5.1(d) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(d)), on February 13, 2002, this final-form rulemaking was deemed approved by the House and Senate Committees. Under section 5.1(e) of the Regulatory Review Act, IRRC met on February 21, 2002, and approved the final-form rulemaking.

Order

By the Commission:

On June 28, 2001, this Commission entered an order proposing to amend its regulations relating to financial reporting requirements for telecommunications providers. These proposed amendments to existing regulations will facilitate adoption of the various recommendations to streamline certain financial reporting requirements previously contained in the final report of the Collaborative, which was created by this Commission at M-00001374.

The June 28, 2001, order was published at 31 Pa.B. 5110. Comments were thereafter received from only three entities: the Office of Consumer Advocate (OCA), AT&T Communications of Pennsylvania, Inc. (AT&T) and IRRC. This final-form rulemaking order discusses the comments received and sets forth, in Annex A and 31 Pa.B. 5110, final amendments to the Commission's regulations necessary to adopt the recommendations contained in the Collaborative's final report filed March 15, 2001, with this Commission at M-00001374.

Discussion

None of the comments filed address concerns or disagreements with any of the proposed amendments to the existing regulations.¹ Instead, the focus of the comments filed by the OCA and IRRC address more general concerns relating to how the Commission will treat financial reporting information that is designated "confidential" or "proprietary" in the future.

The OCA's primary concern is that the recommendation made by the Collaborative and adopted by the Commission in its June 28, 2001, order, relating to the preliminary designation of certain schedules or parts thereof as proprietary, will "virtually eliminate all useful ILEC [(incumbent local exchange carrier)] information from the public view." OCA Comments filed October 9, 2001 (OCA Comments), at 2. This is the same concern that the OCA expressed in its minority report filed with the Collaborative's March 15, 2001, final report and rejected by the Commission when it adopted the Collaborative's recommendations in total. For the reasons expressed in this preamble and in the final report, we do not agree with the OCA that the preliminary designations of proprietary treatment for certain schedules, or parts thereof, will have the type of negative impact suggested in the OCA's comments. We believe, instead, that the preliminary proprietary designations represent an appropriate and reasonable balancing of competing interests between disclosure and nondisclosure in an evolving competitive environment.

IRRC's concern, on the other hand, relates solely to the vehicle used by the Commission to effectuate a change in how certain information designated as "proprietary" will be handled in the future. IRRC asserts that the change contemplated by the Commission should be implemented through the formal rulemaking process and not as a change to its internal operating procedures.

Specifically, IRRC's position is that to allow a utility to designate preliminarily certain financial information as proprietary without filing a petition for protective order is in conflict with § 71.9. Section 71.9 provides that "financial reports are public documents" and that "[i]f a public utility requests proprietary treatment for information in the report," the utility must "file a petition for protective order."

After carefully reviewing IRRC's comments in regard to this issue, we conclude that no change to § 71.9 is required at this time. The change that was implemented by the Commission in its operating procedures does not affect the underlying principle that these financial reports are public documents or that a petition for protective order must be filed if there is a challenge to any "proprietary" designation made by a utility.²

The reality of the marketplace today in an increasingly deregulated environment is that disclosure of certain financial information may indeed cause unfair economic or competitive damage. Under current practice, telecommunications carriers have routinely designated various schedules or parts thereof of their annual financial reports as proprietary to protect themselves from damag-

ing disclosures. The fact that they are entitled to do so notwithstanding the designation of the reports as "public documents" in § 71.9 is beyond question. Section 5.423 (relating to orders to limit availability of proprietary information) spells out the specific procedures that must be followed if a utility wants to designate certain information as proprietary that otherwise would be made part of the "public record."

Indeed, § 5.423(b)(4) clearly supports the type of process the Commission has set up herein, whereby a utility does not file a petition for protective order until there is a specific challenge to a proprietary designation. Under that subsection, the party claiming the privilege must only file a petition for protective order "within 14 days of the date the request for information was received." As the General Instructions to the new Annual Reports at page 2 clearly provide, the preliminary classifications "as to what may be proprietary are not final or binding on the Commission or any party wishing to challenge these [proprietary] designations nor are they binding on any party seeking to have additional schedules, or parts thereof, declared proprietary." (Emphasis added.) These same General Instructions also instruct the company on when it has to file a petition for protective order under § 5.423 to preserve its proprietary designation. We, therefore, believe that the procedures utilized for designating certain financial information as proprietary are consistent with the terms of § 71.9 and no amendment to this section is necessary.

In discussing whether allowing certain financial information to be designated "proprietary" runs counter to the current regulation's declaration that the financial reports are "public documents," IRRC also points out an apparent typographical error in the text of § 71.9 which cites to "§ 5.43 (relating to petitions for issuance, amendment, waiver or repeal of regulations)." IRRC suggests that the proper cite should have been to § 5.423 (relating to orders to limit availability of proprietary information) and not to § 5.43.

In researching this issue back to when Chapter 71 (relating to financial reports) was originally proposed in the early 1990s, we find that the advance notice of proposed rulemaking Re: Public Utility Earnings, Docket No. L-00910061 entered September 24, 1991, did cite to § 5.423, and not to § 5.43. The cite to § 5.423, however, was later changed, inadvertently it appears, in the proposed rulemaking order at the same docket entered March 3, 1992, and was not discovered by anyone until now. We agree with IRRC that the appropriate cite in § 71.9 should be to § 5.423. Section 5.43 relates to petitions filed with the Commission to change a regulation; it has nothing to do with petitions seeking proprietary treatment. After consulting with the Legislative Reference Bureau regarding the proper way to handle this issue, we are amending § 71.9 as set forth in Annex A to make this technical correction to the citation found in that section.

Finally, the OCA also suggests that the Commission should have taken this opportunity to develop information to help consumers better understand which companies offer service in their area and what those services may be. OCA Comments at 7-9. The OCA contends that with this type of information, it could provide consumers with a shopping guide listing the companies that provide services in each incumbent's territory and how to contact these companies. While we agree that the provision of the information would be beneficial to consumers, this rulemaking proceeding dealing with financial reporting re-

¹Indeed, AT&T's comments consist of a one-page letter in lieu of comments stating its support of the adoption of the new rules. In addition, AT&T urges the Commission to continue to monitor the condition of the Pennsylvania marketplace and to be prepared to take further steps to ensure that the remaining reporting requirements do not act as a barrier to entry in Pennsylvania.

