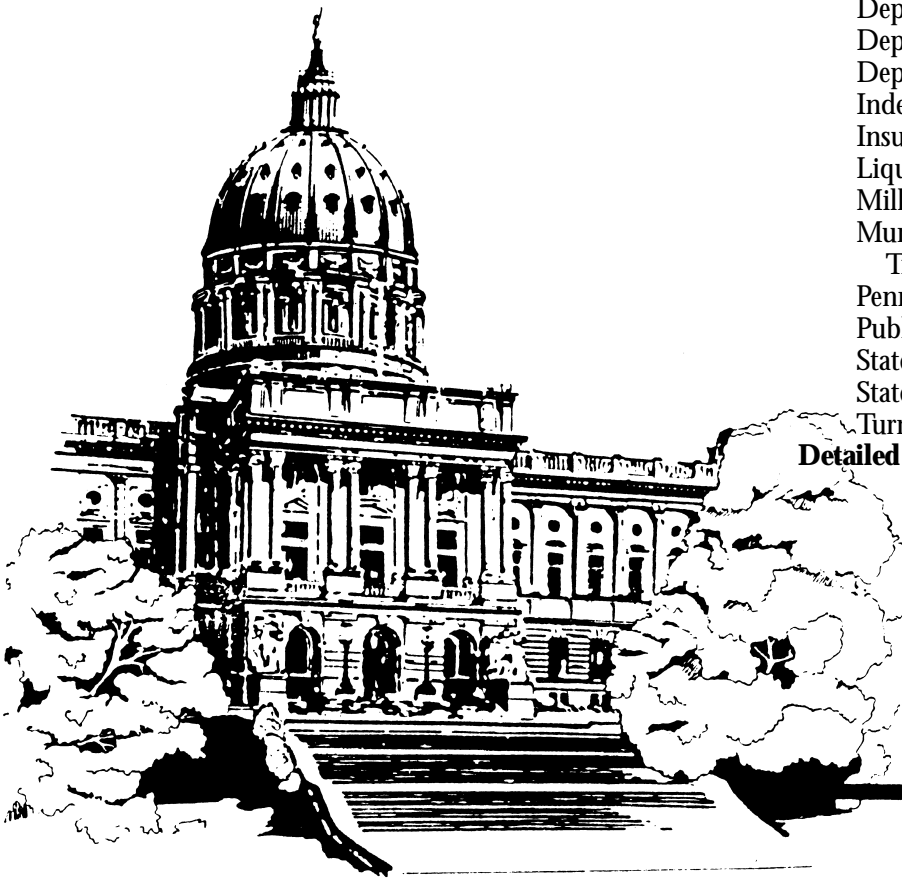

READER'S GUIDE TO THE PENNSYLVANIA BULLETIN AND PENNSYLVANIA CODE

Pennsylvania Bulletin

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the official gazette of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is published every week and includes a table of contents. A cumulative subject matter index is published quarterly.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* serves several purposes. First, it is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, which is the official codification of agency rules and regulations and other statutorily authorized documents. Changes in the codified text, whether by adoption, amendment, repeal or emergency action must be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*. Further, agencies proposing changes to the codified text do so in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Second, the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes: Governor's Executive Orders; State Contract Notices; Summaries of Enacted Statutes; Statewide and Local Court Rules; Attorney General Opinions; Motor Carrier Applications before the Public Utility Commission; Applications and Actions before the Department of Environmental Protection; Orders of the Independent Regulatory Review Commission; and other documents authorized by law.

The text of certain documents published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the only valid and enforceable text. Courts are required to take judicial notice of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Adoption, Amendment or Repeal of Regulations

Generally an agency wishing to adopt, amend or repeal regulations must first publish in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking. There are limited instances where the agency may omit the proposal step; they still must publish the adopted version.

The Notice of Proposed Rulemaking contains the full text of the change, the agency contact person, a fiscal note required by law and background for the action.

The agency then allows sufficient time for public comment before taking final action. An adopted proposal must be published in the *Pennsylvania*

Bulletin before it can take effect. If the agency wishes to adopt changes to the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to enlarge the scope, they must re-propose.

Citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*

Cite material in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by volume number and page number. Example: Volume 1, *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, page 801 (short form: 1 Pa.B. 801).

Pennsylvania Code

The *Pennsylvania Code* is the official codification of rules and regulations issued by Commonwealth agencies and other statutorily authorized documents. The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* is the temporary supplement to the *Pennsylvania Code*, printing changes as soon as they occur. These changes are then permanently codified by the *Pennsylvania Code Reporter*, a monthly, loose-leaf supplement.

The *Pennsylvania Code* is cited by title number and section number. Example: Title 10 *Pennsylvania Code*, § 1.1 (short form: 10 Pa.Code § 1.1).

Under the *Pennsylvania Code* codification system, each regulation is assigned a unique number by title and section. Titles roughly parallel the organization of Commonwealth government. Title 1 *Pennsylvania Code* lists every agency and its corresponding *Code* title location.

How to Find Documents

Search for your area of interest in the *Pennsylvania Code*.

The *Pennsylvania Code* contains, as Finding Aids, subject indexes for the complete *Code* and for each individual title, a list of Statutes Used As Authority for Adopting Rules and a list of annotated cases. Source Notes give you the history of the documents. To see if there have been recent changes, not yet codified, check the List of *Pennsylvania Code* Chapters Affected in the most recent issue of the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

The *Pennsylvania Bulletin* also publishes a quarterly List of Pennsylvania Code Sections Affected which lists the regulations in numerical order, followed by the citation to the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* in which the change occurred.

Printing Format

Material proposed to be added to an existing rule or regulation is printed in **bold face** and material proposed to be deleted from such a rule or regulation is enclosed in brackets [] and printed in **bold face**. Asterisks indicate ellipsis of *Pennsylvania Code* text retained without change. Proposed new or additional regulations are printed in ordinary style face.

Fiscal Notes

Section 612 of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 232) requires that the Office of Budget prepare a fiscal note for regulatory actions and administrative procedures of the administrative departments, boards, commissions or authorities receiving money from the State Treasury stating whether the proposed action or procedure causes a loss of revenue or an increase in the cost of programs for the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions; that the fiscal note be published in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* at the same time as the proposed change is advertised; and that the fiscal note shall provide the following information: (1) the designation of the fund out of which the appropriation providing for expenditures under the action or procedure shall be made; (2) the probable cost for the fiscal year the program is implemented; (3) projected cost estimate of the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (4) fiscal history of the program for which expenditures are to be made; (5) probable loss of revenue for the fiscal year of its implementation; (6) projected loss of revenue from the program for each of the five succeeding fiscal years; (7) line item, if any, of the General Appropriation Act or other appropriation act out of which expenditures or losses of Commonwealth funds shall occur as a result of the action or procedures; (8) recommendation, if any, of the Secretary of the Budget and the reasons therefor.

The required information is published in the foregoing order immediately following the proposed change to which it relates; the omission of an item indicates that the agency text of the fiscal note states that there is no information available with respect thereto. In items (3) and (6) information is set forth for the first through fifth fiscal years; in that order, following the year the program is implemented, which is stated. In item (4) information is set forth for the current and two immediately preceding years, in that order. In item (8) the recommendation, if any, made by the Secretary of Budget is published with the fiscal note. See 4 Pa. Code § 7.231 *et seq.* Where "no fiscal impact" is published, the statement means no additional cost or revenue loss to the Commonwealth or its local political subdivision is intended.

Reproduction, Dissemination or Publication of Information

Third parties may not take information from the *Pennsylvania Code* and *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and reproduce, disseminate or publish such information except as provided by 1 Pa. Code § 3.44. 1 Pa. Code § 3.44 reads as follows:

§ 3.44. General permission to reproduce content of Code and Bulletin.

Information published under this part, which information includes, but is not limited to, cross references, tables of cases, notes of decisions, tables of contents, indexes, source notes, authority notes, numerical lists and codification guides, other than the actual text of rules or regulations may be reproduced only with the written consent of the Bureau. The information which appears on the same leaf with the text of a rule or regulation, however, may be incidentally reproduced in connection with the reproduction of the rule or regulation, if the reproduction is for the private use of a subscriber and not for resale. There are no other restrictions on the reproduction of information published under this part, and the Commonwealth hereby consents to a reproduction.

Title 255—LOCAL COURT RULES

CARBON COUNTY

Revision of Rule of Civil Procedure L1915.4-1 Alternative Hearing Procedures for Partial Custody or Visitation Cases; No. 01-1115

Administrative Order 22-2001

And Now, this 27th day of September, 2001, it is hereby *Ordered and Decreed* that effective thirty (30) days after publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*, the Court of Common Pleas of Carbon County *Amends* Local Rule of Civil Procedure L1915.4-1 governing Alternative Hearing Procedures for Partial Custody and Visitation Cases.

The Carbon County District Court Administrator is *Ordered and Directed* to do the following:

1. File seven (7) certified copies of this Administrative Order with the Administrative Office of Pennsylvania Courts.

2. File two (2) certified copies and one (1) diskette with the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

3. File one (1) certified copy with the Civil Procedural Rules Committee.

4. Forward one (1) copy for publication in the *Carbon County Law Journal*.

5. Forward one (1) copy to the Carbon County Law Library.

6. Keep continuously available for public inspection copies of the Order in the Prothonotary's Office.

Rule L1915.4-1. Alternative Hearing Procedures for Partial Custody or Visitation Cases

1. Upon the filing of any claim for partial custody or visitation, the moving party shall deposit with the Prothonotary the sum of \$300.00 unless excused by the Court.

2. All actions commenced under these rules shall be scheduled for a pre-hearing conference. The pre-hearing conference shall be held to focus on issues of fact and law and to explore the possibility of a negotiated settlement and consent order.

3. A continuance of the pre-hearing conference may be granted by the Court upon good cause shown.

4. If the parties agree on a custodial arrangement, two hundred dollars shall be refunded to the depositing party and a consent order shall be entered in substantially the same form as set forth in "Form A" following Carbon County Local Rule L1915.7.