²We must emphasize that the only modification made to the proprietary designation process is to the timing of when the petition for protective order has to be filed with the Commission. If the petition was required to be filed at the same time the annual report has to be filed with the Commission, we could fairly expect the Commission to be inundated with repetitive petitions to protect the confidentiality of the requested information.

quirements of telecommunications carriers is not the proper vehicle for addressing this issue.³

Conclusion

Accordingly, under sections 501 and 1501 of the Public Utility Code, 66 Pa. C.S. §§ 501 and 1501; sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202), and the regulations promulgated thereunder in 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1, 7.2 and 7.5; section 204(b) of the Commonwealth Attorneys Act (71 P. S. § 732.204(b)); section 5 of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5) and section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232), and the regulations promulgated thereunder in 4 Pa. Code §§ 7.251—7.235, we find that the regulations in §§ 63.31—63.33, 71.3 and 71.9 should be amended as set forth in Annex A; therefore,

It Is Ordered that:

1. The regulations of the Commission, 52 Pa. Code Chapters 63 and 71, are amended by amending §§ 63.31—63.33 and 71.3 to read as set forth at 31 Pa.B. 5110; and by amending § 71.9 to read as set forth in Annex A.

2. The Secretary shall certify this order, 31 Pa.B. 5110 and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

3. The Secretary shall submit this order, 31 Pa.B. 5110 and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General for approval as to legality.

4. The Secretary shall submit this order, 31 Pa.B. 5110 and Annex A to the Governor's Budget Office for review of fiscal impact.

5. The Secretary shall submit this order, 31 Pa.B. 5110 and Annex A for review by the designated standing committees of both houses of the General Assembly, and for review and approval by the IRRC.

6. A copy of this order, 31 Pa.B. 5110 and Annex A shall be served upon the Pennsylvania Telephone Association, the Telecommunications Resellers Association, all jurisdictional telecommunication utilities, the Office of Trial Staff, the OCA and the Small Business Advocate.

7. The final-form regulations embodied at 31 Pa.B. 5110 and in Annex A shall become effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

§ 71.9. Financial reports as public documents.

The financial reports are public documents. The reports will be maintained by the Secretary and will be available

for public inspection. If a public utility requests proprietary treatment for information in the report, it shall be incumbent upon that utility to file a petition for protective order under § 5.423 (relating to orders to limit availability of proprietary information).

Title 58—RECREATION

FISH AND BOAT COMMISSION

[58 PA. CODE CHS. 71 AND 73]

Propagation of Fish

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) by this order amends Chapters 71 and 73 (relating to propagation and introduction of fish into Commonwealth waters; and transportation of live fish into this Commonwealth). The Commission is publishing these amendments under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code). The amendments relate to fishing.

A. Effective Date

The amendments will go into effect upon publication of an order adopting the amendments in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. Contact Person

C. Statutory Authority

The amendments to §§ 71.1 and 73.2 (relating to general; and authorized list) are published under the statutory authority of section 2102 of the code (relating to rules and regulations). The amendments to §§ 71.2 and 71.3 (relating to fish species approved for artificial propagation and introduction; and closed system propagation) are published under the statutory authority of section 2102 of the code and 3 Pa.C.S. § 4219 (relating to permissible propagation). The amendment to § 71.7 (relating to triploid grass carp) is published under the statutory authority of section 2102 and section 2904 of the code (relating to permits for protection and management of particular fish).

D. Purpose and Background

The amendments are designed to update, modify and improve the Commission's regulations pertaining to fishing. The specific purpose of the amendments is described in more detail under the summary of changes.

E. Summary of Changes

On October 16, 1998, the General Assembly amended the Commonwealth's agriculture laws to designate aquaculture as a normal farming activity. This amendment transferred most administrative functions related to commercial artificial propagation from the Commission to the Department of Agriculture (Department). On December 16, 1998, the Department began registering commercial propagators of fish and dealers in live aquatic animals. The Commission no longer issues artificial propagation licenses, live fish, fishbait and baitfish dealer licenses and resident and nonresident fish transportation

licenses. Accordingly, Commission's regulations pertaining to the issuance of these licenses should be removed.

In addition, 3 Pa.C.S. § 4219 provides that the Commission will determine which species of fish are allowed to be propagated in each watershed and will provide the Department with the list. This section also provides that special regulations shall be promulgated regarding closed system propagation. Therefore, the Commission proposed amendments addressing those issues.

A notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 31 Pa.B. 3412 (June 30, 2001). The Commission did not receive any written public comments regarding the proposed rulemaking. However, the Department's Aquaculture Advisory Committee (Committee) discussed the proposed rulemaking on several occasions, and members of the Committee recommended changes to the proposed amendments relating to closed system propagation. Based upon the Committee's recommendations, the Commission has adopted the amendments as set forth in the notice of proposed rulemaking with the changes to § 71.3 to read as set forth in Annex A.

F. Paperwork

The amendments will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements.

G. Fiscal Impact

The amendments will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The amendments will impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public.

H. Public Involvement

A notice of proposed rulemaking was published at 31 Pa.B. 3412. The Commission subsequently published a notice at 31 Pa.B. 6287 (November 17, 2001), advising the public that staff would be recommending that the Commission consider additional changes to § 71.3. The notice also extended the public comment period until January 15, 2002. In addition, the Commission mailed a copy of the notice and the additional changes to all registered aquaculture producers and live aquatic animal dealers. The Commission did not receive any public comments concerning the proposal.

Findings

The Commission finds that:

(1) Public notice of intention to adopt the amendments adopted by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) A public comment period was provided, and no comments were received.

(3) The adoption of the amendments of the Commission in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for administration and enforcement of the authorizing statutes.

Order

The Commission, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Commission, 58 Pa. Code Chapters 71 and 73, are amended by amending §§ 71.1, 71.2, 71.7 and 73.2 to read as set forth at 31 Pa.B. 3412 and § 71.3 to read as set forth in Annex A.

(b) The Executive Director will submit this order, 31 Pa.B. 3412 and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General for approval as to legality as required by law.

(c) The Executive Director shall certify this order, 31 Pa.B. 3412 and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) This order shall take effect immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

CHAPTER 71. PROPAGATION AND INTRODUCTION OF FISH INTO THE COMMONWEALTH WATERS

§ 71.3. Closed system propagation.

(a) *Closed (no discharge) system.* A propagating system may be designated as a closed system only if all of following criteria are met:

(1) There will be 100% recycling water as normal operations.

(2) Closed systems will be housed indoors in a structure enclosed by solid walls, floor and roof. For purposes of this subsection, a wall, floor or roof will be considered "solid" if it is constructed and maintained to prevent unauthorized human or animal intrusions into the closed system facility and to prevent release or escape of aquatic organisms from the closed system.

(3) Water can be added to the system only for making up evaporative loss, cleaning and fish harvesting or to reduce toxic ammonia/nitrates by diluting.

(4) The system does not discharge water into waters of this Commonwealth.

(5) No live fish or live fish eggs will be allowed to escape with water discharges. Accidental spillage of live fish or live fish eggs (including truck loading, and the like) will be contained within the facility in a manner that will prevent fish and fish eggs from escaping into the waters of this Commonwealth.

(6) The system operator is registered with the Department of Agriculture (Department). The Department will notify the Commission when it receives an application to register a proposed closed system, and the Commission may, within 30 days of receipt of the notice, inspect the system to ensure that it is designed and constructed in a manner to prevent escapement of live fish or live fish eggs into the waters of this Commonwealth. Closed systems registered under this subsection shall, in addition to an initial inspection, be subject to inspection at any time to ensure compliance with the requirements of this section and the Commission may issue an order to suspend operations of any closed system when an inspection discloses that it is not in compliance.

(7) The Commission will invite the Department's Aquaculture Advisory Committee or a subcommittee thereof to draft and periodically update construction guidelines for closed system propagators to help them ensure enclosed facilities prevent escape of aquatic organisms into the waters of this Commonwealth. These guide-

lines will assist registered propagators in the design, construction and maintenance of closed systems and will assist the Commission in inspecting these systems.

(b) *Systems with discharges rendered incapable of containing living organisms.* A system whose discharge of water is rendered incapable of containing self-perpetuating living organisms shall be registered with the Department. The Department will notify the Commission when it receives an application to register a proposed system under this subsection, and the Commission may, within 30 days of receipt of the notice, inspect the system to ensure that it is designed and constructed so that its discharge is rendered incapable of containing live fish or live fish eggs. Systems registered under this subsection shall, in addition to an initial inspection, be subject to inspection at any time to ensure compliance with this section and the Commission may issue an order to suspend operations of any system when an inspection discloses that it is not in compliance. The registration of this system may include any species of fish with the approval of the Department.

(c) *Escape of fish into waters of this Commonwealth.* It is unlawful for an operator of any system registered under subsection (a) or (b) to allow fish to escape into the waters of this Commonwealth.

(d) *Written plans for discharge.* An operator of any system registered under subsection (a) or (b) shall develop, maintain and make available for immediate inspection by the Commission and the Department upon request a written plan for containing or treating discharge in the event of a discharge system failure.

(e) *Satisfaction in event of discharge.* An operator of any system registered under subsection (a) or (b) shall notify both the Commission's Director of the Bureau of Fisheries and the Department's Aquaculture Coordinator immediately in the event of a discharge system failure that is likely to contain viable living organisms.

Seasons, Sizes and Creel Limits for Lake Erie

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapter 69 (relating to fishing in Lake Erie and boundary lakes). The Commission is publishing this amendment as a notice of proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code). The proposed amendment relates to fishing.

A. *Effective Date*

The proposed amendment, if approved on final-form rulemaking, will go into effect on January 1, 2003, or upon publication of an order adopting the amendment in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, whichever occurs later.

B. *Contact Person*

C. *Statutory Authority*

The proposed amendment to § 69.12 (relating to seasons, sizes and creel limits—Lake Erie) is published under the statutory authority of section 2102 of the code (relating to rules and regulations).

D. *Purpose and Background*

The proposed amendment is designed to update, modify and improve the Commission's regulations pertaining to fishing. The specific purpose of the proposed amendment is described in more detail under the summary of proposal.

E. *Summary of Proposal*

Current angling regulations, established in 1996, to conserve yellow perch in this Commonwealth's waters of Lake Erie and Presque Isle Bay, include a daily possession limit of 20 fish, an 8 inch minimum size limit and no closed season for sport fishing. On the open lake, these regulations were expected to: (1) constrain the harvest at or below the annual quota or Total Allowable Catch (TAC); and (2) reduce the harvest of small immature perch.

The same angling regulations were imposed upon the yellow perch fishery in Presque Isle Bay that has been subjected to very high fishing mortality especially during the ice fishery. The ice fishery had been responsible for the excessive over-fishing harvest prior to the implementation of the 8-inch minimum size limit and 20 perch per day possession limit.

The Commission's Lake Erie Research Unit is committed to continuing an intensive assessment of yellow perch to evaluate the yellow perch population, angler use and yellow perch harvest and to make any appropriate adjustments to the yellow perch regulations. On the open lake, strong yellow perch year classes and conservative regulations have resulted in increased population abundance at the highest levels since 1990, and yellow perch catch rates continue to increase. However, a sizeable proportion

of the open lake angler catch was released under the 8 inch minimum size limit, and mortality of these release fish was high because of hydraulic decompression. The Lake Erie Boat Angler Survey in the summer of 2001, demonstrated that the 20 yellow perch creel limit was constraining the yellow perch harvest within the Lake Erie Committee TAC. The Bay yellow perch population has also rebounded subsequent to the implementation of the regulations. However, because of the high minimum size limit relative to the relatively slow perch growth, the Bay creel rate has been low. The harvest of Bay caught yellow perch was only 7-19% of those caught during the years 1997-2001.

These intensive yellow perch assessments have shown that reducing the minimum size limit to 7 inches will continue to adequately protect yellow perch spawning stock under the condition of higher yellow perch population sizes. This should reduce complaints about catch and release mortality on the open lake and complaints about the low harvest rates on Presque Isle Bay. Commission staff expect harvest to increase by at least 30% by Presque Isle Bay anglers; however, on the open lake harvest, increases due to reducing the minimum size limit should be a little more than 15%.

Accordingly, the Commission proposes to amend § 69.12 to reduce the minimum size limit of yellow perch on Lake Erie and Presque Isle Bay from 8 inches to 7 inches. The daily creel limit of 20 and the no closed season will remain in effect.

F. *Paperwork*

The proposed amendment will not increase paperwork and will create no new paperwork requirements.

G. *Fiscal Impact*

The proposed amendment will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The proposed amendment will impose no new costs on the private sector or the general public.

Use Permits for Unpowered Boats; Fishing in the Susquehanna River and Its Tributaries; Special Fishing Regulations

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) proposes to amend Chapters 53, 61 and 65 (relating to Commission property; seasons, sizes and creel limits; and special fishing regulations). The Commission is publishing these amendments as a notice of proposed rulemaking under the authority of 30 Pa.C.S. (relating to the Fish and Boat Code) (code). The proposed amendments relate to Commission property and fishing.

A. Effective Date

The proposed amendments, if approved on final-form rulemaking, will go into effect upon publication of an order adopting the amendments in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The proposed amendment to § 61.7 (relating to Susquehanna River and tributaries) is published under the statutory authority of section 2102 of the code (relating to rules and regulations). The proposed amendment to § 65.24 (relating to miscellaneous special regulations) is published under the statutory authority of section 2307 of the code (waters limited to specific purposes).

D. Purpose and Background

The proposed amendments are designed to update, modify and improve the Commission's regulations pertaining to its property and fishing. The specific purpose of the proposed amendments is described in more detail under the summary of proposal.

E. Summary of Proposal

(1) *Section 53.27*. It has come to Commission staff's attention that the current wording of § 53.27(b), requiring use permit decals to be displayed above the waterline on both sides of the bow of the boat, creates a conflict with § 93.5(c) (relating to display of registration number and validation decal). Section 93.5(c) provides that no number other than the registration number may be displayed on either side of the bow of the vessel. Accordingly, the Commission proposes to amend this section to read as set forth in Annex A.

(2) *Section 61.7*. The Commission recently discovered an error in this section. To correct the error, the Commission proposes to amend the section to read as set forth in Annex A.