5. If the parties are unable to agree, the hearing officer shall immediately contact Court Administration for a hearing date, insert this date on a Hearing Notice as set forth in "Form A", file the original with the Prothonotary, and deliver a copy of same forthwith to the parties, counsel, and Court Administration.

6. Where no agreement is reached, the hearing officer shall prepare a recommended Interim Order which said officer believes is in the best interest of the child(ren) and forward it to the Court within 10 days of the pre-hearing conference. The Interim Order shall require the parties to file a Pre-Trial Memorandum with the Prothonotary's Office within five (5) days prior to hearing, and shall contain the following:

(A) A clear concise statement of the principal custody issues to be resolved by the Court;

(B) Principles of law to be applied;

(C) List of witnesses to be called and exhibits;

(D) Listing of any evidentiary disputes; and Legal Argument.

(E) Proposed Findings of Fact

(F) Proposed Custody Order

7. The moving party shall be responsible to secure the services/attendance of an outside court reporter for said hearing and shall be responsible for the payment of said outside court reporter unless the Court places the payment responsibility on the other party.

8. Within 10 days of the conclusion of the hearing, the hearing officer shall file and serve a copy upon all parties a report stating the reasons for the recommendation along with a proposed order including a specific schedule of partial custody or visitation.

9. If exceptions are filed, no exceptions shall be argued before the Court unless written briefs have been filed. The moving party shall file three (3) copies of a brief and exceptions with the Prothonotary's Office no later than ten (10) days after filing of the hearing officer's report, and forthwith serve one (1) copy of the brief upon each adverse party or counsel of record. Each adverse party or his counsel of record shall file in the appropriate filing office three (3) copies of a brief in answer, not later than five (5) days after receipt of moving party's brief and forthwith serve a copy thereof upon all opposing parties or their counsel of record. All briefs shall be prepared in conformity with Local Rule L210. Transcription of the proceedings shall be filed of record by the party raising the objections. The cost of transcription shall be borne by the party filing the original exceptions unless otherwise ordered by the Court.

10. Argument shall be held within 45 days of the date that the last party files exceptions.

11. In all custody proceedings where the interests of children under the age of eighteen (18) are involved, the parties shall attend and complete one 4-hour session entitled "Education Program for Divided Families", referred to in these local rules as "Program."

12. In all custody proceedings, each complaint or petition shall be in compliance with Local Rule L206.1 or Local Rule L205.3.

13. At the time of the filing of the Complaint/Petition, the attorney and/or unrepresented party shall attached to the Complaint/Petition and provide all parties with the Court Order requiring attendance at the Program as set forth in Form "B," a registration form, and Program description.

14. The parties shall register for the Program within fifteen (15) days after he or she is served with the Court Order.

15. Every party shall attend the Program within sixty (60) days from the date of the Order requiring attendance. Any request for an extension of time to complete the Program shall be made to the Court.

16. The fee for the Program is \$25.00 per party and must be submitted with the registration form. Certified check or money order will be accepted for payment. Checks and money orders shall be made payable to the Kathryn James. NOTE: NO PERSONAL CHECKS OR CASH WILL BE ACCEPTED. NO REFUNDS GIVEN.

17. No final hearing shall be held or final order entered until all parties have attended and completed the Program, unless the Court waives the requirement upon

petition filed for good cause shown or by leave of Court. Refusal of the non-moving party to attend the Program shall be considered good cause by the Court. Failure to comply with the Order may result in the dismissal of the action, striking of pleadings, or other appropriate action, including sanctions for contempt.

18. Upon filing of the Certificate of Completion, the Prothonotary shall provide a copy to Court Administration.

19. Copies of this Rule, Program Registration Form, and Program Description shall be available in the Prothonotary's Office of the Court of Common Pleas of Carbon County.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Title 7—AGRICULTURE

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

[7 PA. CODE CH. 128]

Fees

The Department of Agriculture (Department) amends § 128.3 (relating to fees) to read as set forth in Annex A. This final-omitted regulation is adopted under the general authority of the Secretary of the Department to promulgate appropriate regulations to carry out section 7(b) of the Pesticide Control Act of 1973 (act) (3 P. S. § 111.27(b)) and the specific authority in section 37.1 of the act (3 P. S. § 111.57a). This final-omitted regulation will adjust the fees the Department may assess for pesticide product registration, certification, registration and licensing of pesticide applicators, as well as pesticide application businesses.

Contact with Affected Parties

Public notice of intention to amend § 128.3 under the procedures specified in sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No. 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) (CDL), has been omitted as authorized under section 204(3) of the CDL (45 P. S. § 1204(3)), because the Department finds that these procedures under the circumstances, are unnecessary and impracticable. The Department first proposed the fee increase at the Pesticide Advisory Board (Board) public meeting in May 1999. In June 1999, over 6,000 copies of the private pesticide applicator newsletter, "*Pesticide Highlights*," were mailed to all pesticide application businesses and pesticide dealers licensed by the Department. The newsletter contained an article announcing the proposed fee increase and solicited comments. As a result, the Department received 22 comments from these groups of affected businesses. Over 21,700 copies of "*Pesticide Highlights*" were mailed November 1999 to all private certified pesticide applicators and to members of the General Assembly. The newsletter again contained an article announcing the proposed fee increase and solicited comments. As a result, the Department received 14 comments from private applicators. The Department mailed an informational notice of the proposed fee increase requesting comments in November 1999 to all pesticide registrants along with the year 2000 product-renewal application (1,100 copies). The Department received and responded to seven comments from product registrants.

The proposed fee increase regulation and the public comments were discussed at the September 1999, December 1999, March 2000, November 2000 and the most recent Board public meeting in March 2001. The Department also met with the three largest trade associations for the pesticide registrant groups on March 28, 2000, to discuss the proposed fee increase and to discuss any suggested comments or changes. *The Reading Times* newspaper published an article on August 2, 1999, regarding the Department's proposed fee increases. Representatives of the Department attended board meetings of the Pennsylvania Pest Control Association, Lawn Care Association of Pennsylvania and PennAg Industries Association to discuss the fiscal analysis regarding the proposed fee increase. These professional associations represent the majority of the regulated businesses and individuals affected by the regulation. The Department presently regulates 1,100 Pesticide Product Registrants

(Manufacturers & Distributors); 10,500 Commercial Applicators; 5,750 Pesticide Application Businesses; and 2,500 Registered Pesticide Technicians. As part of its out-reach program, eight different regulatory proposals were considered by the Department, the Board and the affected groups. The final-omitted regulation represents a compromise developed through consensus and years of cooperation with regulated individuals and businesses.

Rationale for Fee Increase

The pesticide program in this Commonwealth is required by the act to be a self-funding program. Specifically, section 37.1 of the act provides that if the revenues raised by fees, fines and civil penalties imposed under the act are not sufficient to meet expenditures for the administration and enforcement of the act over a 2-year period, the Secretary is authorized to increase fees by regulation so that the "projected revenues will meet or exceed projected expenditures." The Department is projecting a deficit from the year 2001 and beyond. The "fees" were set by regulation and with the exception of the pesticide product registration—which was modified in 1991—have not changed since 1986. During the past 15 years, the Department has been able to provide the citizens of this Commonwealth with protection and services as required by both Federal and State laws, without increasing the cost to the regulated community. It is the Department's opinion that to continue to carry out its legislative mandate to protect the health and welfare of the citizens of this Commonwealth and the environment, it is necessary to increase the fees charged to the regulated industries and individuals. As part of its discussions and agreement with the regulated community, the Department has determined that it will not increase the current fee structure for agronomic producers, public applicators and restricted-use pesticide dealers.

Fiscal Impact

Commonwealth

The Department has determined that the final-omitted regulation will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth other than a one-time cost of approximately \$3,500 for postage and billing/ form conversion and data processing and programming.

Political Subdivisions

The final-omitted regulation will have direct fiscal impact on political subdivisions in that the approximate 400 local governments which hold a pesticide business license will incur a \$10 per year renewal fee increase.

Private Sector

The final-omitted regulation will have a direct fiscal impact on the private sector as set forth more fully in Annex A.

General Public

The final-omitted regulation will not have any fiscal impact on the general public.

Regulatory Review

Under section 5.1(c) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5a(c)), on August 21, 2001, the Department submitted a copy of the regulation with proposed rule-making omitted to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and to the Chairpersons of the Senate and House Agriculture and Rural Affairs Committees. On the same date, the final-omitted regulation was

submitted to the Office of Attorney General for review and approval as provided in the Commonwealth Attorneys Act (71 P.S. §§ 732-101—732-506). In addition to submitting the final-omitted regulation, the Department has provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a detailed Regulatory Analysis Form prepared by the Department in compliance with Executive Order 1996-1.

Under section 5.1(d) of the Regulatory Review Act, the final-omitted regulation was deemed approved by the House and Senate Committees on September 10, 2001. IRRC met on September 20, 2001, and approved the final-omitted regulation.

Findings

The Department finds that:

(1) Public notice of intention to amend § 128.3 by this order under the procedures specified by sections 201 and 202 of the CDL has been omitted under section 204(2) of the CDL because the Department has, for good cause, found that notice is unnecessary and impractical in that the regulated community participated in the drafting of the amended regulation and previously commented on the fee increases as more fully set forth in this Preamble.

(2) The persons subject to and affected by the final-omitted regulation as adopted by this order have received actual notice of the Department's intention to amend § 128.3 in advance of final-omitted rulemaking under section 204(2) of the CDL.

(3) The amendment of regulation of the Department relating to fee increases in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate for the proper administration of its authorizing statute.

Order

The Department, acting under the authorizing statute, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the Department, 7 Pa. Code Chapter 128, are amended by amending § 128.3 to read as set forth in Annex A.

(b) The Secretary of the Department shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of General Counsel and Office of Attorney General for approval as to form and legality as required by law.