(3) *Section 65.24*. Dunkard Creek is a low gradient warmwater stream that flows through the rural setting of southern Greene County. The fish populations of Dunkard Creek have been sampled extensively dating back to 1976. The dominant gamefish sampled through the years has been smallmouth bass. Dunkard Creek has been documented over the years as one of the highest density smallmouth bass populations in a warmwater stream in Southwest Pennsylvania. Analysis of the smallmouth bass data through 1990 indicated that angler harvest was a major factor in reducing the quality of the bass population. Additionally, results of a 1990 Statewide Smallmouth Bass Angler Opinion Survey suggested that anglers were very interested in quality smallmouth bass fishing through use of more restrictive length limits. These reasons combined to provide the impetus to implement and study a Catch and Release regulation for black bass on a portion of Dunkard Creek effective in 1995 to improve the overall quality of the smallmouth bass fishery.

Two sampling sites were used in this evaluation, one in the catch and release section and one in the Statewide regulation section. The Dunkard Creek smallmouth bass population abundance, biomass, growth and year class strength demonstrated a similar declining trend from 1984 to 2000 at both sites. The number of smallmouth bass over 12 inches at both sites declined by about 60% for the years 1995 to 2000, compared to the 1984 to 2000 mean. This occurred even though both sites had more restrictive regulations applied over the evaluation period of 1984 to 2000. One site went from a minimum length limit of 10 to 12 inches and from a year-round season to a closed season in the spring, while the other site went to catch and release. The more restrictive harvest regulations should have led to an increase in abundance of smallmouth bass over 12 inches at both sites. Smallmouth bass growth data showed that older bass (ages 5 and 6) had a slower growth rate over time, even though abundance had been reduced. Rock bass populations also declined at both sites over the study period.

The declining smallmouth bass and rock bass population evidence combined pointed to habitat or water quality deterioration as possible factors. Water quality was not considered a major contributor, but erosion and sedimentation in the watershed as reported in a study by the Greene County Conservation District was identified

as a probable cause of the fish population declines. This documentation should serve as emphasis to heighten this awareness and take steps toward reducing and eliminating this pollution problem. Livestock farming operations and dirt and gravel roads were considered the major sediment producing sources in the upper watershed. Other sediment sources include mining and logging areas, runoff from waste sites, haul roads and construction sites.

The Dunkard Creek long-term data set allowed staff to document that the catch and release regulations for bass did not meet their objective of improving the quality of the bass population. However, this data set also allowed staff to discover the chronic effects of erosion and sedimentation on smallmouth bass and rock bass populations in the Dunkard Creek watershed. Conservation groups will now be directed to alleviate this pollution and ultimately return the quality component of the smallmouth bass population to its former state.

Accordingly, the Commission proposes that § 65.24 be amended to remove the miscellaneous special regulations on Dunkard Creek.

STATE ARCHITECTS LICENSURE BOARD

[49 PA. CODE CH. 9] Examination Fees

The State Architects Licensure Board (Board) proposes to amend §§ 9.3, 9.41, 9.46 and 9.49a; add §§ 9.41a, 9.51 and 9.52; and delete §§ 9.111, 9.113, 9.114, 9.116—9.118, 9.131 and 9.132 to read as set forth in Annex A.

A. Effective Date

The proposed amendments will be effective upon publication of the final-form rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. Statutory Authority

The proposed amendments are authorized under sections 8, 11 and 13 of the Architects Licensure Law (act) (63 P. S. §§ 34.8, 34.11 and 34.13).

C. Background and Purpose

Deletion of reference to the Architects Registration Examination (ARE) fee

The Board proposes to eliminate reference to the ARE examination fee over which the Board has no control or

involvement. The ARE is a recognized uniform examination used throughout the United States. The General Assembly has indicated its preference for the recognition of National uniform examinations and grading services in accordance with section 812.1 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 279.3a). The fee for the examination is established by the National examiner and communicated directly to the applicants. Applicants for the examination pay the examination fee directly to the National examiner. Thus, it is unnecessary and impractical for the Board to continue to publish the National examiner's examination fee in the Board's regulations.

In lieu of publishing the cost of the examination, the Board proposes to add § 9.41a (relating to adoption of National board examinations), which promulgates the adoption of National board examinations, including the fee established by the National Council of Architectural Registration Boards (NCARB).

Annual renewal fee for registered architecture firms

General operating and enforcement expenses of the Board are apportioned to the general licensee population through the collection of license renewal fees. Section 11(a) of the act requires the Board to increase fees by regulation if the revenues raised by fees, fines and civil penalties are not sufficient to meet expenditures over a 2-year period.

Section 13(j) of the act states that the Board shall, by promulgation of rules and regulations, require that registered architecture firms file with the Board information concerning their officers, directors, partners, professional association board of governors, beneficial owners, members or managers and other aspects of their organization as the Board deems appropriate. This section also authorizes the Board to charge each registered architecture firm an annual filing fee in an amount determined by the Board.

No renewal fee has been established for architecture firms. The Board seeks to establish a renewal fee for renewing the registration of architectural firms, thereby causing licensed firms to contribute to the general operating and enforcement expenses of the Board.

The annual fee of \$50 will be collected by the Board biennially. This means that, every 2 years, the Board will collect \$100 from each registered architecture firm.

Examination and grading procedures

Section 8(c) of the act authorizes the Board to adopt the examination and recommended grading procedures adopted by NCARB. Because the adoption of NCARB's examination and grading procedures would eliminate the

Board's role in the process, the Board proposes to delete regulations outlining its role in the administration of the examination.

D. Description of Amendments

Renewal fee for registered architecture firms

The following table outlines the affected fee and change:

Licensure by examination

Section 9.41 (relating to general requirements) informs candidates that the subject matter of the ARE examination is available from the NCARB.

Proposed § 9.41a includes of National board examinations, including the fee established by the NCARB.

Section 9.49a(a) (relating to diversified training requirements) informs candidates that information concerning the Intern Development Program (IDP) of the NCARB is available directly from the NCARB.

Section 9.49a(b) directs candidates to have the NCARB transmit a certificate of completion of IDP to the Board.

Grading and review

Sections 9.51 and 9.52 (relating to examination grading; and grading compilations) are identical to §§ 9.131 and 9.132 (relating to examination grading; and grading compilation). The Board proposes that these two sections become §§ 9.51 and 9.52, so that they will appear alongside the related regulations referring to licensure by examination and examination. Sections 9.131 and 9.132 would then be deleted.

Examination

Section 8(c) of the act authorizes the Board to adopt the examination and recommended grading procedures adopted by the NCARB. It is unnecessary to continue to publish §§ 9.111—9.118. The Board proposes that those sections of the regulations be deleted.

E. Compliance with Executive Order 1996-1

In compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, "Regulatory Review and Compliance," in drafting and promulgating the proposed amendments, the Board considered the proposed amendments as both required by law and the least restrictive means of covering the costs of services required to be performed by the Board. Further, on July 27, 2001, the Board solicited input from the American Institute of Architects of Pennsylvania and the National Council of Architect Registration Boards.

F. Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed amendments will implement an annual renewal fee for registered architecture firms in this Commonwealth, but, otherwise, should have no fiscal impact on the private sector, the general public or political subdivisions.

The proposed amendments will require the Board to alter some of its forms to reflect the new fee; however, the proposed amendments should create no additional paperwork for the private sector.

G. Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the cost effectiveness of its regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

H. Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on March 21, 2002, the Board submitted a copy of this proposed rulemaking to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and the Chairpersons of the House Professional Licensure Committee and Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committees. In addition to submitting the proposed rulemaking, the Board has provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a detailed Regulatory Analysis Form prepared by the Board in compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, "Regulatory Review and Promulgation." A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, if IRRC has objections to any portion of the proposed rulemaking, it will notify the Board within 10 days of the close of the Committees' review period. The notification shall specify the regulatory review criteria that have not been met by the portion of the proposed rulemaking to which an objection is made. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior to final publication of the rulemaking, by the Board, the General Assembly and the Governor of objections raised.

LICENSURE BY EXAMINATION

§ 9.41. General requirements.

§ 9.116. [**Admittance**] (Reserved).

§ 9.117. [**Proctors**] (Reserved).

STATE BOARD OF OSTEOPATHIC MEDICINE

[49 PA. CODE CH. 25]

Sexual Misconduct

The State Board of Osteopathic Medicine (Board) proposes to adopt § 25.215 (relating to sexual misconduct) to read as set forth in Annex A.

Effective Date

This proposed regulation will be effective upon publication as an order of final-form rulemaking in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Statutory Authority

Under sections 10.1(c), 15(a)(8) and (b)(9) and 16 of the Osteopathic Medical Practice Act (63 P. S. §§ 271.10a(c), 271.15(a)(8) and (b)(9) and 271.16), the Board has authority to establish standards of professional conduct for Board regulated practitioners under its jurisdiction. These individuals include osteopathic physicians, physician assistants and respiratory care practitioners. Proposed § 25.215 identifies when sexual contact by Board regulated practitioners with patients, and under certain circumstances, immediate family members of patients, will be deemed unprofessional conduct.

Background and Purpose

It should be axiomatic that it is unprofessional conduct for a health care practitioner to engage in sexual contact with patients. Past decisions of the Board which have

been upheld by the Commonwealth Court; the Code of Ethics, as published by the American Osteopathic Association; and responsible professional publications addressing the issue denounce sexual contact between practitioner and patient. Nevertheless, complaints are filed each year by consumers who have been harmed by Board regulated practitioners who engage in this conduct.

Description of Proposed Regulation

The proposed regulation seeks to better protect patients by providing guidance to the profession and the public as to prohibited conduct relating to sexual contact between practitioners and patients. The proposed regulation would prohibit any sexual contact between a Board regulated practitioner and a current patient. The proposed regulation would further prohibit any sexual contact between a Board regulated practitioner and a former patient prior to the 2 year anniversary of the termination of the professional relationship when the Board regulated practitioner has been involved with the management or treatment of a patient for a mental health disorder. This 2-year period was developed from professional literature which indicates that an imbalance of power between health care practitioners and patients continues after the professional relationship ends.

The proposed regulation would also prohibit sexual exploitation by a Board regulated practitioner of a current or former patient or immediate family member of a patient. "Sexual exploitation" is defined by the regulation as sexual behavior that uses the trust, knowledge, emotions or influence derived from the professional relationship. The Board believes that it is appropriate to protect immediate family members from sexual exploitation by Board regulated practitioners because immediate family members are often as vulnerable as the patients.

The proposed regulation would also provide that Board regulated practitioners who engage in prohibited sexual contact with patients or former patients will not be eligible for placement in the Board's impaired professional program in lieu of disciplinary or corrective actions. The impaired professional program is unable to effectively monitor Board regulated practitioners who have engaged in sexual misconduct.

The proposed regulation would also provide that patient consent will not be considered a defense to disciplinary action in these cases. The imbalance of power inherent in the health care practitioner—patient relationship not only serves as the basis for the prohibition but also undermines the patient's ability to consent to the sexual contact as an equal. Indeed, the Board's experience in adjudicating these cases has repeatedly demonstrated the reality of the inherent imbalance of the relationship and the patient's inability to give meaningful consent to sexual contact.

Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed regulation should have no fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. Likewise, the proposed regulation should not necessitate any legal, accounting, reporting or other paperwork requirements.

Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the cost effectiveness of its regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

Compliance with Executive Order 1996-1

In compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, the Board extended an invitation to comment on early drafts of this proposal to numerous parties who have indicated an interest in the Board's regulatory activities. The list of these persons is available upon request from the contact person listed in this Preamble. Five physicians commented on the early version. Those commenting on the regulation seemed to agree that the sexual exploitation of patients is improper and should subject the Board regulated practitioner to disciplinary action. Some of the physicians were concerned that innocent behavior may be prohibited by the proposal and only the issue of exploitation should be addressed. Others misunderstood the language of the proposed regulation, and were concerned that the proposal would prohibit a sexual relationship with any patient for 2 years following the physician-patient relationship. The Board is satisfied that the current proposal adequately protects the public without unduly burdening Board licensees.

PART I. DEPARTMENT OF STATE

Subpart A. PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL AFFAIRS

CHAPTER 25. STATE BOARD OF OSTEOPATHIC MEDICINE

Subchapter D. MINIMUM STANDARDS OF PRACTICE

§ 25.215. Sexual misconduct.

(a) *Definitions.* The following words and terms, when used in this section, have the following meanings, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Immediate family member—A parent or guardian, child, sibling, spouse or other family member with whom a patient resides.

Sexual behavior—Any sexual conduct which is nondiagnostic and nontherapeutic; it may be verbal or physical and may include expressions of thoughts and feelings or gestures that are sexual in nature or that reasonably may be construed by a patient as sexual in nature.

Sexual exploitation—Any sexual behavior that uses trust, knowledge, emotions or influence derived from the professional relationship.

(b) *Unprofessional conduct: sexual exploitation.* Sexual exploitation by a Board regulated practitioner of a current or former patient, or of an immediate family member of a patient, constitutes unprofessional conduct, is prohibited, and subjects the practitioner to disciplinary action.

(c) *Unprofessional conduct: sexual behavior.* Sexual behavior that occurs with a current patient constitutes unprofessional conduct, is prohibited, and subjects the practitioner to disciplinary action.

(d) *Sexual behavior prior to 2-year anniversary.* When the practitioner is involved with the management or treatment of a patient for a mental health disorder, sexual behavior with that former patient which occurs prior to the 2-year anniversary of the termination of the professional relationship constitutes unprofessional conduct, is prohibited, and subjects the practitioner to disciplinary action.

(e) *Impaired professional program.* A practitioner who engages in conduct prohibited by this section will not be eligible for placement into an impaired professional program in lieu of disciplinary or corrective actions.

(f) *Consent.* Consent is not a defense to conduct prohibited by this section.