(c) The Secretary of Department shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) This order shall take effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

TITLE 7. AGRICULTURE

PART V. BUREAU OF PLANT INDUSTRY

CHAPTER 128. PESTICIDES

Subchapter A. GENERAL PROVISIONS

§ 128.3. Fees.

(a) *Pesticide dealer's license.* The annual fee for a pesticide dealer's license is \$10. The fee for a duplicate pesticide dealer's license is \$3.

(b) *Pest management consultant's license.* The annual fee for a pest management consultant's license is \$25. The fee for a duplicate pest management consultant license is \$8.

(c) *Pesticide application business' license.* The annual fee for a pesticide application business' license is \$35. The fee for a duplicate pesticide application business license is \$8.

(d) *Commercial applicator's certificate.* The annual fee for the commercial applicator's certificate is \$40. When the initial certification requires examination, no fee will be charged. The fee for a duplicate commercial applicator's certificate is \$10.

(e) *Public applicator's certificate.* The triennial fee for a public applicator's certificate is \$10. A fee is not required when the initial certification requires examination. The fee for a duplicate public applicator's certificate is \$3.

(f) *Examination fees.* Examination fees are nonrefundable. The following examination fees, with payment made in advance, will be charged:

(1) Commercial/public applicator's core examination—\$50.

(2) Commercial/public applicator's category examination—\$10.

(3) Private applicator's examination—no charge.

(4) Pest management consultant's examination—no charge except that a fee of \$5 will be charged if an examination is requested on other than a regularly scheduled examination date.

(g) *Registration fee for a pesticide application technician.*

(i) *Commercial pesticide application technician.* An annual registration fee of \$30 will be charged to register a commercial pesticide application technician with the Department. The fee for a duplicate technician registration is \$7.

(ii) *Public pesticide application technician.* An annual registration fee of \$20 will be charged to register a public pesticide application technician with the Department. The fee for a duplicate technician registration is \$7.

(h) *Private applicator's permit.* The triennial fee for a private applicator's permit is \$10. The fee for a duplicate private applicator's permit is \$3. A fee will not be charged for a special permit which may be issued in conjunction with the private applicator's permit.

(i) *Product registration.* The annual fee to register a pesticide is \$135.

Title 37—LAW

MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS' EDUCATION AND TRAINING COMMISSION

[37 PA. CODE CH. 203]

Administration of the Training Program

The Municipal Police Officers' Education and Training Commission (Commission) by this order amends Chapter 203 (relating to administration of the program) to read as set forth in Annex A.

A. *Effective Date*

These final-form regulations will be effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. *Statutory Authority*

These final-form regulations are adopted under the authority of 53 Pa.C.S. Chapter 21, Subchapter D (relating to municipal police education and training) (act).

C. *Background and Purpose*

These final-form regulations implement the act which establishes the training and education requirements for employment as a police officer. The purpose of final-form regulation is to clarify and correct various aspects of the existing regulations. The following is a summary of the changes.

The amendment of § 203.11 (relating to qualifications) allows previously certified police officers and enlisted members of the State Police who are not currently employed as police officers 2 years to obtain employment as a police officer with another police department without going through the certification process provided the employment takes place within 2 years of the termination of police employment and that the member has already had a psychological evaluation.

The amendment of § 203.11(9)(ii)(F)(I) requires retesting of a failed subject area upon the successful completion of course work in the failed subject. An applicant's failure to pass the retest results in the requirement that the applicant shall retake the entire basic police-training course.

The amendment of §§ 203.33(b)(1) and 203.36(5) (relating to minimum school standards and requirements; and revocation of school certification) will permit schools to conduct only one basic recruit training class every 3 years instead of every year to retain school certification.

The amendment of § 203.83(a)(2) (relating to grants for nonmandatory in-service training programs) will allow law enforcement officers presently not eligible for reimbursement to attend nonmandatory training classes after paying tuition to the Commission.

D. *Comments Received*

Notice of proposed rule making was published at 28 Pa.B. 2925 (June 27, 1998) with an invitation to submit comments within 30 days of publication. The Commission received comments from Chief Charles Snyder of the Lower Allen Township Police (Dept. 91993 Hummel Ave., Camp Hill, PA 17011), Chief Detective Paul Gourley of the Bucks County District Attorney's office (Bucks County Courthouse, Doylestown, PA 18901) and the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC). The following is a summary of the comments received:

1. Chief Snyder suggested several nonregulatory Commission administrative concerns related to providing cer-

tified training to civilian employees of municipal police departments. Whereas the comments received from the chief are more properly considered statements, the Commission does not see the need to amend the regulations.

2. Detective Gourley's comments concerned § 203.11 of the proposed rulemaking. Specifically Detective Gourley requested that the current qualification requirements be upheld and that a 2-year certification waiver should be granted to an officer leaving a police department so long as the officer meets the minimum requirements of the act. The Commission concurred with the detective's comment and the final-form regulation was amended in § 203.11 to provide a 2-year waiver to an officer who held a valid Commission certification 2 years prior to the date of his next employment as a police officer.

3. IRRC made three comments on the proposed rulemaking which were focused on § 203.11 in the following areas:

a. IRRC first commented that the 2-year waiver of certification exemption provided by this section to applicants who were members of the State Police or act certified police officers should not waive the requirements that the applicant must have a criminal history record check prior to being hired as a municipal police officer. Secondly, IRRC commented that the members of the State Police seeking to take advantage of this 2-year exemption waiver should not be exempt from the one of the certification minimum standards which requires all certification applicants to undergo a psychological evaluation prior to employment.

In response to IRRC's first comment, for a police officer to be recertified under the act each department shall continually check the criminal history record of each certified police officer. Accordingly, any further requirement that would mandate a criminal history check for individuals who meet the requirements of this section would be duplicitous.

The Commission concurs with IRRC's second comment to this section and has changed the section to require a former member of the State Police who meets the exemption under this section to undergo a psychological evaluation prior to subsequent employment. This requirement is effective for all members who enlisted with the State Police prior to May 1998. This date was included because members of the State Police who enlisted after May 1998 were required to undergo a psychological evaluation prior to employment with the State Police.

b. IRRC's final comment recommended that the Commission not delete § 203.11(9)(ii)(F)(I) but instead redraft the section to specify conditions for an applicant who fails a section of an examination in the basic police training course. The Commission concurs with this recommendation and has redrafted the section in the final-form regulations.

E. *Compliance with Executive Order 1996-1*

In accordance with the requirements of Executive Order 1996-1, the Commission solicited input and suggestions from the regulated community and members of the Commission. These final-form regulations address a the compelling public interest as described in Section C of the Preamble and otherwise comply with Executive Order 1996-1.

F. *Benefits*

These final-form regulations will clearly benefit the citizens of this Commonwealth by further establishing and clarifying certification requirements for municipal police officers.

Specifically, amending § 203.11 will benefit those currently employed municipal police officers and State Police officers who cease their employment by waiving requirements for certification. Officers will have 2 years from the date they ceased their employment to be reemployed and have all requirements for certification waived. The 2-year waiver is valid so long as the officer was honorably discharged.

In addition, adding § 203.83(a)(2) benefits those law enforcement officers that are not permitted to attend nonmandatory in-service courses by allowing them to attend the training provided they pay tuition to the Commission. This also benefits the employer and the public due to the additional training provided.

G. *Effect*

The final-form regulations will effect certified police officers and members of the State Police.

The impact of the final-form regulations will effect both recruits and veteran police officers. Recruits will be required to be retrained at the school they presently attend. This will be a new policy. Also, veteran officers will be able to change departments within 2 years of leaving a police department without having to meet the certification standards.

Allowing schools to conduct one class every 3 years puts less of a burden on those schools that cannot get enough recruits to hold a class every year.

Amending the certification section allows those individuals that leave a police department or the State Police 2 years from the date of departure to obtain another police position without going through the certification process so long as the members of the State Police have previously undergone a psychological evaluation. This change will make the process used to change employment more consistent with other professions and will save the Commission an enormous amount of time as far as processing applications.

By allowing law enforcement officers who are not eligible for reimbursement to attend nonmandatory in-service training classes after paying a tuition to the Commission those agencies will have better trained officers and be able to be trained along with municipal police officers.

H. *Paperwork Requirements and Fiscal Impact*

The final-form regulations do not create additional paperwork requirements other than those already utilized by the Commission and the regulations will have no fiscal impact on the Commonwealth.

I. *Input*

These final-form regulations were drafted with input from the members of the Commission, the Pennsylvania State Police Chief Counsel's and Policy Office, members of the Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association, the Fraternal Order of Police and the Pennsylvania State Troopers Association.

J. *Review*

Due to the nature of these final-form regulations and the compelling public interest in having properly trained and certified municipal police officers, the Commission will continue to review its regulations and update them if necessary to ensure their overall effectiveness and monitor whether they continue to serve the interests of the citizenry of this Commonwealth.

K. *Regulatory Review*

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on July 19, 2000, the Commission, through the State Police, submitted a copy of these final-form regulations to IRRC and to the Chairpersons of the House Judiciary Committee and the Senate Law and Justice Committee. In addition to submitting the final-form regulations in accordance with section 5(b) of the Regulatory Review Act, the Department has also provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a detailed Regulatory Analysis Form in compliance with Executive Order 1982-2, "Improving Government Regulations." A copy of the material is also available to the public upon request.

In preparing these final-form regulations, the Commission considered the comments received from IRRC, other commentators, the Committees and the regulated community.

IRRC contacted the Commission on August 3, 2000, and expressed concerns regarding several provisions in the final-form regulations relating to qualifications. On August 4, 2000, the Commission requested that the final-form regulations be tolled to permit the Commission to address the concerns expressed by IRRC. On August 8, 2000, IRRC approved the tolling request. The Department submitted revised final-regulations on September 6, 2000, to IRRC, the House Judiciary Committee and the Senate Law and Justice Committee. These final-form regulations were deemed approved by the House Judiciary Committee and the Senate Law and Justice Committee on September 16, 2000. IRRC met on September 21, 2000, and approved these final-form regulations in accordance with section 5(c) of the Regulatory Review Act.

M. *Findings*

The State Police and the Commission find that:

(1) Public notice of intention to amend these regulations amended by this order has been given under sections 201 and 202 of the act of July 31, 1968 (P. L. 769, No 240) (45 P. S. §§ 1201 and 1202) and the regulations promulgated thereunder, 1 Pa. Code §§ 7.1 and 7.2.

(2) The amendment of the regulations of the State Police and the Commission in the manner provided in this order is necessary and appropriate. A public comment period was provided as required by law and that the comments received were considered.

(3) The modifications that were made to these final-form regulations in response to comments received do not enlarge the purpose or scope of the proposed rulemaking published at 28 Pa.B. 2925

(4) The adoption of the regulations in the manner provided is necessary and appropriate for the administration of the authorizing statute.

N. *Order*

The Commission, through the State Police, acting under the authorizing statutes, orders that:

(a) The regulations of the State Police, 37 Pa. Code Chapter 203, are amended by amending §§ 203.11,

203.33, 203.36 and 203.83 to read as set forth in Annex A, with ellipses referring to the existing text of the regulations.

(b) The Commissioner of the State Police shall submit this order and Annex A to the Office of Attorney General and the Office of General Counsel for approval as required by law.

(c) The Commissioner of the State Police shall certify this order and Annex A and deposit them with the Legislative Reference Bureau as required by law.

(d) This order shall take effect immediately upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

TITLE 37. LAW

PART IV. MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS' EDUCATION AND TRAINING COMMISSION

Subpart A. MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS' EDUCATION AND TRAINING PROGRAM

CHAPTER 203. ADMINISTRATION OF THE PROGRAM

Subchapter B. POLICE OFFICER CERTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS

§ 203.11. Qualifications.

(a) Except as provided in subsection (b), persons who are to be employed as police officers by police departments within this Commonwealth from December 21, 1996, shall:

- (1) Be 18 years of age or older.
- (2) Possess a high school diploma or GED Equivalency.
- (3) Be citizens of the United States.
- (4) Be free from convictions of disqualifying criminal offenses.
- (5) Be personally examined by a Pennsylvania licensed physician. The examination shall include the following:
 - (i) Applicants shall be free from the addictive or excessive use of either alcohol or drugs which shall be determined using current laboratory testing procedures.
 - (ii) Applicants shall be free from the use of illegal controlled substances which shall be determined using current laboratory testing procedures.
 - (iii) Applicants physical condition shall be such that applicants could reasonably be expected to withstand significant cardiovascular stress.

(iv) Applicants shall be free from any debilitating conditions such as tremor, incoordination, convulsion, fainting episodes or other neurological conditions which may affect the applicants' ability to perform as police officers.

(v) Applicants shall have visual acuity of at least 20/70, uncorrected in the stronger eye, correctable to at least 20/20; and at least 20/200, uncorrected in the weaker eye, correctable to at least 20/40. In addition, the applicant

shall have normal depth and color perception and be free of any other significant visual abnormality.

(Editor's Note: Subparagraph (v) is suspended pending resolution of a lawsuit filed against the Pennsylvania State Police (Wilson v. Pennsylvania State Police, et al. No. 94-6547 U.S. District Court—Eastern District of Pennsylvania. See 28 Pa.B. 2924 (June 27, 1998).)

(vi) Applicants shall have audio acuity sufficient to distinguish a normal whisper at a distance of 15 feet. The test shall be independently conducted for each ear while the tested ear is facing away from the speaker and the other ear is firmly covered with the palm of the hand. The applicant may not use a hearing aid or other aid to perform the test. If the applicant fails this test, the applicant shall be required to take and pass a decibel audio test.

(vii) Applicants may not be missing any extremities, including digits, which would prevent performance of required police duties or meeting minimum training requirements.

(viii) Applicants shall be free from any other significant physical limitations or disabilities which would, in the physician's opinion, impair the applicant's ability to perform the duties of a police officer or complete the required minimum training requirements.

(6) Be personally examined by a Pennsylvania licensed psychologist and found to be psychologically capable to exercise appropriate judgment or restraint in performing the duties of a police officer. The examination shall include the following elements:

(i) *Interview and history.* The psychologist shall personally interview the applicant. The interview shall include a summary of the applicant's personal, educational, employment and criminal history.

(ii) *Required psychological test.* Applicants shall be administered a current standard form of the Minnesota Multiphasic Personality Inventory (MMPI).

(iii) *Other testing methods.* If the licensed psychologist is unable to certify the applicant's psychological capability to exercise appropriate judgment and restraint to perform the duties of a police officer including the handling of a lethal weapon, the psychologist shall employ whatever other appropriate techniques to form a professional opinion of the applicant's ability. The use of these additional techniques requires a full and complete written explanation to the Commission on a form submitted by the psychologist to the Commission indicating what additional testing has been performed and the results of the tests.

(7) Certify whether they have taken a physical examination or psychological evaluation conducted in conjunction with an application for police employment within the previous year and the outcome of the examination or evaluation.

(8) Be subject to a thorough background investigation conducted by the applicant's employing police department. The investigation shall include the following:

(i) A criminal history check including the submission of fingerprints to the Central Repository for the Commonwealth and to the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

(ii) A check of the applicant's credit history.

(iii) Personal interviews conducted with at least 3 people that have personal knowledge of the applicant but are not related to the applicant.

(iv) Interviews of the applicant's employers, if any, for the past 5 years to determine the applicant's work history.

(v) A check of the applicant's driving record verifying that the applicant has a valid driver's license.

(9) Successfully complete a basic police training course given at a Commission-certified school or obtain a waiver of training as enumerated in § 203.12 (relating to waiver of training).

(i) Successful completion of a basic police training course shall be determined by the training school, based upon Commission standards.

(ii) To qualify for this certification, an applicant shall:

(A) Achieve a minimum qualifying firearms score of 75%.

(B) Receive certification for First Aid and CPR from the American Red Cross, the Department of Health, the American Heart Association or other agencies approved by the Department of Health.

(C) Comply with Commission and school rules and regulations.

(D) Pass the same certification exam administered to those seeking waiver of training as set forth in § 203.12(4).

(E) Attend 100% of all classes.

(I) Excused absences shall be mutually agreed upon by the police officer's department head and school director. School directors shall determine excused absences for applicants not employed as police officers.

(II) Excused absentees shall include personal illness or injury, illness in the immediate family requiring the applicant's attention or death in the immediate family.

(F) Complete the basic training course approved by the Commission with a minimum grade as established by the Commission. The Commission will publish a notice in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* and in the Commission newsletter whenever the minimum grade on each tested area of examination changes.

(I) Applicants not achieving the minimum grade in any tested area shall repeat the failed training in that area before being eligible to take the examination in that tested area at a Commission-certified school. If the applicant fails to achieve the minimum grade on the applicant's second attempt, the applicant shall be required to successfully retake and pass the entire basic police training course to qualify for certification.

(II) Applicants not achieving the minimum grade in two separate tested areas during one basic police training course shall be required to retake and pass the entire basic police training course in order to qualify for certification.

(b) Subsection (a) does not apply to persons who meet one of the following conditions:

(1) Previously held valid certification issued by the Commission within 2 years prior to the date of employment on the application. Persons who received a certification prior to 1988 and who did not have a psychological evaluation shall obtain a psychological evaluation to obtain certification.

(2) Were sworn and full duty members honorably discharged from the Pennsylvania State Police within 2 years prior to the date of employment on the application for certification. A past member who enlisted in the

Pennsylvania State Police prior to May 1998 and who did not have a psychological evaluation shall obtain a psychological evaluation to obtain certification.

Subchapter C. SCHOOL REQUIREMENTS

§ 203.33. Minimum school standards and requirements.

* * * * *

(b) In addition to subsection (a), schools shall comply with the following requirements:

(1) Conduct at least one basic police training course every 3 years the school is certified.

* * * * *

§ 203.36. Revocation of school certification.

The Commission may, after notice and hearings in compliance with Subchapter G (relating to notice and hearings), revoke the certification of a school for one of the following reasons:

(1) Failure to comply with the minimum school standards in this chapter.

(2) Submission of a known false or fraudulent document or allowing the submission of known false or fraudulent documents to the Commission.

(3) Subcontracting of police training to another noncertified entity.

(4) Failure to take corrective action after suspension under § 203.35 (relating to emergency suspension of school certification).

(5) Failure to conduct one basic police training course every 3 years the school is certified.

Subchapter F. REIMBURSEMENT OF EXPENSES

§ 203.83. Grants for nonmandatory in-service training programs.

(a) The Commission will provide grants only for actual expenses incurred by political subdivisions for providing nonmandatory in-service training programs to police officers within this Commonwealth in accordance with the act and this chapter.

(1) Allowable nonmandatory in-service training expenses shall be limited to the following:

(i) *Instructors.* Reasonable expenditures.

(ii) *Services.* Reasonable expenditures for rental and contractual services.

(iii) *Supplies.* Expenditure for necessary supplies for course instruction not including nonexpendable equipment purchases.

(iv) *Administration.* Reasonable expenditures for developing and implementing the training program. This expenditure will not exceed 5% of the total grant amount unless otherwise approved by the Commission or In-Service Training Committee. This expenditure may not exceed 10% of the total grant amount.

(2) The Commission has the discretion to approve additional expenditures not explicitly provided for in this chapter. Expenses which are not approved by the Commission shall be borne by the political subdivision providing the training program. Law enforcement officers employed by a law enforcement agency not eligible for reimbursement under the act may attend nonmandatory in-service training courses after the law enforcement agency pays the tuition established for the course to the Commission.

(b) The Commission has the authority to establish the maximum amount of funds which may be granted to each county for providing nonmandatory in-service training to police officers. The allocation will be based on the number of police officers employed in the county.

(c) The Commission will disburse moneys approved for nonmandatory in-service training grants in the following manner:

(1) The Commission will disburse one half of the grant to the political subdivision within 45 days of the Commission's approval, except for good cause.