Following the comment period, the Department's Water Management Program Manager will make a final determination regarding these applications. Notice of this final determination will be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at which time this determination may be appealed to the Environmental Hearing Board.

LAND RECYCLING AND ENVIRONMENTAL REMEDIATION

UNDER ACT 2, 1995

PREAMBLE 1

Acknowledgment of Notices of Intent to Remediate Submitted under the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (35 P. S. §§ 6026.101—6026.908).

Sections 302—305 of the Land Recycling and Environmental Remediation Standards Act (Act) require the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) to publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* an acknowledgment noting receipt of any Notices of Intent to Remediate. An acknowledgment of the receipt of a Notice of Intent to Remediate is used to identify a site where a person proposes to or has been required to, respond to a release of a regulated substance at a site. Persons intending to use the background standard, Statewide health standard, the site-specific standard or who intend to remediate a site as a special industrial area, must file a Notice of Intent to Remediate with the Department. A Notice of Intent to Remediate filed with the Department provides a

brief description of the location of the site, a list of known or suspected contaminants at the site, the proposed remediation measures for the site and a description of the intended future use of the site. A person who demonstrates attainment of one or a combination of the cleanup standards or who receives approval of a special industrial area remediation identified under the Act, will be relieved of further liability for the remediation of the site for any contamination identified in reports submitted to and approved by the Department. Furthermore, the person shall not be subject to citizen suits or other contribution actions brought by responsible persons not participating in the remediation.

Under sections 304(n)(1)(ii) and 305(c)(2) of the Act, there is a 30-day public and municipal comment period for sites proposed for remediation using a site-specific standard, in whole or in part and for sites remediated as a special industrial area. This period begins when a summary of the Notice of Intent to Remediate is published in a newspaper of general circulation in the area of the site. For the sites identified, proposed for remediation to a site-specific standard or as a special industrial area, the municipality, within which the site is located, may request to be involved in the development of the remediation and reuse plans for the site if the request is made within 30 days of the date specified. During this comment period the municipality may request that the person identified, as the remediator of the site, develop and implement a public involvement plan. Requests to be involved and comments, should be directed to the remediator of the site.

For further information concerning the content of a Notice of Intent to Remediate, contact the Environmental Cleanup Program Manager in the Department Regional Office under which the notice appears. If information concerning this acknowledgment is required in an alternative form, contact the Community Relations Coordinator at the appropriate Regional Office listed. Proposed Revisions to Title V Operating Permit Conditions relating to NOx Budget Trading Program

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) intends to revise the existing Title V Operating Permit to exempt affected NOx budget units from certain monitoring and reporting requirements contained in 25 Pa. Code §§ 145.1—145.90. These regulations establish a NOx Budget and a NOx Budget Trading Program for NOx budget units for the purpose of achieving the health-based ozone ambient air quality standard. This proposed revision was requested by the permittee as provided in 25 Pa. Code § 145.4(b). This section provides for exemption from the requirements of the NOx Budget Trading Program except for 25 Pa. Code §§ 145.2, 145.3, 145.4(a), 145.7, 145.40—145.43, 145.50—145.57 and 145.60—145.62 by limiting the operating hours of the NOx affected sources located at the facility.

The revised Title V Operating Permit will, beginning in 2003, require the owner or operator of the NOx budget units located at the facility to establish a general account and record the hours of operation of each unit. The revised Title V Operating Permit will also include monitoring, reporting and recordkeeping requirements for each of the NOx budget units.

Persons wishing to file protests or comments on the proposed Title V/Operating Permits or allocations must submit the protest or comment within 30 days from the date of this notice. Interested persons may also request that a hearing be held concerning the proposed permits or allocations. Any comments or protests filed at the following address must include a concise statement of the objections to the issuance of the permit and/or allocations and relevant facts which serve as the basis for the objections. The Department believes that the proposed settlement is fair, reasonable, practicable, in the public interest and in furtherance of the statutory goals of the HSCA and the CERCLA.

Draft Technical Guidance—Substantive Revision

DEP ID: 563-2000-655. Title: Stream Protection—Bituminous Underground Mining Operations. Description: This technical guidance document represents a revision of existing guidance which became effective on November 14, 1997. It reflects changes in stream protection that carry over from the 1999 amendments to the Department's water quality regulations. The Department will ensure that underground mining activities maintain the value and reasonably foreseeable uses of continuously flowing perennial streams and, in addition, the existing and designated uses of wetlands, intermittent streams and perennial streams and other surface waters covered by the Department's water quality and waterway management regulations. In implementing this policy, the Department will prevent mining that is likely to result in the loss of an existing use of surface water. 2002 Changes to the List of Class A Wild Trout Waters

The Fish and Boat Commission (Commission) is considering changes to its list of Class A Wild Trout Streams. Under 58 Pa. Code § 57.8a (relating to Class A wild trout streams), it is the Commission's policy to manage self-sustaining Class A wild trout populations as a renewable natural resource to conserve that resource and the angling it provides. Class A wild trout populations represent the best of this Commonwealth's naturally reproducing trout fisheries. The Commission manages these stream sections solely for the perpetuation of the wild trout fishery with no stocking.

Criteria developed for Class A Wild Trout fisheries are species specific. Wild Trout Abundance Class Criteria include provisions for:

(i) *Wild Brook Trout Fisheries.*

(A) Total brook trout biomass of at least 30 kg/ha (26.7 lbs/acre).

(B) Total biomass of brook trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 0.1 kg/ha (0.089 lb/acre).

(C) Brook trout biomass must comprise at least 75% of the total trout biomass.

(ii) *Wild Brown Trout Fisheries.*

(A) Total brown trout biomass of at least 40 kg/ha (35.6 lbs/acre).

(B) Total biomass of brown trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 0.1 kg/ha (0.089 lb/acre).

(C) Brown trout biomass must comprise at least 75% of the total trout biomass.

(iii) *Mixed Wild Brook and Brown Trout Fisheries.*

(A) Combined brook and brown trout biomass of at least 40 kg/ha (35.6 lbs/acre).

(B) Total biomass of brook trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 0.1 kg/ha (0.089 lb/acre).

(C) Total biomass of brown trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 0.1 kg/ha (0.089 lb/acre).

(D) Brook trout biomass must comprise less than 75% of the total trout biomass.

(E) Brown trout biomass must comprise less than 75% of the total trout biomass.

(iv) *Wild Rainbow Trout Fisheries.*

Total biomass of rainbow trout less than 15 cm (5.9 inches) in total length of at least 2.0 kg/ha (1.78 lbs/acre).

For a water to be removed from the Class A Wild Trout Streams designation, total trout biomass must be documented below the set criteria for two consecutive stream examinations.

The Commission intends to consider changes to its list of Class A Wild Trout Streams at its meetings on April 28 and 29, 2002. Persons with comments, objections or suggestions concerning the changes are invited to submit comments in writing to Executive Director, Fish and Boat Commission, P. O. Box 67000, Harrisburg, PA 17106-7000, by 4 p.m. on April 26, 2002. Comments submitted by facsimile will not be accepted.