(2) To receive the remaining grant moneys, the political subdivision shall submit a final audit and course roster to the Commission within 120 days following the conclusion of the training course. Requests for reimbursement will not be considered after 120 days following the conclusion of the training course.

(3) The Commission has the discretion to request an

independent audit of the political subdivision to verify its actual nonmandatory training expenditures prior to disbursing the remaining grant amount.

(d) Nonmandatory in-service training grant funds that have been disbursed to a political subdivision in error or as a result of an unauthorized or improper request for reimbursement shall immediately be returned to the Commission. A political subdivision which fails to comply with the Commission's demand for the return of funds in accordance with this section shall be ineligible for further funding from the Commission until the funds are returned.

(e) The allocation of grants for nonmandatory in-service training programs shall be contingent upon the availability of funds appropriated for the programs.

PROPOSED RULEMAKING

PUBLIC SCHOOL EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT BOARD

[22 PA. CODE CH. 213]
Contributions and Benefits

The Public School Employees' Retirement Board (Board) proposes to amend Chapter 213 (relating to contributions and benefits). The amendments are being proposed to delete the restrictions for purchasing retirement credit thereby allowing the costs of purchase to be deducted from the actuarial value of the retirement account.

This proposal is being made to conform the Board's regulations with the policy adopted by the Board at its December 2, 1998, meeting allowing actuarial debt reduction for purchases of service.

A. *Effective Date*

These amendments will go into effect upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* as a final-form rulemaking.

B. *Contact Person*

C. *Statutory Authority*

This proposed rulemaking is being made under the authority of the Public School Employees' Retirement Code, 24 Pa.C.S. §§ 8502(h) and 8507(d) (code).

D. *Background and Purpose*

The Board is responsible for implementing the purchase of service provisions of the code, and a component of that purchase program is a method of paying for the purchase by eligible members, that is, their contributions. Although the code authorizes the contributions to be made in any manner agreed upon by the Board and member, the current regulations limit payment methods. Deletion of these provisions will restore the Board's statutory authority to authorize the actuarial debiting of the member's account as an agreed upon way to make these contributions.

The purpose of these proposed amendments is to permit the member and Board to agree upon how member contributions for the purchase of service can be made. Members would still have the option of paying by lump sum or payroll deduction but also would have the option to authorize an actuarial reduction in the value of their account to pay for the requested purchase. This would substantially reduce or eliminate out-of-pocket costs for members to avail themselves of service purchases authorized by the code. As noted, by policy of the Board, the Public School Employees' Retirement System (PSERS) currently permits the actuarial reduction of school member accounts for service purchases. These regulatory

repeals will conform the regulations to the current administrative policy. The State Employees' Retirement System is proposing a similar amendment of its regulations that will allow purchases of service to be paid by actuarial debt of State employees' accounts. This amendment will harmonize the regulations of the PSERS and State Employees Retirement Systems, especially with regard to multiple service members.

E. *Benefits, Costs and Compliance*

Executive Order 1996-1 requires a cost/benefit analysis of the proposed amendments.

Benefits

This proposed rulemaking would benefit school employees eligible for service purchases under the code. By reducing the potential out-of-pocket costs to members with an offsetting actuarial reduction in the value of their accounts, easier access to statutorily authorized service purchases would ensue without any loss in the fiscal integrity of the PSERS. Customer service would be improved together with a corresponding reduction in bookkeeping and recordkeeping to the extent that payroll deductions would be reduced.

Costs

There are nominal additional costs to the Commonwealth, its citizens or school employees associated with this proposal. There will be additional cost savings for both school employers and PSERS associated with this proposal.

Compliance Costs

The proposed amendments are not expected to impose additional compliance costs on school employees or employers.

F. *Sunset Review*

A sunset date for these regulations has not been assigned by the Board.

G. *Regulatory Review*

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on October 2, 2001, the Board submitted a copy of these proposed amendments to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and the Chairpersons of the House Education Committee and the Senate Finance Committee. In addition to submitting the proposed amendments, the Board has provided IRRC and the Committees with a detailed regulatory analysis form prepared by the PSERS in compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, "Regulatory Review and Promulgation." A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

Under section 5(g) of the Regulatory Review Act, if IRRC has objections to any portion of the proposed amendments, it will notify the Board within 10 days of the close of the Committees' review period. The notification shall specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met by the portion of the proposed amendments to which an objection has been made. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review by the General Assembly and the Governor of objections raised by IRRC prior to final publication of the amendments by the Board.

H. *Public Comments*

Written Comments. Interested persons are invited to submit comments, suggestions or objections regarding the

proposed amendments to the Public School Employees' Retirement System, 5 North Fifth Street, P. O. Box 125, Harrisburg, PA 17108-0125. Comments submitted by facsimile will not be accepted. Comments, suggestions or objections must be received by the Board by November 13, 2001. Interested persons may also submit a summary of their comments to the Board. The summary may not exceed 1 page in length and must be received by November 2, 2001. The one-page summary will be provided to each member of the Board in the agenda packet distributed prior to the meeting at which the final-form regulations will be considered.

A subject heading of the proposal and a return name and address must be included in each transmission. If an acknowledgment of electronic comments is not received by the sender within 2 working days, the comments should be transmitted by mail to ensure receipt.

CHAPTER 213. CONTRIBUTIONS AND BENEFITS

GENERAL PROVISIONS

§ 213.3. Eligibility points for retention and reinstatement of service credits.

(c) In all instances when creditable school or nonschool service may be purchased, an active member, having elected to purchase the service, is not permitted to cancel the purchase [**once payment has been made by lump sum, or once the member has agreed, in writing, to payroll deductions upon the terms and conditions as provided in this part**].

* * * * *

CONTRIBUTIONS

§ 213.23. Member contributions for creditable school service.

* * * * *

(d) [**The payment for the purchase of all credit authorized by this chapter, except that for sabbatical leave and activated military service leave, shall be payable in a lump sum within 90 days after certification of the amount due or, in the case of an active member, may be authorized through payroll deductions over a period of years not in excess of 6 years, if statutory interest at 4% annually is charged through the repayment period. The amount certified by the Board for the purchase of this credit shall be in accordance with methods approved by the actuary.**

(e)] * * *

§ 213.24. Contributions for the purchase of credit for creditable school and nonschool service.

* * * * *

(b) *Contributions for purchase of nonintervening military service.* The amount due for the purchase of nonintervening military service shall be calculated as follows: The average of the first 3 years' salaries subsequent to the military service, multiplied by the sum of the member's basic contribution rate and the normal contribution rate as determined by section 8328 of the Retirement Code (relating to actuarial cost method), relating to Commonwealth and district shares, and multiplied by the number of years or fractional years of military service.

[**The amount due for the purchase of the military service, as calculated under this subsection, may be paid in a lump sum within 90 days after certification of the amount due, or in the case of an active member, may be amortized through payroll deductions over a period of years not in excess of 5 years without interest.**] All amounts certified by the Board for the purchase of the service shall be in accordance with methods approved by the actuary. Nonintervening military service may not be purchased unless the active member has completed at least 3 years of subsequent credited school service as a Class T-C member.

(c) *Contributions for purchase of intervening military service.* An active member eligible to purchase credit for intervening military service shall pay the amount due in accordance with the following formula: The member's basic contribution rate at the time of entry into the active military service multiplied by the member's then compensation and by years of the military service together with statutory interest during all periods of subsequent school and State service to the date of purchase, if all the amounts due shall be in accordance with methods certified and approved by the actuary. [**The amounts due for the purchase of the service may be paid under one of the following methods:**

(1) **Regular monthly payments submitted through the school district based on the compensation of the member which the member would have received at the time of entry into active military service without statutory interest since the payments are made on a current contributing basis.**

(2) **A lump sum payment within 90 days of the date of the amount certified to be due and owing.**

(3) **Through amortized salary deductions over a period not to exceed 5 years.]**

(d) *Contributions for purchase of other creditable nonschool service.* An active member shall pay the amount due for creditable nonschool service in accordance with the following formula: The member's basic contribution rate plus the normal contribution rate, applied to the member's first year salary of credited school service subsequent to the creditable nonschool service sought to be purchased, multiplied by the number of years or fractional parts of a year of the service purchased, together with statutory interest during all subsequent years of school or State service to the date of purchase. [**The active member may pay the amount due in a lump sum payment within 90 days after the date of certification by the Board of the amount due or through salary deductions amortized over a 1, 2, but not more than 3-year period, if the statutory interest is charged through the repayment period, and if the amounts due are in accordance with**

methods certified and approved by the actuary.]
 This formula for purchase does not apply in the case of purchase of creditable nonschool service rendered to a county board of school directors. In this event, the member shall only pay the amount due based on the member's basic contribution rate exclusive of the normal contribution rate.

STATE BOARD OF COSMETOLOGY

[49 PA. CODE CH. 7] Examination Fees

The State Board of Cosmetology (Board) proposes to amend § 7.2 (relating to fees) to read as set forth in Annex A. The proposed rulemaking deletes references to the fees charged by testing organizations from the schedule of fees for the theory and performance examination for cosmetologists, cosmeticians, manicurists and teachers, and theory examination for managers.

A. Effective Date

This proposed rulemaking is effective on final publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

B. Statutory Authority

Section 12 of the Beauty Culture Law (law) (63 P. S. § 522) prescribes the time place and materials for examinations for licensure. Section 13(b) of the law (63 P. S. § 519(b)) requires the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (Bureau) to contract with a professional testing organization to prepare and administer examinations in accordance with section 812.1(a) of The Administrative Code of 1929 (71 P. S. § 279.3(a)). Under section 812.1(b) of The Administrative Code of 1929 each board has the discretionary power to charge a fee for the administration of and cost of each examination. Section 812.1(c) of The Administrative Code of 1929 defines cost as "all contractual charges relating to the preparation, administration, preparing, administering, grading and recording of the examination."

C. Background and Need for Amendment

Provision and Submission of Applications

The proposed amendment to § 7.2 reflects that the professional testing organization, not the Board, determines the fees charged for the examinations. The proposed amendment deletes references to the cost of the examinations in the Board's schedule of fees.

Elimination of References to Examination Fees

The proposed amendment to § 7.2 deletes references to the fees for the theory and performance examination for cosmetologists, cosmeticians, manicurists and teachers, and theory examination for managers. These fees are set by the administrators of the examinations, not by the Board. To avoid the necessity of amending the regulations whenever the examination administrator changes the fees, the Board proposes to delete references to the fees.

D. Description of Proposed Amendments

The proposed rulemaking deletes references to the fees for the theory and performance examination for cosmetologists, cosmeticians, manicurists and teachers, and theory examination for managers. The fees are set by the professional testing organizations.

E. Compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, Regulatory Review and Promulgation

The Board reviewed this proposed rulemaking and considered its purpose and likely impact upon the public and the regulated population under the directives of Executive Order 1996-1. The proposed rulemaking addresses a compelling public interest as described in this Preamble and otherwise complies with Executive Order 1996-1.

F. Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed rulemaking will have no fiscal impact on the Board or its licensees. The proposed rulemaking should have no fiscal impact on the private sector, the general public or political subdivisions. The amendment will avoid preparation of new regulations each time an examination fee is changed and should not create additional paperwork for the private sector.

G. Sunset Date

The Board monitors its regulations on a continuing basis. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

H. Regulatory Review

Under section 5(a) of the Regulatory Review Act (71 P. S. § 745.5(a)), on September 27, 2001, the Board submitted a copy of this proposed rulemaking to the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) and the Chairpersons of the House Professional Licensure Committee and Senate Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee for review and comment. In addition to submitting the proposed rulemaking, the Board has provided IRRC and the Committees with a copy of a detailed Regulatory Analysis Form prepared by the Board in compliance with Executive Order 1996-1, "Regulatory Review and Promulgation." A copy of this material is available to the public upon request.

If IRRC has objections to any portion of the proposed rulemaking, it will notify the Board within 10 days after the expiration of the Committees' review period. The notification shall specify the regulatory review criteria which have not been met by that portion. The Regulatory Review Act specifies detailed procedures for review, prior

to final-form publication of the regulation, by the Board, the General Assembly and the Governor of objections raised.

I. Public Comment

STATE BOARD OF DENTISTRY

[49 PA. CODE CH. 33]

Application Fees

The State Board of Dentistry (Board) proposes to amend § 33.3 (relating to fees) by revising certain application fees to read as set forth in Annex A.

A. Effective Date

The amendment will be effective upon publication of the final-form regulation in the Pennsylvania Bulletin.

B. Statutory Authority

The proposed amendment is authorized under section 4(b) of the Dental Law (law) (63 P. S. § 123(b)).

C. Background and Purpose

The law requires the Board to set fees by regulation so that revenues meet or exceed expenditures over a biennial period. General operating expenses of the Board for services that are provided directly to individual licensees or applicants are excluded from general operating revenues and are funded through fees in which the cost of providing the service forms the basis for the fee.

In a recent systems audit of the operations of the Board within the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (Bureau), the fees for services to licensees and applicants were analyzed to determine if the fees reflected the actual cost of providing the services. Actual cost calculations are based upon the following formula:

Number of minutes to perform the function
x
Pay rate for the classification of personnel performing the function
+
A proportionate share of administrative overhead

The analysis, with regard to the Board, determined that there are currently no fees for two services, which do not support the actual cost of providing those services: application for dental radiology authorization and notification application—postgraduate training or faculty member.

Section 11.4 of the law (63 P. S. § 130e) provides that no auxiliary personnel may perform radiologic procedures unless under the direct supervision of the dentist who is on the premises at the time that the X-ray is taken, and unless the person has passed the radiologic examination. Section 33.302 (relating to auxiliary personnel performing radiologic procedures) implements these provisions. Persons who have passed the Board approval dental radiologic procedure examination file an application requesting authorization to perform those radiologic procedures under the direct supervision of a dentist. A letter of authorization is issued by the Board.

Section 2(d) of the law (63 P. S. § 121(d)) allows dentists who are licensed in another state or country to practice without Pennsylvania licensure in this Commonwealth for the limited purpose of teaching, including clinical teaching, in a dental school or advanced dental education program in this Commonwealth approved by the Board after notification to the Board and in accordance with Board regulations. Section 2(f) of the law also allows the practice of dentistry without a license by persons in a dental clinic operated not for profit during the duration of an internship, residency or other approved graduate training program, by persons with the required education for admission into the program, and after notification to the Board.

In this proposal, fees for the services identified previously would be adjusted to allocate costs to those who use the service or make application. The Board would continue to apportion enforcement and operating costs to the general licensing population by means of its license renewal fee through the biennial reconciliation of revenue and expenditures.

Administrative Overhead

During reviews of similar proposed application fee regulations for other boards, the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) requested that the Bureau and the boards: (1) itemize the overhead cost to be recouped by the fees; and (2) reexamine the method that is used to determine the administrative overhead factor for each fee.

IRRC commented that although the Bureau's method was reasonable, there was no assurance that the fees would recover the actual overhead cost because the charge was not related to the service, and because the charge was based on the actual rather than the projected expenditures. IRRC also commented that there was no certainty that the projected revenues would meet or exceed projected expenditures over a 2-year period, as required under enabling statutes.

In computing overhead charges, the boards and the Bureau include expenses resulting from service of support staff operations, equipment, technology initiatives or upgrades, leased office space and other sources not directly attributable to a specific board. Once determined, the Bureau's total administrative charge is apportioned to each board based upon the board's share of the total active licensee population. In turn, the board's administrative charge is divided by the number of active licensees to calculate a "per application" charge which is added to direct personnel cost to establish the cost of processing. The administrative charge is consistently applied to every application regardless of how much time the staff spends processing the application.

This method of calculating administrative overhead to be apportioned to fees for services was first included in the biennial reconciliation of fees and expenses conducted

in 1988-89. In accordance with the regulatory review, the method was approved by the Senate and House Standing Committees and IRRC as reasonable and consistent with the legislative intent of statutory provisions which require the Board to establish fees which meet or exceed expenses.

IRRC suggested that within each board, the administrative charge should be determined by the amount of time required to process each application. For example, an application requiring ½ hour of processing time would pay one-half as much overhead charge as an application requiring 1 hour of processing time. The Bureau concurs with IRRC that by adopting this methodology the Bureau and the boards would more nearly and accurately accomplish their objective of setting fees that cover the cost of the service. Therefore, in accordance with IRRC's suggestions, the Bureau conducted a test to compare the resulting overhead charges obtained by applying the IRRC suggested time factor versus the current method.

This review of board operations showed that approximately 25% of staff time was devoted to providing services described in the regulations. The current method recouped 22% to 28% of the administrative overhead charges versus 25% recouped using a ratio-based time factor. However, when the time factor is combined with the licensing population for each board, the resulting fees vary widely even though different licensees may receive the same services, for example, using the time-factor method to issue a verification of licensure would cost \$34.58 for a landscape architect as compared with a cost of \$10.18 for a cosmetologist. Conversely, under the Bureau method the administrative overhead charge of \$9.76 represents the cost of processing a verification application for all licensees in the Bureau. Also, the Bureau found that employing a time factor in the computation of administrative overhead would result in a different amount of overhead charge being made for each fee proposed.

With regard to IRRC's suggestions concerning projected versus actual expenses, the boards note that the computation of projected expenditures based on amount actually expended has been the basis for biennial reconciliations for the past 12 years. During these 6 biennial cycles, the experience of both the boards and the Bureau has established that verifiable data can be substantiated by collective bargaining agreements, pay scales and cost benefit factors. This method has provided a reliable basis for fees. Also, the fees are kept at a minimum for licensees, but appear adequate to sustain the operations of the boards over an extended period. Similarly, accounting, recordkeeping and swift processing of applications, renewals and other fees were the primary basis for "rounding up" the actual costs to establish a fee. This rounding up process has in effect resulted in the necessary but minimal cushion or surplus to accommodate unexpected needs and expenditures.

For these reasons, the boards have not made changes in the method by which administrative expenditures are allocated and the resulting fees will remain as proposed.

D. Description of Services

Professional licensing boards other than the Board have also been proposing revisions to nonrenewal fees. Review of the proposed new fee regulations by the House Professional Licensure Committee and Senate Consumer Protection and Professional License Committee indicated that certain explanations of the services for which fees are charged would be helpful for an understanding of the need to set appropriate fees.

Application Fee for Dental Radiology Authorization

This fee is necessary to offset costs incurred by the Board to process a request for authorization to perform radiologic procedures under the direct supervision of a dentist.

Applicants apply to and are examined by a professional testing contractor. Candidates who pass the examination are reported to the Bureau by the contractor. This information is entered into the Bureau's database and an authorization letter is issued to the applicant. The information must be maintained in the database perpetually, for informational purposes and also for providing duplication authorization letters upon request. This fee is the only contribution applicants make to the operational expenses of the Board since the authorization is not subject to renewal. The administrative overhead charge has been averaged for the boards offering the radiology examination.

Notification Application—Postgraduate Training or Faculty Member

This fee is necessary to offset costs incurred by the Board to process a notification application for postgraduate training or faculty member.

The Board receives the application and supporting documents, reviews for completeness, contacts the applicant to request any missing information or documents, or both, confirms the status of the applicant's license in another state or foreign education, if applicable, and issues a letter of authorization, or discrepancy notice, as appropriate.

G. Description of Proposed Amendments

A \$20 fee would be established for Board authorization to perform radiologic procedures under the direct supervision of a dentist. A \$25 fee is proposed to issue an approval of training.

H. Compliance with Executive Order 1996-1

In accordance with Executive Order 1996-1 (February 6, 1996), in drafting and promulgating the proposed amendment, the Board considered the least restrictive alternative to regulate costs for services requested by licensees and applicants. The Board solicited predraft comments from 133 dental organizations, schools and individuals on July 18, 2001.