Special Initiatives Program; Invitation to Submit Proposals

The Housing Finance Agency (Agency) invites preliminary proposals (proposals) from entities or individuals

(applicants) seeking funding for developments which will creatively meet affordable housing needs within this Commonwealth not currently addressed by existing Agency programs.

Program Objectives

The Agency administers an array of housing funding programs for homeownership, rental housing, emergency mortgage assistance and related supportive housing programs. A complete list of existing Agency programs, application deadlines and contact information is available at www.phfa.org. The Agency recognizes that there may be affordable housing needs that do not coincide with the parameters of its existing programs. In 2002, the Agency has set aside \$2 million to provide funding for selected proposals that will creatively meet affordable housing needs not currently addressed by existing Agency programs.

By this notice, the Agency is inviting submission of Proposals from individuals or profit or nonprofit groups seeking development funding. The Agency encourages creative ideas for developments not otherwise being considered by traditional Agency funding programs. In its review of preliminary proposals, the Agency has not set any parameters on the size of funding request or on the type or number of proposals to be funded. The Agency's review of the proposals submitted may take into consideration factors such as Agency in its sole discretion deems appropriate. Because this program is intended to address affordable housing needs not currently served by existing Agency programs, the Agency will not accept or review proposals which are the same or substantially similar to those which the Applicant, or a related entity, previously submitted to the Agency for consideration under an existing Agency program.

Program Criteria

Proposals should provide a narrative description of the proposed development. The proposal should clearly and concisely:

- identify the targeted need and population to be served; and
- offer an explanation of how the needs of the identified population or area will be served.

Additionally, while the Agency is seeking program ideas that may not yet be fully developed, to the greatest extent available, the proposal should:

- provide a development budget;
- outline a development time frame;
- identify other funding participants and programs involved in the initiative (if any);
- specify the amount of Agency funding requested and explain how the Agency funds will be used to create a viable strategy for fulfilling the identified housing need; (Note: Agency funds may be used for bricks and mortar, housing development and directly related expenditures to support housing only, for example: land acquisition, infrastructure and development costs.); and
- identify who the participants in the development will be.

In all instances, proposals must evidence financial viability. Proposals should delineate the income groups being targeted through the housing and the duration of the funded program. The Agency also seeks as much detail as possible regarding the expectations of dates for all significant components of the proposed development,

including funding commitments from all other sources, governmental approvals for the development, site acquisition time frames and estimates of the substantial completion of the development. Proposals capable of being delivered quickly may be preferred. The Agency encourages submission of proposals with participation of entities designated as minority business enterprises (MBE), woman business enterprises (WBE) or disabled business enterprises (DBE) and which affirmatively further fair housing.

Proposals will be considered by the Agency and conditional funding approvals will be provided to the applicants determined to best achieve the guidelines and criteria of the Special Initiative Program (Program). Once preliminary selections have been made by the Agency, applicants will be required to submit additional information including market studies, site analysis, funding commitments, and the like, as determined necessary and appropriate by the Agency. Funding commitment will be made after the Agency reviews the site, determines the facility is financially viable and feasible and determines that the proposal addresses affordable housing needs not currently served by existing Agency programs. Agency funding is subject to ongoing program requirements, the housing finance agency law, and all other applicable Federal, State and local laws and regulations.

Selected applicants must provide evidence of substantial progress to ensure development feasibility within one year of the date of Agency funding approval. The Agency may recapture funds or terminate any commitment or funding reservation in the event of material deviations from the projected time frames.

Application Process

Applicants should submit four complete copies of the proposal to Robert Bobincheck, Associate Director, Office of Strategic Planning and Policy, Housing Finance Agency, 2101 North Front Street, P. O. Box 8029, Harrisburg, PA 17105-8029.

Proposals must be received by the Agency no later than 2 p.m. Thursday, May 16, 2002.

Insurance Department—Requirements for All Policies and Forms, Preparation of Forms; Regulation No. 11-213

On February 21, 2002, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (Commission) received this regulation from the Insurance Department. This rulemaking repeals 31 Pa. Code § 89.14(b). Notice of proposed rulemaking was omitted for this regulation; it will become effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

This rulemaking repeals a provision relating to time limits for recovery of accidental death benefits. The repeal is based on the Pennsylvania Supreme Court decision in *Burne v. Franklin Life Insurance Company*, 451 Pa. 218, 301 A.2d 799 (1973). In *Burne*, the Court held that accidental death benefit policies may not be sold or issued in Pennsylvania if the death must occur within a certain time period in order for the death benefit to be paid.

We have determined this regulation is consistent with the statutory authority of the Insurance Department (71 P.S. §§ 186, 411 and 412) and the intention of the General Assembly. Having considered all of the other criteria of the Regulatory Review Act, we find promulgation of this regulation is in the public interest.

**Environmental Quality Board Regulation No. 7-371
Architectural and Industrial Maintenance Coatings
March 25, 2002**

We submit for consideration the following objections and recommendations regarding this regulation. Each objection or recommendation includes a reference to the criteria in the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(h) and (i)) which have not been met. The Environmental Quality Board (Board) must respond to these Comments when it submits the final-form regulation. If the final-form regulation is not delivered by February 22, 2004, the regulation will be deemed withdrawn.

1. General.—Fiscal impact and reasonableness.

This proposed rulemaking adopts volatile organic compound (VOC) standards for 46 types of architectural or industrial maintenance (AIM) coatings. These limits, based on the State and Territorial Air Pollution Program Administrators and the Association of Local Air Pollution Control Officials' Model Rule (Model Rule), are more restrictive than the Federal limits that were adopted in 1998 in the hopes of attaining and maintaining the health-related ozone standard in this Commonwealth. The Ozone Transport Region (OTR) is using the Model Rule to reduce VOC emissions, and the Board has modeled this proposed rulemaking after the Model Rule.

We have four general concerns with this regulation.

First, commentators have suggested a number of adjustments to the proposed rulemaking that more closely track the provisions in the Model Rule. These include an averaging provision (found in § 3.10) and an AIM specific variance provision (§ 3.8.1). Why were these provisions of the Model Rule not included in the proposed rulemaking?

Second, to decrease VOC content in the products included in the regulation, properties and ingredients of the products may not be the same as the higher-VOC products. How will these potential alterations impact the quality of the products? If the quality decreases, and usage of the lower VOC-products increases, could this pattern diminish the intended decrease in VOC? The Board should explain whether this pattern has been anticipated.

Third, in Item 20a of the RAF, the Department of Environmental Protection (Department) estimates the cost of implementing this regulation will be \$65 million per year. This estimate is based on a report "Control Measure Development Support Analysis of Ozone Trans-

port Commission Model Rules" (Report) issued by E.H. Pechan and Associates. Chapter II, Subsection D(3) of the Report states, "Details on the assumptions used for ARB's cost analysis are provided in the "Staff Report for the Proposed Suggested Control Measure for Architectural Coatings'" (Staff Report).

Reviewing the Staff Report, it appears that the economic impact figures contained in the report are based on figures developed and applied to the decreased VOC emissions program in California. This is readily apparent in the "Sources and Treatment of Cost Data" section, which highlights economic data collection from California businesses. How are the figures developed for California applicable to this Commonwealth? The Department should provide its rationale.

Fourth, the proposed rulemaking does not include a scheduled technology assessment on the appropriateness of maintaining future VOC limits. A technology assessment of this type would be valuable in determining whether the proposed rulemaking, once implemented, is effective. The Department should consider adding a future technological assessment to the final-form regulation.

2. Section 130.302. Definitions.—Clarity.

Commentators have requested the following terms be added, deleted or incorporated into existing definitions: 1) the reference for roofing should be eliminated from the definitions of "bituminous roof coating" and "bituminous roof primer"; 2) the definition for "specialty primer" should include "odors or effervescence" and "or recommended for application to exterior wood or wood-based surfaces, or for highly alkaline cement, plaster, and other cementitious surfaces"; a definition for "shellac" should be added; and 3) the definition of low solids coating should be changed by adding "or a water-borne clear or semi-transparent stain."

The Board should consider the concerns of the commentators and respond to these concerns in the final-form regulation.

3. Section 130.303. Standards.—Fiscal impact and Reasonableness.

Subsection (a)(1)—(3), which address VOC content limits, could have an adverse effect on those industries that manufacture, supply or use AIM coatings. We have two questions about the impact of these sections on this Commonwealth.

First, how do other states in the OTR regulate the same products?

Second, are the Commonwealth's requirements more restrictive than those found in other states? How will the restrictions of these products affect businesses that utilize these materials?

4. 130.305. Reporting requirements.—Clarity.

This section requires that "Upon request by the Department, each manufacturer of an architectural or industrial maintenance coating subject to this subchapter shall . . . submit an annual report to the Department."

Commentators have stated that the reporting requirement in this section would not be useful, and should be deleted. We have two questions. First, is the information included in these reports necessary for the Department to have? Second, what criteria will the Department use to determine when the information will be requested?

5. Table 1. VOC Content Limits for Architectural and Industrial Maintenance Coatings.—Reasonableness and Clarity.

This table outlines the VOC content limits of AIM coatings. We have two concerns with this table.

First, industrial maintenance coatings in Table 1 have a VOC content limit of 340. The Model Rule has the VOC content level at 250. Why did the Board select the VOC limit to be 340 for industrial maintenance coatings?

Second, commentators have requested the following adjustments or additions be made to Table 1: 1) Calci-mine recoaters; conversion varnish; concrete surface retarders; impacted immersion coatings; nuclear coatings; and thermoplastic rubber coatings; 2) the standards for sanding sealers, varnishes and clear and semi-transparent stains should be raised to 550, 450 and 550, respectively; the standard should be 350 for exterior wood primers, sealers and undercoaters; the standard for floor paints should be changed to 280-400; and 3) and the standard for bituminous roof primers is too low to allow useful application of the product.

The Board should provide the rationale for these standards, as well as the inclusion or omission of products in Table 1.

Default Order

By the Commission:

On August 30, 2001, the Law Bureau Prosecutory Staff instituted a complaint against OnlineChoice.com, Inc. (Respondent), an electric generation supplier (EGS) licensed at A-110122. In the complaint, Prosecutory Staff alleged that Commission staff had notified Respondent by letter dated June 25, 2001, that its surety bond was due to expire on August 27, 2001, and that Respondent had 15 days to provide proof that it had obtained a bond or other approved security in order for its EGS license to remain in force. The Prosecutory Staff complaint also alleged that Commission staff placed a follow-up telephone call to Respondent and heard an automated message system state that Respondent had ceased doing business as of April 30, 2001.

Furthermore, the complaint alleged that on July 31, 2001, the Department of Revenue had informed Commission staff that Respondent has filed for bankruptcy.

The complaint charged that Respondent violated 66 Pa.C.S. § 2809(c)(1)(i) (relating to EGS bonds or other security) and the Commission's regulation at 52 Pa. Code § 54.40 by failing to renew its surety bond.

In addition, the complaint charged that Respondent violated 52 Pa. Code § 54.34(b), by failing to report a material change in the organizational structure or operation that affected its operation in this Commonwealth within 30 days of the date of the change. The complaint requested that Respondent's EGS license be cancelled and that a civil penalty of \$1,000 be imposed as a result of Respondent's failure to renew its bond and notify the Commission of a material change in its operation.

Pursuant to section 2809(c)(1)(i) of the Public Utility Code, 66 Pa.C.S. § 2809(c)(1)(i), no energy supplier license shall be issued or remain in force unless the supplier furnishes a bond or other security approved by the Commission in form and amount to ensure financial responsibility of the EGS.

According to the postal return receipt, service of the complaint was perfected on September 10, 2001. To date, more than 20 days after service of the complaint, no answer has been filed to the complaint, the surety bond has not been renewed, and the Commission has not been formally notified of any material changes in Respondent's business; *Therefore,*

It is Ordered That:

1. The allegations in the Law Bureau Prosecutory Staff's complaint are deemed admitted and the complaint is hereby sustained.

2. The EGS license held by OnlineChoice.com, Inc. A-110122, is hereby cancelled.

3. A civil penalty of \$1,000 is hereby imposed against OnlineChoice.com, Inc. payable to the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission at P. O. Box 3265, Harrisburg, PA 17105-3265, and due within 20 days of the entry date of this Order.

4. The Secretary strike the name of OnlineChoice.com, Inc. from all active-utility lists maintained by the Annual Report Section of the Secretary's Bureau and the Assessment Section of the Bureau of Administrative Services.

5. If the civil penalty is not paid pursuant to Ordering Paragraph No. 3, above, the Office of Executive Director is hereby directed to refer the \$1,000 civil penalty to the Office of Attorney General for collection as appropriate.

6. Notice of this Default Order shall be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

7. The Secretary serve a copy of this Default Order upon all jurisdictional electric distribution companies (EDC) as well as the Department of Revenue.

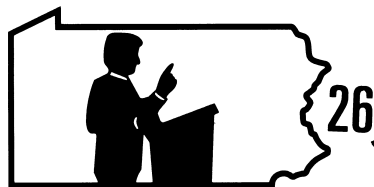

New Act 57 Thresholds Effective January 1, 2002

Act 57 of 1998 provides for annual adjustments to certain thresholds to reflect the annual percentage change in the Composite Construction Cost Index of the United States Department of Commerce occurring in the 1-year period ending December 31 of each year. The Composite Construction Cost Index for the year ending December 31, 1997, was 103.3. The Composite Construction Cost Index for the year ending December 31, 2001, was 119. The difference between the indices for calendar years 1997 and 2001 is 15.7. Therefore, the percentage change in the Composite Construction Cost Index from 1997 to 2001 is 15.1984%. Using this adjustment percentage, the new dollar thresholds for calendar year 2002 follows. The chart also shows the dollar thresholds for each intervening year.