I. Fiscal Impact and Paperwork Requirements

The proposed rulemaking will have no adverse fiscal impact on the Commonwealth or its political subdivisions. The fees will have a modest fiscal impact on those members of the private sector who apply for services from the Board. The amendments will impose no additional paperwork requirements upon the Commonwealth, political subdivisions or the private sector.

J. Sunset Date

The Board continuously monitors the cost effectiveness of its regulations. Therefore, no sunset date has been assigned.

The Department has determined that the proposed equipment will comply with all applicable regulatory requirements pertaining to air contaminant sources and the emission of air contaminants including the best available technology requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12. The Department consequently intends to issue plan approval for the installation of the respective equipment. Additionally, if the Department determines that equipment is operating in compliance with all applicable plan approval conditions and regulatory requirements following their construction, the conditions established in the plan approval will be incorporated into an operating permit.

The Department intends to place conditions in the plan approval to be issued pertaining to the operation and monitoring of the two wave soldering machines and eight hand soldering stations. These conditions are intended to assure proper operation of the equipment as well as maintenance of compliance with all applicable air quality regulatory requirements. The following is a summary of these conditions:

1. The company shall not use more than 800 gallons of flux or 800 gallons of thinner or 3.6 tons of solder paste in the two wave soldering machines and eight associated hand soldering stations during a 12 consecutive month period.

2. The eight hand soldering stations shall not use more than 2 tons of solder per 12 consecutive month period or use a solder that contains a lead content greater than 40% by weight.

3. The two wave soldering machines shall not use more than 3.6 tons of solder per 12 consecutive month period or use solder that contains a lead content greater than 35% by weight.

4. The company shall keep monthly records of the amount of each solder, flux and thinner that is used in association with the two wave soldering machines and eight hand soldering stations.

49-309-007K: Meckley's Limestone Products, Inc. (R. D. 1 Box 1682, Herndon, PA 17830-9799) for construction of a 1,000 ton capacity pulverized limestone storage silo, incorporating a bulk tank truck loadout spout and associated air cleaning device (fabric collector) in Lower Mahanoy Township, **Northumberland County**.

The air contaminant emissions from the new limestone silo will be controlled by a new fabric collector, while the air contaminant emissions from the bulk tank truck loadout spout will be controlled by an existing fabric collector. The maximum potential for air contaminants to be emitted into the atmosphere from the exhaust of the new fabric collector is 0.38 ton of particulate matter in any 12 consecutive month period. There will be no increase in any air contaminant emissions from the existing fabric collector.

The Department has determined that the proposed storage silo, truck loadout spout and associated fabric collector will comply with all applicable regulatory requirements pertaining to air contaminant sources and the emission of air contaminants including the best available technology requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12. The Department consequently intends to issue plan approval for the construction of the respective equipment. Additionally, if the Department determines that equipment is operating in compliance with all applicable plan approval conditions and regulatory requirements following its construction, the conditions established in the plan approval will be incorporated into an operating permit via administrative amendment under 25 Pa. Code § 127.450.

The Department intends to place conditions in the plan approval to be issued pertaining to the operation and monitoring of the storage silo, bulk tank truck loadout spout and associated fabric collector. These conditions are intended to assure proper operation of the equipment as well as maintenance of compliance with all applicable air quality regulatory requirements. The following is a summary of these conditions:

1. The loadout spout shall be used to load tank trucks only; no open top trucks are to be loaded with this loadout spout. When not in use, the loadout spout shall be gated or valved off from the fabric collector.

2. The new fabric collector exhaust shall not contain particulate matter in excess of 0.02 grain per dry standard cubic foot of exhaust.

3. The fabric collectors shall be equipped with instrumentation to continuously monitor the differential pressure across the collector. The air compressor supplying

compressed air to the fabric collectors shall be equipped with an air dryer and oil trap.

4. The company shall keep onsite a sufficient quantity of spare fabric collector bags for the fabric collectors in order to be able to immediately replace any bags requiring replacement due to deterioration resulting from routine operation of the sources and fabric collectors.

5. No more than a total of two bulk loadout spouts controlled by the fabric collector associated with the loadout spout approved herein shall be in simultaneous use at any given time.

18-313-018C: Avery Dennison Chemical Division (US) (R. R. 2, Box 70, Mill Hall, PA 17751) for construction of a reactor and several pieces of chemical processing equipment and for the modification of a reactor and several pieces of chemical processing equipment in Bald Eagle Township, **Clinton County**. These sources may potentially result in the emission of 0.742 ton per 12 consecutive month period of volatile organic compounds, 0.631 ton of which may also be hazardous air pollutants. A preliminary review of the information submitted by Avery Dennison Chemical Division (US) indicates that the sources will meet all applicable air quality requirements including the best available technology provisions of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12. Based on this finding, the Air Quality Program intends to approve the application and issue a plan approval to construct/modify the sources. Additionally, if the Department determines that the sources are operating in compliance with all applicable plan approval conditions and regulatory requirements, the conditions established in the plan approval will be incorporated into an operating permit via administrative amendment in accordance with 25 Pa. Code § 127.450.

In order to ensure compliance with all applicable air quality standards, the Department proposes to place the following conditions in the respective plan approval:

1. The air contaminant emissions from all sources shall be controlled by an existing Yorkaire "vertical 500 cfm" thermal fume oxidizer and an existing Con-Serve model #1500-M3 thermal fume oxidizer.

2. The sources shall be covered at all times during use and shall not be vented to atmosphere other than through the two thermal fume oxidizers except as may be allowed under condition 5 herein.

3. No more than 40 cfm shall be vented to either one of the thermal fume oxidizers. If the sources identified herein and the sources identified in Operating Permit 18-313-018B are, in total, venting in excess of 40 cfm, both thermal fume oxidizers must be in use, except as may be allowed by condition 5 herein.

4. The thermal fume oxidizers, when in use, shall be operated so that the oxidizer exit gas temperature is at least 1600°F at all times, except as may be allowed under condition 7 herein.

5. The thermal oxidizers may be bypassed or operated at a temperature of less than 1600°F for up to 30 minutes per month, during which time the reactors and chemical processing equipment may continue to operate. The permittee shall maintain accurate records of all occurrences and shall provide these records to the Department upon request.

6. The outlet temperature of the thermal fume oxidizers shall be continuously monitored and recorded. These records shall be retained onsite for at least 5 years and made available to the Department upon request.

7. The products produced in the new reactor (R-800) shall be water-based polymer or copolymer products used as adhesives, coatings or resins, manufactured from a monomer mixture containing no more than 37% vinyl acetate by weight (measured as a percentage of total monomer content), containing no monomer with a vapor pressure higher than vinyl acetate and containing no halogenated solvents. Additionally, production in reactor R-800 shall not exceed 876 batches per calendar year.

8. Modified reactor R-700 may be used to produce solvent-based polymer or copolymer products used as adhesives, coatings or resins, as described in the application and supplemental materials submitted for this plan approval. Reactor R-700 may also continue to be used to produce water-based polymer or copolymer products used as adhesives, coatings or resins, in accordance with the provisions of condition 13 of Operating Permit 18-313-018B. The production rate of both solvent-based and water-based products shall, in total, never exceed 876 batches per year.

9. The use of any hazardous air pollutants differing from those described in any applicable plan approval application must be approved by the Department, in writing, prior to their use.

49-310-007: Central Builders Supply Co. (P. O. Box 152, Sunbury, PA 17801) for construction of a new wet sand and gravel processing plant in West Chillisquaque Township, **Northumberland County**.

The plant will incorporate various crushing, conveying and screening equipment. Particulate matter emissions from the wet sand and gravel processing equipment are expected to be minimal due to the moist nature of the initial material being processed and the water which will be applied throughout the process. The main entrance/exit road of the facility will be concreted or paved in order to reduce any possible road dust.

The Department has determined that the proposed wet sand and gravel processing plant will comply with all applicable regulatory requirements pertaining to air contaminant sources and the emission of air contaminants including the best available technology requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.1 and 127.12. The Department consequently intends to issue plan approval for the construction of the respective equipment. Additionally, if the Department determines that equipment is operating in compliance with all applicable plan approval conditions and regulatory requirements following its construction, the Department intends to issue an operating permit.

The Department intends to place conditions in the plan approval to be issued to assure proper operation of the equipment as well as maintenance of compliance with all applicable regulatory requirements. The following is a summary of these conditions:

1. If at any time it is determined that the air contaminant emissions from the crushing, screening, conveying and the like, equipment are in excess of any applicable air contaminant emission limitations, the company shall install water spray dust suppression nozzles and/or take other control measures as are necessary to reduce the air contaminant emissions to within the applicable limitations.

2. The air contaminant emissions from the wet sand and gravel plant shall comply with the applicable requirements specified in Subpart OOO of the Federal Standards of Performance for New Stationary Sources, 40 CFR 60.670—60.676.

3. No generators or engines shall be constructed.

4. The company shall have onsite an operable water truck equipped with a pressurized spray bar to be used, as needed, for the prevention and control of fugitive air contaminant emissions from the roadways, stock piles, truck loading activities and so on.

1. The emission of particulate matter, nitrogen oxides and carbon monoxide shall not exceed .3 pound, .08 pound and 1.35 pounds per million BTU of heat input, respectively.
2. The boiler shall only be fired on green or kiln-dried wood. No coated or treated wood, laminated wood, particleboard, flakeboard or materials other than green or kiln-dried wood shall be burned.
3. All wood fuel placed in the storage silo associated with the boiler shall be blended at a consistent ratio to avoid fuel stratification and consequent boiler combustion upsets.

5. The multiclone collector ash discharge system shall remain sealed from the open air except when changing collection drums and the level of accumulated ash in the collection drum shall be checked daily.

CERTIFIED EMISSION REDUCTION CREDITS IN PENNSYLVANIA'S ERC REGISTRY

Emission reduction credits (ERC) are surplus, permanent, quantified and Federally enforceable emission reductions used to offset emission increases of oxides of nitrogen (NOx), volatile organic compounds (VOCs) and the following criteria pollutants: carbon monoxide (CO), lead (Pb), oxides of sulfur (SOx), particulate matter (PM), PM-10 and PM-10 precursors.

The Department of Environmental Protection (Department) maintains an ERC registry in accordance with the requirements of 25 Pa. Code § 127.209. The ERC registry system provides for the tracking of the creation, transfer and use of ERCs. Prior to registration of the credits, ERC Registry Applications are reviewed and approved by the Department to confirm that the ERCs meet the requirements of 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.206—127.208. Registration of the credits in the ERC registry system constitutes certification that the ERCs satisfy applicable requirements and that the credits are available for use. The following registered and certified ERCs in the ERC Registry are currently available for use as follows:

- (1) To satisfy new source review (NSR) emission offset ratio requirements;
- (2) To “net-out” of NSR at ERC-generating facilities;
- (3) To sell or trade the ERCs for use as emission offsets at new or modified facilities.

The certified ERCs shown, expressed in tons per year (tpy), satisfy the applicable ERC requirements contained in 25 Pa. Code §§ 127.206—127.208. ERCs created from the curtailment or shutdown of a source or facility expires for use as offsets 10 years after the emission reduction occurs. ERCs generated by the overcontrol of emissions by an existing facility do not expire for use as offsets. However, credits in the registry which are not used in a plan approval will be discounted if new air quality requirements are adopted by the Department or United States Environmental Protection Agency.

Finding Chester County

Pursuant to the provisions of 71 P. S. Section 2002(b), the secretary of Transportation makes the following written finding:

The Department of Transportation plans to reconstruct the bridge on S.R. 3034, London Tract Road, that lies completely within the White Clay Creek Preserve located in the southeastern part of London Britain Township, Chester County, Pennsylvania. The Project site is 1.25 miles northwest of the Delaware-Pennsylvania border, midway between roadways PA 896 and PA 41.

The scope of the Project involves eliminating weight limit restrictions by providing a new bridge, and correcting the substandard sight distances and horizontal alignments of the approach roadways. The London Tract Road bridge approaches are under Township jurisdiction, while the bridge remains a PENNDOT structure, and therefore, retains the PENNDOT S.R. 3034 nomenclature as per a pre-Project municipal turnback agreement.

The proposed bridge replacement project will impact two (2) Section 2002 resources, the London Tract Historic District which was determined eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places, and the White Clay Creek Preserve, a part of the Pennsylvania State Park System. Based upon these studies, there is no feasible and prudent alternative to the minor right of way take of 0.3094 acres from the White Clay Creek Preserve. The State Historic Preservation Office has concurred in a letter dated August 28, 2000, that the Project will have no adverse effect on the National Register eligible London Tract Historic District.

The Project is being designed to be aesthetically compatible with the adjacent London Tract Historic District, and it will not substantially impair protected attributes or contributing elements of this surrounding cultural resource. Roadway embankment that has been affected by roadway reconstruction will be reseeded in accordance with a native species Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural resources landscaping plan. Roadway impacts will be minimized by reducing lane and shoulder widths to minimums allowed, and by providing grass shoulders and timber guiderails on roadway approaches.

The replacement bridge will have a lower profile, longer span superstructure with new abutments behind the existing stream banks. Cast-stone form liners will be implemented on bridge concrete.

Stream environment will be protected wetland fencing, biologists and stream edge plantings, and a Chester County-approved erosion and sedimentation plan. In-stream construction will be prohibited from March 1 through June 15 in order to protect the high quality fish population.

I have considered the environmental, economic, social, and other effects of the proposed project as enumerated in Section 2002 of the Administrative Code, and have concluded that there is no feasible and prudent alternative to the project as designed, and all reasonable steps have been taken to minimize such effect. No adverse environmental effect is likely to result from the construction of the Project.

Retention of a Consulting Firm/Team

Value Pricing Study/Implementation/Pilot Project Western, Central and Eastern Regions

Reference No. 3-142

The Turnpike Commission (Commission) will retain a consulting team for a contract to perform a Value Pricing Study and Implementation of a Pilot Program. The consulting team should include the necessary engineering, financial, market research and public involvement skills to perform all project tasks. This contract will be initiated with a 12 month basic study and evaluation phase. Upon a joint agency approval, authorization to be given to begin the second 12 month phase; implementation of short-term pilot variable pricing programs for both commercial and passenger vehicles. If the pilot program sufficiently meets the operational and revenue needs of the Commission, authorization will be given to begin the third phase, implementation of a long term value-pricing program on designated Turnpike facilities.

The proposed study will build upon the results of a preliminary variable pricing analysis performed for the Commission by Wilbur Smith Associates (WSA). Preliminary analysis of congestion pricing alternates for Turnpike facilities was part of an overall traffic, revenue and operations study performed by WSA. This study involved a limited number of motorist surveys, analysis of four

variable pricing scenarios and an evaluation of traffic and revenue impacts. This study did not involve any analysis of social and economic impacts or local road impacts. The results of the prestudy showed the potential to reduce traffic during peak hours by an average 10% to 30%, depending on scenario and peak period surcharge.

The WSA prestudy will be used as a basis for the Phase 1 value pricing study, with congestion management as a basic goal of the study. The concept of pricing differentials will be evaluated throughout the study and implementation phases to assist in congestion management by: (1) providing an economic incentive for traffic to move away from peak period; (2) providing an economic marketing incentive to customers who use electronic toll collection (ETC), which maximizes lane capacity at toll plazas and minimizes traffic queues at the points where commuter traffic enters and exits; (3) promote the safe and efficient movement of traffic; and (4) enhance traffic and revenue growth without compromising existing and projected revenue levels.

The Variable Pricing Study will place emphasis on the development and adoption of Phase 2 piloting strategies that will provide significant relief at congestion points along the system. The three phases are summarized as follows:

Phase 1—Basic Study and Evaluation

This details the general scope of work, budget and schedule for Phase 1 of the Value Pricing Pilot Project. The detailed scope of work prepared by the consultant will be subject to approval by the Commission, the Department of Transportation (PennDOT) and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA). The initial stage of work will consist of a 12-month study to determine the baseline operating conditions along the Turnpike, at the interchanges and at nearby off-Turnpike locations. Phase 1 will also include a refinement of the previously studied variable pricing scenarios and programs to analyze and estimate impacts based on more detailed inputs from market research studies, including stated preference surveys and focus group surveys. The evaluation of the passenger vehicle component will include a separate review of the motorcycle subset. Phase 1 will include a program of outreach and marketing to promote the goals of congestion management and more efficient processing of traffic through ETC. Phase 1 will also include coordination with the appropriate municipal planning organizations and with the Wilmington-Harrisburg Freight Study being conducted by the Lancaster County Planning Commission. There will be provisions for an ongoing inter-agency review process. The Phase 1 work plan should include a task for evaluating the capability of the Commission's ETC system to support the value pricing scenarios being evaluated for potential implementation. The specific pricing pilot projects, outreach approach and scope of monitoring and evaluation for Phase 2, will be developed as important Phase 1 activities. These will be subject to joint agency approval by the Commission, PennDOT and FHWA. A report will be prepared to document Phase 1 conclusions and recommendations.

Phase 2—Pilot Implementation Programs

This phase will involve implementation of short-term (approximately 12 months) pilot variable pricing programs for both commercial vehicles and passenger vehicles, with emphasis on congestion management in the highly congested Philadelphia region. The Commission has in place an existing discounted commercial hauler fare collection system for most major trucking firms that

utilize the Turnpike system on a recurring basis. Consideration of preservation of this discount system will need to be a part of the evaluation of commercial vehicle pilot scenarios. E-Z Pass has not yet been implemented for commercial vehicles, but will be implemented during the life of this value pricing project.

The passenger vehicle pilot implementation program will be based on the existing E-Z Pass system now operating between the Harrisburg and Philadelphia regions. It will also utilize a larger number of E-Z Pass lanes at the interchange toll plazas, which are scheduled for completion by January 2002, under an ongoing program of ETC improvements and expansions on the Turnpike system.

The short-term pilot implementation programs will be preceded by a program of public outreach and marketing and will involve the collection of operating information similar to that gathered during the baseline data gathering process of Phase 1. The pilot programs will be monitored and evaluated for effectiveness and for achievement of congestion management and forecasted revenue neutrality goals, and the results will be compared with the baseline data. Revealed preference surveys will be conducted on those persons interviewed as part of the stated preference surveys and focus groups.

A task is to be incorporated into the Phase 1 Work Plan for the consultant team to develop a specific Phase 2 monitoring and evaluation plan for approval by the Commission, PennDOT and FHWA prior to undertaking the pilot phase.

Phase 3—Decision Mechanism

Phase 2 activities will include the preparation of a scope of work for Phase 3 and a report including conclusions and recommendations from Phase 2. Information gathered as part of Phase 2 will allow the Commission to determine: whether the pilot program sufficiently meets operational and revenue needs; whether modifications are necessary; and whether value pricing should be implemented along the Turnpike on a long term basis.

Phase 3—Implement Value Pricing Program on Designated Turnpike Facilities

Phase 2 provides an opportunity for the Commission to make an informed decision as to whether to implement value pricing on a permanent basis on designated Turnpike facilities. A schedule and budget would need to be developed for Phase 3 if a decision to implement is made.

The specific facilities to be studied are as follows:

Philadelphia Region

(1) Turnpike Mainline (I-76 and I-276) from Downingtown Interchange to Delaware River Bridge Interchange—Length 47.0 miles

(2) Northeast Extension (I-476) from Mid-County Interchange to Lehigh Valley Interchange—Length 37.2 miles

Pittsburgh Region

Turnpike Mainline (I-76) from Cranberry Interchange to New Stanton Interchange—Length 39.0 miles

Lancaster Region

Congestion on Parallel Route (US 30) Study by Lancaster County. The Commission will cooperate with the Lancaster County study of the Wilmington-Harrisburg freight corridor and evaluate the potential for use of excess Turnpike Mainline (I-76) capacity from Harrisburg East Interchange to Downingtown Interchange—Length 64.6 miles.
